

utch legislation regarding marriages, including same-sex marriages, will not become applicable on the BES islands, stated Dutch State Secretary of Kingdom Relations Ank Bijleveld-Schouten last Friday. However, it may not be forever. In what may prove precedent-setting for future situations, Bijleveld-Schouten stated in a letter to the Second Chamber that her government is not in favor of deviating from the Dutch law when it pertains to marriages. Same-sex marriages are legal in the Netherlands but not in the Netherlands Antilles.

Until the three BES islands have become part of the Netherlands as "public entities," most Antillean legislation will remain in effect. Only legislation that is necessary to facilitate the constitutional reform will be introduced, such as the Dutch Civil Code, explained the State Secretary. It's intended that current (Antillean) legislation will be replaced, Bijleveld-Schouten confirmed, and that the Dutch Constitution would become applicable for the BES islands in the future.

Last week the President of the Antillean Parliament, Pedro Atacho, said, "It is up to everyone in the Netherlands Antilles and the Caribbean in general to give content to newlyelected US President Barack Obama's message of "hope and change. The message should inspire everyone, especially politicians, to work harder to take care of their people."

He called Obama's vision for a better United States and world "a bright path" to overcoming all obstacles. Obama is expected in the Caribbean in April for the Summit of the Americas set for Trinidad.

▶ Venezuelan President **Hugo Chavez** said at a political rally on a historic Venezuelan

battlefield last Saturday that Barack Obama had the "stench" of his predecessor as **US president** and was at risk of being killed if he tries to change the American "empire."

Chavez said frayed ties with Washington were unlikely to improve despite the departure of Bush, who the Venezuelan leader has often called "the devil." "If Obama as president of the United States does not obey the orders of the empire, they will kill him, like they killed Kennedy, like they killed Martin Luther King, or Lincoln, who freed the blacks and paid with his life."

In contrast Cuban President Castro, appearing for the first time since undergoing gastrointestinal surgery in July 2006, said of Obama, "No one could doubt the sincerity of his words as he stated that he would turn his country into a model of freedom and respect for human rights in the world and for the independence of other peoples. I have had the rare privilege of observing events over a long period of time. I get information and meditate carefully over these events. I don't expect to enjoy this privilege in four years, when Obama's first term in office concludes."

Interestingly, last year Barack Obama's Kenyan cousin, Raila Obinga, named his son Fidel Castro Obinga.

► There's word in the press that Curação is trying to become a hub for Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic spaceliners.

Joost Wouters, one of the initiators of the Caribbean Spaceport project, hopes to put a Dutch trade delegation in contact with interested parties on Curação. It's envisioned that Curação's Hato airport would be the site of a space experience park that could also be used for launching micro-satellites.

BONAIRE'S MELTING POT CONTINUES TO BUBBLE

Ponaire is now home to 69 different nationalities, up from 59 in 2007. And that's out of a total population of 15,101 (as of December 31, 2008, according to *Bevolking*, the census office). In 2008 Bonaire added an average of 2.4 people per day. The population in 2007 was 14,243 and in 2006 it was 14,006. Growth is accelerating.

Of the total population (15,101), **9,833** are Antillean-born. That leaves the number of immigrants to be **5,268** or nearly **35%** of the total population.

Those immigrants were born in 103 different countries of the world (see pie chart on cover). (In the entire world there are 195 countries) And they account for the 69 different nationalities. By way of an explanation, some were born in countries that no longer exist and/or they may have changed their nationality.

In the total population men outnumbered women in 2008: **7,873 men to 7,228 women.**






At the beginning of 2008 our population was 14,243. There were **148 births** and **1,652 immigrations** (adding 1,800). But there were **70 deaths** and **664 persons** emigrated (subtracting 734), leaving our year-end 2008 total of **15,101.**

am the eye of the doctor. I was pregnant and I went to patient first and at that moment I have to make the decision whether I'm going to send them home with an appointment or let them stay. In that short time frame I am responsible for the patient because if I send them home and something goes wrong, it's my fault.

