The introduction of the US dollar in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba has only played a minor role in the sharp rise in prices on the islands according to a the findings of a buying power investigation carried out by independent companies, Ecorys of The Netherlands and Curconsult of Curaçao, by order of the Dutch Ministry of Interior Affairs and Kingdom Relations BZK.

According to them the local business sector used the switch from the Antillean Guilder to the US Dollar to round prices upwards.

The main explanations for the significant price increases are:

- the higher price of fuel, which in turn increases the cost of electricity and transport;
- the increase in world prices of food and raw materials;
- the increase in transportation cost, because of higher excise tax on fuel

The report stated that double taxation of goods being transported to Bonaire was not a factor because an arrangement was already in place between Bonaire and Curaçao. But that has not happened, which makes the results of other findings suspect in the mind of some people.

► THE HAGUE--The Tax Office of the Caribbean Netherlands last year imposed a total assessment of some \$108 million in taxes and social premiums on Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. The largest chunk that was assessed concerned the general spending tax ABB: \$32.4 million. The Tax Office had calculated the levy would be about \$10 million less than receipts.

This does not take into account property tax for 2011 which would add about \$4 million. The property tax assessments will be sent out later this year. However, for various reasons, the Dutch Government said that the revenues for 2011 were not yet available, but consulting firms, Ecorys and Curconsult, say that the collective burden on the islands in 2011 has sharply increased in comparison to previous years partly because of the stricter compliance of the new system of taxes and social insurance premiums.

▶ The recent additional "free allowance" (vrije uitkering) payment from The Netherlands for Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba of \$8.2 million per year announced last week probably won't lessen the unrest on Bonaire resulting from the island's integration into Holland, but it shouldn't hurt either. Bonaire's free allowance will increase by US \$4.9 million to US \$24.9 million per year. The islands have been complaining that the free allowance was too low for the local gov-

ernments to properly carry out their tasks, let alone to make infrastructure investments. Dutch caretaker Minister of Interior Affairs and Kingdom Relations Liesbeth Spies further announced a grant of \$800,000 to tackle socio-economic issues.


Dutch Ministries, in addition to the free allowance, are making significant investments in public health and education.

Together with the Island Government, the Dutch Government will be making additional funds available for investment in essential facilities in the islands such as drinking water, waste management, airport safety, school buildings and libraries.

- ► THE HAGUE--Dutch political parties are releasing their programs one by one for the September 12 elections, but few are dedicating more than a few words to the Dutch Caribbean islands and Kingdom relations. However, the Socialist Party (SP) feels that The Netherlands should offer custom-made solutions for the issues that the BES islands face. It said that The Hague had approached the three islands in a manner that was too Dutch, too rigid, overlooking the fact that those communities have specific issues that could not be compared to society in The Netherlands.
- ▶ On Tuesday, June 19, at 2 pm, the construction display board of the new correctional institution (prison) was dedicated by Governor Mrs. dr. Lydia Emerencia at the site of the buildings at Aruba plantation.

The new correctional institution will have a capacity of 94 cells, with space for men, women and juveniles. According to the planning the new building will be ready by mid-2015. This facility is in addition to the prison recently completed in downtown Kralendijk. Is this the start of a new opportunity for Bonaire- Penitentiary Tourism?

THE NETHERLANDS--The Central Bank of the Netherlands DNB fears that the Dutch economy will show no signs of recovery this year and, from a historical perspective, will only have limited growth in the next. The DNB noted that high mortgage debt, inadequate economic growth and falling housing prices are making households, banks and the government increasingly vulnerable.

▶ Before the end of 2012, the Netherlands will set up a marine mammal sanctuary for whales and dolphins in the Dutch Caribbean waters. This is one of the outcomes of a meeting organized by the Ministry of Economic Affairs, Agriculture and Innovation (Economische Zaken, Landbouw en Innovatie - EL&I) on June 4 and 5 on St. Maarten. The Dutch Islands in the Caribbean, France, the US, the Dominican Republic and Venezuela discussed the cooperation for whale sanctuaries. Whales like the humpback whale often migrate thousands of kilometers from cold northern waters in summer to the tropical Caribbean Sea in winter so that cooperation is necessary for effective protection.

► Want a 9% Raise? Hit the Gym.

According to a study published in the June issue of the Journal of Labor Research, workers who exercise regularly earn 9% higher pay on average than those who don't. 

