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t is likely that the Dutch Ministry of Transportation and Water will come up with the NAf 2 million needed for the short term temporary water purification plant necessary to reduce the impact of sewage on Bonaire's reefs. Statements by State Secretary Ank Bijleveld and MP Ineke van Ghent indicated this. The Bonaire Waste water Treatment (WWTP) project, the wastewater sewage pipes and treatment plant will not be completed for five years, perhaps too late save the reef. Therefore the temporary plant will have to process the waste brought by tank trucks from shore side septic tanks to the plant. In the shoreline sensitive zone are eight of Bonaire's hotels, approximately 1600 individual households, apartments and about 110 businesses.

► It didn't take long for the Police Department's new anti-theft squad to get results. On February 13 they raided several places. At 3:15 pm they recovered 15 laptop computers from an establishment on Kaminda Diabou, at 3:45 they got three more from a house on Kaya Dialma. They charged J.W.P., 23, with theft and possession of stolen goods.

Later in the week the police held a viewing of the computers at police HQ so the owners could identify their items. Investigation is continuing.

It's been reported that KLM flights from the Netherlands to the Antilles are usually not full these days. KLM has a deal from Amsterdam to Curaçao for €10 round trip; Martinair for €468; and ArkeFly as low as €371. USA flight prices have also dropped. Continental can fly you to Los Angeles and back for \$536. Several small airlines fly to Curação from Bonaire round trip for just under \$100 where you can catch low priced American Airlines flights. Insel Air flies from

**Bonaire to Miami round trip** for as low as NAf 550 and luggage is checked straight through to MIA.

- **Delta and Continental** will discontinue their weekly flight to Curação at the end of April due the drop in demand. There has been no notice of this action for Bonaire.
- The Social Insurance Bank's (SVB) pension age is expected to jump from 60 to 65 next year, said Antilles Minister Omayra Leeflang. However, effective the end of this month, people over 60 will get a 7.7% cost-of-living boost to their monthly old-age pension, which maxes out at NAf 726. SVB expects a deficit of NAf 4 to 5 million in the pension fund this year.

► The Queen's Commis-

sioner for the BES Islands, Henk Kamp, said he disagreed with Member of the Dutch **Parliament** Hero Brink-



man, who stated on several occasions that the Antilles

► The Dutch equivalent of the American/ Aruban Natalie Holloway case drew to a close last week, but with a quite different conclusion.

The trial of lead suspect, Ryan P., in the murder of the 24-year-old Dutch pharmacist trainee, Marlies van der Kouwe, started and ended last Tuesday, February 17, in a Bonaire courtroom packed with observers, Dutch media and Marlies' family. After considering the evidence, the judge will pronounce sentence on March 10. The Prosecutor,

David van Delft, asked for a life sentence not only because it's a specified possibility for murder but also because of the danger to the community should a psychopath like the defendant be freed. He spoke against the "culture of silence" in the Bonaire community which made accumulating evidence against the suspect difficult.

The defendant admitted strangling the girl during a struggle to steal her purse but denied raping her. Because the killer and his associates partially burned the body there was little supporting forensic evidence of sexual assault. In addition to murder and rape, Ryan P. was accused of robbery and kidnapping. Ryan P. had been released from prison a month earlier after serving a six-year sentence for aggra-

Defense attorney Marga Domingo emphasized that despite extensive analysis no evidence of sexual assault was found. She stated that her client wanted only to rob the victim, not kill her. She said the defendant asked Marlies' family for forgiveness.



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

The most important thing, according Kamp, is that "there are people there who just do their job and do it well. They are just as worried as we Dutch are about how their islands will be governed in the future and about political issues like public health and education. They want to improve their situation as much as we want to help them with that. So when someone calls these people corrupt and a 'gang of thugs,' it is absolutely not doing any justice to their efforts."

Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> brought gloomy news about the Dutch economy. New figures from the Central Bureau for Statistics. CBS, officially confirmed that the economy has been in recession since the second quarter of 2008, and is in worse shape than previously thought. The contraction that started in April 2008 resulted in negative growth of 0.1%, 0.3% and 0.9% in the second, third and fourth quarters respectively, according to CBS. And the end is not in sight. New forecasts for 2009 may point to a major contraction of 2% to 4% per cent, experts say. That would mean a decline in growth of at least €24 billion in just 12 months.

**▶** The Dutch Cabinet is

facing a €20 billion shortfall and will have to make drastic cuts in spending to avoid pumping up the budget deficit above two per cent, sources in The Hague said. The cabinet has set up a committee of senior civil servants to make recommendations. The options include raising the retirement age, reducing mortgage tax relief, cuts to unemployment and child benefits and scrapping tax benefits for nonworking parents with young families. Last year there was a surplus of 1%.

What all this will do to the Dutch commitments to the BES islands is unknown.

▶ "The Netherlands is heading for a severe recession," Dutch Prime Minister Jan Peter Balkenende warned. The "most painful" aspect of the forecasts was the increase in unemployment, he said. Unemployment will rise to 5.5% later this year, and up to almost 9% in 2010. On the other hand, household spending power will rise, partly due to the falling oil prices.

having changed the date of the
verdict to the 25<sup>th</sup> of February,
the International Court of Arbitration for Sports (CAS) again

postponed the date to the 13<sup>th</sup> of March 2009. The Olympic Committee of the Netherlands Antilles (NAOC) filed their appeal on the 23rd of August 2008 in Beijing, in order to fight the disqualification of their Athlete Churandy Martina, who initially won the silver medal in the 200m. sprint.

► There is a movement afoot in Bonaire to join the Earth Hour movement



on Sunday, March 28, at 8:30 pm in support of WWF's action to get decisive action on climate change. Switching off their lights for Earth Hour are the Christ the Redeemer statue in Rio de Janeiro, Table Mountain in Cape Town, Merlion in Singapore, Sydney Opera House, CN Tower in Toronto and Millennium Stadium in Cardiff.

Earth Hour is an annual international event created by the WWF (World Wide Fund for Nature/World Wildlife Fund), held on the last Saturday of March, that asks households and businesses to turn off their non-essential lights and electrical appliances for one hour to raise awareness towards the need to take action on climate change. It

was pioneered by WWF Australia and the *Sydney Morning Herald in* 2007 and achieved worldwide participation in 2008.

▶ Divi Divi Air's new STOL (Short Take Off and Landing) Dornier 228, landed in Bonaire very early Thursday morning. The aircraft has a capacity for 19 passengers. It completed a flight of more than 50 hours from New Zealand with an intermediate stop in Ecuador to Bonaire. Including this newest



aircraft, Divi Divi Air has now five planes: three Britten-Norman Islander BN-2As, a Cessna 402B, used mostly for charter flights and now the Dornier.

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## On The Island Since... February 17, 1997 Natasha Rekondie

was born on St. Martin were from Curação, but they came to St. Martin because my dad was a cop and he was stationed on each island for six

In 1976 we returned to Curaçao. We were three children from my mother's side that is – and I was the youngest and the only girl and I was spoiled. I was a very lazy girl; I loved to watch TV and listen to English music like soca, calypso and ballads. At school I did very well, but I was terribly shy. I didn't talk much or ask much and I didn't (and still don't) like parties. I'm just a quiet girl. We lived in Mundo Nobo where the police houses were and I went to elementary school in Otrabanda until the fifth grade because then we went through a bad time as my parents got divorced. I went to live with my mom and my brothers with my grandmother in Dominguito, changed schools, finished and went to St. Jozef Mavo in Punda. I always wanted to be a veterinarian and all four years in Mavo high school I was the best in the class. After Mavo I went to MIL high school where I finished Havo.

