B ONHATA (the Bonaire Hotel and Tourism Association) reports that their occupancy statistics showed lackluster performance for the tourism sector in the first half of 2012. In a press release they reported an occupancy rate of 65.62% for the period compared to 64.09% in 2011. The figures show a modest increase in occupancy rates in the first quarter and a marginal growth in the second quarter: 1.53% and 0.51% respectively.


BONHATA says Bonaire has fallen behind the growth in the Caribbean region for the same period. However, this information is based on reports from just 12 properties (including non-BONHATA accommodations) and sketchy revenue information. A web search done by The Reporter shows that Bonaire has about 120 accommodation providers. BONHATA would like all accommodation providers to provide statistics so a more comprehensive comparison can be made between their business, the island as a whole and beyond. BONHATA says this data is needed to tell a complete story in a way that occupancy rates cannot do alone. ▶ The Bonaire Island Government said fuel prices will go down very soon. The Government assured opposition leader Robby Beukenboom of *Partido Demokrátiko Boneriano* (PDB) following his public complaint.

Beukenboom had accused government of keeping fuel prices artificially high on Bonaire. According to the local authorities, there is an agreement with fuel distributor Curoil to have the rates on Bonaire follow those in Curaçao. That **this has not shown up in the prices on Bonaire yet** is because before the last adjustment was made these had been kept lower than the actual price which should have been for a year. On Friday it will be two weeks since the promise was made.

▶ WILLEMSTAD-- Curaçao politics are in turmoil. The Schotte cabinet resigned after MFK Party-fraction leader in Parliament Dean Rozier failed to reach agreement with his party, leaving the MFK/PS/MAN coalition with the backing of only nine of the 21 seats in the legislature. Governor Frits Goedgedrag has no choice but to dissolve Parliament and call early elections on October 19, despite receiving a document signed by PAR (8), PNP (1), FOL (1) and independent member Eugene Cleopa (ex-MAN) stating their willingness to form a new majority of 11 seats, with Rozier likely to join later.

▶ Stories have reached *The Reporter* telling that it has become **more difficult for individuals to borrow money on Bonaire**. That may be because since July 1st new laws have come into force and the Dutch Financial Markets Authority (AFM) is checking whether money lenders observe the new rules regarding lending money to individuals. They do this to protect the public.



The finance companies that want to lend money must make sure that people will not end up with financial problems if they borrow money or add to the amount already owed. The institution should ask for information about a person's financial situation before deciding whether to lend money. It is for the public's protection that banks, loan companies and other lenders are cautious.

Financial companies must also ensure that they do business fairly and that they are not used for money laundering, fraud or corruption. Furthermore, banks and other financial institutions must be licensed by the AFM or DNB to be active in the Dutch Caribbean. Without a license they are illegal and should not accept savings or lend money. For more information check out: http://www.cn.dnb.nl/nl

The new Parliament to be elected will take office on November 2.

► Last week's gloomy windless day was a reminder that hurricane season is here again. While Bonaire has not been hit by a major hurricane in living memory it suffers weather effects like wind reversals, storm swells and calms when they pass the island. Last week the Colorado State University (CSU) Hurricane Forecast Team increased its overall seasonal forecast slightly last Friday, while still calling for a slightly below average remainder of the season due to the likely development of El Niño.

The Team is now predicting a total of 14 named storms with six becoming hurricanes and two becoming major hurricanes (Saffir/Simpson category 3, 4 or 5) with sustained winds of 111 miles per hour or greater.

► MIDDELBURG—The European Nether-

lands' only variety of coral, "Dead man's thumb," has reappeared in the Oosterschelde in



Zeeland province, having appeared to have died out in 2011. *Alcyonium digitatum* likes strongly flowing, cold sea water and seemed

to have died out in 2010 and early 2011. Scientists said this could be because of the warming of the seas. It is also sea warming that is stressing the Caribbean Netherlands corals.

Divers reported seeing an increasing number of them, press reports stated. Dead man's thumb is so called because it is white and shaped like a thumb.

