Reynolds (Nolly) Oleana has taken over management of the Caribbean Netherlands part of the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science (RCN/OCW)

Nolly has been working for RCN/OCW since May 2011, in the last two years as the Deputy Head. From a selection procedure with candidates from the European as well as the Caribbean Netherlands, Nolly emerged as the best candidate for this position. Nolly is wellknown in the education field on the islands. He started his career as a teacher of Mathematics and Chemistry at the Scholengemeenschap Bonaire (SGB), where he subsequently held various management positions. During the period in which he was politically active, he held the position of Minister of Education for the Dutch Antilles and Commissioner of Education for Bonaire

► THE HAGUE--The Tax Department of Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba collected close to \$142.4 million in taxes and social premiums in 2014. The Dutch Government said it spent about \$325 million on the three islands.

In Bonaire, \$116.4 million was collected in taxes and social premiums in 2014. For St. Eustatius and Saba this amount was \$16.8 million and \$9 million respectively, so Dutch Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations Ronald Plasterk informed the Dutch

Parliament. The bulk of the taxes and premiums, 81.8%, was collected from Bonaire. The percentages for St. Eustatius and Saba were 11.8% and 6.4% respectively.

However, according to Ministry's calculation The Netherlands spent \$325 million on the BES islands; Bonaire received US\$216.7 million. The expenditures on behalf of St. Eustatius were US \$61.3 million, and US \$46.8 for Saba. Close to 67% of the total expenditures went to Bonaire, almost 19% to St. Eustatius and 14.4% to Saba.

- ▶ THE HAGUE--The work permit and related fees levied by the Dutch Government in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba will be reduced, stated Dutch Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations Ronald Plasterk. An assessment of the system of the setting of fees, including the cost of the fees will be carried out in the second half of 2015.
- ▶ If you think racism is rampant in the US consider the situation last week in The Netherlands. Police in The Hague fired warning shots and arrested 34 people during a third straight day of unrest last Thursday, triggered by the death of an Aruban visitor in police custody. They banned public gatherings in a neighborhood hit by rioting.

The death from apparent asphyxiation on Sunday, of Mitch Henriquez (42), has been likened to incidents in the US that sparked protests over excessive use of force by police.

►The temperature hit 37.3° Celsius in Maastricht on Thurs-



day, making Thursday, July 2, the warmest July day ever recorded in the Netherlands, broadcaster NOS said. The temperature In Bonaire topped out at 30° Celsius that same day.

- ▶ Cooking gas supplies are now more readily available following consumer complaints and Executive Council attention. CUROIL, Bonaire's supplier has completed its bimonthly price adjustments. As a result of crude oil price increases the price of petroleum products on Bonaire has been adjusted. For unleaded gas, there is an increase of 10.54 cents, for kerosene 7.72 cents, for diesel .94 cents.

The next adjustment of the fuel price is anticipated in September 2015.

#### ► WILLEMSTAD--

Curaçao's state-owned oil and gas provider Curoil made a profit of 40 million guilders (\$22.6 million) in 2014. That is nearly 15 million guilders more compared to 2013. However, it was sometimes unable to provide Bonaire with all the cooking gas needed on the island.

► Last month members of the US Coast Guard Cutter (USCGC) Bear, that tied up at Town Pier for a few days, as-



sisted in two community relations projects during its stay on Bonaire. In coordination with the Bonaire government, 11 USCGC *Bear* crew members helped with painting and planted several fruit trees at KIBOS (Keyboss) children activity center in Nikiboko and painted the outer wall off the Rincon Community Center on Friday, June 19.

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## Born on Bonaire... June 5th, 1987 - Stephanie Booi On The Island Since... October 2013 - Said Elkaich

66 n 2013 we came to Bonaire together. We'd already been a couple for 10 years. When I was 13 I left Bonaire for Holland. My parents had divorced and I went to live with a good friend of my father's in Amsterdam-West, along with my sister Chemaine who, had been living in Holland for two years with an aunt of ours. In Amsterdam I went to the Amsterdam Lyceum. It was a difficult time, two girls alone in Amsterdam without a mom or dad. It wasn't easy. Luckily I had my sis who mothered me and who also gave me some headaches now and then. Ha Ha! But seriously, she was the one who gave me a solid and sound basis.