**Ambassador's Surprise** 







PURCHASING BONAIRE REAL ESTATE

Bonaire is a legal entity (bijzonder openbaar lichaam) within the Netherlands, and for Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius (BES islands) a number of different laws have been written, approved or currently under review. Therefore the laws applicable here are based on the legal system of the Netherlands, but they are not completely similar for the purchasing process of a property. Since most of the buyers of real estate on Bonaire are not too familiar with this legal system we believe it is useful to inform you of the whole purchasing process.

Obviously, before you can buy a property you need to find your own piece of paradise. Once you have identified the property that you would like to buy, the purchasing process begins.

All listings have a **price.** When the price is fixed there is no negotiation possible on the price. In those cases you may be able to negotiate for when the date of transfer will take place and any other details you would like to be included. When the price is marked as an asking price, it means that you are invited to make an offer on the property, however, the seller is not obligated to accept your offer, even when you offer the asking price.

An **offer** usually contains the following items: the price, the date on which you would like to take possession of the property, a specification of what is included (inventory wise), the currency in which you would like to pay and any contingencies that you would like to include, such as financing and results of a technical inspection.

A contingency for financing will have to include a definite maximum amount that you would need to borrow and any other conditions that are important to you. These parameters need to be included so that you can prove beyond doubt (should that be the case) that you were unable to obtain the financing so that you have the right to receive your deposit back on the property. The proof will have to be written and signed by a known financial institution, stating that they were unable to provide you with the financing for this amount under these conditions.

A contingency for the results of a technical inspection will also need to be defined precisely. This should be in terms of only when major structural problems be found by the inspector will you have the right to dissolve the agreement without a penalty.

Under the law of the BES islands this whole process can take place verbally:



**nothing has to be in writing.** Once the seller has accepted your offer, or you have accepted the seller's offer, there is a deal that is binding for both parties.


Your real estate agent will then draw up the **purchase agreement**, which will reflect the price and other details and contingencies that were agreed upon. Furthermore the rights and obligations of both buyer and seller will be laid down in this agreement. This document will be signed by both seller and buyer and the buyer will need to wire a down payment of 15% within 10 to 14 days of signing this agreement to the escrow account of the notary (notaris) here on Bonaire.

The **notaris** will then prepare everything for the actual transfer of ownership. All outstanding government fees and taxes for the property will be gathered and the notaris will perform a title search to make sure there are no liens on the property. You will receive notification from the notaris of how much exactly you will need to pay before the date of transfer. On the date of transfer you will be invited to the notaris'

office to sign the official date. If you are unable to be present yourself, you can sign a power of attorney for the notaris or one of his coworkers.

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
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## 8th Annual Bonaire Heineken Jazz Festival



On a regular basis one can see and hear the single-cylinder motorcycle riding from Antriol to Sabadeco and back as Gilbert was working on a big outside paint job. In fact Gilbert is a carpenter, but as a painter he also does a great job. First he cleans or removes the old paint, then he starts painting: two layers, sometimes even three. It takes some time and a lot of paint but the result is there. Gilbert and his colleagues are proud Bonaireans. They just like their job and never paint over dust, dirt, sand and soil.

Gilbert loves his motorcycle. It is in good condition and is a reliable and cheap runner. As it is a single-cylinder with just two valves and one carburetor it is easy to maintain too. Gilbert is the second owner. When he bought the Vento Rebellian it was only about one year old and it looked like new. Since then it has served Gilbert for some five years now and never have serious problems popped up. Gilbert knows there are three more 150 cc single cylinder Rebellians on the island of Bonaire. They all look more or less the same. His bike is a two tone, partly metallic blue, partly metallic silver, with loads and loads of chrome parts. The machine is very complete: a speedometer, a rev counter, a fuel gauge on top of the tank, two mirrors, a kick start and electric start, one exhaust pipe connected to two mufflers. During the last couple of years most of the metal from the inside of the exhaust system was blown out so the sound is deep, healthy and solid. "Loud pipes save lives!" This bike has the looks of a well known Milwaukee-made motorcycle: a huge chrome headlamp, two chrome side lamps, chrome mirrors, chrome tank cover with ignition key and fuel gauge, chrome bars, chrome all over the place. Fat rubbers around alloy rims. In the front: 110/90/16, in the rear: 130/90/15. Drum brakes.

