





he Bonaire island Council unanimously approved Simeona "Jona" Chirino-Felida, better known as Jona as Commissioner to serve on the Executive Council to replace Hans Els.

Jona is well known for her active social work. She is shown above with Edison Rijna, the deputy governor.

According to StatLine, in the Caribbean Netherlands on Bonaire, inflation was 1.3% in the first quarter. This is 0.1 of a percentage point higher than in the fourth quarter of 2013. Higher prices for food and clothing were the main factors in the increase. Fruit and women's clothing in particular cost more. Electricity prices fell slightly, and had a downward effect on inflation. The up-tick followed several quarters of declining inflation.

**KLM** is preparing to fly to the Caribbean on biofuel. Spokesperson Joost Ruempol confirmed this to the Amigoe newspaper. KLM is not providing any details just yet. KLM first experimented with biofuel in 2009 and already is flying some routes using the fuel.

**KLM** reportedly sold four Fokker F70s, serials 11528, 11537, 11578 and 11583. to Insel Air (Curacao). All deliveries will be between now and June 2014.

More than a decade ago, the government of President Hugo Chávez enacted strict exchange controls on the bolívar, the Venezuelan national currency. The controls pegged the bolívar to the dollar and limited trade between currencies. Because of these rules, airlines that operate in Venezuela are not allowed to freely exchange their accumulated bolívars for dollars, as they can in countries that have free-floating currencies. Several of the airlines have had to curtail operations as a result.

Normally, every 15 days, they ask the government to convert their revenue,

according to the International Air Transport Association (I.A.T.A.), a trade association for airlines.

But from 2009 to 2012, repayments took around six months, and by the end of 2012 payments were being delayed for as long as a year. And since October, 2013, almost no payments have been approved at all. Now the I.A.T.A. says that the Venezuelan government owes nearly four billion dollars to 24 international airlines including Insel Air and Tiara Air.

Airlines are not the only foreign companies that suffer from Venezuela's rigid currency controls. Toyota's and Ford's Venezuelan subsidiaries, lacking in dollars, had to cut production of vehicles because they couldn't import parts from overseas.

known until recently when the countdown began to Stolte's May 1 departure. In the past an RCN official performed the Rijksvertegenwoordiger functions rather than Woodley.

MIAMI, Florida--The 2014 Atlantic hurricane season is expected to be quieter than normal, with a below-average number of storms and hurricanes, a leading US hurricane forecasting team said on Thursday. Forecasters predicted this year's season will see nine tropical storms, three of which will intensify into a hurricane and one becoming a major hurricane with winds of at least 111 miles per hour (178 kph).

A typical season has 12 tropical storms, with six hurricanes and two major hurricanes. The hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30. Bonaire is historically out of the path of hurricanes but can suffer from side effects like wind reversals and sea swells.

Two out of three persons age 15 and older in the Caribbean Netherlands drank alcoholic beverages last year according to a survey carried out by Central Bureau for Statistics (CBS). The survey showed that 50% of the women and 25% of men in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba had not drunk alcoholic beverages in the past year. One man in eight drinks excessively, compared to one woman in 30, CBS stated.

In Bonaire, 19% of men are heavy drinkers and 10% excessive drinkers. 6% of women in Bonaire are considered heavy or excessive drinkers.

A heavy drinker is defined as someone who drinks six or more alcoholic beverages a day on at least one day a week. Excessive drinkers drink more than 21 glasses per week for men, or more than 14 drinks a week for women.

20% of the population in the European Netherlands did not drink alcohol in 2012, according to CBS. This percentage is almost twice as high in the Caribbean Netherlands: 39%.

Caribbean Netherlands Customs intercepted significant amount of cocaine, ecstasy pills, methadone pills, heroin, cannabis and money in March. They confiscated drugs and money. A total of 1,454.10 grams of cocaine, 2,030 pieces of xtc pills, 1,000 methadone pills, 506.70 grams of heroin and 535.60 grams of cannabis were intercepted on Bonaire, representing a total street value of \$114,476. The total cash amount seized was €10,324.15.


ber reverse the decision that lets them vote and be elected locally on the three islands. The First Chamber itself, but also the Council of State, the Government of Saba and the Dutch Electoral Council are said to be against the idea, so it's not at all certain the proposed amendment actually will pass in any case before the next Island Council elections of March 2015.

This is just one example where steps that were introduced in the interest of democracy in the Caribbean Netherlands perhaps should have been studied better regarding side-effects.

