s we go to press it appears that all the requirements to reopen the Curoil Terminal in Hato have been met. Last Friday, an Antonov 12 cargo plane (above) from Maastricht unloaded two pumps with a capacity of 10,000 liters / minute, at Flamingo Airport. The fire safety pumps were the last element needed It is expected the terminal, which was ordered closed because of safety concerns, will reopen this week in time for the monthly delivery of gasoline and diesel to Bonaire. The pumps will be installed at WFR

▶ As of next Saturday InselAir will no longer operate the non-stop return flight between Miami and Bonaire. Starting November 9th, all flights between Miami and Bonaire will connect to another plane in Curacao. Although Bonaire bound passengers will have to switch aircraft, all luggage will be checked through to final destination so passengers do not have to worry about picking up their luggage while in transfer.

▶Last month Customs intercepted 990 grams of cannabis and 2,827 grams of cocaine on Bonaire, with a total street value of \$66,435. And 123 kilos of rotten meat was destroyed.

On September 10<sup>th</sup>, 2013 the members of the Physical Supervision Team (*Team Fysiek Toezicht*) found 200 grams of cannabis on a female passenger (23) on a flight from Curaçao. It appeared during further investigation that the woman had inserted the cannabis in her private parts. The next day 147.5 grams of cannabis was discovered on a male passenger (33) also on a flight from Curaçao. The man had inserted the cannabis in his private parts.

On September 17<sup>th</sup>, 123 kilos of meat was intercepted. The meat, packed in 15 bags, was discovered on a Venezuelan fruit boat. The captain did not declare the meat for customs clearance and lacked the relevant license. The meat did not smell fresh and

was thawed. It was handed over to the Veterinary Department for further investigation and destruction.

Then on September 18<sup>th</sup>, 248.5 grams of cocaine was found on a female passenger (44) coming from Curaçao. Again the cocaine was found inserted in private parts. (According to our sources the movements of a person concealing contraband within their body can be detected by trained Customs Officers. *Ed.*).

More cocaine was intercepted on the same day and flight. This time 2,578 grams of cocaine was hidden in a bag that was carried by a male passenger (37). Finally, 643 grams of cannabis was discovered on September 21<sup>st</sup> in the lining of the luggage carried by a female passenger (24) coming from Curação.

▶WILLEMSTAD--A crisis meeting was called by Curaçao's Minister of Economic Development Stanley Palm after both the Kura Hulanda Hotel in Otrobanda and the casino of the Veneto Casino Holiday Beach Resort closed their doors. The hotel was declared bankrupt last Friday, while management abruptly closed the casino Thursday night and told all the workers and guests to get out. The hotel, founded by Jacob Gelt Dekker, is a favorite of Bonaireans visiting Curacao.

The Kura Hulanda Lodge at Westpunt with 63 employees is still open, although it too is facing financial difficulties and has been granted a stay of payment until January 24, 2014



▶Bonaire has a new harbor boat. The venerable 33-year-old *Bubi* was retired and replaced by a more modern boat, named *Velos* (registration B-1250). Harbor boats are used for patrols, line handling, towing, emergencies and the harbor pilot. *Velos* is powered by twin 810 Hp Cummins diesels, Hamilton water-jets drive and capable of 64 km./hr (35 knots).

The Dutch Ministry of Economic Affairs gave Flamingo Communications N.V. the concession for 10 years with a possible extension of up to three years.

Flamingo Communications NV is a well-known, respected company on Bonaire under new leadership. It will expand its current activities with mail services. The company is currently attempting to make a seamless transition with the existing concessionaire, NPNA, under a new name: Dutch Caribbean Flamingo Express NV. It was recognized that declining mail volumes threaten the profitability of traditional mail services. Therefore, the new concession is based upon a 3-day delivery. The local mail rate will be increased and will be 88 dollar cents.

The people on Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba will soon get details about how the new concessionaire (Dutch Caribbean Flamingo Express NV) will do its jobs.

Bonaire, October 28, 2013

Subject: The closure of Kaya Nikiboko South concerning reconditioning and construction of the new roundabout.

The undersigned, all owners of retail businesses, located along Kaya South Nikiboko direct your urgent attention to the following.

Due to the implementation of the above activities is that part of the Kaya Nikiboko South between Simon Bolivar and Kaya Kaya Industria since beginning of October has been closed to vehicular traffic. This has major disadvantages for shops and businesses located there. Their customer visits and sales have been reduced to almost zero. The fixed costs of these small traders remain, however. In this time when it is already difficult to keep their heads above water, this loss of sales and customers many even lead to closure of their companies.

