he Netherlands'' new King Willem-Alexander and Queen Máxima will visit the Caribbean part of the **Dutch Kingdom mid-November** 2013, the Dutch Government Information Service RVD announced last week. No specific date was mentioned, but it is certain that the King and his wife will visit all six Dutch Caribbean islands. In November 2011 Crown Prince Willem-Alexander and Princess Máxima joined Queen Beatrix on her last visit to the islands as Queen.

▶Pachi's Place, the brothel officially known as the Hotel Paradise Inn. has been closed for six months and the Men's Heaven "replacement" had its permit denied. Based on open letters and discussions there is concern in the community that uncontrolled prostitution will grow and that young girls will become targets for men seeking sex for money. Meanwhile, The Amsterdam city council has decided to press ahead with increasing the minimum age for prostitution to 21 and will also introduce early morning closing hours for all brothels.

The "Liduinakoor" choir from The Hague will give several performances in Bonaire between March 9 and 17. The choir will add luster to Catholic church services in Rincon and Kralendijk and also perform at the Mariadal hospital and at a benefit open-air concert in Rincon.

The mixed choir has existed for many years and has always been associated with the St. Liduina parish dating from 1915 in The Hague.

Their repertoire consists of church chamber music that spans a period from the Middle Ages to present-day liturgical music. At the invitation of Rinconero Eddy Anthony, the Liduina Choir is now making a special trip to Bonaire. Born and bred in Rincon, Anthony is one of the tenors.

▶ The Classical Music Board Bonaire proudly presents Harold Martina in concert March 14th at 8pm at Plaza Resort

Harold Martina is considered the top pianist from Antillean soil. He was the first student of the municipal conservatory of Vienna who graduated with the highest honor of Summa Cum Laude.

In 1975 he was given a Dutch knighthood for his musical excellence. Harold Martina has performed as soloist with various symphony orchestras in the US, Europe and South America and has accompanied famous soloists.

Martina is an eminent veteran (born in 1934) who hasn't lost any of his virtuosity.

It is a great honor for Bonaire to receive this legendary pianist.

The main concert will be on Thursday March 14 at 8pm and he will give a concert on Friday March 15. See poster on page 10 for more details.

As license plate numbers near the 10,000 mark **chop shops** seem to be flourishing on Bonaire. One friend of ours who lives on a busy street has even given up owning cars because several of his were stolen and discovered stripped of parts before being found in the *mondi*. Now he just rents.

Car theft is a relatively new phenomenon for the island. It wasn't long ago that a missing car was just labeled "joy riding" and was found intact far from where it had been parked. Most of the cars get stripped of parts by the time what's left of them is found. Some believe these stolen parts are sent off island, but it's more likely they end up in junk yards where used vehicles and spare parts are bought and sold.

Police are aware that some people buying these parts are often unaware they have been stolen, but others know full well they have been removed from stolen cars. It is illegal to knowingly buy stolen parts and if the parts are identified they will be returned to the owners. To prevent any embarrassment or problems get receipts from the sellers along with the packaging and papers that usually accompany the product. Don't cooperate with fencing. You could become a victim.

▶ The Foundation Patient Interests BES (Stichting Patiëntenbelangen BES, SPBBES) was launched in Bonaire last week to represent the interests of all medical patients on Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba in the light of the arbitrary and ill conceived cuts in the government sponsored medical insurance for the islands.

SPB-BES, with George Soliana as President, will begin work immediately to provide a voice for patients in the rapidly changing area of medical-care coverage.

"Our primary goal is to help assure that the medical care available to the citizens of all three islands continues at a level that meets the real needs of our people," said Soliana, as he signed the incorporation papers for the new foundation.

▶The CTO (Caribbean Tourism Organization) reported that Caribbean tourism is back to pre-recession levels, with visitors from Canada and the US

giving a boost to tourist arrivals. The Caribbean welcomed 25 million tourists last year, a near 5.5% rise over 2011, outpacing the rest of the world, which saw arrivals increase by 4%. Bonaire's tourist visits increased by 1.4% according to a TCB release. See related story on page 3. You can review the complete State of the Industry Report at www.onecaribbean.org.



► After more than 10 years of the Sunset Beach resort area being an eyesore, the government is taking steps to attract developers. Bonaire's Government Buildings Holding(BOG), the legal owner of the land, is looking for project developers via a tender offer. BOG is using the Curação firm, Heren 2 Caribbean BV, to help with the selection process. The 54,406-square-meter property has been divided into three parcels and an area that is to be accessible for the general public. However, precise details are not available and there is concern that the local people will not have very limited free access but would have to share the waterfront with tourist resorts. ▶From July 12 to 21, 2013, Bonaire will host the regional Caribbean games for Little League baseball, the "Serie del Caribe 2013" for the 11- and 12year-old age categories. The countries that are expected for certain are: Aruba, Curaçao, St. Maarten, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, St. Thomas and Bonaire. The organization also hopes for Antigua and Jamaica, but there will only be certainty about participation after the upcoming congress.

