utch Antilles Express (DAE) will increase its capacity on February 1 when it introduces jet service. New flights to St Maarten, the Dominican Republic, Trinidad, Haiti, Surinam and Colombia will begin.

DAE will use its second Fokker-100 on regional routes to Santo Domingo, Port of Spain (Trinidad), Port au Prince (Haiti) and Bogotá (Colombia). The jet will fly to Santo Domingo four times per week, to Port of Spain three times per week, and to Port au Prince and Bogotá twice each.

The jets will free up the ATR propjet schedule to increase capacity on other routes. Flights between Curaçao and Aruba will increase to six per day; the number of flights between Curaçao and Bonaire will go up to 40 per week. The frequency to Valencia in Venezuela will increase to six times per week.

DAE head Floris Van Pallandt said, "After 9,500 flights our departure punctuality was 91.6%, which is very high for international and Antillean standards." He added that the cancellation rate was a low 0.6%.



► DAE will appeal the case against Insel Air that it lost last week. At that time, the judge decided that both Insel Air and DAE are allowed to fly to St. Maarten.

According to DAE, the consequence of Insel Air flying to St. Maarten is that the route becomes uneconomical for both airlines which would cause both companies to lose money and possibly fail. The failure may make it worse for both Curaçao and St. Maarten; they might even end up without air service, said DAE Director Floris van Pallandt.

DAE's lawyer, Lex Gonzales, argues that the Antillean government did not comply with the regulation dealing with the handling and evaluation of permit requests for intra-Antilles flights. This regulation requires that permits for routes must conform to demand.

Meanwhile, Insel Air has started an aggressive marketing campaign to fill the 167 seats on its MD-83 jet. Roundtrip tickets cost NAf360, with a second person flying for half price. This campaign will continue until February 16, said Insel Air Director Edward Heerenveen on Thursday.

► A group of Dutch "movers and shakers" visited Bonaire last week. The CEOs and ex-CEOs of numerous

large companies in Holland toured the island, enjoyed the beach at Sorobon and drinks and snacks at the Balashi Bar at Divi Flamingo. They also held informal get-togethers with some Bonaire businessmen and elected officials.

► Member of the Dutch Parliament, Hans van Baalen, told the NRC Handelsblad newspaper that he demands apologies from Venezuela for last week's interception of two Dutch patrol airplanes stationed in Curaçao by Venezuelan F-16 fighters.

A spokesperson in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs says that Venezuela admitted that the incident was a misunderstanding but that they did not apologize. Venezuela unjustly thought that the Coast Guard airplanes were flying over Venezuelan territory, but Van Baalen says that "that is too easily said by Venezuela. Venezuela has to offer a plain apology. Saying that they admit the misunderstanding is too sparing."

▶ All pensioners in the Netherlands Antilles got a higher pension payment this month, but not all got a NAf 100 increase. The pension was increased by NAf100; but only for those already getting the maximum. The amount each pensioner will get is proportional to the amount of his/her pension. For example, those getting 50% of the maximum amount will receive only 50% of the increase: NAf 50



► Montserrat remains on high alert following a collapse of the dome of the Soufriere Hills volcano last week. Scientists at Montserrat Volcano Observatory (MVO) said yesterday that pyroclastic flows continued to flow down the northwestern side of the volcano. The alert level remained at "4" which is



the second highest. Last week hundreds of residents in the Belham Valley were evacuated as a precautionary measure.

The volcano awakened from its geological slumber on July 18, 1995, and in 1996 eruptions started with a major killer eruption in 1997 which took the lives of 19 people. The capital city Plymouth was also destroyed. The population was moved to the north where a new capital has been constructed.


► Sam Williams, one of the two parrot researchers working with Bonaire's endangered Lora, will be visiting Bonaire this month to help with our annual Lora count.

How Accurate was our prediction

Structural:

The prime issues facing the negotiators in finding Bonaire's "spot" in The Netherlands will have to do with the currency to be used—Dollars, Euros, Guilders or "Trupials?"—because it will directly affect the buying power of all Bonaireans and how import duties will be handled. The collection of taxes and police presence will also be sticky issues.

Many issues will be set to be resolved over the next five years, minimizing the difficulty of the transition.

Island Council elections in the spring will again be hotly contested. Unless the PDB can come up with a new strategy and popular candidates we predict a UBP landslide. If Bonaire integrates with Holland as scheduled the councilmen will have new roles and parliamentary and local elections will be the way of the future

Structural:

The journey to establish "Direct Ties" with the Netherlands will be painless for Bonaire and the small Antillean islands during the year. Round Table negotiations for Curação and St. Martin will be more difficult.