Then Gilbert temporarily stops his painting job. He cleans his hands on his shirt and he grabs the keys out of his pocket. He takes a position on his motorcycle, ready to launch it. He turns the ignition key and starts the engine.

He revs it a little. A big sonrisa (smile) appears on his face because of the fat sound escaping from the exhaust system. Yes, Gilbert really likes his machine! I take some pictures of Gilbert on his bike. Then he gets further with the job. A wet brush cannot wait too long in the heat of the tropics.

Vento Motorcycles Inc. is a Chinese company. They started the production of motorcycles way back in 1996. Gilbert's Vento is based on the reliable Honda 150 cc one-cylinder, four -stroke engine. The manufacturer's label says the bike was produced in June 2005. If you Google the internet you get a lot of information about this company. They also produce the Vento V-Thunder 250 cc twin. YouTube has little movies about proud Vento owners in Indonesia. And they like their loud pipes too!

Have fun, Gilbert! And please be careful. Beware of the donkeys with two and four legs. **Story & photo** by Jan Brouwer

#### NEW SKATE BOARD BOWL AND WAKE BOARD HELMETS

n this week's Bonaire Reporter Ledition two topics about helmets. First: the "swimming pool" of Jong Bonaire. Second: TSG wake board helmets!

First: the "swimming pool." So people told me Jong Bonaire, located at Kaya Simon Bolivar 16, Playa, had converted their swimming pool into a half pipe for skate boarding. I went to the place and had a talk with Ilona Burgers, the general manager. It appeared that there had never been a swimming pool but that on the terrain of Jong Bonaire a concrete "bowl" was created, a kind of half pipe with extras, more or less in the shape of a swimming pool. At the end of this July the skate board location will be officially opened and a skate camp organized. The good news is that Jong Bonaire ordered a huge bunch of skate helmets and knee and elbow protectors. Congratulations! The more helmets we get on our beautiful island the more lives we can save.

Second: TSG wake board helmets. Then Franklin "Paco" Veeris joined the meeting. He is also involved in the skate board project and the skate board camp. Apart from that he is into

wake boarding. Wake boarding appears to be standing on a board, being towed by a fast boat. (Never too old to learn./jb) Wake boarding is another project of Jong Bonaire.

Then we went to Paco's office where he showed me some wake boards and helmets. Cool helmets! I immediately fell in love with the white wake board helmets. These TSG Technical Safety Helmets are produced by Rider. The white outside shell is made of ABS, the inner shell is made of eps-impactfoam. The helmets have very cool looks. Fourteen ventilation holes and ear pads to protect your ears when you hit the water surface. The helmet has no cloth layer inside. This wake board and kite helmet is washable. Great! So I immediately gave Paco my flat black ski helmet and I left with the TSG wake board helmet for a severe test on the motorcycle. Nice looks, snug fit. The first white helmet in my life. Sturdy but comfortable fit. 497 grams. No cloth inside, washable. Fits good, feels good. Fully adjustable. (I am wearing this helmet while I am writing this article and I do not feel any irritation or disturbing weight.) To be honest this helmet is even more comfortable than my new ski helmet as I am not getting heated up at all. Soon I am going to ride to the kite surf place near Fisherman's Hut to see what the kite surfers do with their brains.

Most of the time you are hanging more or less upside down to collect the lead, the hooks and the line. The more experience you have, the fewer problems you have with controlling your buoyancy. All the time you have to stay alert. Where is my buddy? Are we close enough? All the time you have to decide: Is this line "fresh" enough or did the algae and the coral of the underwater world finally, after years and years, take over? The re-

sult? Several tens of kilograms of fishing line. After the dive we were tired but satisfied. The organization offered us drinks and little snacks at the Dive Inn. Thank you, Dive

Gloves and knives are forbidden in the underwater world around Bonaire, but a pair of pliers or ordinary scissors to cut the fishing lines are very efficient! As you all may know, Bonaire has a new governor and to some she still remains a mystery. So why don't I release you from your suspense and write about Governor Mrs Lydia Emerencia. Governor Emerencia is a very busy lady but she took time and answered all my questions willingly.

My first question was who is she and where she comes from, of course! Mrs. Emerencia answered: "I am the person that I am today thanks to all the experiences I've had, both personally and professionally."

She made it clear that coming from a big family consisting of 14 brothers and sisters including herself (she has a twin sister), family is very important to her and she holds the family concept close to her heart.