This situation cannot continue. (*The completion of the work has been extended into 2014 because of a faulty design-Ed.*) The companies will not survive this period. This is why we turn to you with a request for the government to intervene in this before it's too late for the companies to cover their losses without any financial compensation.

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
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
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## On the Island Since... 1996 - Cesar Pablo Apostel 'Cheky' Zimmerman

**66** was born on Curacao, January 25<sup>th</sup>, ▲ 1951. My mother is Maria Martha Zimmerman and my father José Antero Zimmerman. I grew up in a famous fishermen's town on Curacao, called St. Michael's Bay, one of the island's six natural harbors. My father was a professional fisherman and when there wasn't any fish to catch he would load and unload ships. We were four children: two girls and two boys.

My father passed away after his third heart attack in 1956. We were seven, five, three and two years old. At the time there was no pension for widows and/or orphans and so we lived in simple but respected poverty. My mother worked as a maid servant for a family in Otrabanda where she earned 150 guilders per month..

However, we were never hungry because my dad had left us a house and a little boat and we got an excellent upbringing. My mother was everything to us. When I was 17 I installed running water and electricity in her little house all by myself. My mother never had another husband because she thought my father was the best and I am proud of that!

After Lower Technical School I went in the evenings to Middle Technical School and I graduated when I was 20. Then I worked for 35 years for the government on Curacao, at KAE, later called Aquaelectra, the water desalination and electricity production company on Curacao. I started out in the electricity department, then for four years at the drawing office and the last 20 years as a deputy supervisor/official. I retired when I was 55. By that time I had 35 years of service. I was never involved in politics – it's too messy and the equivalent to corruption.

The last 15 years I've been a legal social advisor and I've won a number of cases on Bonaire. I guess my interest in social legislation started when I was a child and saw what my mom went through. After I was retired I took several courses and I attended many lectures on the subject. I still want to go to Venezuela to obtain my license.

I have four children- two boys and a girl from my first marriage- and with Sulin I have another daughter, Suwela, who has two little sons herself. They're clever little boys, one of five and one of three. They live on Curacao. From my first marriage I also have one grandchild who's almost six and lives on Curacao as well. My eldest son died, so now I have two daughters and one

All my life I felt I was born to paint. Already at elementary school I was chosen to make a drawing on the blackboard of each classroom for the holidays. By the time I was 14 I was selling my work and I had exhibitions. I've had expositions in Venezuela, Cuba, the Netherlands, Puerto Rico, the ABC islands, Anguilla and Santo Domingo. In 1993 during the International Year of the Reef Dive Festival I won first prize with my painting at the Caribbean Gallery here on Bonaire.

A lot of my work I sold to Americans, Venezuelans, Antilleans and Dutch people. Many Dutch have told me, 'Not only are you a good painter, but you're also a good salesman!' Ha! But Seriously, when I paint I can express my feelings, my character – it's another world. When I'm painting I'm in a different place.

told the man that I couldn't paint people but to say that because it isn't positive, but it's still he wanted me to paint 'people swimming at Westpunt'. Well," he laughs, "I painted more than 70 black heads – just round balls - all black - in the sea and you know what? The guy liked it! And he paid

I also paint in black, white and grey. There are people who love colors so much that they don't have a favorite color, but if you would ask me I would answer 'black.' Black is my favorite color because you can combine it with everything. It might seem strange but I think eight out of 10 painters will tell you the same thing. But I also love green very much. Maybe as an artist you need to be colorblind.

Well, for more than 30 years I kept coming to Bonaire frequently. I had and still have very good relationships here at all

Everybody makes mistakes, but to blame someone else for it – that's the biggest mis-

People should read more – the more you read, the more you know. You can't blame Holland because we all went to school. I find that Dutch should be our language and Dutch should also be the instruction language at school. Let's be reasonable: you don't get anywhere with Papiamentu. I don't love the Netherlands, but I had to learn the language and I finished school and all my children learned it well – they had the chance.

Nowadays the political system is destroying its own people. You see the direction most children are going. They become criminals... and that is very serious!

I've been a Jehovah's Witness for 42 years and I believe in truth and in logical reasoning. When you talk about a theme you have to be informed about it. I read every day and if all people would read more - every kind of literature, not only spiritual - the world would look different today.

Now I'm helping people voluntarily to interact with their family and others in a constructive way and I suggest that they should read God's word. Sometimes it helps and people find a way to change their life in a positive direction. It's for a reason that we call our services 'meetings' because you're free to ask questions and to analyze the

Well, there are a few things I still would like to do, besides going to South Africa and Mexico. I am going to say goodbye to the world of painting with the biggest exhibition that ever took place on the Antilles: 154 plantation houses. I want to paint all my paintings one more time and then I will sell them at an open expo to the highest

In life one should make their own party and invite people to it! Do things that make you feel good. That's what life is all about.

