For people who already are under treatment with a medical recommendation for a chronic disorder there is a phasing out arrangement and the treatment continues to be reimbursed in full.
- Added is a neonatal screening for newborns (the heel prick).

▶ Based on information provided by the Don Andres Shipping NV, because of the presence of cruise ships on Bonaire's piers, as well as maintenance on the piers, cargo has to be unloaded inefficiently and at night which will result in shortages and the higher costs will be passed on to the consumers of Bonaire. Twenty-four cruise ships are expected in December.

▶ Bonaire's government has a vision for the development of our island from now through 2025. This vision is laid down in the document "A vision for the future of Bonaire, Carib-



bean Netherlands.

The vision is: "Optimal happiness for present and future generations of Bonaire" and can be described as choosing sustainable development in the broadest sense, providing prosperity, allowing its people to lead a healthy and balanced life for current and future generations.

To achieve these goals, the government says it will undertake programs leading to an improvement of the social security system, integrate neighborhood development with attention to social problems and vulnerable groups, investment in infrastructure, including the road network and the seaport and airport, stimulate the business and investment climate, define a responsible environmental and nature policy, improve and diversify tourism, professionalize and strengthen the administrative apparatus and hold structured dialogues with the community.

▶The Evaluation Committee, which is charged with assessing the impact of the state structure established on 10-10-10, visited Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius from November 13 to 19. The purpose of this first visit was to hear from various groups on the islands what they consider important for the evaluation. On Friday, November 14, the Evaluation Committee visited Bonaire and spoke with residents. Two political parties boycotted the meetings saying that participation would imply their acceptance of the structure as agreeable.

The committee is headed by **Liesbeth Spies**, former Minister of the Interior and Kingdom Relations. The other members of the committee are **Fred Soons** – emeritus professor of the Utrecht University; **Glenn Thodé** – Rector of the University of Aruba and former Lieutenant Governor of Bonaire; Luc Verhey – Professor of Leiden University and State Council of the Council of State, and **Frans Weekers** – former State Secretary of the Ministry of Finance.

No report is yet available.

▶ Antilleans still lead the crime charts in the Netherlands. Caribbean-born people of this ethnic group are still more often a suspect of a crime than second generation Antilleans born in the Neth-



erlands. The figures and conclusions are in the 2014 Annual Integration Report of the Central Bureau for Statistics (CBS) of the Netherlands released last Wednesday. The crime rate among this group, the majority originating from Curaçao, may have steadily decreased over the past seven years. In second place committing crimes were persons of Moroccan descent, followed by Surinamese. In 2013, close to one in every 11 Antillean men was arrested for a crime. Some 147,000 persons of Dutch Caribbean descent were registered in the Netherlands in 2013, which is 0.9% of the total population.

▶On November 1st
Nichalin Martina became
the new director of the
Tax Office - Belastingdienst Caribisch Nederland
(B/CN), part of the Tax
and Customs Administration of the European Netherlands. Nichalin Martina
succeeds Angel Bermudez,



who left in June this year. Martina was trained in the Netherlands and started her career in Aruba where she worked as a tax inspector. After that she joined the Tax and Customs Administration of the European Netherlands. She is responsible for both the *Belastingdienst* (Tax Service) and Customs, which together form Belastingdienst/CN. Apart from the regular tax processes and customs processes, B/CN also performs duties for third parties such as collection and levy for other implementing organizations and for the Bonaire Island Government.

▶In the morning on Wednesday, November 12th there was a joint traffic control by the Royal Military Police (KMar) and KPCN on Kaya Internashonal.

A motorcycle policeman would select a vehicle to check and order the driver to follow him to the control site in the parking lot of the airport where KMar and KPCN checked the papers of the vehicle and the driver and the technical condition of the vehicle assessed. Eighteen vehicles were checked with some violations discovered: One driver did not appear to have a valid driver's license, one driver was driving without insurance and four drivers were found to have not paid road tax for the second half of 2014. The Police commented that many drivers are still getting used to the presence of the new motorcycle cops in traffic. If you get a signal from a motorcycle cop you are obliged to respond. You may get a signal to stop where you should stop immediately. Or you can also get a signal to follow him to a certain place.

