Bonaire to Vote in Dutch Parliamentary Elections

Prime Minister Mark Rutte tendered the resignation of his cabinet to Queen Beatrix on Monday afternoon, 26 April, following the collapse of talks aimed at restoring order to government finances.


Party for Freedom (PVV) leader Geert Wilders pulled out of the negotiations earlier, saying the impact of the spending cuts "ordered by Brussels" was too great. The decision meant the minority cabinet of People's Party for Freedom and Democracy (VVD) and Christian Democrat (CDA) no longer has enough support in the Dutch Parliament, making parliamentary elections inevitable.

The Dutch Second Chamber elections will take place on September 12, 2012. Bonaire, St. **Eustatius and Saba will take** part in the elections for the first time since they became part of The Netherlands on October 10, 2010. Member of the Second Chamber Ortega-Martijn asked Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations Liesbeth Spies whether she had taken note of the recent concerns expressed by the Governors of Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba about the costs of organizing the elections on the islands. On September 20 the first meeting of the newly elected Second Chamber will take place. Candidate lists must be in by July 31. New political parties have until June 18 to register their name at the Voting Council. We expect local parties may align with one or more of the Dutch parties for this election.

didacy in the Christian Democrat (CDA) party's contest to find a new leader ahead of the general election of September 12. Candidates may register until May 4. A selection committee will be announcing the candidates for the election on May 7.

Wilders is controversial. He lives in a government safe house fitted with a panic room and is guarded round the clock, travels by bulletproof car and rarely talks with journalists — choosing instead to funnel messages directly to supporters via Twitter and a personal blog.

But when Geert Wilders dubbed "Mozart" for his bleached-blond bouffant hair brought down the Dutch government last week in an extraordinary show of force by Europe's resurgent far right, it wasn't over his high-profile rhetorical war on Islam. Instead, the clash was over his emphasis on another belief that he and his Freedom Party now see as almost equally dangerous: an integrated Europe. In the Netherlands, Wilders, 48, rose from political obscurity during the past decade to become one of the most influential farright politicians in Europe.

Wilders — who spent time in his youth on an Israeli kibbutz — is pro-Israel and staunchly anti-Islam. Describing Islam as a religion of violence and hate that wants to "enslave" the West, he has called for the closure of Muslim schools, made a highprofile anti-Muslim film and wants forced registration of all Dutch citizens holding two passports. - Michael Birnbaum and Marit Van Kooij

THE HAGUE—

The Dutch Ministry of Education, Culture and Science (OCW) is making an additional \$6,265,890 available in the next four years so schools in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba can pay incentives to attract teachers from abroad.

Labor conditions on the islands

are unattractive for teachers from The Netherlands. Teachers are faced with the cost of moving, and the move has an adverse effect on their pension build-up. **Education Minister Van Bijsterveldt-Vliegenthart** is willing to provide compensation for travel and moving costs, pension premium, old age pension AOW, study debt and double living expenses.

For travel and moving costs, the Minister suggests a one-time contribution of \$2,070 per teacher. Teachers will receive compensation of \$552 per month to cover their ABP pension premium and \$414 per month to continue the build-up of their AOW (retirement) in The Netherlands. Younger teachers who have just completed their studies also can receive a monthly contribution of \$345 to pay off their study debt, and if they have to pay a mortgage on their house in The Netherlands they may further receive a contribution of \$690 per month to cover their double living expenses. The incentives package is applicable to contract periods of three years. Schools also can use the addi-

carry out abortions. Without this license abortions are technically "illegal."

Terminating a pregnancy became legal in October 2011, but until now, no one had applied for a permit. The Minister pointed out that in the former Netherlands Antilles, some 50% of pregnancies were terminated, usually by medical professionals.

▶ Dutch Party for Freedom (PVV) leader Geert Wilders has called on Muslims throughout the world to leave Islam. He made his call in a speech in New York, to promote his Englishlanguage book *Marked for Death*. Wilders claimed that his book explains that Islam is a "totalitarian ideology" and is an encouragement to freedom-loving Muslims to turn their back on Islam.

