A ccording to a reliable source, the government benefits in the BES Islands are significantly lower than in the European Netherlands. It has been calculated that to equalize the "social benefits" in the BES Islands with those of the European Netherlands would amount to LESS than 1/1000 of the Dutch government's budget. This would include retirement, disability, housing benefit, child assistance, and welfare payments.



▶While the Bonaire Island Government (OLB) likes the plans of developer Coco Beach Management (CBM) to develop the waterfront property at Sunset Beach (above) as a public beach, it has put a hold on development until environmental issues are sorted out. Until measures are taken to protect the underwater environment, perhaps by a retaining wall for the beach sand, the OLB has ordered the work temporarily stopped.


The necessary permits have already been submitted in consultation with Stinapa, the Commission Nature Management Bonaire, BOG and CBM. The government has pledged to cooperate to deal with these permits as soon as possible so that CBM may soon proceed with the construction of the beach. The work ban remains in effect until the necessary permits have been granted.

According to a press release on March 3, personnel from several police agencies, the Tax Service and labor inspectors from the Island Government took a joint action against labor exploitation and human trafficking on our island. Labor exploitation and trafficking are considered to be serious crimes often with serious consequences for victims. Combating it is a top priority of the government, hence the crackdown.

In the action, particular attention was focused on illegal workers, exploitation of workers, immigration control, (identity) documents, residence permits, work permits and taxes.

Two local businesses were scrutinized:

#### **Elections 2015**

The Government Service for the Caribbean Netherlands (RCN) is responsible for the information campaign on behalf of the Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations for the Island Council election on Wednesday, March 18.

The theme for the campaign is based on nature, which plays an important role on the islands and is something each resident, individually and together, share a responsibility for. Each voter can make a contribution to this process. The concept compares to sowing seeds that will grow and flourish in the future under the slogan: "Plant your vote, let it grow!"

The Island Government, on the other hand, is responsible for the organization of the elections, including the distribution of voting cards. All eligible voters should have received their cards. If not, contact the *Bevolking* office (Public Registry). Non-Dutch citizens can vote if they have been residents for five years and meet other conditions.

The political gauge above, drawn by Desiree Croes of the PHU party, provides a fairly accurate measure of where the different Bonaire political parties vying for seats on the island Council stand.

The elections are set for March 18. In the running:

- 1. **UPB** James Kroon - Green Union Patriótiko Boneriano (UPB)
- 2. **PDB -** Clark Abraham Red Partido Demokrátiko Boneriano (PDB)
- 3. **PHU** -Michiel Bijkerk White Partido Pro Hustisia i Union (PHU)
- 4. **AKB** Ramiro Richards Yellow Aliansa Kristian Boneiru (AKB)
- 5. **MPB** Elvis Tjin Asjoe Light Blue Movementu di Pueblo Boneriano (MPB)

- 7. **MLB** Eric Soleana Red / Yellow / Blue –Officially recognized as "Blank list #7."

The underlying issue in the election is the status of Bonaire as a part of The Netherlands. Positions range from independence to close integration. Each party also takes a stand on local matters.

White T-shirts will be the dress code on Friday and Saturday, March 20 and 21, as a big piece of Bonaire's population will turn out to help people and organizations perform needed chores they cannot afford to do on their own.

The Bon Doet organization guided by CVDH Consultancy and the NGO Platform will provide the structure, tools, supplies and coordination to the willing workers. The volunteers will be children, teens, adults, seniors, employees of local businesses like Rocargo and SSS, service clubs, groups of family members, colleagues and friends. Several departments from the Island Government as well as youngsters from the high school SGB and the continuing education program FORMA also will pitch in.

For example: Tene Boneiru Limpi (TBL) is organizing a cleanup event on March 21st during BON DOET. TBL will focus on the area of Washikemba. This beautiful area will be further developed as a tourist area with a scenic route. The development of the area will be coordinated by rural development plan POP. They are striving towards an area where kunukeros (farmers) can offer recreation to tourists. This could provide an extra source of income for kunukeros.

Tene Boneiru Limpi wants to support POP and is lending a helping hand by coordinating this clean up. In turn, TBL is hoping for the support of volunteers to be able to clean the 15 km section completely.

On the 21st TBL will be ready and waiting for volunteers from 7.30am on the dirt road (right hand side) that leads from the Kaminda Lagoen to the Washikemba area. the Family Store and La Parada. Checked were tax issues, payroll lists and labor practices as well as other activities being conducted by the businesses.