The first school year I didn't pass, but from then on it went smoothly. I finished Mavo, then I followed a middle professional education for interior design. It was something I'd always liked. From there I went to higher professional education doing HBO MER: marketing, economics and law. I finished up to the third year. When I was barely seventeen I met Said."

"I was born in Tangier, Morocco," Said says. "When I was 10 I immigrated with my brothers and my mother to Holland where my father had been living and working for 20 years. Although my father used to come to Morocco three months per year I was mainly raised by my mother and the family who all lived in the same house. Holland was another world. Everything was completely different and the food had an unknown taste and smell. I didn't know the language at all so I went to a special class at elementary school where many children from different nationalities – but mostly Moroccan - were studying the Dutch lan-

In Holland life was a hundred times better tience and she understands me." "I am a than in Morocco, but I missed the Moroccan very quiet person," Stephanie smiles. "He is habits and ways- the Moroccan identity. However, it didn't take long, because Amsterdam-West was and still is like a small Moroccan town where I have a lot of family and people who know me and where my culture is very much alive, but with an Amsterdam twist.'

to stand up for myself and that it is okay to have your own opinion – no matter what age you are. People listened to me and I was heard. The fact that you could discuss matters with your teachers- that was something

so surprising because it's unheard of in my culture! And Amsterdam was a very weird city with the weirdest people of so many different nationalities, religions and styles. It was an eye-opener. You learn to be open minded and you realize that the world is a better place with all kinds of people."

"One day I was driving around with a friend of mine," Said says, "when I saw this lovely young lady on the sidewalk. I got out of the car, walked up to her and asked her what she was planning on doing. She answered she was going shopping so I told her I wanted to accompany her. All she said was 'Okay!' But my friend, who was driving the car, was waiting in the middle of the road and was causing a traffic jam with at least 150 cars blowing their horns and people started yelling at me.

a heaviness lying over Holland. I felt we had gotten stuck. We'd been talking a lot on Skype with my dad and he'd told me he wanted to start something up and were we interested in doing that for him. Said had never been on Bonaire – and that's what I mean when I said he is spontaneous and not afraid of new challenges - because he told me, 'We're going!' Just like that. I would never do such a thing. Three months later we arrived on Bonaire. Said thought it was awesome and I'd come home again.

I started working for my dad at Radio Energia where I learned to do the administration with the help of Cactus Accounting. After a couple of months, Steven, the boss of Cactus Accounting, offered me a job and I accepted because I felt I could learn a lot there, especially about setting up your own business. Said went to 'play' farmer at

"What I'd never done before, I did then," Stephanie says, "I gave him my correct phone number! It was in 2004 and we became a pair. In 2009 we moved in together, which was sort of official because during all those years we had been in each other's company constantly."

"She became a part of me," Said says. "I love her innocence and her immense pamy opposite and that makes life so much more fun. He is spontaneous, he's open for new challenges and even when it's unfamiliar and different, he will try it. I've learned that from him and it's what I like very much about him.

Well, the years went by and Said was Stephanie continues, "In Holland I learned assistant manager of an electronics store and I was still studying when he told me he had enough of Holland. He found that the possibilities in Holland had gone down from limited to null over the last couple of years. For me personally it was like I felt there was

Kunuku Warahama, where he helped my dad, in the meanwhile trying to figure out what would be a good business opportunity on Bonaire. He came with the idea of a Döner and I liked it. Döner Kebab is a Turk ish dish of seasoned minced meat and yoghurt with added veggies served on a flatbread. Mostly it's lamb but we only have chicken. The bread is specially made on the island and the chicken is the best quality we can get. We could do it cheaper but definitely we don't skimp on quality. The veggies are always fresh and we try to use locally grown products – if available. Next to the Döner Kebab we're also selling grilled chicken, which is a best seller, Turkish pizza and noodle soups."

"When I was working at the kunuku," Said says, "I was growing a variety of vege- all about peace of tables, and on Saturdays Stephanie and I would sell it at a booth at Kaya Industria. It was a massive success. In one hour we would be sold out. That's how we worked and saved money for the Döner. We began by putting a container right next to what was

Leen Bakker at the time, now Store 25, across from Warehouse. Stephanie's dad still had windows and doors which we put in the container and inside we had it completely tiled. That was a present from Stephanie's dad. Mister 'Eppie' Damascus built it the way we were visualizing it, a very creative man he is. We applied for the permit and for the finishing touch I went to Holland, to a very good friend of mine who has a big, successful Döner business. As a present he taught me the secret of making the best Döner. When I came back we opened two weeks after we got the permit. It was mid November 2014. Two days before the opening we invited family and friends to come and taste our food and boy, it was like a culinary explosion, because many of them had never tasted anything like it. They told us, 'This is Taste'! And so we opened with confidence and a good feeling. We didn't do any publicity because we wanted to start slowly, but that never happened because on Bonaire the best advertisement is mouth to mouth!"