Another one was dropping the requirement that candidate lists must earn at least one seat outright before competing for a residual seat. Plus a "separation requirement" was introduced so that Island Council members cannot be commissioners at the same time, something that actually was mandatory in the former Netherlands Antilles.  $\blacksquare$  *G.D.*

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# On The Island Since... 1993 – Linda Schut

hat I know is that my mom 667 had been here to dive when she was 20 and when my dad was in the military service he was stationed on Curacao, so both of them knew the islands. I was born in Utrecht, Holland, where my parents had a printing house. I don't know why they moved to Bonaire, but I do know that they were looking for something different. So, when I was four and half, the three of us came to live here. I remember I went to kindergarten, Skol Preperatorio Orkidia, but I do not remember anything else.

My father started working for National Printing and my mom was a substitute teacher at the schools, then later on at the after school care program at Rayvah. They also had a copy machine at home where people could have copies made and I would help them with it. From there exactly 20 years ago - they established a new printing house: Flamingo Communications. When I was eight I began answering the phone and when I was 12 I would insert the pages of the For Sale pamphlet, so I had a really great work experience from the time I was a little girl.

As well as the business I was very much into sports, especially sailing, first with Optimists, then with Sunfish - racing and recreation. There were two people who would always win: either Sabina ter Borg or me and... we were best friends! Artie de Vries was the sailing instructor and we had a great group of kids. During Regatta I did win once or twice, but in general Sabina would win and I'd be second. But with the Sunfish we would be together in one boat.

However, most years you couldn't sail during Regatta because of the lack of wind. I never figured out why they would insist on organizing it in October when the wind dies down. I clearly remember that once during a Regatta Sabina and I lay down in the boat to sunbathe as there was no wind at all and the boat was just float-

young, almost one year younger than my classmates and still a real child where the others started puberty early. And that's why ultimately I chose to repeat the sixth grade (at that time it was the last

grade) so that I didn't have to go to SGB with that group of people. It has been one of the best decisions of my life. I ended up with Sabina in the same class and I could finally be myself. Nobody ever bullied me in that class. Super! have very good

vacation to Bonaire – to get away from it all – my boyfriend broke up with me. I wasn't doing well at all but I'd decided to come back to Bonaire to live.

I'd met Wiebe, who is now my boy-

I graduated from Mavo when I was 16. My mom and I went on vacation to Holland and there I got glandular fever. When we got back I had to stay at home, feeling exhausted, for almost seven months. One month before I became 18 I went to Holland to study to become a beautician with the goal of becoming a make-up artist. But, because of the glandular fever I got fibromyalgia and everything became 10 times more difficult in every possible way. All my muscles hurt constantly. Everything I do hurts. And believe me, there are muscles you don't even know you have- like your eye muscles or the muscles of your jaw. It's brain signals that cause the pain.

I was told that the training I was going to do – ROC in Utrecht – would be too much for me. In the end I found a private school where the course would take a year. It was extremely hard, but with interruptions and breaks I managed to do it in three years, and I did it! I also graduated as a nail and hair stylist and as a make-up artist, so I have all the diplomas Then I wanted to leave Holland; it wasn't my place. They saw me as a Dutch person, but I didn't feel like one. I've always felt like I was a stranger. I didn't know where to go and I didn't want to go back to Bonaire either. I also had a boyfriend so I stayed on. I was working in catering, but when the catering was taken over everything went wrong in the organization and I got more and more stressed, then I got overwrought. My relationship suffered and when I came for a

friend and business partner, when I was here on vacation. He lived on Bonaire and when I moved back I met him again. First we were friends and then it became a relationship and I started feeling much better.

My parents, especially my mom, have been a great support to me. I was working at the office at my parents' business when I began to feel really bad. I was sitting behind the computer and all my muscles would ache, my vision was blurred and I had headaches all the time. I ended up on AO – sick leave. The doctor wanted me to stay on AO for two years after which I would be definitely incapacitated. But... when you are medically unfit to work on Bonaire your government allowance is less than \$300 per month and I cannot live I don't feel accepted and that might be the on that! I sat at home for over a year while consequence of the bullying. The way Wiebe was at school, then I decided to apply for a permit to start a second hand store. At the end of June 2013 I opened the store, 'Buy, Sell & Trade.' We are located on Kaya Korona 38A, almost opposite Kooyman.

