

► Following numerous flamingo deaths the Water and **Electricity Company (WEB)** promised to equip overhead electric cables with reflectors so that the birds will not fly **into them.** The company will set aside NAf 30.000 to NAf40.000 for the project.



► Last December the Bonaire Government passed a resolution (AB1991#8) to help build up the island's fish stocks by establishing no fishing zones within the Bonaire Marine Park. While spearfishing has long been banned, line fishing was permitted. STINAPA, which manages the Marine Park, was designated to define, educate and, if necessary, enforce the new regulation.

The two zones will be marked by buoys and signs in four languages. Yellow painted stones are used as well.

Zone 1 runs from north of Harbour Village to Point Waya, Zone 2 from the Plaza Resort harbor to Chachacha Beach.

It is permitted to take bait fish and two non-reef-dwelling fish in these areas under special regulation.

Experience in other Caribbean areas show that within a few years fish population and fish sizes increase in the no-fish zones and adjecent areas.

▶ Last week Island Governor Glenn Thodé in the name of Queen Beatrix awarded **Dutch citizenship** to 31 persons who competed the necessary requirements. The ceremony was held in the Passangrahan (Island Council Chamber). Addressing the new citizens were, among others George Menshe, head of the Civil Registry, and Governor Thodé.

▶ Bonaire is not alone in considering using algae-based fuel. The city of Venice, Italy, has announced a plan to produce 50% of its electricity needs from an algae-based power The city will be producing electricity from two types of algae that are brought in clinging to ships and which regularly grow over the seaport. The algae will be cultivated and treated in laboratories to turn it into fuel. The fuel will then be used to power turbines in a new 40 MW power plant in the center of the city. The innovative project will cost the city \$264 million and should be operating in two years.

▶ The Antillean Parliament will shortly receive a phasing plan for the further process of dismantling the Netherlands **Antilles.** The promise came after opposition member Jopie Abraham from Bonaire requested clarity regarding the progress of the constitutional change process.

The progress of Bonaire's connection to Holland as a municipality continues independently of this process.

► The Antillean airline companies DAE and Insel Air are having difficulties in receiving any transfers of their revenues in American dollars from Venezuela. The Venezuelan car industry, banks dealing with credit cards and other sectors dealing with imports are also suffering from the dollar shortage. This is the result of the lowered oil price and the international crisis. Some Venezuelan banks have informed their clients via pop-up messages on their websites that payments in dollars can be made only for food, accommodation and medical emergencies abroad.

► Citing cooler seas and the prospect of a weak El Niño, the benchmark Colorado State University (CSU) hurricane team lowered its 2009 Atlantic forecast on Tuesday to 12 tropical storms, of which six could become hurricanes.

The US research team, founded

▶ Homeowners are requested by storm forecasting pioneer William Gray, said the season could see two "major" hurricanes of Category 3 or higher on the five step Saffir-Simpson intensity scale. Hurricanes of that magnitude have sustained winds of more than 110 miles (177 km) per hour.

> The researchers said sea surface temperatures in the tropical Atlantic Ocean had cooled in recent months. Hurricanes draw energy from warm sea water, so cooler water could diminish hurricane activity.

Happy Birthday, Reporter 15 Years Old This Month

B eginning with this issue we will look back at the past years' news that appeared in our pages. It's interesting, especially when viewed in the light of current developments.

We begin with a retrospective of some of the news as it appeared in Port Call (previous name of *The Bonaire Reporter*) at its beginning in 1994 and 1995. You'll notice many of the items are waterfront related as befit the original Port Call slogan-Bonaire's Boating Newspaper:

Port Call - "For Yachts in Bonaire" -1ST issue was printed in April 1994. Readers had to donate NAf 1per copy (to cover Xeroxing).