During the inspection police confiscated three passports. One woman was also put on a plane back to her home. Investigation continues.

It was observed that during the action *sneks* (snacks) near the locations being checked abruptly closed. The future will see more of this kind of joint action against labor exploitation and human trafficking say the authorities.

►AMSTERDAM--The Dutch inflation rate fell to its lowest level in 27 years in January: 0.0%, central statistics agency CBS said on February 12. The inflation rate has been falling steadily since the summer of

2013. In Bonaire the inflation rate is still rising. In The Netherlands a liter of gasoline now costs on average €1.47 (\$1.68), nearly 13% less than a year earlier. In Bonaire it costs \$0.98.

▶On Monday, March 9th a meeting for fishermen and fishing boat owners was held at the Amboina community center which may help revitalize the local fishery cooperative KOPIBON. The purpose of the meeting was to inform the fishing community of the recent fishing developments. A presentation was given by fish / fishery biologist Martin Earl of the Institute for Marine Resources & Ecosystem Studies in the Netherlands (IMARES).

▶In 2011, the average disposable household income in Bonaire was over \$19,000, in Saba nearly \$21,000 and in St. Eustatius \$24,000. These are the latest figures available from Caribbean Netherlands Statistics. Incomes in Bonaire and Saba ranged from \$6,000 in the lowest income bracket to around \$53,000 in the highest income bracket. The gap

was wider in Statia, where incomes varied between \$6,000 and over \$68,000.

▶ In a perhaps unrelated development the Board of Financial Supervision for Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba expressed its concern that the 2014 fiscal year for Statia will likely end with a deficit.



▶ A delegation from Bonaire, from both the private and public sector, traveled to Panamá City for meetings with COPA Airlines in early February to propose a weekly flight to Bonaire from Panama. The delegation, led by Deputy Edsel Winklaar, also consisted Martien van der Valk for BCR; Charles Fox for BONHATA; Yasmin Perez, the TCB representative in South America; Candice Kimmel, the TCB representative in North America; and the Dutch Ambassador to Panama, Mr.

Wiebe J. de Boer. They presented a proposal for a weekly weekend COPA airlines flight, either Friday, Saturday or Sunday, for the winter season 2015/2016.

▶According to Insel Air, airlines and passengers are currently taxed and charged disproportionately by governments, causing ticket prices to rise and consequently resulting in a decrease in air travel. Many countries, not ours, make a distinction between regional and international flights regarding taxes and charges. In some cases up to70% less in fees is charged for regional flights, which leads to lower ticket prices for customers.

"For example," said Insel's Chief of International Affairs Edward Heerenveen, "passengers travelling from Aruba to Amsterdam pay \$34.25 in taxes for a nine-hour international flight and local passengers pay the same amount for a 25-minute regional flight from Aruba to Curação."

Another example affecting Bonaire travelers is that while it costs 183 guilders for a BON-CUR round trip ticket, a round trip by taxi between Hato Airport and Santa Barbara Beach Resort costs about 235 guilders (2 x \$65).

▶ Arkefly will start flying another of its Boeing 787 Dreamliners on a route between Eindhoven and Curacao and Aruba in November. Ticket sales for the flights will begin in March. It is the first time a Dutch regional airport will serve as an origin or desti-

nation on an intercontinental route.

▶Effective March 2, 2015, the Venezuelan government announced that all U.S. citizens planning to travel to Venezuela must possess a visa issued by Venezuelan authority. InselAir also announced that U.S. citizens without the proper documentation are not accepted on InselAir's flights to Venezuela. There is a Venezuelan consulate on Bonaire.

▶WEB seems to be showing greater transparency in its reports of outages. Their press office detailed the times, cause and details of the last three power failures.

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## On The Island Since... June Henk and Boy

he first time we came here was early 1992 when I was pregnant with Boy," Herma says. "Henk had been diving here in 1980. He's the one who always wanted to live on a tropical island and he travelled the greater part of the world to see them and dive the oceans around them." "When Herma got pregnant," Henk says, "I searched for an island where we could raise a child. She loved Bonaire instantly and during that first week that we were here on vacation, we bought two pieces of land, then we went back to Holland.

I was the creative director of an advertising agency and Herma was the senior copywriter. By then we had been going steady for four years and we were living together as well. We couldn't make a move before I sold the business, but we came here almost every year and at a certain moment we started building. We designed the house ourselves and all the communication about the construction was done by fax. In 1999 we took the definite step and moved to Bonaire."

