Signs, similar to the one above, hoping to influence voters in the upcoming Referendum on December 18, have begun appearing around the island. Some of the signs hint at anti-Dutch "racism" so much so that the local Papiamentu language newspaper, *Extra*, issued a strong editorial against it. Notice that the sign itself mixes Papiamentu and Dutch words.

The first look at corruption on the BES Islands discovered nothing much so Ard van der Steur Minister of Justice wants to do additional research on corruption in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. The Dutch Council for Law Enforcement concluded that there is little factual information about corruption in the Caribbean Netherlands "This makes it difficult for the Prosecutor and National Police to proceed with criminal investigations and prosecutions," added Van der Steur.

The Justice Minister recommends that Law Enforcement gather more information about corruption and a plan of action. "Together with the OM, I will examine how the nature and extent of the corruption can be mapped, so that additional actions and measures can be formulated," he writes.

▶After five years the High Court in The Hague finally closed the case against former "Union Patriotiko Boneriano" (UPB -green) leader Ramonsito Booi, ex-UPB Commissioner Burney el Hage and his wife Gina, in the so-called "Zambezi" probe regarding suspected document falsification and mortgage fraud. The case had been closed when the Bonaire Prosecutor's Office had been forced to drop the case because it could not meet a deadline set by the examining judge to complete its investi-

gation. Then in 2011, some citizens formed the Foundation Good Governance and filed a complaint with the Court of Justice to instruct local authorities to continue to pursue the trio. But corruption was added to the charges, which led another judge to again dismiss the case. The prosecution then unsuccessfully appealed the latter ruling, first to the Court of Justice and ultimately to the High Court.



▶ There was another armed robbery of a Chinese-owned supermarket last week. The robbers got away, but there was a good description of them and the getaway car. The police posted it on social media almost immediately! A first for Bonaire. At press time the stick-up men were still at large.



▶On Sunday, October 4, between 22:45 and 23:15 there was a robbery in the house located on Playa Lechi 36 in Bonaire (Boulevard). Camera images show that on the night of the raid between 21:00 and midnight the same car, an SUV, passed more than 10 times in front the house where the robbery was committed.

Authorities posed the photos from the security cameras on social media and asked the help of the public to identify it. If you have more information about this car, the driver, or to the robbery, contact the police by calling 715-8000 or 717-8000 or via the hotline 717-725.

►On Sunday, November 1st artwork made by inmates of the Correctional Institution Caribbean Netherlands

(JICN), the local prison, was exhibited at the *Sentro Deportivo Jorge Nicolaas*, the sports auditorium, on Kaya Amsterdam.

Several beautiful paintings by several detainees were exhibited. This time, in addition to paintings, other artwork produced by the inmates under the supervision of art teacher Andres "Addi" Figaroa, was shown.

The convicts created their artwork independently on their own initiative. During this exhibition there was an opportunity to view the artwork and paintings as well as buy them. There were photos of furniture made by the detainees that could be ordered for later delivery. The proceeds of the sales are used to provide more materials so JICN can continue to stimulate and motivate inmates to make positive use of their talents and skills.



▶Work on the updated sports track at the stadium in Kralendijk is almost complete. When that happens then Bonaire will have a track that meets all international standards for athletics. Fundashon Wega di Number Boneiru also made a financial contribution for the maintenance of the track. In addition refurbishment of the stands is almost complete and it is hoped that it will not be long before sporting activities will be held at the stadium.

▶The Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) wants their information to be more easily accessible to the public and has launched a Facebook page. CBS will be posting press releases, announcements and results of studies and links to the statistics and backgrounds of the studies carried out by CBS. It is also possible to ask questions. ▶Tourism Corporation Bonaire (TCB) is targeting use of social media to attract more tourists to Bonaire. This followed an investigation into the use of social media marketing through tourist offices in the Caribbean, designed and implemented by Eva Sira, a student at the NHTV University of Applied Sciences in Breda, Netherlands. She examined the social media using

Referendum 2015



ast week the Referendum Commission held a press conference to explain the procedures leading up to the **December 18**th **Referendum** to assess the feeling of Bonaire voters regarding the changes on the island since the governing restructuring that began on October 10, 2010 (10-10-10). Five of the seven members of the committee were present (photo above).

