

New Island Governor

Janu ary 27th the Dutch Council of Ministers approved the proposal of the Minister of Interior Affairs



and Kingdom Relations, Mrs. mr. drs. J.W.E. Spies, to appoint Mrs. Lydia.A. Emerencia, PhD) (photo) as the new Island Governor of Bonaire. She will be sworn in by RCN head, Wilbert Stolte, in the Passangrahan, on March 1st, 2012.

Dr. Emerencia, born in 1954 in Aruba, is of Bonairean descent. Her father was born in Bonaire. She has various family members living on the island. She knows Bonaire well and has been here on many occasions. She has two children.

Mrs. Emerencia has many years of experience in education. In 2010 she became the director of the Center for Research and Development at the University of Aruba. Before that she was the Rector of the same university. She has two academic degrees: a Ph.D. from the Utrechtse School voor Bestuur en Organisatie, University of Utrecht (UU), and a PhD, AbD. from the Katholieke Universiteit of Nijmegen. She succeeds mr. dr. Glenn A.E. Thodé who as of January 1^{st,} took over as the rector of the University of Aruba.

Under a new procedure several persons had applied for the position for the island governor. A selection was made from the received applications and conversations were held with the short-listed candidates that met the requirements. The trust commission that was installed by the Island Council gave a report of its findings. A central government representative made recommendations to the minister of BZK (Interior Affairs and Kingdom Relations). The appointment of the island governor takes place by royal decree. The island governor is appointed for a term of six years.

▶ Bonaire's Commissioner of Education and Culture, Silvana Serfilia, regretted that the New Year started without the traditional performances of a "Maskarada" group at the residence of the Governor and in the barios.

"Unfortunately, the group that was to organize this had called it off at the last moment," she said at the opening of the first poetry evening

"Luna Yen" (Full Moon) of 2012. The Government cannot be blamed for the Maskarada events not going through. On the contrary, she was one of the commissioners who had actually made more financial means available to organize Maskarada.

Serfilia promised that Maskarada will not only take place at the turn of the year but also during other appropriate times.

The commissioner wants stories, riddles, poems, songs or paintings about the Maskarada phenomenon. Submit them to the Culture Department, SKAL. In fact Serfilia expressed her concern about the future of Maskarada in the form of her own poem that she presented.

▶ The Bonaire Executive Council wants Bonaire's government-owned companies to **show more initiative,** especially in the fields that are of fundamental importance for the local economy. Commissioner Burney el Hage (UPM) said that Flamingo Airport is sound asleep, even though at least 60% of all economic activities for the island begin and

El Hage hopes to liven up things by appointing new Supervisory Boards at various government companies. He wants to see more from them in the first quarter.

"The airport is fast asleep," said El Hage, "while the economy of the island begins there. We will miss opportunities if we don't wake up the airport." The Executive Council has appointed a new board at Bonaire International Airport and a new board will also be appointed at Telbo to shake things up there too. The Executive Council thinks Telbo should increase its advertising and adopt a more commercial attitude.

El Hage added that it annoys him considerably that the property of Sunset Beach at Playa Lechi is still undeveloped. The commissioner noted that at least 14 companies had shown an interest and urged Bonaire Government Buildings N.V. to speed things up and advise the Executive Council on the matter as soon as possible.

►Willem Cicilia (photo) will replace Norwin Carolus as Bonaire's Island Secretary. He is currently acting secretary. Carolus, who was appointed on a temporary basis, will be asked to stay on another month for a smooth transition.

▶ Based on the discussions at a recent Island Council meeting, Bonaire's roads are in bad shape and unlikely to get much

better this year. Why? Around the turn of the century

the UPB-led Bonaire Government diverted money from its Road Maintenance Fund to the Bonaire In-



ternational Airport (BIA), to expand and repair the airport. The local government borrowed NAf 8 million from the Antilles Central Bank to do this. They have been paying \$45,000 per month to pay off the loan. It still has three years to go.

The airport extension made Bonaire a KLM hub and reversed an economic downturn. But Bonaire's roads took a turn for the worse and it looks like things will get worse before they get better. That's because the motor vehicle license tax, previously used for road maintenance, goes to pay off the loan. (Incidentally, 2012 license tags are still not available as this

While the Netherlands central government agreed to take over many island debts as part of the 10-10-10 integration with Holland the airport loan and road maintenance was excluded.