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Born on Bonaire... July 4th, 1950 - Mayra Everts On The Island Since... 1967 - Freddy Everts



y parents were Raquel de Jongh swelled up big time. I **▲** and John Craane," *Mayra says*. We were 11 children and I was number seven. We lived on the waterfront. My grandfather's house was where It Rains Fishes restaurant is now and our house was a of days and started feelbit further. As a child, my life was all about the sea- swimming and fishing. I went to Lourdes Mulo, then I started working at Banco Popular. In 1974 I met Freddy, but I already had a three-year old daughter, Rucellia."

Freddy says, "My father was Alacario Everts from Nort di Saliña. My mom was Cecilia Goeloe from Antriol. They left for Aruba where my dad worked at the Lago oil refinery and I was born there on March 1st, 1956. We were eight children. When I was 11 my dad retired and we came back to Bonaire. It was super sweet, a close-knit community, friendly and relaxed. I went spear fishing all the time and we could take karkos (conch) and lobsters without any problems. There were no restrictions, it was all okay! That time will never return.

I went to nautical school in Curacao, I worked on Aruba building a mega pier, then came back to Bonaire where I got a job as a waiter at the Hotel Bonaire casino. I was

"I met Freddy for the first time," Mayra continues, "at my mother's house. He was a friend of my brother Randolph. It was love at first sight. He was a tough guy, not afraid of anyone and I loved everything about him: his color, his smile, his eyes, everything I could see. The rest came later!" "I didn't know Mayra," Freddy says, "but when I saw her I thought, 'What a babe! Vitamins for the eyes!' I was 18 and she was 24. The first months we talked a lot, but not about love. However, a year later we hit it off."

"I'd bought my own house when I was 22," Mayra says, "the same one where we still are, but it was much smaller then. I worked at the bank and my daughter Rucellia went to school and crèche. After work I would pick her up and go to my mothers' and Freddy would come too. You know what I would do? When I needed him, I thought of him very strongly and then he would show up! Telepathy! It worked better than any WhatsApp nowadays! He would walk me home, but we didn't live together yet. He was too young, hahaha!

In 1978 we went to Holland. I felt like seeing my brother Randolph who lived there, so we made a plan and we left. It was extremely cold that winter and I was missing ing a line to fish and fell of a rock. He was my mom like crazy."

"I liked it," Freddy says. "I started working at the harbor, loading and unloading ships. It was hard work. But Mayra was homesick and when she got pregnant with our eldest son we decided to come back."

"We went to Curacao," Mayra says, "but Freddy couldn't find a job and my legs

went to the doctor and he prescribed diuretics, three tablets per day. I took them for a couple ing really bad. I was completely dehydrated and looked like an iguana. We rushed to Bonaire to Dr. Welvaart. He told us that the doctor in Curacao had made a big mistake. Looking back at that episode, we still feel

that taking those pills when I was pregnant with our son Illich, caused Illich's kidneys to stop working before he was t21. But more of that later.

"Rucellia had been living in Holland for nine years already," Freddy says. "Illich had his training as a goldsmith and we were so

and he looked so good! There were complications with leakage, but after three more operations he was fine. Then he completed proud of him!"

"2009 was the year that my father and Freddy's mom passed away, and somehow for Freddy the moment had come to go home," Mayra says. "We came back in June 2010 while all the children and our only grandson stayed in Holland.

For me it's hard, really hard. Many times I wonder what I'm doing here. In the meantime our beautiful little granddaughter Jade was born. Freddy says I have to let go, but mother and children can't let go of each other; they are forever connected by a silk

"I respect my children's decision to stay in Holland," Freddy says. "They are adults, they make their own life. But if they want to come back, they know the way. They've got their house here and they are welcome.'

"Fathers are different," Mayra says. "They do have a silk thread, but that one goes to their mother, not to their children.

But... although my children are not here I do feel happy with what I have; I'm not lonely because Freddy never leaves me alone and I have my little dog Maya who is my companion. My house is tops and I sew, I crochet and embroider and I can plant as much as I like. I go to the Kriabon market to sell my plants, I am a member of Mi Mes Hofito and I am involved in everything agriculturally that Bonaire has to offer. Really, I am a farmer!"

"I belong here," Freddy says. "I feel free and I can do a little bit of everything. We re constantly in touch with the children and as we are longing for them,

they are also longing for us. Those are the things of life. I feel I am here to defend their interests because you never know in life. It changes all the time." ■ Story & photos by Greta Kooistra

Illich was born in April 1979. Freddy worked at Flamingo Beach in the kitchen, but when the casino opened he became a croupier. I had rented my house and lived at my mom's with the children and Freddy lived with his parents, but in January 1980 we moved into the house because Freddy couldn't stand it anymore. I told him 'we should get married some time...' and so in May 1981 we got married.