Sulin and I have been married for 20 years and we've never hit each other, we've never bitten each other and many people love us and we love people back. It's fun!" ■

I've become world famous by painting Dutch Antillean plantation houses. To me it's like the buildings are telling me their own personal story – why they were built, who owned them, what it was they were planting on the premises, what kind of people lived there, who were the slaves. The whole history of the building comes to my mind; while I'm painting I'm in love with these buildings.

Many people believe the plantation houses were owned by the Dutch. They're wrong, because the owners were the Spaniards. Eight out of 10 owners were Spaniards, maybe two were Dutch. They came much later. An example is Pachi de Sola, a plantation house build by a Spanish family at Waaigat on Curacao. Eventually they sold it to the government and for a long time this historic house served as a register

I also like to paint nature around my buildings but I cannot paint people or ani-

Let me tell you this story. Once there was a Dutchman who wanted me to paint Westpunt (a beach on Curacao) with people who were swimming there. Before I started I

kinds of levels – also work wise. Twenty years ago I built this house in Mexico (a neighborhood on Bonaire), because it was decided by the family that we should come and live here after I retire. I like the quiet-

During my lifetime I visited 18 countries in South America and Europe, but South Africa and Mexico are still on my bucket list. I've got paintings hanging there you

This last year I haven't been painting much. I still have quite a few paintings in stock and it is quiet... and... although my prices are very reasonable, there is also a lot of competition on Bonaire, like Manuela Winklaar who is a very good painter! I've learned a lot from her and I even dared to imitate her!

Besides painting and selling my paintings and besides Bonaire's lovely tranquility and nature I also came here as a missionary to help people to get a better insight into themselves and in their relationship with others and with God. In this social and political system many people are getting lost, and when I compare it to other countries I see there is a large backlog here. I didn't want

The Friday before an unofficial party was organized by the crew of the restaurant. The event was heartwarming. Monique met a lot of old friends and clients. She received flowers and little presents.

Monique has been on the island of Bonaire for more than 10 years. She's worked as a waitress at Mona Lisa for some eight years—a fulltime job. As well as that she works part time at the Outlet Mol across the street in the new shopping center.

Then, one night, some eight months ago she fell with her little red scooter and got seriously injured. The trauma plane flew her

immediately to Aruba where she had to stay for a month because of serious brain damage and paralysis of the left side of her face. After waking up from a severe coma and recovering a little bit from the very serious physical injuries she came back to her island to wait for two months and a half for further medical treatment. It took that much time and a lot of communication and paperwork to be allowed to go the Netherlands for treatment and reevaluation.

Now the tough girl is back on the island. She smiles and says: "I'm glad I'm back! It was heartwarming to see that many friends and clients last Friday. Bit by bit my short term memory comes back. I am a little bit tired and sometimes it is a bit difficult to concentrate, but I am still recovering every day! By Skype I have contact with a mime therapist in the Netherlands who helps me

to train the nerves and the muscles of the left side of my face."

She smiles once more when I ask her about riding her red scooter again. She replies: "During my crash apparently I protected my little scooter. It has just a few minor scratches. And yes, I will ride my scooter again. I do not really need a car and if I need one I can always use my father's car. The only restriction for riding my scooter is that my father insists I wear a helmet. So yes, I am convinced and I am going to buy one!"



PIET AND ELS KOENE AND THEIR VERY RARE LADA SAMARA CABRIOLET

couple of years ago I saw a weird red Lada Samara parked in one of the streets of Playa. A lady approached the vehicle and I had a little talk with her. That time there was no time for an article. On

Saturday October 26th the now flat red Lada has four round headlamps and in the front Samara Cabriolet popped up again, parked on the opposite site of the road along which the Pakus di Pruga is situated. I asked the owner of the local Chinese Bar next to Jong Bonaire and he pointed in the direction of the Pakus di Pruga. Then two persons approached the vehicle. I introduced myself. And yes, they knew about The Bonaire Reporter, and yes, they had read the last article about the London cab, and no, an article about this vehicle was not a single problem!

Els and Piet Koene are the third owners of this quite unique original Lada Samara Cabriolet. Els' father was a Lada dealer in the Netherlands. He imported the vehicle from Russia. Then Els' brother bought the vehicle together, legs spread wide/jb) Very low and finally, some 12 years ago, Piet and Els bought the sturdy and solid cabrio. Piet: "This Samara as made in 1992. I brought it to Bonaire. I also imported a Samara sedan ain parts. So far I haven't needed many spares as this cabrio is a good and reliable runner. Those days the Samara was for sale for 9,999 Dutch guilders, let's say some \$5,500. It was one of the cheapest cars you could buy for the money. The Samara sedans were chopped and converted into cabriolets by a factory in Germany. The conversions were for sale for 30,000 Dutch guilders, so they were not that successful!"

