Island Council elections are set for March so expect to see a blooming of color all over Bonaire this month as the political parties step up their efforts to attract voters. Look for red, white, blue and green flags everywhere.

▶Public consultations on rules based on the proposed Electricity and Drinking Water Law for the BES Islands has **started.** The government is looking for input on their law covering drinking-water quality, the reimbursement for excess environmentally sustainable (like wind and solar) electricity that users feed into the grid and consumer protection, including compensation for disruptions and rules on disconnection policy. The laws are part of the general draft Law on Electricity and Drinking Water, which is now under discussion in the Dutch Parliament. These draft rules are now available to the public in Dutch and English on Website: www.internetconsultatie.nl/ regelsElektriciteitEnDrinkwaterBes. Reactions may be sent to this website until March 10. If you have ideas be sure to submit them. They've made it easy.

► Caribbean Netherlands Labor Inspection Caribbean officers on Bonaire used their authority to shut down construction activities at a building site on Kaya J.N.E. Craane in Kralendijk. The main reason to stop the construction was the fact that there was immediate and grave danger for the employees. The site was very poorly protected against falling from heights. After the activities had been halted, the contractor immediately started corrections. A day later the measure was lifted. Compared to European Dutch construction practices many projects on Bonaire may be unsafe. The Labor Inspection Office reckons that orders for the suspension of work may be given more often in the future.

▶The top officials of the Caribbean Netherlands Police Corps held a press conference at police HQ to present the island's 2014 crime figures. The presentation disclosed that Bonaire had more vio-



lent offences with 318, with five major cases including the double murder on January 23, 2014. The number of violent robberies decreased from 51 to 39, while theft and burglaries were up. Break-ins at homes went down in the second half of 2014, supposedly because a notorious burglar left the island. There were 48 drug incidents, in which drugs were found 38 times. In 16 cases drugs were intercepted at the prison. There were eight cases of selling drugs.

▶ Happily, Museum Bonaire is finally coming out of the storage container and going into a proper building—see page 3. However, that building is the one that was used s a local art gallery showcasing island artists. With so much local talent it is time for a new Kas di Arte to onen.

▶ Heel prick screening of newborn babies was begun on Bonaire on January 1, 2015. Later this year, St. Eustatius and Saba will follow. Bonaire's Public Health Department and the San Francisco Hospital of the Mariadal Foundation worked together with the Dutch Ministry of Public Health, Wellbeing and Sports VWS and the Centre for Population Research of the National Institute for Public



Health and the Environment of the Netherlands

Heel prick cards with the blood of the newborns will be sent to the Netherlands and screened for 17 diseases. The neonatal screening, offered to babies shortly after their birth, aims to trace rare, mostly genetic diseases. Timely treatment can prevent or limit severe damage to the physical and mental development of the child.

Prison Tourism is not only a feature of Bonaire—a new bigger prison is under construction- but will be expanded in the European Netherlands. This summer, up to 242 convicts will be brought from Norway to the Netherlands to serve out their sentences in a Dutch jail, junior justice minister Fred Teeven told parliament on Thursday.

The prisoners will not necessarily be Norwegian. "It could be a Pole, Latvian or Lithuanian with a Norwegian prison sentence," Teeven said. The plan to bring in foreign prisoners is one of several measures introduced by Teeven to try to improve prison service finances. Belgium already places some of its prisoners in Tilburg because of its shortage of jail spaces.

Bonaire will most certainly entertain prisoners from the other BES Islands and perhaps from the entire Dutch Caribbean as well.

▶WILLEMSTAD--The Meteorological Service of Curaçao ("Meteo") will soon be getting a new weather radar that enables local forecasters to detect bad weather earlier for the ABC islands. Hopefully it will restore public access to the radar information previously available via the Internet.

The existing radar is obsolete and now so old that spare parts are difficult or impossible to get. The new radar accurately predicts rain areas, lightning, tornadoes and turbulence, but can also identify areas where hail is expected.

However, we have hope that much of the original exhibit is still intact and that it will be a pleasant surprise when it finally opens. The temporary director, Papito Thomas, has pushed to have things finally happen and so – in Bonaire fashion they are happening. NAAM (The National Archaeological - Anthropological Memory Management) who is also responsible for what happens to this museum will be around to help.

