

## FIOTSAM AND JETSAM



hat will fill the "Flotsam" section if we can't report the activities of DCA? That day may be coming soon. And with it the loss of competition on air routes between the Antilles. Curaçao officials are saying that further attempts at keeping the company operational are pointless, considering the seizure by creditors whenever government financial support is provided. The PAR political party believes the bankruptcy advised by the General and Legal Affairs department from the start of the recent "salvation" exercise should be begun immediately.

DCA is upside down. Of a fleet that used to consist of three MD-82 jets, four DC-9s and two Twin Otters, only two DC-9 jets are still flying. Schedules and routes can't be maintained.

PAR doesn't see the point of continuing to support the practically bankrupt company. "The Island Council shouldn't put more money into DCA because it simply can't be done." The last transfusion of NAf12 million in support of DCA was seized by creditors. To circumvent this, the party suggested establishing an institute called "Emergency Welfare for DCA Employees," to be subsidized with NAf4.5 million, which would cover the airline 's employee salary expenses for three months.

They further suggested providing guidance to airline employees so they can find other jobs quickly. PAR will insist that the Minister of Traffic grant permits as soon as possible to other companies so they can take over the open DCA routes.

▶ The promise made of flying to the US from Bonaire may soon come true in an unexpected way, not via BonairExel, but via CuraçaoExel. CuraçaoExel expects to start flying Bonaire-Curação-St. Marten next week, on Monday, October 4. Meanwhile requests were made to the Transportation Ministry for flights to New York (Newark), Memphis, Miami and Panama. The company plans to open those routes in a few weeks. Two leased Boeing 737-400s are on order. Curação-Exel is not a separate company, but a subsidiary of Dutch Eagle Express (DEE), as is BonairExel. They are all part of the Exel Aviation Group with its head office in Amsterdam.


▶ CuraçaoExel has scheduled a morning and afternoon flight to St.

Martin, Monday through Friday. The morning flight will depart from Hato, Curaçao, at 10 am, and the afternoon flight will depart at 4 pm. The return flights from St. Martin will be at 1 pm and 7 pm. On Saturdays and Sundays there will be only a morning flight. Passengers from Bonaire can connect through Curaçao without having to change planes. The flight schedule offers connection to the flights of the Dutch

CaribbeanExel (on Mondays and Thursdays) from Curação to Amsterdam.

CuraçaoExel will conduct the flights with an ATR that can fly to St. Marten in 1 hour and 40 minutes, only a few minutes more than a jet. The aircraft is supposed to arrive in Curaçao with Curaçao-Exel livery this Friday. Round trip tickets to St. Martin from Bonaire will be NAf397 guilders, the same as from Curacao.

ArubaExel can't seem to be able to get into the air. Obtaining the necessary permits from the Aruban authorities is going much slower than anticipated. The aircraft reserved for ArubaExel, and painted in its colors, is being used by BonairExel because one of its planes is awaiting a new engine.



▶ When and if it is taken over by the Exel Aviation Group, Winair, the Central Government-owned airline that services the SSS islands (Saba, Statia and St. Maarten), will be renamed WindwardExel, announced Exel's President Harm Prins last Friday. Prins said he was "quite confident" that Exel would take

over Winair's operations but kept all options open, as there is no final agreement yet. The deadline for the takeover is October 15, when Winair's moratorium on debt payments ends. The airline has been in financial difficulty for some time.

"There will be a solution by next week. I would be surprised if that would not be the case," Prins said. The Central Government, Winair's owner, has to be willing to sell the airline's shares to Exel, explained Prins. "At this stage we have a fair agreement with the Central Government," he said.

Winair's shares would be transferred to **Dutch Eagle Express, the holding company established in Bonaire**. The three Windward Islands will each hold a "golden share" that will enable them to discuss inter-island connections with Exel. According to CEO Robert Gibbs, "We are committed, without pressure from government. We have to make sure the islands are connected. My family from St. Eustatius would also never accept anything else," he said. In Curaçao, Exel has CuraçaoExel, in Bonaire, BonairExel, and in Aruba, ArubaExel.