- ▶ Last Monday morning 24 students from Bonaire, eight from St. Eustatius and three from Saba arrived in Holland to begin their advanced studies. Approximately 25 other BES Island students chose to study elsewhere: about half in Curaçao, the remainder in the US, Aruba and South America.
- ▶ Historian and archivist, Boi Antoin, is asking for volunteers to help with his Bonaire Historical Foundation. Boi has an incredible library of books, photos, videos and other memorabilia of the island from the earliest times and he needs help in sorting and archiving. It would be a fascinating job. Under the new structure the regional police force and fire department fall under the responsibility of

the Ministry of Security and Justice as of January 1, 2013. It will consist of both the Police Corps in Holland and the Caribbean Netherlands Corps.

There are several identifiers on the uniform. The **white shirts** give recognition and visibility to the police officer. For the white shirts to keep white the police are making arrangements for laundry services

The second component on the Caribbean Netherlands' police uniform is the **new sleeve emblem** with the names of the three islands -Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba- embroidered in white. The third identifier is the **emblem design**. The **sword of justice** is symbolically represented together with **three stars** representing the islands. The stars are on the emblem shield rendering their relative geographic location. The **background is blue** representing the sea and ocean around the three islands.



First Bonaire Vote

n September 12th people on Bonaire will get their first chance to vote in Dutch Parliamentary elections as a result of the 2010 integration with The Netherlands.

According to RCN Head of the Communications, Lucia Beck, a Parliamentary information campaign already underway will focus on four themes. The people will be informed of the tasks and role of the Sec-

ond Chamber, the ballots, voting by proxy,

when to vote and the list of candidates.

Although RCN is charged with informing the public, the campaign was coordinated with the island governments. The three island governors met several times before the plan was drawn up. They charted which data are important for the people and these wishes were taken into consideration.

RCN is not responsible for the organization of the elections, said Beck.

This article is to provide an overview of the Dutch political system. The next edition of *The Reporter* will have details of how and where to vote.

Dutch politics have some overlap with Belgian, German and Scandinavian politics, however, the Dutch political system is unique and has features not seen anywhere else. The Dutch elect only their legislative bodies; all executives are nominated by the Crown.*

Dutch elections are based on proportional representation. A party that gets 7% of the national vote gets 7% of the seats in the national parliament. It does not matter where these votes were cast; there are no electoral districts.

Proportional representation allows small parties to be represented in parliament, which is considered a Good Thing.

Parliament and The Three Large Parties

The Dutch parliament has 150 seats, and 76 are necessary for a majority (and a viable government coalition).

A government coalition consists of two of the three large parties. Until 1994 that was enough; thereafter the two large parties had to invite a third, smaller coalition party to obtain a majority.

The three large parties are:

- left-wing PvdA (labour; social-democrat)
- centrist CDA (Christian-democrat)
- right-wing VVD (liberal)

Government Formation

After elections, the largest party takes the initiative and selects another large party (as well as, nowadays, a smaller one). If they can reach an agreement, a new government is formed. If, after protracted negotiations, the largest party is unable to form a government, the second-largest can have a try.

I thought it would be a good idea to go abroad for a year. I was planning on backpacking through Australia – like everybody else, ha! But when I came to Bonaire in September 2000 for a week, I thought 'No way, Australia. I'm going to stay here for a year!' I'd fallen in love with Bonaire instantly!

Back in Holland I applied for a job with Maarten Maartense's notary's office in Bonaire, but he had no vacancy. How-

66 n 2000 I graduated with a degree it was just my books and me, except for ▲ in Dutch Law from the University my girlfriends' card club on Tuesday directed learning. I find it still amazing that I had so much perseverance, but yeah, it was the only way to become a notary! For two years I flew up and down to Holland eight times to do exams. I started in 2006 and in August 2008 I graduated. But all in all, this study was easier because I'd already worked in the field and many cases were very familiar. Nevertheless, it was a milestone when I was qualified and became a notary.

The fun part about this office is that it's

ever, soon after, I found a job in the personnel department of Plaza Resort and I came to Bonaire. I was 26 years old. When the plane landed it felt like coming home and when I called my mom I told her so. Much later she told me, 'That was the moment I knew I'd lost you.' Well in a way she was right, because fairly soon after I came here I knew that this stay wasn't going to be a short intermezzo...