In 1970. Both my parents became a model in 1987 and I modeled for three years. During that time I was also playing in the best brass band of the Netherlands Antilles, 'Brass Revolution,' as a base drummer, the only girl in the Antilles. What a contrast for being such a shy person! We played at parties. I played, but I didn't dance and no drinking and no smoking -bonmucha! (good girl!). Lovely times though. We played at the carnival in St. Martin, Aruba and Curação and during the Regatta on Bonaire.

In spite of being so very shy, I in July 1996 and was working in a hospital part-time until I got the chance to come to Bonaire.

> In 1994 I and my former boyfriend - who was from Bonaire had come here for vacation. We loved the tranquility and peace so we started looking for work here Through his sister I got a temporary contract with Bon Fysio, filling in for someone. I arrived in December 1996 and worked for Bon Fysio for four weeks. After I returned to Holland Bon Fysio called and offered me a job

In August 1990 I went to Leiden, Holland, to do a medical laboratory higher professional education (HBO) for two years, but it was too much about numbers and I'm not so good with numbers. During my second year I did one year of sports massage; I liked it so I decided to change my course and I studied physical therapy for four years. I finished

so my boyfriend and I came back in February 1997. He went to work for the salt company. I worked with Bon Fysio for one year, then in July 1998 I started my own practice, 'Fysio Therapy Natasha,' in Playa until I finally found a good location in Tera

I also started with medical fitness and aerobics and I was



working with a chiropractor from Curaçao, Dr. Snel, and with an acupuncturist named Gobin Persaud. I took a course in acupuncture and a course in cranio-sacral therapy. And I had my first baby, a boy named Shaxel, with my previous boyfriend in April 2001. So, I was 26 when I came here and 27 when I opened my own

I set goals everywhere I go. On Bonaire I had three goals: my own practice, my own house and kids, and to get married. The last one didn't work out... so far! Ha! Ha! But anyway, when I reach one of my goals I replace it with another one - to challenge my-

self. And the challenge I had was to go to St. James Medical School because I wanted to be a doctor. I went to St. James in 2004, together with a colleague of mine, Kiri Quiringdoongo. It was a lot of hard work. I went to school from 8 am until 3 pm, and from 3 until 6 pm I worked at my practice. At 6 I picked up my son from daycare, and at 10 pm I started studying until 2 in the morning, five days a week for two years until I graduated. So did Kiri.

And then—the cruelty. The government of Bonaire didn't accept our certificates. They had

promised us before we'd started that they would accept the certificates and that they would give us a scholarship after the two years, to continue our studies in the States. That was the promise. And as we were the only two locals who had finished the course, St. James Medical School promised us to pay for our trainee location in one of the hospitals in the States and we were only supposed to pay for the cost of living, which the Bonairean government was going to take care of. None of that happened and we wasted two years. I was frustrated and angry.'

Natasha is pretty and tall and she's a well-balanced, calm and strong woman. She's also thoughtful, serious and gifted and she has a natural authority.

"In September 2006 I had my second baby boy, Felipe, with Rene 'Bencho' Cordilia. I'd met him in August 2002 when I went to have my car fixed and I liked him immediately." She smiles.

"My children didn't change my life very much; I am quiet and when I'm not working I'm always at home. I try to raise my children in a way that they don't go after fads and money doesn't come first but family does because family is the basis. Then there's respect for other people, for everybody, and to be helpful, that's important too, I think. My

hobby is my two children and the most important thing to me in life is health.

I don't play music anymore, and that's a pity, and every first of the month I want to start with sports, every first of the month that is. I can't cook, but I like to eat and I like to experiment. Last weekend a Surinamese teacher from SGB taught me how to make roti. This weekend it's going to be bami." She laughs. "I have a lot of cookbooks in a container – I should get them out!