▶ It's been impossible to travel to Venezuela directly from Bonaire for some time. To remedy this Jasta Travel has organized **charter flights to Valencia**, a popular destination for tourism and medical treatment. The charter airline, *Venezolano Aereo Servicio Sur America* (ASSA), will fly its 19-passenger aircraft three times a week on Sunday, Wednesday and Friday. Contact Jasta Travel at 786-9444, 569-6962 or 563-1697 or pass by their office at Flamingo Airport. The possibilities of flying to Los Roques or Margarita are being considered as well.

▶ While clearing Immigration in New York last week we noticed passengers entering the US who were not US citizens were required to have their fingerprints taken as part of the country's additional security measures. The new procedures began September 30 and will apply to almost all non-US citizens, with the exception of passengers under age 14 and over age 79.

An inkless fingerprint scanner was used to take fingerprints. A digital photograph was also made.

The process took only about two minutes. A US government release stated "As of October 26, all Visa Waiver Program (including Dutch passports) travelers entering the US must have a machine-readable passport. All regular passports issued by the Kingdom of the Netherlands since January 1, 1995, are machine-readable. ▶ On top of all the usual electric power outages, lightning caused a short-circuit in the WEB power plant at the Trans World antenna site last Sunday. According to a WEB press release, 85% of the island was without power. The outage lasted from 4-10 hours depending on location. There were continuing outages and surges that day and the next. The Reporter lost power in its offices six hours the next day as well. WEB apoligized for the inconvenience the power loss caused. We heard a figure of 17 outages in the

### harles Souriel of the Police Department reports:

For the year 2003, the Detective Department reported 200 drug related arrests and 5 other arrests, totaling 205. They confiscated 256 kg, 134.4 grams of cocaine, 2,355 grams of heroin and 4,029 grams of marijuana.

The police in Playa made 109 arrests. Rincon police arrested 22. Police in Amboina made 4 arrests.

last two weeks. The cost of power outages to the Bonaire economy is monumental.

▶ The consumer price index for Bonaire rose 0.3 % in August compared to June of this year, according to the Central Bureau of Statistics. Cooking fat, meat, fish and other foodstuffs increased but was almost balanced by a price decrease of potatoes, vegetables, and fruit. The price index figure for the food sector went up by 1%. Other sectors rose a fraction of a percent but others didn't change. The so-called 12-month average of price change was 1.6% in August of this year compared

Intering their home almost made me want to join the cast of the movie 'A League of Their Own.' Two corners of the living room of Claudette Raphaela, 34, and Edsel Pieter, 37, were full of impressive trophies and medals. The enthusiastic welcome of the friendly and dynamic couple was a good kick off for our interview.

As coordinator of SONRISA the 3<sup>rd</sup> International Ladies Softball Tournament (from 7-9 October) Edsel has an impressive sports resumé. Volleyball was his first love at the age of eight. The family tradition of volleyball combined with the strict sport discipline at school made him excel. Not long after he joined the most famous sport in his hometown: baseball. At 17 he had to make a choice between the two sports due to school obligations. Volleyball made it. During the next years he participated in international competitions.

When he was 21 a talent scout discovered his talent for softball and offered him the opportunity for a 'Fast Pitch' (the highest division in softball). He has an official international degree as volleyball trainer of the FIVB (the French official international volleyball organization). In addition to this he's an official international softball trainer and nationally recognized softball umpire. Last but not least he's part of the veteran soccer team and loves to cycle with Claudette. Edsel is currently working as a pur-

"A stable and well-structured youth sport policy is essential for Bonaire," explains Edsel. "It prevents that (situation where) talented Bonairean youngsters stand out abroad instead of on their own island." He provides several painful examples of Bonairean boys and girls who, once recognized and admired for their talents abroad, were forced to play against Bonaire.