We've lived through all the ups and downs like all other couples, but we've never spent a day without each other. He has been a good father and a good husband. He's spoiled me, he did well!

In 1985 we bought a kunuku, and there I got pregnant with our daughter Queeny-Ann. It was a good kunuku with a windmill and a sturdy house, but before she was born we sold it; there were too many goat thieves. Freddy was afraid he would end up in jail, taking the law into his own hands...

One day before my birthday in 1988, my mother passed away. She was 72. Freddy's father had gone in 1983 when he was throw-

A few days after my mom's funeral, I got pregnant and our youngest son, Gustavo, was born in April 1989. We converted the porch into a bedroom for the two oldest children and the two little ones slept with us. It was a great time. Sometime later we took a loan and remodeled the house and changed

moved with Mayra's sister, but then the sister's boyfriend wanted him out. So I went to Holland to look for a house and three weeks later we were all living together again, except for Rucellia. It was a huge step, but we had to, because if we would not help our son, who would have? Nobody!


I started working for an employment agency at the shipyard. Then, just before his 21 birthday, Illich's kidneys stopped working. It happened practically overnight. I couldn't believe it; such things had never occurred in our families before." "I felt like standing on the edge of an abyss," Mayra says. "There was nowhere to go. He was dialyzed for 10 months. It happened in 2000 and in 2001 I asked the nephrologist, 'When are you going to put him on the transplant list?' His answer was, 'Do you have a kidney for him?' We stood there, my sister Haydee, Freddy and I, and we said, 'Together we have six kidneys."

"They chose me first," Freddy says, "and I passed all the exams with flying colors! The specialist said, "Except for when your son would have had an identical twin we could not have found a better match.' They called it a 'turbo kidney' and on the 17th of June 2002, my son and I were operated at the hospital of the Erasmus University in Rotter-

An Icon Retires - Riet Sealy

It was a retirement party to remember. On Wednesday, November 12th a tremendous bash was thrown for Riet Sealy, the woman who was the "midwife" for Youth and Family care on Bonaire.

At least 200 people were present as an astonished Riet arrived by 'mini-train' at a beautifully decorated Tera Kora Ranch, where she was invited to sit down on her 'throne' on stage. The party was organized by Youth and Family. Speeches were given by the chairman of the Supervisory Board, the Deputy, the manager of Youth

Care and Riet's brother. Master of ceremonies was Riet's former pupil, Aimed Ayubi.

The invitees came from high school, the elementary schools and crèches, from all the different organizations Riet has worked with throughout her career. There were colleagues and ex-colleagues, Riet's husband Arthur and other family members. The catering and decorations were taken care of by the late Wahid (who had sadly and unexpectedly passed away shortly before the event) and his wife Nelly. Upbeat music was provided

by the children's band, Kara Kora, but also adults - think, and and for sure, Riet was one of the first ones to hit the dance floor.

A couple of days later we met to do this interview during which Riet explained her career and brought the highlights forward, but most of all it sketched the image of an unconventional woman who has been deeply involved in the care for the children of Bonaire and their parents and who dedicated her entire career to improve their situation.

'I came to Bonaire in 1982 with my husband Arthur and our two kids, Timothy and Ingrid, who were toddlers. I was 30 and studying to become a Dutch teacher at high school. I continued my studies on Bonaire and then I went to Holland briefly where I graduated.

Back on Bonaire I gave Dutch classes to the government officials, then taught adults at Mavo night school. When the children went to elementary school I started teaching at SGB high school and studied pedagogics, graduating in 1986, then taught social science. There were no books; it was up to me to make it work. I had the students choose the subjects, so we would discuss social issues like drugs, teenage pregnancies, aids, sexuality and politics. I'd ask the students, 'What is it you want to know about it?' I'd divide the class in groups and tell them to go out and find their answers. I always try to find a way to make children -

not just assume. Everyone should form their own opinion.

After six years I was through with SGB. Teaching was fun, but the pedagogic climate at school was too traditional. To me, school is not only about teaching; it's also the atmosphere in which children are being taught; you have to make them critical and I only believe in sensible rules. Rules which are not functional or uncontrollable are useless.