The games are estimated to cost Bonaire approximately US \$250,000, but Sports Commissioner Kroon says the funds are already budgeted.

▶ The Island Council of Bonaire unanimously approved an ordinance that regulates the official phonetic spelling of Papiamentu. The council also established the ordinance that regulates the use of Papiamentu in communication with government and other entities

St. Eustatius Commissioner Carlyle Tearr has drafted an unpopular action plan to remedy the situation concerning more than 60 neglected locked-up donkeys on his island. Statia's Greenfound

Foundation sounded the alarm about the suffering donkeys who were not being sufficiently fed and often without water in a letter to the editor published in *The Daily Herald* on February 13. Some of the animals had already died.

"While government is restricted in funds and wants to cut the herd from 60 to 20 or 30 it will, however, care for a herd of donkeys. The donkeys have already been moved to a new and bigger pasture," said Tearr. Marina Melis of Bonaire's Donkey Sanctuary travelled to St. Eustatius to review the situation. On the radio she emotionally declared that the civil servant in question should be fired! Reportedly she offered to care for about 30 of the donkeys in Bonaire if someone could come up with financial support.

▶ A group of Dutch detectives was sent to Bonaire to interrogate Ramonsito Booi and Burney El Hage, confirmed one of their attorneys, Everett Wilsoe. They scheduled five days to talk with Booi and three for El Hage.

In September last year the Joint Court of Justice issued an order to prosecute the duo, even though the Bonaire prosecutor saw no reason to because there is a good chance they may be found guilty. The charges regard a probe into possible fraud with the issuing of land by Booi and a mortgage for El Hage.

▶Between March 1 and August 31, 2013, interviewers from the Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) will conduct a Budget Survey (in Dutch: budgetonderzoek BO) on Saba, St. Eustatius and Bonaire.

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The budget survey is a sample survey of households conducted by the CBS. The research aims to map the spending of the households. Information from the budget survey is used, among other sources, when calculating inflation.

The budget survey is held every five years on Bonaire. The last budget survey was held in 2004/2005. On Bonaire 600 households will be involved, on Saba 315 and St. Eustatius 450.

Tourism- Bonaire's Lifeblood

An Editoria

I s enough attention and care being given to Bonaire's tourism, the lifeblood of the island's economy?

While it cannot be disputed that over the last few years Bonaire has seen considerable improvement in health care, sanitation and education, the island's infrastructure remains stressed and there are several ambitious plans for upgrades. All these facilities are expensive and must be paid for out of public funds or by grants from The Netherlands.

If the growth and development of tourism, the artery of our economy, falters then we have a big problem.

Years ago the government-owned company (N.V.), the Tourist Corporation Bonaire (TCB), was founded to take the lead to design, implement and coordinate the sales and marketing of tourism-related activity for the island.

A few weeks ago I wrote in *The Reporter* about my visit to a travel fair in the Netherlands. I was very unhappy with the pitiful representation of Bonaire at that event. A few days later I read about a strike of the TCB staff supported by its labor union.

Background: The TCB staff and its newly appointed head found it impossible to accomplish meaningful work because the TCB Board of Directors, in office slightly more than a year, interfered in their ability to function on a day-to-day basis. A few days later, all board members resigned "en bloc." The TCB's prime shareholder, Bonaire Holding Maatschappij (BHM), in the

person of Island Commissioner of Economic Affairs Burney El Hage, withdrew its support from them. The next week El Hage appointed former MCB bank executive and interim Lt. Governor, Orphaline Saleh, to lead a restructuring of the TCB and redefine its charter from a government corporation to a non-profit foundation (*stichting*). The foundation would include tourism industry stakeholders perhaps acting as a Polish Diet*. I missed the focus on producing what is needed desperately, a tourismoriented strategic plan!

The events of recent weeks are not a model of good governance. What a hassle: shareholder, board and staff all arguing. Who can do good job in such a situation?

Since Ronella Croes, recognized for her leadership, good relationship with BHM and buildup of cruise-ship tourism, left her post as TCB head three years ago for a more lucrative tourism position in Aruba TCB management has been a revolving door; first an interim director, then a project leader then a director who had weak support and left after a year. And now we have a new head of the TCB. I don't envy him.

But apart from all political turmoil there has long been a much more fundamental problem with our TCB tourist office.

For 10 years the TCB managed with an extremely frugal budget of around 2 million Antillean guilders. Then it was raised to \$1.6 million. The annual report called "government funding" indicates the bulk of it goes to fund of staff and offices in USA,

There is little left over to conduct needed marketing campaigns and consumer surveys. It's not surprising that the total number of visitors for 10 years has fluc-

tuated around 70,000 for the last five years. And that there is no money left to pay for top tourism management talent.

