





n a joint statement on August 25, Divi Resorts and Bonaire Overheidsgebouwen N.V. (BOG, responsible for Bonaire's islandowned buildings, a subsidiary of Bonaire Holding Maatschappij N.V.), announced that they have mutually decided that the proposed Divi Sunset Resort Bonaire project will not continue to be developed.

The proposed multi-use project was to include condominiums and an all-inclusive resort at Playa Lechi, the location of the former Sunset Beach Hotel. Divi Resorts had promised to build there several years ago and erected a huge Quonset hut-shaped tent (above) on the site. The deteriorating tent has become an eyesore (photo above) on the northern hotel row.

Many local residents welcomed the announcement. They want a public beach on the site rather than another resort. More on page 10.



**▶**Because of an accidental error, between 500 to 5,000 liters of oil leaked into Salinja Vlijt and then into the sea on August 20 from the Akkerman auto dealership. It was an unfortunate combination of events. Akkerman was busy with activities on the septic tanks and drainpipes during a tropical downpour. Rainwater subsequently ended up in the oil drain, forcing the oil out into the saliña via Kaya Amsterdam. 

►THE HAGUE - The introduction of a new tax on Bonaire in 2011 will yield \$2 million more than previously estimated, wrote the Dutch Finance Minister Jan Kees de Jager in a letter to Parliament. That's primarily because there are currently 15,700 people registered as living on the island rather than the "more than 11,000," which is the 2001 figure that the previous estimate was based on. In the same letter, the minister wrote that most Bonaireans will have to pay less tax, except for tourists, Pensionados and 60+ seniors.

►THE HAGUE—**Eighteen** laws and regulations relating to the new constitutional relations in the Kingdom were published in the Dutch Government Gazette (Staatscourant), a required step in the reformation of the Dutch Antilles. The decree can



# 10-10-10 / 99% Sure?



Henk Kamp at the RSC/RCN press breakfast on September 1. Announced was the re-naming of the Regional Service Center (RSC) to the Rijksdienst Caribisch Nederland (RCN)-The Dutch Caribbean Public Service.

Recent events are making the October 10, 2010, integration into The Netherlands of the BES Islands and the "country status" for Curaçao and St. Maarten more certain. Queen's Commissioner Henk Kamp told *The Reporter* last week of his concerns that the actions of the new government in Curaçao and the reaction of the Dutch Parliament's Second Chamber may hamper progress towards the breakup and subsequent restructuring of the Dutch Antilles. But developments over the past weekend should lessen his concern.

Between midnight Friday and Saturday night (September 3-4), Curaçao got a new MFK/PS/MAN (political parties) Executive Council, passed the draft constitution for the future "country" of Curaçao and decided to participate in Thursday's Round Table Conference (RTC) on the dismantling of the Netherlands Antilles on 10-10-10.

However, the Curação Council at the same time passed a resolution instructing its delegation to seek agreement to exclude Curação from the Kingdom consensus laws, to include a procedure for their island to become independent and to start a process to change the constitution they just approved by referendum.

In Aruba the members of the Aruba Parliament approved the changes to the Kingdom Charter to permit the breakup of the Dutch Antilles. And in St. Maarten its Island Council approved the last of more than 24 necessary "organic laws."

But in Holland the situation remains murky. Dutch political parties have been trying to form a coalition based on parliamentary arithmetic from the last elections held on June 9. Talks on forming a right leaning minority government collapsed on Friday when the Freedom Party-PVV pulled out. Queen Beatrix is meeting with party leaders this Monday and Tuesday to try to again revive coalition negotiations. The Netherlands has been without a permanent cabinet since the previous government collapsed on February 20.

It remains to be seen whether a majority of the Dutch Second Chamber will vote to amend the Kingdom Charter to allow the breakup and reformation of the Antilles in Tuesday's scheduled debate. The Liberal Democratic Party -VVD, the Party for Freedom -PVV and the Socialist Party -SP, together having 70 of the 150 seats in the Second Chamber, are expected to vote against it. The Christian Union -CU with its five seats, is also considering voting against it.