Thankfully, the old historical Museum Bonaire building on Kaya Julio C. van der Ree 7, Sabana, is being restored by a private party and could also become a museum. 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Nature Conservation Gets A Boost

EXTRA MONEY FOR SHARK PROTECTION



ast week the Dutch 'Postcode ✓ Loterij' approved a grant of USD \$1,9 million for a three year project aimed at shark protection in the waters of Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, Saba, Sint Eustatius and Sint Maarten. The money will be made available to local marine parks through the Dutch Caribbean Nature Alliance (DCNA), which is a nongovernmental organization in which nature parks on all six Dutch Caribbean islands cooperate.

The implementation of this project will be done together with local communities, fishermen and researchers and directed by local experts.

Mr. Tadzio Bervoets, manager of the

Sint Maarten Man of War **Shoal Marine** Park, is delighted: "All of us who work with these majestic creatures are unbelievably excited and appreciative of the Postcode Lottery for this significant and important contribution. Not only for shark conservation on our islands but also within the region, where much work is being done to understand these important creatures

and the role they play in the health of our oceans and the sustainability of the island firmly underway on St. Maarten, where communities that depend on the sea. All of the involved marine parks have put shark conservation and educating the public on the importance of sharks as a top priority and with this significant boost we will be able to better understand these wonderful creatures and educate our communities on their beauty, their importance for nature and last but not least their contribution to the development of our diving tourism."

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
Sunset Beach

From recently published plans it looks like development of the Sunset Beach property will be done in a way that will provide jobs and business opportunities for Bonaireans -without erecting a new large hotel. A proposal made in 2010 by the Playa Publico Action Group suggested the property could be used for:

- 1. A water sports facility owned by locals. People could rent chairs, umbrellas, snorkel and windsurf gear, paddle boats, take snorkel or windsurf lessons, etc.
- 2. A local Snek like Maiky's or Antriol Catering, selling food, ice cream, pastechis, drinks, etc..
- 3. Art Gallery
- 4. A boardwalk so even the eldbeach and the sea
- 5. A kresh and a playground where people can leave their children to play near the sea
- 6. A protected swimming area and life guards for the entire beach
- 7. A boat ramp for small boats
- 8. A beach volleyball and games

The drawings indicate places for these activities. The 12 acre property has been divided into three parcels. The project scale is small so development should be affordable to local entrepreneurs.

Last week's press release was



to provide clarity about planned near-term developments at the location, some of which are alerly and handicapped can enjoy the ready underway. Loads of sand are piled along the shore and automobile access has been limited. People are continuing to use the area during this activity. The intention is to maintain free access to the beach for local people while allowing sustainable development of the area which is one of Bonaire's prime seaside locations.

Business for Bonaireans

"It would be really positive if the area could be developed so that Bonaireans could afford to open businesses there to serve the locals and tourists who would come to a public beach as we did in the past,"

said Sherwin Pourier, manager of a local bank.

From an economic point of view, Pourier continued, "such a smallbusiness-oriented development would provide far more opportunity for our people than another hotel where many of the best of any new jobs would go to foreign-

"Of course building a new hotel would create construction jobs," said Sidney Manuel, a local contractor and president of AKIB. "But would that contract go to a Bonairean company? I doubt it. And with the current tight market for construction labor, where would the workers come from? If the area was developed for small businesses there is a much greater

chance that the work would go to local people and we would not have to import more workers."

"I truly hope that the Sunset Beach area will be developed in a way that benefits our local entrepreneurs and workers rather than some foreign company," added

A 2010 survey among both residents and visitors showed overwhelming support for preserving the beach as a public amenity. More than 88% of all respondents and 80% of all Antilleans chose preservation of the beach as opposed to a large hotel or luxury housing. It's taken five years for this message to sink in... and just prior to the perhaps the most critical local elections in the island's

One resident commented in the survey, "Most of the money earned by large hotels on Caribbean islands goes to foreigners. Combine that with the fact that they pay very little in taxes and pay below minimum salaries to the majority of their employees and the result is that big hotels do not contribute substantially to the financial health or to the prosperity of the islands."

