referendum to consider alternatives to the current constitutional status of the BES Islands held last week in St. Eustatius (Statia) fell far short of the 60% turnout considered the minimum to make the result binding. The voting percentage of 45% is indeed low, especially on an island where elections and other referenda traditionally have seen a much larger participation.

Some observers said the much of the population felt the exercise wasn't worth the trouble. The vote was:

- Autonomous territory within the kingdom (747 votes)
- Maintain the status quo (374)
- Full integration into the Netherlands (14)
- Independence (5).

An increased concentration of the legionella bacteria was found in the drinking water distribution system in and around the new headquar-



ters building of the Caribbean Netherlands Police Force on the Kaya Libertador Simon Bolivar in Playa. Drinking water which contains legionella isn't necessarily a health hazard. Contamination is only possible by breathing in contaminated drops in, for example, showers and air conditioning cooling systems. The infection is contracted by breathing in the legionella bacteria when it is in aerosol form, like in shower water. Legionella is a pneumonic (lung) illness. It was first discovered in Philadelphia in 1976, when it caused an outbreak of pneumonia at an American Legion Convention, infecting 221 people and killing 34. Many outbreaks have often been in connection with cruise ships, according to the American Center for Disease Control.

In response to these results WEB took action by flushing and chlorinating the **Dutch Caribbean Police Force HQ.** Overseas experts were called in and exhaustive monitoring is continuing.

Coincidently, jobs to construct two new water supply pipes signed last week with the BWM and CWM companies. BWM will build a water supply pipe more than two kilometers long from Hato to the tank park at Seru Largu. CWM will build a water supply pipe of almost five kilometers long from the tank park at Seru Lagu to Kaya Maria C. Hellmund.

▶ With the joint unveiling of the "construction board," Commissioner James Kroon, Commissioner Jona Chirino and RCN/OCW Department Head Hans Kuilder officially kicked off the construction of the new facilities for the Papa Cornes elementary school. The building is split into four phases: during the first phase, the land will be prepared for construction, then respectively the buildings of Papa Cornes nursery and the day care will be built and a covered play area will be constructed. The last phase includes the completion of the site.

THE HAGUE—Dutch State Secretary of Social Affairs and Employment Jetta Klijnsma released an overview of \$4 million worth of projects for 2015 to help combat poverty in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. Twelve projects for St. Eustatius, eight for Saba and 13 projects for Bonaire were approved. They include integral district improvement, self- management for elderly and people with a light physical handicap, organizing sports activities, coaching youngsters so they can live on their own, go to school or work, renovation of homes of low-income families who will also be offered training to increase their chances of paid work, and, for Bonaire, job programs in the area of construction, agriculture and tourism/hotels/restaurants. Also, emergency social facilities will be offered and the day care centers strengthened.

Customs (Douane Caribisch Nederland) intercepted shipments of cocaine, cannabis, cash, spirits and cigarettes in November: 1521.80 grams of cocaine and 774.80 grams of cannabis with a street value of almost \$86,125; 20 boxes of spirits, 6 cartons of cigarettes and \$80,001 in cash. Arrests were made in Saba, Statia and Bonaire

Some examples: On 18 November, at the Bonaire South Pier, members of Team Fysiek Toezicht found 6 cartons of cigarettes during a routine inspection of a fruit boat. The cartons of cigarettes were confiscated and an official report was drawn up. On 20 November members of Physical Supervision Team intercepted 296.80 grams of cocaine at the Bonaire airport. The cocaine was found on a female passenger on a scheduled flight from Curaçao. On inspection it turned out that the passenger was carrying the cocaine internally. The passenger was arrested by Customs and was handed over for further investigation.



intercepted 674.40 grams of cannabis at the Bonaire airport from a male passenger on a scheduled flight from the Netherlands. On closer inspection it turned out that the passenger had swallowed balloons (bolitas) containing cannabis- see photo above.