All this could make for a politically exciting week in The Hague.

While anything is possible, this final RTC can be considered "more of a ceremonial closure," said one delegate, when the final decision on the new arrangements will be signed off by all Kingdom partners.

An ancient Chinese proverb, sometimes referred to as a curse, describes the situation, "May you live in interesting times."  $\blacksquare$  *G.D.*

opposed by some in Bonaire's tourism sector.

The new laws were passed after consultation with stakeholders and the public last year. The legislation is designed to protect the sea and land environment of Bonaire. They formalized the marine ordinances that were in force for many years and added new protections for both land and sea. Additionally, as of January 1, 2011, fees will be charged for all commercial users of the waterfront and Marine Park. The revenues, estimated to bring in between NA f200.000 and NA f300.000 annually, are earmarked for STINAPA, the NGO that currently manages the Bonaire land and sea parks.

The enactment of the law has outraged some resort and dive operators. According to a source in the sector they are being singled out to support STINAPA while other tourism-oriented businesses are not charged. Besides, they say, they already provide significant support to STINAPA by collecting dive-tag fees, providing mooring and facilities for Marine Park boats and more.

In protest of this law, BHG (Bonaire Hospitality Group), BONHATA (Bonaire Hotel and Tourism Association) and CURO, (Council of Underwater Resort Operators), the latter usually a staunch supporter of such initiatives, have voted not to sign an (unrelated-*Ed.*) covenant, initiated by the RSC, called "*Na Un Bonaire Mas Limpi*" (For a Cleaner Bonaire) at this time.

# On The Island Since... October 2003 – Jiri Lausman

have only reluctantly accepted the idea that an article about myself would be written in this series. However, I agreed because I would like to express my opinion concerning the future development of Bonaire, which has been the topic in a large number of my guest editorials and letters to the editor in this paper during the past years.

So...I was born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and I arrived in Holland in 1967 to work on a big project. At the time there was a tremendous shortage of engineers in Holland. I started working for Ballast Nijdam and worked for that company until my retirement. But two years ago

I married late in life. We met in 1977 in Brazil where I was working at the time. My wife is Brazilian; she's much younger than I. In 1978 we moved to Caracas, Venezuela, where our eldest son Robert was born. We have two sons, Robert, 31, Holland; he's one of the best surfers in The Netherlands and he invented and designed some major innovations for surfboards.

We lived in Caracas for seven years and during that period we visited Bonaire for the first time. We stayed at Hotel Bonaire (Sunset Beach). It was very good and it had a beautiful beach. I was impressed and thought it would be ideal to live here: the pure nature, such kind people and the perfect climate. It's never too hot for me!

In 1987 we moved to Aruba where I was the manager for the Americas for Ballast Nijdam. While we lived there I decided to buy land on Bonaire and to build a house here. So, now I'm here – I

live in this house by myself. My wife lives partly in Aruba, partly in Brazil."

He smiles, puts a plate of cheese on the table, offers me a glass of wine and says, "I would like to talk to you about the future development of Bonaire. It's important for everyone on Bonaire and I have always studied all available documents concerning this topic. I am very impressed with the so called Pourier Report, made for the Bestuurscollege in 1992 by a

On The island Since (Continued from page 4) group of experts, led by the Bonaireanborn Miguel Pourier, former governor of the Netherlands Antilles. According to this report, the task of the government is to protect the most important asset of Bonaire – the 52-kilometer-long coral reef. All island policies must be focused on this task and it means: no mass tourism, no new large hotels, limitation of the number of divers and other measures necessary for the preservation of the reef. The principle of the Pourier Report was very simple, as Bonaire doesn't have beaches or minerals, or refineries. It has the coral reef, one of the most beautiful in the world. So, the government of Bonaire must take care of the reef, because it's brittle, fragile and it's all we have. Mind you, this was 18 years ago!