I worked for one year at the Plaza and I had a nice time there, but I missed working in my professional field. So again I applied to the notary's office and this time Maarten did have a job for me. It was meant to be because he had put an ad in a Dutch newspaper but didn't get any serious responses. It was March 2002 and I started working as a notary lawyer.

I liked my work, I really enjoyed it and in 2005, after working at the notary's office for three years, I was authorized to deputize for the notary. That was an extra step. But then I was confronted with a problem I'd pushed aside for quite some time: I'd done the wrong study. I'd done Dutch Law, but for this job it should have been Notary Law, so I picked up the right study this time – also a university study.

Fortunately I had many credits because of my first study, but I still had to do 18 subjects... at home, by myself. My social life stopped completely and for two years

the only one on the island and everything passes through here. In Holland there are very large offices and many of them are specialized. But here you get everything: from an old local lady who comes in to make her last will and testament to a developer who's going to erect an entire residential neighborhood and everybody and everything in between. Most of the time people come for a happy occasion: they buy their first house or they are finally realizing their dream of starting up their own business. Of course there are sad cases as well, but that's also part of the job.

Here we work with seven people, including myself and an eighth person will be joining us soon. It's a great team. I have wonderful colleagues! Law on the island is for the greatest part the same as in Holland and the things that are different from Holland, the typical Antillean things, I've learned through practical ex-

Also, Maarten was an excellent mentor and teacher. I've learned much from him as well. In the back of my mind there was always this vague idea that I would succeed him when he would retire but when he was diagnosed with lung cancer we never really discussed it although I think he had faith in me. A couple of months after he passed away my company took

over his company - which means that the something they've been waiting for, for a personnel stayed with me and that I bought the inventory. I didn't have any guarantees though because I wasn't sworn in by the Queen yet and to be appointed I had to apply for the job like everyone else. It was a gamble because if I hadn't gotten the job the company would have been useless. In total there were nine candidates. I have to mention that they sought a successor to Maarten and... I was appointed, but at the same time they were also looking for a second notary. The fact is that before 10-10-10, the Antilles was one country and people could use any notary who was established within the Antilles, but after 10-10-10, I became the only notary for the BES islands and there is no choice and no competition - not a favorable situation according to The Hague, and so a second

long time.

My next challenge and I think that it's quite bold of me," she laughs, "is that I'm going to build a new office across from RCN and the *kadaster* (land registry office) on the same side of the road. I am the first female notary on Bonaire and of course I'm proud of it. I really think it's

When I don't work, I read or I go to the sea. I've got four dogs, two land turtles and a great group of girlfriends. I love to be at home; it's something I simply enjoy. I don't go out very often. Bonaire has become very busy, especially during the years the island was booming many more houses have been built and there are also many more cars and... there's a lot of anxiety among the people and I find that

notary's office needed to be established and it's coming.

Since the economic crisis there's less work, especially when it comes to real estate. Of course there are other deeds which are still being executed, but it has become much quieter. In spite of this situation, The Hague has decided to make an exception for Saba and Statia and they are not allowed to use our office. They have to go to St. Martin. It's a bit strange because people from here cannot execute a deed on Curação anymore like they could before 10-10-10 and neither can someone from Curação execute a deed here like they could before."

Aniek Schouten is a wise and kind person. She's thoughtful but she also has a natural flair and charm. She has the ap*pearance of a model – she's very tall and* very slim and elegant - but you feel she's solid and serious and absolutely dedicated to what she's doing.

"The best thing about this job is the diversity," she smiles. "You meet all kinds of people from all walks of life, not only people buying houses, but for instance also people who finally get a lot of long-lease land from the government,

very sad. I know Bonaire from before the big economic boost and in spite of the fact that so many things have changed, I am still in love with the island and its people. I've travelled frequently since I moved here and I still have a long list of places that I want to see and for that Bonaire is perfectly situated. From here it's easy to travel to North and South America and all of the Caribbean. But," she smiles, "for the time being I can't go. We're starting to build in a couple of months and I've just been sworn in so I have to prioritize!