On The Island Since... 1993 Ana Belinda de Lima

66 was born in Honduras in 1968. My whole family is from Honduras. When I was two years old we left. My father was an engineer in the oil industry and first we went to live in Curação where my dad worked at the refinery. Then we lived in Aruba, Ecuador, Mexico and Santo Domingo, and when we moved to Venezuela I was 10. Up until then I'd always gone to an American school and English was the first language at home.

Once we were in Venezuela my mom just loved it there and she said, 'No more moving!' So my dad went on working abroad and we stayed with our mom. She was our role model; she kept the family together and educated us.

In 1989 my father was working for Bopec here on Bonaire and we – four kids and my mom – came over to spend the summer holidays here. I was 21. During that vacation my dad became ill and he and my mom went back to Venezuela, but they decided we could stay here and have our vacation. We were really excited to be by our-

selves. We went out every night and it was perfect because Bonaire was such a safe place, so we did things we could never could do in Venezuela – like partying until two in the morning!

Then I met my husband, Manuel de Lima. He'd come from Portugal through Venezuela to Bonaire in 1982 and he was working for a Portuguese company on the island. It was like destiny because he was already divorced and he had a little girl who was living in Venezuela with her mom, only 30 minutes from where I was living... a big living in Venezuela, so it wasn't that easy. I was studying preschool education and running a daycare, 'Colita y Muñecon,' and we only saw each other once a year needed to learn Papiamentu and in at Christmas, but the telephone was less than three months I was singour great friend. My parents didn't let me go for summer vacations anymore after they found out I had a boyfriend.

In 1993, four years after Manuel and I had first met we decided it was enough and we got married

and I left everything behind and came to live here." She smiles. "It seems to me like yesterday. The beginning was a little bit tough because we were such a close-knit family, so the change was really huge. But with the love and patience of my husband I got through that. I didn't speak Papiamentu or Dutch and that's what I needed to get a job.

Since I was 15 I'd always worked with children, so it was like a big part of me was missing. I stayed at home and was a wife and it was like that for almost nine coincidence. We started dating, but months. I used to torture myself by he was living on Bonaire and I was going to the preschools and the two daycares that I knew until playschool 'Jiwiri' gave me the opportunity to work there as a volunteer. Esmeralda gave me all the help I ing with the children and God helped me because six months later a teacher left and I got the job permanently. Then I also took a Dutch course for two long years with Mrs. Piek because I thought it was very important for me to be able to understand the Dutch children as well, and now I can communicate with all the kids. I worked with Jiwiri until my baby boy Alejandro was born on the fourth of July,

> Because he was a really difficult baby as he was always sick, I




stayed at home with him. However, thing. in April 1997, five couples with five babies knocked on my door. They wanted me to take care of their babies and that's how Colita y Muñecon started on Bonaire.

Because I was a foreigner it took me some work to get the permit to start a crèche, but with the help of SEBIKI and some deputies I got my legal permit two years later. After that I started taking every course provided by SEBIKI and the government to upgrade myself and to keep on learning Papiamentu. And today I don't feel like a foreigner anymore – I'm so happy to be part of this community and the preschool community and I can give my opinion and I don't have to be afraid of saying some-

I was taught 'old school' - the old system – and it's a little bit difficult to change after you've been working for a long time with a specific system. The way I see it, behind discipline there's always love and respect. I find the new school system too flexible. I think it's good for children to have boundaries, but... it all depends on the child and the specific needs of each child. Most of the parents think that the majority of the responsibility lies with the crèche and not with them. The bad person in the movies is always the teacher, not the mom! Often they want me to discipline the child, but at home it can do what it likes. Maybe be-

cause parents don't see much of their children it's their way of compensating. Children do miss their parents; they miss them a lot! They need their attention and their time.'