I've worked since I was very young, but

it together and it's fun! This is NOT a Pakus di Pruga (Animal Shelter flea market) because we have to buy everything; we don't get it for free. We also have to pay rent, WEB and salaries, so therefore we cannot be too cheap. Also, our items are of good quality and sometimes even very special and/or unique. But if we get a good deal buying something, we also sell it low-priced. We're open every day except for Sunday and Monday - from 10:30am till 6:30pm non-stop.

I enjoy going to work, maybe because this is my own store and maybe because I see things I would never have guessed you could find here. And whenever I feel tired, I can take a break. That's another advantage and very important in my case.

I am still undergoing treatments - very painful ones, really awful-and I just hope that one day someone will find a cure for fibromyalgia because the disease has made my life very narrow and limited. I've never spoken about it up to now, as I didn't want to be judged by it . You see I am NOT the disease, that's not me!

I used to be an outgoing person who loved to party and now I look differently at life. I live a life that would suit an older person, but then... my boyfriend is only 20 and he keeps me young, ha ha ha!

To me Bonaire is home. In my roots I feel more Antillean than anything else, but things are going after 10-10-10 does not make me happy. It seems like everybody has changed, like they've held a grudge against each other. I find that hard to deal with. We're all in the same boat and I think we should get together and find a solution. I hope for better government allowances, for child support, that the standard of living for the people here will be equalized to what it is in Holland and that we can live in harthe old days." ■ Story & photos by Greta Kooistra

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ast week two apparent failures of our justice system came to light. In the first, two (formerly) young men were sentenced to prison for a crime they could not possibly have committed. In the second, two preeminent Bonaire politicians were harassed for over five years for corruption, which charges the court said, were without foundation.

The details:

For a gross miscarriage of justice The Dutch Government has to pay Bonairean Andy Melaan \$1.3 million (around €930,000) because he was wrongly imprisoned for eight years. It is the highest payout of damages for a miscarriage of justice to date, the Dutch daily Volkskrant reported.

In the same murder case, Nozai Thomas, who was sentenced to four years, will receive almost \$680,000 (€490,000). This was decided by the court two weeks ago. The two were wrongly accused, tried and convicted of murder at Spelonk.

In 2005, Melaan (35) and Thomas (27) were sentenced to 24 and eight years in prison for a double murder at Spelonk. At that time the local Papiamentu language press were astonished at the incorrectness of the verdict. After a years-long fight the men were cleared of the charges on the 15th of November, 2013. Their case is the sixth miscar-

riage of justice under Dutch law of this century. Their lawyer, Geert-Jan Knoops, says that the men are victims of the difference in laws between The Netherlands and Bonaire.

Knoops says that the men now suffer from depression and post-traumatic stress disorder, and that their lives are "irreparably broken." Melaan was stuck in a police dungeon for six weeks, isolated from the outside world to break him mentally, Knoops stated. His daughters don't know their father anymore. In 2008, Melaan attempted suicide.

The court awarded five times the compensation that acquitted persons normally get. Press release

**B** onaire's Court of the First Instance acquitted ex-commissioner Burney el Hage and his wife Ginia as well as former UPB-leader Ramonsito Booi of all charges. Judicial authorities said the evidence was inadequate.

The Public Prosecutor's Office immediately announced it would appeal the verdict at the High Court in The Hague.

It's the second blow in a short time to the Zambezi case, after Judge Irma Lips had already dropped all corruption charges against the trio a few weeks ago.

The tough Public Prosecution on Bonaire can be said to have suffered a heavy defeat in the island's biggest corruption investigation to date. Former politicians, Burney and Genia El Hage and Ramonsito Booi were acquitted by the court of official corruption, fraud and money laundering.

The lawyers of the three will hold the Dutch state liable for the persecution, according to their attorney, Jan Knoops, "for enormous damage" that Booi, El Hage and his wife suffered from five and a half years of protracted investigation. That other individuals, never formerly charged, were held in custody for extended periods and had their careers ruined was not mentioned in the verdict.

n Thursday, March 20, around 3:30 in the afternoon STINAPA headquarters received a phone call about a man who was seen entering the ocean with a spear gun downtown in front of Club Nautico. Rangers were mobilized immediately and headed to town. Upon arrival the rangers saw a man snorkeling so they entered the water and approached him. The man was in possession of an illegal spear gun as well as seven fish, all with holes in their body from the spear.

The spear gun, fins, snorkel, mask and all the fish were confiscated.