Environmental Relief

Sorobon beach is an area that is fragile and receives more people than it can sustain during cruise season. This causes permanent damage to our environment and, at

the same time, damages the place for our own people. If we can develop Sunset as a public beach we can provide a location for many people to enjoy and, at the same time, reduce the pressure on other sites and protect our island."

During cruise season, the pressure on the beaches at Sorobon is intense. A well-planned and managed beach at the Sunset site would reduce this threat to the sea grass beds and mangroves."

Following storm damage, bankruptcy and a fire the large area west of the traffic circle has been vacant, but still used by donkeys, goats, dogs as well as people. Since 2006 the Island Government has been the owner of the land. In the past, attempts have been made to develop the entire area, notably a failed scheme by Divi Resorts. In 2013, the government launched a public process to select feasible projects.

Until the full project is finalized there is an agreement with Coco's Beach Management to improve the public space and the beach and make it usable in the short term. This company will invest in the improvement and in return receives the right to benefit from the beach in order to recoup the investment. We will continue to report on this as it develops. ■ Jane Townsend/ G..D.

At 9:45 that early Saturday morning the check in of volunteers took place. Non-divers were more than welcome to help in collecting, rinsing and separating the huge variety of trash. Lionfish hunters were also welcome. The official briefing was at 10am sharp. Divers were instructed about the do's and the don'ts in the underwater world. Just collect fresh trash. Leave old trash, partly covered by new coral to the sea. Do not collect

cans with paint as the paint might destroy the dive gear. Then the bunch of volunteers took off in the direction of Karel's Pier. After a one-hour, nondeco dive they collected more than 1,600 items. was born in Surinam but grew up in The Netherlands where we moved when I was four. In Holland two sisters were born. First we lived in Hilversum, a lively town, centrally located, then we moved to Lelystad, a brand new, but remote place in one of the polders.

There was a mix of many cultures and I was a small boy. Almost all the other little kids were physically stronger than I and so, when a new judo school was opened my parents said 'that would be good for Ronnie!' That's how I started with judo. The teacher immediately had us participating in competitions in other cities. The training turned out to be of great advantage when I grew older.

Eventually my parents decided to move back to Hilversum where I went to high school and did Havo/MBO. Subsequently I did Higher Professional Education -Computing and Information Sciences - in The Hague. After two more years of University I got my Master's degree and became an engineer. I got a job with Media Group West, part of the Telegraaf newspaper, providing info service for the commercial TV stations. I worked for them for four years, moved to another media company and three years later I started my own media agency.

I was extremely ambitious, but when I look back, it's with mixed feelings. You have a large social network, you attend lots of parties, you drive an expensive car and you wear designer clothing. It's very much about appearances and there's fierce competition. I had a real good time though and business was booming, however, at a certain moment I looked at myself and thought, 'What is this all about? There must be so much more to life!'

To tell you the truth," he grins, "I was a terrible go-getter. I never went on vacation and I was never sick (even if I was) and I used to speak bad about people who would go on sick leave. Then I met the girl who is now my wife, six years ago. I was 31 and my

outlook on life changed completely.

It was an early Thursday night and I'd just come from a dinner meeting. I was walking in the center of Amsterdam when I heard some commotion and saw one of my business contacts almost hit a girl with his car. It was close enough to say something, so I asked the girl, 'Are you okay?' She walked up to me and she said. 'I'm fine!' Then I saw how lovely she was and my mind started racing because I didn't want to let go of her. As we had already exchanged some words it wasn't hard to keep the conversation going so I invited her and her girlfriend for a drink. We had a very nice conversation and she told me her name was Valeriya. Before the girls left we exchanged phone numbers and I went for a bite to eat. Then we went to Bonaire. My sister was working as a trainee with Plaza Resort and I wanted to introduce Valeriya to her and the island seemed a nice destination. We loved it: a real Caribbean island but developed, and we joked about coming to live here when we were older. Then we returned to Holland.