We think that agreement conflicts between Holland and Bonaire won't arise until 2007 as the July 2007 deadline for the new order nears.

The election for Bonaire's three seats in Parliament at the end of January will be the closest in years. The UPB, buoyed by a stronger economy, could win two of the seats. But the PDB move that consolidated candidates from the Socialist and Labor parties into itself may swing enough votes to win two of the three seats. The election is too close to call.

Structural:


Direct hit

Bonaire and the two other less populated islands signed off with a final agreement, the "Slotverkalring," to obtain a unique municipal status in The Netherlands.

The UPB won two of Bonaire's three seats in the national Parliament but the PDB coalition made a formidable showing and took the remaining seat.

Economic:

The word, boom, means trees in Dutch but an explosion in English. Look for an explosion in investors and real estate prices as easy access to Bonaire for Europeans becomes a matter of course. Decisions will have to made to protect Bonaire's trees and its environment from the continuing building boom.

Two and possibly three major hotels will begin construction and numerous other tourism related projects will begin.

At least one additional airline route to the US will be started and there will be increased flights non-stop from Holland.



Economic:

The rosy economic outlook for Bonaire will continue. Rental apartments will continue to be the strong sector.

There will be at least one more non-stop flight a week from the US, motivated by the Continental non-stop's high load factor

Housing starts, especially for Bonairean workers, will be a growth area.

Real estate values will soar in anticipation of the 2007 conversion to the euro, especially if it remains significantly higher than the US dollar.

Ground will be broken for at least one, maybe three new hotels.



Economic:

Direct Hit

All the year-end reports released to date show strong growth for Bonaire, primarily in construction.

The second non-stop Continental flight began in December and Arkefly, a Dutch charter airline, began flights in November.

Real estate values continued to move upward, reported at least two of Bonaire's leading realtors.

While ground wasn't broken, two major new resort developments will be underway soon.: Divi Sunset, an all inclusive resort, and a major hotel school.



The sewage plant project will finally begin, hopefully in coordination with other infrastructure improvements and road repair.

Developments will threaten Bonaire's trees, water and land. The Mangrove Village debacle will seem miniscule compared to what will happen unless safeguards to protect Bonaire's environment and culture are built-in to the integration agreement.

Encouraged by past success STINAPA will function as an environmental watchdog.



Environmental:

The Bonaire government will get behind a real alternative power project this year.

The sewage plant will continue to creep toward completion without being halted by environmentalist interests despite its acknowledged shortcomings.

Bonaire's Parks will continue to improve under their two strong managers

Environmental:

Partial Hit

While the Bonaire government announced plans for a wind turbine park, no progress was made on installation of a sanitary sewer system.

Bonaire's land and sea parks continued to be models for the rest of the world.



Social:

Until integration with Holland is achieved a combination of local and Dutch social programs will serve as a safety net for the island's population.

After integration, if politicians' promises are kept, Bonaire will move closer to Holland's social support system to the betterment of all Bonaireans.

Bonaire's police will get a shake-up once the Dutch justice system looks closer at Bonaire's needs.





Social

Under the moral leadership of the Governor and fundamental reinforcement from the Central Government, Bonaire's police will have more presence which will bring about a reduction in crime.

The charitable grant-giving powers of AMFO will be refined and systemized. Grants to worthy causes will resume early in 2006.

Social:

Aiss

After a good start Bonaire fell back into a past pattern of not being able to stop home, hotel room and auto break-ins. Police presence in Bonaire remains elusive, however, there were reports of better citizen and tourist victim relations and the police department claimed a 15% increase in arrests.

AMFO never was reborn. However, USONA became the prime distributor of government aid to the island.

► Last week we reported that **the Dutch province of Noord Holland of**fered to take the three smaller islands, Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius under its governing responsibility and to assist the islands in a number of areas. Noord Holland already has 65 municipalities with a combined population of almost 2.6 million people and intense economic development including Schiphol Airport, Amsterdam, the country's capitol, seaports, factories and 1.1 million automobiles. The province of Noord Holland was established in 1840 and is one of 12. **The** province system is a level of government that is between the central government in The Hague and municipali-

Many Dutchmen feel it is an unnecessary level of government in the 21st century. However, in the Antillean Referenda that were held several years ago, Bonaire opted for "direct ties with Holland" which was motivated by the inadequate performance of the Central Government layer in Curaçao. Therefore, opting for provincial membership may be contrary to the wishes of the Bonaire population.