The bad roads are costing drivers lots of money for repairs because of unnecessary damage to their vehicles. At the Island Council meeting Commissioner James Kroon promised to work on this problem.

▶ Recently **the tax service**, *Belastingdienst* Caribisch Nederland, sent reminders to tax debtors who have not, or not completely complied with their tax obligations in 2011. If you received a reminder and are of the opinion that this is not correct or was sent in error, please contact the Belastingdienst (Tax Service) immediately.

▶Prices in the Caribbean Netherlands rose dramatically in 2011 over the previous year. St. Eustatius recorded the highest inflation rate- 9.9%. The provisional inflation rate for Bonaire was 5.4%. For comparison's sake consider that the Dutch inflation rate over the same period was 2.3%.

Prices for food, soft drinks and transport contributed the most to inflation on Bonaire. Food prices were up 7.8% in 2011 from 2010, (Continued on page 13) This Week's Stories

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BEWARE OF THE CAMEL NOSE

Dear Editor:

The actual proposal of the Government of Bonaire to allow the construction of piers for other than the specified in the recently approved zoning plan reminds me of an old Arabian proverb: "If the camel once gets his nose in the tent, his body will soon follow."

The seriousness of this issue is something that you have to take into account if you want to imagine what the rest of your life will look like, whether you live here or are a visitor to Bonaire. If it's accepted, the Government proposal will be devastating for nature conservation and for the future of the island.

This law proposal will take the entire "conservation" effort out of the current law. More than 50 years of advanced environ-

mental legislation will go down the drain.

Developers will be allowed to build things in the Marine Park for recreation/tourism/bar and restaurant purposes. Recreation is a broad word and we don't know exactly what else can come. On the new piers, developers will be allowed to build structures up to a maximum of 5 meters high with a maximum size of 50 m². This is almost a standard 2-story building resting on a pier.

The maximum length of a pier can be 40 meters, all the way to the drop off on most of the island. The Government can allow construction up to a size of 250 m² with a height of max 5 meters. This is the equivalent of 3 to 4 small 2-story apartments!!..... in the water!!!!..... on top of a pier!!!

They (the Government) can allow piers larger than this (without describing for what purpose or in which instances), so you can expect requests to build larger piers with just God knows which structure on top or what for

Finally, the Government can deny a request for a permit if they are of the OPIN-ION that what will be built is damaging to the coral reef. So, no independent expert Environmental Impact Assessment will be required. Just the "OPINION" (expert?) of the Government is enough to decide if a proposal is damaging or not and therefore allow it or not......Good-bye science.

This is serious business if passed. It is not the five piers that they have proposed now. The problem is the 25 or more requests that they have denied in the past years, with good criteria and following the guidelines and laws that they themselves approved. Those are the ones that I'm afraid of. ALL of them will come back and ask for a permit

and more will follow......and then, the rest of the camel will be in the tent and it will be too late. We will walk our beautiful boulevard looking at the backside of restaurant kitchens, sundecks, 250 m² 2-story buildings and more. Good-bye horizon.

You can help to stop this proposal and keep Bonaire in the forefront of coral reef conservation where it always was. We have until February 2, 2012, to give our comments and object the proposal. You can log in at http://www.bonaireweb.com/ zoning/ and read more and download an objection letter. Be sure to clearly state what your interest is in this subject. Feel free to add or modify the letter as you wish. Print it, sign it and bring it to the DROB office on Kaya Amsterdam. If you cannot personally bring it, sign it and send it to me (marinepark@stinapa.org). I will print it and bring it for you. Be sure to bring two copies and make them sign one as proof of receipt. Let the Government hear your opinion and make your opinion count. BEWARE OF THE CAMEL NOSE.....Bonaire, its peo-

Last week the Holland-America line cruise ship *Noordam* considered bypassing its planned port call to Bonaire. Why? A story in a Dutch newspaper said Bonaire was in the throes of a Dengue fever epidemic.

