The Governor-elect was born on July 7, 1967, and educated on Bonaire at the Prinses Beatrix School, the SGB High School then pursued his higher education in The Netherlands. He has a reputation for honesty and sincerity.

Once ratified by the Dutch Crown, he will be sworn in on August 20<sup>th</sup>.

**▶**Bonaire's Flamingo International Airport has received a safety certificate from the Ministry of Infrastructure and the Environment. This certifies that the

Bonaire airport meets international safety standards. It is the first airport in the region to get this international certification.

Les Laplace, director of Bonaire International Airport (BIA), speaks of it as a milestone for the island. Other airports in the Caribbean, including Aruba and Curaçao, are not yet certified at the international level by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO).

In early June an extensive audit was conducted by the Environment and Transport Inspectorate of the Ministry for Infrastructure and the Environment in accordance with ICAO regulations to confirm that Flamingo Airport qualifies for the safety. By Belkis Osepa

The 16 members of the VBIS prices set the prices. The maximum prices were set by ranking the (good quality) products from the least expensive to the most expensive.. After that, the cap is set at an average of the of the 36 products in the 16 participating supermarkets. The members of the VBIS have committed to hold the line at these prices.

Average prices of 36 products in the 14 participating supermarkets will decrease by 24%.

► More than 20 years after the need for a sewer system to protect Bonaire's reef was confirmed, it is about to begin full operation. Its cost has been astronomical [from €20 up to] - €34.5 million - which means each [vacuum-] connection to the 607 households, 73 hotels and businesses costs more than €50,000 each.

Minister Plasterk stated that the report was made available to him by the European Commission on January 17, under the condition that its contents would be dealt with confidentially.


The investigation focused on possible irregularities with financial management within Foundation Development Netherlands Antilles (SONA). The project was tendered by SONA in 2010 and awarded to MNO Vervat International.

Minister Plasterk said he declined to publish the OLAF report as this could hamper preliminary investigations by the Prosecutor's Office in Bonaire into potential crimes.

► The Citizens for a Better, Safer and **Animal Friendly Bonaire presented** their approach to handling the situation of roaming donkeys on Bonaire to the local government but obtained agreement on only one item- improving road safety for the motorists and the animals. They had a wild life biologist explain how the donkeys are beneficial to the ecosystem, the shortcomings of the existing method of controlling donkey population at the Donkey Sanctuary, the financial benefits of their plan and its tourism value. However, the group will continue to pursue its goals which are based on respect for Bonaire's animals and preservation of Bonaire donkeys. Significant opposition to the appointment of the new Kingdom Representative appointee was a (Rijksvertegenwoordiger) for the BES Islands, Gilbert Isabella, is in the news. Members of the Dutch Parliament for the ultra-right PVV Party, including Geert Wilders, formally expressed concern over the 'appointment of a controversial PvdA Alderman. Curação-born Isabella (53) was one of the more than 60 persons who had applied for the position of Rijksvertegenwoordiger. Isabella was selected as the sole candidate by a special committee installed by Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations (BZK) Ronald Plasterk. The committee contreasurer for the funds, is not held accountsisted of former Governor of the Netherlands, Bonaire and Curação, Frits Goedgedrag, former President of the Second Chamber of the Dutch Parliament Gerdi Verbeet, former Dutch Minister of Economic Affairs Laurens Jan Brinkhorst, As city councilor of Utrecht, he spent a forand Secretary General of the BZK ministry Richard van Zwol.

St. Eustatius Commissioner Reginald Zaandam also voiced criticism in a letter dated July 3, in which he questioned whether Isabella was the right man for the job because, according to him, being an Alderman for three years doesn't constitute as having "broad expertise in the governing process," a requirement in the job descrip-

He also pointed out that Isabella had no affiliation with the BES Islands and re-

marked that the member of the PvdA, the same party of Minister Plasterk. "Our candidate choice would have been a track record and experience of man-

aging people and the expertise to bring public entities and The Hague closer together. . But Plasterk plucked out an outsider from Utrecht," Zaandam said.

"We were assured by Minister Plasterk that the decision would not be political. Plasterk's CDA predecessor appointed his CDA chum, Wilbert Stolte. # On The Island Since... 1997 - Angliet Baidjoe

Tow that I've reached this age, I through Africa and Asia, begin to realize how precious the years are which lie ahead of me. I'm no longer tied to a job and I've got so much to do, while I feel that my body can't do things the way it used to, or at the same pace. I am someone who is interested in all aspects of life and I have many hobbies; that's why I feel I'm short of time.