Wilders joins another former Dutch MP, former VVD Member of Parliament **Ayaan Hirsi Ali**, as a fighter against Islam. Hirsi Ali moved to the US in 2005, and was subsequently named by *Time Magazine* as one of the 100 most influential persons.

►EINDHOVEN—The Dutch advice and engineering bureau, DHV, will be guiding several construction and renovation projects to improve health and medical care in Bonaire. DHV will guide the extensive renovation and expansion of the San Francisco Hospital and the adjacent nursing home, Kas di Kuido. Both facilities are operated by the Mariadal Foundation. Total cost of the construction, expected to take three years, is \$30 million. The project will be built according to sustainable, environmentally friendly standards. San Francisco is Bonaire's only hospital and has 36 beds. The hospital provides internal medicine, emergency care, general

He visited the island at the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce on a one-week fact-finding mission.

Liliane de Geus of Link Development coordinated the visit. She was the director of Downtown Management Organization (DMO) in Curação before her return to Bonaire.

Feehan spoke with public and private sector representatives and held presentations for the Executive Council and others. He concluded that the center of Kralendijk and the street scene aren't attractive. There are too many infrastructural problems, cars are parked haphazardly due to insufficient parking facilities, the town center is unsafe because of sidewalks under repair and clinkers and Saturday nights at 7:30 from lying all over the place. The available waste containers are often

public toilets, while the existing

ones are not attractive to use. There's overdue maintenance and a good management plan for the open spaces is lacking. Feehan advised the Chamber of Commerce to assume the leading role and produce an action plan.

► Joran van der Sloot, suspected in the disappearance of Natalee Holloway almost seven years ago, is to serve out his 28-year sentence in Peru. Dutch citizen Van de Sloot was found guilty earlier this year of the murder of 21-year-old Stephany Flores Ramírez on May 30, 2010, in a hotel room in Lima. Now the US has requested his

extradition to face charges of fraud and extortion of the mother of Natalee Holloway. In the US case, Van der Sloot is accused of asking Natalee Holloway's mother for €190,000 for information about what happened to her daughter's body. He is said to have received the money from her.

Peruvian Minister San Martín explained that Van der Sloot might May 2012. be able to attend his trial in the US, but that he would have to return to Peru after the verdict to serve the rest of his 28-year sentence.

On the Island Since...2006 - Néthanja Bendt

was born in Surinam in 1991 in the district of Nickerie. My early childhood was wonderful. Both my parents had been the youngest child in their family and had therefore been very spoiled. When they got me, they automatically spoiled me the same way! My mother, who is a music teacher, had a gospel choir of about 30 people. My dad also sang in the choir and during all the rehearsals and performances I was always present, standing on a chair in the front row, clapping! Naturally I started singing at an early age. The last time I was in Surinam for vacation my mom and I listened to some tapes from when I was two and three years old.

Nickerie was quiet and we were a close-knit family who did everything together – swimming in the creek, playing with marbles and always, always, there was music. My grandparents lived close by and my uncle had his farm a little further. We danced and sang every day, and in the afternoon my grandma's sisters who also lived close, dropped by and then we went fishing in the creek.

When I was about four, my brother was born and a year later my sister. We moved to the capital, Paramaribo, when I was six. My mom had gotten a job as a music teacher there, but every weekend we went back to Nickerie.

Our family got involved in a terrible car accident when I was nine. My little brother was five and he took the biggest hit and his skull split. He should have been dead, but he survived and they called

him the 'miracle child' and that's what he is. He was operated on by a neurologist who tried to close leaks to the brain and they also fixed his face. But after six months my parents had to fly quickly with him to Holland, and it appeared that the operations had done no good at all. My brother still lives in Holland and when you see him you wouldn't think something was wrong with him. But he needed to be operated on again and there are many issues we have to take into account considering him.

My sister and I stayed with my grandparents in Nickerie, but after a while I got sick with stress and had to go to Paramaribo for treatment every other week. My sister suffered from nightmares and I don't know how we got through it, but if it wasn't for God, we wouldn't have managed.