Lydia's father is a Bonairean while her mother is an Aruban lady. Her dad was a military officer and he taught all his kids a very important lesson in life: When you start something you have to finish it, no matter what! Later on, Lydia found out that in life it is not always possible but she always tries. Mrs. Emerencia elaborated: "If you want something, work hard for it: no pain no gain. Nothing comes falling down from the sky. Perseverance is good and try not to give up or never give up."

Even though her family members were numerous, her parents made sure that all their children got a chance to fulfill an academic study. Besides education, Lydia and her siblings were brought up with many good qualities like the essence of communication, languages, culture, literature and music. No matter how much new information and culture they learned about, the most important one was their own: Bonairean, Aruban, Antillean. And the first language they would have to master was of course their native Papiamentu

Mrs. Emerencia lived eight years in the Netherlands during her university years. That period was one of self-discovery. Questions such as, Who am I? What am I doing here? Where am I going?

By the time she successfully completed her academic degrees, specializing in education, she knew exactly who she was and what she wanted in life on all levels.

When Lydia left Aruba to study abroad she never changed her mind about going back to Aruba or to one of the other islands like Curacao or Bonaire where they speak Papiamentu. Her intention was to collaborate wherever and whenever she could with the development, evolution and progress of those islands.

Mrs. Emerencia has worked in many institutions and universities in Aruba since she moved back "home."

Subsequent to the sabbatical year she

took, Bonaire was looking for a new governor, so she applied out of love for her father's island. And guess what? She got the job. Yay! Her main professional reason for wanting this job was the significance of connecting with people, showing real interest in them and actually caring for them as well. This year, 2012, in the early spring, Mrs. Lydia Emerencia officially became the Governor of Bonaire.

After I'd asked her about the most important aspect of her job, Emerencia answered. "I consider the most important aspect is the possibility of helping to strengthen the foundations for the society, to further develop it into a dynamic society with a well-being for all. I believe that those foundations are grounded in respectful and kind human relations in which solidarity is considered as an important value." She continued, "What's also important is the vision and the capacity to identify one's own aspirations and goals and have a sense of determination to fulfill them. Crucial factors therefore are self-organization, self-esteem and selfconfidence. These combined together gives one the strength to believe that one can do it. So do it!"

Lydia has been Governor of Bonaire officially since March 2012. I asked her what she considers to be her biggest challenge in her line of work. Lydia replied, "My biggest challenge would be to facilitate open dialogue between opposing parties and strengthen unity and respect for diverse opinions, especially political opinions."

For those who do not live on Bonaire, allow me to fill you in. Previous to Mrs Emerencia, Bonaire had another Governor by the name of Glenn Thodé. He served less than two years and resigned due to the lack of professionalism, the petty infighting, the integrity and the general dysfunction of the Island Council. Well, that is what people on Bonaire have been saying. So, I asked Mrs Emerencia about this matter and also her opinion.

She answered, "My decision to take this job while being aware of the disillusion of the former Island Governor has been a very conscious one. I believe that Bonaire has a lot of opportunities and great things going on, which deserve support and ap-

preciation. A key factor in my decision making has been my father's love for his island and his deep concern for its future. I believe and see that there are good and interesting people living on Bonaire, who love and truly care for this island. You will see that Bonaire is more than just politics and politicians." She paused and then resumed. "However, I do agree that Bonaire has a formidable challenge to demand from its political leaders' transparent policy, together with wise, responsible and democratic decision making. Nevertheless, I am optimistic and believe that Bonaire has reached a point of no return.

There is a growing awareness of the principles of good governance. There are increasingly more social institutions and individuals willing and able to fearlessly speak up against signals or evidence of bad governing practices.

The general level of education is increasing and Bonaire is creating its own local leaders with the capacity to analyze and understand the development of the island and to formulate alternative directions.

There are more solid structures for government actions and there are more and potentially better legislative structures as Bonaire grows stronger and thus becomes more aware of the mechanisms and dynamics of its development. This implies a more critical evaluation of its leaders and options for development, thus a better Bonaire is inevitable.


It is a matter of time, caring, hardwork-

ing and visionary citizens, with their willingness to lead by setting a good example and most important of all by **not** giving up!"