Claudette totally agrees and explains the existing situation in the ladies softball team. "It's hard to get women over 35 to come to training as their tight family schedule and work make it difficult. If they had the opportunity to start when they were kids, it would be much easier to make it a regular life style." Both Claudette and Edsel explain the success

of the Curação and Aruban sports teams: they all got their motivation as kids, and possibilities are created for upgrading to divisions.

Edsel and Claudette have a well prepared program for hosting the 3<sup>rd</sup> International Ladies Softball Tournament, a tradition that started two years ago on Curaçao. The Regatta board applauded the initiative by recognizing this tournament as part of the official Regatta events. This tournament is dedicated to Ms. Bernadette Windster who worked hard to start ladies' softball teams back in 1992.

After months of preparations and hard work Claudette managed to hand in this program two weeks in advance to the participants and press. It's indeed a sports program, but still there will be plenty of time to socialize through gatherings and parties. Don't let them pass you a 'fast ball' and miss this event!


## REGATTA





# CORAL SPAWN 2004

A good coral spawn insures a new generation of corals, thus perpetuating the coral reef. It is great fun to watch. So Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, October 3, 4 and 5, are good nights to be out on the reef after dinner enjoying the show.  $\Box$

Individual Corals spawn only once a year, mostly at night. How they manage to synchronize the event remains a mystery. Fewer than 20 years ago, conventional wisdom held that coral reefs did not propagate sexually, but passively and vegetatively, like some plants. Then in the mid-1980s scientists began to document a remarkable natural event. Once a year several species of reef-building corals spawn en masse, spewing out billions of eggs and sperm into the water. The discovery of this phenomenon has shed new light on the intricate workings of the reef and is especially significant in recent efforts to rebuild and reconstruct reefs.

Now that scientists know that coral reefs time their mass reproduction according to a lunar calendar, they are getting better at predicting spawning times, but how the corals synchronize their reproductive cycles to go off once a year remains a biological mystery. Bonaire is at the forefront of helping to solve the mystery.  $\Box$  G.D.





The annual coral spawn takes place five to seven days after the full moon in September and October. This year the spawn is more difficult to predict by the months because the full moons fall at the end of the months of August and September. So the full moon that was the trigger for the September spawn was really in August. The moon was again full on September 28, creating the October spawning event.

In August the spawn was modest. Some corals produced eggs and sperm for release, but the main spawning event is more likely to be on October 3, 4 or 5. This is an exciting time for the coral reef. Sponges, Brittle Stars, and Sea Cucumbers also spawn at this time of the year. Corals produce their dramatic show late in the evening between 9 and 11 pm, but some of the other creatures spawn during the day.





Referendum Followup-The Iesurun Report

# A New Structure for the Netherlands Antilles?



If the Dutch daily newspaper, *NRC Handelsblad*, is correct about the draft of the final report of the Jesurun Committee, it could offer firm direction and impetus toward a new structure for the islands of the Netherlands Antilles.

The NRC Handelsblad obtained a copy of the draft of the final report of the Jesurun Committee which makes recommendations on the future of the Netherlands Antilles. Its recommendations coincide with the outcome of the Bonaire Referendum. The report prepared, by a work group on administrative and financial reforms headed by Edsel "Papi" Jesurun, is to be presented to the Dutch and Antillean Governments next week.

It will propose reforms making Curaçao and St. Maarten autonomous countries within the Dutch Kingdom. Saba, St. Eustatius and Bonaire would get direct ties with Holland. A majority voted for that option in the recently completed Bonaire referendum. This would also spell the end for the Netherlands Antilles, says the Dutch newspaper. The work group will also propose that Holland take over a large part of the NA f 4.8 billion debt of the islands. The interest would still have to be paid by the Antilles, but at a much lower rate of 3% to Holland instead of some 9% to financial institutions in the Netherlands Antilles.

"Both Minister Thom de Graaf (Kingdom Relations) and the Antillean Cabinet have already indicated that the advice will weigh heavily," *NRC* writes.