Valeriya is half Bulgarian, half Russian. Just before we met she was offered a job in Bulgaria but she had second thoughts about accepting the job. Well, I encouraged her to go for it and told her we would stick together no matter what. I came to see her every weekend – a three-hour flight and

In Varna we got the idea of going to Bonaire, and with the little money left we flew to Bonaire and rented a small apartment. Our plan was to work in a restaurant. The second restaurant we walked into hired us on the spot. Soon after I was also teaching mixed martial arts classes at Health & Fitness Center Bonaire. We could pay the rent and we bought a scooter. After four months we decided Bonaire was what we wanted so we went back to Holland to arrange the paper work and say goodbye to family and friends.

While we were in Holland, Valeriya was asked through her (modeling) network if she'd like to get married on a TV show. We went to see the people involved in the show and after some talking they told us the wedding would take place within a week. We were flabbergasted. What to tell our parents? But somehow it all worked out and everything was taken care of, literally everything; it was fantastic!

Before we left Bonaire, I was offered the position of manager/ barman at the 'At Sea' restaurant, and Valeriya was promised a job at Harbour Village. So we had a solid foundation to come back to. After having been in Holland for a month, the owner of the Health and Fitness Club Bonaire asked me if we would be interested in buying the place. I thought 'Wow! If we could do it, it would be a dream come true!' All my life I'd been into sports. I'm a black belt in judo, jiu-jitsu and karate and all my life I've done kickboxing. we did find a way – unbelievable!

I had just started at 'At Sea' and I couldn't disappoint the owners, so Valeriya worked the afternoons and evenings at the gym while I did the mornings. After


six months of working morning, noon and night it was time to make up my mind, so I went to work full-time at the gym. In September it will be four years. December 2013 we moved into what used to be the bowling alley because we needed more space and we're doing well!



And why the new hours now, when everyone has to get new vehicle stickers? Enjoy waiting in the lines and chatting with your friends or bring a book.
- The new route for the Karnaval Parade 2015 is generating not-so-positive "words on the street." Some parade participants are complaining the route is too long, some parade watchers are complaining there is no shade or nearby bars/restaurants, some homeowners complaining they will be prisoners in their homes for hours. First time in Bula's long memory that the parade will not be going down Kaya Grandi. The parade route for the Grand March on Sunday, February 15: Parade will begin on Kaya Nikiboko South at the roundabout crossroad with Kaya Industria/Kaya Emerenciana, proceed down Kaya Nikiboko South, Kaya Caracas, Kaya Simon Bolivar, J.A. Abraham Blvd., Kaya Gilberto Croes, back down Kaya Nikiboko South and end in the area of van den Tweel.
- Is it just coincidence that there are 2 cruise ships in town on Karnaval Sunday? (Ironically, one of them being one of the big Carnival line cruise ships.) Did someone feel a need to keep the streets clear for the tourists?
- Many months ago Telbo announced it would be offering super high speed cellular phone service. According to local newspaper èxtra, Telbo is working with a cell service out of Aruba which will allow "roaming" service on Bonaire. Their sources report that the SIM cards were not "functioning optimally" and did not work with the roaming system so the cards need to be "revised." 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

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

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Great Fishing!

The 27th Bonaire International and Local Fishing Tournament was a great success. With only a sliver of a new moon the fish



were hungry by morning. With a first strike brought in and released in less than an hour after the lines were in the water, the tournament was off to a great start. There were a total of 21 boats in the **International portion: 16 from Aruba** Curacao and Venezuela and 5 from Bonaire. Many of the foreign boats made a full vacation of it, arriving up to two weeks in advance to enjoy the island and seek out the best fishing grounds. With only 21 boats, a total of 35 releases and 12 strikes that were lost in 2 days, kept all of the boats and the control center very busy. Yet... there was still enough energy for great parties at night. An amazing 17 out of the 21 boats got their name on the board with at least a strike. Day one was the day of the blues with 10 blue Marlin, 4 White Marlin and 2 Sail fish released and 7 strikes that were lost. Day 2 the White Marlin took the hook with 13 releases and only 4 Blue Marlin, 3 Sailfish and 5 lost.

Each Blue Marlin released is worth 300 points and each White or Sailfish are worth 150 points. The tie is broken by the first to reach the points. If they are released at the same time, the time of the strike is then used as the next tie breaker.