Somehow I finished elementary school, and as I like technology I wanted to go to Polytechnic School, but my mom didn't

agree. She wanted to send me to a school where I would learn how to sew a skirt – but I'm not so much the skirt-sewing type! That's not my style! Well, to make a long story short: My mom's sister lived on Bonaire and she and I had a special bond. When I was a baby, my aunt wanted me and asked my mom for me, but my mother always said, 'I didn't get any babies to give them away like they were puppies!'

The first time I came to Bonaire I was three years old and I still remember how

that was. My grandparents (my mom's parents) came with us. And before I came to live here I had been here at least six times, so, when I was 14 my aunt said, 'Come here!' and I went to live with her on Bonaire.

I went to SGB and did Mavo – technical - and then I did Havo and now I'm following management training. My aunt and her family moved to Holland and I'm living with friends of my aunt. Currently I am

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working for RCN in the archives. It's a good job and I have great colleagues, but it's got nothing to do with technology. I would love to study aviation maintenance technician and some day I will.

To be young and living on Bonaire... well, I am not the average person. I'm not an internet freak. I do have a Blackberry, but I can't work it very well and when I want to say something to someone I prefer a phone call. So, I am different from most people of my age. I am a quiet person. Silence and tranquility don't bother me, and I have no problems keeping myself busy here. I play dominos with my friends, we watch movies, we go for a swim, drive around or we jam in a studio – that's what we do most of the time! And of course I go out now and then. However, reason number one why I won't stay here is because I don't have family here and then, I still want to study more – because I am smart. Here you stay at a certain level and that's a pity, especially when it comes to my music.

From the time when I was very young I've been singing in public. I am part of a girl's band here: Lucy, Amanda, Mary, Sylvia and me. We play everything- Salsa and Reggae and we do a lot of R&B and I write my own songs and we play everywhere: Little Havana, Wilhelmina Plaza, Sorobon, Plaza Hotel. We're good, you know! However, one of us is in her final school year and I got a contract with RCN - so, it's a bit less. I also sing solo and I accompany myself on my keyboard and every Sunday I sing at my church, the Ministry Di Kristu Hesus." She looks pensive. "To me music is a word with a very

powerful meaning. It's my whole life and it takes me into a different world. Music also means love - a very strong and profound love. I couldn't live without it. It literally means everything to me. I think that someone who doesn't care for music must have a dead soul."

Néthanja is very talented. She has an extraordinary pure voice - but also she's bright and she's nice. She knows what she wants and she will get there. "Sometimes I feel lonely. I shouldn't say that, because too many people care for me. But I miss my family. If I'd go somewhere now it would be Holland where I'd like to do conservatory and music theatre. For one year I haven't studied anything except for my management course. My aunt would like me to study electronics and do my music later so I will have a more solid basis. In a way she's right because if you want to do something in music you have to be really good! Still, I'm looking for what's closest to my heart and in the end, it's always music.

One thing I regret is that I never paid attention when my mother was giving music lessons because I still can't read music! I am too lazy, I prefer to play by ear. My mom is very good at it, however, she doesn't play any instrument and that's what I'm good at: piano, guitar, flute, bass. When I touch it, it starts playing and that's why I should do something with it because I realize that's a gift. Another thing is, since I am here, I do what I want with my voice – something I wouldn't dare to do when I am around my mom! No way! I miss her because she's strict and she knows I can do much more with my voice and...she's right!

Everybody else is living in other places around the world - amazing when you think of it. I even have relatives in China!



Nowadays, Mangazina di Rei is a key element in Bonaire's cultural preservation which is managed by youngsters (in training) and community groups. Under the guidance of a group of passionate seniors, professionals and volunteers, the youngsters are being challenged into taking more entrepreneurial responsibilities and using their talents at their utmost best while also working on their cultural and social development. "The challenge for all of us together is to deliver to our visitors a unique experience of seeing, tasting and feeling the culture of Bonaire," said Danilo Christiaan.

