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report that may influence the planned Referendum on the constitutional structure of Bonaire will be released this week. On Monday, October 12th, the evaluation committee Caribbean Netherlands presents its conclusions regarding the constitutional structure set on 10-10-10. The committee looked at the operation of the legislation, the operation of the new administrative structure and the consequences for the population. Since 10-10-10 Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius have had "direct ties" with the Netherlands.

It was agreed to examine the new political structure five years after its implementation.

The committee will present its report in the afternoon on October 12. The presentation can be followed live on the website of Nieuwspoort. http://www.nieuwspoort.nl/live/. The presentation will be in Dutch with a live translation (audio) in English and Papia-

▶Bonaire plans to have a new constitutional referendum on December 18, Commissioner Clark Abraham told the Island Council. In a first referendum people will only be asked if they agree with the way content was given to the winning choice of the last referendum for direct ties with the Netherlands. If the majority answer "no" the Island Council can decide on a new vote with various options taking into account Resolution 1541 of the United Nations (UN). In addition to Dutch citizens 18 years and older living in Bonaire, also foreign adults legally residing on the island for five years or more can participate.

► The Bonaire island government (OLB) has failed in communicating with its citizens because it still has not responded to five complaints presented to them by the National Ombudsman, according to Ombudsman Van Zutphen. The issues included granting leased land to a person other than the owner, land exchange with OLB and the provision of a diving license. The Ombudsman reported he has sent repeated reminders.

The National Ombudsman assesses the actions of the government with regard to proper governance. Within the context that the government operates, it can be difficult to meet these requirements.

its future plans with a central theme "to work on the three islands, Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius as one police force with a common vision and identity to enhance the safety and quality of life." No specific mention was made on how to deal with the recent spike in armed robberies on Bon-

Also announced was that the current BES Island Police Chief, Hildegard Buitnk, has decided not to take on a second term as Chief for essentially personal reasons. A new chief will be named by March, 2016, in consultation with the present Chief, judicial officials and the island governors.

The Regional Police Corps Administrator expressed his appreciation for the great efforts of Mrs. Buitink over the past years.

Clark Abraham, Commissioner of Tourism and Gabriele Tixi, cruise-ship manager for the Tourism Bureau, visited several cruise lines during a visit to Miami, Florida, from August 23 to 27 to talk about future plans for cruise tourism in Bonaire. During the meetings Commissioner Abraham discussed how the product quality and services of Bonaire might be improved and expansion of the facilities of the pier, the island's ability to increase the number of visits for the cruise season of 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 and the general port policy.

► AMSTELVEEN—Dutch airline KLM is poised to cut a quarter of its managerial **jobs** and support functions, national broadcaster NOS said, after acquiring a copy of the reorganization plan. The document states that KLM is too complex, too slow and too expensive. The company is too hierarchical, has too many managers and "has lost sight of its customers."

According to KLM, this means 25% of managers would lose their jobs and those who remain would have bigger departments to deal with. The job cuts should lead to savings of 40 million euros a year, NOS said.

► The Dutch Ministry of Infrastructure and the Environment (I &M) has provided a subsidy of over \$4 million for the drinking water transport and wastewater treatment operating costs this year, according to a recent government press release.

The cost for a reliable and sustainable supply of drinking water on Bonaire and the operating costs of the sewage water treatment on the island are so high that it cannot reasonably be paid by Bonaireans. Therefore, the Ministry of Infrastructure and the Environment will help Bonaire.

For the transportation of drinking water alone, over \$1.5 million is available. Nearly \$2.5 million for the operating costs of wastewater treatment plants was also offered. In the future, the operating costs of wastewater treatment, however, will partly be paid by the island itself. The condition for this grant is to set up a sewage tax plan in phases beginning in 2017. Wastewater treatment is important for the quality of the environment, health, the coral reefs and therefore for tourism and the island's economy.

► According to the Dutch Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) the largest airport of the BES Islands, Bonaire, showed an increase of 20% to 3000 flights in the second quarter of 2015. The number of passengers for Bonaire also increased considerably, by 6%. At St. Eustatius airport the number of flight movements fell by over 7%, at the smallest airport, Saba, flight numbers were unchanged. Passenger arrivals is usually considered a measure of tourist visits, but the CBS did not draw any conclusions on the intentions of the passengers in its report. ▶Work to renovate the track of Kralendijk stadium will begin shortly, announced Sports Commissioner Gerald Silberie. During the renovation, the stadium will be closed to the public. Other parts of the stadium, like the broken walls, the chairs and the piece of land that separates the stands from the track will also be renewed. The track will meet the interna-

he Saint James School of Medicine says they will quit operation on Bonaire next year. The Bonaire campus is moving to the island of St. Vincent at the end of December 2015 and being merged with the already established school there. Three of the five class levels will transfer at that time. The classes remaining will complete and then phase out.