After frantic communication, the Captain was persuaded that the story was a fabrication, perhaps concocted by principals in a Dutch company whose multimillion dollar proposal to "make Bonaire Dengue free" was rejected in favor of an alternate approach.

Once in port the ship was visited by island officials to further discuss the matter. If the ship hadn't docked the economic impact to the taxis, shopkeepers and tour operators would have been significant. \blacksquare *G.D.*

he reason I came to ■ Bonaire was mostly because of the diving. I fell for Bonaire the way it was. In February 1996 I came here for a dive vacation. I was 28 years old and I thought Bonaire was beautiful, just great and a place I would love then I became a dive instructor. to be. In Holland I was working as a photographer for photo shops, mostly working indoors, but after I'd been here I wanted to become a dive instructor. I loved the diving and being out in the water. I went back to arrange everything and then I came here with hardly any luggage - 'a jockey and a toothbrush!

In those days, the Dutch who came to live here needed a permit and because I wasn't yet a dive instructor I couldn't get a job at a dive shop. So I started working as a cook at Marcel Nahr's Rendez-Vous restaurant. I'd worked as a chef in Switzerland for two years and in Holland as well, all before I went to the school for professional photography. That's why Marcel employed me and for me

it was a reasonable, temporary alternative. I worked only in the evenings and during the daytime I went diving. At Dive Inn I got my dive masters certificate and shortly after passed PADI's instructor development course, and

I resigned at Rendez-Vous to be in a better position to be hired as a dive instructor. I got an offer from Aruba, worked there for three months, then came back to Bonaire. Aruba was a good experience.

I started as a dive instructor at Lion's Dive – now Buddy Dive. However, as I am a passionate photographer I wanted to combine the two things. By the end of 1998 I was working at Sand Dollar Dive and Photo as a photo instructor, teaching underwater photography to tourists. Underwater photography is different. You need to have good diving skills as well as be a reasonable photographer. And there's the fact that you're floating in the water. It's always close-up photography

so you have to be right on your subject because you're taking photos through liquid instead of through air - which means a decline of color, definition and contrast. And you have to consider floating dirt particles. You must have knowledge of marine life and a trained eye as well because you have to approach your subject from a very close distance which can be very difficult. But that's what I like about my job – to share my knowledge and passion with other people.

Around the same time, 1999, I met Annet at a party at the

"In Holland I was working for a publisher, Hebri," Annet says. "where they made wall maps and an atlas of all the six Dutch Antilles islands. Web and Sunbelt still have one of Bonaire on their walls. I'd been working on this project, then my boss said, 'You know what, you should see the area!' and he bought me a ticket! I was here for four weeks, and two days before I left I met Tim.

Those last two days we spent together. I thought he was super cute. At the time there was a restaurant in town across from Exito, called 'De Tuin' - now Will's Grill. De Tuin was also the only internet café in town at the time. I always saw a yellow motorbike parked in front of it. What an ugly thing it was! Well, at the beach party Tim said, 'I'll take you home!' and before I knew it I was sitting on the back of that ugly yellow motorbike! Ha! ha!

we stayed in touch by mail and telephone, and three months later I came to Bonaire once again. Five months later Tim came to Amsterdam and then I decided to move to Bonaire. I had to leave my house anyway as it was going to be renovated, so I thought I'll stay for a year on Bonaire and let's see how it goes.... I'm still here!" Tim and Annet are very good together. There's a lot of respect and love between them. They're also hardworking, down-

"We immediately moved in together," *Tim says*, "although by that time we'd known each other for a year, but physically we'd only spent one month together. It was a plunge into the deep, or - a shot at happiness. It turned out to be the second one. It all worked out and we got married in 2007."

"I wasn't nervous about it," *Annet says*. "It felt good, but I thought if it doesn't work out I'll go back. I came with just a few things. I didn't bring anything with me and now we're loaded with stuff! I started working at the Plaza, then Jibe City, after that Rent-O-Fun, then for Bonaire Partners and later on Sunbelt. In November 2011 I came to work with Tim." *Tim smiles at Annet and says*, "I do want to mention that throughout all those years you've always helped me in my business."

"Thank you. That's sweet!" *Annet laughs*.