Should we worry about the quality of work of the TCB? After all we seem to have a good on-island staff and competent overseas representatives. Yes, we do have to worry about how the government of our island handles the TCB.

In recent years, and even today, the TCB is a managerial mess. False economy practiced by the institution that is the lifeblood of our economy has crippled Bonaire tourism competitively. I call it "penny wise and pound foolish."

But perhaps there is no money available? But there is! An example: the 70,000 "stayover" tourists, through the "room tax," contribute approximately \$2.8 million annually to the coffers of the island. Shouldn't that amount be fully available to our tourist office? That's just for starters. If you really want a good decisive marketing campaign and attract outstanding people add a few million dollars more. Recently Commissioner El Hage admitted that collection of


the room tax was lax and that perhaps only half that was due was being collected. But it is the responsibility of the government itself to collect that money and it most certainly can be a source of new funds. In a newspaper interview El Hage suggested raising the present budget by \$3 million in three years; that's \$1 million per year on top of the \$1.6 million actual budget.

Maybe that can be the source of the new funds. In a newspaper interview he suggested a budget of \$3 million was more realistic.

If government wants to be more active it should create incentives to increase the number of tourist facilities, add and improve flight connections. And decide to start a boosting campaign now to fill up the 10,000 airline seats currently empty in the present airlift capacity. That could mean an extra income stream of \$20 million to Bonaire and could discourage the airlines from cutting their flights. Does it really matter if the TCB is a government corporation or a foundation, considering the actions necessary?

The friendly employees of TCB are blameless. They do their best at their office. And last week it was announced that the TCB downtown office will be open through lunchtime. After all the sad TCB publicity in recent weeks it was gratifying to read a positive press release. ■ Guus Gerritsen

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Born on Bonaire, October 14th, 1952 – Iris Semeler

"My father was from Nort di Saliña, my mother from Antriol. We were five sisters and one brother. My father was a good painter and a shoemaker as well. Almost everybody would come to the house to have their shoes repaired. I still live in that house – the house in Nort di Saliña where I grew up as a child.

My dad was strict; we were not allowed to cut our hair - we had to let it grow long, just like our grandmother used to wear it - and lipstick wasn't an option either. I was daddy's girl - after school I would help him with the shoes, putting leather under water to make it supple so he could re-sole the shoes with it.

When I was 20 I started working for Radio Hooyer 3 as an announcer. Before I was hired I had to do a commercial for a stove, Magic Chef, for about 10 minutes and they recorded my voice and sent it to Curação. Once it was approved I started working - all by myself! At that time the radio was only broadcasting from 6 pm until 9 pm. Then Boeboei Cecilia (now at Bon FM) became the station manager and the radio started broadcasting from 8 am to 10 pm. I worked with Bòi Antoin, Rudy Domacassé and Donny Wout. We were the crew, it was fun! For two, three years we went on like that and then Boeboei and I stepped out.

I was living on Curação when my dad

gustinus Bookstore my son Javier was born in 1985. It was a difficult delivery, but he really is a fine boy now! I was a single mom and for the first two years of his life Javier went to my cousin Elsa Molina's during the daytime. Then I sent him to Curação to live with another cousin of mine because I didn't want him to go to crèche at such a young age. He stayed there for one year, then he came back to Bonaire to start kindergarten at the age of three.

To have a child... it was a beautiful thing. Presently Javier is working in communications at Mariadal. We don't see a lot of each other lately because he's busy with his work and sports and of course he has a life of his own with his partner Tazin and their beautiful little boy my first grandchild – Tyler, who was born on the 21st of September last year. I'm not babysitting yet, but I am certainly planning on doing so!

Many years ago, when I worked for Augustinus Bookstore on Curação, the bookstore set up the 'Kontest di Fli' – the kite competition – there. Then, together with Josephien and Eugenio de Jong, I had the idea to start it up on Bonaire. The first time was in 1979, with 75 kids who just came to fly their kites at the field where Kooyman is now. The following year it became a competition. From there we went on. It was something totally new

had a terrible accident. He was painting the house of Mr. Hernandez, the notary, and when he came down the ladder, he fell and landed with his neck onto barbed wire. He died practically on the spot. It was December 28, 1977. It was the blackest page in my life. A week before, my father had called me to ask if I was coming home for Christmas, but I was planning on coming to Bonaire for New Year's and that's what I'd told him. So, I came for my dad's funeral. He was only 68 years old.

Then I returned to Bonaire and applied for a job at the Augustinus Bookstore on Kaya Grandi. I started working there in 1978 with Josephien Trinidad-Piar. Together we ran the bookstore for 12 years, then Josephien moved on and set up something for herself while I stayed on for three more years. Then they closed the store down and six months later, in August 1993, I opened Flamingo Bookstore at the same location, but this time it was my own business. I've been here for about 34years!