But let's start with the beginning. I was born in Paramaribo, Surinam, as the oldest turn to the tropics. I had child of a nest of five because after me four boys were born. I come from a multicultural family. My parents are Hindu and Chinese and within the family there were various religious beliefs related to the different cultures. I grew up with Hinduism, Islam, Buddhism, Christianity and some more, and it really enriched my life. It was fun too because there were a lot of religious festivals and celebrations to attend. The family would always get together as we were extremely close-knit and there was a genuine respect and acceptance of each other's religion.

My father was a teacher and when he was young he was sent to the interior of the country to teach the indigenous people. My brothers were not born yet, so I went alone with my parents. In spite of the culture and to learn so much at the same fact that I was very young, I can still remember situations and images like it was yesterday.

People perceive with five senses, but in the jungle at a very young age and without realizing it, I learned there is something like a sixth sense. I grew up with it. I had a special and close connection with my maternal grandmother and she also taught me how to look differently at things things you cannot see immediately, but you feel them, like an extra intuition and I've kept it all my life. My grandmother knew things. One day she told me 'When I die, you will be there to bury me.' I was 19 at the time and living in Holland and I answered, 'Oma, I don't know where I will be then.' But she said calmly, 'You will be there with your children.' When she passed away many years later, I was living on Bonaire. It was a beautiful day. I had vacation and my children were on a plane to Bonaire to spend the holidays with me. When I got the news I immediately bought three tickets and the next day we flew to Surinam to bury her.

When I was nine I got very sick with asthmatic bronchitis and my grandmother took me to Aruba. She told me, 'The fresh sea air will do you good!' My grandmother's sister lived there with her two daughters and it was wonderful to play with girls, instead of having to fight with my four brothers! I stayed there for one

vacations we spent in the jungle where my father helped to set up schools. Then he decided he wanted to study again and we moved to Holland. When we arrived on a cold and grey November day, I told my parents, 'I will never stay here!' I became a teacher and then I followed every available education related to my profession and many others that I was interested in, like alternative medicine.

I staved in Holland until I was 34. I travelled extensively through Europe, but also

always and still with a backpack that doesn't weigh more than six kilos. I had my children, but that didn't stop me. I took them with me and they got the travel bug as well. They're always on the go.

After 20 years in Holland I decided it was time to revisited Surinam and the **Dutch Antilles frequently** and when I applied for a job in the area, the first answer came from the Catholic school board in St. Eustatius/Statia. I lived there for eight years with my children. The father of my children couldn't get used to such a small island and felt like he was choking so he went back to Holland while we stayed on.

It was a wonderful and precious time. We walked through all the islands of the Caribbean. And work was a challenge. It was fun to be able to teach in a different time. I also built my house there. We had a beautiful view to the sea and we've seen the sun set in many different and magnifi-

After elementary school the children had to go to high school VWO, which wasn't available on Statia, so they went to Holland where they were taken care of by their father. I went to live on Bonaire where I had a number of friends. I applied and immediately got a job in public education. Next to my profession as a teacher I also founded a construction company, with a good friend. I worked actively in the company but now it's dormant. I've taught in all the schools on the island. I've been a substitute teacher. At Forma I taught teenage moms, at SGB second chance students. I've worked in special education, in kindergarten and with OICN. I've also taught adults.

After I sold my house on Statia I built

mother would ask me to touch her plants. She'd say that I had a deep connection with plants that came from a very strong love of nature. Also, I cannot see a cutting, a piece or a part of a plant on the street, trampled and half dead because then I have to pick it up and take care of it and bring it back to life. It's something I cannot explain, but I feel guilty if I leave it there, when I let a part of nature die.

Next to my life as a teacher I've always been closely involved in the Bonairean community. I participate in many activities. I know many people because of my work. I always go everywhere on my bicycle and when people ask me for help, I will devote myself to a good cause.

For 10 years, from 1999-2009, I organized guided trips to the jungle of Surinam and I've taken many interested people from Bonaire on my Amazon tours. Presently I am also selling delicious goodies at the Kriabon market, every first Saturday of the month. The atmosphere is great and I've met a lot of fun people there!

Last year in January I stopped working

point at the teacher(s), while everyone seems to forget that the parents as well as society contribute the main part to the upbringing of the child. Therefore I think it wouldn't be bad if at the end of the school year somebody would shake the hand of the teacher and say, 'Thank you for what you did for my child.' Of course we get paid to do it, but money isn't everything when you do something with your heart and soul.

You never know what will happen in life, but Bonaire has become very dear to me and because of its people it feels like home. I am still travelling - South America is my focus. I am 59 now and still very curious about the unknown. I travel through hamlets and villages, through desolate places, inhospitable areas, where people rarely come.