For a long time I wanted to be a teacher, but when I was at HAVO high school I was at the delivery of my sister-in-law's baby, and that changed everything. I wanted to become a midwife. However, that particular education is not available in the islands and I didn't want to go to Holland, so when I got a scholarship I chose to go to nursing school, IFE, in Curação, It was

I went to live in Seru Fortuna with a family and those people became like real family to me. The man owned a carpenter's workshop and he taught me how to make furniture, something I enjoyed a lot. Four years later I graduated and went back to Bonaire where I started working as a nurse at the San Francisco Hospital, now Fundashon Mariadal.

In 1999 I went back to Curação.

I am the one who sees the work again in the workshop of the people where I'd stayed during my training as a nurse. I was making furniture until I was eight and a half months pregnant and after my son Jason was born I went back to Bonaire and started at the hospital again.

I worked there for six years until 2005. In 2006 I began to work at Centro Medico Central with Dr. Van der Vaart. So, I'm here for three years now and he doesn't want to get rid of me. We March it will be 22 years – Dr. Van der Vaart, Crusita, Cecile, Mery and I - are the best team there is.

I was born in Nort di Salina. My mom is Laura Thielman-Eisden and my dad Alejandro Thielman. They had 11 children: eight girls and three boys. I was number 10. My dad worked at Customs and he also played, and still plays, the kuarta, the guitar and the sinfonia, an instrument that resembles an accordion. I love music and I love to sing and when I was 10 I started taking kuarta lessons with Mr. Gregory

go for a third child." She laughs. "My little daughter didn't want to hear about a baby in my belly. She told me, 'No! I want you to go now and look for a baby somewhere. Hurry up!'

If I get pregnant, Doctor Van der Vaart is going to do the delivery. He loves deliveries – just like me. Whenever it's possible I run after the doctor when a baby is going to be born and there are many patients who want me to be there. To me it's always as beautiful as the very first time when I was just a girl and I saw my sister-in-law giving birth.

Life is sweet; sometimes there's stress and you just go on, but I like it simple and quiet. I don't go out. I like to sleep and I like to eat but—write this in capitals - I DON'T LIKE TO COOK! So, I always go for takeout, unless my mom has some leftovers.

The choir, my family and my work - that's my life! It's very important to me that the children are doing well at school and that's not what's happening. The new school system is bad. In the old system we would be instructed in Dutch from the very beginning. That's how we learned to understand the language. In the new system the instruction language is Papiamentu and they're getting some Dutch classes every week. It


doesn't work, believe me. Jason (9) has no problems whatsoever with math, but he's having a lot of difficulties with the languages. He's in fourth grade and he's reading like a first grader. He does not understand the subject matter because he doesn't understand Dutch. I don't know what to do about it. He's not dumb at all, but every week he gets very bad notes and I have to put my signature on them and it saddens me. It makes me tired and desperate." She sighs, looks at her son who's sitting on the sofa, watching TV and gives me a wearv smile.

"Okay, let's go back to my work, which means so much more to me than just work. I do my work with great pleasure and the patients have a lot of confidence in us. We also perform small operations and we treat people who've been in dive accidents or people who need treatment for wounds in the decompression chamber and we get a lot of tourists in. Sometimes I miss the action of the ambulance like when I was working at the hospital, but now and then we also turn out for an emergency.

I sincerely hope that in the future there will be more attention and funds for healthcare on Bonaire because the way it's going now – it's not good. Lately they're cutting back in so many things – like people having to pay for their own medicines in

spite of the fact they're insured with SVB, BZV or FZOG. We also have to cut back on materials. All doctors' practices have to. There's only one certain budget we're getting per year, appropriated by FCT (the chief of the money) in Curação and that has to last us for the whole year. When we order something it takes about two weeks for everybody to add his signature and then we get it here, but most of the time it's less than we've asked for. All this started in 2008. It was never like this be-

Another thing I would like to see improve is the way Fundashon Mariadal, the hospital, is functioning. I don't like to say too much about it but they could do better. At the practice it's getting busier by the day and I am in between the doctor – who's also getting tired – and the patients who want to be seen by him. I have a lot of patience and I don't like to get angry, but sometimes I say, 'I'm getting out of here.' I get my keys and start running!" She laughs. "It never happens! And I taught a lot of people to call Dr. Van der Vaart, 'Doctor' because people would come and tell me, 'I have an appointment with Dick,' and I would answer, 'With whom? I suppose you mean the doctor!' Hey, they haven't gone to school together. Have some respect!