She laughs "This bookstore is not just a bookstore; it's a social meeting point. Once the customers come in, they don't want to leave because they meet their friends and acquaintances here and they discuss family matters, world and local politics and health issues. They buy a newspaper, but they also read it here and comment on it. I have more than six

During the years I worked at the Au-

and lots of people came to watch the competitions. It was a huge success. Every year we had a different jury and the event kept on growing. Sometimes we had 260 participants, including contestants from Curação! Now we stick to 200 contestants, otherwise it takes too long. We also have themes like who has the most beautiful, the biggest, the smallest, the most original or the strangest kite. And some people take months to build their kites.

This year, on April 7th, we celebrate 35 years of the Kontest di Fli. All those years I've been the coordinator, but there is also a committee we cannot do without: Jimmy, Igmar, Sherrel, Javier, Achibald, Rina, Stephen, Arthur, Gerald, Hubert and Kurban and... next year I won't be coordinating anymore. I will hand it over to Gerald Victorina. But Flamingo Bookstore will keep on organizing the event... until I don't know when!

I was also the secretary of the Sentro di Bario di Nort di Saliña. I did that for seven years, then I started working as a volunteer for the 60+ Club, and now I have been the chairman of the board for over 15 years! Our group is called 'Sesenta Plus Flor di Orkidia' and we and only we have our own clubhouse, 'Centro Orkidia Professor Alejandro Saleh,' next to the bakery in Nort di Saliña. We get together four times a month. People come for a 'charla' – an informative meeting – a dance, gymnastics or a lecture, but we also organize activities like we invite Mariadal to come and take people's blood

pressure or give them a flu vaccination. There are about 36 members from all over it together with Mr. Kuks and we're getthe island, aged 60 to about 90 years old, and we have six volunteers. And of course every one who wants to make a donation or wants to become a sponsor of the 60+ Club is more than welcome!

I think that our club is important because the situation of the elderly is not good. Everything has become so expensive and there are also many more charges and taxes introduced. So, if you're older and you've got your own little house, life has become almost unaffordable. It is very difficult for the elderly to pay for all those expenses, and many times they need to ask their family for help, which is not a nice position to be in.

Well, in 2002 I was chosen 'Woman of the Year.' In 2004 I was invited together with Bòi Antoin to participate in the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Kingdom Statute in The Netherlands. About five years ago I was honored to become a Knight in the Order of Orange Nassau, and three years ago, on December 15th, on the 'Dia di Nort di Saliña, I was also distinguished because of all that I did for the people and...yes, I am proud

Lately, from 4 -6 pm on Sunday afternoons, I have my own radio show with Radio Digital. It's called 'Orange Vitamins' and I'm only play songs from

Dutch artists, and I only speak Dutch. I do ting a lot of feedback from local people who really enjoy the show.

I love music, all sorts of music and I love to dance too! I also love to cook kuminda stoba (stew) the local way - and then I invite my friends to come over. I live alone and I have to admit that the biggest part of my social life takes place at work. Six days a week, Monday through Saturday, from 7 am until 6 pm I am in my store. I don't close during lunch hours because then the people also come in—to cool off from the hot street, or to wait until they start working again. It's cozy and very entertaining, but also an opportunity to share your feelings and thoughts with others. The warmth of the people – that is and always will be what Bonaire means to me.

You see, the way Bonaire has changed and still is changing rapidly, has given me this miserable and uneasy feeling like... I want to flee... but where to go... I live in the house where my parents raised me,

but everything else is different now and I feel very insecure about the future..."■

Tourism History

PArt 2 of a Series

In 1940, the Germans invaded and occupied Holland. Although far away





from the continent that was torched in World War II, the islands of the Colony Curação were drawn in as well. As soon as war broke out in Europe, the inhabitants of Aruba and Curação who were of German or Austrian nationalities (Jews as well!) or who were sympathetic to the National Socialist ideology of the Germans were singled out and picked up as soon as The Netherlands capitulated to the Germans. This was done to prevent them from becoming a "fifth column" on the islands; they could undertake sabotage against the oil refineries which were vital in supplying petrol for the allied air forces. Together with sailors of German vessels that happened to be in the ports of the islands, they were first incarcerated in local prisons. That was on May 10,

Soon after, however, they were transported to the island of Bonaire. There they

were put up in local schools- the women and children separated from the men - a total of 461 persons, a migration unprecedented for the island of Bonaire. Most of the 107 automobiles on the island were required for the transportation of the new "guests" who were not very willing to cooperate, which goes without saying! Dutch marines had to be brought in to assist in the guarding of the prisoners. In July of that year, the 220 imprisoned shipmates were transferred to Jamaica, and for the remaining prisoners an internment camp was built along the shore, south of the capital, Kralendijk. It consisted of four parts, separated from each other: one for German men, one for Dutch men, one for women and children and one for the guards. They all lived in wooden barracks. Later the families were reunited in small dwellings inside the camp. After 1941, the tight rules inside the camp were gradually eased. Some prisoners could even work, outside as well as inside the camp. And they were allowed to build their own houses on the island. At the end of the war, most prisoners left the island. Some of them decided to stay, some married and their offspring still live on the island.