▶ American Airlines announced that it is starting the New Year by offering customers on Caribbean flights new choices in fresh light meals, snacks and bottled water... at a price. The new choices are part of the airline's "continuing efforts to give customers what they value," American said in a press release. Snacks and bottled water will be available on all flights two hours or longer, and the fresh light meals can be purchased on all flights three hours or longer.

In September, American tested selling snacks on approximately 250 domestic flights. Results indicated that customers

appreciated the choice and value of purchasing individual items onboard the aircraft rather than having the items bundled together in a snack box.

The airline launched its food for sale program a year ago on US domestic flights. The program is offered in addition to the complimentary beverage service which remains unchanged.

REGENERATION

Dear Editor:

While educating divers as well as concerned dive masters about the nature of coral damage, it is important to understand both sides of the process, which are the diver's action and the coral's response. Coral is a living organism, not a passive fragile vase set on top of a sharp rock.

Corals are cnidarians, together with anemones, sea jellies and hydrozoans. Cni-



darians are well known for their remarkable any amputated head or foot, and when dissociated into single cells, even intact animals will regenerate from reaggregates. Studies have shown that coral polyps of a colony – not only the ones directly bordering an injured area but also as far as 15 cm away - allocate resources to repair the injury to achieve fast recovery. This is important in order to prevent colonization of a lesion by competitors. Regeneration ability and rate depend on a lesion shape. For example, long narrow lesions like lacerations from pressing coral tissue against underlying skeleton may be closed in minutes, while closing of circular lesions even of much smaller size like parrotfish bites may take hours or days; and lesions of a larger area may never be closed.

In other words, recovery of small damage, caused by things touching coral here and there is part of normal life of a coral reef. The real enemy of reef is larger scale effects: from rock-anchors thrown onto reef by fishermen, to over fishing of essential species, to water pollution. This is where the conservation efforts need to be directed.

Veeteeld and Visserij from the government are working together with the vet from Kaminda Lagun to collect the donkeys of Rincon, tranquilize them, and then bring them in a horse trailer to the harbor at night. There have been several shipments of the donkeys of Rincon since June/July 2006 with the

total of shipped donkeys at approximately 100 now. One shipment I followed myself and found out then that these donkeys were being used as food for the zoo in Curação. In fact when I was told this fact by the man in Cura-



the donkeys in his kunuku, I went to the zoo to discover that he told the truth also. Unfortunately some of the shipped donkeys have actually died in the horse trailer sitting at the harbor in the heat without water.

Some are saying that Marina Melis and the Donkey Sanctuary are the ones sending the donkeys of Rincon to the zoo for food. But that is simply a lie. I wish so much that these donkeys could be taken in the sanctuary, but already we have over 300 donkeys, and it is very difficult to find funding to provide for their food and care, so we can't take in any more donkeys under the current circumstances. But please know that because of all the donkeys taken in by the Donkey Sanctuary, the number of car accidents involving donkeys on the streets has been reduced from 120 in 2005 to only 5 in 2006. We are happy with that success and wish for you a good, safe, and happy New Year. And thank you for all those who help and support the donkeys of Bonaire.

Mangrove Village Must Be Removed

A swe went to press last week the office of the Governor of the Netherlands Antilles, in its overseer role, cancelled the building permit for the mangrove Village development project at Bonaire's Sorobon Beach on the grounds that no environmental impact study was made and that in any case it violated the principles of the Treaty of Ramsar (Iran, 1971) that protects costal wetlands around the world. Holland is a signatory to that treaty. Since then reaction to the ruling has been heated. The ruling vindicated the position of the environmental conservation NGO, STINAPA, that said the construction in that area was illegal because it violated the treaty and harmed the mangroves that grow in the area. Despite the opposition construction was well underway when the cease order was finally confirmed.

Bonaire's UPB ruling party-controlled Executive Council, which issued the building permit, said its action was no different than the permits issued for other development in the Sorobon area and that the complaint was politically motivated. They lamented the fact that developer Angelo Clarinda, a Bonairean, who also built the fueling facility at Flamingo airport, was denied the right to build. However, the Executive Council will abide by the Governor's ruling.

The opposition PDB party focused on the abuse of power by the ruling party, a pat-

tern it says is typical of current Bonaire government.

The Governor's order implied that the present construction in the mangroves must be demolished. Just when this will be done and who will foot the bill has not been decided.


