

Brasilwood Explosion!



he Dutch **I** government's representative who will be most directly involved with developing the new relationship between The Netherlands and the Antilles, the

new State Secretary of Kingdom Relations, Ank Bijleveld, will be paying an orientation visit to the Netherlands Antilles and Aruba beginning Monday, March 19.

She plans to visit all islands and meet with the Antillean Governor, the Central Government and the Executive Councils of Curação, Bonaire, St. Maarten, St. Eustatius and Saba.

► A report by consultant James Dunnigan questions: If Venezuelan dictator Hugo Chavez made a grab for Aruba, Bonaire and Curaçao, could the Dutch really do anything **about it?** "The Dutch military is no slouch, having performed peacekeeping missions in the Balkans and has served alongside the US military in Iraq. However, these have been relatively small contingents of land forces as opposed to a major naval-air campaign which reclaiming those Caribbean islands would entail. The report concludes that because of long supply

lines and strategic factors, US and allied help would be needed to stop any aggression from Chavez.

► Air France-KLM is reportedly preparing a bid for Alitalia and could link up with investment fund Management & Capitali, which has already been shortlisted by the Italian government, daily Finanza & Mercati said without giving a source.

The Italian government holds 49.9% of Alitalia and is ready to sell a stake of at least 30.1% in the airline.

► Soon, Antillean students in the US, holders of non-Dutch passports and other travelers who need a nonimmigrant visa (NIV) for the US will no longer have to travel to the American embassy in Caracas or Barbados. The American Consulate-general in Willemstad has started a test project for issuing visas locally. The last time the US consulate issued a visa was years ago. Travelers with a Dutch passport do not need a visa to travel to the

With the new system visa requests are done online. The requestors complete and print the new Electronic Visa Application Form which minimizes the handling time. With the completed form the requestors go to the American consulate in Curação for an interview. The requestor's passport, for which an NIV is approved, is sent to Caracas

where the actual visa is printed. The passport and the visa is then FedEx'ed or mailed.

- ► The US State Department and the Homeland Security Department now require all US citizens and foreign nationals to carry a passport or other accepted secure documents to enter or re-enter the US from vacations or business travel (by air or sea) anywhere in the Caribbean, including Bonaire.
- ► Parliament unanimously approved the National Official Languages Ordinance last week adding Papiamentu to the Dutch Kingdom's official languages. Dutch, English and Papiamentu are now official languages.

Education Minister Omayra Leeflang gave Parliament members the first Papiamentu document from 1933, "Bibliography of the Papiamentu language of Maritza Coomans-Eustatia," and a copy of E Kas Patras (The Back House) of Anne Frank as a gift.

"Papiamentu can no longer be called a dialect. Together with the Dutch and English languages Papiamentu is now a language in the Kingdom," said Leef-

Capt. Don's Award on Display

ast month Capt. Don's Hall of Fame Trophy was unveiled at the Departure Hall in Flamingo Airport. The award to Capt. Don was made two years ago in October and since then TCB together with co-sponsors worked on the project to place this important trophy in a special place. Now there's a beautifully designed display that can be seen by all our departing visitors at the Departure Lounge. The display was designed by Littman's Jewelers and was sponsored by TCB, STINAPA, CURO, BONHATA and Capt. Don's Habitat.

Capt. Don requested that he wanted to include a piece on Ebo (Hubert) Domacassé who was instrumental in getting Bonaire where it is. He feels the award is not just for him (Capt. Don) but for the island and therefore belongs to the people of Bonaire, especially to those who contributed to making Bonaire the Divers' Paradise.

Here's bit About Ebo by Capt. Don, written in February, 1999:


wo old gray haired ladies, tourists, pulled down their diving masks, locked arms and walked confidently down the old boat ramp to disappear into the sea. This was 1967 at the site of the once WW II internment camp, now the Flamingo Beach Club Bonaire (now Divi Flamingo).

A young Bonairean called Ebo stood watching, fascinated, as these ladies, perhaps older than his grandmother, simply adorned steel tanks and other basic

diving gear and walked into the sea. He had watched Captain Don was equally comfortable with all and his divers doing this for years the international tourists. - which stirred no real desire to learn. However, grandmothers?