It was a tremendous opportunity and great pleasure for me to meet our Governor face to face and interact with her. I am so impressed. She is a nice lady and extremely intelligent. I am positive that Bonaire will undergo many good changes during her governance. I cannot wait to see the results of her projects. As for all of us out there, please take into consideration her wise advice. Eastern Store was a small warehouse selling a bit of everything from cosmetics to bicycles and household items. In March 1990 the store moved to a new location which is now where Tung Fong Store is: Kaya Korona #52.

The family changed the name from Eastern Store to Tung Fong Store in the year 2000 to establish the new generation. Amy and Lo Kei's children joined the management team two years later in 2002. So since 2002, the management of the family business is Amy, Lo Kei, Eliza and Thing Chung Yan.

As the years passed, the Yan family expanded the building and enlarged their product line. They created new departments inside the store, offering a larger choice of the products they sell.

The unofficial baptized name by the locals is "The Chinese." This was because back in the late 70s when Amy and Lo Kei arrived in Bonaire there was not a single department store owned by Chinese people. They saw an opportunity and took it with both hands by establishing the Eastern Store. Since it was the first Chinese owned store ever in Bonairean history, when people said, and still say, they go to the Chinese, it meant only one place: the Eastern

Most of our clients are local people or residents of Bonaire." 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A Library For Bonaire

've been coming here with Martha, my wife, for 35 years. First we discovered the coral reef; it was colorful and silent, a different world to see and enjoy. Then we became acquainted with the people. To me, the essence of a culture is the language and it seemed like all the people here had this treasure of being able to speak four languages. That's the surest base of the future of a society. To develop further you need the books and the computers to give access to everything that has been written. Therefore, after having accumulated during my lifetime around 6.000 volumes, mostly in English, but also in Spanish and French, I thought: no reason to keep it for myself or my children who cannot accommodate such an amount of books. My first idea was to find a proper institution in Venezuela, but I've seen the results of other people doing so and it didn't work out. Then I started to toy with the idea of donating my library and my personal files to Bonaire, and they could see it as the first brick of a much more ambitious program. I think Bonaire would be an ideal location – isolated, perfect climate and no other distractions – for people who want to follow merchant courses in Spanish like the Cervantes Institute which has 54 centers in 20 different countries which are devoted to the Spanish and Hispanic American culture and Spanish language. In this case, I would like Bonaire to consider the possibility of installing a multi-cultural, multilingual center on the island, and I hope that my donation may be the impetus to establish such a foundation.'

Speaking is Francisco Kerdel Vegas, born in Venezuela in 1928, a prominent and exceptional man. To mention all his achievements would be an impossible task, but amongst other things he's an internationally known professor of dermatology, whose work and research has been awarded numerous times, nationally and internationally. He

thored a great number of text books and articles in the fields of tropical and dermatological diseases. Also he has been the ambassador



of Venezuela to Great Britain and France and for Unesco, and he was one of the members and founders of an international dermatological training center in Moshi, Tanzania. He was the creator of the "virtual parents," a foundation of virtual colleges in Venezuela. He's a member of WWF and the founder and first president of the Foundation to Protect Nature in Venezuela.

"The reason why I want to donate my books to Bonaire can be explained through a speech Federico Garcia Lorca – the greatest poet Spain has produced - made at the inauguration of the first people's library in the whole province of Granada, Spain. Garcia Lorca said: 'A man doesn't live from bread only. If I were hungry and helpless in the street, I wouldn't ask for bread but for half a loaf of bread and a book...' The first steps are always very problematic, but to me, persistence is the key word. My sole concern is that the government or a private institution provide a location where the books can be kept as a unit. If people are aware that this opportunity is available and they put on some pressure, a location will be found. Now that Bonaire is part of the Netherlands they could probably view this initiative favorably."





#### **EDUCATE AND EDUCATE**

ducation in various ways is crucial for people's progress and success. Having been well educated, many men and women in our Bonairean community occupy high positions. In these positions they bring Bonaire to a level to connect with the rest of the world via communication which is very important. We educate through communication, but we have to watch out what kind of information we are bringing forth. Information is to mold people, to make it touch their hearts.

Education begins in the early years and is obligatory for children between four and 18 years. Because many parents today are working they have to send their kids between 0 to four years to **pre-school.** No matter what, the parents' duties are to inform themselves about the pre-school situation in the area they are living before sending their children there. They should talk with the director and look around the area where the pre-school is situated. Remember that pre-schools must give accommodation, caring attention and prepare the child for the basic schools (Basic schools are now known as practical schools, divided into different levels in the fields of technology, science and communication.) and from there to advanced schools. To go through all these steps of education the child needs proper guidance.