Someone who was sent to the internment camp by mistake was Jules Heitkönig, a Dutch citizen who had left Holland in 1938 and had found a job at a jewelry store in Aruba. On May 10, 1940, he was arrested and transported to Bonaire just because of his German last name. After the war he remained on the island. He married a local woman and started a family. Jules engaged



in several commercial and social activities. A goldsmith by trade and an amateur photographer who ran a photo shop, he was also known for selling souvenirs made out of genuine Bonairean materials, like reef coral and conch shells. Products of his craftsmanship were regularly used as gifts for visiting members of the Dutch royal family.

The presence of the internment camp in the early 40s brought a lot of commotion as well as social and commercial activities. Construction materials were needed for a military camp, housing for officers and a hospital had to be built. And military personnel had wages to spend so there was a remarkable surge of prosperity on the island

After the prisoners left in 1945, the barracks of the internment camp were transformed into a hotel accommodation: Hotel Zeebad (Sea Bath), later renamed Flamingo

Beach Club, the first tourist resort on the island. The former hospital was made into a restaurant. The hotel opened its doors in 1952. This was the beginning of the construction of a series of hotels on the island in the decades that followed and the development of its tourism industry.

In this way the tiny island of Bonaire made history: an internment camp was transformed into a seaside resort! ■ *Evert Bongers*

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Who Will Fix Our Planes?



B onaire's Aviation Maintenance Technician School needs a new home. Their building on the former Sister Maria Hoppner property has been sold and will be converted into an alcohol addiction recovery facility.

The successful grass roots operation was begun by Jacinto "Boeboei" Frans on January 14, 2008, with 12 students in the day school and eight at night. Currently it has 15 day students, with eight in their final year. Thirteen have already graduated, eight already are working for local airlines like DAE and Tiara Air. Three are trainees. It is a model for providing education to fill a need on the island and offer an opportunity to youngsters. It's a private school with eight instructors. It doesn't get a subsidy from the government, but student loans are available. Talks have recently opened for merging the school with the Bonaire Community High School (SGB) advanced education "MBO" schools.

It's not an easy course. It takes 2½ years to complete and costs the student \$15,600. There's a six-month period of practical experience and 1,850 lessons which meet the requirements of the International Civil Aviation Organization.

Its students come from Aruba, Bonaire, Curaçao and St. Maarten. The school applied for the Dutch MBO level 4 qualification, which is equivalent to EASA (European Aviation Safety Authority License) and it was granted by the Dutch Minister of Education Culture ant Science. Exams are EASA exams. They don't target FAA certification because of Bonaire's closer connection to Europe. However, the school has an



agreement with an FAA school in Puerto Rico for future developments. The school's long range plan is to attract students from the Caribbean basin and even South America.

All the students who come from off -island live "on campus" (in 12 rooms) which is in the same building as where the classes are held. This is a big advantage for the students because they only get charged for their meals, electricity and water. And they have no problem with transportation to get to school. Students are tested before they are accepted and they have to be 17 or older. They even have an actual airplane that they work on to make airworthy.

What kind of building or facility does the school now need? Primarily it needs a hangar with the facilities to conduct classes and aircraft maintenance. It believes it can afford to handle a million euro mortgage. Can anyone help them? 

t was in the 30s of the last century that 1974) thought of creating his own artificial fishing lure. Those days Rapala fished for trout in the lakes of Finland, using live bait. In 1936 he made his first successful lure from local bark using a knife and some sandpaper. His fishing lure became popular and is now well known over the world.

In 1964 Rapala's fish and fillet knife was introduced. Today Rapala's factories develop and produce all kinds of fisherman's knives. The Rapala 126SP is a fine example of a reliable and affordable knife. The 126SP-model has a blade made of stainless steel. This flexible blade has a length of 150 millimeters or 6 inches. The thickness of the

blade is only one millimeter which makes the knife very suitable for following the skin and the bones of the fish. The handle is made of a dark red colored hygienic plastic and measures 120 millimeters. In the handle there is an 8-millimeter hole for an optional lanyard or cord. Unfortunately this stainless steel filet knife does not float. There are almost no knives known with floating capacities. This knife is really light and fits your right or left hand very well since it is absolutely symmetric and sharpened on both sides of the blade. For safety you can connect the lanyard to your wrist or connect the knife with a little piece of cork. The Rapala 126SP comes in a very basic sheath. When you get attached to the fillet knife it is better to create your own holster out of a piece of old leather or so. The razor blade sharp Rapala fillet knife is manufactured for the Rapala Corporation, Vaaksy, Finland, and made in China. The knife is for sale for a minimal \$8.90 and available at Budget Marine.