After heading the TCB for the past two years the Director of Tourism, **Ethsel Pieternella** will step down. During his tenure Pieternella headed

► WILLEMSTAD--The management of the Taams Clinic in Curaçao reports that the hospital has basically stayed open. The radiology departments, the sleep centre, cardiology, laboratory and lung specialists are operating as patients are accustomed to, and the counter where clients can register is open from 7 in the morning. The clinic is in "dire straits" because of financial problems. However, the property is scheduled to be auctioned in late December.

TELBO has started to connect 'Fiber to the Home' in Amboina and Hato. The fiber optic cable will replace the copper wire lines so

▶ Dutch Social Affairs Minister Lodewijk Asscher has finalized draft legislation aimed at stopping companies in the European Netherlands from paying foreign workers wages different from Dutch staff. This, the ministers said, is disadvantaging Dutch workers, and by ensuring everyone is paid the same, companies will no longer be able to compete unfairly with each other. "People should get the same pay for the same job, whether they come from Rotterdam or Romania," Asscher said.

We note that in the BES Islands, workers who are significantly underpaid compared to European Dutch counterparts, are not covered by the new legislation

its network, with new service between Curaçao and Port of Spain. Three days later, on December 18, the company started direct flights between Curaçao and Georgetown, Guyana. The new flights take InselAir's network to 20 destinations. The airline is also preparing to launch two weekly flights between Aruba and Manaus in northern Brazil beginning in January 2015. InselAir remains the only carrier that offers direct service (albeit one-stop with a plane change) between the US and Bonaire to Miami.

HARBOUR VILLAG

► The Harbour Village Beach Club has again been voted Bonaire's Leading Hotel in the 2014 World Travel Awards, hailed as the "Oscars of the Travel Industry" by *The Wall Street Journal*. It was the resort's second consecutive year to receive the award, which it also won seven other times in the past decade.

► Harlton "Onnie" Emerenciana was sworn in as a member of Bonaire's Island Council for



UPB. He replaced Ramonsito Booi, who resigned as party leader and councilman ahead of the March 18 elections. Booi told *The Reporter* he wanted to minimize any connection between the vote and because of the appeal in the "Zambezi" case against him scheduled for a week earlier.

Havana/Washington—The US and Cuba agreed last Wednesday to restore diplomatic ties that Washington severed more than 50 years ago, and President Barack Obama called for an end to the long economic embargo against its old Cold War enemy. A major impact on Caribbean tourism is expected. With Havana being only 90 miles from the US with lots of unspoiled coast and undeveloped areas, it may be especially attractive to eco-tourists. Flights should cost a small fraction of what they are to the eastern and southern Caribbean.

► Construction of Bonaire's newest 125-person prison will begin January 5, 2015 and construction will last 18 months. Occupancy is set to begin in late 2016. It will replace the recently completed jailhouse in the middle of Kralendijk. No plans for that was announced.

► The Karnaval Commission announced that the 2015 Grand Karnaval Parade will follow a different route next year. It will begin at the Kaya Industria/ Kaya Emerenciana traffic circle and continue along Kaya Nikiboko Sùit to Kaya Caracas, Kaya Simon Bolivar, Blvd. J.A.Abraham, Kaya Gilberto Betico Croes, returning to Kaya Nikiboko Sùit to break up at the van der Tweel supermarket. The Farewell parade will follow essentially the same route but terminate at the Stadium in Playa for the burning of Momo.

► Can it happen here? December 18 was one of the busiest days of St. Maarten's cruise tourism season, with 7 cruise vessels in port and an estimated 18,000 cruise passengers and 8,000 crew members. That would be more than entire population of Bonaire. On the same day Aruba celebrated a huge milestone in its tourism history when it welcomed its onemillionth stay-over visitor in a year.

► As has become a tradition, elderly residents of 60-plus organizations in Bonaire were offered a Christmas dinner by a group of anonymous benefactors. On December 12 over 130 pensioners from Tera Kora, Nikiboko, Antriol, Nort Saliña and Rincon were treated to a festive meal at Divi Flamingo Beach Resort. They were served by volunteer employees of Maduro & Curiel's Bank (MCB), while John Hilgers provided the music. Afterwards all the guests received a small present and a 2015 calendar of Jong Bonaire, as well as pictures of themselves taken during the gathering by contributing photographers Melissa and David Phillip.