Ana de Lima loves 'her' children and she's strict but fair as she believes that's best for the child. She's straight to the point and she feels very responsible and passionate about helping a child grow and

"At the moment I have a bunch of little angels; we are working with a nice group and a nice group of parents too. Now I'm slowly introducing the new system. It's been introduced in all the preschools on Bonaire. It's called 'Kaleidoscope' and it's almost the same idea as they're using in the elementary schools now, so the transition between preschool and elementary school will be smooth. But... we have to be multi-lingual. We have to teach the child in its own language. So we're speaking four languages here: English, Papiamentu, Spanish and Dutch, and the children absorb all these languages very quickly.

I'm really happy the preschool system changed since I first started here. Then it was a place where you left your children to be looked after; there were no crayons, or paper, just toys. And now you can enter into any of the 20 crèches here on the island and vou'll see all sorts of educational materials. At

my crèche we have 30 children: some come in the morning, some in the afternoon and some come all day. We have a program, a schedule the kids follow daily so it's like a routine for them. Every month we work with a different theme and at the end of each theme we have an outgoing activity or a big party. Being responsible, loving and strict is what counts most. I always tell my trainees there are two working in the mornings and

two in the after-

we have a lot of responsibility; we have a lot of little Spidermen and Spiderwomen growing up here!'

I love my work, but I'm also a mother and a wife. Alejandro is 12 now and he's in SGB at Havo. I'm really proud of him and his achievements. He's a good swimmer with the Barracuda swimming club. At the moment he's in Aruba participating in a swimming competition and I'll be going in two

noons – 'Look, this is not a cookie, days to join him. He also loves to go on his mountain bike – anything that's sports thrills him.

> When I'm free I love to stay at home and enjoy it. I also love animals; any little animal they bring to me I'll take care off until it's big enough to go to a new home. And I'm always selling tickets to raise money for different activities. Sometimes we get into the car, find time with my family and travel a beautiful spot and sit there with sandwiches and something to drink

and we just enjoy the view. I don't like the sun or the beach; I don't like to get dirty, that's the prob-

Well, my idea is to work three to four more years, then find someone who would like to go on with the crèche so I can learn how to play the piano which is one of my great dreams and to have a little around. But I wouldn't like Colita y Muñecon to disappear; I wouldn't like that at all. I think I will always stay here – you know sometimes I think of living in Venezuela or Portugal, but when

I'm there... I really want to run back to my calm and secur island!' ■

Bonaire Gets A Grand Piano

he Bonaire Classical Music Board, a group of 15 culturally-minded residents and a few companies, report that the island's own grand piano, a Yamaha C5, arrived last week and has been unpacked, installed at the Plaza Resort and is getting tuned following its sea voyage. There was great help from Rocargo Services who sponsored the transport from the Netherlands to Bonaire.

The donations for the grand piano already exceed NAf 35.000. There is still NAf 4.000 to finance. That will be managed by fundraising and organizing concerts where the grand piano is Board Bonaire an important instrument.

THE BONAIREAN MAN

Most foreigners coming to Bonaire wonder how our Bonairean men think, behave and act. Well, in this case, I think we have to get the answer from an educator who has been studying the Bonairean man's progress from the early ages. Retired educator, Mr. Henry P.A. Tore (68), married to Mrs. Matea Teresa Strickx, has been on the island since 1964. After teaching in the Dominicus Elementary School (behind San Bernardus church), he continued his career as an educator at Lourdes High School (the front part of SGB (School Gemeenschap Bonaire) today on Kaya Korona) in English and Mathematics.


From 1970 he was the principal of Lourdes High School for four years. In 1974 he was appointed as the inspector of education for Bonaire and Curação. Then Holland came up with a new plan for education on Bonaire which was to put all secondary (junior and senior) high schools in one building, under one roof. In 1975 he fulfilled Holland's goal and was honored to be the director of the SGB from 1975-1980

He's since held all kinds of jobs associated with the office of education. He was Director of the Department of Education, founder of the Catholic School board; of FORMA, a form of education for dropouts; and the FINEB finance office for graduates who want to continue their studies in Holland, Aruba or Curação. As you can see he has broad experience in the field of education, so he can tell you about Lucinda Da'Costa-Gomez, Mrs. Maria his own experiences and the Bonairean man.