The Department of Education and Culture at Kaya L.D. Gerharts 6 provides in-

formation folders for pre-school to higher education for parents and teachers.

But what about our children who enter higher education when they come from different levels of education in their preschool and basic schools? They are usually placed at the same level from which they graduated.

The **SBO** (Secundaire Beroep Onderwijs, Secondary Vocational Education) is a new educational innovation which has been successful in the last several years. There have been fewer dropouts with most of the students staying in school. The students get more attention at their own level, help in setting goals and what they want to achieve in the future.

Before SBO there was no place to put these kids and there were many dropouts. But today there are different areas of education to serve the needs of these students. **FORMA** and **the Stichting Project** are functioning as vocational schools to prepare these students for the economic situation, to fit in the working class. They need special care and guidance to minimize the social economic situation.

Bonaire is developing rapidly and from now through the next five years we need more professionals with different skills in sports, science, etc., and we'd like to have our own Bonaireans to occupy these fields. We need a group of caring people like social workers and psychologists who can work on the prevention part, to help them

from going into criminality. Also the educators, teachers and even parents need professional help to cope with different situation schools.

Some of the OICN students with teacher Esterline Brunken (center)

is for every child to reach advanced school, finish it, get a diploma and get a job.

Another big event here in Bonaire is the new education innovation for all kinds of persons. Whether or not you have a diploma, now is your opportunity to achieve your goals and of course those of your company. The new innovation is the **OICN** (Onderwijs Instituut Caribisch Nederland), directed by Mr. Gilberto "Juni" Vos, which has been operating on Bonaire for the last year. It gives men, women and companies the chance to reach out for opportunities in life. Anyone who wants to expand his or her education to the next level is an outstanding candidate, those of you with the guts to still want to educate yourself, even after so many years of be-

ing out of school. Of course it's not an


easy task. You have to deal with your

#### Who's Who on The Bonaire Reporter

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## Sailling Full of Expectation to Bonaire

I t was in the beginning of 2009 when we, Maarten (39) and Daan (35) from Holland, made a plan to go sailing to see the world. We didn't have a boat, Daan couldn't sail yet, we didn't win the lottery, but... we decided to try to make something what seemed impossible, possible.

The big plan was to sail the world in two years. That's an optimistic plan if you also want to see the countries you pass. We knew that somewhere we would change our plan, maybe three years, maybe we'd change the route. We didn't know at the time. Let's find a seaworthy boat first.

We bought a projectboat in England. There was a lot that needed to be done, so we worked hard on the boat for two years. Every possible day, every

free minute we spent on our boat and also every penny. In the meantime we also had to maintain our normal work of course. We both have our own businesses. Before we left Maarten worked most of the time in all Dutch theatres as a technician and stage designer with comedians. Daan was active as a drama teacher, actress and communication trainer; a busy period, working hard for our special goal.

When to leave? When are you really ready? Never. We wanted to leave somewhere in the summer of 2011. In January we picked a date. On the fifth of June 2011 at 12.10 hours we would leave the harbor from Amsterdam. Up until then there was a lot to organize between our working hours. Renting out our house, preparing our clients that we were leaving, arranging the boat papers, finding a home for our dear, nervous, not suitable for a boat cat...and so on and so on...

We made it! On the fifth of June we were very tired, but ready to go! Just a small little thing was against us: the wind. Our whole family stood on the pier to wave us goodbye, but the winds were coming from the wrong direction and were much too strong. The main thing we learned last year is that you have to be flexible in life, especially on a sailing boat. We left two days later.

On the road we soon discovered where the term "Seaman's stories" comes from. The sea can be rough -especially the North Sea where we started. Seasickness is not nice and a lot of things can and will break during a long trip at sea. As an example:

Sometimes you sail away with wind force 4, and during a multi-day trip the wind pulls to force 7 or more. That's quite a difference at sea! Not to mention the height of the waves sometimes. One night, on the high seas in the middle of the night, the boom clapped hard against Maarten's head. Another time a "harp" broke, so a very big sail dropped into the water and went under the whole boat. We always made it through, but it sometimes can be exciting at sea! Fortunately Maarten is

very handy, so we can fix most of the things ourselves, even at sea.