According to a school press release there were several reasons for this tough deci-

- •Increasingly difficult immigration requirements for students
- •Tough immigration requirements for faculty
- •High cost of living
- •Lack of space to build a campus
- •Extremely limited connectivity with flights to the island
- •Lack of cooperation from the government authorities in helping to resolve these issues.
- •These issues are almost entirely nonexistent in St. Vincent.

However, the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science (OCW) and Immigration (IND) say these reasons are overstated. They point out that:

•Entry Requirements for American citi-

zens are equal to those for Dutch citi-

- •Admission requirements have even been simplified for the majority of the medical students.
- •The application for a declaration of admittance was free until October 1st. After October 1st the cost for a declaration of admittance is \$145.
- •The rules for admission are also simplified for the American family members who want to visit the American students.
- •US citizens as well as Dutch citizens are allowed to stay for a maximum period of six consecutive months, within a period of one year in the Caribbean Netherlands, without authorization.
- •They are exempt from applying for a work permit.
- •The school has no accreditation- In 2010 the American Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) gave the medical school three years' time to meet the quality requirements of The Netherlands for recognition. The medical school did not get an accreditation declaration of the Nederlands Vlaamse Accreditatie Organisatie (NVAO). This means that the education is not recognized by The Netherlands, but that doesn't mean that the school isn't allowed to stay on Bonaire.

The Dutch government is aware of the economic importance of the medical schools for the Dutch Caribbean Islands. The fact that the medical school is leaving the island is the choice of the school, they say.■ *Press releases*





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

DONKEY DOWN

Nature can be dispassionate when it comes to survival.

Living on a kunuku with mondi all around we see nature intimately. This continuing drought has affected all of us. Most of our non-hardy non-native plants have died. Some of the beautiful tall Yatu and Kadushi cactus have just fallen over. But the saddest sight of all was last week when we discovered a mother donkey, comatose, on her side with her baby next to her. We

We hoped they could be saved and called the island vet who immediately drove out. The mother was very weak but still breathing; so we rounded up a couple of passing bike riders and all of us together got her into the back of a pickup, not an easy job through the cactus and brush.

and our neighbors had seen the baby but never the mother and began to have bad

feelings about the missing mother.

In the meantime the baby ran away. From the amount of donkey manure on the ground by the mother the vet felt she had been down several days, but the whole time, even in her dying state, she nursed her baby. "That's what mothers do," the vet said. "They give to their child as long as they can and when they see the child is ready, they die."

Sadly, the mother didn't survive. She had no wounds. Starvation and dehydration

took their toll the following day.

The next day we saw the baby in the company of two adults, standing in the middle of the road, trying unsuccessfully to eat crushed tuna cactus.

There currently are two groups on Bonaire totally concerned with the welfare of our donkeys. They approach the preservation of the animals differently. In any case right now there are too many donkeys and not enough food and water to support their population in the wild.

How could this heartbreaking event have been avoided? I, for one, feel that the Animal Shelter Bonaire has it right: sterilization. Not all of them, but try to make a difference in the numbers. This donkey mother maybe could have endured the bad times were she not pregnant. There has been a lot of rhetoric -on different sidesabout how to protect Bonaire's donkeys, but to see one dying in front of you because there's not enough food and water just makes you sick. ■ Laura.DeSalvo.



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Unchain Your Dog

'It's For Free!'

The Bonaire Animal Welfare Organization is launching a new and truly wonderful project, offering help to people by looking for a solution to unchain their dog. "The goal is," according to Maryke Barendregt of the Animal Welfare Organization, "to accomplish real improvements in the situation of many dogs who are tied on a very short chain, often without any shelter from the sun or rain, for their entire life.

We perfectly understand that not everyone is in the position to put a fence around their house and even if they do so it can be hard to keep the dogs inside the yard because many of them jump or 'climb' over the fence and others dig their way to freedom.

We came up with the idea to clamp a coated steel wire between two points – for example a pole and a tree or two poles. Then a pulley will be put on the wire to which a thinner chain is attached which can be hooked to the dog's collar. The effect will be that the dog has much more space to move around, not only in length but also in width.

By having more space the dog will be healthier and livelier and it will feel more connected to its yard and the people who live there. The result will be that the dog is definitely going to be a much better watch dog than a dog that's stuck on one square meter for its entire life and who is either sick and wasting away or totally frustrated and completely indifferent or vicious and dangerous to any living creature, including children.