Spear fishing is a highly damaging activity as it is very effective and tends to remove the big fish from the reef. In a decision without precedent at the time, Bonaire completely banned spear fishing over 40 years ago. This ban, together with good fishing practices from our fishermen and other management measures, resulted in Bonaire's reef fish population still being one of the healthiest in the Caribbean. Lion fish is the only fish that is allowed to be shot with a spear gun especially designed for hunting lion fish. In order to be awarded a permit for hunting lionfish, an appointment with the Marine Park manager is required.

The confiscated fish was donated to the Krusada foundation.

## **Triumphant** Performance

Ralendijk's Kas di Sosiego chapel, next to San Francisco Hospital, provided the distinctly classic setting for the passion concert organized by the Classical Music Board Bonaire (CMBB) on Saturday 12 April, to a sold out audience.

The internationally known cellist, German Marcano, performed an impressive repertoire of two solo suites by Johan Sebastian Bach. 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


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#### Flying squid Japanese researchers confirm squid can fly





and in the open ocean so keep your camera ready and eyes open! Sarah Girouard

hat oceanic squid can actually fly? How you may ask? The key is their jet propulsion. Squid suck water into a large chamber in their bodies and force it out through a narrow channel that can be directed in various directions. This feature is important because they commonly use it to make a rapid escape from predators. The jet stream can be so powerful that freeswimming squid are sometimes ejected out of the water, giving the view that they are "flying." Each "flight" lasts around three seconds and has been classified into four stages. The stages include launching, jetting, gliding and diving. At each stage, the squid changes forms to become more aerodynamic.

These flights occur randomly

SHARING THE SEA

I love Bonaire. This is my 9th year visiting and in this time I have seen many changes. I try to embrace them all. Bonaire has so much to offer to a person of my age, but also for the youth, teens and young adults. Kiteboarding, windsurfing, diving, stand up paddling and sailing are all available.

These young folks need more to do and a place to do it. So when I visited Atlantis, commonly called Kite Beach, I saw positive change. It is a great place for kiters and kiter enthusiasts to gather. While kiting is central to Atlantis, the beach has become a nice place just to hang out. The question is how can the kiters continue their sport while allowing others to safely enjoy this part of the coastline? And can this all be accomplished while respecting the marine environment at the same time?

Is this possible? Yes, I think so, but awareness on the water and common courtesy are key to making this work. Snorkeling the southwest coast of Bonaire is my passion. My favorite snorkel is a drift from Red Beryl to Margate. These days if I enter the water before 10am, all is good. There are very few kiters. But after 10, especially on windy days, Red Beryl can be scary-not



treacherous or dangerous-but scary. I am not over reacting here. Last week while beginning this drift (in the light blue water) I see a kiter coming towards me. I pop up and wave an arm- to be seen- and to alert the kiter that I am there sharing the water. He was very close. Close enough for me to see the look of shock on his face. I was wishing for a "thumbs up" or other signal from him. Letting me know that he had seen me, and that he would remember I was sharing Red Beryl/Margate with him. I received no sign. Just a hasty come about and off again. This has happened more than once. My snorkeling buddy has tried to call out to the kiters in order to alert them that we are sharing the area, but again no response. After a drift snorkel we were admiring a pod of Dolphin swimming and feeding at Red Beryl. They too had the same problem I did. They were keeping an eye on the kiters as

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#### well. When

I snorkel this area I make it a point to know where the kiters are at all times. I keep my eyes on them, but I wonder if they are keeping their eyes on me? Do they not see me? Are they even aware of the snorkelers and divers using these sites?

STINAPA recommends that kiters surf in dark blue water. Wonderful, but do kiters even know this? Is STINAPA getting the word out to them? And is this rule explained to novice kiters when they take their first kite lesson? This is a multi use area. Perhaps a bit of education can help all of us-kiters, divers, and snorkelers-enjoy fantastic southern beaches of Bonaire Flipper



he Bonaire Coral Restoration Foundation (CRF Bonaire) is a nonprofit conservation organization dedicated to restoring the shallow water populations of elkhorn and staghorn coral along the coast of Bonaire

Since the 1980s coral diseases, bleaching events, loss of sea urchins together with deteriorating water quality and overfishing have affected the staghorn and elkhorn coral populations throughout the Caribbean. CRF Bonaire

was born in 2012, when Ken Nedimyer, founder of CRF based in Florida USA, was invited by Buddy Dive Resort to work with and assist Bonaire with their continued efforts to preserve Bonaire's greatest assets, its reefs.