"In November '99," *Tim says*, "the waves of hurricane Lenny came and they destroyed the Green Parrot and the photo shop of Sand Dollar Dive and Photo. Because there were no more facilities I resigned and again I became a dive instructor, this time at Capt. Don's Habitat.

To me diving causes moments of intense and complete happiness. Also, it's a privilege that you are able to do it because 100 years ago it wasn't possible. The fact that you can go down and witness the wonders of the underwater world, the beauty of it all and.... with a huge exclamation mark –

the photography - which gives it an extra dimension.

To me photography is a passion. The combination of technique and working with people: that's what I like best about it—and - in the end -the pursuit for the perfect image. It's an endless search and sometimes you come very close. That's the passion and I am ever so lucky that it is also my job.

I always wanted my own business and during my work at Capt. Don's as a dive instructor I missed photography terribly. Diving without a camera is excruciating. You're always 'obsessed' with images. It's like a non-stop process in your mind. You get up with it and you go to bed with it. The urge to create an image becomes a handicap when you don't have a camera with you.

The reason I started my own business is that I created my own market at a time when there wasn't one for photographers on Bonaire. What happened at that time the end of the 90s and the beginning of 2000 - is that most resorts had their own photo shop with underwater photo instructors. Then the economy dropped and at the same time analog film photography changed to digital, and I guess that was the reason for many photo shops to close. Nevertheless, there was a growing market for instructors to teach digital photography because few people understood precisely how it worked. For me, the transition to digital wasn't too hard as I know what photography is about. I started with Fish Eye Photo on the property of the old Den Laman restaurant, to teach people about digital photography.

It went very well and for a period of time

I was the only photo shop where people could get instructions, lessons and digital underwater photography. That was how I began. Then I started with wedding photography, real estate and air photography, products and portraits. Now we are also selling and renting cameras, we do printing, we still teach, all kinds of stuff.

I began in 2002, so this year we'll celebrate 10 years! Of course there's more competition nowadays. The under water activities have somewhat declined, but on land I'm doing more and more projects. One moment I'm under water, the next moment I'm shooting a million dollar villa and then I'm up in the air. Those are things I couldn't do in Holland.

Really, what keeps me here is the diver-

sity: the job I am doing, the diving, the beauty of nature and the outdoor life style. Bonaire 'happened' to us and we've built our home here. The island has changed in many, many ways and a lot has been destroyed for the sake of the economy. I dearly wish we could still change and go for quality and eco tourism. I would love to see this island be unique in the world, with clean energy, limited construction and

quality tourism. I hope with all my heart that we will still be able to take that turn."

However, with proper cleaning, the lionfish meat is excellent in taste and texture, and any that make it to the table means "they are no longer a threat on the reefs." of the year 2012. The location was a part of the Caribbean Sea leeward of Karel's Bar. The Captain's meeting was around 10 am at Dive Friends' Yellow Submarine location. As the photograph shows, some hundred volunteers contributed to this environmentally friendly happening. (Count the faces. I stopped at the fourth one/jb.) After a quick shower and a little nap the volunteers enjoyed a pot luck barbecue. No fish on the grill.

Loads and loads of divers disappeared into the waters around Karel's Bar to collect dust and debris and all other varieties of pollution. Other volunteers were waiting on the boulevard, ready to collect the bags containing, after counting, 1,085 glass bottles, 281 plastic cups, plates, spoons, forks and so on, 133 aluminum beverage cans, over a hundred fishing lines, two cell phones with a still functioning sim-card, computer equipment and a lot more.

During this clean up dive attention was also paid to the Fishing Line Project, organ-

ized by the STCB (Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire), in partnership with DCNA (Dutch Caribbean Nature Alliance).

Once I had the "pleasure" to go down south with STCB's Mabel Nava. The goal was to go underwater and recover the remains of a turtle which died because it was trapped in parts of fishing line and a fishing net. The unfortunate creature just choked and passed away. We tried to collect all the parts of the animal and its shell for a reconstruction, but as we all know, dead is dead. A dead end and not a single way to return. So visit the website: bonaireturtles.org and get informed by Sue Willis from the Fishing Line Project. Gloves and knives are forbidden in the underwater world around Bonaire, but a pair of pliers to cut the fishing lines is more than welcome! Thank you, volunteers! Thank you, employees and volunteers of Dive Friends of Bonaire. Let's add a pair of pliers to our equipment! \blacksquare Jan Brouwer



of weeks ago when he and Sean Sutherland my job interesting and worthwhile: to set were performing a classical piano concert up a project, to build something up and to at Plaza Resort. The concert moved me to work on something that would last for a tears and I felt immensely grateful to both longer period of time and, last but not pianists. As Sean was leaving the island I least, great colleagues to join you in that. made an appointment with Christiaan for an interview. This is his story.