No bill fish are taken aboard. A strictly controlled set of photos are taken to confirm the release along with control codes given over the radio and times recorded by the control to match up with the photos.

In the "big boat" class, *Naira* from Aruba took first place with 1,200 points and the first release for Friday. *Sea Ross* from Curacao also with 1,200 points, came in second. *Alina* from Aruba grabbed the 3rd place with 900 points while *Meal Ticket* from Bonaire took 4th with 600 points and the prize for first release on Saturday.

La Gorda from Bonaire won the most tuna while Alina from Aruba brought in the largest tuna. The monster weighed in at 45kg. Afishonado from Curacao took both the most and the largest Dorado, while all of the Wahoo stayed hidden from this tournament. The locals did find their share of these!

The local fishing tournament, for mostly smaller boats, also saw record catches with 21boats participating and 13 of those made the board. Those 13 boats brought in an amazing catch of more than a ton of fish -1,034 kilos (2,275lbs). You can be sure that there tuna is featured as the catch of the day in many restaurants. There was a huge variety of fish caught. The market at It Rains Fishes is certainly well stocked with the buyers on the pier ready to snatch up much of the fresh fish arriving.

The local tournament aims for fish to eat and the fishermen keep their own catch.

For the boats 17 feet and under, **Eugene Granviel on** *Devoron* reeled in 5 fish for a total of 31.5 kg for **third place**. **Larry Gerharts on** *Kido* brought aboard 26 fish with 56kg for **second place**, while **Renny Cicilia on** *Speed* took **first place** with 38 fish for a total of 65.5kg.

For the boats 17 feet and larger Humphrey Thomas on Rainbow Runner caught 46 fish for a total of 110kg for third place and Nicolaas on Wild Lady took second with 41 fish at 122.5kgs

and **Eddie Coffie on** *Double Eagle* wore out the reels hauling in 92 fish tipping the scales at 189kg, for **first.** Not bad for one day of fishing!

We hope that next year the fish are equally hungry and the anglers equally skillful in bringing them in.

Napa and It Rains Fishes were the main sponsors of the events. Of course none of these competitions would be possible without the participation of our island partners who have supported the tournaments throughout the years. We are

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My Little Shop

n Bonaire there are still some tiny little shops, called "tokos," found in the neighborhoods. They struggle to survive. In order to get the story behind those shops our reporter visits them. If you don't want those shops to disappear, support them by visiting them and buy something. Every dollar counts for them.

Let's keep them going. They represent Bonairean history.

Toko Trupial

On Kaya Rafaela you find **Toko Trupial**, a small toko in Antriol. If you follow Kaya Linda past Hillside and keep on driving the asphalt road with some curves you will find this toko on your left hand side. Parking is no problem. The toko is open from Monday till Saturday from 11am to 7pm.

Who is the owner?

Olga Christian, who originally comes from the Dominican Republic, owns the shop. She rents the building and owns the inventory. She's lived on Bonaire for 32 years. She started out as a cleaner of hotel rooms, married a Bonairean man from Rincon who unfortunately passed away and has rented toko Trupial for 18 years. She came here for work and gradually learned to speak Papiamentu. She really likes Bonaire and is very grateful she can live here. Bonaire feels very safe to her, and in comparison to the Dominican Republic it has fewer problems and less poverty.

She started her business, as she says, when Bonaire was still Bonaire. There were hardly any Chinese supermarkets and snacks and everybody would pass by her shop and had some guilders to spend. On Sundays there would be barbecue. People would play dominos and there was a lot going on. In Rincon there was literally nothing to buy, so everybody would come to Playa. Those were the days!

What is sold?

Olga sells all kinds of drinks and you can sit in her shop or outside to enjoy them. She sells candy, nuts, canned vegetables, groceries and some fruit, onions and potatoes from local neighborhood growers.

Where do the customers come from?

Most of the customers are people who live in the neighborhood. They come to drink a beer, talk with each other and exchange information about what is going on. If people have forgotten an ingredient they come to her shop to get it. People go to the big Chinese supermarkets to get their daily food, so she cannot have a large stock in the store. She usually gets around seven to eight customers per day; she cannot afford to close because she can't take the risk of losing customers

A couple of months ago there were a lot of Dutch people visiting her business. They had made a tour and passed by different small shops. She really liked this, having some more and different

people around. Wouldn't it be great to organize this more often?