But what happened was that Bonaire's politicians had other ideas about the future of the island. Both main parties thought that large, international hotels must be built in the framework of the development of the island. There have been plans to build two big international hotels, a Divi Hotel at Sunset Beach and a Hilton

Hotel at the Azul Project. Fortunately it didn't happen. Unfortunately, the opinion of the Bonaire politicians and also of the majority of the local people is to build large international hotels. It seems to be that for them the development of the island is construction. Proof of that was shown at a local school exhibition when the children were asked, 'What should be the future development of Bonaire?' They presented paintings and drawings with buildings, large buildings, even on Klein Bonaire.

The Pourier Report has never been integrated into the local society. The politicians and the schools didn't succeed in teaching the people the importance of the coral reef – the main asset of the future of Bonaire. Well, according to the just-published report of the Environmental Commission, established by the *Bestuurscollege* in 1991 in order to advise in environmental questions, the condition of the reef worsened considerably during 2009. It was mainly caused by the building activities along the coast and by the sewage water seeping from septic tanks to the sea

The Pourier Report is mentioned in the introduction to the Strategic Environmental Evaluation of the Land Destination Plan, agreed by the Bestuurscollege in June 2010 and expected to be approved soon. Unfortunately, although this plan also pleas for the protection of the coral reef and the saliñas, it advocates the necessity of development of Bonaire in order to accommodate the growing number of inhabitants which, according to the plan, will reach 25,000 in the coming 10 years. About 3,000 new homes are planned to be built for this purpose and new industrial plants and hotels will be constructed. It is evident that by approving this plan, the Bestuurscollege will in fact declare that the basic principles of the Pourier Report have been definitely thrown overboard. It hurts me, because I want the best for the island and I think the Pourier Report was the best for Bonaire."

Jiri Lausman is a man from the old world. He's a man of great intelligence and willpower. He's a ladies' man – old fashioned style. He is a man who can take care of himself – a rare species - and he's a man who will never be an 'old man'.

Jiri has an excellent memory, but he lives in the present, not in the past.

"All my life I've traveled and I'm still traveling. I love the wilderness in far away countries. Last year I made a long trip through the mountain areas of Alaska, including the harsh Aleutian Islands. In June and July of this year I visited South Korea and the Russian Far East. In Russia I climbed the volcanoes of the vast Kamchatka peninsula with a small group of much younger Australian mountaineers. Kamchatka is larger than Japan; it has 200 volcanoes of which 29 are active. The population is about 380,000. Japan has 127 million. Afterwards I traveled through the Siberian Taiga in an allterrain vehicle with a driver and a guide with a gun, because grizzly bears are abundant in that area! I also found the remains of one of the Gulags – Soviet concentration camps – in the vast Kolyma region, the coldest area of the northern hemisphere." He gets up and shows me some artifacts he found in the Gulag. His house has a collection of paintings, minerals and statues from all over the world. His garden is original 'mondi' - "I left my land the way it was. I only planted two palm trees where construction damaged the original vegetation." He laughs. "Nobody in my neighborhood has a garden like mine!

Let me tell you, in my opinion, the assumption that the island's population will grow in the coming 10 years in a large part by retirees from Holland is not correct. It would be strange if now, after the penshionado advantage is abolished under the new status of Bonaire, the number of retirees moving to Bonaire would increase considerably. And I think for most people the change from Bonaire being a part of the Kingdom to becoming a part of the Netherlands plays no role. Anybody who's lived in The Netherlands knows that the hot, tropical climate of the Antilles is the main reason why the Dutch retirees stay in their own country or move to another European location with a milder climate." He grins. "Some weeks ago it was really very hot for three days and all my neighbors were sighing, saying, 'It's so stifling, the heat is already unbearable! Thus, do not think that the masses of Dutch retirees will inundate Bonaire in the coming years!"

nce again, the breeding season for Bonaire's Lora has already come to an end. Tuesday was a day of mixed feelings for us when the last remaining nest was found empty as the final chick fledged. Now the hard work starts of processing the data and writing a report. Not quite the same thrill and adventure as collecting the information itself and spending every day in the "mondi" amongst the birds. The interesting part about report writing and data analysis is being able to come to some conclusions about the trends we have seen throughout the season, and to see it reflected in the data.