I always work according to a vision: you have to educate children to become independent, strong parents of young children. The people, because that is something they can work with the rest of their lives. I am very much shaped by the emancipation movement; being emancipated, making your own decisions and carrying the responsibility for it. Freedom in restraint – because there is your partner, the children and the community you are part of. You are a free person, but you are connected with the people you live with, the people you work with and the society you live in.

When I was still with SGB, Ann Martha, Ruthlyn Bernabela and I founded Sebiki. Around 1995 the problems with troubled Antillean youngsters in Holland started, so a task force was founded in Holland and on the five islands. Goal was to

find out how to prevent youngsters from getting off the track, but Holland also wanted to keep them on the islands. So we opened a center where we gave parental support, information about how to raise a child and a number of courses and training. Our target group was the Sebiki center was a two-year project. When it was approved it became the Sentro Hubentut i Famia (Youth and Family Center) which officially opened on January 1st, 2012.

I was also involved in 'Kaleidoscoop,' a program for preschool (crèches) education. It was part of the education renewal program for the Antilles. We chose it because it was an international program from the US which connected best to our educational system. For the five islands, 20 coaches were trained. Bonaire got five and I was one of them. The coaches started training the daycare teachers; it was experiential learning, directly applicable in

practice. The project lasted for two years but it is ongoing as every three years the crèches and the teachers have to recertify. In fact it is a lifetime learning process; the teachers have to upgrade constantly and we, the Youth and Family Center

(previously Sebiki), must meet their needs.

In 2011 I thought 'Sebiki is taken care of and I'm going to retire'. I was 60! But then they were looking for a director to set up the Youth and Family Center and an urgent appeal was made to me if I wanted to do the job. I accepted because I wanted the new center to have a good start and I told them I would do it for two years so the base would be strong and then someone else could take over.

In the past I'd been the president of the teachers' union, Simabo, and so it was interesting to sit on the other side of the table being the director of the Youth and Family Center conjoining all the different parties in one organization. (Bonairean Youth Care, Porta Habri, Sebiki and Fundashon Mariadal's Parent and Child Care).

Well, after working with youth problems for 20 years, I can confirm that poverty has always been the main cause of these problems. At the time there was little or no money to do something about it; however society wasn't as complicated as it is now and it was actually quite manageable with the help of the family and the neighbors and the agencies involved.

Because of the social media, the tourists, drugs and the rich people who came to live here and the decrease in norms and values and a much more complicated society, the face of poverty changed and many people are now ending up on the edge of society.

On the other hand, I do see that new developments also offer new chances, be-

cause a lot has been and is invested in education, health care and assistance care, which should stimulate people to educate themselves and free themselves from poverty and the best way to do so, it to do it yourself with the help of the offered possibilities.

And that's emancipation; to take the responsibility for your own life and I know what I am talking about, because I grew up in poverty – a working class family with 14 children and my dad worked at a factory. If you want to get out of it, you have to do it yourself. Of course you're allowed to use all the help you can get, but then comes the time that you have to do it alone. Change comes from within.

On Wednesday, November 12th, I officially said goodbye. It was an immense event – the whole celebration. I've experienced it as a tribute to my entire career on Bonaire and I have to say that now I know what the word overwhelmed stands for....

'You've done a terrific job, although we didn't always agree.' This statement was made by various people and you know, it's true! Because for me it doesn't matter who you are- the governor, the director or the deputy, when I stand for something, I speak out!

I'm 62 and I'm going to spend more time making my mosaics, growing plants in my greenhouse and my granddaughters Eva and Sanza can visit me often. Also I'm planning on seeing my grandson Boris in Holland frequently and' she grins 'I'm going to develop teaching materials. I will do training and coaching, being involved directly with the people. 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Garden? Just Do It!





Papaya tree

t last the rainy season has started A after a long period of nearly two dry years. Plant lovers were crying after so many of their plants died and were not even thinking of planting anything more. But now we cannot complain. We have more than enough rain, and look how beautifully green Bonaire is.