Ebo had been born to the sea: sailed before he could walk, swam with the agility of a fish and dove, holding his breath, down into the reefs to remarkable depths, often without mask or fins. There was no part of the sea which brought him fear. Yet Scuba seemed to impose a caution that held him back from wanting to learn the art.

Ebo Domacassé is in many ways the heart of the Old Flamingo Beach Club. He was a trusted employee, often administrator, waiter, boat man hauling water skiers, fishing for others. And then as the bartender: as



Even though he had been around the shenanigans of this crazy Captain Don and had virtually watched the birth of the Caribbean's diving craze, there was a hidden reserve that restrained him from the desire of compressed air breathing. But now the grandmothers had touched a nerve. Not long after, Ebo donned his first tank and simply taught himself Scuba. Captain Don, having been that route himself, thought it a most natural thing and had simply cautioned Ebo: "Never do two tanks back to back. And pull this 'J' rod when you run out of air; it will give you enough air to get to the surface. But don't trust it. When it

fails, just come up slowly, but most important, never, never hold your breath. Just tilt your head back and breathe out slowly, kinda like whistling."

Several years later Ebo was logging some hundreds of dives. A visiting Scuba instructor diving with Ebo was horrified that he had never had proper Scuba instruction. Ebo smiled, knowing that he had more than triple the instructor's underwater time. Nonetheless Ebo Domacassé was to become the first certified diver on Bonaire. Captain Don wasn't certified until five years later.

It was not the certification or instructor status that propelled Ebo into the throngs of the developing diving industry but his phenomenal compatibility with the reefs, fish and the sea. It was as if a new aquatic Tarzan had moved into the oceans of his fathers - to take charge. His desire has never been less than total conservation. He had compassion for his charges that over the years he guided through his virgin reefs, relaxed and with a constant awareness. Few historians know of his remarkable record of his unsung number of entries into the reefs - a shepherd to literally thousands of visiting divers who have ventured with him without harm or incident.

The sailor, Ebo, became a hero in 1968 when he bested Captain Don in a sailboat race that won him 27 cases of beer. It was the birth of the now famous Bonaire International Sailing Regatta (which this year will be the 40th).

The compassion for this man Ebo Domacassé, who has been unceremoniously awarded two reefs in his name- Ebo's Reef and Ebo's special - a gesture from other guides as well as from his wet guests, is enormous. There's a love and respect from every diving visitor whom he's touched. Many machos are vocal, but it was Ebo with his quiet ways and relaxed manners who has given so much of himself to the building of Bonaire's renowned underwater image.

It has been an honor to have dove with you Ebo." Capt'n Don./L.D.

IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Dear Editor:

Last week's issue of *The Bonaire Reporter* contained my letter about detrimental effects of overfishing on coral reefs, and Dee Scarr's article about a fatal disease that struck sea urchins in the Caribbean in the early 1980s. The two topics are seemingly unrelated. However, this coincidence reminded me of a sad story in which these **two topics came together** in a very unfortunate way. This story has a great lesson, and it needs to be retold since it happened more than 20 years ago and many today never heard of it.

The large island of Jamaica was once surrounded by a beautiful reef that held some 60 species of corals. During the last couple of centuries, the population of Jamaica grew exponentially, while continually fishing. Overfishing in Jamaican waters can be traced back over 100 years. People removed more than half of the large algae-eating **fish** even before the 20th century. By 1973, both herbivores (parrotfish and surgeonfish) and carnivores (sharks, jacks, and groupers) were taken at a rate that was twice - or even three times - the sustainable take.

Here come the urchins. As fish disappeared, the population of this algae-eating competitor of fish exploded. This was good for the reef; during the 1970s the reefs appeared to survive well, as sea urchins took over the niche of herbivorous fish, keeping the fleshy, filamentous algae under control.

In 1980, Hurricane Allen smashed the Jamaican corals. As the reef began to slowly recover after the hurricane, the grazing urchins played a critical role in keeping down the algae so new corals could settle. Three years later, a disease attacked the urchins causing their mass mortality throughout the Caribbean. With overfishing still rampant, there were no major grazers left. Algae started to flourish. Clearly benefiting from the lack of grazers, algal coverage by the end of 1980s increased from 4% to 92%, with live coral cover declining from 52% to a mere 3%! The Jamaican coral reef died. The causes were the urchins' death after the hurricane damaged the reef, with **overfishing triggering** the reduced resilience of the reef ecosystem. Remember, the live coral reef coverage around Bonaire is about 47%, a little less than it used to be around Jamaica before 1980.