Well, I had my practice for 10 years but in the ninth year I studied education for 16 months and in August 2007 I got a full time job as a biology teacher at SGB high school and in December that year I sold my practice. You know, I chose physical therapy because I see every client as a new challenge. In teaching, every student is new challenge; that's what I like. There are always bad stories going around about SGB high school and I wanted to make a change. I like to teach, especially children who have a reputation for bad behavior, but when you talk to each one of them, you see that all the problems they're having come from a difficult childhood. A year ago the school started a practical training course especially for boys with difficulties and it's working very well. I'm also mentor of a class that has been 'class of the week' five times in a row,

from January until now. I am so proud of them.

Another thing I find is that it would be good if new teachers, especially Dutch teachers, could understand and speak Papiamentu. All the study books are in Dutch, but to really understand and communicate with the children on their own level and to explain the lessons to them you need Papiamentu. I'm teaching at BVO, lower professional education, and a lot of children are really struggling with Dutch. It's sad to say, but I see more misery

coming with the next generation coming to SGB, the ones who are now in elementary school, with the new school system where they're getting too few Dutch classes. I've put my eldest son in extra Dutch classes to prevent this happening to him, but it shouldn't be necessary. Every child has the right to good educa-

I see myself teaching for 10 more years, but... I also love change. I want to do as much as possible in life. I have a dream of opening my own private hospital

here on Bonaire in a natural environment, a hospital especially for children and long-term patients. I'm looking for sponsors to support my project and I'm serious. I've got the plans. You see, I'm always looking for more, for a

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

#### FISHING PART III

This is a continuation of last issue's subject of fishing on Bonaire.

f you need information and advice you have to go to the right source. For fishing, go the LVV (Landbouw, Veeteelt en Visserij) government office for Agriculture, Flocks and Fishing. LVV has a broad mandate that gives service to people who are involved in agriculture, raising livestock and the fishing business. To learn more about fisheries I interviewed Raymond "Rocky" Emmers (51) in charge of LVV, a nice, humble person, very smart and a real Bonairean. He, as well as everyone fishing in our waters, is concerned about what is going on Bonaire. He keeps the fishing records on the island. Rocky has been doing this job for more than 26 years.

As he says, "In the beginning the government had a fishing company that was managed by Mr. Pleumeekers (who passed away some years ago), but it went bankrupt. After that the fishing came under the control of the LVV, but we didn't have enough funds to manage this properly because the government-supplied budget was so small. So the fishermen had to go on their own. After some years of struggling we got a fishermen's co-op to ease the cost of fishing, but the people on the board were into making more trouble and not solving the fishermen's problems. So we dissolved the board and are waiting for the next step.

But I believe that if you got the right people on the board we could do a much better job. We did a lot to bring the fishermen together. We went to a conference in Saint Lucia with some fishermen to let them see what a co-op could do for them and what a co-op all about. Being a co-op and being a legal entity you can get help from everywhere, even from banks who can help in buying necessary fishing equipment from a boat to a hook. We are working hard to bring the co-op back on its feet.

LVV, DROB and STINAPA managed to repair some facilities like the pier and fresh water faucets at Sorobon for the fishermen.

Some fishing companies in Curação gave us some advice about what else we can do for the fishermen here in Bonaire.

Unfortunately, the commission for fisheries in the Netherlands Antilles, which is based in Curaçao, advised the minister in charge who worked for the Central Government to give permission to everyone to fish in Bonairean waters. The LVV worked strictly with the Coast Guard to supervise this matter at sea. But it's not an easy task.

On Monday, February 16, we had a meeting with some of the fishermen about this, and we are eager to start the co-op again. We have people with skills who can do the job. But fishermen have to join, to come together to make it happen. We can have a solid fishing industry in Bonaire that can help Bonaire's economy grow. But we must have modern equipment to do the job right. We can't stay behind. But without help from the fishermen for a co-op this will be just words. We want to stay positive. We look forward to make this come true."

they suffered a calamity. On February 11, at 0950, the Bonaire police received a call that a boat on the east coast was in trouble and that divers were jumping over the side. It was one of the windiest, roughest sea days of the year. The abandoned dive boat began drifting in towards Baby Beach.