"In the beginning it was very hard for me," Herma says. "Boy was seven years old and went to Papa Cornes elementary school where he was bullied to no end, and as a parent you feel awful, totally impotent." "I loved every thing about Bonaire," Boy says. "We went to explore the kunukus, the caves and of course the sea. It was so beautiful! I loved the donkeys, the iguanas, the underwater world, the snorkeling and the windsurfing. But... what happened at school was out of everybody's control. Nobody could do anything about it. In the morning the first thought that entered my mind would be,

'Back to hell!' and at the end of the morning when the buzzer went I felt: 'Get out of here! Go!' But during the last school year at Papa Cornes things went better and they stopped bullying me.

Then I went to high school and did VWO (pre-university secondary education). I had become a rebel. I was longing to be free. I had a hard time accepting rules, and I thought 'I can do it myself, if only they'd let me be!' After I graduated I wanted to take a year off and go to Holland and see

a free-dive clinic with him. Carlos, who is from Caracas, Venezuela, is a world class free-diver and record-holder. In October of 2003 he became the first human to achieve a Free Immersion of more than 100 meters (down and up on one single breath of air), certified by Guinness World Records. He really is an icon!

When I ran into Carlos he told me that he was looking for people because he wanted to start a school, so I began to work for him and he trained me. It took me

what it was I might want to do. I had a strong romanticized idea about Dutch society. We'd go there once a year and I also had friends and girlfriends there so I was absolutely motivated. I wanted to go back, badly!

I was 18 when I left and I made a lot of bad choices in Holland. I just wasn't ready for it. I realized there was so much I didn't know about and at the same time I felt terribly homesick for Bonaire the beautiful island I'd left behind... And so, at the end of the year I decided to come back.

I started at Wannadive as a dive master in training, then I worked for one year with them as a dive instructor. Good times! Then I had some health issues and decided to quit the job and on my last working day I met Carlos Coste in the parking lot. I'd taken

about a year. In the meantime I was assisting during the courses, I did snorkel trips with Carlos where we introduced people to free-diving and I did yoga. I learned to control my body, my breathing, my heart rate and my mindset. Free-diving is an inner journey; you are very conscious of your own thoughts and completely dependent on yourself, on that one, single breath of air. My record is 53.7 meters and for the moment I am satisfied. However, the reason I'm doing it are the fishes and the underwater world - to be a part of that in the most natural way – like a sort of fish – that's my kick, my motivation. But I want to keep on challenging myself, not to let it become too easy. Recreationally I also like to expand my time under water it's not so much about depth, it's the feeling of intense peace

where you are one with the sea and yourself.

When I'm lying still I can hold my breath for four minutes. Before I did the clinic, I had a black -out once- a bunch of tough kids trying to prove something to each other, ha! I'm not doing that anymore but I still like coming out of the blue and tap a diver on his shoulder!

I am 22 now and I have three jobs: I work with Caribe Watersports as a captain and a snorkel guide, I am a host at Wannadive and with Carlos I work as a free-dive instructor. I am one of the best snorkel guides on the island. I'm an experienced scuba dive instructor, I have an extensive knowledge of the underwater world, a click with people and there's my connection with freediving and my passion for the

I've left the bad times behind me and I'm living in the present. To me, the island is one of the most beautiful places on earth and it is home."

Herma adds, "We had a very rough start and I've done everything in my power to support him to pull through and he has done so well. To have a son who is a free-diver... there are no words to describe how proud I am of him! At first it's a bit of a scary thought, but then one day we were snorkeling and he dove into this bait ball and all the little fishes went to the side and then the ball closed above Boy. It was so natural, he was part of it all and it was so controlled and serene and it showed me what he's capable of. Boy is doing what he likes best and nothing makes me happier!

During the years we've lived here I've done a lot of gardening. We have almost three acres and every rock and plant you see I've put there myself. My life is about keeping Boy and Henk happy and taking care of the house, the garden, the cats and the birds. You know that Jerry Ligon stops here on his tour because we have such a variety. I just love nature. A couple of years ago I founded 'Tuinieren op Bonre' (Gardening on Bonaire) on Facebook and now we have almost 700 members. And following in our footsteps, Curacao started a similar page. A lot of people love gardening, but I would like to see more variety

When we came here Henk had stopped working and he wanted to write. He'd written and published two books in Holland -The Hands of Cile Almarel - a visionary written warning to Muslim extremism (written in 1979) and Katoi, about an unusual love. The writing here in Bonaire somehow didn't work out, but Henk has always been very ambitious and he's multitalented, so he started painting." "I began in 2000," Henk says, "and the satisfaction you get from painting is that you see the result immediately. Together with Guus Gerritsen we published a book called **Portraits** of Bonaire in 2002 and 2006 and somewhere in between I painted the mural on what used to be Cultimara - now Top Supermarket. It took me two years and it became a fad! Many people gave me the assignment to paint themselves and their family. At the moment I'm busy with two assignments and it takes me a long time, but thankfully there's no pressure. That's the reason why I came here; I didn't want to wait until I was retired. I wanted to live in the tropics, where I could paint in my sarong in the garden. I found that freedom and I built up a career and I'm not going anywhere from here!"