The question that will be submitted to the people in the referendum will be:
"Do you agree with the content given to the direct ties with the Netherlands?"

Only a "yes" or "no" answer can be given. If the voters indicate dissatisfaction, another referendum will be held to offer alternatives.

The Referendum Commission members indicated that they are impartial and neutral and sees as their duty to inform the people in the coming weeks as well as possible.

There will be three information bulletins: the first on November 13, five weeks before the Referendum. This bulletin will be a brief explanation of

the conduct of the Referendum and its consequences.

The second bulletin will be published two weeks later and will answer questions. The third bulletin will come out one week before the Referendum.

For the awareness campaign there will be a website:

(Referendumbonaire2015.org) and Facebook page (Referendum Bonaire) plus advertisements in the media and some billboards.

Information meetings will be conducted at four locations: one in Rincon and three in Playa.

The Referendum Commission explained that this is a "non binding" Referendum and that the outcome specifically concerns only Bonaire. Partly for this reason the United Nations has not been invited because it is not needed. The hope is that about 11,000 voters will cast their ballot, but there is no minimum number of votes required.

The organization of polling stations is in the hands of the Main Civil Affairs

Department which handles the Island Council elections. Everyone who is legally registered can vote, including non-Dutch residents who have been registered at least five years.

The Referendum Commission will communicate in Papiamentu and Dutch, two of the three official languages in Bonaire. You can ask questions by email:

Seismological Research station reported an earthquake between Bonaire and Curacao, with the epicenter located 28 kilometers southwest of Bonaire. The quake registered 2.8 magnitude and was at a shallow depth of 2.8 kilometers.

- ♦ More rumblings: from tourists. Local media reports that a fairly large group of tourists were quite inconvenienced when they arrived at Flamingo Airport last week and no taxis or buses were available. Seems there was a large cruise ship in town that day and all the taxis had better things to do. With airlines like TUI (formerly ArkeFly) adding flights to Bonaire, this could be a major issue.
- ◆ Rocargo is no longer handling the Federal Express service of Bonaire. The new FedEx office is now located in Hato at Kaya Den Haag #4. Reportedly the phone number is 717-8889 and e-mail address is altacourier@bonairelive.com.
- ◆ Rolling words on the street are that there is a big auto dealership shakeup coming to Bonaire. One of the oldest auto dealers on the island will no longer carry

a major brand auto maker but instead will add two other major auto makers. The "abandoned" brand will be moving to another local dealership. Stay tuned for the details.

♦ Shake your money maker: MCB has announced major new developments. In January 2016, they will begin construction of a new Playa branch at the current location of their insurance division, BSure, at the corner of Kaya Grandi and Kaya L.D. Gerharts.

In connection with these new developments some other changes are occurring. As of December 1, the MCB airport branch will be closed permanently and the Rincon branch will only be open on Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 9 to noon and from 1:15 to 3:30. Also as of December 1, the Playa and Hato branches will have new hours, 8 am to 4 pm nonstop. Because the Hato branch will now be open through lunch, the drive through window there will be discontinued.





auren Schmaltz, the → General Manager of the Echo Foundation that focuses on protection of Bonaire's endangered Amazon parrot (Lora), reports, "The wild parrot chicks have fledged! Another breeding season has finished and young chicks across the island have left their nests. I'm thrilled to be able to report that we found no evidence of poaching at any of the nests

that the Echo team was monitoring. Instead, the hills are echoing with the sound of juvenile parrots begging mom and dad for at least one more 'free

The team are done with monitoring of nests but we are all still out and about, busy keeping a close watch on the young parrots. Now that they have fledged they are learning how to navigate through a much bigger, more complex, and sometimes more dangerous world. At the Dos Pos Conservation Centre, where there are several nests nearby, there has been a Caracara flying over regularly. These birds of prey do not attack the parrots but seem to get a kick out of stirring up all the birds. But there are also cars, windows and power lines that these youngsters



have never before encountered which could cause serious harm.

So far, everyone seems to be doing amazingly well at adapting to the big wide world. This is great news for us because we can focus our energies on the upcoming rainy season and the opportunity to help restore their native habitat, so that their children can have a healthier, safer home in which to grow up.