The police said they got notice that two divers were missing and mobilized a massive rescue effort and scrambled a helicopter and airplane. Fortunately, within a few minutes of the notification, according to the police report, the divers were reported safely ashore, but the rescue was already in motion.

One of the BECD owners told *The Reporter* that the captain of the boat said that first one, then the other of his motors stopped running and neither of would restart. The eight divers were already in the water and were advised to make their own way to the nearby shore. They and the captain all made it to shore uninjured.

Later the boat, a Zodiac Hurricane 920 about 30 feet long, which had been driven ashore, was salvaged by a crane and trucked to Boto Blanku Marine for inspection. There was surprisingly little damage to the hull but the motor skegs were demolished. The Port Captain is investigating the accident. BECD hopes to be back in operation in a short time. There was to be a post on the website www.bonaireeastcoastdiving.com/en/with up-to-date information but was not available at press time.


### **More Than 60 Tires Removed**



This project started as Happy Hour chatter among the yacht people moored in Kralendijk Bay. It was quite evident to all that the surge and surf from Hurricane Omar in October 2008 had caused a dramatic increase in the debris (mainly tires and wooden planks from the shore and broken docks) that was lying in the shallows and on the reef. One cruiser counted 68 tires within the span of five boats. The group voted to offer its services to the Marine Park. To that end, Din, Chief Ranger of the Marine Park, attended a meeting in which it was agreed that three Park staff members, Juan, Apo and Polina, and a Park boat, would work with the cruisers to pick up only those tires that had no coral or sponge growth on them.

There was 100% participation among the cruisers invited to join. Over 40 people organized into teams made up of divers, swimmers and boat workers. Toucan Dive Shop kindly provided free air fills for the divers. Then on Thursday, January 29 the group worked for three hours to retrieve the tires, which eventually filled a garbage bin, provided by SELIBON on the commercial dock. The event was so successful, that the boaters agreed to complete the cleanup of tires from the remainder of the mooring field and adjacent reef. 



Young males, on the other hand, are being bombarded by images and lyrics from hip-hop culture, movie and inter-

net media, etc. that equate "masculinity' with being a "thug." In this kind of culture, education is not "cool"; instead being sexual with a number of women, fathering children without responsibility, showing off with violence, money, and drugs, and demeaning women are considered to be the traits of a "real

Perhaps some workshops on feminism for both young men and women at the high school could open up a new kind of dialogue on gender roles, conflict, and communication that would help address problems and issues related to JP Richau gender that occur everywhere, not just on Bonaire (i.e. rape, domestic violence, drug addiction, depression, etc.).

#### RESPONSIBLE BOAT DRIVING

On Tuesday, February 10 we were walking past Angel City in the morning. There were three dive boats moored at the Hilma Hooker site, a small fishing boat moving slowly south to north just in the blue water area, and the dive boat Free at Last approaching the mooring buoy at Angel City. My wife and I were shocked to see the dive boat cut directly across the bow of the fishing boat without reducing speed. The fishing boat got rocked at a dangerous angle. The dive shops that I'm familiar with educate their boat operators about safe operation of their boats and very possibly the shop that owns Free at Last did the same. Maybe the rules of the road and courtesy at sea should be reviewed with the operators. There was no need to race to the buoy, especially at the expense of a fisherman whose boat was a fraction of the size of the dive boat. The dive boat operator should have cut speed and reduced wake long before approaching the site. Dive boats and fishing boats should be able to share the same sea without antagonizing each other. I hope I never have to witness this kind of irresponsible behavior again.

No Status Aparte for Curação and St. Maarten

ithin a short time, the Netherlands Antilles will be dismantled. Our island, together with St. Eustasius and Saba, will become an integrated part of the Netherlands, while Curação and St. Martin will remain part of the Kingdom as autonomous lands.