The annulment by the Governor of the Netherlands Antilles of the decisions by Bonaire's Executive Council because it violates an international treaty sends a strong signal to island governments: Continued economic development is important, but the natural environment must be considered more and more. The Governor had already suspended the decisions to grant a long lease and to issue a building permit for the "ecological resort," on October 4.□ G.D. with photos by Wilna Gronenboom

Diver Response to First Dive Panic Experience Examination of Panic in 12,087 Recreational Scuba Divers

hat happens when divers panic underwater? David and Lynn Colvard sent us the results of their scientific study of a large sample of certified divers:

But is it really OK?

Among the 499 with a panic dive and rapid or uncontrolled ascent, 14 males and 9 females reported having signs or symptoms of decompression illness, and 7 males and 2 females underwent hyperbaric treatment, an insufficient number of cases for meaningful statistical analysis. One diver reported long term residual effects: numbness in the left toes after 5 years.

A history of panic prior to diving corresponded to about a two-fold relative risk of panic while diving, (2.3 for males and 1.7 for females). However, a history of panic prior to diving made little difference in the incidence of rapid or uncontrolled ascent with panic, either during or after initial training. A follow up study of the divers from this survey is currently underway. A prospective study of new dive students is needed to better determine the incidence of panic, the relative risk with a history of panic prior to diving, the incidence of rapid ascent, and the morbidity and mortality from the same, so that physicians can better advise potential dive students. □ David F Colvard, MD and Lynn Y Colvard, PhD



- 1 It's good for your pet. It reduces the risk of certain reproductive cancers and diseases for both males and females, and these pets also generally live longer. For females, it eliminates the heat cycle and therefore the nervousness, blood and unwelcome males. For males it stops the mating desire, reduces mounting and the tendency to roam.
- 2 It's good for you. It reduces the risk of unwanted litters. There will be no more problems with blood stains, males breaking into your yard, pets running away in search of a mate and the job of taking care of and finding homes for an unwanted
- 3 It's good for the community. Homeless pets often create serious problems. They destroy property, spread disease and cost a lot of money to control. It's an agonizing job to have to euthanize animals because of irresponsible breeding. $\Box L.D.$



second stage that never gets cleaned or receives a brief rinsing and is left wet repeatedly can wind up looking rather bad inside. I mean bad enough to almost make one's stomach turn when you see it.

Most, NOT ALL, 2nd stages are not difficult to remove the front cover and diaphragm. Some have a side pin or a clip. Most have nothing. Just unscrew the front cover and carefully see what comes next. Some have a friction ring. Others have another screw-on ring with a friction ring under that. The last item should be the rubber diaphragm which might be blue, black, clear or white and possibly other colors. Aqualung (US Divers) makes a very small 2nd stage called the Micra that can be a bit of a problem. I have a special tool to remove and install the cover so you might not want to tackle that model.

A regulator second stage

Some really old 2nd stages such as metal Dacors and Scubapros have a ring that holds the cover and the ring is held by one or two screws. These are a pain but not impossible. I have had some newer regulators that I needed a ring wrench to unscrew the cover only because they had been on for so long. Some manufacturers make special tools although there is usually a way around this. Using a kitchen rubber top removing cloth thing pad works wonders also.

With care, an old toothbrush can be used to scrub out the inside if necessary. Perhaps the dive shop you use can show you how to take the cover off, explaining any "tricks" such as keeper pins or friction ring etc. Of course the best thing to do is clean and dry the 2nd stage well after diving by running water through it, not just soaking.

One last point - when you do have the cover off, clean the threads. There can be sand pieces in there which don't help when putting it back together. Just screw the top down snuggly. Do not over tighten.

After all is said and done, take a gentle breath through it to make sure you get no air.

If you get air, you have not put the diaphragm back correctly or the exhaust valve got disturbed.

Bonaire Sea Turtle Conservation Needs Contributions

In reallocating its environmental aid the Dutch Government cut off aid to Bonaire's Sea Turtle Conservation (STCB). It had been a major source of funding for several years.

In early December, two STCB board members visited The Hague and met with the appropriate minister to continue the conservation activity which had received the approval of the Bonaire Island Council in August 2006. At the meeting the representatives were informed that the funding program

had been terminated and that a newly defined environmental program would begin in April, 2007. Unfortunately, sea turtle conservation would not be considered for any future grants.

The representatives were further advised that with the recent commitment of the government to a long-term trust fund for the Dutch Caribbean Nature Alliance (DCNA), STCB would not qualify for future grant money.