B onaire is blooming bright yellow! And it's the best show in years. Now's the time to see swaths of yellow blossoming trees especially up and down Seru Largu and along the north western coast of Bonaire. The trees are Bonaire's signature Brasilwood or Dyewood (Brasia in Papiamentu) tree. When it blooms it's often confused with the kibrahacha which also has a yellow blossom, but much larger.

The Brasil is a relatively small tree with deep grooves in its trunk and branches. It has short heavy thorns and the leaves are pinnated and roundish.

Bonaire nearly lost all of its Brasilwood trees with the popularity of the wood being used as a red dye. Acres of these trees were cut down and shipped to Holland where it was rasped to extract the dye.

Sadly, in areas where the Brasils have been cut down they've been replaced by the nasty, thorny Cossie which is very adept at covering open places quickly, leaving no room for other trees. It's an example of how easy it is to destroy nature and how difficult it is to restore it later. $\Box L.D$.

view movies of the parrot parents, of the parrot team doing chick check ups, interviews and much more. As raising awareness is a big motivation of the venture there will also be a lot of educational material from parrot facts through to online diaries from the project personnel describing their work.

To get access to all this material visitors will have to donate a small amount to the parrot project online. It will be possible to compare the details of the three pairs and their nests and choose which to sponsor. Or parrot-

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On the Island Since ... 1999 and 2005

Bert Poyck and Jo Bux

7 hen we were children we lived on the same street in Sittard, a town in the south of Holland, but we didn't really know each other because I was 17 and into girls and Jo was seven and playing soccer. It was here on Bonaire that we became neighbors again." Bert Poyck: "In the early 90s I used to travel frequently to Curação for business and that's how my wife, Miep, and I decided to come this way when we retired. In Holland I had a wholesale business in building materials and an import/export company which entailed a lot of traveling to Asia, but as I suffer from asthma I wasn't functioning well. Especially during the winters I felt really bad and it came to a point that I said 'Enough! I'm going to spend the last part of my life in a nice climate!'

We chose Bonaire because of its tranquility and we went to live at Lagoen Hill. The first couple of years we worked in resort management, but soon enough we decided to become *penshonados* full time. Now I am into photography and I sell the photos to tourists at the local cruise ship market and to resorts as wall decorations. I play guitar every day and Miep and I walk a lot through the *mondi*. We're no divers, we don't snorkel, but we do enjoy the island. This is home!"

Jo Bux: "In Holland I was a professional soccer player with Fortuna Sittard for 10 years, but originally I was a geography teacher. During my career as a soccer player I was teaching five hours per week, but when I stopped playing soccer those hours were too little to make a living and at the time there was no need for teachers so I opened several CD shops and a CD wholesale business. Music had always been my hobby and it was the right time because CDs were just being introduced to the public. I worked in the business for 20 years, then more and more people started downloading music, so I sold the business right in

My wife Dymphie and I were playing with the idea of doing something different, and as she was working in the fashion industry we decided to do that. Then we thought, 'Why shouldn't we do it in a nicer climate!' We met Bert and Miep at a party of a mutual friend in Holland. They were already living in Bonaire at the time. We'd just been to Aruba to look around but we didn't like the lifestyle there, so we were very interested to hear what they had to say about Bonaire. By the end of the party we decided to

visit Bert and Miep on Bonaire.

It took us some years before we finally came, but the moment we set foot on the island in 2004 it was love at first sight, and we came to live here in 2005. We bought the house next to Bert and Miep and we really like it here. We're still working. We have a fashion and CD shop at the house. I also deliver music to restaurants and I sell Bonairean music, bachata and meringue, at the cruise ship mar-

ket. It's funny because more and more locals come to the house to buy CDs with music from the old days, from Europe and the US, like ABBA and Roy Orbison! "

"So now we have a long-term commitment to the music school. We wanted to do something for the Bonairean youngsters and we think this is the right way."