So it's time to stop lying back. Come out of that chair and turn your yard into a lush green. Don't complain about the mosquitoes or the grass that is growing so fast and not leaving you a spot to plant. No, nothing like that. Save some old pants and long sleeved shirts, go in your yard between 10am and 4pm when mosquitoes are less active. If you are planting in pots look for a place with the most sunshine where the mosquitoes don't like to be. They prefer it under trees and shadowy places. So the more daylight the less trouble you'll have with all kind of bugs and mosquitoes. And don't forget: look for very dry old coconuts, take the husk off and either put it in a can or in a small hole in the ground and light it. The husk doesn't make a fire; it just smokes big. Around the bierput (cesspool) is very a lot and mosquitoes hate it. It's a very natural way to keep mosquitoes away from around your house or while you are busy planting in your yard. Try it and see how well it works. It's not expensive and unhealthy like bug spray; just a simple solu-

Some "Do You Know Things"

-Do you know that the beautiful flowering oleander is a very poisonous plant? And did you noticed that never any hungry donkey, iguana or goat ever eats any of its leaves? You see how smart nature is. Any animal knows that this plant will give them serious problems if they eat it. So with this

female papaya plants? So if you plant a papaya tree and it grows big with flowers but then never a papaya appears, then you know you have a male papaya tree. Sorry for you, waiting for a sweet home grown papaya. How to recognize the difference? A male tree has a lot white flowers on a long stem. A female has short white flowers directly on the tree. But you only notice that when the tree start giving flowers. So my advice is to plant more than one tree so that you have more of a chance to have a fruit bearing tree. Papaya seeds grow very easy and fast. If you ate a very tasty papaya, just dry the seeds for two weeks in the sun, then throw them in some dirt. Look how fast the young plants pop up. When they are like 10 cm. dig them up carefully and plant them in several places in the yard. They need 70% sun and a little shade. Close to the house is okay because they don't get that good; they will not destroy it; they have few roots but the main root grows deep, so it's important not to plant it on klip (limestone).

Papaya is a very healthy fruit to eat raw but also when green, cooked as a vegetable, stewed with beef or pork meat. Bonaireans make the most delicious stoba with it. Ask them for the recipe.

lowed by Vinyasa yoga with Laura, half an hour that flew past with postures,









here sea turtles go after they hatch? This used to be such a mystery to us scientists since the baby turtles are so small. Trackers were out of the question because they were just too big for the little turtles to lug around. New solar powered satellite trackers, which are only activated by air, are providing us with the first information on what these turtles (specifically Loggerheads) do from when they hatch to when they are grown up. It was found that

these babies drift, and they drift far! Some drift as much as 4300km, remaining close to the Gulf Stream that runs in the north edge of the Caribbean Sea. These little turtles hide and feed in Sargassum, which is a sea weed that floats on top of the water. Sea turtles are amazing and you know now where they go and grow up to be the majestic creatures that are so fun to see underwater.

n Sunday, November 9th, 21 volunteers got together at the Dive Inn location of Dive Friends Bonaire. As always the goal was to salvage as much fishing line as possible, especially new fishing line. This time it was Richard, from Dive Friends Bonaire/The Fishing Line Project, who informed the bunch of volunteers- experienced divers and nondivers. Goal, as always, was to clean our sea from fishing line. Especially new fishing line is hard to see for turtles and when they get trapped, they will die because every turtle now and then has to reach the surface to grab some fresh air.

The Bonaire government and Customs give permission to clean the underwater world of the Town Pier. The captain of the *Freewinds* gave orders to stop the engines. As always mesh bags and free air Green! were supplied by Dive Friends Bonaire.

For the 19 fishing line hunters it was a one-hour, non-deco dive. The level of the tide was very high this time. Hard to find

your way under the main pier. Water temperature was excellent and there was almost no current. Two volunteers remained ashore to observe the bubbles of the divers for irregularities. After the divers returned the volunteers collected all the fishing line and a little bit of other debris. After rinsing the dive gear and a physical clean up all volunteers went to the Freewinds where the captain and his crew invited the brave divers and other volunteers to a well prepared lunch.

The Fishing Line Project is run by Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB). Thank you again Dive Friends Bonaire for your hospitality, your free air and the use of your mesh bags. Thank you Captain of the Freewinds for inviting us for lunch. Together we can.

B o creates wonderful, hand-made bonbons and chocolates right here on the island, called "Beau Choco." She makes the sweet treats fresh for us in her own little workshop: white, milk and pure, fine Belgian chocolate, filled with rum, home-made coffee liquor, strawberries, apple syrup, peanuts and much more in a great variety of shapes and sizes.

Bo recently came back to the island after running her own chocolate shop in Belgium for the past four years. Though she loved every minute of having her own business, she explains that she worked seven days a week, long hours and as she did everything herself, never had a break. "I did not visit my family in Bonaire for six years." she says.