Chef Search Recompression Recognition



he recompression tank on Bonaire is the only hyper-modern facility for treat-■ ment of diving accidents and diabetic wounds in the ABC Islands," according to the chairman of the Foundation Recompression Tank Bonaire, Ruud Vermeulen. Forty-five patients were treated in the hyperbaric chamber of the Foundation last year. In total, they received 274 treatments. In most cases (37) it involved hyperbaric treatment of divers after a diving incident. The other patients (8) received hyperbaric

oxygen therapy to accelerate the slow healing process of wounds.

Medical Director Dr. Dick van der Vaart quoted these figures during a meeting of the more than 35 team members who are always on standby to assist and treat patients. There were also patients from Curação and Aruba among the 45 treated last year. He surprised seven volunteers with a certificate of merit for their exceptional dedication through the years. These included supervisors Malin Kayser, Pamela Teitel and Linda Baker, who've been doing this work for over 20 years, while Diana Nicolaas, Harold Kurban and Ronald Simonis were honored for being always available when needed. Maureen Mercera received a special mention because she, together with a patient involved in a serious diving accident in Curação last year who was flown to Bonaire for treatment, went to a depth of over 100 feet in the tank environment. A depth of 65 feet is normal, ■ Press release/ G.D.

SUNSET BEACH DEVELOPMENT OFFCOURSE

This is a copy of a letter sent on 28 February 2013 to Mr. John Soliano of Bonaire Overheidsgebouwen N.V. which oversees the management of island-owned land:

Dear John:

Sidney Manuel and I thank you for your time on Tuesday and for that of Sr. Anthony Nicolaas. As always it is a pleasure to meet with you. We appreciate your showing us the planned splitting of the Sunset Beach property although, as we made clear, we believe this is not at all in the best interests of the Bonairean community.

The main concern of Fundashon Playa Pùbliko is to assure full access and use of the marvelous beachfront of that property for tourists and for the entire Bonaire community. The plan that BOG has put forward falls far short from that.

Let me be specific about our concerns:

The area you have allotted to public beach is completely inadequate. You stated that it is approximately 50 meters wide (North to South) or only about 15% of the total beachfront) which is not sufficient to accommodate more than a small number of people at one time. Based on studies of carrying capacity for beaches around the world (e.g. Mauritius, Egypt, India, Tanzania etc) about 8 m2 is required for each person using a beach. This means that, even at this high density (for Bonaire) the proposed public beach could only accommodate a maximum of about 60 people (local and tourists) whereas the full 300+-meter beach could accommodate close to 400.

Your stated goal of allowing for local businesses to be developed there has no economic basis. If there is only a 50-meter-wide beach there would not be enough potential trade there to sustain a viable business whereas a 300+-meter long beach could easily do so.

Our definition of 'access' is far more expansive than yours. While you plan to provide strictly legal access to the whole beach, your own concept will restrict the kinds of activities local people can engage in for more than 85% of the beachfront, leaving only about 15% for the public and tourists.

We emphatically disagree with your concept of limited use of the balance of the beachfront to be "determined by the developers." This is a recipe for complete exclusion of Bonaireans and making their access uncomfortable or costly.

As you explained the current plan, "people will be able to use the 'public area portion of the beach as they like but, if they go on the beach in front of the proposed developments, they may not barbeque" or, we assume, camp, play music or engage in many of the activities that Bonaireans expect when they go to the waterside.

Your plan would allow the developers to cover the beach with chairs and lounges (for which they would charge a fee as do Plaza and Harbour Village) and in other ways to obstruct or intimidate local residents who only wish to enjoy their time at the sea. The government has proven itself unable to enforce public access at Plaza, Harbour Village and other developed sites where, by law, there should be access. There is no reason to expect that the Sunset Beach situation will be any different.

As BOG has split the property, the depth (sea to property line) of the beach appears to be quite inadequate for it to be shared between the developments and the public. Once new hotels or condos appear, real access by local people will be both extremely limited and intimidating. We believe that existing law claims the first 50 meters from mean high tide as public beachfront. The BOG plan does not even come close to this. It is not a valid argument that the government has ignored this requirement in the past. Now is the time to take a stand for the people of Bonaire and not for the developers.

Should the developers decide to build condos instead of hotels, this problem will be even worse as the 'owners' will expect to have restricted beach rights having paid for their property.

