t the beginning of this week de-A time beginning of this week velopments in the Dutch AirExel lawsuit against Bonaire's Dutch Eagle Express, DEE, (and its follow-on company, Dutch Antillean Express, DAE) took an alarming turn. As reported in the Dutch newspaper The Daily Telegraph, a Court has been asked to seize the assets of DEE/DAE and possibly those of its company officers, shareholders and conceivably the govern**ment.** Yes, it is a possibility that the Bonaire Island Government, as the original owner of DEE, will be liable for the 12 million euros that its once parent company, Air Exel, claims it spent getting BonairExel up and running.

A press release on Easter Sunday from BonairExpress emphasized that if the court allows the seizure it would mean the end of Bonaire's airline adventure. DEE/DAE, which operates Bonair-Express, previously said that it was NOT liable for the debts of the Holland-based AirExel companies and that AirExel business losses were to its own account and could not be extended to DEE, the holder of the Air Operating Certificate for the airline. Now the court will have to decide.

The issues are confusing and convoluted. The principal owner of the Dutch AirExel and DEE is the same person,

Niek Sandmann. Several other corporate structures with board members never before mentioned in connection with BonairExel(Express) have become public in recent days as well, causing wonder at the Byzantine corporate structure contrived to support a three-airplane airline. And Harm Prins, former Air Exel top man, who was pushing the case, has left Holland Exel, which will probably be taken over by tour operator TUI. It's the same Harm Prins who was arrested late last year for blackmail and fraud in connection with AirExel activities.

The day of reckoning for BonairExel (Express) is this Thursday, 31 March, when a judge in Curação will rule if the lien will be imposed.

The people of the Antilles recall the huge debt accumulated in the early 90s following Bonaire's Parker Project scam which wound up costing Antilleans tens of millions of guilders and some say is the reason a 5% sales tax was introduced. It's conceivable that the demise of DEE could have similar consequences. Check the *Bonaire Reporter* website, bonairereporter.com for late breaking news.

A Brazilian businessman, David Isreal, is going to try to **rescue Royal Aruban Airlines** (RAA). Isreal has established a company, Amazon Valley Company, that operates under Aruban law. This company will investigate whether an agreement can be reached with the creditors of RAA for a start-up of the company. RAA has never flown before, but the preparations near completion. Aruba is without a national flag carrier since Air Aruba went bankrupt.

Beginning with one 7-passenger Cessna three years ago, the small airline has found success serving the Bonaire-Curaçao route. There is speculation that it may now include Aruba in its itinerary.

Curaçaoans Germaine and Richie Reginald, who were both pilots for ALM, last year purchased the airline that was founded by Carla Siercke and pilot Hans Peter Barth.

Germaine, based in Curaçao manages the operation. Divi Divi extended their gratitude to all who have helped make their business a success.

- ▶ On April 2 the last assets of DCA will go up for auction in Curaçao. They consist of furniture, electronic devices, computers, aircos and other items. Contact the Deurwaarder, Ms. S Ersilia, in Curaçao at Hato Airport if you wish to inspect the items. Only cash will be accepted.
- ▶ Dutch Minister of Governmental Reform and Kingdom Relations Thom de Graaf resigned last Wednesday after

losing a key parliamentary vote on electoral reform. The resignation of De Graaf, who was also deputy prime minister, has put a major strain on

Prime Minister Jan Peter Balkenende's coalition. Thom de Graaf was the minister charged with the responsibility for the Netherlands Antilles and had formed relationships with Antillean leaders. He was considered sympathetic to the movement for constitutional reform in the islands. No replacement has yet been named.

- ▶ Bonaire was represented at the biggest tourism exhibition on earth, the ITB in Berlin, from March 11 to 15. With 10,000 exhibitors from 180 countries and regions, ITB represents the full spectrum of global tourism at all levels with tour operators, booking systems, travel destinations, airlines, hotels and rental cars. The TCB, BONHATA (Bonaire Hotel and Tourism Association) and the BHG (Bonaire Hospitality Group) were on hand to let attendees know of the joys of Bonaire.
- ▶ In previous weeks the Bonaire Hospitality Group (BHG) reported through the media that the Tourism Corporation Bonaire (TCB) and the Bonaire Hotel & Tourism Association (BONHATA) wasted money by having exhibition
- ▶ The Irish-owned mobile telephone company, Digicel, which took over Curaçao Telecom (CT) two weeks ago, was rebuffed by Curaçao-owned UTS when they tried to work out a joint agreement. Now it will become a tough competitor for UTS in a market that may soon see the entry of communication giant AT&T. The UTS monopoly is gone and the resulting competition is expected to lower cell phone rates to consumers.



space separate from BHG's at the ITB (International Tourism Börse) in Berlin.