We also had lots of very nice and easy trips at sea, with gorgeous waters, splendid winds, beautiful clouds and magnificent sunsets.

From Holland we went south to Portugal. From there we sailed during a couple days (and nights) to Madeira and Porto Santo. Then we went to the Canary Islands, where we got ourselves a new crewmember, cat Miss Luna. We found her in La Palma, a bit sick and thin. We took her to a doctor, refreshed her and even got her a Spanish passport. First we took her on a daytrip from La Palma to La Gomera. From the beginning she's been great on our boat.

After the Canary Islands, you need to cross the big Atlantic Ocean. So it's on the Canaries where we prepared for the Big Trip. We left La Gomera with a lot of groceries, water tanks full and our new Spanish friend. We were heading for Cape Verde. It took us a week to get there. Miss Luna loved the long trip. That's the only time we were also awake at night-- her playtime! We all enjoyed the ride!

We arrived a day before Daan's birthday -24 November- in Cape Verde. The big twist in our journey arose on the Cape Verdes. We needed to find a pregnancy test, which was not so easy to obtain. Finally we found one in the main town and discovered the great news that Daan was pregnant! All this right before our longest trip: the crossing of the Atlantic Ocean.

Normally Maarten gets more or less sick at sea. Now we both did. It took us 16 days at sea to arrive good and well in Suriname. So we had heaps of time to make a plan for our new situation. That's where the ABC islands came in. We found it a good idea to go to a Dutch Island to have the baby. It's nice to be able to speak your own language with such great events as giving birth. In Suriname we had our first ultrasound, which confirmed that Daan was really pregnant. Then we started talking with people about the ABC islands. Where should we go and why? Everybody recom-

mended we go to Bonaire, the beautiful small island, with nice and friendly people, a good atmosphere, opportunities to work, a new hospital and so on. Our decision was easily made. After visiting the Caribbean, we would go to Bonaire. And so we did.

We arrived on the 21st of May, so we've been here three weeks already. It's strange to be so far away from Holland, but at the same time to recognize familiar Dutch elements—the language of course, but also to find lots of Dutch foods for example. We're very glad that we're welcome here. We've already met a lot of nice people, including the midwife and nurses. We came in with ultrasound reportss from three different countries and in three dif-

ferent languages. That happens when you move all the time and also want to have your check ups.

It's a bit strange to stay here for such a long time, after traveling around for a year. At the same time it's very nice and quiet to make our home and nest here. We hope to really get to know Bonaire because we'll stay here for at least half a year. Maybe we can work here. That would be nice! We'll see. We're going to work on our boat as well; that never ends. Maarten will repair some sails with his sewing machine, getting rid of some rust, and so on.

In about six weeks the baby is coming. Does anyone have a perambulator (pram) for us? The sea and sailing are exciting, but having a baby on this beautiful island is thrilling too! So here we are. A year ago we wouldn't have imagined living on Bonaire for a while. We live by the day and see what the next stop will be. For now we're very glad to be here.

#### JUNE IS ADOPT A SHELTER CAT **MONTH**

June is traditionally "Adopt a Shelter Cat" month in many countries. Why June? Because in countries with changing seasons cats breed more frequently in the spring which results in the high birthrates in June. Cat overpopulation is a serious problem all over the world....and is a very serious problem on Bonaire since it never gets too cold to deter cats from breeding. Unsterilized female cats can give birth up to 5 times a year, with an average of 4 or 5 kittens per litter. A female cat can become pregnant as early as 4 months old and, while her fertility may decrease at an older age, there is no "menopause" and an unsterilized female cat can always become pregnant. A female cat can actually be impregnated by more than one male and carry two different litters from different male cats. She can also become pregnant while nursing a litter. A single pair of cats and their kittens can produce 420,000 kittens in just 7 years! How can you help with this overpopulation