This Samara cabriolet, licensed: B - 3177, is equipped with four eight-spoke light alloy GTI rims and 185/60R13 mud and snow tubeless steel belted radial shoes. The front

and the rear the vehicle has spoilers. Side skirts are fitted and the hybrid cabrio has a moon roof.

The Lada factories are located in the Russian county of Samara. They are said to be the largest car producers in the world with a production line of no less than 145 kilometers and 180,000 employees. The first Lada was the 2101 model, a rugged and reinforced copy of the Italian car of the year 1967: the FIAT 124. Lada bought the production rights and mounted a home designed engine, light alloy drum brakes and higher springs. The first Ladas had a crank to start the engine by hand. (Gloves, jaws Siberian temperatures sometimes made the car battery have a hard time. In 1977 Lada introduced the permanent four-wheel drive Niva. The Niva was made after an original Russian design and fitted with the normal Lada engine. Because of all the reinforcements and the use of a lot of thick metal the Ladas were known as "tanks." The Samaras were the first more or less modern Russian cars, equipped with three or five doors and front wheel drive. The last

Samara was produced in 2013. In this region Ladas were for sale in Cuba, Saint-Martin and Curacao. ■Story & photo by Jan

t Boomerang Hardware store I found A the new hardened Master Lock padlock without keys and without numbers. I got intrigued by the sleek design and the mystery behind the lock. For \$15 I became the new owner of the black magic lock. At home I took a position behind my solid mahogany desk in the office, opened the plastic blister and started reading the instruction manual. All in all it took me one day and a half to open the lock for the first time. After reading the manual at least 15 times I still was not able to open the closedpad lock for the first time. Finally an instruction video on YouTube helped me out. I have to admit I am not that smart. On the other hand a thief has to be at least a little bit smarter than me otherwise he is also busy for some one day and a half to replace for instance my motorcycle or my boat

So here is how it works. First you have to press in the hardened handle or grip. Then you have to move the central button of the padlock a certain number of times up, down, to the left and to the right. Finally you are able to unlock the device. No keys or numbers needed. On the back of the lock there is a little switch which enables you to change the code. Interesting and mysterious. It took me a day and a half. This really is a useful gadget. here are only approximately 350 peo-■ ple in the world who could have this completed this "To Do List" posted on their refrigerators....and Bonaire resident Dennis Kellner recently became one of them. On October 11 of this year, Dennis climbed his Seventh Summit, Mt. Kosciusko in Australia, after having finished his Sixth Summit, Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, only 13 days earlier. Over a 13-year period, he has safely and successfully climbed the Seven Summits.

The Seven Summits consist of the highest mountain on each of the seven continents: Denali/Mt. McKinley (North America), Aconcagua (South America), Mt. Vinson (Antarctica), Mt. Everest (Asia), Mt. Elbrus (Europe), Mt. Kilimanjaro (Africa) and Mt. Kosciuszko (Australia).

In 1963, the first Americans reached the summit of Mt. Everest. A story in National Geographic about that climb got Dennis interested in mountaineering. In 1999, a sixday mountaineering course on Mt. Ranier in the US proved to Dennis that it was something he enjoyed and was able to pursue. He didn't begin climbing with the intent of doing the Seven Summits, but when he was successful at climbing Mt. Everest, he knew that goal was attainable. Tamara had been an active backpacker but had not done any climbing internationally until after she and Dennis met. She traveled to South America to meet Dennis after his



summit of Mt. Vinson and they trekked and climbed through Patagonia. She also accompanied him to Mt. Elbrus in Russia and climbed to base camp from where Dennis continued on to the summit push. This year,

"I enjoyed it, although there were times that I was naturally concerned. I was really impressed with Tam's climbing strength and thoroughly enjoyed having her as a tent mate and climbing buddy!"

In response to questions as to the most difficult, the easiest, most enjoyable and most scenic of his summits, Dennis's answers were quickly given. "The most difficult was Aconcagua. It's the highest mountain outside the Himalayas. The final push on this mountain is called the Canaleta and it is loose rock and boulder which requires difficult scrambling to get to the actual peak." The easiest: "Mt. Kosciuszko. It was just a pleasant six-hour day hike, al-

Tamara was quick to point out that Dennis has actually done Eight Summits. "The Eighth Summit was wonderful! We climbed Mt. Brandaris (Bonaire) on the one-year anniversary of Den's summit of Mt. Everest. It was a beautiful day with a great view from the top and we had the mountain to ourselves. The best part.....there was no snow!"