Mangazina di Rei is going to host a twoday event this month. "On May 18, International Museum Day is taking place at the Mangazina di Rei Culture Park with an open house, from 10 am to 4 pm. This means that our doors are open to everyone in order for each one of our visitors to see, feel and taste the culture of Bonaire!" announced Danilo. He continued: "The theme for this two-day event will be sustainability, which is also the goal of Mangazina di Rei. We would like to show the tourists and the Bonairean population the power of culture and its effect on the sustainable development of Bonaire. It would mean a world to us if in the year 2024, when celebrating its 200 years of existence, all that we created today will still be present and in good condition."

"The following day, May 19, is what we called *Mi Zjilea* Day. *Mi Zjilea* in Papiamentu means 'when one feels good doing something one likes very much.' Or, as they say in English, 'when one feels like a fish in water.' bands like Foyan Boyz, for example, will be performing until late at night. For the early birds, Mangazina di Rei will be open on this day for breakfast. There will be a buffet and tickets are available for presale. Prior to the breakfast buffet there will be a walking tour guided by Mr Bòi Antoin."

Besides hosting cultural events, Mangazina di Rei is also a study center acknowledged by many international institutions such as the Dutch Organization CALIBRIS which specializes in health care, social care, welfare and sport studies. At Mangazina di Rei youngsters and (high) school drop outs get a second chance to prepare themselves for re-integrating into the society and the labor market, but this time they will be better prepared.

Danilo elaborated: "What we would like to achieve during this two-day event is to inform people about the Mangazina di Rei. This project is composed of various parts, such as the restoration of the old warehouse while maintaining it as a historic building, to give the heritage of Bonaire a fixed and timeless spot inside the cultural park, creating a food hotspot for the birds in the neighborhood, offering youngsters the chance to practice how to become entrepreneurs so that they may be more understanding and enthusiastic while at the same time cherishing the value of doing business."

Danilo cheerfully continued: "Another

pending project is the eco museum concept of 'Rinconsito.' We would like to create a miniature version of Rincon. An eco museum is a dynamic way in which communities preserve, interpret and manage their heritage for a sustainable development and it is based on a community agreement."

I think that Mangazina di Rei is a great place to visit, actually a must see, feel and taste experience as their slogan states. The museum at the entrance is embellished with so many details and gives you a detailed photographic view of how things were done in the past on Bonaire. 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
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BONAIRE ON WHEELS

THE HAPPY CADUSHY FAMILY ON WHEELS

B onaire/Rincon – As long as Eric Gietman can remember he has been interested in off road riding. Those days, way back in the former century, he lived in the southern part of Holland and he really liked to ride his bike over unpaved roads and through the still existing outback of The Netherlands. Every now and then he fell of his bike but he never got seriously injured and he always wore a safety helmet. One of his last bikes was a Yamaha XT500, the first of a new generation of reliable single-cylinder, four-stroke off-road machines. Then he decided to sell the motorcycle and buy two mountain bikes for Jolanda, his partner, and himself. So they were still off road but now the vehicles were powered by human energy instead of by an engine powered by fossil fuel.

In 1997 Eric and his wife spent their honeymoon on Bonaire and they immediately fell in love with the hardly spoiled island. Of all places, they really loved the small and independent village of Rincon with its proud citizens in the northern part of the tropical island. All kinds of fantasies popped up and plans were created to start a business or something to be able to live on this wonderful island. It took them years and years to create a business plan and when everything was organized and thought over again and again the economic recession changed all plans. Several times Eric visited the Diver's Paradise to find out how to create a job and a living on Bon-

aire. Then, in March 2009, Eric, Jolande and their lovely daughter, Rianne, made a giant stride. They moved to Bonaire to live their dream. One year later they bought the former Cinelandia complex in Rincon and started cleaning it. They put a lot of energy and money in restoring the house next to the cinema and they started the Cadushy Distillery, an artisan and traditional factory where they produce their Bonaire liqueur, made of the Kadushi cactus.