It Like It Is

ave you ever heard of Econcern? You should because they have big plans for Bonaire. As the CEO of Econcern stated in the Dutch magazine, Vrij Nederland (nr 52/01, 27th of December 2008 – 7th of January 2009), "We are building a system on Bonaire to supply the entire island with sustainable energy through wind and biodiesel." That sounds fantastic, doesn't it? We are so lucky to have been chosen as an island to experiment on. And an experiment it is, because the combination of wind generators and a biodiesel plant does not exist anywhere else in the world. Of course you can congratulate yourself with such a feat.

Obviously there are some comments to be made about this project, otherwise I would not be bothering you by bringing up this topic. To start off there is the fact that they want to make a power plant run on biodiesel. The research into biodiesel is still in its infancy. But no problem, they will tell you, until we have biodiesel we will use the good old fashioned oil fuel. Well, why is your CEO pretending to build a "system to supply the entire island with sustainable energy?"

If you think that as soon as the biodiesel is available they will use that instead of oil fuel, you are sadly mistaken. At one of the public hearings organized to give information on the new power plant, it was made clear to the public that the power plant will switch to biodiesel as soon as the price of biodiesel can compete with the price of this cheap and dirty fuel oil. That could take a long time, perhaps even more than a lifetime.

Why tell the public that you are making green energy on the island when it is unclear that that is actually going to happen? It all depends on whether the researchers will find a way to make biodiesel cheaply enough. That is a big "if." You hear sounds across the globe that biodiesel may well not be the way to go. Every surface you use for biodiesel you cannot use for growing food. With the growing numbers of people there may come a time that growing rice becomes more important than growing palm trees to fill up your tank.

The people of this project have thought about how to get the biodiesel of course. They want to make it in a big pond at the salt pans in the south. Would that be enough to supply 60% of the energy of the entire island, which the power plant is designed to produce on average? I still need to be convinced of that. And what about the contamination of the reef if you have a big pond of aggressive-growing algae in the open air next to the open sea? How can anyone be absolutely sure that no algae will fly the coop, or that new algae will come in to compete with the existing algae? Until that time I am not looking forward to that pond of gooey-looking green smudge, however much I like green energy.



Green energy is not only about wind and biodiesel, but you have to look at the whole package, the location of the power plant included. Granted, Bonaire is a small island, so you are limited in your choices of where to put a power plant. But why choose a location in a nature reserve close to Gotomeer and the marine reserve? Also, it is not logical to have plans to make biodiesel in the south and the power plant in the north. Not only will you lose energy when you have to transport your biodiesel, but can you imagine all those trucks driving on the Tourist Route to get to the plant? It seems like the choice of the location was not made with biodiesel in mind, but with the tanks full of oil fuel just a stone's throw away.

Wouldn't it be wonderful to really become an island that runs completely on sustainable energy? There are some promising projects with biodiesel. Algae are grown in "tube mattresses" filled with water and nutrients, which are hung in a vertical position. That way you have solved a few problems. There can be no contamination with the environment because it is a closed system. You need less water because a lot will not evaporate in a closed system in comparison to growing algae in a open pond. What is most important, you yield more biofuel per acre because you can grow it vertically. You can check it out yourself on Youtube. "Vertical Algae biofuel Growing."