With the Seven Summits behind him, what's the next quest? "We've been discussing the next quest or adventure....time will tell! For now, we are looking forward to R&R and recovery." ■Jane Madden Disko



### Tourism Corporation Bonaire (TCB)Ready For the New Season.

Preliminary tourism statistics for the third quarter of 2013 were recently released by the TCB, They showed that US arrivals increased 13.4%, but overall total third quarter arrivals remained flat. The statistics are based on International and Domestic Arrivals between July 1st and September 30, 2013. Flights from and via Aruba or Curacao are considered "domestic." International flights constitute those originated in Miami with Insel Air, from Houston and Newark with United Airlines, from Atlanta with Delta Airlines and from Amsterdam with KLM and Arkefly.

Total US arrivals in 2013 from July 1st - September 30th were 5,443. In 2012 the same period saw a total arrival of 4,800.

United Airlines saw a total passenger increase to Bonaire of 35.17%. This was primarily due to the recent September "Sellabration" promotional campaign." Delta from Atlanta had a small decrease of 6.45% while Insel Air from Miami saw an increase of 9.91%. This increase could be

related to the vacation period and DAE stopping its operations.

Total European arrivals for the third quarter of 2013 remained essentially flat: 7,337 arrivals compared to 7,315 in 2012.

Arkefly from Amsterdam had an increase of 16.20% and KLM saw a decrease of 4.69%. Arkefly will be adding a third new weekly flight on Tuesdays starting November, 2013. This will translate into an extra 4,000 passengers per year to Bonaire given the same load factor as the Saturday and Thursday flights.

The third quarter the regional airlines saw a decrease of 2.06%. This can be linked to DAE stopping their operations, having less seat capacity and reducing connections into Bonaire. The flight interruptions of Tiara Air Aruba flights, due to yearly maintenance also affected the connections. They are now operating normally.

All the companies that adhere to the TCB Cruise operating standards will need a badge which allows them to operate within the City Center boundaries during the Cruise Season. These badges are in production and will be distributed at the beginning of November. #### **Cruise Ships: Beneficial of Detrimental to Bonaire?**

A significant number of people on Bonaire say they are opposed to cruise ships calling at the island. It may be because the ratio of cruise ship passengers to the island population is one of the highest in the Caribbean: almost 1,000% more visitors arrive by ship during the season than live on Bonaire. (see graph at right).

But this works both ways. It means that the large number of visitors will spend more money per Bonaire resident than they might spend elsewhere. The positive economics for shopkeepers on cruise ship days cannot be denied. But forget about parking downtown.

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## **Edshel's Nursery**



here is a little treasure hidden off Kaminda Lagun. Take a left when you hit the Balentina Blokkenfabriek sign, follow some bumpy dirt roads and you'll find Edshel's place marked by a sign decorated with a sun and moon and the text "Mantene Nos Cultura Na Bida." Here is a typical kunuku from the outside, but upon entering you see the workings of an avid gardener. Edshel, a kind and humble green thumb, used to make a living from his plants, but now it's become a hobby which he continues despite the rising cost. "If you have lots of plants and they cost a lot of water, no money comes in." He's also battling the extremely dry year which he says has been one of the worst and is being besieged by those pesky iguanas. "When I'm out, they come and visit me!"

In the past, school children would visit Edshel's garden and he would talk about traditional food cultivation. He was born in Curacao near the famous gardener and herbalist, Deenah Veeris. In his childhood he was raised to honor the garden and described what he learnt as a necessity because in his time there were no doctors in the area. "When you got a cold you had to go to the garden." Every year as he grew up they had to plant the kunuku.

Inside the first open shade houses the majority of plants are still looking vibrant. You can tell he's out and about often by the quality of the plants. He shares, "Every morning I HAVE to be out with the plants. I don't miss a single day." There is quite a variety here and many native plants. Everything from Palu di Sia, Taki (you can boil and eat the insides including the seed), Beshi, Kibrahacha (you have to harvest seeds after flowering as they don't grow seedlings beneath the mother tree), Kalabas, Oliba, Wayaka, Tamarind, Mahogany and Shimaruku. We get lost in the finer points discussing the difference between the three types of Palu di Sia, the most well known of which has that trademark orange/brown peeling bark. He pa-

tiently explains that there is Bursera simaruba (orange/brown bark), Bursera bonariensis (similar glossy leaves to B.simaruba but silver/white bark) and Bursera tomentosa (similar silver/white bark to *B. bonariensis* but unusually shaped hairy leaves). The next time you look at a species of *Palu di Sia* you'll be able to impress your friends a little more than, "Well, it's a tree with really nice bark"! Amongst the trees were also the native Sabal Palm which I have mentioned before as the only native palm on Bonaire. Edshel went on to remind me that it is also a PROTECTED palm and that if you "bulldoze one you should go to jail!" Also in the nursery there are fruit trees for anybody's fancy from Soursop, Pomegranit, Mispel, Kenepa, Mandarin and Suriname