BONHATA responded with a statement that the space they had was more appropriate since it was among other Caribbean locations and away from loud music that interfered with contract negotiations. There was lots of interest by tour operators for the 2006 season.

BONHATA has invited BHG to join their group, but the offer was rejected. BONHATA is Bonaire's representative to the Caribbean Tourism Organization.

UTS employs about 500 people. The company signed several roaming contracts in the region, including the US, Latin America and Europe for mobile telephones with a post-paid subscription.

Ask the Dietitian

Be Creative with Vegetables! A low-fat vegetable recipe

egetables are packed with essential nutrients and fiber, are generally low fat and contain in most cases few calories. And like all nonanimal foods, vegetables are cholesterol free. The trick is to keep them that way when preparing them for the table. Avoid excessive amounts of cooking fat by using non-stick pans which allow you to sauté with minimal oil. Replace cream or whole milk in casseroles and sauces with low fat milk thickened with a little flour. Dense vegetables, such as tubers and winter squashes, are higher in calories than leafy vegetables. To preserve nutrients, avoid overcooking. One of the easiest ways to cook them is to briefly plunge them into boiling water until they are just crisp-tender (blanching). An alternative to this is steaming.

Here is a nice light and low fat recipe you can serve for lunch or dinner.

Zucchini and Sweet Pepper Enchiladas (for four)

- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil 2 zucchini, halved lengthwise and cut into thin slices
- 2 yellow bell peppers, cut into thin

halved and thinly sliced 1 clove garlic,

³/₄ cup reduced-sodium

1 teaspoon dried oregano or basil

2 cups, no-salt-added, crushed tomatoes

1/4 cup shredded low fat cheddar cheese

1/4 cup prepared salsa

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. In a large non-stick skillet, heat the oil until hot but not smoking over medium high heat. Add the zucchini, bell peppers, onion, and garlic, stirring to coat. Add ½ cup of the broth and cook, stirring frequently, until the onion is softened, about 5 minutes. Stir in the remaining ½ cup broth and the oregano and bring

to a boil. Reduce to a simmer and cook until almost all liquid has evaporated, about 5 minutes longer. Remove from the heat.

Windsurf Scene at Sorobon Bonaire Waves

F or several months windsurfers in Bonaire have been shaking their heads, wondering where the wind was. Typically in February and March sailors enjoy wind conditions of around 18 mph. In February and March locals and tourists could count only a few decent sailing days instead of the usual windsurf scenario. Thankfully, the weather changed dramatically around the 23rd when the winds returned with a vengeance. For two days, only the expert or the

adventurous sailor headed out with 3.0-4.0 meter sails to enjoy or rather brave the winds with gusts sometimes near 45. It was wild on Lac Bay with moderate chop and strong winds. Training local pros, Taty Frans, Choko Frans, Ruben Petrisie and Kiri Thode, headed up wind to Cai, their favorite training ground, for a few wave sessions. Visiting pros from the Gorge, another windy spot, joined their windsurf brethren in what turned out to be a wild ride for all.

As the water from the open sea enters the channel at Lac Suite, a vacuum of wind sucks into the bay, creating some large swells. This past week the waves were sometimes mast high, creating an amazing site for the many tourists and windsurf spectators who headed up to Cai to see the show. Taty Frans dazzled the crowd with some crazy loops and tricks, defying the dangerous and challenging waves. His cousin and



brother kept up the pace with some super charged jumps and moves. It was a great day for wind and waves

At 100 years old, my Aunt Marie, my mother's older sister, is as sharp and as aware of what goes on in the world as she was during her 42-year-long career teaching languages in New York's inner city schools. Having had no children herself she dotes on her nieces and nephews. Like me. At family parties, weddings and get-togethers she's always the peppiest, most vibrant person there. And so she was at her 100th Birthday Party last week in Kingston, NY, close to where she lives.

In 1983 after her husband of 47 years passed away, she learned to drive. At age 79 the time most people turn in their driving licenses, she got her first one. But then again George DeSalvo with his Aunt Marie she always was adventurous.



She says she's "traveled to all the countries in the world, except China." She still lives by herself in her lovely house near the banks of the Walkill River, but now her travels are more restrained. But another operation, late in 2004, restored her vision! During her birthday party last week she asked us to put her back on the mailing list again. Now she's again keeping track of Bonaire's affairs.