Eric: "We love the island of Bonaire, especially the village of Rincon. This is the best kept secret. Rincon is a fine example of the original Bonaire. We bought the ruins of the cinema and the house next to it and we are really into restoring it the way it was in history. The house is over 110 years old and the cinema was built in 1957. It is a Rinconeran copy of Cinelandia in Curacao and it also has those typical art deco style features. We are working on the house and the cinema will be restored too. The roof collapsed as the white ants ate the wooden structure. It took us months to clean everything up and transport the material to the landfill. Some Rincoñeros did not even know the cinema had a floor! We also created the Bonaire Heritage Foundation and web site for Rincon: www.Rincon.nl as we think it is important to keep Bonaire's history and traditions alive."

As Bonaire has the perfect climate for motor riding Eric bought a second hand

Honda TransAlp 700 cc V-twin. The engine itself has always been very reliable but the electronics suffered from time and temperature. Eric took several sealed electronic units apart and started measuring, soldering and replacing. Unfortunately he had very little success Then he bought some aftermarket replacement parts, and after installing the new electronics the machine gained a lot of power. The first time Eric turned the throttle he immediately fell off his bike because he did not expect that amount of extra power!

In March 2010 Jolande passed the exam and received her motorcycle driver's license. Until now she only had experience with a very small singlecylinder two-stroke Solex moped made in France. Eric and Jolande found a second hand Honda 125 cc singlecylinder TransCity. Jolande enjoyed the motorbike and gained a lot of experience. Finally they found out that the difference in power between the 700 cc TransAlp and the 125 cc TransCity was too big so they found a very nice 250 cc single cylinder Honda. Now, they form the happy Cadushy family. Especially during the weekends they get their gear and run the bikes. Eric: "The three of us, we all love riding the motorcycles on this lovely island. It is fun but it is not without a risk. Think of the donkeys and goats crossing the road and think of the other participants in the everyday traffic. They are not really used to bicycles, mopeds and motorcycles. Most roads are narrow and the edges are not smooth. So Jolande, Rianne and I always protect ourselves with helmets, long trousers and sturdy boots. Especially helmets are a very important part of our protection. They protect our heads and our brains. A human being has just one head and it is impossible to replace it!"


Now the Gietmans are looking for a small motorcycle for their daughter Rianne. Rianne also likes enjoying open

Happiness Is A Good helmet

This is the first of a series of Bonaire Reporter short articles by J@n Brouwer, about helmets and helmet awareness.

way of reducing head injuries and fatalities resulting from motorcycle, moped, bicycle and skate board crashes. Wearing a helmet has been shown to decrease the risk and severity of injuries among motorcyclists by about 70%, the likelihood of death by almost 40%, and to substantially reduce the costs of health care associated with such crashes.

Most people on motorcycles, mopeds, bicycles and skate boards don't use safety helmets on Bonaire. The climate is too hot and helmets are not cool. Last week I did a tour around a lot of shops on Bonaire looking for helmets as I really got fed up with all the people getting seriously injured. Last year several persons even passed away because of injuries. In the earlier days speed was as fast as the top speed of a horse or donkey. Nowadays speed easily reaches 60 miles or so. We have to protect ourselves because of these increased speeds. And yes, a baseball cap or a stainless steel strainer does help a little but there are better solutions. On our own island I found at least four shops where they have helmets for sale: bicycle helmets, mountain bike helmets, ski helmets and motorcycle helmets. Prices vary from \$25 to \$110. Send me an email or give me a call and I'll inform you about the variety of helmets available on our island. A lot of helmets nowadays ARE cool!


Dive Friends 10,000th PADI Certification Goes To Amber Sills


World Tai Chi Day In Bonaire



An Antillean "Tour d'Azul With a "Bag of Music"



May 26 on Bonaire—Tjako van Schie and Henk van Twillert

t's been nearly three years since saxophonist Henk van Twillert began this music of Henk van Twillert and his successful in-concert tours to the ABC Islands, accompanied by his friend Tjako van Schie at the piano. Since then they have played at locations throughout the world, leading up to their recently released CD, "A Bag of Music." Here is an eclectic "trunk full" of music, ranging from European classical pieces to tangos, from contemporary Jazz to classical Antillean compositions. This CD forms the basis of their musical "Tour d'Azul." coming to Aruba, Bonaire and Curacao and St, Maarten from May 24 through June 2, 2012.