When I asked how Edshel keeps the leaves of plants looking so vibrant he replied that he mashes the green insides of a Kalabas with water and pours that over the plants. As for nutrients he adds one quarter goat manure to three quarters local soil when potting. For fertilizer, later on he will buy organic liquid fertilizer from Manuel who is sometimes at the Kriabon Farmers Market. When he plants seeds he buys potground from Kooiman as the local soil often contains grass seeds. Another trick he uses is a bucket filled with holes that he fills with water. This acts as a slow release system. There are also some cases of recycling such as his innovative use of bathtubs as planters!

Further into his kunuku Edshel has full shade houses. Here, safe from the med-

dling iguanas, he keeps his tender sprouts and his seedling station. In this area he is sprouting Mint, Starfruit, Potato, Parsley, Celery, Garlic, Italian Basil, Kouseband and "Popeye" Spinach as he calls it! "This is the time to plant seeds, right before the rain." In the other rooms he has Banana, Moringa, Rosemary (grown from seed which I had previously heard was impossible), Yucca (the sweeter variety the locals call "yellow"), Custard Apple, Pineapple, Papaya, Cucumber and Oxalis. The last apparently can be used against spots and you can eat the leaves, flowers and carrot-like roots.

On the way out I notice a large tree I had never seen before. When I ask what it is he smiles mischievously and asks how I think he got it. I don't figure it out and he laughs because he found the seed deposited by the sea! He says people tell him stories like, "Ooooh I saw that tree at Noord Salina or ooooh I saw that tree at Hotel Bonaire" and he knows it is not true. It turns out to be a Ficus with rubbery leaves a little smaller then *F. elastica*. He has only seen it on a visit to Jamaica where he saw a huge specimen.

As a final parting nugget of information

he lets me know that when he plants a coconut he will add sand and seaweed from Lagun. And judging by his massive coconuts that he's clearing out for a bargain \$150 a piece it's working a treat.

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## The 'Art Route' - 'Kaminda di Arte' 2013-2014



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
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## **Bonaire Gets "Direct Ties" With The USA**

Did you know that Bonaire has "direct ties"....with the 2014 World Series Champion Boston Red Sox? Xander Bogaerts, 21-year-old infielder for the Red Sox, spent a good part of his youth on Bonaire playing for the Little League Select team here, helping them reach the Caribbean Champion finals in 2005.

Born on Aruba, Xander and his twin brother, Jair, were 11 when the Bogaerts family moved to Bonaire. But they eventually moved back to Aruba, first Jair and then Xander, largely because the quality of baseball was higher there. When remem-



bering his time on Bonaire playing under the guidance of Francis Wanga and others, Xander said, "I am happy that I could play on Bonaire as a child when my parents moved to the island of flamingos." He went on to say that he knows Bonaire is grateful that he helped Bonaire reach the final of the Caribbean championship and that Bonaire is waiting for him to do great things . "I will never forget Bonaire. I will do my best to see if I can go there this year when I am back on Aruba."

The government of Bonaire presented a special program about Xander on NOSTV and Energia Vision last Wednesday. Although five Arubans have played in the major leagues, Xander is the first Aruban to play in a World Series and the first Aruban to win a World series.

Xander is not just a "back up" player. Here's what American sportswriter Tim Britton had to say about Xander before the final series game:

"This postseason, Bogaerts hasn't just emerged as a better option at third base than Will Middlebrooks; he's become one of Boston's most important bats at any position. And that breakthrough can have a cascading influence on the team's offseason plans. Behind David Ortiz's otherworldly performance in this World Series, Bogaerts has been the Red Sox's best hitter in the Fall Classic. Entering Wednesday's Game Six, Bogaerts is 5-for-17 (.294) in the series. Better yet, he's 5-for-11 since a hitless first two games....His numbers are even better in the playoffs as a whole. In 11 postseason games, Bogaerts is hitting .348 with a .467 on-base percentage. Four of his eight hits have gone for extra bases."

### Price Fighter

In the first week of December Bondigro b.v. will open a new low budget supermarket in the blue building along the Kaya Industria Pariba, more or less opposite the building of the Van den Tweel Food Group. So in the near future in and around the Kaya Industria area there will be four supermarkets and Bondigro will be by far the cheapest of all.