After being here for 11 years, I think I will go for another 11, Ku Dios ke (God willing). You know, something I still enjoy every morning when I get up is the balmy temperature, the birds that are singing, the fact that the sun is already up.

I still don't take it for granted. It's something I enjoy and appreciate every day."■ Story & photos by Greta Kooistra















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Bonairean Humor

CAN YOU KEEP A SECRET WHEN YOU ARE SELLING YOUR HOME? AND HOW DO YOU UNRAVEL THEM WHEN YOU ARE BUYING A HOME?

S ome of us by nature trust everyone, and then there are some of us who believe there is a conspiracy behind every statement made. And then there is the rest of us, the 'normal' ones. Although generally in life you will have greater peace of mind if your attitude is less suspicious, but when you are purchasing a piece of property it might be wise to ask some questions and not always accept the first answer that you get. Please allow me to explain why.

Under the current law on Bonaire when you are putting a property up for sale the seller has the duty to disclose any information about the property that might **not be visible by normal inspection**. For example, if there are some cracks in the outside walls that are clearly visible, that information does not have to be volunteered by the seller. However, if the seller replaced his tile floor last year and saw that these cracks go all through the floor, and just retiled over the cracks, then he should voluntarily divulge that information.

Other information that the seller needs to disclose are matters such as what type of sewage system the property has (septic tank, cesspit, the flowering banana tree under the kitchen window), or any issues with piping, plumbing and wiring and the

presence of white ants (termites). Known leaks that are not visible during the dry season need to be pointed out as well. This list goes on and on; anything not visible by normal inspection of which the owner is aware of needs to be disclosed. A good realtor will always have already gone through this exercise with his or her clients before listing the property and will divulge all information voluntarily, or at

Oh well, that is easy, the less suspiciously minded amongst us might say: "I do not have to ask any questions, all relevant information will be presented to me, because of this legal obligation." Well, that is where the policy makers have drawn a line because it is going to be very difficult to prove in hindsight what a property owner knew and what not. Therefore in the same law the obligation for the buyer to actively seek information about the property is included.

As a buyer it is easy to ask: "Are there any issues with leaks? Where is the septic tank located? Are there any issues with the plumbing, wiring or piping?" However, even when you get a seemingly honest answer, there is still no assurance that the seller is not withholding information.

Therefore it is wise to hire a professional to do a proper home inspection. and include the results of his or her inspection as a contingency in your offer on a property. The home inspector should know what he or she is doing and know where to look for common and less common issues with properties on Bonaire.

Small Parties



Five new small parties from the Netherlands have successfully registered in Bonaire to participate in the Lower Chamber Elections: Anti-Europe Party, Nederland Local, 50Plus Party, Libertarian Party and Democratic Politics Turning Point. The Anti-Europe Party and Nederland Local also submitted a list of candidates on Bon-

*The Kingdom of the Netherlands is a constitutional monarchy whose crown is hereditary in the House of Orange-Nassau. Current head of state is Queen Beatrix. (The Netherlands has had female Heads of State since 1890)

Formally the Queen appoints the prime minister and the government, but since the 1880s or so it has been custom that this government has a majority in parliament. In practice the Queen wields little power. How much her personal opinions matter is not known; in fact, how much influence she has is one of the few remaining palace secrets.

She only participates actively in politics just after the elections, when a new government is being formed. She appoints the politicians who take the lead in this process, and she replaces them by others if that becomes necessary. $\blacksquare G.D.$

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

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Can we Save our Monument

"Because again, after being away one and a half years, I have seen that more (historical) homes have been torn down, especially along the coastline..."-W.G.

n the 27 of July a symposium about the Monuments of Bonaire, financed by The Netherland's Architecture Fund, was held in the Government Executive Office. The main topic was the question: "Where are we today with the monuments of Bonaire?" (Reporter Aug.3-17, 2012). There was a follow-up on the 2nd of August, again in the government office, but this time with the Lt. Governor, Lydia Emerencia in the leading role.