Next to the installation of the poles, the steel cable, the pulley and the chain (which project is starting as we speak), the Animal Welfare Organization has been promised help by the Army which will come to Bonaire by the end of the year, and in January the soldiers will start fabricating doghouses which will be for free as well and placed in gardens where dogs lack shelter from the sun and the rain.



The Unchain Your Dog initiative is a broad project," Maryke says. "It's not only about trying to improve the amount of living space the dog has, we also want to improve the living conditions of the dog; if necessary we will treat the animal against mange (sarna) worms (bichi), ticks (karpata) and flees (piew). We got a donation from the Dutch foundation, Stichting Dierenlot, so we will be able to do that for free as well!

Another issue is that we can have the animal sterilized and if people are open to it, we will discuss options to prevent pest outbreaks and how to take good care of your animal in general. Eventually we are hoping to reach everybody who wants advicce and help so that in the end it will have an effect on the whole neighborhood – and ideally – one day – on the whole island. That is our goal and prevention and education are a very important part of it.



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On The Island Since... August 7th, 2014 - Sanny Ensing & Guillaume Chidaine

've been coming here since I was four years old. We lived in Curacao and we would spend vacations here. My dad was the head of the lab in Curacao where he did research in cocaine and aloe. In fact, his fascination for aloe started there.

My dad is the owner of Onima Aloe Vera, the only aloe plantation on Bonaire. I was an only child and my childhood was pretty idyllic. We moved to St. Martin when I was 10 and to me it is home. It's the place where I feel grounded.

I was 15 when Hurricane
Luis hit St. Martin on September 5th, 1995. It completely ruined the island. Our school was destroyed and the parents were asked whether they could send their children under 16 to relatives or friends on other islands. They didn't want us to be around with the curfews, the looting and the general mayhem. So, I went to Curacao and the funny thing was that I ended up in exact the same class with exact the same children I had left years before!

When it was safe to go back, I returned to St. Martin and three years later I graduated VWO 6. I'd participated in a contest in St. Martin's *Daily Herald* newspaper, in which they asked for a writer for the 'Out 'n About' – the entertainment guide of the island - and I got in! I was 18 and I worked for them for two years. Then I moved to Seville, Spain, where I lived for a year and a half, working in a TexMex restaurant, studying Spanish and just having a lot of fun!

In 2000 my dad moved to Bonaire permanently. For a long time he'd already had the aloe plantation but then he bought a house here and I came back on a regular basis to help him with the aloe: harvesting and planting. When I decided I wanted to study I went to the University of Amsterdam where I studied cultural studies and anthropology. My Master's was on Heritage and Identity Formation in the Caribbean.

After my graduation I went straight back to St. Martin where a new job at the *Daily Herald* was waiting for me and where my mom still lived. Guillaume and I had met previously when I was writing my thesis on St. Martin in 2007. Then we met at my mom's place at the beach, where she had a tiny little shack, a true Caribbean home. I was staying there and Guillaume, who was a friend of hers, was visiting."

Guilaume: "I knew her mom before I knew her. Of course it was a set up! And it worked out well because it took us a week to fall in love. Mom knows best! Ha ha! When Sanny went to see her dad on Bonaire on Valentine's Day 2007, after we'd been together for one and a half weeks, I decided to follow her two days later. Bonaire was so laidback! I fell in love with the island and with Sanny. It was like a prehoneymoon. Three weeks after we met we moved in together. And from then

on we came to Bonaire at least once a year, always in February, always for our anniversary.

I was born in the center of France, in Clermont-Ferrand, known for its Michelin tires and its volcanoes. I spent 20 years of my life there. However, for all the holidays we would go to Brittany where we had a family house and where some of our family's roots are. In Brittany I learned how to sail when I was seven or eight, and I got hooked on boating. So, after finishing high school I tried university but it wasn't my thing. Then I moved permanently to Brittany when I was 23. I started repairing boats and building them as well. I'd finally found my vocation, my trade, my skill. My parents were extremely happy because I had been wandering around for

Master Shipwright Visits Stormvogel

Bonaire had a special visitor arrive in September by the name of Bruce Halabisky. Bruce has been a wooden boat shipwright and marine carpenter for the past 25 years. He received an invitation from Fundashon Patrimonio Marítimo Boneiru (Bonaire Maritime Heritage Foundation) to visit Stormvogel, the last of the wooden sailing cargo boats from the ABC Islands. Halabisky then applied to the nonprofit Center for Wooden Boats in Seattle, Washington USA, and received a grant to cover travel costs to the island.