Henk van Twillert is a gifted musician who demonstrates superb technique combined with a special emotional interpretation which carries away his fellow musicians as well as his audience. He is truly a musical world citizen, inspired by the various places he has lived but not easily pigeonholed by either place or type.

These days Van Twillert's hometown is Aveiro, Portugal, near where he teaches in Porto, and where he is inevitably influlands, he grew up with the European clastin Guia (featuring Ines Soares), Jazz sics, studying at the Amsterdam Conservatory, and he continues to pass on his knowledge of classical musical literature. In Venezuela, where he is a guest lecturer Palm and Padu Lampe. at "El Sistema" of The National Youth Orchestra of Venezuela, he has become especially attuned to the great South American composers. And in New York, where he has spent two years pursuing doctoral studies, he has become deeply involved in Jazz composition.

During previous tours in the Dutch Antilles, Van Twillert discovered the classi- Carlos do Carmo (Henk joined him in cal Antillean music of Livio Hermans. Wim Statius Muller, Padu Lampe, Jan Gerard Palm, Rufo Wever and others. His love for what he's found there is easily understood in his renditions of these works in the CD, "A Bag of Music."

The influences from every aspect of this musical Odyssey can all be heard in this three-part CD compilation, which was launched September 2011 in the Amstel

Church in Amsterdam. Since that time Tjako van Schie in concert has continued to draw enthusiastic full halls in the Netherlands, Belgium and Portugal.

Following Henk van Twillert's second successful appearance in the Antillean islands in 2011 (this time with a 10member-strong saxophone youth orchestra, "Vento do Norte"), Van Twillert and Van Schie return again, now augmented by two additional guests, Ines Soares, a fado singer of great class, and "all round" percussionist Marlon Conradus of Curacao.

Their touring performance, "Tour d'Azul," inspired by the CD, "Bag of Music," begins on Curacao on May 24th, arriving on Bonaire May 26th, continuing to St. Maarten on May 30th, and closing out on Aruba, June 2nd. On each of these islands, their public concerts will be supplemented with additional concerts for local school children and workshops for aspiring musicians.

The programs for each of the concerts will include works by Bach, Rachmaninoff and Faure, tangos by Piazzolla, brilenced by the "fado." In his native Nether- liant fados by Jesus Sing and Mario Marpieces by Gershwin and Sidney Bechet and Antillean compositions by Livio Hermans, Wim Statius Muller, Jan Gerard

COCARI BEFORE AND AFTER



n 2010 I wrote an article about Cocari n 2010 I wrote an article accumulation (Comission Cuido pa Grandinan di Rincon), an elderly care foundation existing in Rincon since 1982. The need for this special care was very important in Rincon at that time as well as the need to expand and reorganize. With the help of the government, Cocari finally got the special care they really needed. Last year, in 2011, under the direction of Mr. Boy Clarenda as president of the foundation, different caring programs were reestablished.

The board consists of specialized nurses from the hospital's Fundashon Mariadal to make sure the "visitors" of Cocari are being taken good care of. A volunteer worker from the foundation, Nurse Jolanda Domacassé, tells us, "Volunteers are diminishing and the cost of living is getting higher. Volunteers cannot fill the working hours between 8:30 am and 2 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays any more because life expenses make them need to have a paying job. They can't afford to work without getting paid because they have a family to take care of. And what they earn from donations is not enough for all the care that's needed."

This has completely changed. Now they are being well taken care of by the hospital's Fundashon Mariadal. The nurses will be at Cocari three times a week, supplying this day care center with different help. There are more activities for the visitors and more special care. Due to these activities the visitors at Cocari have increased. But there is more that needs attention.