Delno will be sorely missed by the island and by all his friends. But, as he says, "I'm just an email away." We wish him the very best! \Box *G./L.D.*



Rains Rescue Bonaire Rice Harvest

he economic hardship that hit Bonaire when the rice mill was shut down by the European Union (EU) action withdrawing its preferential treatment for foreign rice processed in Bonaire is about to be reversed. On April 1 most of Bonaire's rice planted during the rains of 2004 will have been harvested. The heavy downpours of the past season have produced a bumper crop.

Bonaire rice qualifies as EU farm produce and as such benefits from the same generous subsidies given to French and Italian growers. The saliñas, flooded with rainwater, make a perfect rice paddy. Since water buffalo are scarce on the island several of the unemployed donkeys that managed to evade the Sanctuary roundup have been pressed into service behind the plows.

George Winkkler, manager of the rice mill, is ecstatic about the prospects. "We've already called 30 workers back to get the grain elevators and milling equipment prepared to process the harvest. Ships to transport the rice overseas have left Europe enroute to Bonaire. When we begin full production about 100 people will be employed."

Corgill Salt is rumored to be considering modifying several of their salt evaporator ponds to make them suitable for rice paddies. "Global warming is reducing the need for road salt to melt winter ice," said Jon Ghleen, the Works Manager. "Corgill's immense profits will be bolstered even more by successful rice production." If most of the salt production is converted to rice growing, Bonaire will become second only to Indonesia in annual tonnage.





Bonaire's political parties are scrambling to take credit for the economic boom. The Green Party is saying rice growing is another of its successful initiatives, along with the demolition of unattractive historic structures, to supercharge Bonaire's economy and that KLM is considering flying "just picked" rice to gourmet European consumers. The Red Party applauds the economic boost but is concerned about the distortion of Bonaire's cultural heritage. "If this continues," said opposition Red leader Jopy Abrams, "before long tourists will be hearing that the slave huts were used to store grain." Several environmentalists are concerned that the change

Several environmentalists are concerned that the change from salt to fresh water in the saliñas will harm to the feeding grounds of Bonaire's many flamingoes. However, STINAPO, the new enforcement arm of STINAPA, will monitor the situation. \Box *G.D.*

- ▶ All Italian wines priced NAf 45 and over are to be recalled by local wine merchant AWC because of a serious price deficiency. The Italian quality restaurants will probably soon run out of Amarone and Ser Gioveto, so if you like these wines, you'd better hurry and book a table at Croccantino.
- ▶ And while on the subject of wines, California vintners in the Napa Valley area, which primarily produces Pinot Blanc, Pinot Noir and Pinot Grigio wines, have developed a **new hybrid grape** that acts as an anti-diuretic. It is expected to reduce the number of trips older people have to make to the bathroom during the night. The new wine will be marketed as "Pino More." (*J.A.*)

▶ The WEB power plant is back to normal schedule again, thanks to the newly installed Aggreko megawatt generators. Power outages will once again be random, as in the good old times.

This Friday, LVV, in cooperation with the island government, will begin **installing goat vending machines at key spots on the island.** So if your goat has gone missing you can obtain another conveniently and relatively inexpensively. The flat price is NAf1 per kilogram. Coins or bills are accepted by the new machines.

► Officials from DROB (Environmental Section) made a startling discovery during



last week's "bat-count" survey of Bonaire's many caves. A child, apparently being raised by a family of fish-eating bats, was found in a deep cave in the Lima section. Fish-eating bats are one of the seven bat species living on the island as well as the largest with a typical wingspan exceeding 45 cm (18 inches).

The child is believed to be three-year old Isidore Farkas, the son of a Belgian tourist couple who had believed him kidnapped from their rental car at the Angel City dive site two years ago. The child spoke no recognizable language but seemed to communicate with his adopted mother with high-pitched squeaks. Except for an extreme sensitivity to loud noises, he seemed healthy. He will be reunited with his human parents on Friday, April 1.

New Airlink for Bonaire

B onaire is to have a new airline servicing both the US and Europe, with an operational start planned for January 1, 2006. On the very spot where Bonaire's first airstrip was built some 70 years ago, on the road to Rincon, Dutch air tycoon Erik Aviator, former partner of Bonaire businessman Nick Sandcastle, revealed his plans for a new airline, dubbed Bonaire Historic Airways (BHA).