Stephanie continues, "Now it's eight months later and the business is doing very well, above expectations. We've added two employees and we're both working 10 hours per day, six days a week. I am five months pregnant, so some things will change," she smiles. "First we're going on vacation to Morocco for four weeks, so the business will be closed from July 17<sup>th</sup> to August 14<sup>th</sup>. Then a cousin of mine will come to help us. We are working hard on our future and even more now that we're having a little baby boy soon because life is no longer only about us. The future is looking bright. I am happy we came back. On Bonaire I feel free and safe and light again. It's a stress-free

"Our relationship is very strong because we love and respect each other and we have a long history together," Said says. "That's why we are such a good team. And you know, after a hard day's work there is nothing better than a good cup of coffee and a cigarette and sitting at the sea knowing there's nothing else


you need; Bonaire is mind." ■

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## Bonaire's First Driving/ Biking/Hiking

#### A NEW TRAIL OPENS—FOR DRIVERS, HIKERS AND BIKERS-BARA DI KARTA

Lagun/Washikemba – Bonaire. n Friday, June 26th in the afternoon Lt. Governor Rijna and Deputy Silberie officially opened the new tourist trail, Bara di Karta by unveiling the huge billboard with the map and information about the trail through the remote

Bara di Karta is the area between Kaminda Lagoen and Kaminda Sorobon. Yellow signs indicate the some 15kilometer trail for cars. Pink signs indicate walking tours and blue signs indicate two different mountain bike trails.

outback of Bonaire.

This tour and the whole area is named after the 57-meter-high hill, half way along the trail and in the mid of the terrain, Bara di Karta. The tour brings you to the Washikemba formation with brown, red and black rocks, volcanic material. Then to the Washikemba Plantation. The mansion is in the center of the plantation and is said to be haunted as ghosts appear on a more or less regular basis. The

Washikemba saliña shelters a lot of flamingos. During the dry season the saliña is almost without water. Close to the Boka Washikemba you will find Bonaire's longest tree, forced to grow in one direction by the trade winds. Size of the tree is some 100 feet. The mouth or boka of Washikemba is spectacular during windy weather, as is the blow hole or suplado. Big boulders on the coast were brought there by waves over 30 feet, caused by tsunamis, attacking the island from the west. The trail leads to Onnie Emerenciana's Kunuku di Mamai Rosa, operating since 1882, and other kunukus with wind mills and traditional cactus fences. Locals left their properties some 50 years ago to find a job and a living in downtown Kralendijk. Now they are coming back, doing their utmost best to make a kind of living

with new agricultural techniques. The Pos Bara di Karta is a wind mill, pumping up water for irrigation. Farmers and the government are busy restoring dams to keep the water on and in the is-

The Bara di Karta Hill is only 57 meters

high, a 15-minute hike, but the view over the island, the salt, the mansion, the boka is more than stunning. Finally you can find shelter at the picnic-area, under a tamarind tree and try its sweet and sour fruits.

After the unveiling of the billboard, after shooting some pictures, writing down some information, having a beer or two and a snack, my dog Sneetje and I jumped in the Puma-powered, Britishmade Land-Rover Defender.

Unpaved road conditions were good. Dry season. (once I got stuck for six hours in the Washikemba area. Jb) A four-wheel drive vehicle is not necessary. Some road clearance is advisable so a pick-up will do the job. Fourteen-inch rims or bigger are ok. Check the pressure of all tires, including your spare tire. Check the level of your fuel or take an extra canister with you. Always take fresh water with you. Even un-cooled water can be a relief. Do not drive too fast as rocks can damage the sump of your engine. (I had this once. /jb) Just think of a first aid kit and use your safety belts. An unnoticed bump or hole can easily lift you from your seat and cause a headache. Always descend a hill in the same gear as you approached it. Do not use your clutch while descending. Take your time and enjoy what your island can offer you. And this is just 1% of what our beloved Bonaire has kept secret.