The Governor invited Willem van Hees (Openbaar Lichaam Bonaire, Director Bedrijfsvoering en Ondersteuning), Jonathan Jukema (director R&O) and myself, Wilna Groenenboom, for a follow-up: "What steps do we need to take to save the monuments of Bonaire as soon as possible?"

A lot of work has been done already, all by a few people, mostly in their spare time: people like Alca Sint Jago (R&O), Bert Nijland (head of Legal Affairs) and Hans Rietveld of Stichting Monumentenzorg Bonaire. Hans has walked almost every street of Bonaire to make an investigation of all the potential monuments of Bonaire. This investigation led to a list of more than 600 buildings which we can find on the governmental site, (Openbaar Lichaam Bonaire, List of R.O.B.-Ruimtelijke Ontwikkelingsplan Bonaire, established on 8 October 2010, annex 3 "Concept list of the protected monuments of Bonaire"). And with the right laws we can really protect and save the history and culture of these monumental building on Bonaire.

The Monument Symposium was intended to involve people and let them become more aware of present state of affairs and that especially those houses no longer being lived in are in great danger and can't wait very much longer to be preserved. And some of them show us that they, like Pueblo Novo, built in 1885 (see photo below), more or less have given up the fight, and are in decay! Can we restore it? It is time for action!

The meeting with the Lt. Governor was very constructive. It was the first time that I witnessed the Lt. Governor Lydia Emerencia in action. This was an amazing experience for me. In a short and very effective way she informed herself about the present situation by asking questions, analyzing the answers, and at the same time taking notes about possibilities to set the roadmap for the future. And to have it all make sense for herself and us, she started to write it down on a flipchart with the wordsm "Once a teacher always a teacher!" (see photo above)

The roadmap that seems to be the one to follow has been applied to 15 houses and is:

Investigation - as soon as possible. The monument symposium and the follow up made us realize that more than 600 potential monuments are probably too many for a small island like Bonaire. A short time ago 15 houses were added to the monument list, mostly governmental buildings. Most of the 600 houses have private owners. Must we make a shorter list?

A group of specialists from different backgrounds should look at the list of 600 and decide whether the age, history, culture, quality and ensemble value (grouped with neighboring buildings) can give it the status of a monument.

Description - to reach the official status of "Monument" a description must be made of the house, done by an expert.

Followed by designating, contacting the


owner(s) and then finally starting with the conservation, and if there is money, restora-

The two meetings in the government offices made us all realize that there is al lot of work to do and that we must hasten the process that's already started if we want to save the last monuments of Bonaire for the future. Because again, after one and a half years, I have seen that more old houses have been torn down, especially along the coastline.

In this whole process manpower and money are the main bottlenecks. By walking, biking and driving over the island last month I found out that the second main problem is **awareness**. Some owners don't realize or don't want to realize the value of their house. I am not just talking about the financial side, but the historical and cultural value for all the residents of Bonaire and also for the tourists who enjoy Bonaire.

Communication - to take notice and listen to each other for all parties concerned (Government, house owners and specialists) are in my opinion the key to success! I have a good feeling about this because we all want the same thing. The blueprint is already there. Now we must work on the foundation. Quite some bricks have been already carried to the construction site. But now we need more construction workers and more stones, beams and in the end, beautiful tills to "finish the house." The first new steps have been taken in this process. I hope and think the will is there to finish this very important masterpiece of historical and cul-

or 15 years on Bonaire, Lize Singosemito-Amattabri, (photo above) has been preparing the distinct dishes of her native Suriname that she learned from watching her mother cook: "My mother loved cooking and I loved watching her cook. I watched her and I learned." t age 13, Lize and her younger sister finally begged their mother to be allowed to cook so they could gain her approval. Their first attempt was a vegetable soup that looked easy enough to make--water, vegetables, salt, sugar, some chicken. Her mother's review? "Not bad," she exclaimed after tasting and allowed them to move on to their next culinary adventure--fried fish with hot peppers—but she soon limited their cooking, saying, "You have to go to school; there will be plenty of time to learn to cook one you are married and have your own family."