"The trend toward ever faster and cheaper air travel is about to reverse itself," declares Erik, "same as happened with transatlantic ocean liners which now ply the leisure cruise trade." BHA will employ small, lavishly fitted aircraft, probably Fokker 50s or 70s, seating 12 in grand luxury, using Bonaire and the Dutch island of Texel as home bases. The whole trip will take three days, with stops at St. Maarten, Hilton Head Island, Bermuda, the Azores, Madeira, Jersey (Channel Islands) and then Texel, all islands, and

the same route back.

The price will be around US\$4,500 one way, return by commercial airliner.

"We have already dozens of advance bookings," says Erik. "We plan to build our own modest airstrip and accommodations on Klein Bonaire and have requested permission from the Island Government, as this project will greatly enhance the tourist attraction of Bonaire without harming the pristine beauty and delicate ecological balance of Klein Bonaire.

We hope to have the permits for a 1 km. strip and one-story high control tower by mid June."

This coming Easter Friday Erik Aviator and his local partners plan to show the actual location of the strip on Klein Bonaire to any interested outsiders. Meeting place is the shacks on the east shore of Klein, meeting time is 10 am. Bring your own boat and refreshments. \Box *C.dK*.

SURVIVOR BONAIRE

BS-TV has announced that next season's popular "Survivor" series will take place here on Bonaire. In a departure from the show's original format, contestants will be chosen from expatriate residents of the island. According to the show's host, Jeff Probst, "We want to see how these folks manage to survive on an island like Bonaire." Therefore, the show's "challenges" will be taken from everyday life on Bonaire. Probst himself has agreed to his own challenge: he will endeavor to make it through the entire series while never once uttering the words "I'll go tally the votes."

CBS plans to call the two tribes 'The Makambas' and 'The Merkas.' Like the original series, the team that loses a given challenge will have to go to Tribal Council, and a member of their team will be 'voted off the island.' On Survivor Bonaire, Tribal Council will be held at Flamingo Airport, and instead of having his or her torch extinguished in a symbolic gesture of defeat, the losing contestant will have to turn his or her sedula over to Immigration. Rather than the usual \$1,000,000 prize, the final survivor will be given a lifetime, tax-free residency with the freedom to come and go from the island at will

The search for food, a constant theme in

previous Survivor series, will be a little different on Survivor Bonaire. The Makamba tribe will have to dine out for a week without eating French fries, and will be required to leave at least a 15% gratuity. The Merkas, on the other hand, must dine out for a week, never once going to KFC, and never once uttering the words, "But back home we can get..." A challenge for both tribes will be to find fresh milk on a Thursday.

New to the Survivor Bonaire series will be the fashion challenge: The Makamba tribe must wear shorts and flip-flops, while the Merka tribe will have to wear long pants, closed-toed shoes, and NO flowered shirts.

Individual challenges are rumored to include the following: Completing a circuit of the island without driving by a "Snack," obtaining a list of household items without going to "The Chinese Store," trying to find out where to pay a parking ticket, and obtaining a driver's license by visiting fewer than four agencies.

The greatest challenge survivors face will probably be the building of a shelter which they must do in less than one year.


Lora Roost Discovered!

Tourist Stay Home

Especially Foreign Ones

The Antilles Grand Council announced a ban on all foreign tourists, especially divers and snorkelers. The previous rule of a two-week stay has been changed to no stay. Thus the plan to introduce the unpopular "seaside viewing and ocean air breathing fee" has been tabled indefinitely.

The Lost Penguin is delivering emergency sandwiches to any stranded tourists, and portable toilets will be set up in Wilhelmina Square as tourists will not be permitted to rent rooms on the island.

Grand Council head, Anthony Gutlett, who was absent on a trip casing SA-BADECO homes, was replaced by his aunt and mother who announced that, for Bonaire, tourism will be encouraged between Kralendijk, Rincon and Aruba. When interviewed, Gutlett's cousin Marsha Donkey (standing in for Gutlett's aunt and mother, who were absent as usual) stated there will be many advantages to banning tourists, such as:

- 1. No more divers to ruin the reefs. Blind snorkelers, who were avoiding the \$50 "breathing through a plastic tube fee" by snorkeling at night, will no longer need to be pursued by our police patrol boat.
- 2. Creation of a new drag strip on the



jet runway. (Since not as many planes will be needed, it will end the need for using the road to Sorobon as a drag strip.)