My piano teacher, Sanja Milohanic, who had been teaching me for four years, was Croatian, and sometime during that devastating war she felt she should go back to be with her people. I was 13 and I remember her looking at me, saying, 'But what will happen to you? You are ready for the conservatory...

I thought 'Jeez, am I that good?' However, I'd just started high school and I was feeling great, didn't want to give it up really and so I thought, 'I'll do something with it later.' Sanja stayed and she went on teaching me until I was 19. Then I went to study medicine, but as I wasn't awarded a place to study in Holland, I went to Belgium the first year. Somehow I thought, 'It's done with the piano...' I didn't see how I could possibly combine it with my studies, but I did find a piano to play. The second year of my studies I moved to Amsterdam. In 2004 I graduated as a general practitioner. I did promotion research, then I continued my studies to become a pediatrician.

In Amsterdam I was taught what it means to get the sound out of the piano as it is really a percussion instrument. I also wanted to play with others and that's what I did in the Dutch Student Orchestra with a friend who played the cello, and duos and trios with the cello and the violin. During my studies I considered playing the piano as a hobby, but it was also something I couldn't live without.

In 2008 I went to work for a year at the St. Elizabeth Hospital on Curacao. I couldn't play the piano and I let it go for the time being. I did jazz dance and also I took painting lessons with Astrid van Dorp at her Art2gether atelier, and somehow the experience was like playing music. Once a month, when she had an open day, I played the piano – highlights! The year in Curacao was part of my education to become a pediatrician. Then I went back to Amsterdam, to the OLVG hospital and the AMC hospital. In the meantime my aunt had given me my grandmother's grand piano. I lived in a minuscule apartment, but it added a completely different dimension to the playing as a grand piano is an instrument with more versatility.

But all in all, from 2007 until 2011, music has not been my mayor interest. After studying for of four and a half years I bepediatrician... because I find the development from a baby into an adult fascinating and beautiful, and health wise there are so many very interesting aspects that come with it.

September 26th, 2011, I came to Bonaire. In March 2011 I received an e-mail from the San Francisco Hospital on Bonaire saying they were looking for a pediatrician. I responded and gave them my point

I 'met' Christiaan van Woerden a couple of view about what I thought would make

During the time I was working on Curacao three years ago, I was on Bonaire for only one weekend, and then it was very special... because what I was looking for at that time was quietness and authenticity. On Curacao I got to know the hustle and bustle of life on a vivacious Caribbean island; Bonaire was a chance to start something new. However, I didn't think it would go through and my ideas about Bonaire were quite uninformed. I thought I could never play the piano here or paint. The only thing I expected was I would have a great time just working." He *laughs.* "Isn't it a shame to think like that! How ignorant!

Well, I'd just started to work and it's quite funny that I was able to bring my own piano for just the six months that I'm here. I am the first pediatrician to join this project called 'Specialist Basic Care for Bonaire' which has been set up for a period of five years by the Ministry of VWS (Health, Welfare and Sports). In 2011 the structure of the hospital was changed. Family doctors are no longer working at the hospital. Specialists from this region or from Holland are now responsible for the hospital. A group of nurses came as well, each with their own expertise. Plus other highly trained professionals like someone who's a specialist in hygiene or safety management for example. I am posted abroad by Holland and I work on Bonaire. My responsible medical person on Bonaire is Theo Braeken (the medical manager of the hospital) and the board and its chairman, Dr. Giovanni Frans. Every fortnight we discuss with Theo how it's going and what else can be done. There is fantastic cooperation and appreciation for each other amongst the board and the special-

I work at the polyclinic and I see the problems children have here. The first thing to do together with the board of Fundashon Mariadal is to see what we can do about it, and then when we get help from Holland it all comes together. This is what the project is about. It is very important for us to have the same quality of communication with Holland that we have with the board of Fundashon Mariadal. My colleague, Mechelien Rövekamp, (another pediatrician), and I have the feeling – even after the short time we've been here – that now we know what is important and necessary to introduce and set up on Bonaire. So together with management we are busy developing a plan to make it happen. I will be leaving in March, but Mechelien will came a pediatrician on August 10, 2011. A remain with my successor who will be here to bring the different people and cultures for one year, and hopefully, because of this continuity, they can work out the plan we have started.