Visit the website: explore-bonaire.com for more information in advance and watch the very interesting documentary about Bara di Karta by Hendrik Wuyts. Get a preview by watching it on Tourist TV.

Get a map of the area in advance at the tourist office of Bonaire on the Kaya Grandi, or at the bigger hotels. Have some fun in advance with your girlfriend, family or friends, planning the excursion.

The development of this trail is the result of the intensive work of POP (Plattelands Ontwikkelings Plan/Plan di Desaroyo di Kunukeru/Development Plan of the Outback/jb), the government of Bonaire and the Dutch Department of Economic Affairs.

And there is more to come. A trail in and around the Rincon area is under construction.

NICK MADLENER AND HIS LIVING HERITAGE.

Tera Kora/Bonaire -

couple of years ago I wrote an article about Nick Madlener, owner of Buena Vista Optics, and his little red four-stroke, single-cylinder quad. I was curious and a little skeptical about the vehicle as in my opinion a quad is unsafe at any speed. Nick informed me about his quad and told me it is not the quad but the driver who can make the quad unsafe at any speed. Then I agreed; Nick had a

Years passed by and boys grow older as do their toys. Nick had fantasies about constructing or assembling a trike, based on a motorcycle, based on, in his opinion, the motorcycle: an all American made Harley-Davidson...

So Nick searched the internet and found the Frankenstein Trike-site. Now Nick knew it was possible to order a kit and convert a conventional two-wheeler into a real trike. The next problem was to find a suitable "donor" bike. A Harley-Davidson Hugger was for sale. Unfortunately the motor bicycle was a little bit dented and neglected and the 883 cc engine was a little bit underpowered. Then Nick found

a 2011 built Harley-Davidson Sportster. An, almost needless to say, V-twin (Harley also produced single cylinder motor cycles as we all know. /jb), measuring 1200 cc, equipped with a smooth fivespeed gearbox. Nick Madlener and Orlando Fransisca spend hours and hours, talking over the fantasies of Nick, converting them into a real plan. Then Nick ordered the kit, including huge 15-inch aluminum eight-hole five-nuts rims, fat tires, a pair of mud guards, a bracket and a rear swing arm, an axle, a disc brake. And Orlando mounted all parts to the no-moreoriginal Sportster.

As Nick has problems with one leg he had to convert the shift system of the Sportster. Again he surfed the internet and he finally found a so called widow maker or suicide shift. A suicide shift is a shift mounted on the left hand side of the motor cycle, next to the tank instead of on the handle bar. So Nick got an old handle bar from Orlando and started to collect some pieces of old but still usable iron. The final result after a lot of studying, copying, drilling, welding, sanding, polishing and spraying was a custom made hand shift that did the job perfectly.

At the end of 2013 the project was fi-



nally successfully finished. Now Nick is the proud owner of a converted Harley-Davidson Sportster, equipped with a 1200 cc old fashioned long-stroke push rod overhead valve V-twin that gets its air and fuel by Screamin' Eagle. Finally two Vance Hines chrome pipes take care of the exhausts. By a belt the power from the engine is delivered to the two massive Hankook radial m+s tubeless tires, measuring 265x50x15. In the front and in the rear there are two disk brakes. Front shocks, electrics and electronics, the braking, all is completely original Harley-Davidson. The good looking black and flat black bike has only some 3500 kilometers on the gauge. Just recently Nick changed the 2.4 gallon peanut tank for a bigger one, containing 4.5 gallons. Nick: "Now I can make the southern loop and the northern loop without a break at home

to refill the tank! And there are plans to change the spooked front wheel for an all aluminum disk wheel. Plans and fantasies, but they will become reality!"

Then Nick shows me his driver's license. No license for a motorcycle, just for a car. The Sportster is registered: B -564. By law this is not a motorcycle but a car, like in England and in the Netherlands Finally he informs me about the fact that this unique motorcycle is completely financed by the heritage of his parents. Then he starts the engine.

A cloud of dust. Windows are trembling. Nick launches his bike. His parents can be proud of their son.

# igh School Test Results Improved

The examination results of the Comprehensive School Bonaire (SGB) High School after completion of the second period are published below. On average, 74% of examinees of the national exam passed. This rate is 6% higher than last school year. In 2013-2014 of the 242 candidates, 164 passed for a success percentage of 68%. This year from a total of 227 students examined, 167 students passed giving a passing percentage of 74%. 