How to survive?

It has become very hard to survive. As Olga can only buy small quantities she does not get a discount from the wholesaler. As her customers have become poorer they don't buy a lot and they go to supermarkets where it's cheaper. She earns less than the minimum wage and works to be able to eat, as she has a very low pension. Still she wants to keep on going. She doesn't like to give up and let other people take over. She saw things change since 1995: Chinese people took over a lot of shops and Bonaireans gave up their businesses. She doesn't under-

stand why the government allowed this to happen.

The future - hopes and wishes

She hopes to be able to continue her work. She really wants the Bonairean people to be proud of their island and have some chances. *No hay major terra que la mia* (There is no better land than

my own) should be their slogan, as it is hers. To feel that is to be rich! Story & photo by Justine Verschoor



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
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That sharks are losing their sense of smell due to ocean acidification? Sharks have a keen sense of smell that can detect prey from great distances. Carbon dioxide (CO₂) is released into the atmosphere by the use of fossil fuels and decreases the pH of ocean water. This acidification of the ocean is associated with global climate change and has been shown to affect how marine predators detect their prey, including sharks. In a recent study, adult smooth dogfish sharks avoided squid odor after swimming in a pool of water that had been treated with the levels of CO₂ pre-

dicted for the year 2050. Predator behaviors like tracking and attacking of prey are dependent on the sensing of odors. These senses were greatly reduced with increased levels of CO₂. The next time that you smell some delicious fish, think about how sharks may lose this ability because of fossil fuel overuse!

materials, what kind of containers to use for planting, how to make the soil productive, how he uses different animal manure. (Even iguana manure is collected to mix with dirt and old animal bones which Emanuel says is phosphorus for the plants.)

Two greenhouses have peppers, parsley, tomatoes, string beans, spinach and more.

Okra (yambo) grows in a mix of soil and cardboard. There is a bee hive with bees for honey.

All the vegetables, flowers, trees, herbs grown with all these different techniques are unsprayed and without any other chemical stuff. Just pure natural.

There was way more interested things to see, too much to say. One just has to visit

this garden to admire the amazing job Emanuel and his partner Sandra do there. At the end they offered us a great lunch which was the best taste of veggys from a botanical garden.

Emanuel, an experienced gardener, come from Ecuador, Sandra from Chile. Both are busy in the botanical garden. Sandra is also busy with a kind of art. She makes colorful bags ,things from old wood, renews chairs and much more.

COSMIC VALENTINE

If you want to give your sweetheart something special and out of this world for Valentine's Day we have a trio of exquisitely beautiful objects in the cosmos, gift wrapped and ready to present right here in the Bonaire Sky Park.

On Valentine's night, Saturday, February 14th, after sunset face west where you'll see an exquisitely beautiful, dazzlingly brilliant object that may look like a star. But a star it is not. It is, instead, the brightest planet we can see from **Earth**, the planet named for what else- the Roman goddess of love, 8,000-mile-wide **Venus**.


If you have a telescope take a look at Venus and you'll see that Venus is not quite round. Venus is on the other side of the **solar system** so it's much smaller now than it will be this summer when it will be much, much closer.

You can celebrate this Valentine's Day by first showing your loved one the super bright planet of the goddess of love shining down on both of you, which will be prettier than any Valentine's Day card out there. Then for a super special cosmic Valentine's look due south between the hours of 8 and 9 pm and you'll see a very bright red star shining above the horizon. In fact it's the brightest red star we can see with the naked eye from planet Earth and, just coincidentally, it reaches its highest point above the horizon every Valentine's Day between the hours of 8 and 9 pm.

It marks the shoulder star of the great sky-giant **Orion the hunter** and its name is **Betelgeuse** which most people pronounce beetle juice.

If we compare Betelgeuse, the Valentine's star, with our own star, the **Sun** and our own planet the Earth, you'll understand just how big. Our Earth is 8,000 miles wide, which means it is pretty dinky compared to our Sun, which is 865,000 miles wide. In fact, we could fit over one million Earths inside our Sun. Betelgeuse, however, is so huge we could fit over 160 million of our Suns inside it. And that's just when Betelgeuse is at its smallest size.