> And then there is this other project. Frouwkje Smit, a Dutch community artist, came up with this idea for a project in which an old classical piano connects the original and the new residents of Bonaire. The piano travels all over the island and has a camera mounted on it. The piano

itself is also the camera man. It is played by me (a new resident) and like a 'Pied Piper of Hamelin' it connects historical places and causes interactions and confrontations, temptations and connections between the original and new residents. The end result is a road movie which first will be shown at different locations on Bonaire. then after that on the other islands of the Kingdom. The end destination will be Holland. The whole intention of this project is closer together.

The first time was a try-out in all tranquility at the salt flats with Gabriel and Radjiv who lifted the piano from the pickup truck together with nephrologists, Professor Nubé and his wife Muriël Grooteman, and Jessica de Vocht (internal medicine and infectiology) who brought the beers! Then we were at a Christmas concert at the hospital chapel along with six

people from Fundashon Mariadal. Then one day later we played on the boulevard.

People who meet the piano start rapping, playing the quarto, the tambu or start singing spontaneously. The other day I was in Rincon without the piano and at Kos Bon So they were in the middle of a reggae jam session. When they saw me they looked up and said, 'Hey swa! Where is your piano?'

And amongst other things - this is why I came here! It's been the first time in my life that I have been able to do so much in such a short period of time – professionally as well as with the piano." Story & photos by Greta Kooistra

TOO TIRED TO ENJOY LIFE, MADAM?

t is like bumping into an old friend and finding out they are doing great! That was the sentiment yesterday when "Jklynn," Bonaire's nesting female hawksbill, reappeared on the map after 24 straight days with no signals from her satellite transmitter.

Jklynn is currently in the coastal waters of southwestern Dominican Republic at Jaragua National Park. Judging by an average speed of travel during her migration we can assume Jklynn arrived there around the 21st of December, traveling a net distance of 720 km (448 mi) in approximately 13 days. Because Jklynn's current location is consistent with her heading from the time she left Bonaire and because she has most likely been there for a few weeks we are fairly confident this is her home foraging ground. Parrot Watch Update

here's so much happening for the parrot team right now! This unfortunately has meant that I just haven't had a moment to sit still and therefore write about what we or indeed the parrots and parakeets are up to. We'll have a very quick catch up now and then hopefully soon, Dear Reader, another tale of parrot adventures will follow....

Both the parrots (Loras) and the parakeets (Prikichis) are now getting close to release and Echo's vet Jon wants each individual to leave his care in the very best condition. So each and every parakeet has just had a health check and a dose of anti-parasite formula dabbed on each armpit. With nearly 50 Prikichis still waiting for release this was quite a procedure with four people assisting Jon: one person catching the jet-fighter-fast Prikichis in a proper parrot catching net, another did the dabbing of the dose, a third was note taking and the fourth redistributed the checked individual into a separate aviary. It almost goes without saying that all the birds were in fine fettle thanks to Jon's dedicated care and the support of the wonderful volunteers who help him

There's little to report on the Loras as they are also all fine. Two new birds arrived on New Years Eve (which had until that moment been a day off for Jon). And yet another arrived after having been caught in Rincon. All three had been illegal pets and the first two were actually confiscated by the police. This most recent addition was an escapee, but the people who caught him noticed he had a foot problem. Having dropped everything he was doing Jon inspected the bird and removed what appears to have been hair (though I still don't believe it) that was wrapped tightly around a toe. The cut into the toe was very bad and it may not recover.

I've just realized we've been so busy that we haven't had a chance to name these three birds. What a terrible situation this is! Anyway the poor little devil was very hungry and thirsty and after being given some fluids he gulped water and food. He's a charming young Lora and is now receiving a twice daily potion of goodness from Jon and doing very well.