It would have been nice if the CEO of Econcern spoke more realistically in that article in Vrij Nederland. He could have said, "We are building a system on Bonaire to supply the island with about 40% very green energy through wind power and about 60% very dirty energy through burning fuel oil, with the intention of going green for the full 100%. But until biodiesel can compete with the cheapest oil available, Bonaire will not be 100% sustainable." But that doesn't sound flashy enough I guess... ■

FISHING

People have been fishing on the seas around Bonaire for years. Our forefathers lived by the sea. In the past, often during the week, we could go early in the morning to Playa Lechi, to mention just one of the spots, where we waited for the fishermen to come in with their boats. You could buy fresh fish right there, go home and prepare it before you even went to work. Then at lunchtime you'd come home and have it for lunch. Are we still able to do that? If it's still possible please tell me where I can buy fresh fish early in the morning.

Because I'm concerned with what is going on I had interviews with several fishermen to see what their thoughts

One who's been in the fishing business for 17 years, Luis Wijman "Juni" (40), said, "Up until about 10 years ago there was a lot of fish and people were standing in line to buy it, but today there's not so much fish. Where the fish are has changed a lot and some of the fish comes from the north west. They're not so easy to catch, especially if you don't have the most sophisticated equipment. There are big boats coming from Venezuela with fishing permits they got from the Central Government (in Curação) to fish in our

waters, and they sell the fish to other islands. They were doing long-line fishing for three years, so by the time we got there there was hardly anything left. We as fishermen have to talk about these problems but nobody is listening.

During the seasons when it's very hard to catch fish some supermarkets and restaurants import their fish from Ecuador where they buy it for a very cheap price. Then when we have fish that we want to sell to them they won't buy it because they're continuing to import it from Ecuador. But you still have to sell your fish so you can survive and support your family. Fortunately we sell to local people. So as you can see there are many factors causing the fishing business to go down. I still have my business and have to pay taxes for it. But because it's not as productive as it used to be, for the past two years I've had to go to work in the construction business every day so I can pay my bills.

It would be best for us to have a fishermen's foundation. We could get bigger boats better equipped to fish in deeper waters. The Island Government office has to regulate the LVV (Landbouw, Veeteelt en Visserij, agriculture, flocks, fishing) to see where fishing in Bonaire is heading."



Another very experienced fisherman is Constantino Pedro Diaz "Doei" (74). "Born to be a fisherman," he said. "I was fishing as a hobby, then I got into the fishing business. In the past there were few boats and a lot of fish. The fish price was very low and all the fish was sold. Today we have fewer fish and the price is high. In our waters we have six to seven foreign fishing boats that catch fish every day using long lines and they get all kinds of fish. With a small boat using a traditional fishing line you can lose a whole day if the fish don't bite. The fish are there, but you need a bigger boat with special equipment to catch them. Industrial fishing can help the island for sure. And of course with bigger boats and good equipment you can catch different kinds of fish in one fishing day.

A local fishing tournament was organized as a social day to bring the fishermen together and through this event start corporation among fishermen, but it didn't succeed. I hope one day we can have one."

As you can see a number of fishermen are concerned. There more comments from the fishermen to come.

Following the break and a retuning of the brand new stage piano Helena gave a truly magnificent


performance of the Davidbundlertanze from Robert Schumann. Following huge applause, as an encore she played the Etude in C Sharp by Frederic Chopin.

Governor's New Year's Party

Sends A Message

overnor Glenn Thodé and his wife, Mechtild Thodéde Wit, hosted the traditional Governor's reception in the courtyard of the Bestuurscollege (BC) on Saturday, January 24, under starry skies and gentle breezes. It was the largest turnout for a New Year's reception in memory with around 200 people attending. Former Governor Herbert Domacassé and his wife, Lena, were also on hand, as were a variety of officials.

The musical background was provided by the Latin Jazz trio of Andrina, Carlos and Lando.

After wishing everyone a happy 2009, Governor Thodé took the occasion to talk about what 2009 means for the future "direct ties" between Holland and the BES islands of Bonaire, St. Eustatitus and Saba. His speech was in Papiamentu, followed by Dutch with a summary in English.

He said that the goal of replacing the BES islands' connection of the Antilles Central Government in Curação with di-

rect ties with The Hague is intended to improve the quality of life of the people living on the islands, especially with respect to education, social benefits, fiscal dealings and public safety.