And there, in the midst of nature, I feel the connection."■

#### PART II OF III

efore 1868 the island of Bonaire was one big Government Plantation where one could not establish him/herself as it was not permitted to live on Bonaire. The only inhabitants here at that time were slaves owned by the king and privately owned slaves and the military.

After slavery was abolished the Government would not allow any further exploitation of Bonaire. However, several koenoekoes (farms ) and plantations had been privately sold before 1868, including sales of Government properties.

In 1868 a public auction of Bonaire took place on Curação. Privately owned land began then and lasted up until the end of WWII. During this public auction five large portions of Bonaire, ranging from 600 to 4,000 hectares, including the salt flats, were placed "under the hammer." See map at right.

In the past, large land owners (Groot Grond Bezitters) owned more than one home - one usually in Kralendijk and the other, out of town, which was their plantation. The Shon (in Papiamentu meaning owner of land and slaves, a man with status and property) would be at both places regularly. At the plantation there was always someone called Vitó (overseer) to tend to things. He was especially important in cases where the Shon resided in Curação.

The wife of the Shon stayed at home in Kralendijk, and of course so did the children. It was unheard of having them travel to and fro twice a day, from the plantation to town. Relatively speaking, distances

## Go Wild

t's that time of year again when the ness of raising chicks. Some of these tiny bald chicks are just getting their feathers when they are plucked from their homes and have already spotted some little, fluffy families. Collected illegally these poor individuals will spend the rest of their lives in a cage.

It's a sad reality but it is still happening right here on Bonaire.

The Echo team, who are dedicated to the protection of the Yellow-shouldered Amazon Parrot (the Bonairean Lora), are busy monitoring nests. They will be doing what they can to ensure the wild chicks get to grow up and "go wild"! While the nesting season is an exciting time of year it can also be heartbreaking when known nests are found empty, with only one explanation for the sudden disappearance.

Echo employs several strategies to prevent poaching on Bonaire. First the team must find the nests and, although the parrots often the "Parrot Club". This exciting initiative

Bonaire's parrot is special and the Echo team have started attending fairs to share their passion for this rare bird. The team are looking forward to being at the next Cultural Market held by Mangazina de Rei (this Saturday, July 26).

Another of Echo's efforts to raise awareness and inspire appreciation for parrots is

As well as working with children, Echo has recently started providing tours of their Dos Pos Conservation Centre. The tour gives an insight into Echo's work and best of all it is led by local guides who are eager to share their knowledge of Bonaire.

Dr. Sam Williams is hopeful that this tour will be a permanent feature at Dos Pos.

"We are excited about creating a more sustainable way to provide economic gains from the parrots. The tours are themselves just fledging and there's more to come. We mainly want to share our message about just how unique and wonderful the Yellow-Shouldered Amazon parrot is and how their home, the dry-forest, needs restoring."

At the moment Echo's one-hour-long Wednesday afternoon tours happen every week and are donation based. Meet at the Dos Pos windmill before 4:30 pm and bring



## Proposal For Freshwater Wetlands Project

To attract more tourism and for Bonaire to advertise to the world that we are making our very arid island a bit more accommodative to wildlife, specifically birds, well-known Bonaire naturalist Jerry Ligon proposes a project in which Bonaire will have a year-round freshwater park.

He writes, "This will be the first permanent freshwater location for the entire island, and it was chosen because the impoundment has already been constructed, and it has shown in most years to catch natural rainwater and has become a fantastic wetlands all on its own. However, in most years the period of it being a wetlands usually does not go beyond three or four months, just barely enough time for the many species that require fresh water to nest, and then it dries up.

During the past winter, this location was the corner the site for the very first nesting of **Black-bellied Whistling Duck** for Bonaire, that I documented on 11 January, 2014. boina and

The proposal includes a well to be dug which will provide the fresh water for this park. After consultation with proper authorities, it hopefully will be placed along **Nikiboko Noord**, and by controlled flow the water level can be maintained and will flow towards the north along an existing, constructed creek bed for a total of almost 500 meters to then flow under Amboina into another catchment that is already in place, to which I have given the appropriate name, "Cattail Marsh."

We will also be enhancing the vegetation along the shoreline that will provide cover and places for nesting as well as simply resting and feeding for birds.

Check the Google Map at right for a bird's-eye view of the proposed area, which is on the corner where Hanachi Am-

boina and Kaya Nikiboko Noord come together. The blue line marks the length of the wetlands, and shows where the water will flow under the newly constructed cement canal that goes under Hanachi Amboina into an area that also has collected rainwater in years past and had a beautiful cattail marsh that was totally destroyed last fall when someone in government gave the undefined instructions to "clean up" the area.