Bo smiles and tells: "When I left Bonaire I decided to study chocolate making, an education that takes two years." In order to become a professional chocolatemaker you need to know what you are doing. "You have to be very careful with chocolate," explains Bo. "If it is made fresh, like mine, then any little change in temperature, in the way it is cooled or even in the way the molds are rinsed can do damage to a beautiful bonbon."

Bo's hard work paid off and her chocolate shop in Belgium was a great success. "I missed my family though, and at 24 I wanted my weekends back," she says. Today ning Sinterklaas Speculaas truffles and apple-syrup bonshe enjoys chocolate making as a hobby. VARIABLE STARS

ate autumn is an excellent ✓ time to observe four of the most variable stars in the sky: Mira, Algol and Delta Cephei. While most stars shine with a steady light for most of their lifetimes, some stars show a changing brightness over time. These are some of the most intriguing objects in the sky and have contributed to our knowledge of the heavens.

But what is a variable star? As its name suggests, it is a star which, for one reason or another, varies in brightness over time.

Some stars' variability is regular as clockwork, caused by physical motion or rapid pulsation of the star's diameter; others are slow and irregular. Some are totally unpredictable. These stars are exciting to observe because you can never be sure ahead of time exactly what you will see, and sometimes you can actually see the star change brightness before your mous variable star. It is the type star of very eyes in real time.

Scientists use a magnitude scale for star brightness. On that scale, the lower an tances to globular clusters and nearby object's magnitude number the brighter it is, with negative number magnitudes denoting exceptionally brilliant objects.

Mira, in the large dim constellation of Cetus the Whale, was one of the first variable stars to be discovered. David Fabricius in 1596 was the first to notice that this star changed in brightness over time. Careful observations showed that this star varied in brightness from second magnitude, one of the brightest stars in this part of the sky, to naked-eye invisibility at 10th magnitude. Currently Mira is around 8th magnitude, so you will need binoculars to see it.

Our second star, Algol, has been known to be unusual since ancient times. Its name means "The Ghoul" in Arabic and it has sometimes been called the "demon star." In early illustrations, it is often depicted as the Gorgon's head in Perseus' hand.

Algol is what is called an "eclipsing variable." It consists of two stars orbiting serving variable stars so absorbing. each other at a close distance, less than 6 too. ■ Dean Regas & James Albury



million miles (9 million kilometers). As they orbit, each star cuts off the light from the other for a short period. The result is that Algol's brightness varies by 1.2 magnitudes every 2.86736 days, or 68 hours 48 minutes 59.9 seconds. Yes, its period really is known that precisely. Algol is the second brightest star in Perseus.

Delta Cephei is perhaps the most fathe "Cepheid" variables which are used as "standard candles" to calculate the disgalaxies.

The last variable is much fainter than these but one of the most unusual stars in the sky. Located in a small triangle of stars close to Deneb and the North America Nebula in Cygnus, SS Cygni is what is called a cataclysmic variable or a dwarf nova.

Just as a dwarf planet is not a planet, a dwarf nova is not a nova. It is like a nova in that it undergoes a significant brightening (about 5 magnitudes or 100 times brightness), but it does so at frequent and irregular intervals, roughly every seven to eight weeks. Most of the time it sits down around 12th magnitude, but for a day or two every two months, it pops up to 8th magnitude.

I find SS Cygni one of the most exciting objects in the sky to observe because I never know in advance whether it will be a dim 12th magnitude star or blazing forth at 8th magnitude. That's what makes ob-

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Turtles For Bid

Recently Bonaire's artists have been extremely busy creating, painting and assembling pieces of art. Nearly all the creations have one thing in common—they are in the shapes of turtles. "There is a whole range of everything", explains Sue Willis, project coordinator for Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB). "We've encouraged people to engage in different themes. For example, we have Trashtastic, which involves making mosaics with things that have been thrown away or washed up like beer bottles, plastics, driftwood. Then we have Turtle Extravaganza, works that have the most number of turtles on one single turtle."

Other categories include True Life, realistic turtle artwork; Fisherman's Friend, pieces that convey a strong sea turtle conservation message; Junior Delight, art for those 10 years and under; and Turtle Groupie, projects completed by a team of three or more artists. She wrote a nice poem that goes along with the piece and it says, 'On the back of each sea turtle ride the lives of many other sea turtles. If we save one, we save many.' That brings a lump to my throat every time I talk about it. Her artwork and the way she expresses it is so beautiful."