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Boats circle around the platform that serves as a gateway to Carlos Coste's dive to the depths of the ocean. Coste is attempting to break the World Record free diving in the Variable Weights category that currently stands at 145 meters. That means he has to reach to a depth of 146 meters today with just one breath. A weighted sled, that is connected to a boat specially geared up with a deadweight pulley system should something go amiss, is used to send Coste down at a speed of 1.6 meters per second.

Once the desirable depth is reached he will let go of the sled, and, still connected to the rope, come up to the surface on his own power using a monofin (one fin for two feet instead of a separate one for each) to propel him upward. The tension is palpable as the judge counts down the minutes, and then seconds to Coste's last surface breath. Three, two, one and he's gone.

his is the first year that Carlos L Coste and his wife Gaby hosted the Deep Sea Challenge 2015 - a free diving competition on Bonaire. The couple moved to Bonaire in 2013 and started a free diving school. In a press conference at the Plaza Beach Resort on June 17<sup>th</sup>, on the opening day of the Challenge, they explain why Bonaire is the perfect free diving destination. What makes it perfect for free diving is not only the clear and calm Caribbean waters and the immediate depth that surrounds the island but the fact that within minutes driving distance from home or hotel you'll find a decompression chamber, a hospital and great supermarkets stocked with good organic super foods, a free diver essential.

#### The Challenge

The Deep Sea Challenge took place from June 17 to June 23, and in that time new personal records were set by the challenge competitors in a variety of disciplines. The competition included four different disciplines: Static Apnea; a discipline that focuses on time. How long can you hold your breath whilst floating face down in a pool? Dynamic Apnea; a discipline that focuses on distance. How far

can you go down? The Constant Weight category which involves swimming down with fins, taking a tag and going back up to the surface. The diver will have to announce the depth he'll try before diving down so the tag can be attached at the right depth, and the Constant Weight without Fins discipline which means depth is announced and the diver swims down breaststroke-style until he finds his tag on the line.

#### **Scores**

Free divers from around the world participated in the Deep Sea Challenge. Meet Edgardo Andrade from Honduras who won the Constant Weight and Constant Weight without Fins category as well as the honor of most complete athlete overall, Boy Roozendaal from Bonaire/The Netherlands who did great and placed second in that category, Martyn Bromley, from Great Britain holds third place and Maarten Boon, from the Netherlands, fourth place. Sebastian Lire from Chile took first place in the Static Apnea category, Warley Resin De Souza from Brazil placed second and Courtney Williams, from the USA placed first in all disciplines as the only female free diver. Carlos Coste, apart from trying to break the world record Variable Weights also took first place in the Dynamic Apnea discipline.

#### **Coste's Passion**

Carlos's free diving passion started in university when he got accepted into a prestigious underwater club whilst studying mechanical engineering. He was attending the Central University of Caracas in Venezuela when a study-partner introduced him to the World Underwater Federation (CMAS). This was a training club with a scuba course that was nothing like a regular PADI course but more like navy survival training. Only the best 25 out of 100 were allowed to do the course that

involved moving underwater from tank to tank whilst holding your breath. It was during this course that Coste became fascinated with free diving. He trained himself and together with some other enthusiasts formed a free diving team. They contacted the International Association for Development of Apnea (AIDA) and in 2000 the team competed in their first free diving world cup hosted in Nice, France. They placed third overall (out of 32 participating countries.) Coste explains: "It was so motivating! This was the first time we left our country and our first international competition and we had such a good score. It made me want to push on to see what else I

see what else I could do." In 2001 the Venezuelans entered another world championship in Ibiza. "One team member wasn't that well trained and kept the team back," Carlos clarifies, "and so from that moment on I decided to go at it alone. I then broke two world records in one week, the Constant Weight at 90 meters and the Free Immersion at 93 meters." He also holds the record as first human being to dive down to

100 meters in one single breath.

#### **Holistic Lifestyle**

In order to be able to breathe optimally Coste practices yoga and pranayama yoga that focuses on breathing techniques and lung flexibility. Nutrition and sports are also very important. The focus is on super foods and TRX training – in order to toler-

ate CO2 and low oxygen levels. Other methods that rate high on

his list are visualization, mediation and Neuro Linguistic Programming or NLP. He uses these techniques to pre-focus on the

dive and the depth he has to reach and to optimize the use of air between lungs, mouth and ears. Coste: "When I dive to these depths it is a very technical issue but I also want to feel good—I enjoy this."