"We are complete again," Herma says. "We've got our own little family and we are extremely happy. When Boy came back from Holland - for his own reasons - it gave me the confirmation that we did the right thing by moving here and thus the circle is closed."■

And Goddard Catering, the business that supplied food to the KLM planes landing on Bonaire enroute to Quito and Lima also shut down on March 1.. Not much business since those flights were cancelled.
- More openings. Local media reports that **Tiara Air will soon be flying again**, bringing back the flights between Aruba, Curacao and Bonaire. The company will soon announce when the flights will commence.
- Zen's Bar and Cafe, owned by Michi Zhen, is now open. Michi is serving breakfast and lunch six days a week and in the evenings you can enjoy delicious cocktails and snacks. Good to note that Zen's is open on Sundays when many of the other island eateries are closed, and they plan on serving special "Sunday soup" each week. Zen's is located at the Bonaire Shopping District at the Hato traffic circle. Closed on Wednesdays.
- Local social media comments are complaining that once again the new Dutch regulations are ignoring Bonairean tradition. Traditionally, local island council elections were always held on Friday so that winners could celebrate their victory late into the evening/early morning hours. This year, the election is on a Wednesday, restricting the duration of celebrations due to work obligations the next day. Can we expect a "sick day" epidemic on Thursday?! Bula Bonchi

## **Divers Down**

Lotte Hass, the pioneering woman diver known for beauty and bravery, died last week at 86. Often called the first lady of diving, Ms. Hass helped shatter the glass floor that had long kept women from the ocean's depths. She was a member of the Woman's Diving Hall of Fame. She and her husband, Hans Hass, were perhaps the first to dive and take underwater photos off Bonaire and Klein Bonaire before WW-II. Hans Hass passed away in 2013.

Eugenie Clark, known as The Shark Lady because of a best-selling book she wrote, whose childhood rapture with fish in a New York City aquarium led to a global reputation as a marine biologist and expert on sharks, died in late February at her home in Sarasota, Fla. She was 92. The cause was lung cancer. Dr. Clark rode a 40-foot whale shark off Baja California, ran into killer great white sharks while scuba diving in Hawaii, studied "sleeping" sharks in undersea caves off the Yucatán. She was a legend among Scuba divers.

Dr. Clark was an ichthyologist and oceanographer whose academic credentials, teaching and research posts, scientific activities and honors filled a 20-page curriculum vitae, She continued to oppose commercial exploitation of endangered species and to counteract misconceptions, especially about sharks. ■From *The New York Times*

## A Dutch Worker Looks Back on Three Years on Bonaire

Interview with Leo Tigges, Liaison for the Ministry of Safety and Justice within the Dutch Caribbean. Leo has had his farewell party and will go back to Holland soon. This gives him opportunity to look back on the three years he has spent in Bonaire. He arrived May 2012 and leaves March 2015.

#### First impression of the island

He arrived alone with his cat; his wife would come later. For the cat it turned out to be a one-way ticket: she died here, as she was already very old. Leo says, "The first things I noticed were the heat, the wind and the high prices in the supermarkets. You get accustomed to it, you have to Holland this is a municiaccept it, but the high prices are very sad for the population of Bonaire." He really got to love Bonaire's nature and this love inspired a new hobby: photography. Another hobby got less attention here: cooking. "It is often hard to find all the ingredients and it is very hot to cook here."

He started at the RCN in the APNA building. Holland and the ministry felt far away. He realized for civil servants in Holland it was very hard to imagine how policy works here in the Dutch Caribbean. He was very busy explaining the situation and can look back on some results. "There is more attention given to the Dutch Caribbean," he says, "and fortunately the ministries are more focused on cooperation. Cooperation is very much needed, as in a small society like Bonaire you see immedi-

ately the implications if you don't: you waste money and you don't really help society. Working together has become a method to organize work and cooperation between ministries and Bonairean organizations. That really is a positive thing!"