"From the point of view of an educator," he said, "a man is molded according to his environment at home, in school and on the capable of filling all positions. street. In the past men had more privileges than women in every sense. They had more freedom to experience and learn to be in high positions. Women were more at taking it very easy today. Emancipation of the women and their additional rights made men start thinking differently, because women have proved that they can succeed in high positions. There are Antillean women who have had and who are still fulfilling responsible positions in our community, like Mrs. Liberia-Pietersz and our Prime Minister of the Netherlands Antilles, Mrs. Emily de Jongh-Elhage. Against all odds, insult and opposition the women have grown strong,

My advice to men generally, especially to the Bonairean man, is to invest in his future. He must study. Young men are start thinking about our responsibility. playing by the rules are not enough. You need to invest not only in material things but also in wisdom and courage. Assume your responsibility as a man. Get a job, take care of your family and/or children, do volunteer work and continue to study. nity and exert yourself. 



priving along the southern shore of Bonaire has got to be one of the most colorful and exuberant experiences on the island—colorful in every aspect of the word. Our culture and history and the south end of the island have been tied together for centuries, and this tiny story is a part of that. Local color is something we all seek. After 1957 when an American based company decided to restart salt production on Bonaire after centuries many of the former traditions in collecting salt of course disappeared, but several of the original elements remained. The oldest area, Blue Pan, aside from the ruin and obelisk, has little to show from its past. But the areas of White, Red and Orange Pan have quite a few unique relics that were left behind. As you approach the homes at White Pan, look to your left. On a low tide day the dikes and pan walls are clearly visible. These were built by the slaves. As you continue south you'll see

more walls and dikes made from coral rock.

But there is one relic that's quite special and must be preserved as should all the buildings in the south! As you take the most southern bend along the road and look to the sea you will find an original sea inlet which was man made. Follow the inlet to the saltpans and on the opposite side of the road you will see several wooden beams lying horizontally to the road.

Reef Cleanup By



he initial cleanup on January 29th, when over 60 tires were removed from the shallows and reef along Kaya Playa Lechi and Kaya J.N.E. Craane was just the start of a project, which would carry on through February and much of March. The cruisers moored in the park and the marine park staff carried it out.

The effect of surge from Hurricane Omar, in October 2008, deposited a tremendous amount of debris (mainly tires and wooden planks from the shore one to "give back" to this wonand broken docks) lying along the reef. The cruisers offered their services to the Marine Park, and Din Domacasse, the Chief Ranger of the Park. agreed that three Park staff and a Park boat would work with the cruisers to clean up tires that were free of coral or sponge growth.

Over 40 volunteers spent a half-day retrieving tires from the bottom and lifting them into the boat. Toucan Dive Shop kindly provided free air fills for the divers. The event was so successful (a large garbage bin was filled with tires) that it was agreed to complete the tire cleanup the following week.

In the meantime, boaters gathered and piled any tires lying in the vicinity of their boats. Then, on February 5, the boaters completed the tire project with the help of Marine Park staff. In all, over 120 tires and a large piece of docking were collected.

A meeting with Ramon de Leon, Ma-

rine Park Manager, confirmed that the reef clean up was a priority and that he fully supported the continuance of the project. The cruisers next collected and piled wood from the wreckage of the three main docks along the waterfront. On February 19, a boatload of wood planking was recovered. Air fills for this day were provided by Carib Inn.

Two more work days, on March 12 and 19, saw another two boatloads of docking, fragments of fiberglass from broken boats, PVC piping, and even a sink, removed. Anything too heavy to raise manually was lifted with air bags and dropped into deep water beyond the reef. WannaDive offered free air for the divers on these two days.

In addition to the volunteers, the Marine Park staff worked particularly hard these days. Besides lifting the debris into their boat; they had to unload and transfer it to their truck and off-load it at the landfill. It was a great effort by everyone involved.