Andy Uhr, STCB spokesman writes, "So where does that leave us? Well, we are working on identifying other grants and will be submitting one mid-January. But the scope of this, and most other available grants, is nowhere close to what tion is easy, can be done right on-line we had hoped to secure from Holland. In addition, we have been raising funds

from supporters such as yourself and have had some success. Donations from Maduro & Curiel's Bank (Bonaire) N.V. and BOPEC have been encouraging and we received a generous donation from the Foundation for the Preservation of Klein Bonaire (FPKB). Still, we have a long way to go to meet our goal of raising NA f 100.000 this year."

On the Island Since ... 2000

Corine van der Hout

hile I was studying - I was about 18 - my parents bought an old farm house at an auction. It was then that I met this real estate broker and I thought: This man has a nice job; he's driving around all day, he's seeing people's houses inside and out, he's drinking coffee with them and he meets all kinds of people – that's what I want too! I was doing a high professional education study, a leisure study, and I liked it, but this seemed something far more interesting. So I started studying to become a real estate broker and at the same time I finished the other study. But before I finished the real estate course I got a job at a real estate office, a very fancy one. I was 22. In the meantime I finished my studies and was sworn in as a broker when I was 24.

I liked my job a lot, but after four years I was looking for a new challenge. Our headquarters wanted to open a new branch in the north of Holland, in Groningen, and they asked me if I was interested and I thought 'Yes'! And so I went to Groningen and I stayed there for four years. Then I wanted something new. Either I was going back to school again to become a financial controller or I would go abroad. I saw an ad in a trade journal about a real estate office for sale on Bonaire and I wrote them a letter, just for the fun of it! After two months -I'd practically forgotten about the whole thing – Ben van Zutphen, the owner of Sunbelt at the time, called me. I'd never been here, nor in any part of the Caribbean, but I did know where it was! After many phone calls, faxes and E-mails I went to have a look, together with my partner Jan-Henk van der Wier.

My first impression? It was hot, very hot! We figured we had to see the island first and so, being two typically Dutch people, completely stressed, we raced around the island and came back three hours later, telling the people we were staying with: 'We've seen the whole island!' Of course the sea was marvelous; the fact that you could see the fishes swimming in such transparent water was really amazing, but about the island itself I honestly didn't have an opinion.

We spent 10 days on Bonaire, assisting Ben a little bit and I soon realized that things worked quite differently here. Selling and buying was an international affair, and clients come from all over the world. Their backgrounds and knowledge were completely different, so what a broker does here is amongst many other things, giving a lot of information, not only about the sale, but also about

the island, the laws and the way things are working here in general.

Well, we went back to Holland, back to our jobs, letting the idea sink in for a while. But after some time we felt it was too big a challenge to let go and so we bought the business. We sold everything we had, everything! We arrived here with 110 kilos of luggage, and the biggest part of that were the computers. It was such a good feeling; I didn't have anything anymore! I felt totally free! Super!

We started with Sunbelt at the end of 2000. It was a very bad year and 2001 and 2002 were a drama – Bonaire's economy was way down... We'd known that when we bought the business, but as my first boss always used to say, 'All over the world houses will always be sold and bought because people need to have a house, simple as it is...' And we thought, 'As long as we'll survive it's enough.' Here we would get a commission of 4% versus 1.5% in Holland, so I thought, 'We can make it.' Anyway, it was only the two of us.

The moment KLM came to the island the market started booming because the Europeans could come and go every day and the Euro was high, and from that time on everything went way out of hand, positively speaking, because now were here with 10 people!"

Corine van der Hout (36) is pretty, very elegant and straight; she's easy to talk to, but she knows exactly what she wants.

"On Bonaire", *she says*, "we depend very much on the number of flights that come to the island. I am sure that when KLM stops at the end of March with their Amsterdam-Bonaire-Lima flight it will have an impact on the market, but on the other hand, we've got ArkeFly back. I also noticed that since the negotiations between Bonaire and the Dutch government started about a new status for the island, the number of investments on Bonaire has gone up. And



young people with children (a group we never had before) are coming to live here. Also many Americans and other non-Dutch foreigners want to get a residency permit now because it's still relatively easy and nobody knows how it will go in the future.

I am a guest here and I am doing my job, but I also hope that I am contributing something to the island, in the sense that my company creates work for other people too. The island will change... and I don't know if that's a good thing, but when I look at the young people here on Bonaire I see they also want to accomplish things. They also want progress and to be able to go forward with their lives. They want the things they see on the Internet and on TV, like the people living in the States and in Europe. So I think that you can't stop progress. I am an intermediary here. I am between the parties, and I don't force anybody to sell or buy; that's not the way it goes and that's not the way I want it because I see those people every day.