To expedite the transition, Regional Service Centers have been established on all the BES islands. The Governor said that this means that the Dutch will actually be physically present on Bonaire as well as the other islands, and that offers an exceptional opportunity for the neces-



A special feature of the event was the participation of the Queen's top officials of the BES islands: Bonaire Governor Thodé; Henk Kamp, Queens's Commissioner for the BES islands; St. Eustatius Governor Hyden Gittens; and Saba Governor Jonathan Johnson

sary activities to proceed properly because it can increase the understanding between the two cultures. This empathy can lead to better resolution of the issues that will arise. The Dutch can sample first hand the situations on the islands, and the local people can talk face-to-face with the Dutch men and women charged with bringing the islands into mainstream Holland.

Governor Thodé emphasized that the BES islands are seeking "integration with Holland, not assimilation." Local traditions and culture are to be preserved and balanced against the pressures and

benefits of a European-style society. He hoped that all would use 2009 to work towards that goal. \blacksquare *G.D.*

he house of the Wever family is situated somewhere on the right hand side of an unpaved road named Kaminda Tras di Montana (Road behind the Mountain), off the road between Mentor and Rincon. Most of the privately owned house has been built by Mr. and Mrs. Wever themselves over the last 25 years. They, their two kids, a son and a daughter who now live abroad, really love their spacious house on their huge terrain. No neighbors for the next couple of miles, no connection with the WEB (water and electricity distributing company of Bonaire), just the silent noise of a wind powered generator able to produce a thousand watts, and every now and then the deep and Rovers ever produced are still in running solid sound of a diesel generator when Johnny Wever is using his welding gear or one of his other electric power tools. "No connection for me with the WEB," Johnny exclaims. "I prefer to be independent, depending on the energy produced by our own windmill. I love the sound of clean energy!"

Johnny and his wife are enjoying life and are very happy persons. His wife was born on Bonaire while Johnny is from Aruba. "I was born on June 3, 1952. That makes me 56 now," he explains. "As a 16-year-old

boy I started as a volunteer working for the Red Cross of Aruba as a life guard, helping other people. Nowadays I am still

connected to the Red Cross, as president of low speed, two-wheel drive, neutral and the Bonairean Red Cross. Our office is at Flamingo Airport. I've been an active member of the Red Cross for 41 years now! The slogan of the Red Cross is, "Help us to help other people!" And I fully endorse this idea. The Bonairean Red Cross is very active on our island. There is a neverending need for volunteers and financial support, but we help wherever we can, during all kinds of sport events, karnaval activities, you name it and we do our best to be there to help and to assist!"

Johnny Wever is retired now. He arrived on the island of Bonaire on August 1, 1977, and for years he was connected to the SGB (secondary school of Bonaire for kids from 12 and up) as a mechanical engineer teaching the students to work with several types

"Since December 1990," Johnny says, "I've been a certified First Aid Instructor. Until now I'm the only certified instructor on the island. In 1995 a hurricane named Lenny tortured our island and I got in contact with Letzer Krausse, representative of the Dutch Red Cross. With Letzer's efforts the Red Cross of Bonaire had donated to them an ex-military ambulance made by the Land-Rover Company from Solihull, England. The car was originally painted a military green, but it was re-sprayed white with red painted crosses on the aluminum body. I gave this vehicle the name "Bosnia" because it served the troops during the war in Bosnia. The diesel engine-

powered, four-wheel drive ambulance served the Red Cross of our island for a lot of years, but at last the second-hand ambulance got tired. The gearbox developed more and more problems, and finally it became almost impossible to shift gears. Another problem was the lack of parts for the car on Bonaire. So in the end she was parked in a hangar, waiting for better times.

Finally, the Bonairean Red Cross decided to sell the vehicle and I became the new owner of this non-runner. Because of my interests and profession I like this car. She consists of an aluminum body mounted on a very rigid chassis. The chassis, the body and the engine are very easy to work on. It is said that some 75% of all the Landcondition."