You might say that the dismantling process started in 1986 when the Netherlands met Aruba's urgent demand to leave the Netherlands Antilles and to become an independent country within 10 years (in a 1987referendum, 82% of Aruba's population voted for independence). From the beginning of the Netherlands Antilles, Aruba felt too oppressed by the Central Government in Curação. Although nobody dares to mention it, the different ethnic origins of the majority of the population of both islands – Afro-Caribbean in Curação and European in Aruba – played a role in this decision. Unfortunately, at that time the only possibility of Aruba escaping the yoke of Curação was to leave the Kingdom of the Netherlands and to become an independent country.

It was agreed that for the transition period Aruba would get so called "Status Aparte," which meant in principle that, with the exception of defense and foreign relations, the island would be allowed to take all administrative, economic and financial decisions itself, without any control or interference by the Dutch government. However, only four years later, Aruba's government surprised the former colonial power with its humble request to remain in the Kingdom, and the article in Aruba's constitution scheduling Aruba's independence was rescinded. One of the reasons was the bad consequences of becoming independent for Surinam, a former Dutch colony which, against the will of the majority of its people, was forced by the Dutch government in 1975 to leave the Kingdom of the Netherlands and to become independent. A full third of Surinam's population then fled the country and settled in Holland. The originally democratic government of Surinam was soon overthrown by a bloody military regime which without any trial executed 15 of its opponents. Nobody knows how many people would have left Aruba if its original independence plan had become a reality in

You would expect that the rescinding of the independence plans would automati-

cally mean the end of Aruba's Status Aparte which served as preparation for independence. However, after lengthy negotiations, the magnanimous Dutch government agreed that Aruba could retain its status. However, after several years of Status Aparte, the lack of any external control over the island's finances and tourist development resulted in disaster. The US and Italian courts sentenced Aruba's government to pay many millions of dollars to foreign investors for not complying with its obligations towards them. The payment of the enormous debt still forms an important amount of Aruba's annual budget. The lack of external supervision of Aruba finances also resulted in rampant corruption, not so much by the two main political parties, AVP (Christian Democrats) and MEP (Social Democrats), alternatively ruling the island, but particularly by small parties forming a coalition government with one of the main parties.

An abhorrent example was the Minister of Public Works in Aruba's first administration after receiving Status Aparte, called by the contractors, "Mr. 5%," surpassed only by the Minister of Transport and Communications in the last coalition government. His fraudulent actions were also the main reason for a decisive election victory of the MEP party which has been ruling Aruba alone, without any of the small parties, for the previous eight years.

The bad experience of the Netherlands with Aruba's mismanagement has been the main reason why the new autonomous lands within the Kingdom, Curação and Sint Maarten, originally hoping to receive a similar status like Aruba got in 1986, will be subjected to severe control of their finances. The population of Curação will decide in the coming referendum if the package offered by the Dutch government will be accepted or rejected. There is no multiple choice now; the people have just to vote "Yes" or "No." ■ Jiri Lausman

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## **More Help for Bonaire's Youngsters**

utch Minister for Youth and the Family, André Rouvoet, recently visited Bonaire s a part of his efforts to see first-hand the state of local facilities and systems for dealing with problems among young people in the BES islands. In addition to meeting with local governmental officials he and his staff also visited several local organizations such as Jong Bonaire, SEBIKI, Maria Höppner and others.

The Minister made it clear that the new relationship with Holland will have far-reaching implications for the young people of the islands. The first, and most visible, reflection of the ministry's efforts will be the creation and staffing of a Center for Youth and Family (CYF) on each of the three islands. This office will then coordinate activities aimed at children at risk and will include improvements in both systems and facilities for dealing with children taken into court protection, addiction, criminality, domestic violence but also an emphasis on prevention of problems before they begin.