Bonaire is a favorite destination for cruisers, from all over the world, who dive. It was a rewarding experience for everyderful island that is loved so much. Now, shore divers, local and visiting, who frequent this area can once again enjoy and appreciate the beauty along this portion of Bonaire. ■ Story & photo by Karen Chelswick

Bubbles from the Biologist



Did You Know...

Legends of sea monsters like the Kraken, a beast that ascends from the deep to devour whole ships of brave men, may not sound like the Caribbean Reef Squid we see here in Bonaire, but there are some similarities between the two. This mollusk eats small fish, other mollusks and small crustaceans. They eat about 30-60% of their body weight daily! These squid don't have to travel from the depths of the sea but prefer to live in shallower waters, down to 60 feet.

Caribbean reef squid use body color and pattern to communicate with each other. Male squid are sending mixed messages. Fighting males will turn white and bounce against each other, but throw a female in the mix and the male will actually split his coloration so that the female only sees the gentler side of him (the male never shows her the aggressive white pattern) while still on the offensive with the other male (an entirely different

message altogether). They will also turn pale when approached by a predator before jetting off - clearly these are not the sea monsters of legend.

Rob's Harley-Davidson WLA

The 45th of a series of Bonaire Reporter articles by J@n Brouwer, featuring some of Bonaire's interesting vehicles that are "on wheels."

Bonaire/ Kralendijk -

hen, on Wednesday afternoon, Rob van Dongen opens the door of his workshop in the back of the yard, his garage gives me the impression of a kind of historical museum. The first item you see is a Harley David-

son "Liberator" parked in front of a World War II Ford Jeep. Then you see an enormous American flag hanging on a wall in the back of the garage, an old fashioned fuel pump, classical American toys for the kids, old metal oil cans and used tools, and all kind of World War II army gear. And of course there is the smell of fuel, engine oil and hypoid EP 90 gearbox oil, all blended with the smell of cigars. This is Van Dongen territory!

Rob appears to be a very open and friendly person. He loves his hobbies and he really wants to inform you about everything. Because it is already half past seven he immediately rolls his classical motor out of the workshop and parks it along the yellow painted wall of his traditional Bonairean house. First we have to take the pictures, and then it is time for a talk. We will run out of tropical daylight soon!

The motorcycle is a Harley Davidson WLA Liberator, made in the US in the year 1942. The drab green colored vehicle And, as we know, an engine needs fuel is officially registered on Bonaire as 493 - MF and also wears a red plate on the rear fender showing some kind of number of manufacturing: U.S.A.W – 687273. Rob is very proud of his 750 V-twin motorcycle. He bought the machine some 12 years ago in Europe and transported it to Bonaire about 10 years ago. Rob says, "I have been a regular visitor to my beloved island of Bonaire since 1980. I bought the house in 1989 and since 2006 I am an official resident of the island. One of the reasons for leaving the Netherlands was the enormous increase of road traffic in Holland. It became harder and harder to enjoy riding my motorcycle on those cloudy Dutch roads. My loyal Harley just the war (along with spare parts the loves cruising at a speed of some 45 miles equivalent of many more.) an hour. Nowadays modern cars and trucks don't like this speed anymore! I had already bought my house on Bonaire so the decision was easy. Let's go to Bonaire and enjoy the advantages of the silence and quietness we can still find on this island! Just think of an afternoon trip around the silent south, enjoying the sound of the wind and the engine!"

Rob tells me about everything. A long time ago, as a student in the Netherlands, Rob fell in love with a Harley Davidson Liberator. A friend of his owned one. This friend had a lot of problems with the bike, but when it ran it ran and the sound was unbelievable. So Rob decided to save money to buy his own Liberator one day in the future. About 12 years ago, after looking around for ages, Rob found a nice and almost completely original Liberator for sale. The bike had been restored and was in very good condition. Rob made the right decision. The engine always runs and the machine just needs regular maintenance. This, of course, means topping up all liquids and checking everything always. You really have to run a Liberator on a regular basis, otherwise the oil tank starts dripping on the chain and it keeps on dripping until it is completely empty. and oil.