When we speak about the mangrove development at Sorobon, for which the permits were cancelled the other day, I have to say that at first the argument those people who were against it were using, saying that it was such a beautiful and undisturbed place – that argument didn't make any sense to me, from a developer's point of view. But then, as it turns out by a scientifically proven study of the environment that it will have a negative impact on the environment, specifically the mangroves, I changed my opinion and I am against the construction of the development; the whole eco-system... that's where I draw the line. But, on the other hand, I have nothing against 'high-rise' buildings of four stories. Anyway, it's up to the government to make the rules.

Our market has changed a great deal; the clients who are coming now are a

very different kind of people. I am amazed at the amounts of money people are willing to spend. Those are different people, not the people of the old Bonaire who liked the simple way of life. However, these new people do appreciate the tranquility, and they love to go around in shorts and flip-flops. On the other hand, they want luxury and they want high-speed Internet! Maybe this could be the ideal solution for Bonaire for the future no mass tourism, but people who love a more exclusive life-style...

As for myself... I have no ambition at all, really, not at all! It all turned out this way by itself somehow. I am a serious person, and I am involved, and I am certainly a positive person. I like so many different things and I think I am straight. I like to dress well." She laughs. "It started because my first job was with this exclusive real estate business and it was highly appreciated to conform to the dress code, and it's something you grow into. I also feel that it shows I'm serious about my relationship with my clients. When I am going to talk to someone about a contract I feel I can't show up in shorts because these people are spending money they've been working hard for all their lives and by dressing up I want to show them that I'm approaching them in a serious way.

When I came here I didn't know if I was going to stay here for a year or longer, but as time passed by I realize now the longer I'm gone from Holland the less I want to go back. If I go, it's only for a family visit. You see, the moment I close the door of the office, I feel I am on vacation. I go surfing or biking

and the weather is always beautiful. The longer I am here, the more I've come to love the island." □ Story & photo by Greta Kooistra

Use the Moon to Find the Biggest Planet and an Even Bigger Star"

n the Sky Park this Sunday January 14th and Monday January 15th you'll be able to use an exquisite waning crescent Moon to find the king of the planets and one of the biggest stars you can see with the naked eye. There is one catch, however. You'll have to get up with the chickens. This Sunday, January 14th, about an hour before sunrise face southeast where you'll see an exquisite 25-day-old waning crescent Moon complete with earthshine which will look like a grayish black full Moon nestled within the bright crescent. And that term, earthshine, is a very descriptive term compared with moonshine. Because while the bright slender crescent you'll see this Sunday is called moonshine, it's really reflected sunshine because the Moon does not make its own light. It simply reflects light from the



Jupiter

So moonshine is reflected sunshine. Earthshine is an entirely different story, however. It's actually sunshine bouncing off the daytime side of our Earth onto the darkened portion of the Moon, which is then reflected back to Earth. So earthshine is sunlight which bounces off our Earth onto the Moon and then back again. And the only time we can see this earthshine phenomenon is during phases of either the waxing, which means growing, crescent Moon and the waning, which means shrinking, crescent Moon. Don't miss it because it's absolutely beautiful.

Now once you've found the Moon look over to its left and the brightest object you'll see is the king of our sun's planets, 88,000-mile-wide **Jupiter**, which is so huge we could line up 11 of our Earths side by side across its middle. And please if you got a telescope for Christmas take a look at Jupiter because not only will you be able to see details of its layers of storm systems but you'll also be able to watch its four largest moons as they change position from night to night as they orbit the king. In fact you can even see Jupiter's four largest moons with a pair of binoculars.

Next if you look just down and to the right of Jupiter you'll see another giant object, although much dimmer than Jupiter because it's so much farther away. It's the red star called **Antares** which marks the heart of **Scorpius** the Scorpion. And to make sure you've found it simply go out 24 hours later on Monday January 15th and an even skinnier crescent Moon complete with earthshine will be parked right

What could be simpler? And although Antares looks dimmer than Jupiter from our perspective, it nevertheless blows Jupiter away because it is a star 600 times as wide as our own Sun. It is in fact so huge we could line up 5,800 Jupiters across its

Once again this Sunday the crescent Moon with earthshine is up and to the right of the king of the planets. And on Monday it's huddled right next to the second big-