For Curaçao and St. Maarten to become autonomous countries, considerable investments will be needed in law enforcement, public finances and proper governance. In addition, the 50-year-old Kingdom Charter, the Antillean Constitution and the Islands Regulation ERNA will have to be amended. The committee urges quick decision making. A "Round Table Conference" has been scheduled for mid-2005, at which the dragging constitutional issue must be resolved for once and for all. Up to now the impression was that the committee would advise keeping some Central Government, but in a slimmed down form.

The Dutch 2005 budget mentions the premise of maximum authority for the islands, minimal tasks for the Central Government and crucial responsibilities for the Kingdom. The proposal is not entirely new. Then Dutch Prime Minister Ruud Lubbers had already suggested in the early 1990s to make Bonaire, Statia and Saba "Kingdom islands," where the Dutch Government would take care of the most important government tasks. The proposal sees voluntary cooperation between the islands for justice, monetary policy, the Social Insurance Bank-SVB, the pension fund and education. New tasks would have to revert to Kingdom administration.

Granted, it is only the advice of a work group, but it is one that carries considerable weight, as an initiative of the Dutch Kingdom Relations Minister, Thom de Graaf. Up to now The Hague had always insisted that a breaking up the Antilles or separate status such as that of Aruba was out of the question for other islands, yet that's what the work group appears to be proposing.  $\Box$  G.D.

### Luz Marina Lara-Gaviria

came to help my sister Lola and her husband who owned a restaurant on the road to Sorobon. It was called 'Egretta,' now 'Kontiki.' I was 22 . It was very difficult for me to leave Colombia because I was doing theatre work and folk dancing; we didn't get paid, it was just to be happy.

Bonaire was very different and small. I wasn't planning to stay at all, so after three months I went back to Colombia. Then Lola called and said she wanted to come to Colombia for two or three months and she needed me in the restaurant. While I was working there the owner of Sorobon Beach Resort, Loes Rood, saw me, liked me instantly and offered me a job. I accepted and after one week Loes asked me if I had another sister. I said yes because we're eight sisters and two brothers! But the one I was thinking of was Eunice, vounger and prettier than I! Eunice was 18, still in high school. It was a hard decision, but she came.

It was so nice to have my sisters, but Eunice made our life miserable. She was very young, very beautiful and Bonaire was very small: there was nothing for her to do. At the time neither of us could speak a word of English, we didn't have a driver's license, so we were stuck at Sorobon, the very end of the island. We were young and full of life and everybody liked us. It was a perfect time! But Eunice didn't want to stay; she wanted to go to university. One day when Lola and I were completely tired of her complaints, we told her, 'Go back! But you have to tell Loes and Karl yourself that you're leaving.' That changed her mind somehow. She stayed. Three years later she found a perfect husband in Peter Lensvelt. They fell in love. It was really love! They have three beautiful kids and they're living in Spain now. My sister Lola and her husband Robert Seket are living in The Hague and they have two beautiful children.

I'd been working at Sorobon for about two years when a very nice couple from Germany invited me to come and visit them. I didn't take it seriously, but three months later the woman called me from Germany to tell me that she was pregnant and would I come to take care of the baby when it was born. At the same time a very attractive German boy came to work at Sorobon. He was sitting outside and I remember thinking, 'Oh, how horrible! How white he looks!' But that was before I noticed his eyes. He was only staying for six months and when he was about to go back the couple called me to tell me that their baby was born. Stefan and I were in love so together we left for Germany, he to Berlin and I to Hamburg. For seven months we traveled back and forth to see each other, but with my Latin soul and my hot blood I couldn't live in such a cold climate. You see, we can do it, but just as a break, not forever."

Luz Marina Lara-Gaviria (41) is a woman who knows how to tell a story; she has a great sense of humor; her English is perfect; she's elegant and she's pretty. "I came back to Bonaire. Loes was very happy and gave me my old job back. Stefan came several times to Bonaire and I went a few times to Germany, but he didn't want to live on Bonaire and for sure I wasn't going to live in Germany, so it ended.