By setting coral nurseries and transplanting mature staghorn and elkhorn coral onto degraded areas, the CRF Project aims to restore a portion of the coastal coral reef of Bonaire.

To date, more than 6,000 coral fragments are growing in the nurseries in Bonaire and almost 1,000 have already been transplanted on the reef.  $\blacksquare$  G./L. D.

Saving Bonaire Donkeys - A New Direction

Indignation and horror at the so called "contract" to eventually eliminate all donkeys from Bonaire has sparked action by Bonaireans who believe the donkeys play an important role in the island's heritage and are a wonderful tourist attraction, to say nothing of their concern for the animals on compassionate grounds.

The Bonaire government contracted with the well-known popular Bonaire Donkey Sanctuary to collect all the wild donkeys they could find, confine the females and foals in the Sanctuary, castrate the males and set them free with reflectors on their ears, and cull the herd of diseased or infirm donkeys. This was deemed necessary

as the donkeys were considered road hazards, destructive to the native plants and sometimes a pest. The donkeys are the responsibility of the local government which can be held responsible for the damage they cause, for example, to motor vehicles resulting from a collision.

At that time, last year, the only viable alternative to that plan was to leave the situation as is and accept liability or the wholesale eradication of the donkeys. While many ideas were brought forth, the Sanctuary appeared to offer the only viable alternative to safeguard the animals. There were no other organized groups or individuals able to shelter large numbers of donkeys, until recently.

The group called Citizens for a Better, Safer and Animal Friendly Bonaire has a plan and is moving forward to make it happen. They already have gotten the government to stop culling the herd. Their primary objective is to have the wild donkeys stay in the "outback" (*mondi* in Papiamentu) for the safety of both animals and people.

To do this they must:

\* Begin a massive awareness program that must start immediately. (Watch for animals and no-feeding signs at airports, hotels, tourist and local restaurants etc.)

\* Animal crossings and reintroduction of signs on high-ways.

\* Long speed bumps on the roads where needed (the type where you can drive at normal speeds but no faster).

\* Get our special Bonairean wild donkeys back a water supply in areas away from main roads (water supplies they had for hundreds of years that were cut off by building/ fencing etc.).

\* They have private parcels of land already allocated away

from the high traffic areas that can be used for them to stay wild and safe. (Arrangements are being made to repair old wells or to drill new ones where needed).

\* Donkeys that need to be reintroduced to the wild can be. (The method is supplied by wild burro experts with many years of experience). It can be done.

\* A strategy is ready to be put in place that will allow the donkeys that are already domesticated to be embraced and used to a great end goal. It will allow for increase revenue for the persons on pension or others who are in need of work.

\* Large banners for the airport and signs for other areas have been ordered to alert the public and visitors.

A another potentially significant fact in favor of preservation of all Bonaire donkeys came to light as a result of preliminary DNA testing done of blood samples from Bonaire donkeys. They may be the direct descendents of the wild Nubian ass, an endangered species as defined by world conservation authorities. Next week 25 more samples of blood will be tested to determine if indeed the genetic connection is viable enough to give the Bonaire donkeys protected species safeguards. *Press releases/ G.D.*

or the past 22 years while Bonaire's donkey -lovers were debating and suggesting solutions to care for the island's donkeys, one person, Marina Melis, and her Donkeys' Help Sanctuary, were taking action by providing water, food, medical care and shelter for hundreds of the animals. They received minimal government support, relying on donations from individuals and foundations. The operation received glowing reports from inspectors for the conditions provided and general operation, the most recent last week from the Royal Society of the United Kingdom.

Contrary to what *The Reporter* published last edition the Sanctuary did not get government money for expansion and operation. Not in 2003 or in 2012 for relocation, but because of the Sanctuary's forced relocation away from the airport and urgent request from the government they did get some help with money for fence material and for a short period (three weeks) manpower from the Public Works Department to speed up the move. But they never received a government

subsidy to extend the Sanctuary properties or buildings. Recently, as a result of the catch program they do receive money for the new arrivals. The new Sanctuary land was bought

with money from donations and sponsors, and since funds are short there is still no house for Marina Melis and her husband Ed to live, so they have been existing in a storage room for the last  $3^{1}/_{2}$  years.