One of the concerns of the team before the beginning of the Lora breeding season was whether the Loras would breed at all as there was a severe lack of rain during Bonaire's "winter."

Despite our concerns, the Loras initiated their breeding like clockwork around the same time as last year. The team even found several new nests this year, and monitored a similar number of nests as in previous years.

The big differences began to appear when the eggs were being laid. Despite monitoring a similar number of nests, there were

far fewer eggs being laid on average than in previous years. This lower

clutch size is an indicator that the adult birds were not able or not willing to invest as

much in their reproductive efforts this year. Long-lived birds such as the Lora need to be in good physical condition in order to reproduce, as it is energetically costly. Loras breed once a year, and will invest six or possibly more months before their chicks are independent. Smaller birds like the Bananaquit live for shorter periods and by contrast will produce several clutches in a year. For a Lora, it's not worth putting its own survival at risk for one breeding attempt when it has the opportunity to continue reproducing for another 30 years. Compared to other parrots, Bonaire's Loras are known to have poor "hatchability," which means that relatively few of the eggs that remain intact at the end of incubation, hatch. This does not include the eggs that have been eaten by rats or cats. Poor hatchability could occur for many reasons, such as inbreeding in the population due to small population size, eggs not being fertilized, or even the conditions inside the nest during incubation. So it was no surprise for us this year when only 63% of the eggs hatched. In other tropical birds an average

Despite Salba Nos Lora's annual campaign to remind people that stealing Loras from nests is illegal, this practice still continues. This year, six chicks were taken from the nests that we were monitoring. The consequences of being caught with an illegal pet Lora are high as this law is beginning to be enforced again. Look out for Salba Nos Lora's beautiful new campaign posters ( at left) for more information, which are due to hit the streets anytime soon!

of 92% of viable eggs hatch.

After an uncertain start to the season, we were delighted to see that 25 chicks made it into the wild population from the nests we

monitored. Hopefully in a few years' time we will see them again making their own nesting attempts!

Flotsam and Jetsam (Continued from page 2) only go into effect four weeks after it has been published in the Gazette. The implementation date of the decree is to be October 10, 2010. But the most important Kingdom Law, the one to amend the Kingdom Charter, wasn't published. Without this law the other laws and regulations, despite being published in the Gazette, cannot go into effect. The debate in the Second Chamber is set for Tuesday, September 7.

- ► Since 2006 Hendrik Wuyts of Scuba Vision and Gerard van Erp have been recording a documentary following the progress of Bonaire towards integration with The Netherlands. There are a number of interviews still to be conducted. The documentary is expected to be available in December, 2010.
- ►St. Maarten and Curação have decided to use a NEW common currency - the Caribbean guilder- beginning in 2012. The existing Netherlands Antilles guilder will be Government. used during the transition period.
- ► Travelers to the US with a passport from US Visa Waiver Program countries (including The Netherlands) will now have to pay to enter the US. ESTA is an "electronic traveling authorization" which all travelers from Visa Waiver Program countries must obtain before embarking on a trip over land or sea to the US. This traveling authorization has been mandatory since January 12, 2009. As of September 8th 2010, the US will charge \$14 per ESTA. One can only apply for this online and via a credit card. No traveling data is required to fill in

The ESTA is valid for a two-year period, or until the relevant passport expires. The website for registration is https:// esta.cbp.dhs.gov.