When Sorobon Beach Hotel was sold, Loes was very generous and gave me and Eunice some money. I had this dream of building my own house in Colombia, so I went back-to find that the money wasn't enough! One month later Loes came to visit me and the first thing she said was, 'Don't you want to come back to Sorobon?' And again, there I went with my backpack to Bonaire!

Anyway, now I have a very beautiful house in Colombia, in Guarne, in the countryside, close to Medellin. My mom lives in my house and my brothers have their *fincas* and land nearby. It's up in the mountains where it's cold and green and where you can smell the earth. I love to sit in the kitchen with my mom and my sisters and talk all day. I am very happy with my sisters and brothers; it's like having nine best friends!

Okay, where were we? I learned English because I needed it in my life and in my work. For three years I took courses and my vision of the world changed completely because I could communicate with more people. I could apply for better jobs and get ahead in life. But first I had to get my driver's

license, to be able to go to Playa to my English course. I stayed with the new managers of the hotel for one year. Dolf Huijgers, the new owner of Sorobon Beach Hotel, asked me if I wanted to work at the 'Red Pelican' (now 'Kontiki'). I did that for one year. Then I met this couple from Aruba, homeopathic doctors, who were opening the Crystal Light Center in Nikiboko. I went to their workshops for six months and they offered me a job in October 1996. It was only part time, so I worked at the Spa in Harbor Village in the afternoons.

A little bit earlier, July

20<sup>th</sup>, all of us Colombians had celebrated our Independence Day with a very big party at Kunuku Warahama. It was there that I saw Francisco Cano doing the horse show. He was so impressive that I fell head over heels in love with him! I asked a friend to introduce us. She did, but nothing happened as he had a girlfriend. Nevertheless, we became good friends. After he and his girlfriend split up we became involved and fell in love. It wasn't much later that I found out that I was pregnant. I was 35 and felt happy and quiet inside. I stayed on Bonaire until I was seven months pregnant, then I didn't want to be here anymore with the heat and the mosquitoes so I went to Colombia to have my baby. It was perfect! Everybody was very happy, except for Francisco. He had to stay because he was working.

Our son Jean-Paul was born in 1998. When I came back I brought my mom with me to look after the baby. I started working again for Harbor Village, but I also gave my brother-in-law, Peter, a helping hand at the reception at Lion's Dive, I worked for Desireé at 'A Place for You.' I did all kinds of jobs.

Two years after my sister Eunice and her family left for Spain I decided it was time for me and Jean-Paul to go and live there too. Francisco couldn't come because his Dutch passport wasn't ready. We stayed for 14 months. I had my own massage center in a little town close to Malaga. It was very good in summer, but in winter there were too few people to make a living. And Jean-Paul missed his father very much. He'd started stuttering. I decided we should

come back and live our lives again on Bonaire.

Well, for now I'm going to stay here. We have a very beautiful *kunuku* with all the animals. We have land in Nort di Salina and we're renting this house in Antriol. I have a very strong love for Bonaire, but when my boy needs to go to university I think we'll go to Spain. Our world is open. I'm rich, I have everything I want. I am an old mama, but I am very comfortable with my boy. I am a very adventurous person, but now I am quiet because I have a son and he's the most important thing in my life.

I'm enjoying Francisco and Jean-Paul! I'm 41; I'm not a hot potato anymore! Bonaire has given me all the opportunities to make the best of my life and that's what I did. When I get nostalgic I play my Colombian music, I dance, I cry and I laugh. It's something the Colombian people have inside and it never goes away.