While plans may be realized to allow Bonaire's donkeys freedom to roam as they did in Africa millennia ago, will the Bonaire Donkey Sanctuary remain a safe haven for around 500 of the animals, and an important tourist attraction. It also serves as a source if inspiration for what one person with a passion for animals can do  $\blacksquare$  *G.D.*



# Bats On The Move

Nectar Feeding Bats From The ABC Islands Recaptured In Venezuela

During the first week of March, four bats of the species Long-nosed bat, *Leptonycteris curasoae* (at right) marked on the ABC Islands (three from Aruba and one from Bonaire) were recaptured in Venezuela by a team of scientists. The recaptures, lead by Dr. Jafet Nassar from the Venezuelan Institute for Scientific Research, occurred close to the



city of Coro in the coastal Venezuelan State of Falcón.

This is the piece that was missing in the puzzle of the migratory and long distance movements of these amazing flying mammals. Previous inter island recaptures were the first step in confirming the hypothesis from STINAPA's research unit that these bats are flying overseas among the ABC islands and to the South American mainland. These recaptures demonstrate that we do not have separated populations for the islands and the continent, but instead there is a meta population for the entire ecoregion.

This exciting discovery is the product of more than five years of effort invested in scientific research by STINAPA Bonaire, CARMABI, Arikok National Park (united in The Bat Conservation Program of the ABC Islands PPRABC), the Venezuelan Institute of Scientific Research, and an endless list of volunteers and supporting organizations. More than 6,000 individual bats were captured and ringed during this period.

This discovery, about mammalian ecology and the population dynamics of this keystone species of our terrestrial ecosystems, has significant implications for the management and conservation of bat population.

NAKED EYE PLANETS THIS MONTH

Here is a recap on the planets visible in the Sky Park over the next two weeks. It's a good time for stargazing. Mercurv

Mercury is unobservable as it is close to the **Sun** all month.

April 25 and then, in early May, jumps into evening visibility.

#### Venus

Venus is the bright "Morning Star", blazing low in the east-southeast before and during dawn. The planet loses a little of its altitude in April, but at magnitude -4.2 around mid-month you will not have any trouble distinguishing it. The telescopic appearance of Venus changes dramatically during the month. On the 1st, the planet spans 22 arcseconds and shows a disk about 54% lit. By the 30th, Venus' apparent diameter has shrunk to 17 arcseconds, but the disk is then 66% illuminated.

Venus, the second of the inferior planets, is almost the same size as the Earth, and is the nearest body in the sky apart from the Moon. Until recently, we knew practically nothing about the surface of Venus, and there were constant references the horizon roughly three hours after to "the Planet of Mystery." Indeed, until the radar measurements of the 1960s even southwest as dawn begins. The ringed the rate of rotation of the planet was not known.

It was then found that Venus turns on its axis once every 243 Earth-days, making the planet's day longer than its year! Even more surprising is the fact that the rotation is retrograde. In other words, Venus spins in the opposite direction to the majority of the planets in the solar system. Mars

The most spectacular planet this month has to be Mars. April brings the Red Planet closer to Earth than at any time since the winter of 2007. If you have a telescope, even a small one, now is certainly the time to get it out.

Mars pokes above the horizon during evening twilight, among the background stars of the constellation Virgo, and is high up in fine view in the south by mid-

hue, you will not confuse it with any other object.

#### Jupiter

As darkness falls, gas giant Jupiter rides above the western horizon, around 60° high from the Sky Park's latitude. The planet lies in Gemini, near the ecliptic's northernmost point, so it remains visible well after midnight despite being three months past opposition.

Jupiter is the King of the Planets, and not just because of its enormous size - this monster planet is 88,700 miles (142,700 kilometers) in diameter. Jupiter also reigns over the other members of the solar system in the affections of amateur astronomers, because this great ball of gas is just so consistently interesting. Saturn

Throughout April, Saturn pokes above Mars, and lies a good 30° high in the planet resides among the background stars of the constellation Libra and shines at magnitude +0.2, two full magnitudes brighter than any of Libra's stars.

Saturn is the most striking member of our planetary family. With an equatorial diameter of about 75,000 miles (120,700 kilometers), it is the second largest planet circling the Sun. Appearing as a bright yellowish object in our night sky

Black Moon rising- There is a second **New Moon** this month sometimes called a black moon. Notice how much closer the Sun and Moon are compared to the New Moon on April 1. On April 29, the moon will pass directly in front of the Sun, causing an annular solar eclipse, visible in Antarctica and Australia. Bob Berman