The WLA is a model of Harley-Davidson motorcycle that was produced to US Army specifications in the years during and around World War II. It was based on an existing civilian model, the WL, and is of the 45 solo type, so called due to its 45 cubic inches (740 cc) engine and single-rider design. The A stands for "army." Harley-Davidson began producing the WLA in small numbers in 1940 as part of a general military expansion. The later entry of the US into World War II saw significantly increased production, with over 90,000 being produced during

Rob's WLA was built in 1942 in the States. It is a very reliable and quite slow 750 cc side valve two cylinder compressing the fuel and air mixture only five times. When the engine is hot it can even run on kerosene! There are only three speeds in the hand shifted gearbox and using the brakes is quite an adventure. Normally Rob uses the engine to slow

of the old drum brakes is not comparable to the power of modern disk brakes. There is no electric start on the machine. It is just the old kick starter you have to use. Mounted on the left hand side of the rear of the bike is a foot-operated siren. It works similarly to the dynamo of a bicycle. The harder you push the siren to the rear tire, the higher and more penetrating the noise. Rob tells me the siren is a very useful device with all the donkeys on our

Starting the engine is a ritual: Open the fuel tap. Kick start the engine three times.

down. The brakes are there but the power Partly close the butterfly/choke of the carburettor. Turn the ignition switch on top of the tank. Push the kick starter another time. The reward: a very nice original V-twin low revving Harley sound and the juicy smell of oil and gasoline.



The Seven Sisters and the Moon Point to Mercury at its Best for 2009

his Sunday you'll have an opportunity to find **Planet #1** at its best for the entire year by using the **Moon** and the **Seven Sisters**, which will make a fabulous visual threesome.

This Sunday night, April 26th, about 45 minutes after sunset face west northwest where you will see an exquisite crescent Moon complete with earthshine which will look like a dark full Moon nestled within the crescent, and just below it the tiny star cluster known as the **Pleiades** or **the Seven Sisters**, and just below it the most difficult of all the naked eye planets to find, Mercury, but easy to find this Sunday by using the Moon and the Seven Sisters.

The Seven Sisters names are Maia, Electra, Alcyone, Taygete, Asterope, Celaeno and Merope.

Mercury is the tiniest planet of them all, Planet #1 from the Sun, 3,000-mile-wide Mercury, only a thousand miles wider than our Moon. And if it looks pink to you don't worry because it's called the pink planet even though it really isn't pink at all. We call Mars the red planet because it actually has a reddish color to its soil. But Mercury appears pink due to the fact that it never ever gets very high above the horizon, so we always look at it through dusty and dirty layers of our Earth's atmosphere which gives it a pink coloration. The dirtier the atmosphere the pinker it will look.

So if you've never seen Mercury before you can make sure you've seen it this Sunday simply by looking below the crescent Moon and the Seven Sisters. And might I suggest you get out a pair of binoculars or a small telescope to really make this sighting even more fun because you may be surprised to see Mercury looking like a tiny crescent Moon, smaller than our own crescent Moon, directly above it. And here is something to think about. Our Earth is 93 million miles away from the Sun and takes 365 1/4 Earth days to make one trip around it. Mercury however is only 36 million miles away from the sun and makes one trip every 88 Earth days. And since one trip around the Sun equals one year if you are 10 years old on planet Earth you would be 41 1/2 years old on Mercury. Which makes it safe to say you should probably never ask a Mercury maiden her age

Mercury is actually the fastest moving of all the planets. In fact, whereas our Earth moves 67,000 miles per hour in its orbit, Mercury zips around the Sun at the breakneck speed of 107,000 miles per hour. So look for Mercury this Sunday when it will be almost as high as it ever gets and super easy to find. ■ Jack Horkheimer