The initiator is Roland Schalker, well known from the Dive Hut and his many years on the island of Bonaire. Schalker is shhown in front of the new building. Water is connected, soon there will be electricity for the freezers and the coolers. Schalker: "I just wanted to create an alternative to

Schalker: "I just wanted to create an alternative to the luxurious and expensive supermarkets we already have. I did a lot of research and made a lot of calculations and I went to the notary for advice. We decided to create a kind of a holding based on co-operation and shareholders—shareholders with participation and equal say. The enterprise is a kind of foundation. The main goal is to present some 350 different products of good quality for a very low price. Most articles will be non-perishables or deep frozen. Of course we will try to make money, but that is not the first goal. The possible benefits out of the enterprise will eventually flow to the shareholders. At this moment we have some 150 shareholders. Some people just bought one share of \$150 but there are also persons who bought shares for \$10,000!


For years I lived in Switzerland where supermarkets like Aldi and Lidl work with the same construction: good products, a small variety, low overhead costs. Germany and the Netherlands are also familiar with these popular and basic supermarkets. In the US Aldi also has supermarkets. We will be like a small and cheap kind of Walmart, the low budget supermarket Sam Walton started way back in 1962. It takes a lot of money to start an enterprise like this. At this moment two 40-foot containers with products are on their way to our island. It takes some \$60,000 to fill and ship one container. I put my own money in the co-operation and together with the shareholders we can do it.

So far the newspapers paid attention to this no nonsense supermarket in Papiamentu and in Dutch. I realized I did not reach the English speaking and reading people on the island so I am glad I am allowed to vent my ideas and plans in *The Reporter*. Facebook also gives information. Just type: Bondigro. Unfortunately most of the Bondigro/Facebook site is still in Dutch. I am going to work on it. # Picture Yourself At Mt. Rushmore, USA.



Joan and Alan Zale are frequent visitors to Bonaire who just completed their 35<sup>th</sup> trip to the island. Earlier this year, on April 25, 2013, Alan fulfilled a lifelong dream of visiting Mt. Rushmore in Keystone, SD. Mt. Rushmore, often referred to as the President's Mountain and America's Shrine of Democracy is located in the Black Hills of South Dakota. It features the image carvings of four American presidents, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln. Gutzon Borglum was the sculptor for the project, which was dedicated in 1941 taking 14 years to complete. The project cost \$989,992. Another interesting fact is that no one died competing Mt. 

fter 17 bi-weekly articles about the A History of Tourism in this publication, I have now come to the end of the installments. My interest in the history of Bon- major source of information on how Bonaire aire's tourism came about after publishing a book on the same subject on Aruba, where I live. The wealth of subjects regarding Bonaire's tourism has always been obvious to me: its tranquility, the underwater world, the flamingoes, the national parks, the Regatta, the story of Hotel Zeebad, important players like Captain Don, L D and Hugo Gerharts. All of that merited being documented.

I approached Bonaire's outstanding historian, Bòi Antoin, who helped me tremendously by allowing me access to his research on the subject in Papiamento. Without this information, I would never have been able to write in such depth about these subjects. It was not my intention to publish a book, so I approached George DeSalvo, publisher of The Reporter and his immediate reaction was very positive. We started publishing at the end of February and never skipped an installment until today. My thanks to George on all that surrounds them, the island's natuand Laura are heartfelt. I am equally grateful ral beauty, its flora and fauna, culture and to Ria Heitkönig who helped me to many historic photographs taken by her father

Of course the history of the island's tourism does not end after what has been published in these articles. It is an on-going process. But essential subjects, most of which occurred in the 60s of the past century, have shaped the tourism industry as it is nowadays. Of course there have been other important players in its development, like Niki Tromp and Toon Abraham. Their contribution has been of the utmost importance as well.

Without one man I could not have written my series: Mr. Hugo Gerharts who tirelessly answered all my questions by email about what occurred in his career as a tourism

entrepreneur as well as in that of his father, L D. Although we have never met, he trusted me with his father's memoirs, a has developed from an island of fishermen and 'kunukeros' (farmers) to an important asset of the Caribbean tourism industry. His memoirs have never been published as a book, but with Hugo's permission I am now publishing its most interesting chapters in the weekend supplement of a Curação newspaper in Dutch. To fashion a book from this 'rough copy' of almost 400 pages will be a totally different undertaking, but it will be an important addition to Bonaire's written

Last week, on October 31<sup>st</sup>, members of the Gerharts family and their friends remembered when L D died, exactly 30 years ago. This man most assuredly deserves a statue in Kralendijk.