Lize's mother would be proud of her daughter's cooking business, Warung Baro, started 15 years ago after her husband died when she needed to find a way to support her family. With the help of her three adult children, Lize manages the business without the assistance of any employees, which keeps costs manageable. Her schedule is a hectic one, though, with cooking and selling food on the weekend, shopping and looking for bargains on ingredients during the week ("Everything is so expensive now," she complains), and taking orders for catering all week long.

As for the food, it is ample, spicy, and delicious for a reasonable price. One of

the most popular items on the menu is nasi-rames, a combination of noodles, fried rice, crispy potatoes, vegetables, chicken, with a home-made sate sauce. Lize fries her own peanuts and flavors the sate with her "secret" ingredient: prawn-flavored paste that she gets from Curação. Another scrumptious treat is chicken livers with peppers (that I frankly could not get enough of). Roti is another special from Lize's kitchen; however, these must be made to order because they are fairly labor-intensive. In fact, often Lize must ask a friend down the street to make the "roti" (pancake) while she makes the fillings, especially when many are ordered. The Indonesian version of the egg roll is loempia for which Lize makes her own dough and sweet and sour sauce. To complete the meal is pisang-goreng, batter-fried plaintain with just a hint of spice. Essential to all of Lize's dishes are spices that can't be easily found in large quantities on Bonaire (like turmeric), so Lize either makes shopping trips to Curação or has visiting family members bring them from Suriname.

For Lize, every day is one of preparation: "It's a lot of hard work, but I love cooking..it's in my heart." But don't look for her to open a restaurant in town anytime soon because there are too many expenses for rent, power, water, employees, etc., which is one of the reasons she thinks a number of restaurants have closed recently. Besides she prefers to cook in her own kitchen where "it's a good living because we are all helping one another." ■ Story & photo by Pauline Kayes

Saving Bonaire Forests

B onaire's forests are struggling. Historic felling and the introduction of goats and donkeys have left our island with few large trees. This is a problem for Bonaire's Yellow-shouldered Amazon Parrot (Lora) which relies on large trees for food and nest sites. Large trees also trap water and hold soil. Without trees these flow out of the system and young trees find it even harder to grow.

Saving and restoring Bonaire's forests means discovering what we have left. Echo Foundation, in collaboration with local youth groups, including STINAPA's Junior Rangers, are beginning by mapping eight parrot-important tree species. Having been taught to recognize these eight species, teams head out armed with GPS units and Android phones. They photograph each tree, record their positions, their size and any signs of animals. Then back in town, the data that was collected using the phones is uploaded to a dynamic online map, letting other people see the trees Bonaire has left.

The map shows where trees are, and where they are lacking. Using this information we can direct habitat restoration to the areas that need it most and have the best chance of restoring Bonaire.

Parrot

ver the past months, 111 parrot (Lora) chicks and native parakeets (Prikichis) that were confiscated on Bonaire as a result of a tip to STINAPA and the police last year were successfully

Bonaire's Echo Foundation organized this, the world's first large scale release of Yellow-shoulder Amazon Parrots and parakeets. The chicks, some barely one week old, were found in a sorry state but only one chick died thanks to a massive outpouring of material assistance and round the clock volunteer labor .

In September 2011, the illegal dealer was given a suspended sentence of 10 months, 180 hours of volunteer work and a \$2000 fine. Since 1952 it's been against the law to steal, kill, or sell the protected parrots and their eggs or to have these birds as a pet on Bonaire (unless they have

been registered and have an ankle ring).

The illegal trade in parrot chicks is a huge problem worldwide and Bonaire is not an exception. The chicks are taken from the nest before they can fly and usually shipped to neighboring islands to be sold to unethical pet dealers. Echo-director Sam Williams said that during the time he was studying the Loras, one out of three parrot chicks was illegally taken from the nest. Echo Foundation works for the protection of Bonaire's endangered Lora species among other things.

Massive Turn Out for Dive Friends Bonaire Clean Up Dive



n Saturday, July 21, an army of volunteers gathered at Dive Friends Bonaire at Dive Inn to clean up underneath Bonaire's South Pier. Even though the weather was a bit rainy, the Dive Inn was filled to capacity with local and visiting volunteer divers overflowing out into the parking area.