While the items above represent serious objections to the plans of BOG we do acknowledge some good points you brought out:

> Your requirement for the developers to contribute to the cost of beach development and maintenance. However, we are concerned that this may make them think that they 'own' the beach since they are paying for it.

> A willingness to consult with Fundashon Playa Pùbliko in setting negotiating points when the time comes for contract deliberations. We would have appreciated being consulted before this decision was made since both BOG and the Bestuurscollege have been aware of our concerns and interest for almost three years.

The BOG plan is a series of lost opportunities for Bonaire which will never come

The opportunity to create a recreation and entertainment focus for the island

The opportunity to create new Bonairean-owned businesses and the associated jobs

for our tourists and enhance our tourism product

An opportunity to encourage the blending of tourists and local residents in a pleasant, uniquely Bonairean environment

The opportunity for Bonaire to make a dramatic statement about its tourism product, about ecology and to re-enforce the unique nature of Bonaire for our visitors.

We know that it is late in your process to make some of the changes we have asked for but, at a minimum, the entire public beach area should be no less than the required 50 meters deep from high water and the ability of the developers to dictate the uses of the beach should be rescinded. This property is

The opportunity to create a new magnet that, with this width there is room for both visitors and local people to share one of the best spots on the island for relaxing and enjoying the ocean.





Guest Editorial

My Idol

It was in 1976 that I found myself at the threshold of the Bartlett Music Store in Carmel, California. We are in the first days of a nine-month sabbatical. It is time-off as compensation for myself and my family. A reward for six years of dogged hard work for the company I work for. One is expected to do something fruitful with the time available. Write a book or pursue another academic or spiritual adventure.

As my first publication is almost finished there is room for something else. After years of musical performances on the drums I want to learn to play the baritone saxophone. And I have an idol: It is Gerry Mulligan whose 78 rpm records I have played until the grooves wore out. "Nights at the Turntable" and "Bernie's Tune" with Chet Baker.

The owner of Bartlett Music Store is one Chris Bartlett. He is a character of great individuality, perhaps partly formed by his experiences in Vietnam. He shows me a baritone saxophone which turns out to be 15 lb. contraption with a mouthpiece the size of a cucumber. He thinks it is not necessarily the most appropriate instrument for a beginner, so I leave the store, the proud owner of a beautiful Silverplate Buescher tenor saxophone, a beginner's textbook and a reference for a teacher with Mexican background at the Carmel High School: Mr. Roberto Avila

From thereon half a year of biweekly lessons ensue. These are skillfully administered, supported by Avila's authority and love for music, as he treats his other, somewhat younger students. And there is endless practicing in a bathroom which has been converted so that my beginner's scores don't torture the rest of the family too much.

Back in The Netherlands I consider myself to be quite an accomplished musician. I cheekily call a teacher of the musical conservatory and am promptly referred to his youngest student, who goes by the name of André. I arrive for my first lesson in my working costume, a sleek dark blue businessman's suit. After some scales he wearily shakes his head. "This won't do. Put that thing away and lie on the floor." I take off my jacket and lie down on the prickly horse hair carpet tiles and await what may come. Suddenly he plants his foot with its sturdy shoe in the center of my chest and bellows: "And now breathe." As I gasp for breath he clears me up on the difference between the technique of the breathing of wind instrument players, from the diaphragm of the chest and my perky chicken's breast.

We become friends and after two years he accompanies me to Bruxelles to finally buy the baritone saxophone I long for. On the way back he recommends a real baritone saxophone specialist as a teacher. It is first-year conservatory student, Henk van Twillert. My idol Gerry Mulligan is coming within reach.

The new music teacher teaches me to properly interpret music. After ample analysis and painful practice the music sheets are removed. "From memory, please, so that you may focus on intonation, accents, cadences and tone." I find it excruciatingly difficult but he is right. "It has to be turned into music by you yourself." After some years we lose contact. We are both preoccupied with our careers. He finishes his conservatory studies and establishes himself as a gifted musician. I pursue my management consultant career, followed by making some sailing voyages and end up in Bonaire in 1998 and indulge in writing books, making music with my Antillean friends, organizing jazz festivals and much more.

Thirty years after my lessons with Henk van Twillert something special happens. It is in our Mega-Jazz radio show (yes, the one with Bernie's Tune as opening melody) I hear the CD of a guest of co-host Henk Roozendaal. It is a beautiful piece of music played by 10 saxophone players, recorded in the church of Spakenburg (NL) and the soloist (who is also the director) is Henk van Twillertenk! I am dumbfounded, surprised and curious and consult

"Google" to learn of his whereabouts. I establish that he is studying and teaching in New York City and that he lives and works in Portugal. We make contact by telephone and a week later there is a reunion at Schiphol Amsterdam Airport. Whilst enjoying a tasteful combo of fish and white wine we make plans for the near future.