We say smallest size because Betelgeuse changes its size regularly like a gigantic slowly pulsating heart, one that beats how-



ever, only once every six years. When Betelgeuse is fully contracted and at its smallest size it is still about 500 times the width of our Sun but when it expands to its biggest size it is almost 900 times as wide.

Or, if you care to think of it this way, if we could place Betelgeuse where our Sun is, when Betelgeuse is at its smallest, it would stretch out past the orbits of **Mercury**, **Venus**, Earth, and all the way to **Mars**. But when it's at its largest it will reach all the way to **Jupiter**.

And if you turn and look east you'll spot Jupiter the king. It is the biggest and almost the brightest planet we can see from Earth, the planet named for the Roman king of the gods. If you have binoculars or a telescope take a look at Jupiter on Valentine's night and look for a close pair of lights above Jupiter. They are two of Jupiter's moons, **Io and Europa.** And you can watch them separate after an early evening kiss that night.

So, there you have it. A brilliant planet named for the king of the gods right after sunset in the east. In the west the planet of love, Venus, and due south between 8 and 9 pm and at its highest, the biggest cosmic Valentine you'll ever want to give - Betelgeuse - a giant red star slowly beating like a heavenly heart for your sweetheart courtesy of our local galaxy. Is this a romantic cosmos or what?

Shelter News

Spay and Neuter Animal Shelter Tips:

The single most important thing that we can do to save cats and dogs from all the suffering and death that their overpopulation causes is to spay and neuter them. Spaying and neutering are routine, affordable surgeries that can prevent thousands of animals from being born, only to suffer and struggle to survive on the streets, be abused by cruel or neglectful people, or be euthanized for lack of a loving home.


Spaying and neutering makes a big difference: Just one unaltered female dog and her offspring can produce 67,000 puppies in only six years. In seven years, one female cat and her offspring can produce an incredible 370,000 kittens!

Sterilized animals live longer, happier lives. Spaying eliminates the stress and discomfort that females endure during heat periods, eliminates the risk of uterine cancer, and greatly reduces the risk of mammary cancer. Neutering makes males far less likely to roam or fight, prevents testicular cancer, and reduces the risk of prostate cancer. Altered animals are less likely to contract deadly, contagious diseases, such as feline AIDS and feline leukemia that are spread through bodily fluids.

Spay and Neuter Facts

Will my animal's personality change after spaying or neutering?

Spaying and neutering will only reduce or eliminate the behaviors that you don't want, such as aggression and urine marking. Neutered males are less likely to



roam, fight, or mark their territory with urine, and spayed females experience less hormone-related moodiness. In exchange, your companions will likely become more interested in you (rather than finding a mate) and will still protect your family.

Will spaying and neutering affect my animal's weight?

No. Cats and dogs become overweight and inactive because their guardians feed them too much and exercise them too little, not because they are sterilized.

Why should I have my male cat or dog neutered?

Male animals contribute to overpopulation even more than females do. Just one unsterilized male animal can impregnate dozens of females, creating dozens upon dozens of unwanted offspring. Neutering also eliminates male animals' risk of testicular cancer and reduces unwanted behaviors such as biting.

Should I let my female animal have one litter before having her spayed?

It's best to spay animals before they reach sexual maturity in order to reap the full health benefits. Spaying your female companion animal before her first heat cycle means she will have one-seventh the risk of developing mammary cancer. Spaying also eliminates female animals' risk of diseases and cancers of the ovaries and uterus, which are often life-threatening and require expensive surgery and treatment.

What if I can find homes for all my animal's puppies or kittens?

Even if you manage to find loving, lifelong homes for all the puppies or kittens, that means that there will be that many fewer homes for puppies and kittens in animal shelters who desperately need to be adopted. And unless you ensure that every puppy or kitten you place is spayed or neutered before going to his or her new home, they can go on to produce litter after litter of offspring themselves. (See first column in bold).

Is sterilization safe?