Caribbean paradise, where the ocean is warm, turquoise and shallow, and green sea turtles ever so often stick their heads out of the water to look at your athletic progress and more importantly to take a breath. Well, in Lac Bay on Bonaire, you can.

ac Bay on Bonaire is a hot spot for

windsurfers as well as for endangered

What seems like a very peaceful coexistence can be dangerous sometimes, especially for turtles. Fortunately, collisions between windsurfers and surfacing turtles are rare - but they do happen. However, something else threatens marine life in Lac Bay even more: people racing right through the turtle food (seagrass) and thereby destroying

To protect and regrow these brownish and sort of muddy looking seagrass beds, in 2009 Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) set up several floating fences on the windsurf beach of Sorobon. These are made out of plastic tubes and are clearly marked by signs to warn surfers not to enter these turtle feeding areas - as bottom scraping fins destroy the roots of the grass, as much as stepping on

Not only is seagrass essential for green sea turtles, it is also an important factor in balancing the bay's ecosystems as a whole. The seagrass beds are home to various microbes, critters and fish species, and seagrasses function like filters which constantly clean the water. Their roots also perform an important role by anchoring the sands in place in Lac

Bay.

Don't Hurtle Through Turtle Food!

To prevent the floating fences from sinking or drifting, members of STCB clean the lines weekly from fast growing algae and check if they are still fixed on their buoys and anchors. Many local and visiting volunteers have already helped STCB do this important work. "The more people we have, the quicker the work is done and the more fun it actually is," says Cosette Larash (24), STCB Intern and marine conservation student from Maryland, USA. And: "Kids and parents can learn a lot about marine life on Bonaire when they join us."

STCB Project Coordinator, Sue Willis, adds that "maintaining these floating lines is important for Bonaire's endangered sea turtles and without the lines and the efforts of staff and volunteers at STCB this important ecosystem would be destroyed."

So next time you wonder why some brownish muddy areas disturb the perfect image you might have of a Caribbean beach, remember: this is delicious turtle food and it keeps your turquoise dream water clear. Just help to keep it growing. Because a Caribbean paradise without turtles? That's just unthinkable!

Want to help? If you are ready for line cleaning – usually taking place on Tuesday mornings at Sorobon Beach, send an email to sue@bonaireturtles.org. Volunteers should be prepared to work standing in the shallow water under the strong Caribbean sun, so long sleeves, sunscreen, a hat and swimming gear are required. GREEN TURTLE SPEARED

t the end of September a Green turtle A was spotted with a long metal spike sticking out of its neck near Andrea II dive site by an STCB volunteer. The green turtle was on the surface in distress and swam towards the volunteer. According to the volunteer, the metal spike was embedded about an inch into its flesh near the neck. The spike appeared to be a thin home-made harpoon, 39 inches long with a nick in the

one end for a string and a point on the other end. The volunteer was able to remove the spear by gently rotating the spike out of its neck. The green turtle did not resist, indicating that there was no barb on the end. After the harpoon was removed there was no blood oozing from the wound and no sign of any infection.


forbidden to use hand spears or poles with hooks to hunt or catch marine life. Since

On The Island Since... February 2008 – Yhannireth Pinto

66 n August 2007 we came here for a for the time being. Well, after going back vacation. We were supposed to go to Cuba but there was a hurricane so we decided to go one week to Aruba and one week to Bonaire. We spent the week here and we loved the place. One month later we moved here. It was really easy. I came alone with the kids because my husband was working in Trinidad. As he was going to finish that job in December and then go to another location, the children and I needed a place to stay where they could go to school in the meantime. Immigration told me I needed a hundred papers and that I had to leave the island

and forth a lot we got our residency in February 2008.

Then my husband also came, but most of the time he was travelling for work. We thought we would be here for one year and then we would see. Well, the year passed and I didn't want to leave Bonaire anymore, mainly in the interests of my children.

Before we came here my boys had also been in school in Trinidad and they had learned English quickly. However, Dutch on Bonaire was something else. It was very difficult and both of them lost one

school year. Juan, who was 13, went to SGB, and Santiago, 11 at the time, went to Kolegio Reina Beatrix elementary school. Neither one of them spoke one word of Dutch or Papiamentu. So after that year, when they were doing better, it was very important for me to stay. I didn't want to move them anymore. I wanted them to finish high school here."