problem? In several ways. First and foremost: if you have a cat, be SURE that he/ she is sterilized. There is no benefit to NOT sterilizing your cat. In fact, sterilization brings benefits. Unsterilized cats roam neighborhoods looking for mates, fight with other cats, develop abscesses and infections from the fights, the males spray nasty smelling urine to mark their territory where ever they go. Unsterilized males frequently development urinary and bladder problems are healthy with current vaccinations and the and unsterilized females are good candidates for breast cancer, both sexes if left unsterilized can also spread feline sexually transmitted diseases. Sterilized cats will stay at home, be more affectionate, not smell up your house or your neighbor's car....and cost you less in time, trouble and money in veterinary bills. The Bonaire Animal Shelter offers free sterilization for the smart pet owner who wants to sterilize their cat. Just bring it into the Shelter and they take care of the sterilization at no charge to you. If you have cats that just "stop by" your house for a visit, bring them too. If your cats are sterilized, spread the word to your neighbors and friends to do the same. We need to stop the overpopulation now! Second: Adopt a cat (or two!) from the Bonaire Animal Shelter during June...or at any time during the year. Your adoption of a Shelter cat makes room for other unwanted cats to come to the Shelter and wait for a home. Adult cats are already sterilized. If you adopt a kitten, the adoption fee includes sterilization at the appropriate age. Right now there are numerous loving cats and kittens available for adoption that would love to make your house a home. Third: Make any kind of donation you can to the Shelter Sterilization fund. Help

the Shelter reduce the overpopulation of

unwanted cats, kittens, dogs and puppies

through the free sterilization program.

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
## Did You Know...

hat the ocean sunfish, Mola Mola, may have a symbiotic relationship with albatrosses?

The ocean sunfish is one of the largest marine bony fishes, reaching 2.3 metric tons and 2.7 meters in length and can be found widely distributed in the tropics and subtropics. Mola Mola can often be found basking at the surface of the ocean for unknown reasons. It has been proposed that this behavior may be a way of allowing other organisms to clean the parasites off of the sunfish, which has been widely documented to have large numbers of parasites on its body. Recently, a school of juvenile ocean sunfish were seen sunning themselves off the coast of Japan and most had several visible parasites. When an albatross was seen near the school, the ocean sunfish did not try to avoid or flee from the bird, but rather, the school actively pursued the albatross. The bird then began eating parasites off the ocean sunfish. More albatross joined in and competed for the parasites on the ocean sunfish. It is believed that the ocean sunfish were sunning themselves to actively look for albatross that would remove their parasites. This could mean that ocean sunfish and albatross have a symbiotic relationship with one another that has, to this point, been undocumented.




THE HORSE ON THE HANDLE OF THE BIG DIPPER

ave you ever heard the story about the horse on the handle of the Big Dipper? Well it's a good one. Just face due north in the Sky Park before midnight and you will see the Big Dipper low on the horizon, either to the east of the North Star or west of the North Star or directly above it (its exact position depends on the time of night). Four stars trace out its cup and three stars make up its handle. But we're going to pay atten-



Now although you have undoubtedly seen this star many times, have you ever looked at it really close? Because if you do look at it really close you will see that it is not just one star but two. Indeed right next to Mizar you can see a slightly dimmer star, a star named Alcor, which in Arabic means "the lost or friendless one." Now centuries ago it was said that these two stars - bright Mizar and dimmer Alcor- were used as a kind of ancient eye exam for a famous sultan's army. If a recruit could see both stars he was in, but if he couldn't he was out. I kind of question the validity of that story, however, because most people can see both stars. Although admittedly I have to use my glasses, so maybe the test was for older recruits.

At any rate, long ago these two stars became popularly known as "The Horse and the Rider", bright Mizar being the horse and dimmer Alcor being the friendless rider. And you can see them for yourself any night you can see the Big Dipper. And there our ancient eye test ends. But it doesn't end for modern eyes of a different kind, the eyes of tele-



scopes and spectroscopes, because if we look at Alcor, the rider, with a spectroscope we would see that this so-called friendless one is not so friendless after all. In fact Alcor has a companion rider, another star invisible to the naked eye, thus making Alcor two riders on Mizar, the horse. But that's not exactly true either because if we look really close at Mizar we discover that Mizar is also not just one star, not even two stars or three stars or four stars but is in fact a rare quintuple star.

In other words, when we look at this ancient Arab representation of a solitary horse with a solitary rider we are in reality looking at two horsemen driving a team of five horses across the night sky on the bend of the handle of the Big Dipper. Seven stars all told! Two double stars and one triple. Six of which are twice as big as our own million mile wide Sun and at least 50% brighter.

Incredible isn't it? What modern astronomy reveals about objects that generations of mankind have seen for thousands of years. So get outside, and gallop across the heavens with the horse and his rider, Mizar and Alcor, two visible stars which are in reality seven!