His job is hard to describe. You might see it as a position of translator. If there is a development in Holland that could have

repercussions for the Dutch Caribbean you have to see if it is applicable here and/or if some adjustments have to be made. Especially the way to make it work in practice is very important. The subjects Leo paid special attention to are domestic violence, a fund for victims of violence, and he made sure that on Saba and Sint Eustatius there is a notary every other week. Leo explains, "It was very hard for people to arrange their notary business as there was no notary on those islands. Now someone comes from Sint Maarten, so people don't have to travel themselves. It seems like a very small success, but in fact it was hard work getting there."

That counts for almost anything: it costs a lot of time to consult people and convince them. The work was often very prac-

tical: for example how to control the license for weapons, what to do with and where to put goods that are confiscated (as there was no secured place). There is a place now and there is a procedure. In that way the work is very different form the work at a ministry in Holland. You are almost responsible yourself for practical solutions.

He got the opportunity to be a "proefboef," a fake criminal when the new prison cells had to be tested. He could share his cell with a friend and thought they were fine. Also the personnel turned out to be very professional. "In comparison to the rest of the Caribbean,' he states, "the cially grateful that they made the right prison on Bonaire is very decent and you are treated in a correct way."

He feels it is a shame that there are too few social possibilities for people coming out of prison. In Holland this is a municipal responsibility, but the government here has to deal with a lot of issues and has not been able to give it full attention. It is a pity, as a lot of people come back to prison because of insufficient possibilities to get a home, work and to settle themselves.

#### **Positive experiences**

Leo got a close personal encounter with health care on the island. He got heart problems during a swim. He went to the hospital and they decided to bring him to Colombia by air ambulance. He was operated on and sent back after four days. He is under observation by the cardiologist and had physiotherapy afterwards. He is doing well now and is very satisfied. "I am espe-

decision to send me to Colombia immediately."

"It is a pity, he says, "that the physiotherapy nowadays is no longer part of the insurance for habitants of Bonaire."

He also sees and hears positive stories about the educational system. There is an improvement going on.

Leo is 66 and can retire if he wants to. But he is too active to be attracted to a life without work. He would really like to continue working, within Europe or in the Caribbean. He and his wife feel really

sorry to leave and they have plans to come back to Bonaire al least twice a year. ■

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## Bonaire's Onima Aloe Sails To Holland Aboard Tres Hombres

The brigantine *Tres Hom-bres* was back in town. She came in just during the karnaval and left on Monday, February 25, to continue her voyage to the Dominican Republic, then onward to Europe.

By now visitors and residents of Bonaire are familiar with the sight of this beautiful wooden sailing vessel lying in the clear blue waters just outside of Kralendijk. She recalls the days of pirates past and represents a sustainable, visionary future ideal: from A to B, emission free.

This time she is transporting French wine and rum from the Canary Islands in her hold as well as cocoa beans from Grenada and the famous Grenada Chocolate Company chocolate bars. In Bonaire she loaded 100% pure organic Onima Aloe Vera gel and products in her speciallydesigned cold room, a room that stays between 16° and 20°C to guarantee product quality.

The ship sails to The Netherlands where she will be greeted with a festival in her honor, with carrier bikes, hybrid cars and even horse and carriage awaiting the products in her hold. These means of transport - true to the emission -free fair transport principle have cycled, driven and clipclopped the Grenadian cocoa beans to the Chocolate Makers' factory in Amsterdam Noord where they are burned, roasted and molded into scrumptious organic chocolate bars.

Her wine and rum will continue the journey back to their places of origin. As Lammert Ossinga, the return journey captain (Arjen van der Veen sailed her to Bonaire) explained: "At one point *Tres* Hombres was transporting two barrels of bio-dynamic French wine to New York. The ship was not allowed to unload at the docks so had to return home with the wine still in her hold. Amazingly enough, the wine in those two barrels was superior to the barrels left at home– the journey made the difference. The wine from

these barrels sold at €150 a bottle! journey begins." Today we regularly carry some barrels of this specific French biodynamic wine in our hold, just for the journey from great wine to outstanding wine. We will never take on too many barrels though, otherwise we can't load up on all the other wonderful Caribbean produce like rum, cocoa, coffee and now, Aloe Vera."