► According to a release from Bonaire's TCB, Bonaire's earnings from cruise ships will increase from \$10 million in 2013 to \$25 million in 2016. This results in an additional cash injec-

tion to Bonaire of \$24 million in three years (based on an a controversial value of \$70 per passenger). If true, for the local economy it means more jobs and business opportunities. **In 2016 cruise tourism is anticipated double to 350,000 from today's 144,000** cruise passengers. This is 35 times more than the assumed growth of 3% in the Caribbean.

On The Island Since a few weeks old-Julio Silberie

y mother had to go to Curacao to give birth,"

says Julio Silberie, "because it was too risky to have me here, so I was born on Curacao, July 10th, 1955. Then we went back to Bonaire, to Nort di Saliña. My father, Carlos Silberie, worked at the Washington plantation where he made carbon (charcoal). It was heavy work. Once the charcoal was ready he had to put it in big burlap sacks and take it to the entrance of the plantation where the houses were. There he would get a receipt -asimple piece of paper - with which he could buy groceries at the shop owned by the Washington plantation. However, there was always plenty of food; there were goats, which one could buy from the owner of the plantation, and there were lots of iguanas and fish.

My father spent the whole week at the plantation. He slept there, his life was very hard. The boss would take him home with the truck, sometimes on a Saturday, but most of the time he would only come home on Sundays.

I have one brother and two sisters. My sister Prisca lives here in Nort di Saliña and the two others live on Curacao.

When I was in fifth grade of St. Dominicus elementary school, the head of the school, Friar Candidus, told class, 'Tomorrow we're going to Lower Technical School to see what you can learn there after you've finished here.' I went home and told my dad and he said, 'You could do it, but I'm not making enough money to pay for your schoolbooks.' When I told the friar what my father said, he answered that he would ask the government for a loan which my father could pay back in installments. But I went home and told my father, 'You know what? I'm going to find a job so I can help you!'

I went to JC Herrera who imported Amstel beer from Curacao which was brought to Bonaire on Don Andres ships. The ship would arrive full of beer, and after customs had opened it the three of us would unload the cargo. One man would stand in the boat, one on the dock and the other on the pick-up truck. The beer came in boxes which we threw to each other, and when the pick-up truck was full we it doesn't matter! However, I

went to the storage to unload the truck, then back to the ship until it was empty.

I was 15 and it was hard work. It had to be done in one day because at night the ship would return to Curacao. I did it for about 10 years, then I began to work for Cultimara, at the warehouse, stack- couldn't get hurt at ing shelves. It was good, by far not Progreso and have as hard as the work at JC Herrera's. They also had a butcher shop and I told them I wanted to work with them. The boss, Clyde Marchena, said, 'No problem, but you have to arrange it yourself.' And so I started the next day. They showed me everything: the meatsaw machine, the freezer, the machine to make sausages and the display. Then they taught me how to serve the customers and how to weigh and calculate.

Later I learned how to debone meat, how to remove the membranes, to recognize the different parts of the meat;. You had to learn the exact names. By that time I was 27. After I'd learned how to cut the meat I had to learn to operate the meat saw machine. It was very dangerous; a difficult job. You cannot talk or listen to the radio because you have to stay sharp and pay constant attention. The door would always be closed and when someone would knock, the first thing to do was to turn the machine off. It required great concentration.

After work I would go to Progreso Supermarket to help the gentleman there. They also have a butcher shop but no people to saw. Sometimes I would stop at six at Cultimara, then I would be sawing was on vacation when I met IJs-

really had to watch out. because at Progreso I wasn't insured. I'd always say some prayers before I started working... you never know. And Cultimara was my regular job; I Cultimara pay for it!

My parents had already passed away some time before that, when one of my neighbors, Monica Melaan, asked me if I would like her daughter Andi to come and live with me. I told her it was no problem. So when Andi came I

didn't have to get up early anymore to cook before I went to work, and on Sundays I no longer had to wash my clothes. That was then, hahaha! Now I cook Saturdays and Sundays and on Sundays I do laundry too!