The entire wetlands area from the south toward the north, ending at the Cattail Marsh, is almost 500 meters long, running









south to north, and around 140 meters across. This is a fantastic area with a lot of potential for uncrowded wetlands along which will be constructed trails, quiet areas where photographers can capture many uncommon and beautiful species, or just a simple, quiet place for nature enthusiasts to enjoy a walk through a freshwater wetland.

The southern and western perimeter has already been built up as an embankment, which looks down into the wetlands, afford-

ing good opportunities to view and photograph shy species, like **Sora Rail** (on the facing page), two species of **Gallinules**, **Caribbean Coots**, which are designated Near Threatened status on Bonaire, and many species of water fowl, such as **Blackbellied Whistling Duck, Blue-winged Teal, Northern Shoveler, American Wigeon.** There is already ample parking along the junction of Amboina and Nikiboko Noord.

I'm enthused by the possibility of having a permanent fresh-water wetlands is because the customary clear cutting of existing wetlands that exist during the rainy season can be eliminated. An education program would help people better understand what a working, permanent fresh-water wetlands could do, as shown in the above photos.

If this proposal gets the proper agreements, then we will have, for the very first

time on Bonaire, a freshwater wetlands that does not dry up in the spring, which forces many bird species to abandon any nesting attempts on our island. The addition of such a beautiful natural wetlands area will also increase the interest that visitors as well as local inhabitants will show toward the birdlife. Many local entrepreneurs will be able to gain knowledge and then lead nature trips, so this area will serve as an "Outdoor Classroom" that local schools can also utilize. I can foresee weekly

bird walks, led by knowledgeable bird watchers on Saturday mornings, in the style of Audubon walks along wetlands in many communities in the US."

meal, linen, cottons, and tools to be sold in their shops. The division within the homes of these Shons mirrored their activities. In the town house the ground floor was fitted for storage and a shop. The family lived upstairs.

Naturally, in the first half of the 20th century, Bonaire's population did not consist purely of large land owners. There were also middle class families, business men, shop owners, craftsmen and government workers. Generally speaking we can say that the differences in prosperity found their way through the size and images of the homes, including their interiors. But socially there were no barriers.





IS THE SUPERMOON JUST BS?

eteor Shower Alert: On July 28, 29 - **Delta Aquarids Meteor** Shower. The Delta Aquarids is an average shower that can produce up to 20 meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced by debris left behind by comets Marsden and **Kracht.** The shower runs annually from July 12 to August 23. It peaks this year on the night of July 28 and morning of July **29.** This should be a great year for this shower because the thin **crescent Moon** will set early in the evening, leaving dark skies for what should be a good show. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Aquarius, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

he next full moon will probably be dubbed a **Super Moon** by the media. Don't let the idea of a super moon get to you because it's not really that big a deal. But all the TV news people go nuts about the super moon so it must be something really special! Right?


Readers, you know as well as I do that even though there is a measurable size difference between the biggest and the smallest full moon of the year that you can't really notice it without special measuring

Check yourself. There is even a handy measuring device around .: your pinky finger. Use it to see how big the super moon

The moon is the easiest thing to see in the the **Earth.** night sky, but remember when you're looking at the moon you're seeing reflected sunlight. The moon does not produce light of its own. And the moon is not always a stargazer's friend because it can get to be so earth once every **orbit** (Apogee). In fact, bright it wipes out most of the stars and the this year the moon had two perigees in Milky Way.

Start by watching the moon on the evening of August 4th and see what we can

To use your pinky finger to measure the apparent size of the moon: extend your arm, stick out your pinky finger, close one eye and then put your pinky finger over the moon. It will disappear behind your finger.



so it's what we call a waxing gibbous moon. Remember gibbous means humped and waxing means it'll get fatter night after

Do that each night until August 9. Now try your finger trick. What happens? And though it's not quite full now, it will probably look full to most people, but it won't really be full until 2:09 pm Sky Park Time on the 10 th. We won't get to see the moon until it rises several hours later. If you really want to be picky about it, the moon is past full when it rises for us in the Bonaire Sky Park.

So what makes this full moon a supposed super moon?

Super moon is not really an astronomical term but refers to a moon that is full at about the same time it's especially close to

The moon's orbit is not a perfect circle but is really an **ellipse.** This means the moon gets closer to the earth once every orbit (Perigee). And farthest from the January. And it will have two more in No-

This perigee on August 10 is only nine minutes away from the time the moon is full so it gives us the closest and thus biggest full moon of 2014. So look at the rising moon on the evening of August 10. And use your pinky finger to measure it. Can you tell it's a super moon? I don't The moon will be one day past first quarter think so. ■ *Dean Regas & James Albury*