- 3. Restaurants will no longer need to serve food to tourists, thereby giving restaurant staff more leisure time, without pay, while protecting our dwindling Wahoo supply.

- 5. The need to raise diver and snorkeler fees is now ended since no divers or snorkelers will come to Bonaire.

are in such abundance that they do not rate species protection. Their curious name derives from the sound these little amphibians make, not unlike the mocking bird. \Box

SOLUTION TO TOO MANY CARS ON BONAIRE?


Dear Editor:

I thought the article "Too Many Cars on Bonaire?" (Bonaire Reporter 3-25-05 Issue, last week) was well written and researched. However, it did not address what I consider to be the root cause of too many cars on the island. Namely, too many licensed drivers. To alleviate this problem I would suggest that all currently licensed drivers be required to demonstrate competency to operate a motor vehicle. Many would fail the test and there would be fewer cars on the road.

Are there bad Bonaire drivers? Based on my observations walking about the island I wrote a simple test and had several local drivers give me their answers. The test was as follows:

- 1) When rounding the corner in front of Julio's you find pedestrians crossing the road. Do you A) slow down and risk being rear-ended or B) blow the horn vigorously to hurry them on their way.
- 2) When backing out of a parking place at the Tropical Flamingo do you A) look

Unfortunately many of the drivers taking the test answered A for all three questions. With drivers like these, accidents just waiting to happen, it is surprising to me that there is not more carnage on the roads of Bonaire. I strongly urge that the authority for licensing drivers retest everyone and revoke permanently the licenses of all that fail. With a limited road system only the truly competent should be at the wheel. This will create a safer and less traffic congested Bonaire for all Webster (Web) Burrfish to enjoy.

Earth Day in Bonaire

pril 22nd is the 35th anniversary of International Earth Day. Five years ago the Coral Reef Alliance joined the celebration with Dive In to Earth Day, adding a diving/shoreline emphasis to Earth Day. 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DIVING with DEE Scorpionfish

KEEPING THEIR SECRETS

S corpionfish are fascinating, aren't they? For one thing, few other fish let us study them so easily. Scorpionfish don't hover or flitter around; they mostly just rest on the bottom. Why? Because they don't use their swim bladders, the internal buoyancy control devices that bony fish possess. Without neutral buoyancy, the scorpionfish must swim very quickly (like an over weighted diver). In order to gain "altitude" from the bottom, a swimming scorpionfish flares out its pectoral fins and uses them to control its takeoff, trajectory and landing. The fish's tailfin provides thrust.

One other interesting thing about scorpionfish pectoral fins: their undersides are patterned in an eye-catching black, white, and maroon. When a scorpionfish wants its movements to be noticed, it displays those patterns. The message is, "Note my warning coloration: I'm venomous!"

Once it settles into position, a scorpionfish may brace itself on its pectoral fins or even raise the front of its body an inch or two off the bottom by pushing up on its pectoral fins. Then it waits. And waits. Ambush predators are among the most patient of creatures, and the scorpionfish is an expert ambush predator. It "hides" in plain view, looking like an algae-covered rock. Should an inattentive little fish or crab swim by or try to graze on the scorpionfish-rock, the scorpionfish lunges forward, opening its huge mouth all at once and flaring out its gill plates. This sudden action creates a vacuum which sucks the prey animal into the predator's mouth. Just in case the prey fish is too big to be engulfed all at once, the scorpionfish's small, grasping teeth prevent it from escaping as it's swallowed. (Well, except at least one time, when I saw a scorpionfish lunge up and accidentally suck down a sharpnosed puffer. The scorpionfish looked as if it were gargling for a moment, then it spit the little puffer out! Sharpnosed puffers have a distasteful mucus on their bodies. This little individual had been so sure of the effect of the mucus that, despite being swallowed, it hadn't even puffed up!)


The type of scorpionfish we see most

easily around Bonaire is the biggest scorpionfish here, growing to 14" and more. It's the spotted scorpionfish, Scorpaena plumieri ("feathered stinging fish"). The "stinging" refers to the venomous spines in a scorpionfish's dorsal fin and on its underside. Each hollow spine rests on a venom sac. When something pushes down on it, the spine pierces the venom sac, which sends the venom through the spine and into the injury. Any fish who chomped a scorpionfish would be envenomated by both top and bottom spines. The foolish predator would either learn a painful lesson, or die -- and be removed from the gene pool. Either solution works well for other scorpionfish.