Currently, due to its small size, Bonaire does not have sufficient capacity to deal with many of these issues and children often have to be sent to Curaçao for help or may not be able to receive needed services at all. This should change dramatically with the staffing of the CYF which is estimated to be approximately 40 full-time workers across the three islands. The ministry plans to focus on training and upgrading of local professionals over the next two years.

As Minister Rouvoet said during his meeting at Jong Bonaire, "one of our major goals in the transi-

tion period will be to assure that the correct facilities are in place when the final transition occurs." He went on to say that he plans to be sure that there is good cooperation between BES island organizations and their counterparts in the Netherlands.

## **Bubbles from the Biologist**

### **Did You**

Know...why seals see well underwater? Think back to a time when you briefly opened your eyes underwater, without a mask. Do you remember what you saw? For humans, the sight would have consisted of a blurry blue haze with any objects present also appearing blurry. Humans, and their eyes, have evolved on dry land for many thousands of



years. The cornea of the human eye is convex which, along with the oblong-shaped lens, allows the eye to focus light to a single point on the back of the eye. In water, light moves at a slower speed than in air. Without the lenses being able to compensate for the change, the human eye is unable to focus the light underwater, creating a blurred image.

On the other hand, seals have the ability to see objects clearly both underwater and on land. Unlike the human eye, the central region of the seal's cornea is flat. This allows light to pass through unchanged. However, the light needs some way of becoming focused. The seal's lens is a spherical shape with increased muscle attachments, allowing it to change shape more than a human's lens is able. Thus, seals use their lenses to focus light to a single point on the back of the eye, whether viewing an object on land or underwater. ■ Kara Kozak

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## Two Outstanding Art Openings


#### Ronald Verhoeven's Exhibit At Kas Di Arte

Renate van der Bijl's Exhibit at Plaza Resort







What Does That Old Saying 'In Like A Lion Out Like A Lamb' Have To Do With The Cosmos?



ou know I have always been fascinated by mythology and folk lore, especially phrases we learn during childhood and repeat all our lives and frequently have little or no idea where they came from. For instance everyone has heard that old phrase that "If March weather comes in like a lion it will go out like a lamb," and vice versa. But have you ever wondered where that phrase comes from? Well my astronomical colleague has long suggested that maybe this phrase got its imagery from the heavens.

On Sunday, the first day of March, about 8 pm Sky Park time, if you're far from bright lights and if you go outside and look toward the northwest you will see the very dim stars that make up the constellation Aries the Ram or Lamb. But if you look in almost the opposite direction toward the northeast about the same height above the horizon you'll see the constellation Leo the Lion. So here we have two wonderful night sky images that match the phrase, a lion and a lamb, both about the same height above the horizon in early evening on the first of March.

But what will we see if we go out at the same time a month later on March 31st? Well, quite a different story, because on March 31st at 8 pm, the lion will be almost overhead and the lamb will be smack dab on the northwestern horizon. Now we all know that the weather at the end of March is usually milder than the weather at the beginning of March so our skies at 8 pm on the last day of March with the lamb setting supports the fact that March is going out like a lamb. However, if we turn our skies back to March 1st at 8.m we see that the lion is just rising, which lends support to the premise that March usually begins with fiercer weather, comes in like a lion so to speak. So perhaps long ago someone tied this all together noticing that on the 1st day of March Leo the Lion was just rising up into the heavens whereas at the end of March Aries the Ram was leaving them. And thus decided to poetically link both of them to the weather.

This March 2009, however, we can add a second cosmic meaning to that old phrase because also in the west just after sunset at the beginning of this March 2009 is the planet **Venus** at its greatest brilliancy, out dazzling everything in the sky except the Moon and the Sun. In fact it comes in at the beginning of March like a lion but as the month progresses, it loses half its brightness and starts vanishing into the sunset, going out like a lamb. Whatever, it's always fun to investigate old folk lore because there always seems to be a bit of truth involved. So here's hoping your March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. ■ Jack Horkheimer