► According to a government press release, the fishermen's pier near Regatta House on Playa Pabou is getting renovated. The structure was battered by waves from Tropical Storm "Omar" in October 2008 and lost both its walkway and supporting timbers. They will be replaced with a system that will allow the planks to be removed in case of heavy seas as done by many waterfront dive operators.

The Bonaireiaanse Wegenbouw Maatschappij (BWM) company is in charge of the work. Although completion is not expected until mid-October the south portion will be available for use during Regatta.

► InselAir announced the start of Insel's service from Miami to Havana, Cuba, as of Monday, October 4. The flight is scheduled twice weekly at the onset, with the route expected to grow to flights six times a week. InselAir complies with all FAA (Federal Aviation Administration) criteria and has an impeccable track record during its two years of operation in the US. InselAir will also service Charlotte, North Carolina, from Curacao, twice a week as of November 25. The airline flies non-stop from Bonaire to Miami and return each Saturday.



# Save Sunset Beach For All Our People

S unset Beach is up for grabs. Divi Resorts abandoned their plan to build on the site of the old Sunset Beach and the longlease land is back in the hands of the Bonaire government.

Now there is a groundswell of sentiment to make Sunset Beach a recreational area for the people of Bonaire and island visitors as well.

Much of Bonaire's shoreline on the western side of the island is taken up by hotels, mostly owned by people and companies that don't live here. In some cases access to the sea from those hotels has been cut off to people living on the island. Sunset Beach is the last hope for the people of Bonaire to have their own beach in a convenient location.

Think of it - a place to enjoy one of the best beaches on the island, open space with some beautiful old trees – a family place for picnics, barbeques, beach parties, maybe some concession stands, run by local people, selling will negotiate a juicy tax-holiday. food and drinks, and most importantly, no gates shutting Bonaireans out.

It can be done. Klein Bonaire, owned by developers, was saved for the people of Bonaire because of the efforts of locals and contributions from the Dutch Government and The World Wildlife Fund.

Klein Bonaire wasn't the only time Bonaire's people got their way. In the 90s there was a proposal to build a refinery on the upwind side of the island. The people rose up, signed petitions and it was stopped. Sunset Beach can be saved too and this time it won't cost a pile of money since it's already owned by the Island Government. Forget arguments that a new hotel on the site will bring jobs for




Bonaireans. As with other most resorts, workers will come from "third world" countries and management from "first world" countries. Tax income? Any developer worth his salt

Anyway there are plenty of other sites available for hotel development to say nothing of developments that have never been completed. Build there.

Bonaireans need a beach they can call their own. But it will take a LOUD voice from the people to make lawmakers listen and turn away from the blandishments of foreign business interests. An action team is being set up this week.  $\blacksquare$  *L*./*G*. *D*.

### Dr. Eugenie Glark Recieves Bonaire's Lifetime Achievement Award

E ugenie Clark's interest in fish began at the age of nine when her mother took her to visit an aquarium. She became fascinated by what she saw, especially the shark, and soon enough, she got a job there. The fascination and job continued throughout her life. She is now 88, has been married four times, has four children and remains full of energy.

It was most appropriate to give her a Lifetime Achievement Award on top of the scores of other honors Dr. Clark has received.

Eugenie Clark was born on May 4, 1922, to an American father and a Japanese mother. Tragically, her father, Charles Clark, died when she was just a baby, leaving Eugenie with her mother, Yumiko, who remarried when Genie was a child.

Never wavering in her passion, Clark enrolled in Hunter College in New York City, graduating in 1942, then at NYU, earning her master's degree in zoology in 1946 and her Ph.D. in 1950.


The subsequent success of her lab at Cape Haze and the rarity of being a female marine biologist helped expand Clark's career and gave her the nickname, "Shark Lady," which oddly enough predated her experiments on the large fish. By 1965, Dr. Clark had become so well-known that she was the guest of the Crown Prince of Japan, Prince Akihito, to whom she gave a small, trained nurse shark and a portable testing apparatus as a gift.