When seeking prey, the spotted scorpionfish does more than rely on its camouflage. It's perfectly willing to take a more active role in hunting by seeking high concentrations of prey fish. I used to visit a formation that sheltered a large school of young French grunts and almost always found a scorpionfish resting nearby. Recently we came upon a section of reef where hundreds of brown chromis – perfect prey for an adult spotted scorpionfish – were industriously spawning. As we watched, a scorpionfish glided up and settled within lunging distance of a couple of mating pairs.

Spotted scorpionfish can lunge a distance of half their length. They hang out just about everywhere around underwater Bonaire, from the reef slope to the flats, resting on or next to rubble, dead coral heads, or even sand. Sometimes I notice a spotted scorpionfish by its shape, sometimes by the regularity of its camouflage, and almost always by its remarkable eyes. In photographs, scorpionfish eyes usually appear flat black, but when you're in the water with them, a scorpionfish's eyes look as deep as the channel between Bonaire and Klein Bonaire. Maybe prey fish are mesmerized (like I am) by those bottomless eyes. Or, perhaps the eyes are adapted for nocturnal activities such as mating, which takes place at night for at least one species of scorpionfish.

I haven't heard anything about anyone observing the mating of spotted scorpionfish, so such mating may never have been observed, at least by divers wishing to share their observations. What we do see



occasionally is two or three scorpionfish near each other. Much more rarely – I've seen it once and heard of it being seen only a couple of times – is scorpionfish mouth-fighting behavior: two scorpionfish grab each other's mouths, the first holding the second's lower jaw in its jaws, and the second holding the first's upper jaw. This is definitely some kind of contest, probably between rivals although none of the observers has noticed a third scorpionfish. (I envision the third as a Scarlet O'Hara-type, murmuring, "I declayah, are you boys fighting over little ol' me?")

Sometimes the mouth-fighters seem to be pushing, sometimes they seem to be pulling, and in one memorable video sequence they rolled right over a mini-cliff, never releasing their holds on each other!

Just a few years ago very little was known about the private lives of frogfish, but last week I saw some amazing photos of frogfish mating – at night! – and divers have also observed frogfish mating in the daytime on Bonaire. I have high hopes that we'll unlock the scorpionfish's secrets, too – it's just a matter of time.

/ hat a way to begin a new month because several cosmic goodies get April off to a fabulous sky gazer's start. Jupiter will be at opposition on Sunday the 3rd. You can use the **Moon** to find Mars on Monday the 4th, and on Friday the 8th even a partial eclipse of the Sun.

On any night this week, about an hour after sunset, face southeast where the brightest star you'll see in the sky will not be a star but the biggest planet in our so-

lar system: 88,000-mile-wide Jupiter. And although it will be almost at its very best it will officially be at its best this Sunday the 3rd when it is at what astronomers call "opposition," which in plain language means that on Sunday Jupiter will be directly opposite the Sun as seen from Earth. This further means that it will be seen in the sky all the hours the Sun is not, which further means that it will be visible all night long. Additionally, whenever a planet is at opposition it is at its best for viewing because it is then at its biggest, brightest and closest to Earth for the

Watch it all night long as it slowly rises in the east just after the Sun sets. It will then climb the southeastern heavens hour after hour until at midnight when it reaches its highest point due south. After which it will slowly descend toward the southwest and set just as the Sun rises in the east.

Now for all practical purposes Jupiter is really great for viewing two to three weeks before and after opposition. So if you've got a small telescope get it out now. You'll be able to see several of its equatorial bands of weather plus you'll be able to watch its four biggest Moons change places in respect to Jupiter as they orbit around it, night after night, which is something really fun to see! Many people can see it with just a pair of binoculars if they're held real steady. So happy Jupiter gazing this weekend and throughout April.

And now for those of you who'd like to find a planet which will be getting steadily brighter week after week and which will reach stunning brilliance in October, might I suggest you start your Mars watch now. You can use the Moon as a finder on both Sunday morning the 3rd and Monday morning the 4th. Just face southeast about 45 minutes before sunrise on Sunday and an exquisite crescent Moon will be only 8 degrees to the right of tiny 4,000-mile-wide Mars. And the next day, Monday, an even skinnier crescent Moon will be on the other side of Mars but still only 8 degrees away from it. What could be easier?

And for those of you who'd like to experience an eclipse of the Sun, on Friday April 8th a total eclipse will occur over the Pacific Ocean, and its partial phases will be seen over the Caribbean. What a way to open April! An eclipse of the Sun, a sure way to find Mars and Jupiter at its best!