As one of the visitors said, a new building and a new bus is necessary. As she, Mrs. Maria Albertus (74), explains, "Now, under the care of Holland, we are going to get a

new building soon. It's getting crowded where we are now.

Thanks to the Rotary Club, in 2010 we received 35 wheel chairs, 10 hospital beds and 15 mattresses from Holland. In 2011 we came under the special care of Fundashon Mariadal and on March 20th this year during the Volunteer weekend, BON DOET, the Cocari yard got cleaned and a greenhouse was built. Because of this greenhouse Cocari can now grow its own veggies and the visitors can take care of it.

On April 28th Cocari had its first Simadan parade, taken care of by the Fundashon Mariadal, the first in all of Cocari's 30 years of existence. Participants from the elderly homes in Playa came to join us with precelebrations of Rincon Day. It was a great experience for all the people in Rincon."

We can see that Cocari has progressed from a few years ago. Now we have specialized care, and in the future because of the increasing demand for care of the visitors we will have five days of Cocari instead of just three days. Soon the old school yard will be rebuilt for a new elderly home for Rincon people.

On Sunday May 6, Fundashon Cocari celebrated a fashion show for the elderly entitled "Machi Modelo."

So you can't imagine how much has been

changing at Cocari. If you wish you can visit and see for yourself. Call Josephine Trinidad (717-8900), the nurse in charge of Cocari activities.

A Medley of Tunes



rt Marshall and Friends" performed a medley of classical operatic arias and instrumental selections, including popular ballads, a vibrant Piazzolla tango and even some Jazz and Hollywood tunes at Plaza Resort Bonaire's Cacique Hall on Saturday evening, April 21. Billed as, "From Vienna to Broadway," this program Bragoto), Andrew Solomon took covered more ground musically than ordinarily would three or four concerts organized by Bonaire's Classical Music Board.

Wolfgang Mozart's "Minuet" and Allegreto con Variazioni," for example, was performed as a sprightly clarinet piece with piano accompaniment, as was the piano-accompanied clarinet solo from Guiseppe Verdi's opera "La Fortza del Destino," and Giacomo Puccini's "E Lucevan di Stelle" from the opera "Tosca." Similarly, arias from Amilcare Ponchielli's opera, "La Gionconda" and Georges Bizet's "Carmen" were sung by Monique Anderson with piano accompaniment.

After the intermission, the mood shifted to more contemporary songs performed as trios:

Eubie Blake's "Memories of You" and Sidney Bechet's "Petite Fleur" (both arranged by Art Marshall), or as quartets for: "Kurt Weill's "Mack the Knife" and Gordon Jenkins' "Goodbye" (both arranged by Art Marshall).

In trio performance of Piazzola's "Oblivion" (arranged by the lead role on oboe, accompanied by piano and clarinet, expressing the overwhelming melancholy of the piece with perfect pitch in a marvelous rendition.

Ms. Anderson's vocal range had to have been severely tested throughout the performance with demands varying from the (mezzo) soprano highs required by the operatic arias to the lower, more earthy registers of the Jazz-oriented numbers, where she seemed more at home.

The name of Benny Goodman, a friend of Marshall's when Goodman was a seasonal visitor on St. Maarten, was invoked various times as formative influence on both Marshall's style of clarinet play and his arrangements as well.

All told, the group was warmly received by its Bonaire audience, which responded with numerous standing ovations and "bravos."

The Classical Music Board Bonaire's next performance will be offered on Saturday, May 26, at Plaza Resort's Cacique Hall, featuring the return of saxophonist Henk Van Twillert, accompanied by pianist Tjako Van Schie, and this time augmented by two additional guests, Ines Soares, a fado singer of great class, and "all round" percussionist Marlon Conradus from Curacao. ■




Did You Know...

evels of carbon dioxide (CO₂) have been rising not only in the atmosphere but also in the Earth's waters. The ocean is a large carbon sink and studies have shown that the increasing levels of carbon dioxide can cause problems for corals. A recent study by Nilsson et al. 2012 has revealed that high levels of CO₂ can also alter fish behavior by affecting their brain functions. In-

creased CO_2 concentrations affected the sensory system of baby reef fish, corrupting their sense of smell, causing hearing loss, and affecting their coordination.