Spay and neuter surgeries are the most commonly performed animal surgeries. Most animals experience relatively little discomfort (anesthesia is used during surgery, and pain medication is generally given afterward) and are back to their normal activities within a day or two.

The Animal Shelter Bonaire offers a free spay/neuter for the cats and dogs of Bonaire. Visit the Shelter on the Lagoen Road or call for more information. (717-4989). ■




ho wants to adopt handsome Jim?

Preserving Bonaire's Intangible Cultural Heritage with UNESCO

"INTANGIBLE HERITAGE IS THAT BIT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE THAT 'YOU CAN'T TOUCH.""

n January 20 and 21, 2015, Bonaire hosted an extensive National UNESCO Consultation on Intangible Cultural Heritage preservation. This National Consultation is part of the sub-regional program called "Strengthening the capacities of Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, St. Eustatius, Saba, St. Maarten and Suriname to implement the Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage."

The Netherlands and Bonaire have ratified the 2003 UNESCO Convention for the Preservation of The Intangible Cultural Heritage, but now the island has to find a way to make use of the ratification of this convention and implement it.

Ms. Himalchuli Gurung, UNESCO Program Specialist for Culture at the Kingston Cluster Office was in attendance to explain

ways to implement this UNESCO Convention and function as an adviser for Bonaire's cultural parties that will continue the implementation strategies. Heritage consultant for the National Commission for UNESCO Netherlands, Cornelieke de Klerk, was also

A wonderful welcome to the Consultation was given by Ms. Liliane de Geus, who specified the different relationships between UNESCO, The Netherlands, the Caribbean Cluster Office and the various islands including Bonaire when it comes to Intangible Heritage Preservation. Ms. Gurung continued with a presentation on the implementation of Intangible Cultural Heritage, explaining clearly to everyone present that Intangible Heritage is that bit of cultural heritage that "you can't touch."

"Think of stories and music, dance and specific trades like boatbuilding or basket weaving. This is the 'living' heritage, the heritage that is usually transferred from the older generation to the younger one by listening and doing. Some of this heritage is still very much alive today, but a lot is in danger of being lost forever by what is called 'the last guardian' of this heritage. Think of the last person who knows how to dance a specific dance, sing a particular song or has working knowledge to build a traditional ship. Within the UNESCO Convention for Intangible Cultural Heritage, intangible heritage can be placed on a Representative List and on an urgent list- for the heritage that is in danger of being lost immediately."

Mr. Richenel Ansano, director of The National Archaeological - Anthropological Memory Management (NAAM) in Curacao was also present to sign a protocol with Commissioner Jona Chirino-Felida for future cooperation between the islands.

Danilo Christiaan spoke about the function of Mangazina di Rei for Bonairean heritage preservation. Then the group enjoyed a traditional lunch and was transported back to Captain's Don's Habitat where the Cultural Policy plan Bonaire was presented, the Cultural Relation between the BES islands and The Netherlands (*Cultuur Handreiking*) was explained and the Bonaire Government cultural funding contracts were clarified.

The next day, at the Island Council building, **Bòi Antoin** took the floor and explained his research, the programs he has made, the library he established and the various websites on which much of Bonaire's intangible heritage has been made accessible through books and television programs. Ms. Gurung explained a little more about actual implementation tools for the Safeguarding of the Intangible heritage and Ms. de Klerk pre-

sented a to-do program for St. Eustatius – giving a quick, clear picture of the steps one can take to start the implementation process.

Various representatives of the Bonairean community were

present to listen in on the presentations and to offer help and advice. A discussion on the subject made clear that a commission will be formed by interested parties to continue the implementation process and that a group with five selected members will attend the next conference by UNESCO in Curacao that will provide them with an implementation toolkit.

It became clear that those present considered of utmost importance getting youth of Bonaire involved in the process of safeguarding their Intangible Cultural Heritage and the protection of Papiamentu as a language. Heated discussions between the participating groups in the breaks outside made it crystal clear that the preservation of intangible cultural heritage is very important to many Bonaireans. With the Convention ratified, it is now a question of joining forces and working towards the actual implantation of this Convention so Bonaire's Intangible

Cultural Heritage will always remain an active part of its society – a gateway to Bonairean identity.