Bert: "When Jo and I met at the party of this friend we found out not only that we'd lived in the same street when we were kids but also we had other things in common. Jo knew a lot about music because he worked in the business and my lifetime hobby had been rock & roll. I was a guitar player; I wrote songs and played in several bands. I was a child of rock & roll: the Everly Brothers, Chuck Berry and Little Richard - those were my idols!

So, one night on Bonaire the four of us were chatting about all the people we know in the music business and then we said, 'Let's try to get some Dutch bands to come to Bonaire to perform!' We did-

n't know what we'd gotten into. We'd already contacted Rene Schuman and Angel Eye, and then it came to a point that we had to set a date and book them. After that we started looking around for sponsors. Luckily all the business people we approached were positive, especially because of the fact that if there would be any money left we would donate it to a Bonairean cause. To show our appreciation to the sponsors we offered them a buffet before the concert and an after party with the artists. Everybody had a real good time! Rene Schuman and Angel Eye made a video clip here on the island, with images from Bonaire. Maybe someone, TCB or Bo-TV, wants to use it. If so they can contact us. That was last year.

For this year we're planning to get an artist to perform during the Regatta, so there will be no entrance fee and the show will be for everyone to attend. We absolutely don't want it to be an elite 'Makamba' affair. The response from the Regatta organization was positive and we hope our sponsors will react the same way as they did last year and hopefully new sponsors will step in as well. We are also interested in bringing real good bands from South America, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic or Jamaica. If someone has contacts there we would seriously like to talk about it.

From the very beginning it was clear to us that we wanted to set up a non-profit foundation because a lot of money is involved when it comes to organizing such an event. So, we founded Fundashon Bonaire Entertainment and decided to support the music school after talking with its secretary, Ricardo Vos,

and with Boy Janga. Music, like sports, is something that keeps the kids off the street. Ricardo Vos said, 'It should come to a point that the children become 'addicted' to music.' It's also good for the Bonairean music so it will remain. Ricardo told us they wanted to complete the whole reorganization of the music school first (they're also looking for another location) before we hand the money over to them. After that the money will be used to pay for music lessons for those who cannot afford it. Our goal is that those children will eventually form a band. We shall support them in every way, not only financially, but also with our know-how and through our connections in the music business. We will still be busy with music but in cooperation with the music school. The staff at the school has the idea that when a child plays in a band he or she is part of a team. They are responsible for one another and they also stimulate each

We got the impression that the music school takes it very seriously, and we're confident that everything will turn out well. It's also an obligation we have to our sponsors. So now we have a long-term commitment to the music school. We wanted to do something for the Bo-

nairean youngsters and we think this is the right way. We wanted to do something together with the local people. That's what this is all about!"

Treating Traumatized Divers

or those of you who were wondering following last week's story, my greatest phobia is nostophobia, the fear of returning home at the end of a great dive vacation, especially on Bonaire. But, for some divers the problem is anticipatory anxiety about the next dive when the last one was psychologically traumatic.

The first traumatized experienced certified diver I ever "treated" was a clinical psychology graduate student who wanted to dive on her honeymoon but who could not even put her face back in the water after a particularly bad experience on her last dive in Mexico.

The standard treatment for phobias is 90 to 120 minutes of prolonged exposure and response prevention to "reprogram" the autonomic nervous system's hyperarousal response, etc. So, she and I spent several hours one Sunday afternoon in a pool doing slow deep diaphragmatic breathing and very gradual progressive desensitization and prolonged exposure and response prevention. When she would start to get anxious we would slow down and she would belly breathe until she was ready to proceed to the next step. Eventually, not only could she go under and breathe comfortably from her regulator, but she was repeatedly taking her equipment off and on in the deep end. After returning from their honeymoon her new husband reported he had hired a private divemaster to be her dive buddy as a precaution, but she had been able to dive successfully in Hawaii without panicking.