Captain Arjen van der Veen is no stranger to Bonaire as his father has lived on the island for many years and he has numerous friends on the island. A trip to Bonaire is much like coming home to him. This time he will stay on Bonaire a little longer with his girlfriend Lucy to enjoy the beauty and tranquility of the island. Then they'll fly back to London where she will give birth to their first child. "I am becoming a dad, finally," said a smiling Arjen, and added proudly: "a new

A visit to the boat saw many of the crewmembers and trainees busy on deck clearing out and cleaning gear, making space in the hold, cooking and picking up crewmembers and visitors with their now, engine-less dinghy. "The engine broke down, explained French first mate Rémi Lavergne, "so we have to use oars," and he laughed. "Fits the emission-free theme to a T."

On board crew-member Gerrit **Dijkstra** and Captain Ossinga dove into the hold which is filled with wine, rum and cocoa beans to make space for Onima's Aloe Vera container. The opening of the cold room needed to be adiusted for the container of gel to fit and they were busy measuring the space to ensure proper accommodation for the Aloe Vera. Her hold will be loaded full with rum and coffee beans by the time they

leave the Dominican Republic to sail back to Europe.

In The Netherlands the Tres Hombres and their Fair Transport Company have gained an admirable reputation over the years for a sustainable future with sailing freighters. Visionaries Arjen van der Veen, Jorne Langelaan and Andreas Lack**ner** were dubbed slightly 'crazy' when they dreamed up their freighters under sail but today their 'idea' has taken flight with investors believing in their vision of emissions-free trade.

The birth of their shipping company Fair Transport sees Tres Hombres sailing the trans-Atlantic route to the Caribbean and back. whilst the 1873 British fishing trawler Nordlys is used to transport goods in European waters. These two ships are sailed with traditional rigging, but their focus is not on the past alone. Fair Transport is busy with their future too, drawing up plans of building the very first hybrid ship, the Eco liner, a Dynarig concept with a 19- meter

long steel hull weighing three tons and using high-tech sails. The concept is daring but so was the birth of *Tres Hombres* and Fair Transport. Going on past performance, these captains sail into a bright future. ■
























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## lwesome Walk-a-Thon

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


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## Little Shop

On Bonaire there are still some of a very creative concept: the tiny little shops, tokos, to be found in the neighborhoods. They struggle to survive. In order to get the story behind those shops our reporter visits them. If you don't want those shops to disappear, support them by visiting them and buy something. Every dollar counts for them.

Let's keep them going. They represent Bonairean history

#### BONAIRE MOBILE CARWASH

At Kaya Rebecca #9 you see two yellow minibuses on the property with the sign: "If it's dirty we can wash it." You only see them in the evening, because during the day they are to be found all over the island cleaning anything dirty. To get there you go from Kaya Korona in the direction of Lagoon. Passing by a yoga center on the left hand side you turn left. The green house you see on the left side is the place where the owner and his family, including his grandmother, live.

#### WHO OWNS THIS PLACE?

Egbert (Wimpy) Saragoza is the owner of Bonaire Mobile Carwash. As a boy he was already cleaning cars and in 2006 he started to do this as a business. As he had experienced the timeconsuming process of people having to drop off their car and later coming back to get it, he thought

owner of the car did not have to go through the trouble of dropping off and collecting the car. He designed equipment needed to clean anya minivan that would be able to bring all the materials to wash a car on site. He was convinced that this would be a success and started out to get the necessary license from the government.

Unfortunately the government was not very enthusiastic about his plan. He did not get the license he wanted because they thought that his washing would endanger the environment: the soap would pollute the ground. Wimpy was very disappointed, but also persistent in trying to realize his idea. He continued his business at his own spot at Kaya Rebecca but kept talking and networking with people in order to make his dream come true. He even went on the radio to tell how the government made it impossible for him to do his busi-

Some years later he met a man named Tobi who imported environmentally-friendly soap. He helped Wimpy to convince the government that their soap was safe for the environment and even got test results from Holland. In 2010, four years after his first attempt, Wimpy got the license to operate his mobile carwash. The next problem to be solved was to finance a minibus. The bank would not lend him any money. Fortunately his grandmother helped

him. She was the one who raised him and believed in him. He installed the minibus with all the thing dirty and started to be mobile. This was a great success. Now he has two busses and he offers work to a lot of youngsters who work together, especially on Saturdays, the busiest day of the week. In this way he wants to contribute to the society, to make young people work instead of hanging around or turning to criminal activities.