Dr. Eugenie Clark has been invaluable to the world of science for many reasons. She has greatly contributed to the scientific knowledge of sharks and further contributed scientific research on a variety of fishes. Perhaps most importantly, however, Dr. Clark challenged the stereotypes surrounding women in the scientific community, proving to researchers and the public alike that even small, diminutive women can greatly impact the scientific community.



Controversial Law (Continued from page 3)

Supporters of the new law argue that resorts and dive shops have been getting an almost free ride in the Marine Park and should be made to pay for what they are exploiting.

Some of the fees include:

- Use of the Marine Park for business (diving, snorkeling, windsurfing, sailing, etc...) \$840 per establishment per year;
- Using a mooring buoy, kick, riprap, seawall, (private or commercial) or overhanging structure \$280 per year;
- Using a ladder from shore \$140 per year;

- Using an industrial pier or dock \$560 per year;
- Use of a built or completed beach \$140 per meter per year with a maximum of \$16,760 per year.

No fishing zones are set and, in addition to the marine life already protected, the law extends formal safeguards to Bonaire's plants, trees, animals and reptiles. There are also building guidelines defined to protect the environment. And much more.

# **Body Talk**

#### **OVERFED BUT UNDERNOURISHED?**

There cannot be many people in this world who have never been concerned about their weight. Apart from the weather and money, body weight is probably the most talked about subject on this earth and very few people are really



happy with what they have, hence all those fad diets out there! We all know they work for a while, but soon after stopping, the weight just comes back.

A weight problem is a nutritional problem. To understand your weight problem, it is essential to understand what happens with the food you eat and the process of digestion, absorption, utilization and elimination. Each one of these processes are of extreme importance to the body, but it is usually the first stage – digestion - where most people fail. Digestion simply means your body is not breaking down your food adequately.

Proteins are broken down into amino acids for building and repair, carbohydrates (starches and complex sugars) into simple sugars for fuel, and fats are broken down into fatty acids and glycerol for building, repair and emergency needs. It is important to remember that we have alkaline digestive enzymes in the mouth for carbohydrate and fat digestion; we have acid (pepsin) digestive enzymes in the lower stomach for initial protein digestion; and we have alkaline digestive enzymes in the pancreas and throughout the first part of the small intestinal tract to finish up the job for proteins, starches sugars and fat.

Unfortunately, most of the foods we commonly eat are acid forming, and when our body (including our saliva and blood) becomes acidic, our nutrition becomes coagulating. In other words, our building materials (fats, fuels, minerals and other compounds) start sticking or clumping together. Most people's intestines become impacted with a thick rubber-like substance called mucoid plaque which develops in the gastrointestinal tract, made up of gluten, mucus, proteins and other food by-products that act more like a glue than nutrition.

It is this very same mucoid plaque that blocks the nutritional components of our foods from being adequately absorbed into the body. Because the body is not getting adequate nutrition, it thinks it is being starved and holds onto everything that you eat. Now what goes in to the body, for the most part, must come out. Easier said than done. I have found, in general, most people with a weight problem do not eliminate every day (sometimes only two to three times a week). Whether you have a weight problem or not, you have to eliminate every day, and if you are a meat eater, you should certainly eliminate twice a day.

If we do not eliminate our waste, we build congestion interstitially (around cells) and intracellularly (inside cells), causing further cellular decay and death, making it virtually impossible for the body to perform even the most basic of processes. As we get older, the body also slows down due to cellular weakness. Add inadequate nutrition and elimination to that, and we have a recipe for a health disaster.

Hato-Washington Park/Bonaire -

**S** o it was not really that early as they had the intention to leave, that they left Hato in the direction of the Washington Park. A group of eight youngsters, consisting of Victor, Nanouk, Daniela, Seb, Jamie, Margeaux, Derek and Sarah, and an elderly person had the idea to visit Washington Park and climb Mount Brandaris.