Last winter I received an email from Liz Mercure, Senior Supervising Producer for CNN in Atlanta. This is how she recently explained her problem to Scuba Diving magazine writer Selene Yeager:

"I was certified to dive in 1981. My husband says I am part fish and that I must dive twice a year to keep my gills from growing over. I was always totally comfortable in the water, completely fear-

In 2004 I was diving in Honduras. My group began chasing a turtle. We kicked very hard to catch up. I suddenly could-



n't get my breath. I was hyperventilating at about 70 feet. I stopped swimming and hovered, trying to catch my breath. The edges of my vision got dark and my heart was pounding. I thought I was going to pass out. My buddy stayed with me until I felt better, then we continued the dive.



Sporadically after that dive I would have instances of my heart racing, being short of breath and diminished vision. It was a feeling of abject terror. There would be no warning at the onset, but it was usually within the first 5 minutes of a ploy the technique. I never again went dive. I started going on shallow dives only (40-50) feet, but it kept occurring. This went on for about two years. I was diving less and less, although I never stopped diving. I would always stay down and work my way through the attack. Once the attack stopped (after about 3 minutes) the rest of the dive was calm and uneventful. I didn't know if it was physiological or psychological, but the more I read about panic attacks, the more I realized that's what it was.

I love scuba diving so much that I couldn't allow this fear to ruin my favorite activity. I read an article on panic attacks in Scuba Diving. It quoted Dr. Colvard, so I contacted him. We had a good discussion on the phone and he sent me some CDs on ways to understand and manage panic. Most of it was designed for beginning divers and not someone like me, an experienced diver who had a sudden onslaught. Near the end of the tape they described how to slow your heart rate by

deep breathing from the diaphragm. I practiced doing it. I found it worked in all sorts of stressful situations.

On my next dive trip, as soon as my heart started beating faster I would eminto a full blown panic attack. I struggled with it for the entire week, having the beginnings of one on almost every dive. I was able to resume deep diving (80-100').

On my last two dive trips (Puerto Rico and Mexico) I had no problems at all. I am as comfortable in the water as I always was. It was gone as quickly as it began. I even got winded on a dive in Puerto Rico but never came close to a panic attack. I just slowed down, caught my breath and kept diving." David Colvard.

The Moon and Venus Make an Exquisite Showing on the First Night of Spring plus a Super Close Pairing of the Moon and Saturn

s if by some super Akind of cosmic magic on the very first night, in fact on the very first moment of Spring this year, the Moon and Venus will form an exquisite picture of the kind that will not only take your breath away but which has stirred the emotions of humankind since our species first began to look up at the heavens. Plus on the second night of Spring the Moon and Venus will make yet another breathtaking sight, almost as if to say that this Spring is going to be absolutely beautiful. Then only one

week later the Moon will come so close to **Saturn** it will make you want to grab your binoculars or a small telescope. Let me show you.

On Tuesday, March 20th the first night of Spring, one hour after sunset face due west where you will see an absolutely spectacular pairing of an exquisite crescent Moon and the most brilliant planet of them all, 8,000-mile-wide, **Earth**-sized, Venus which is only 406 miles smaller in diameter than our own planet. But what will make this pairing so exquisite is the fact that this slender crescent Moon will look as if a dark, grey-black full Moon is nestled within it. We call this phenomenon **Earthshine** because, whereas the bright crescent is sunlight directly reflecting off of the Moon, Earthshine is sunlight that reflects off of our Earth onto the Moon and then bounces back to Earth again. So in effect the dark ghostly full Moon is really sunlight bouncing off our Earth's brilliant clouds and oceans onto the Moon's unlighted surface, thus the name "Earthshine."

Now since spring begins at precisely 8:07 pm Sky Park Time, Tuesday night, this means that if you're on Bonaire when you look at the Moon and Venus you'll be seeing them just before Spring begins. And in case you're clouded out on Tuesday, you'll have a second chance to see an equally exquisite pairing of these two 24 hours later on Wednesday the 21st, the second evening of Spring when the Moon will be the same distance above Venus as it was below it the night before. Don't miss this please because I can't think of a more sensational cosmic way to welcome in the beginning of the new season.

Then as night after night goes by the Moon will slowly grow larger. And on Wednesday the 28th around midnight you'll see an exquisite **gibbous** Moon, half way between first quarter and full, parked less than one degree away from 75,000-mile-wide ringed **Saturn.** And if you have access to a small telescope this would be the time to use it because they will both fit within the same field of view and will absolutely blow you away! \Box *Jack Horkheimer*