#### WHAT SERVICES ARE GIVEN?

Wimpy cleans anything on the spot. He cleans not only cars but also big objects like boats. He even cleaned the clubhouse of the golf course. When I came to his spot he was busy cleaning a car that was used during Karneval that was very dirty on the outside as well as the inside. He and his colleague made sure it looked like

#### WHERE DO THE CUSTOMERS COME FROM?

Customers come from all over Bonaire. His company cleans private cars and objects but also has contracts with big companies like Selibon and rental car companies. Tourists and locals come to him to get things cleaned and he has a good name. He does anything to get the job done as it should be and

within a reasonable amount of time. People who are at their working place call him so he can clean their car during working hours and they can take a clean car home. He also got involved in a cleaning job for a big company where oil had leaked and an inspection was due. He worked on this job with 15 people, day and night, and managed to get it done a week before the inspection. They had a lot of fun, as they did a job no one else on Bonaire dared to

#### How to survive?

Wimpy has a lot of work and is very glad he can help to give work and possibilities to others who need it. He is one of the few successful Bonairean businessmen and wonders why it is made so difficult by the government to

accept good ideas from Bonairean citizens. It looks like there is no stimulation for their own population to create businesses and all the opportunities are given or sold to foreign people. To him it feels like there is no support, even a lack of interest to help people who want to start and make their own money. At this moment he can get another contract from a rental car company, but he can only accept the contract if he has some space to bring the cars for a wash. To get this space near the airport is essential for him to be able to expand.

#### THE FUTURE, HOPES AND WISHES

Wimpy cleans a lot of rental cars and wants to have a piece of land to do this near the airport. He al-

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## A Garden? Just Do It!

**ROOT VEGETABLES** 

Not so long ago I was really surprised to see so many different root vegetables ("ground food") in the supermarkets -all good stuff to bring variety in our meals. But I tell you what, I had most of them already in my yard. All these root vegetables are tropical plants which can grow easily on Bonaire. I've tried some of them already and got a lot of nice stuff. In the old days it was quite normal to have some of these roots somewhere in your yard. Nowadays it seems as though only the supermarkets know where to find them. But be smart and find them in your own backyard, not just in the supermarkets.

I'm talking about yucca (also known as cassava or tapioca), white and yellow sweet potatoes, yams, Chinese tayer and pom tayer.

The sweet potato is the most well known one on Bonaire. The plant looks similar to the potato plant. It winds on the ground and the roots become potatoes. To plant it you need a potato. Put an old sweet potato in the soil. After a while the potato gets roots which become the new potatoes in the soil while the plant grows on the soil. Once the plant gets established it only needs water a few times a week. After about 10 months push away some

dirt to see whether the roots are good enough to harvest. Try one if you're not sure.

Plant the Chinese tayer and the pom tayer in the same way. Put an stick above the soil with nice

old root in the soil or plant it in a big crate or half cut barrel. Protect them from rats and mice who love the roots.

Yams, Chinese tayer and pom tayer look about the same. They look like the tajerblad (photo in the Feb.16 *Reporter*.) They are family. But you eat the leaves from the tajerblad, you eat the roots of the others. Thats why in the Caribean they call them "ground food." Its healthy stuff, full of vitamins and plant protein, good food for sick babies, sick and old people, hardworking folks, ,those who do heavy sports. Yes, healthy for everyone and easy to cook.

The pom tayer has big leaves and big roots too. Surinam people make their delicious popular "pom" with the roots-a brew of grated roots mixed with broiled chicken, tomatoes, onion, celery, some herbs and spices in a pan in the oven.

With the other roots one can make soup, or boil or fry them like fried potatoes. Also just boiled you can eat them with a nice salad, salad dressing and a nice spiced stew piece of meat. Well known in the Caribbean is salt fish with root vegetables. Google for more information and lots of recipes.

The cassava is a very big root too and can be prepared in many different ways. It grows differently from the other plants. It grows as a stick above the soil with nice

leaves like a hand. The roots become the big cassavas. I have them in my yard and enjoy the roots often in all kinds of soups, boiled and fried with fish and meat and as a vegetarian food.

To plant the stem, not the root like the other plants. The stem is the important part.



Cassava (also called Yucca or Tapioca)

Cut the stem into 20 cm. parts. Put about half of the stem into the soil. Water them a few times a week. After a few days you notice new leaves coming up. Iguanas don't like them but they pull the stems out of the soil and the plant dies. After about nine months push away some dirt. If you see some big roots it's time to pull the whole plant out and cut the roots for your food. Then cut the stem into pieces and plant again. Don't put the stem in water; it will die immediately. It won't die if it lies a few days just like that . It's a strong plant which doesn't need much water and which grows easily in all kinds of

So once you have all of this in your yard you don't need to visit the supermarket so often anymore.