#### Workshops

During the Deep Sea Challenge various complementary workshops were held

for the general public such as yoga workshops, including SUP voga, hosted by USA free diver Courtney Williams and the Smiling Budha Studio, a Tai Chi workshop, as well as a choice of kids' workshops such as yoga for kids, a STA pool challenge and a swimming and dynamic challenge for kids. Coste held an informative talk on the importance of good nutrition and super foods that help keep the body in optimal condition such as quinoa, kale, broccoli, sweet potatoes, walnuts, cranberries and much more. The pair's daughter even made examples of daily recipes that participants could look into.

## World Record Variable Weight

As Carlos tries to reach a depth of 146 meters he stops at intervals to equalize. The weighted sled has a clutch that he can release for a second. The AIDA

referees track him with a fish tracker to measure the depth he reaches. Rescue divers with tanks are waiting for him at 70 meters and free divers a little higher, at 30 meters. On the first attempt, Saturday June 20, he reached just over 120 meters, on the second attempt on June 27, 126 meters. Coste had ear issues. This means that the world record Variable Weights is still in the hands of Canadian William Winram. Coste is happy though, he had a beautiful Deep Sea Challenge and plans to try and break another world record, this time in another category. Here's to Coste and his wife Gaby and here's to the Deep Sea Challenge 2016!

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
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# Dreams After Turning 50

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'm talking to Wilco Harbers, who, after a life of social work and taking care of other people's needs, decided it was time to do something completely different. Mind you, I have no regrets whatsoever of what I've done all those years in social work. On the contrary, I think I benefited greatly from that experience in the relationship I have with my clients now. I have an extensive knowledge of human nature, and over the years I've learned how to find out what it is people really want, and I try to give them confidence and support them in trying something quite different and taking more risks when it comes to their interiors. But of course, in the end, it's always the decision of the client.


For me the criteria is that what's realized should fit the clients- their lifestyle, taste and needs- but also it should reflect the surroundings. And what I enjoy very much personally is when we bring something gutsy, something daring into the design, something the client never thought of or dared to think of before.


The fact we are here in the Caribbean has everything to do with my designs. Light and the use of colors are my passion but also my expertise. I am good at that. What I often bring into my projects is the sea. We're on an island and if you don't see her, you feel her. I try to make people aware of the special characteristics of Bonaire- its colors and temperature, the sea and all that lives in it and the sky – 90 shades of blue - but also all the different greens - and the special scent of this island.

We are living in a gorgeous, unique place and to bring the special beauty of this island home and incorporate it in your interior, that's a challenge, that's huge. But when you have done so and the interior of the house fits you like a glove and makes you feel it's part of you, then the picture is complete and we have a full circle.

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Junior Rangers Graduate

Perhaps the most significant program for teenagers living on Bonaire is the STINAPA (Park Authority)
Junior Ranger program. It was started in 2009 and now the program consists of about 35 youngsters who meet weekly to learn about the environment of their island and to learn the skills needed to appreciate it, preserve it and enjoy it. A major focus is on SCUBA diving.

Last week the Junior Rangers, the support staff, volunteers and friends got together in the Divi Flamingo conference room for graduation. There are seven levels to progress to finally be qualified as a Nature Ambassador for the island.

Junior Rangers receive diving certifications and learn to understand the ethics necessary to protect Bonaire's valuable land and sea resources. By being knowledgeable SCUBA divers so they can recognize the value of and understand ocean habitats and underwater ecosystems.

They learn about the significant Bonaire terrestrial environments of birds, plants, caves, bats and bees.

They become leaders and role models for other youngsters which is the program's ultimate objective along with passing on knowledge and appreciation for nature and environmental issues.  $\blacksquare$  *G.D.*

Chef Bos brings his in depth culinary experience to Breeze 'n Bites. His dinner specials are amazing (Barracuda toped with shrimp in a saffron sauce). He's creative (balsamic ice cream for example) and innovative, featuring Thai curries or pea soup. For one guest he made a meatless vegetarian disharomatic vegetables en croute. His fish dishes are lightly prepared, perfectly done and mouth watering. Chef Bos explains his philosophy: "This is a cozy place where the food should be fresh, tasty and nice."