In two pick up trucks they drove the curly road along the coast, heading north. They passed the Goto Lake, and crossed the still sleeping village of Rincon. No time to spoil. The goal was to reach the entrance of the Park more or less on time. It was already getting warmer and warmer and in the Park some members of the group could not resist the dangerous waves of the first beach in the park: Playa Chikitu. On the beach they found the track of what must have been an enormous turtle, creating a nest for some 150 eggs. gel. Mount Brandaris was the target! Around mid day (sic!/jb) they reached Mount Brandaris. It is always fun to climb the highest mountain of the island. Soon he was far ahead of the group and out of sight. Every now and then the figure in the red t-shirt popped up on the horizon, getting smaller and smaller. It took him

magnificent view over the island and the impressive ocean. The group was still half way, sweating and complaining. The saddle was full leather, produced by the famous Brooks factory in England. Most of the time Victor used the lowest gear possible and some moments he even had to carry his bike because the climbing was really too steep. The whole expedition took some two hours and luckily the bike and its rider did not suffer from flat tires because of the slime in the tubes and the linings between the tubes and the tires.

After this sporty event all members of the group jumped in the two trucks





# BONAIRE PARK\*

\*to find it... just look up

September is the month for close and bright planets, Jupiter and Uranus in the evening and Mercury in pre-dawn skies.

Greetings, Sky Park readers. This column was produced before author Jack Horkheimer passed away on August 20<sup>th</sup> but he still wants you to know what's up in the night sky. Read below.


t et out about an U hour before sunrise in mid-September and be sure you have a clear view to the east. Look low in the east just above the horizon for a pinkish light

and that will be Mercury. Mercury will be getting higher and easier to find every morning after the 13th and will be at its best around September 18, 19 and 20. If you look at Mercury through a small telescope you can watch it go through phases just like the **Moon.** 

Mercury is the planet closest to the Sun and goes around the Sun the fastest. This means that Mercury quickly pops in and out of view in the morning and evening sky. It's never there for more than a week or two and it never gets very far from the Sun, which means it's never very high in a dark sky. So you have to get your look at Mercury at just the right

Meanwhile in the evening, look low in the east just after sunset and the king of the planets, bright Jupiter and the second planet out from the Sun after Jupiter, Uranus, will appear very close together. Jupiter now is closer than it has been in the last 47 years and on September 21 will be at its closest, biggest and brightest of this year. Jupiter is the biggest planet, over 88,000 miles wide, that's 11 Earths wide.

Jupiter will rise higher hour after hour until midnight and will be in the sky nearly all night long. This is happening because Jupiter is at **opposition** on the 21st, which means Jupiter is opposite the Earth from the Sun and thus closest to Earth. Our Earth goes around the Sun



Astronomer Anthony Wesley's photos show that one of Jupiter's two dark stripes is gone. It's a phenomenon called South Equatorial Belt Disturbance, and it happens every three to 15 years.

faster than Jupiter and passes Jupiter every 13 months. But because the Earth and Jupiter do not orbit the Sun in perfect circles they are not always the same distance apart when we Earthlings pass by. This year Jupiter is especially close and will not be this close again until 2022. So this means that this September will be the best time to look at Jupiter for many years!

Another special thing to look for as you watch Jupiter is the blue green planet Uranus, which will be especially close to Jupiter around September 19. You will be able to see Uranus above Jupiter with just a pair of binoculars but using a telescope will be even more fun. Uranus will appear to be so close to Jupiter that only one full moon could fit between them.

But there is something else that is special about Jupiter and that is that it looks different from last year. Jupiter usually has two prominent dark bands across its middle that are visible in even a small telescope but one of them has disappeared! So enjoy Mercury in the morning from September 13th through the

20th and Jupiter and Uranus in the evenings. Jack Horkheimer