Asko Zuidam of Dive Friends Bonaire addressed the group of 115 divers and explained what trash should be recovered and what should be left behind, as well as how to keep from damaging any marine animals. Sue Willis from the Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) program gave an explanation of how to safely remove fishing line and announced the launch of a new

project to help Bonaire's sea turtles. The Fishing Line Project is running with sponsorship from the Dutch Caribbean Nature Alliance (DCNA) and aims to reduce the amount of fishing line, hooks, nets and other debris found on Bonaire's reefs; items which pose a great threat to Bonaire's endangered sea turtle population.

After the briefing, the divers entered the water, at Playa Cha Cha Cha and swam over to South Pier. A snorkel team of children, guided by local volunteer Walt Bentsen, participated by picking up debris in the shallows along the shoreline. When collection bags were brought to the surface, Dive Friends crew and volunteers checked once again to be sure no marine creatures would be removed from the water. **Press release**

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uilty as charged or innocent until proven guilty? What happens when one IS proven guilty and is sentenced to jail on Ronaire?

The answer is incarceration for the bad guys in the state-owned prison named JICN Justitiele Inrichting Caribisch Nederland (Correctional Institution Dutch Caribbean, Bonaire location).

According to the RCN website, the Correctional Institution Dutch Caribbean, Location Bonaire (JICN) performs penalties and custodial measures on behalf of the Minister of Justice after the verdict of a judge is imposed. The house of detention on Bonaire was refurbished and expanded with more cells in order to keep up with the need.

I have been talking to the head of the department at JICN and I came to understand that on Bonaire the prison has four departments: Care, Youngsters, Females and Externals.

Those in the Care Department require extra care and attention while the Youngsters are a blend of late adolescents and young adults. The Females are housed together, segregated from the male inmates. The Department of Externals hosts all the remaining prisoners who do not belong to either of the groups mentioned before.

JICN considers the Care and Youngsters as special departments because they need to be handled in a special way and therefore also have their own specific programs which are different from the other departments.

This spring 2012, JICN and OICN Onderwijs Instituut Caribisch Nederland (Education Institute Dutch Caribbean) have teamed up with an educational program for the inmates.

A Department Head at JICN, Ms D. Raphaela, stated, "We here at JICN find it is necessary to invest in the independency of our inmates. We would like to teach them and show them how to deal with their issues so that when they get out, the reintegration process will not be so hard on them."

She continued, "They have been given support, insight and basic linguistic knowledge in order to enhance their opportunities in getting a (better) job and increase their

chances while going back into the society after being in

JICN also informed me that their students have also learned to survive and focus on their self-reliance in a new positive way rather than in a usually negative way as they were used to.

Ms. Raphaela elaborated: "We would like to contribute by investing where we clearly see a need and hunger for education by our students.'

I also spoke to Mr Gilberto "Junny" Vos, director of OICN, who shared his view on this collaboration with JICN.

Mr. Vos said, "We have been teaching the students of JICN some essential basic knowledge of Social Skills, English, Dutch, Papiamentu and Computer Skills."

He elaborated, "I've composed this program because nowadays we cannot get a job if we do not know some basics about how to use a computer. And as for the languages, Bonaire has Dutch as an official language next to two important other languages which are Papiamentu for the local market and English which has become the trade language.'

The educational program started in March 2012 and was completed in August 2012.

During this period, OICN held educational sessions three times a week at JICN. There were two groups and most of the students attended class regularly. The students will receive their certificates soon.

JICN was pleased to see how the inmates changed for the better and that they really learned new things that could be very useful in their near future. Ms. Raphaela specified, "It surprised me that they were open to education and actually actively participated in the classes provided by OICN with enthusiasm. We could see that they have wanted this educational program and we are proud to announce that it has been a success because the students were truly motivated."

As for Mr Vos of OICN, he shared his opinion. "This program has come to a successful end and I will feel honored to hand them their certificates shortly personally.' And he added, "Although this program ends, I would like to continue to help the students of JICN by offering them the new program entitled 'Explore New Horizons' where more classes will be taught."