Dick was a chef for the old Den Laman in the 90s. On a ship in Antarctica for three months he cooked for 50 people, three meals a day (13,000 meals in total). All the provisions were brought aboard before sailing. "No skimping," Bos relates. 

prive down Kaya Gobernador Debrot on any given day and you just might see a 10-foot long streamer flying above Navegante Boatyard just north of the desalinization plant in Hato. That is your personal invitation to visit Bonaire's historic ship, *Stormvogel*.

Fundashon Patrimonio Marítimo Boneiru, the Bonaire Maritime Heritage Foundation, is currently restoring the old boat. Launched from the shores of Playa Pabou in 1951, Stormvogel is the last remaining sailing cargo boat built in the ABC Islands. These ships were central to Bonaire society in the days before regular airplane service. They bonded the islands by uniting friends and relatives, supplying news and delivering vital cargo.

"The foundation is just beginning Phase Two of Project *Stormvogel*," explains board member Johnny Craane. "With our all-volunteer crew, we are doing an extensive, historical restoration of the boat. Later, she will become a museum for the island, hopefully a floating one, where both residents and tourists will have a chance to learn about our rich, nautical past."

The first Bandera Riba!, Flag Up Day, took place on June 27th. The goal was to reposition *Stormvogel* higher to make working on her easier for the crew. The ship was also leveled. Navegante Boatyard owner, Lelle Davidsson, operated his crane to lift the 7-ton boat. The rest of the volunteer crew was Johnny Craane-head of the restoration, his nephew-Bob Craane, Jim Madden and myself. Once the boat was repositioned, the crew removed the propeller and rudder. These



parts will be included in museum displays below deck when Stormvogel becomes the Bonaire Maritime Heritage Center after restoration. Hendrik Wuyts, owner of Bonaire Vision Films International, filmed the work. Hendrik is making a video that will track the entire restoration process of Stormvogel. That will later be shown below decks in the maritime heritage center's mini theater.

But not all of the volunteers of Project Stormvogel are adults. The foundation is making a concerted effort to include youth in the project. Starting soon, students from *Scholen Gemeenschap Bonaire* (SGB School), STINAPA Junior Rangers



and CIEE Research Station will participate in the Junior Shipwright program, a 10-hour informal educational course where students get handson experience working alongside Bonairean shipwrights while completing nine hours of restoration work.

Additionally, they will attend one-hour talks on the islands' nautical heritage presented by local historian and board president, Bòi Antoin. This program is funded in part by a grant from the Prins Bernhard Cultuurfonds of the Caribbean region. It is expected that 100 students will become Junior Shipwrights.

There is also a campaign to get younger students, ages 6-12, involved. The foundation plans to organize class field trips for school kids on the island. The students will tour *Stormvogel*, learn about the

golden days of sail on Bonaire and receive informational pamphlets about the island's maritime history. Xiomara Frans, an educator on Bonaire for over 20 years, will act as liaison between the schools and the foundation. "Project Stormvogel offers something for everyone on Bonaire," says Craane. "We want this to be a project for the entire community."


And Flag Up! Days are a great way to participate. When the *Stormvogel* flag is flying above Navegante Boatyard, stop on by. You can watch the restoration crew at work, ask Johnny Craane about the boat's history or buy a *Stormvogel* T-shirt (\$20), bottle koozie-insulator (\$5) or a bumper

sticker (\$3). All proceeds go directly to Project *Stormvogel*. Bandera Riba!

#### **CELEBRATING SUMMER SKIES**

hat better way is there than to celebrate our first full month of summer than by spending the night under the stars? You had a good chance when several hotels, like Captain Don's Habitat, shot off fireworks for American Independence Day on July 4<sup>th</sup>, but the stars will remain pretty much the same for this week.


You can check out a host of bright constellations all over the sky. Face west. The first thing to draw your attention will be two bright, non-twinkling lights. Those are the planets Venus and Jupiter. Venus and Jupiter had a super close conjunction on June 30th. Even this week they'll still be very close to each other and will make an excellent spectacle in the dwindling twilight.