These "ground foods" are all in one. They

fill your belly, they taste great, they are healthy, and they are for every age. Just do it!



SEEING DOUBLE THIS WINTER: TWIN STARS AND PLANETS

hen you think of the Sky Park winter sky, you might think about seeing Orion's Belt or the scorchingly bright dog star, Sirius. But in this week's edition we'll take a closer look at the Gemini Twins, the easily recognized winter constellation with two bright stars named Castor and **Pollux** plus the two brightest planets will put on a display in the eve-



ning sky. Those are **Venus** and **Jupiter**.

During this week face west when it's totally dark. You will see the first of two exceptionally bright planets. That dazzlingly bright light is actually the planet Venus. Some people call it the evening star since you can see it just after sunset. And if you're a keen observer you may see Mars below Venus too.

Dean: To see the other big, bright planet, and the twin stars of Castor and Pollux you'll have to turn around to face southeast and you'll see the king of the planets, giant **Jupiter**. Jupiter is hardly Venus' twin, but right now both planets are very bright. In the Sky park Jupiter is about nine times wider than our **Sun** and a gas giant planet 88,000 miles in diameter while Venus is a rocky planet a little less than 8,000 miles in diameter. Jupiter Jupiter is all clouds and features the great red spot, a humongous hurricane-like storm so large you could fit a few Venus' inside it.

Venus is covered in clouds that trap in heat like a greenhouse. In fact, Venus has the hottest surface temperature of any every day, on pretty much the entire planet. Venus is about 128 million miles away while Jupiter is a whopping 412 million miles away. Even though it's so

much farther, Jupiter's size makes it so bright for us on Earth.

Now to the real twins - at least, mythologically speaking. The two bright stars marking the heads of the Gemini twins are high in the eastern sky above Jupiter. They're named Pollux and Cas-

The constellation of Gemini is tough to picture without a strong imagination. Especially since at this time of year they're standing sideways in the sky. The two main stars, Pollux and Castor, may look to be similar but they're not. Pollux is the larger and brighter of the two stars. It's 43 times brighter. And back in 2006 astronomers found a planet orbiting Pollux. Castor is 2.3 times the diameter of our has 67 moons. Venus has none. Zip. Zero. Sun and about 30 times brighter. It's white in color and way hotter than Pollux. If you could visit Castor, you'd be able to see that it's not just one star but a system of six stars revolving around each other.

So after dark this week, look for the two brightest planets - Venus in the western sky, and Jupiter in the eastern sky... and planet. It's 900 degrees Fahrenheit all day, the twin head-stars of Gemini, Pollux and Castor high up in the east. Neither the two planets, nor the two stars are really twins. But you still may "See double" this month. ■ *Dean Regas & James Albury*

#### WHAT IS TRAP-NEUTER-RETURN?

rap-Neuter-Return is the humane and effective approach for stray and feral cats. Trap-Neuter-Return improves the lives of feral cats, improves their relationships with the people who live near them, and decreases the size of colonies over time. If left alone, these cats keep reproducing and can become a nuisance, prompting well-meaning people to call for cats. help to remove them. However, when those cats are removed, new cats simply move in to take over the territory. Therefore returning the neutered cats to the colony area serves an additional purpose and reduces the amount of feral cats in the area.

TNR is exactly what it sounds like: Cats are humanely trapped and taken to a veterinarian to be neutered. After recovery, the cats are returned to their home—their colony—outdoors. It stops the breeding cycle of cats and therefore improves their lives while preventing reproduction.

Therefore it's a life-saving and effective solution for these beautiful, independent

hat reef manta rays often venture far away from their home reefs to feed, sometimes traveling for hundreds of kilometers! These gentle marine fish, closely related to spotted eagle rays commonly seen in Bonaire, feed on plankton that can be hard to find on near-shore reefs.

Recently, researchers on the Great Barrier Reef in Australia tagged manta rays and tracked their movement using satellite systems. The resulting study showed that these manta rays travel vast distances (one individual travelled 2441 km in 118 days) to find more abundant food sources. One spot that the manta rays frequented was the Capricorn Eddy, an offshore nutrient hotspot that is home to large amounts of the plankton that manta rays eat.



Amazingly, the manta rays were able to successfully locate this far-from-home food source, and are able to consistently make the journey. Unlike many reef animals that are essentially confined to the reef, it is clear that reef manta rays have are ready and willing to travel as far as necessary to find the most plentiful food.