The certificate that the students of JICN will receive shortly proves their goodwill, motivation, studiousness, and will to change for the better.

Both JICN and OICN think that the students earned their certificates by working hard, attending classes, actively participating and they truly merit this recognition.

When these students get out of JICN, they will feel less frightened upon taking a second chance educational program because they have already fulfilled a similar course. This will decrease their reluctance while wanting to learn more but still hesitant in asking for help or acknowledging its essence for a better future.

I personally believe that everyone deserves a second chance in life. Even though I agree that one must have done something really bad to end up in jail, I also have faith that that same person would have had time to rethink his/her actions while sitting out the imposed sentence. Furthermore, education is power and knowledge is priceless, so why not make the most of it while staying at the JICN facilities. If one is willing to learn new things, the sky is the limit and no one ever stops learning. Each and every one of us learns new things every single day. Thus, felon or saint, keep up the good work and make sure you WILL be prepared for to-

day's tough labor market when you are a free citizen again.

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

Flamingo Tongue Snails Cyphoma gibbosum are common in Bonaire and feed primarily on gorgonians (sea rods, sea whips, etc.). These small critters are often Snap a picture and appreciate the Flacollected by scuba divers due to their beautiful and alluring pattern. What looks exposed internal beauty that we are so to be an intricately colored shell of yellow-orange painted with irregularly shaped spots outlined in black, is actually the mantle or soft skin layer of the snail!

The intriguing coloration of the mantle that envelopes the all-white/apricot colored shell is used not only to make the shell, but also for nutrient exchange as well as a defense mechanism to warn predators of toxic chemicals acquired from munching on gorgonians. While the shells are still pretty, many divers unknowingly gather these living organisms in hopes of a spotted memento only to

A BLUE MOON AND MORE



here are some hard to spot items in August skies as well as the easiest. First the tough ones.

Around 10 pm this month you may be able to spot Brochi's Cluster and the double star, Albireo, in Cygnus.

By that time, 10 pm, the constellations, Cygnus, Lyra and Aquila, will have risen well up into the south-east. Their three brightest stars - Deneb, Vega and Altair respectively—make up the "Summer Triangle." If you sweep with binoculars one third of the way from Altair towards Vega, you should spot Brocchi's Cluster - usually called "The Coathanger" as this is exactly what it looks like, but seen upside down. It's not thought to be a real cluster but an "asterism" which is a chance grouping of stars. Not far to the upper left of Brochi's cluster is, perhaps, the most beautiful double star to observe in a small telescope. It is the star Albireo which forms the head of the swan. At magnitude 3 it is the least bright of the stars that make up a part of Cygnus called the Northern Cross. However, when seen through a small telescope, it is seen to be made up of two stars showing a beautiful color contrast. The brighter 3.1 magnitude com- that the final full Moon could still be ponent (which is itself a double star) is amber in color whilst the 5.1 magnitude companion star is blue-green in color. With a separation of 35 arc seconds the

pair can be easily split even under poor seeing conditions.

Also in mid August you may be able to spot the planet Neptune. The planet Neptune is closest to the Earth on the 24th of August, so it's a very good time to look for it. Around New Moon on the 17th of August will be best as the skies will be darkest. Neptune lies in the constellation Aquarius, not the easiest to find this year. At magnitude 7.8, you should be able to spot it with binoculars and a telescope might even show a bluish disk just 2.4 arc seconds across.

Perhaps the easiest body to spot in the night sky is the Moon. This month we have two full Moons and the second is often called a **Blue Moon.** It is not totally obvious why. One thought is that in the 19th and early 20th centuries, the primary Farmer's Almanac listed the third full moon as a Blue Moon when there were four full moons in a quarter (normally three) and may have highlighted these using the color blue. For example, in the three-month summer season, the first full Moon would be called the early summer Moon, the second the midsummer Moon and the third the late summer Moon. So called the late summer Moon, if there were four full Moons, the third was called a Blue Moon.



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


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