Jupiter is the bright light on the right and Venus is the brighter one to the left. Both planets are visible right below the stars making the head of **Leo**, the lion. Leo is one of the most popular spring time constellations and in a few weeks, it will disappear below the horizon. The bright star Regulus to the right is Altair. Each of these stars marks the heart of the lion and is a multiple star system almost 80 light years away from

If you aim your gaze toward the south in the Sky Park, you'll see my favorite constellation of summer, Scorpius the Scorpion. Scorpius is easily found if you Look for a jshaped pattern of stars. The top three stars marking his face are Graffias, Dschubba and **Pi Scorpii**. And not far from Graffias and Dschubba is the ringed planet Saturn. Saturn is in an excellent spot for viewing this week, so I strongly encourage you to view it through a telescope.

Even through the most modest of telescopes, you'll be able to see Saturn's magnificent rings. A ring system that Galileo said resembled ears

If you follow the stars of Scorpius away from the three stars marking the face, you'll see a bright red star named Antares, because of its resemblance to the planet Mars. which itself was named after the Roman god of war. Continue to follow these stars through the curve in the tail and you'll see two stars that are close to each other which mark the stinger of the Scorpion. These stars are Shaula and Lesath. Shaula is a



blue-white star approximately 570 light years from Earth and Lesath is a white star 580 light years away and six times the diameter and 11 times the mass of our **Sun**.

If we now aim our view to the east, you'll see the stars marking the Summer Triangle. The brightest and bluest of the three stars in the Summer Triangle, is Vega. Down and to the left is **Deneb** and way over belongs to its own constellation. Vega is 25 light years away and is part of Lyra the Harp, whose stars make a little parallelogram. Vega's blue-white color tells us that it's much hotter than our Sun. In fact, compared to our Sun's temperature of 10,000 degrees Fahrenheit, Vega blazes away at a fierce 17,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

Altair is 17 light years away and it's the eagle eye of the constellation Aquila the **Eagle.** Altair is pretty close to us as far as stars go, and it's the t12th brightest star we can see. If we compare it to our almost million-mile-wide Sun, Altair is not only 11/2 times its size, but since it's a hot white star, Altair is actually nine times brighter than our cooler yellow Sun.

Lastly, we have **Deneb**. Deneb is approximately 3,000 light years away and marks the tail of Cygnus the Swan. Not only is Deneb bigger and brighter than the other two stars in the Summer Triangle, but it also happens to be the North Star on Mars. So, if you ever get lost roaming the surface of Mars, look for Deneb and you'll find north. Of course, if you get lost on Mars, finding north will be the least of your problems.

There are changes underway at Echo, Bonaire's "parrot protection" foundation: new management, new aviaries, new nests, more rescues.

Echo's founder **Dr. Sam Williams** is stepping back from day-to-day management and will be leaving Bonaire to take on new bird conservation responsibilities in Costa Rica. In 2003 Sam first visited Bonaire as a predoctoral student. He's been studying the local parrots (Bonaire's unique endangered Amazon Loras) and improving their conditions ever since. Some think his work is responsible for the almost tripling of the Lora count population over the years.

In 2010 he founded the Echo Foundation, now established at Fontein and Dos Pos, to continue to try and do something about the threats to the Loras. Although he's leaving the island he will remain as Echo's Director and fully committed to Echo and the conservation of Bonaire's amazing Loras.

The change makes room for two new team members. **Lauren Schmaltz** is Echo's new General Manager and is supremely qualified. In 2009 Lauren Salerno (her maiden name) was living on Bonaire working for CIEE and wrote for *The Reporter*. She volunteered for Echo, and even continued to support it during her travels and back to the US.

Lauren has a Master of Environmental. For the past two years Lauren has sat on Echo's Board of Trustees where her formal training has repeatedly impressed the Executive Committee.

Nathan Schmaltz, Lauren's husband, will

be managing Echo's operations on the ground. Nathan's has a Master's degree in Library and Information Science and is a practical guy with team management experience. Both Lauren and Nathan are keen divers and ecologically minded.

It's Lora breeding season again and we can hear males making their distinct call to announce their arrival with food for the incubating females. Soon, when the chicks have hatched, they will become vulnerable to poachers. Thanks to the support of donors last year there are several covert motion sensing digital cameras and these have been put out in hidden spots overlooking vulnerable nests. We hope that no poaching occurs but if it does we expect to get images of the poachers that can be used to enforce the Loras' protected status.

Echo's Lora homes are expanding. Initial construction went very well and rapid progress is being made. In addition to those dedicated to the Yellow-shouldered Amazon Parrots, we have built another large aviary for a pair of Green-winged Macaws. More changes on the way.