The reason we have been so busy and why now at 6am I am going to have to stop and get on with other jobs is because we are moving the project and all the parrots to a dream location. In a foolish effort to save pennies for the parrots the parrot team have become carpenters and we've not only built a great big release aviary, we've made shutters, doors and even door frames for our new abode. Dianne, our star volunteer from Texas who was here in the crazy first day of the rescue, is back. She was lured in by the prospect of getting to see a release. Little did she

know she'd have to help build the aviary and fix the house where she'll stay before even seeing a parrot. It's been an incredible few weeks and indeed the team are as good as exhausted. 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
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The Marines and Army Have Landed

ast week four platoons from the Dutch Marines ✓ and Army did some exceptional tasks on the island. They helped the Pelikaan school with transport of their new donated blackboards. They painted the buildings at Slagbaai, cleaned the yards and brought all garbage to the landfill, spruced up the de Bonairiaan restaurant of the Stichting Project, the building of the Red Cross, the buildings of the Krusada rehab center, When we caught up to them they were cleaning and painting the grounds and buildings of the SGB high school. For these projects the personnel of the Marines and the Army worked together to deliver uncountable hours of manpower. They also paid for most of the supplies to make this happen (paint etc). Local contractors, especially INPO, helped out with their Bobcat loader and other heavy equipment, donated help or their assets to make their good work a success.

There was significant interaction with students and school staff as well during the week. About 100 "spike sticks" were fabricated in the school shop and groups of students and soldiers policed the grounds spearing paper and trash. At first there was some grumbling about the job, but at the end a team spirit and pride in the improved appearance of the area totally reversed the mood.

All these community projects are handpicked by the Veterans Foundation of Bonaire. They suggest these projects to the military staff on Curacao.

► The Foundation for Rehabilitation

(Stichting Reclassering Caribisch Nederland - SRCN) is starting the use of GPS anklets for monitoring suspects and offenders on probation. This modern electronic means of control

means of control started on January 16, 2012, in Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba. The new instrument will help the SRCN reduce the risks for victims and society. The GPS bracelet has been used for several years for the probation supervision by the probation office in the Netherlands.



Winfred wanted people to understand and enjoy the mythology of Bonaire not be afraid of it. It is not

black magic, not voodoo. It is the stories of Boynay, the mythological first Bonairean, and the stories of Uncle Louis that are most prominent in his mythology paintings.

But his work had more direct influence as well. Following his first snorkel trip on Klein Bonaire in 1996 he created the Save Klein Bonaire poster design which was a key in getting the recognition needed to get

the small island protected from development.

"I have no goal when I start a painting. I just take the colors and play with them on canvas. Then I look a long time at what I did and discover new forms and new color combinations; then I follow my feelings." This is all normal, spontaneous and simple. Not having to be afraid of the forms – just free giving of the forms.

Winfred was born deaf in Aruba. His father was a Bonairean customs worker and his mother was from Aruba. At the age of 4 he went to St Michael's School for the Deaf in The Netherlands. At St Michael's there was an enormous gold angel on top of the tower, and two large, powerful, gold lions on balls flanked the gate. He watched that angel every day and understood her mystical power. He grew up as a humble Bonairean with the richness of Europe all around him...

There he learned to read, write, and lip-read. He began the laborious task of learning to speak – which he mastered after years of study. Winfred trained to become a graphic designer. His first job was the solitary work of a typesetter for a local newspaper. The work was too lonely so he next tried working for a zoo, taking care of feeding the animals.

At 17 Winfred came back to Bonaire after a short stay in Aruba. He took over his father's old family home in Antriol and went to work for Capt. Don's Habitat where he learned to love gardening. He was a friendly, humorous man who was most humble about his artistic gift.

Winfred Dania's paintings hang in museums in the Antilles and in The Netherlands. His artwork is owned by collectors throughout the world, and many Bonaireans proudly display their own "Danias" in their homes.

Pet of the Week Did You Know...

hat corals and their symbiotic algae must protect themselves from sunburns?