"I have visited other countries with rich maritime histories where the wisdom to record that history arrived a generation too late, and most of the information was lost forever. But I also have worked on similar projects like this before so I thought I might be able to help in some way to preserve this important bit of Bonaire history. I think we are just in time to save *Stormvogel* and possibly rekindle the pride of one of the strongest boatbuilding traditions in the Caribbean."

Part of that boatbuilding tradition is Johnny Craane, head of restoration for Project *Stormvogel*. He was glad to have Halabisky visit the old boat. "Bruce was here for six days and we got a lot accomplished. He surveyed the whole ship and agreed on how we are now re-building the framing. He also helped us plan a materials list of the nails, planks and rigging we will need for the next steps."

"Obviously, materials are a challenge to obtain on a small island far from the mainland," says Halabisky. "But *Stormvogel* herself is a testament that this obstacle has been dealt with before. The biggest challenge is the staggering amount of work necessary to finish the job. From what I saw of the project's volunteers, there is not only a dogged enthusiasm, but also a deep pool of talent from which to draw in putting *Stormvogel* back together."

Halabisky, working with board member Patrick Holian, took detailed measurements of the 45-foot long sloop during his visit. From this data he will make line drawings—a scaled, dimensional representation that will accurately reflect the exact shape of *Stormvogel*. This will be the first permanent record of any of the boats ever built on Bonaire. The old shipwrights usually built by eye, intuition and perhaps a small model. Halabisky also plans to make a 3-D model from the line drawings and donate it to the project.

Having these visual records is great insurance. If the boat's hull should collapse during restoration due to an unforeseen event, the crew would be able to reconstruct *Stormvogel's* distinctive shape from the drawings and model.

The experienced shipwright also joined the crew in harvesting kui (mesquite wood) from the mondi. This timber will be used to replace rotted ribs in the boat's frame. Joining him were a number of young people from Project Stormvogel's Junior Shipwright program. This educational outreach initiative, funded in part by the Prins Bernhard Cultuurfonds for the Caribbean, teaches local youth about Bonaire's rich maritime heritage while they work with experienced boat builders. It is an integral part of Project Stormvogel. Halabisky also took time to speak at Scholengemeenschap-Bonaire (SGB High School) to about 30 students on careers in boat building. Bruce just completed a 10year circumnavigation on his own wooden sloop, Vixen. He financed much of the voyage by working on wooden boat restorations around the world. Between those funds and those from his wife, Tiffany, who worked as a yoga instructor, the adventurous couple not only funded their sailing travel, but also supported two daughters who were born during the voy-

Luckily for Project Stormvogel, Halabisky generously donated his knowledge and time even during these busy days when his family is trying to re-establish a land-based lifestyle on a Puget Sound island near the Canadian border. Part of the reason for his visit may be due to the urgency to save our island's nautical culture. "As I started learning more about the rich maritime history—the relatively recent history—of Bonaire, I was amazed that the boatbuilding skills and the boats themselves have been allowed to vanish without a trace. Here in Bonaire you have what was once considered to be the fastest and most seaworthy sailboats of the whole Caribbean. And yet today there is not a single vessel like Stormvogel still sailing. Not only that, but there is really no record of their hull shapes or even any models

existing. Already the younger generation is asking what were the boats like that their grandfathers built and aside from *Stormvogel* there is nothing to show them. For me, this is an extremely worthwhile endeavor." Story & photos by Patrick Holian





'd like to share the wonderful Bonairean eco-tour we - a group of 20 people- did in the morning of October 8 with a great guide, journalist-historian, Bòi Antoin.

It started when some friends and I asked Bòi if he could guide us to a cave. He agreed so that morning at 7:30 we headed to Arawak along the road to Rincon. The tour started with about an hour-long walk through a very tough area to the "Cave of the Virgin." Everywhere there was dry or barely alive Yatu cactus, Frou-Frou, **Bol cactus** and other types of cactus in between, as well as rocks, a lot of dead trees and dry bush and some live plants with thorns. Bòi gave us a lot of information about these rare plants, many of which are used for medical purposes.

There was the **Red Feira**, very good for a lot of health problems like worms in the body. A tea made from this plant will help children with worms.

Then there was the wild Wayaca (ironwood) tree (different from the Wayaca we see in town). In the past people used to brush their teeth with the thin stems. It has also a kind of a mint taste so your mouth feels fresh and clean. (We tried it).

While we walked through the landscape Bòi pointed out more plants, some of which had died. There was the wild Yerba Hole which has a very nice smell when you put a leaf under your nose. All the many kinds of Yerba Hole are good to mous one with a large entrance. But bemake a nice tea which calms the stomach, bringing down stomach upset and pain. There were also a lot of goat and iguana bones.