A final word to the people of Bonaire who are blessed to live on such a precious and beautiful island: I want to congratulate them history. The island has a tradition of defending its wealth, but once again there are predators on the loose, aiming to take commercial advantage of all this beauty, sacrificing what has been protected successfully throughout the years.

Sixty years ago, as the first American tourists visited the newly opened Hotel Zeebad, they all came to this conclusion: 'Don't

ever change this island, keep it as it is!' Please keep their advice! ■ **Evert Bongers**

### For A Safer **Bonaire**

For the first time there will be an amnesty in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba for handing in illegal (fire)arms and ammunition to the authorities. In principle, this surrender of arms will have no consequences for the possessor of the (fire)arm, unless later on it is evidenced by investigation that such weapon was involved in any crime. Then an investigation will be duly made, however. All other (fire)arms will be destroyed by order of the Public Prosecutor.

Also other weapons - which are not barred from being kept on hand - but which one still wants to get rid of, can be handed in without any legal consequences.

On the dates below – between 13.00 and 20.00 hours – weapons and ammunition can means of compressed air or gas), daggers, be handed in:

1-November 6 in Kralendijk at the Koninklijke Marechaussee office on Kaya Gilberto F. Croes 24 (opposite the sta-

2-November 7 in Rincon at the suboffice of the Executive Council on Kaya Arcangel (Minguel) Pourier 73

It will also be possible to ask questions and to have weapons checked if one is not sure whether they are illegal or not.

The object of this drive is to reduce the amount of illegal weapons and ammunition in circulation and, in doing so, increase integral safety in the BES islands and to inform citizens of applicable rules.

On January 1, 2014, a new integral firearms policy will be introduced. Details will be made available later this year.

In pursuance of the BES Firearms Act, it is prohibited to have on hand / to possess prohibited firearms and ammunition. Having on hand does not imply that one should have a firearm literally within reach. Also keeping a firearm at home is prohibited and, consequently, punishable.

Objects which, in terms of their shape and size, resemble firearms (and therewith are suitable for threats or extortion) are also part of the prohibition of the BES/Firearms Act. For example certain toy weapons, 'BBguns', 'airsoft guns' and other imitations of a firearm or explosive.

In exceptional cases, the Island Governor may grant a person authorization to have a firearm on hand.

In pursuance of the BES Firearms Act, it is also prohibited to have certain objects on the public road or in any place accessible to the public. The following objects included:

- Rifles, air/ gas weapons (weapons with which projectiles can be fired by sheath-knives, bayonets, poniards, swords, sabers, bodkins, truncheons, rubber coshes, bulls' pizzles, blackjacks, knuckle-dusters, lances, spears, pointed sticks, arrows;
- Other objects that have obviously been made to be used as a weapon. This should appear from the circumstance or the manner in which they are worn or used. Think, for example of someone who moves around with a baseball bat or a kitchenknife. ■ Press release

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#### NIGHT SKY WITCH - CAN YOU SEE HER?




his month you should be able to spot the Constellation Orion. He rises a little late but comes earlier each night. Soon, when you walk out just after dark, you will see his bright figure towering over you to the south. He harbors many awesome secrets, one of which . . . is a witch!

She stares back at the bright star Rigel as though it were her own evil creation. Truly, this area of the night sky is haunted. She is seasonally well timed and one of the tougher targets to photograph. You can make out the shape of her head in two ways that I can tell. I see a hat, a large nose, a cheekbone, and a protruding chin. Even without the Halloween influence, what do you see?

Do you see the witch's profile? You may look at this photo and wonder, What in the world is going on here? Well, nothing in the world is going on here. The goings-on are happening about 900 lightyears away! That is 900 years traveling at the speed of light. Light travels pretty fast, by the way, about 186,000 miles in one second. The photograph above is actually a representation of what the Witch Head Nebula looked like 900 years ago! No big

There are a lot of gas clouds in outer space, and astronomers cryptically refer to them as "nebulae" (the Latin word for

"clouds"). The light coming from the very bright star Rigel is passing through this gas and splits up, somewhat like that Pink Floyd poster some of you may have seen. Light is made from all colors of the rainbow, but the warmer colors (orange, red) tend to pass through the gas while the cooler colors (blue, purple) tend to bounce off the gas, making the nebula appear blue. Our sky is blue for the exact same reason. This type of nebula is called a reflection nebula, and we live inside one!



Where is she?

To gain a little perspective, the graphic above shows the location of the Witch Head Nebula inside Orion. Easy to spot with the naked eye but far too faint to be seen without the help of digital photography. David Rankin