In the last issue I wrote about an adaptation that some deep corals have in low-light conditions. Now I



will describe some adaptations that both corals and their symbiotic algae have developed to deal with high-light conditions.

It's truly amazing at how intricate living organisms are, especially those living in a mutualistic symbiosis. Many coral species thrive in shallow waters. However, life in the tropics can be harsh and at times high-light conditions damage both coral and algae tissues. Remember the pigment granules that I wrote about in the last issue? Well, shallow corals also have pigments, but instead of transforming the wavelengths, these pigments absorb and reflect much of the damaging light wavelengths (UVAs).


Here's where it gets really interesting. The symbiotic algae, zooxanthellae, also are thought to produce sunscreen (termed MAAs) that block the damaging light wavelengths (UVBs) that

the coral's pigment don't! Together, the coral and its symbiotic algae effectively avoid damaging UV rays. Caren Eckrich

ost reef-building corals have a symbiotic relationship with photosynthetic algae, called zooxanthellae ("zo-ah-zan-THELLee"), which live in their gastrodermis (disgestive cell) tissue. The zooxanthellae, like all plants, convert sunlight, carbon dioxide, and water into oxygen and carbohydrates that feed the coral polyps and help them produce reef-building calcium carbonate. In return, the corals provide the zooxanthellae with protection and the compounds they need for photosynthesis. Pigments in zooxanthellae also give corals their beautiful orange, red, purple, and yellow colors. Maricopa Community College / G.D.





LET ORION AND VENUS BE YOUR GUIDE

A lmost everyone's favorite constellation of winter has to be Orion the hunter simply because it's so huge, so bright and so easy to identify. But did you know that you can use the stars of Orion to find Taurus, the giant bull of the heavens, plus Orion's two hunting dogs and a crouching rabbit named Lepus?

Plus we have two dazzlingly bright planets in the western sky after sunset and a rare chance to use Venus to help you spot the giant planet Uranus.


On any night over the next few weeks between 8 and 10 pm look due south

where you'll see three bright stars evenly spaced and lined up in a row. They make up the fabled belt of Orion the hunter. And directly above them you will see two other bright stars, which mark Orion's shoulders and below the belt two more bright stars which mark his knees.

Now if we shoot an arrow in either direction through Orion's belt we can find several wonderful cosmic objects. For instance if we shoot an arrow up to Orion's right our arrow will land almost smack dab on a reddish orange star named Aldebaran, which is the fierce red eye of Taurus the bull. But if you have really dark skies and extend that arrow a little bit further you will see a tiny dim cluster of stars riding on Taurus' shoulder, the cluster of stars called The Seven Sisters, The Pleiades.

Next shoot an arrow through Orion's belt in the opposite direction and it will land smack dab on the brightest star we can see in the night sky, Sirius. It marks the eye of one of Orion's two dogs, Canis Major which in Latin means the big dog. And if you use your imagination and draw lines between some of these stars you can come up with a pretty good stick figure of a

But Orion also has a smaller canine companion named **Canis Minor** and to find it, well, is a bit trickier. Take Bellatrix, one of



telgeuse, then extend that line to the east and while it won't run smack dab into Canis Minor it will come very close to the bright star **Procyon** which marks his eye. It too is very bright although not as bright as Sirius.

So we have now used the belt of Orion to find Orion's big dog and his two shoulder stars to find Orion's little dog. But one of our favorite constellations near Orion is a rabbit, which Orion's two dogs have probably been hunting for the past few thousand years. His name is Lepus the hare. And he's directly underneath Orion's feet, perhaps hiding in a cosmic bush Orion is standing in: smart Lepus, not so smart Orion.

And what about those planets we mentioned earlier? Well you can hardly miss Venus and Jupiter in the western sky. Venus is the lower and brighter of the two planets and is our evening star. You can see Venus even before sunset and if you know where to look you can even see it in broad daylight with your naked eye. Venus and Jupiter are still getting closer each night and early in March they'll be super close.

But next week on February 9 Venus will be even closer to another planet that is usually a lot harder to spot than Jupiter. On the evening of February 9 Venus will be less than a half degree away from Uranus. You couldn't even fit one full **Moon** between them, they'll be so close. You'll have to use binoculars to see this. ■ Dean Regas & James Albury


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