The white re-sprayed Land-Rover series III model 109 ambulance was presumably produced in the 70s. The push rod cast iron overhead valve diesel engine is slow but very reliable. The electrics are primitive. No electronics. No power steering, no power windows, no air conditioning. A real no nonsense vehicle, fitted with a very rigid, non-flexible chassis mounted on four leaf springs. The comfort of the car is of a low level. The cabin for the driver and his

> helper is, to say the least, a little cramped. Hardly any space for all the black, yellow and red knobbed shifters to engage high speed,

four-wheel drive. A non-standard ambulance. Sturdy, not that comfortable. **But** on the other hand, it's a vehicle that keeps on driving while the floor mats are floating because of high water.


Then, as almost always, Johnny smiles his big smile. "And I am going to take care of this car. I am going to make her run again. For me, as a mechanic, this is a real challenge! One day we will see this exmilitary vehicle back on the paved and unpaved roads of my beloved island of Bonaire!"





I would like to dispute a comment made by Mary Ann Koops in last issue's article about animal overpopulation on Bonaire.

She states that in seven years, should no sterilization program for cats and dogs be successful, the number of dogs and cats would be "and that would take care of the donkey overpopulation nicely". What donkey overpopulation? There are only 80-100 donkeys left in

the wild on Bonaire. Since 1993, the "problem" of donkeys on the island has been well taken care of by Marina Melis and her husband, Ed, who now hold and feed 407 animals on their land. There is a strict neutering program in place and all males inside the park are castrated, so no new animals are born there. The sanctuary has a step-by-step initiative to bring in all the females from outside of the park, but the lack of cash funding from any governmental or environmental body means that the process is necessarily slow. In addition, the recent loss of 13 hectares of land to the airport expansion program has caused further huge problems for the sanctuary. Mr. and Mrs. Melis have the perfect solution to the "donkey overpopulation" already in place and in progress. Please do not undermine their efforts with ill-considered comments which cannot be substantiated.

enk Kamp, who has been appointed the Queen's Commissioner for the BES islands and who arrived on Bonaire early this month, will play an important part in the transition of Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba to their new status. In the Netherlands, the Queens's Commissioners, appointed for a period of six years, are representatives of the Queen in the country's 12 provinces. They act at the same time as the chairmen of the "Provinciale staten" (Provincial Council) and "Gedeputeerde staten" (Deputy Council).

However, Kamp will have another role besides acting as the Queen's representative. He will mainly supervise the transition of the BES islands to their new status in cooperation with local government officials.

It can be said without exaggeration that during the last years Henk Kamp has been one of the most charismatic politicians in the Netherlands, highly respected by his opponents as well as his supporters. He served successfully as the Minister of VROM (Housing and Land Planning), later as the Minister of Defense during the involvement of the Dutch army in Afghanistan, and finally as a member of the "Tweede Kamer" (House of Representatives) for the conservative (in Holland the liberal) party, VVD. He has been a very popular person, appearing frequently on various television shows, defending his opposition against the gradual Islamization

throughout time. "Omar," the tropical storm, surprised our island with a lot of destruction along the coast. SELIBON surprised me by cleaning up the mess so fast. I went out for a little free driftwood shopping and found most of it had already disappeared with the hard work of a lot of caring people. Fortunately I was able to salvage a few pieces to create something good out of this event in our

I know a lot of driftwood collectors out there are looking for something to do with their pile – so let me lead you through this easy project.

You will need to find a base piece to start. Any piece of wood slightly smaller than the finished project works well. Old unusable pieces of plywood are my favorite. With this base piece on a table, start placing pieces of driftwood to resemble body parts onto the base board. I look for driftwood that resembles fish fins, fish bellies and mouth pieces. Lay out all the parts on to the backboard. Think of it as a jigsaw puzzle. Start shifting the pieces around until they resemble some

sort of fish. When you have a good design in place, pull out the handy electric drill. To keep the wood from splitting, use a small drill bit to drill a hole from the backside of the backboard all the way through and into the wood piece add-on. Then you can put the wood screw in place with a screwdriver attachment using your electric drill or with a standard screwdriver. Wood pieces that are not more than 1" thick can be attached from the topside instead of the backside. This all depends on the size of your screws. The points of the screws should penetrate both pieces. The smaller pieces of wood can be attached using thick heavy glue such as "Goop." I used a bone and an unidentified metal round object for Omar's eye. This is when the real fun begins. Be creative and add odd objects to your art. People will look and wonder or question its origin. That really makes it Art for Fun!