We have three children: Lucretia.

Luzmarina and Julius. Andi is a good person; she loves to joke. She is always friendly and never angry. Our children are good children too; they are sweet. They listen to us and

asked if I'd like to help make a movie about the Indians on Bonaire for Tourist TV. This gentleman came to talk to me. He drove me to my house and I told him that he could pick me up the following Sunday. After he'd left I looked around and thought, 'What am I going to wear!' Well, I got a couple of burlap sacks, put them in water to soak off the name of the potatoes, and when they were clean I cut them in half and with a fishing line I sewed them together until it was some sort of a loincloth, an apron. I did the same for my daughter Lucretia, who was also invited. They took us to Boca Onima and there I put on the cloth while this lady, who belonged to the crew, wrapped Lucretia's upper body in a long piece of fabric. We got a necklace with beads and animal teeth and a spear and we had to climb on top of a small cave between the cacti. The gentleman stood behind me with the camera

first time for me, because I'd also acted when I was younger.

From my father's side we are descended from the Indians, the first inhabitants of Bonaire. Bòi Antoin found out that we come from the Caiquetio Indians, natives of Northwestern Venezuela. It's a pity my father never spoke about it and we never asked, because now it's too late. Once, somebody had some Indians come over from Venezuela to make a roof of palm leaves. When they saw me in the street they all stood still to look at me; they just stood there watching...

For me Bonaire is still good, I work a lot with Makambas (the Dutch) so that's no problem for me.

There's only one worry I have and that's the children who are growing up now. The parents have to pay more attention to them and the children need to learn to listen otherwise I see a lot of trouble in the future. For me personally I feel the island is still tranquil and I hope it will



The drum is the center of a lively tradition where all of all the special events of the past year are sung. Have you done something good or have you behaved impolitely? If so, you, you may find that you're mentioned in the songs of the Bari. But you have an opportunity to answer in a song

The name refers to the Spanish barí, Baril (ton, barrel). Making it requires a skilled process. In recent weeks 25 children and young people received lessons in how to make and play barí. 



17, 2014, n November Fundashon Patrimonio Marítimo Boneiru (Bonaire Maritime Heritage Foundation) was officially registered at Notaris Schouten. The new foundation has five objectives. They are: to preserve artifacts, photographs, documents, charts and the aural/visual history of Bonaire's maritime past; to create a maritime heritage center where residents and visitors can visit and learn about Bonaire's role in the southern Caribbean's nautical history through interpretive displays and audio/video materials; to expose youth of all ages to their maritime past and involve them in learning activities such as seamanship, boat building, boat maintenance and boat restoration in order to develop skills and promote careers in the maritime industry; and to restore boats that are of historical significance to the ABC Islands.

To that end, Fundashon Patrimonio Marítimo Boneiru has started Project Stormvogel, an effort to save the last of the wooden sailing cargo ships of the ABC Islands. Stormvogel (Storm Bird) is a 45foot cutter that was built and launched on Bonaire in 1951 from the shores of Playa Pabou. Her captain, Martin Felida, had secured a contract to haul propane tanks between Bonaire and Curaçao. Stormvogel also transported charcoal, salt and live animals. She joined an unofficial fleet of local cargo ships

that served as the lifeline between the ABC Islands. But beyond delivering goods, these boats united families and friends and were essential to the islands' well-being, economy, and culture.

Stormvogel ended up decades later rotting away dockside in Curaçao. But the future now looks bright for the old boat. Descendants of Martin Felida have donated the vessel to Fundashon Patrimonio Marítimo Boneiru. François van der Hoeven from Curaçao is leading a group of volunteers in preparing the ship for transport to Bonaire in January. For three years, van der Hoeven personally pumped water out of Stormvogel weekly in a valiant effort to keep her afloat. He recently arranged for Curaçao Marine to haul out the boat and place her on dry dock free of charge. When asked why his Curacao crew

was working so hard on a boat for Bonaire, van der Hoeven responded, "Because they like wrecking so much! All joking aside, the volunteers here love the idea of saving a historical vessel. It does not matter that it will go to Bonaire. The Curaçao connection with the Stormvogel is part of the history of both islands.'