Sometimes there was a path, sometimes we had to go through the bush. One person got Yatu cactus needles in the hand, a child slipped and hurt her hand. But Bòi showed us how to put the aloe which was growing there on the wound.

At one point at a higher elevation there was an awesome view over the land to the sea—so wide, wild and such a space.

Finally we reached the cave, an enorcause the interior was so small we could only enter in small groups. Bòi was waiting for us inside. It was not far to go in but it was not easy. While sitting and listening to him the lights were turned out at a certain moment and it was really dark! Very scary!

The cave is beautiful like something fr om a fairy tale with the stalagmites and stalactites. It made me think of the movie, "Lord of the Rings."

After a while we started back, which

was harder because the sun was stronger and there was less shade. Everybody needed their water bottles. Bòi let us walk by ourselves, then asked who knows the way back? It looked so easy but we were guessing the wrong way nearly every time. And with all the thorny bushes, the sharp rocks, broken bottles and animal bones it was a kind of watch out and walk

Along the way Bòi pointed out plants and trees like the wild cherry (Shimaruku) and talked about other small grapes and berries that grow in that area but are not well known.

Around noon we headed for town, everybody tired but impressed by this tour, a masterpiece of Bonaire's nature. ■



OCTOBER SKY CALENDAR

ots to see this month: ✓ October 12— New Moon, 8:06pm. At this stage, the **Moon** is not illuminated by direct sunlight and is completely invisible to the naked eye.

October 13 – After midnight – That multicolored star you see in the southeastern sky after midnight (until dawn) is Sirius, in the constellation Canis Major. It's sometimes called the **Dog Star**.

October 15 - After sunset, look to the western horizon to see the tiny waxing crescent Moon and Saturn (and the star Antares)!

October 16 – Wow, look at this lineup! In the sky before dawn, look for Venus, Jupiter, Mars and Mercury (Mercury will be closest to the horizon).

October 17— Mars and Jupiter will be very close together before dawn for the next two days.

October 18— Look to the east about an hour before sunrise to see the line up of these four planets: Venus, Jupiter, Mars and

and **Neptune** are very close.

October 20— First Quarter Moon, 4:31 pm. In this phase, the Moon looks like a half shower. Also, before dawn, be on the look--Moon in the sky. One-half of the Moon is illuminated by direct sunlight while the illuminated part is increasing, on its way to

October 21-22— The Orionid Meteor Showers. These showers originate from debris from the most famous and wellknown of all comets, Halley's Comet. The sky will be nice and dark because the Moon will have set already, making for good viewing. These meteors radiate from a point near the club of the constellation Orion. The bright star near the radiant point is Betelgeuse. Best visible looking to the south, between 2 and 4am, in any time zone.

On the evening of October 20th to the early morning of October 21st, get outside, somewhere with no light pollution, and look for the annual Orionid meteor shower.

What are the Orionids? They are caused from debris from the most famous of all comets, Halley's Comet. The comet last visited Earth in 1986 and will return next in the event and appears full for three days. 2061. Debris in the orbit of this comet – the Orionid meteor stream – is now encounter-



ing Earth's atmosphere. It is called Orionids because the meteors seem to emerge or radiate from the **constellation Orion**.

The best time to observe any meteor shower is during the early morning hours, between midnight and 5am., regardless of your time zone. Generally, with the Orionids, observers can expect to see 20-25 meteors per hour.

The meteors, which are vaporizing bits of comet ice and dust, will look like streaks of light in the night sky. They're often referred to as shooting stars (so feel free to make a

As you look into the predawn sky, you'll October 19— The waxing crescent Moon also get to see the slim waning crescent moon rising which, fortunately, will not interfere with the visibility of this meteor out for the sky's brightest star, Sirius. Jupiter will also be very bright before dawn, and will be visible in its spot high in the sky.

> October 24 – The large, waxing Moon will be right between planets Uranus and Neptune. Because the Moon will be so big and bright, you will not be able to see the two planets without a telescope. Look to the southeast in the evening.

> October 26 – Venus reaches its greatest elongation west of the Sun in the morning sky. Look to the east, before dawn: Venus is also very close to Jupiter and Mars, which will be the closest for all of 2015. We won't see this close of a grouping of planets until January 2021.

> October 27 - Full Hunter's Moon, astronomically full at 8:05am. In this phase, the entire disc of the Moon is fully illuminated by direct sunlight. Though the Moon is only technically in this phase for a few seconds, it is considered "full" for the entire day of