Bubbles from the Biologist

Did You Know.....iguanas have rows of sharp serrated teeth that they use to chew up foliage? They can also use their teeth in self-defense and aggression. When walking through the Washington-Slagbaai National Park, you can see wild iguanas in the trees and along the paths.

On a field trip for my conservation biology class, we encountered large wild iguanas. We were told that people would regularly feed the iguanas even though signs warned otherwise. Feeding wild animals is not advisable, as animals that are fed by humans often lose their natural fear of people. Nearly any wild animal, no matter how timid, is capable of inflicting injury to humans, pets, and livestock. Feeding wildlife also has negative consequences for the animal. Because of close contact at feeding areas disease can readily be transmitted between animals. Also, human food may not provide the appropriate nutrients for wild animals. Bits of bread and crackers are not a sufficient food source for an iguana, however, they will eat it if given to them. Since people in the Park have been feeding the iguanas they've become aggressive and had no qualms about coming right up to my feet, even though I didn't have any food. I bent down to look at one when all of a sudden it jumped up and bit my finger! Serrated teeth leave quite a painful and bloody bite, and I was hastened back to the car





Hotel School for Bonaire Is Bonaire Really Environmentally Conscious?

B onaire signed a Document of Understanding (MOU) with Stenden University in Leeuwarden, The Netherlands, to have a mid-high-level hotel school built and operated in Bonaire. The Bonaire Economic Platform and Bonaire Hospitality Development Company and Ki Developments are also part of the agreement. Details of the location of the project have yet to be decided.

Over 10,000 students are studying and more than 800 employees are currently working at Stenden University of Applied Sciences (Former CHN). The university has campus sites in the Netherlands: Leeuwarden, Emmen, Groningen, Meppel and Assen; campuses in Doha (Qatar), Bangkok (Thailand) and Port Alfred (South Africa). And now a new location is planned for Bonaire. The uni-

versity offers three associate degrees, 19 bachelor programs and four masters programs in the fields of (Service) Management, Education, Care, Economics and Technique. Stenden University was the result of the merger between CHN University-Netherlands and Drenthe University on January 1, 2008.

There are no similar schools in operation in Aruba or Curação, or anywhere else in the Caribbean. \blacksquare *G.D.*

Bonaire says, "We have no control over what our neighbors are doing!"


It's illegal to dump waste in the *mundi* (countryside); but did you know it's illegal to dump on your own land and on rental or leased land? If you have rental







reetings, Sky Park visitors. In fact if we compare Betelgeuse with our own star, our 865,000-mile-wide **Sun**, Betelgeuse is so humongous we could fit over 160 million Suns inside it. And that's when Betelgeuse is at its smallest size because Betelgeuse changes its size regularly like a gigantic slowly pulsating Valentine heart, one that beats however only once every six years. When Betelgeuse is fully contracted at its smallest size it is a whopping 500 times the width of our Sun, but when it expands to its biggest size it is a super 900 times as wide. In fact if we could place Betelgeuse where our Sun is, Betelgeuse at its smallest size would reach out past the orbits of **Mercury**, Venus and Earth, all the way to **Mars**. But when it's at its largest it would stretch almost all the way to **Jupiter**.

Just think about it. Our Sun is almost a million miles wide, but Betelgeuse is almost a billion. Wow! So why not surprise your personal Valentine this Valentine's night or Valentine's week and have a hug while the goddess of love smiles upon you in the west just after dark. Then between 8 and 9 pm face south and give your sweetheart the biggest cosmic Valentine anyone will ever get: a gigantic red star slowly beating like a heavenly heart for the one you love. Is this a romantic cosmos or what?