Since then I am organizing the concert tours of my teacher of old on and in the vicinity of our islands. Sometimes with a large orchestra, another time with a *fado* singer, piano player or a quintet of string instruments. And we have become the closest of friends.

Recently Henk has, on my request, sent me two scores by Bach: 'Air' (on a G string) and 'Du bist bei mir' and he spurs me on to try them. I diligently practice. Exciting, Bach!

A month later Henk and his wife Laurinda are guests at our family and vacation house in Friesland (NL) and what I have dreaded unfolds. "Come on, Guus, let's hear those snippets of Bach." After Henk has filtered out the flaws in my playing we pause. When we continue our session he removes the music sheets. "And now from memory." Even though I saw this coming my heart sinks. We take it on line by line, at first with a bit of sheet and then from memory, becoming increasingly beautiful. Thank you, maestro Henk!

A few days later: My son-in-law tells us that my youngest grandchild, 11 year old Rik, wants to take up the saxophone. They have already been to a shop and he is equipped with both an alto saxophone and a teacher in Utrecht (NL). And they will soon stop by. It makes me very happy. The people at the shop had asked Rik whether he had an idol. "For sure" the little fellow said; "My grandfather is my idol!" They came to visit. After a day we could play the scale of 'C' together and a simple children's tune.

Almost flawless, played from memory with feeling and bravado. Upon saying goodbye I had to disappoint my grandson a little: "Grandpa will gladly help you with a few lessons, but you are better off with a with a real saxophone player for an

idol. Like Benjamin Herman, Candy Dulfer or your own teacher for instance. They are much better than I am and will live for a longer time to come." Good luck Rik with your beautiful new saxophone.

-hat a species of shrimp live Linside sea squirts? This association is so strong that the Italian common name for the shrimp is Gambero dell'ascidia, or "shrimp of sea squirt." These animals are found in the sub tidal and female shrimp live together zone off the coast of Islas Baleares in Spain. Each shrimp usually lives alone and returns to the same chamber for shelter.

When these shrimp begin their summer mating season the females of the species stay inside their sea squirt homes while males of the species leave to visit females. A BRIGHT COMET?

his month we have a chance to spot what may be the brightest comet seen for some time. Comet Pan-STARRS was discovered some two years ago when it lay between the orbits of Saturn and Jupiter - very dimly. It is named after the Panoramic Survey Telescope and Rapid Response System. It reaches **perihelion**, when closest to the **Sun**, on March 10th, well inside the orbit of **Mer**cury. At our latitudes it is likely to be at its best between March 8th to 20th with the 12th to 17th optimum.

Its magnitude is predicted to be -0.2 on March 10th, dimming to +1.3 on the 20th and down to +3.6 by month's end. The azimuth (compass heading) at which it will be seen moves northwards during the month starting at azimuth 260 on the 9th, 270 (west) on the 13th, 280 on the 18th and at 310 degrees azimuth on the 28th. It will be very low above the horizon so you will need to get to a high observing location with an unobstructed view to the west and north-west. It should lie just above a thin **crescent Moon** on the 12th making, if clear, a wonderful imaging opportunity.

In a less spectacular vein as March opens, the Moon ushers in Saturn as they both rise together late at night. Saturn and Spica, at magnitudes 0.3 and 1.0 respectively, will shine brightly in the southeastern sky in the late evening. Toward the end of the month, on March 28, the Moon will re-enter the scene, positioning itself between the two as it is one day past full phase.

March's Full Moon occurs at 6:27 a.m. Sky Park Time on the 27th, which means that at moonrise on the evenings of both March 26 and 27, the Moon will be more than 99% lit. The mornings after Full Moon, March 28 and 29, you can spot the Moon as it is still setting in the west looking close to full while the Sun has already risen in the east.

Jupiter is still in **Taurus** positioned near the bull's V-shaped head. March 17 will make for a great photo-op as the Moon interjects itself into the small space between Taurus's head and Jupiter. The giant

planet and our Moon will appear to be about two degrees apart.

The **spring equinox** occurs on March 20 at 11:02 UT. On many places on the globe on this date, day and night each last for 12 hours. In the Southern Hemisphere, fall

In the Northern Hemisphere, the sky is ruled by the **constellation Orion** during the first quarter of the year. Containing some of the brighter stars in the sky, it anchors both the Winter Hexagon and Winter Triangle. Its familiar line of three stars that outline Orion's belt makes it one of the easiest constellations to spot.

Last month we discussed how to identify some of the bright stars seen in the winter sky. This month brings more bright stars near the **zenith** (i.e., the point on the sky directly overhead). Just to the north of Orion and Taurus is the constellation of Auriga, the Charioteer, which has the shape of a pentagon.

Its brightest star is Capella, which ranks 6^{th} in brightness in the night sky.

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
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
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