The new foundation has a fivemember board including Bòi Antoin, president; Eric van de Keuken, treasurer; Patrick Holian, secretary; Johnny Craane, head

of restoration; and François van der Hoeven. While arrangements are being made to transport the boat home, Bòi Antoin is busy videotaping interviews with old sailors from the time of sail when Stormvogel plied the seas. That includes Jan Felida, son of the boat's original captain, Martin Felida. Antoin will use these interviews and historic photos to make a documentary about this colorful era of our island's history. Segments will eventually be used on the foundation's website, which is now under development.

After restoration, Stormvogel will become the Bonaire Maritime Heritage Center where volunteer guides will give on-deck tours for school groups, residents and tourists. Maritime artifacts and multimedia displays will offer glimpses into the past below deck. One of the main goals of the foundation is to involve the youth through the project. That begins with the boat's restoration, which will kick off in early 2015 at the Navegante Boatvard in Hato. Eventually Stormvogel will serve as a training ship where volunteer adult sailors will teach young peo-

ple about seamanship, boat operation and ship maintenance. Patrick Holian



THE GALAXY GOURMET AND THE KITCHEN COSMOS

t's estimated that, 99.999% of all human beings who've ever lived, ourselves included, have never really had a clear concept of the scale of the universe.

To say that space is big is an understatement. How often do we think that those beautiful sparkling points of light in the sky are actually suns like our Sun, yet they're so far away that they appear as mere points of light? How often do we think of the differences in sizes between the various planets as they drift across our evening and morning skies?

Even with all the easy access we have to information about the universe, many of us still don't really relate to the size and distance of things when it comes to the night sky.

We have a neat demonstration that can help, and you can do it at home, using everyday objects you can find in your kitchen.

Let's first talk about **Jupiter**, **Earth** and our Sun. Jupiter is our largest planet, but what does that really mean? We can easily look up the fact that we could fit 1,300 Earths inside Jupiter, or it cosmic kitchen, consists of over 100 would take 1 million, 300 thousand Earths to fill up our Sun. For example, if and pumpkins, occupying a space 20 you drove in a car from the Sun to the earth at 70 miles per hour, it would take you almost 150 years to make the trip. Furthermore, it would take you almost 800 years to drive from the Sun to Jupiter and almost 6,000 years to drive from the Sun to Pluto.

But numbers are easily forgotten, so if you really want to relate to the cosmos, it's best to think of it in every day terms, and what could be more every day than your kitchen. So, the next time you pick up an orange, pretend that it's the Sun. Then, take a salt shaker and sprinkle some salt in your hand. If you can pick up just one of those grains of salt, that will represent the Earth, circling the orange at 30 feet away.

Now take a black bean. This little black bean represents the planet Jupiter,



circling 200 feet away, or one city block away from the orange.

The planet **Saturn**, would be another black bean, another city block away (or 400 feet from the orange).

Pluto, everyone's favorite dwarf planet, would be one speck of finely ground pepper, 10 city blocks from the orange.

But our Sun is just one of billions of stars in a family we call our galaxy. On this same scale, the Sun's closest neighbor, Alpha Centauri, is another orange, 1,300 miles away!

And all the other stars are fruits of different sizes and on the average are 2,000 miles apart. So our galaxy, from our billion oranges, grapefruits, cantaloupes million miles in diameter. And that's just one galaxy!

But, to show the number of stars in all the galaxies in the visible universe, it would take more oranges, grapefruits, melons and pumpkins than have ever grown since the beginning of time!

Remember, our Sun is just one of those oranges, with its 8 major planets and 5 dwarf planets, all mere specks of salt, pepper and black beans, circling less than 15 city blocks away.

Or think of it like this. The next time you're in your kitchen. If we could fit our entire solar system, our Sun and all its planets, including the distances between them, inside a coffee cup, our galaxy would be the size of North America! Dean Regas & James Albury