Baby reef fish had a corrupted sense of smell and reduced survivorship because they were unable to smell the chemical aromas secreted by their predators. A loss of hearing deterred the fish from the reef during the day, increasing their chances of being seen and preyed upon. The fish most at risk are species that require high amounts of oxygen.

CO₂ levels are increasing at a steady rate, which may give fish enough time to adapt to the changing environment. If, however, the levels of CO₂ become too high or the rate of increase too fast, there is a greater chance of severe neurological issues as seen in this study. The best thing we can do to reduce human CO² emissions



into the atmosphere is limit our use of fossil fuels. ■ Crystal Wilson

*to find it... just look up


or the last several months there have been great views of the planets in the Sky Park. This will prove to be true throughout the month of May as well. Those of us with telescopes can obtain dramatic views of phase changes in Venus, spectacular rings around Saturn, and neat surface markings on Mars. There will be an "annular" solar eclipse in the late afternoon of May 20th. Unfortunately for us east of Mexico the Sun will already have set, and we will miss it entirely.

An annular solar eclipse happens when the **Moon** directly on the **Earth-Sun line** also reaches the farthest point from Earth in its orbit around us, and therefore appears a little too small to fully block the Sun. About 90% of the Sun will be blocked in this eclipse, but at mid-point of eclipse, the Sun will appear as a "ring" of light in the sky. The next such event will not happen until 2023.

But let's get back to what we CAN see. Venus will jump out at us early in May as soon as the sky darkens. Look west for this brilliant "evening star." It is at maximum brightness of -4.7. On May 1st it was some 30 degrees above the west horizon and not set until 11:30 pm. But its orbit around the Sun, smaller than ours and inside ours, is bringing it closer to us and "tucking" it between us and the Sun. Indeed by May 31st, Venus will only be about 10 degrees above the horizon, and will set just 40 minutes after the Sun. But look at it on May 22nd when the crescent Moon will be seen just 5 degrees below and left of it.

Venus's orbital motion will also cause the telescopic views of it to change as well. It will appear crescent all month, but the crescent will shrink (less lit-surface seen) while the overall size of the planet image will increase by about 40%

Mars begins May just a little left (east) of Leo's brightest star Regulus, high up in the southern sky. Its orbit will take it away from Regulus through the month, so it will be twice that distance left of it by May 31st. Mars outshines **Regulus** by almost 4 times and its reddish color makes a nice contrast with the blue-white color of this hot star. Telescope views this month will reveal the white north polar cap and some dusky surface markings.



Saturn can be found by shifting your gaze due east. It too is among the stars of a zodiac constellation; in this case, Virgo. And it too is near the brightest star of this constellation, Spica. This month these two will appear to remain about 5 degrees apart; with Saturn to the left of Spica. Saturn is so far away that its orbital motion over a month's time is not as noticeable in reference to background stars as the motion of Mars, which is much closer to us. Telescopes will show Saturn's lovely rings, tilted 13 degrees to our line of sight, and can reveal several of the planet's over 60 moons.

PLANETARY INFORMATION

MERCURY is in the eastern pre-dawn sky during April and May, reaching greatest western elongation on the 18th. It is harder to observe during May, rapidly closing with the Sun and vanishing into its glare before month's end.

VENUS is visible in the W to NW evening sky. It gradually, then more rapidly, closes with the Sun, becoming a larger but narrower crescent in the last weeks of April and the first ones of May. An historic transit of the Sun by Venus occurs on June 5: the last one until 2117! Keep watching this site for a public event to observe it.

MARS is visible in early evening, in Leo. It is fading (magnitude -0.7 at the start of April, to +0.5 at the end of May) and shrinking in apparent size (13" at the start of April, to 8" at the end of May) as its distance from Earth increases again following a March 3 opposition.

SATURN is visible most of the night, in **Virgo** near the bright star **Spica**.