And one day when I am old and my boy has gone his way, Francisco and I will return to Colombia. I will sit in my house and smoke big cigars and I will drink two *aguardientes* every day. My old sisters and I will be sitting there,

talking all day and when my grandchildren come to visit me, I will tell them all the stories." □



# DUTCH EDITION OF NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC FEATURES BONAIRE SEA TURTLES

S ea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) is featured in the October 2004 issue of National Geographic (Dutch edition). Satellite tracking of mature sea turtles has not only caught the attention of the public but has also caught the attention of renowned Dutch magazines like National Geographic and Grasduinen. This is the second time in two years that STCB has received coverage in the highly prestigious National Geographic, a magazine for science and education. The magazine has a monthly circulation of 200,000 issues. National Geographic is accessible on the internet at www. nationalgeographic.nl.

To date, four Bonairean sea turtles have been fitted with satellite transmitters. Two female hawksbills and one fe-



male loggerhead have been tracked back to their home feeding areas after nesting on Bonaire. One of the hawksbills traveled back to Mona Island near Puerto Rico while the other one returned to the Navidad Banks north of the Dominican Republic. The loggerhead is about 150 km off the coast of Honduras. Typically, female sea turtles return to the place of their birth to nest about every three years or so. The fourth, male hawksbill 'Tom,' is still right off Klein Bonaire where he was tagged in July. We expect him to start his journey to his home feeding grounds at any time. In October/November two to four more hawksbill turtles will be fitted with transmitters. 

Leo the Lion

The Goddess of Love Pays a Super Close Visit to the Heart of Leo the Lion and an Old Moon Makes a Foursome with Saturn and Gemini

n Sunday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> the brightest planet of them all, named for the goddess of love, **Venus**, will pay a super close visit to **Regulus**, the heart star of **Leo the Lion**, a cosmic duo that will take your breath away. Plus on October 7<sup>th</sup> a very old **Moon** will make a foursome, showing you how to find **Saturn**, **Castor** and **Pollux**.

This Saturday, October 2<sup>nd</sup> just before sunrise, face east where the brightest thing you'll see will be our old friend, 8,000-mile-wide, super brilliant Venus, our so-called sister planet because it's almost the same size as Earth. And parked just below it, and usually looking very bright when it's in the sky all by itself but not so bright because it's



parked next to super brilliant Venus, is Regulus, the heart star of the ancient constellation, Leo the Lion. Only one degree will separate them or, if you like to think of it this way since a full Moon is half a degree wide, two full Moons will separate Venus from Regulus which is visually very close.

But ta da! Every once in a while a super close meeting occurs which can be absolutely stunning. In fact the next morning, Sunday October 3<sup>rd</sup>, Venus and Regulus will be snuggled up side by side only 1/5 of one degree apart. That's less than the width of a quarter Moon. And I strongly encourage you to look at them through a pair of binoculars to get an even more exceptional view and see Regulus' blue color more vividly.

Of course with all things cosmic this close meeting is only an illusion. In fact, on Sunday the 3<sup>rd</sup> Venus will be 98 million miles away from us while Regulus will be over 5 million times farther away, 85 light years beyond. So Regulus must be pretty big and bright to be seen at such a distance. And in fact it is 5 million miles wide which is over five times the diameter of our own Sun and 160 times brighter. It's so huge we could fit 282 million Venuses or Earths inside it. Wow!

On Monday the 4<sup>th</sup> they will once again be one degree apart from each other, but Venus will now be below rather than above Regulus. And if you want to see how rapidly they move, go out the following Sunday, October 10<sup>th</sup>, and you will see they are a whopping 8 degrees apart and joined by an exquisite 26-day-old waning crescent Moon. Once again Saturday, the 2<sup>nd</sup>, Venus approaches Regulus, Sunday they practically visually collide, and then on Monday they change places in the heavens, and on the 10th are much farther apart and joined by an exquisite Moon.

But if that's not enough for you, next week, Thursday October 7<sup>th</sup>, just above Venus and Regulus you'll see an exquisite 23-day-old crescent Moon and directly above it the twin stars of Gemini, Pollux and Castor and beside it the wonderful ringed world, Saturn, which we are visiting right now with our Cassini spacecraft. Fabulous cosmic goodies just before sunrise. A great reason to get up with the chickens.  $\Box Jack$  Horkimer