"When I came here," Santiago says, "it was really tough! But since we were small we'd always been moving around and dealing with new experiences, so this was just one more, but... it was the toughest one – because of the language. They didn't have a special program for me. I went to regular classes and my brother and I learned Dutch by ourselves. We had private lessons too, but that didn't help much. However, in spite of everything, I wasn't unhappy at all and I was never bullied. There were so many different cultures in my class, so many nationalities, so who was going to bully who?

The first two years in elementary school were the hardest, but in high school I did really well and I finished VWO-4 while my brother Juan graduated Havo-4. He is 21 now. He's in Groningen, Holland, studying engineering. I want to leave the island too because I am 19 and there isn't much going on here, but I don't relaxed mode of the island made me forknow if I'll like Holland. It's way too different from what I've heard and I don't all. like the cold. And I might not be able to do my favorite sports there- surfing and wakeboarding. Also, if you're alone in Holland it can be terribly hard. You know, I am Venezuelan and I feel Venezuelan.

ceived in Qatar and born on Bonaire in 2009. I stayed at home with him for two years, then I started working at Buddy Dive. At the time they used to have a liveaboard – a very luxurious dive boat – stationed at the Galapagos Islands. I was in charge of all the bookings for that boat, including transport, tours etc. I did that for clients are very faithful. They don't get three years and then Buddy Dive closed the operations and I was out of a job.

I talked to Patrice of Bistro de Paris and right away he said, 'Yes! That's a good idea!' That's almost a year and a half ago!

An arepa is like a corn bread – cooked on the grill. However, there are different ways. It's crunchy, although it can be soft as well, and it can be opened like pita bread. There is no limit to what you can fill it with, but most popular are *Pabellon* (shredded beef with fried plantains and

white cheese, avocado and black beans) and the other one is Reina Pepiada (shredded chicken mixed with avocado and mayonnaise). But I also have pork, chicken, fresh fish, octopus, seviche, seafood casserole, tenderloin and vegetarian arepas.

The experience at Bistro is great and the bored with my arepas which makes me happy. And the tourists are always ready to try them. They are not afraid to eat something they don't know. 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
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

Lots of Interesting Bonaire Statistics





Tourism accounts for a substantial part of employment on the islands of the Caribbean Netherlands. On Bonaire and Saba, 20% of jobs are tourism-related, versus 12% on St Eustatius. In the rest of the Netherlands, tourism accounts for 8% of jobs. Statistics Netherlands (CBS) reports that the government sector is by far the largest employer on the islands of Caribbean Netherlands.

The number of employee jobs in Caribbean Netherlands totaled 9,500 in 2014, marginally down from 2013. On the larger island of Bonaire, there are approximately 7,800 jobs. Apart from government and tourism, several hundred people are employed in the sectors trade, construction and financial and business services. The smaller islands of St Eustatius and Saba account for 1100 and 770 employee jobs respectively.

The average annual wage in Caribbean Netherlands was \$24,420 in 2014, an increase of 1% compared to 2013. On average, wages were highest on St Eustatius and lowest on Bonaire.

Structure of employment different from the European part of the Netherlands.

The distribution of jobs over the various sectors on the islands differs from the rest of the Netherlands. Proportionally, employment in the tourism sector is more than twice as high as in the Netherlands. The share of government jobs is also much larger than in the Netherlands. The absolute number of jobs on the islands is fairly low. As a result, the number of jobs at local government level is relatively high.

What also plays a part is the fact that a number of facilities (like specialist medical care) and business sectors (like agriculture and business services) are hardly or not at all present on the islands. Hence, the structure of employment is quite different from the rest of the Netherlands.


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

Spectacular Exhibition Opens At Mangazina di Rei

It is Friday, 23 of October. In the dark I'm driving towards Rincon. Just before entering Rincon, on the right hand side there is light and already a lot of parked cars. This is the place to be. I am welcomed with *awa limunchi* (lime water) or tamarind, a refreshing drink. After a meet and greet with music from a local Rincon band, "Silver Bullet," a presentation is given by **Danilo Christiaan**, the project manager for Mangazina di Rei and his wife **Heleen**.

They show what happened during the preparation for the exposition. For example, some materials arrived for making boards, but some parts were missing. These parts would be sent afterwards and they could track them. This caused a lot of tension because the parts were traveling within Europe and in South America, and every day they showed up in a different place, from Germany to Saint Maarten to Puerto Rico. But, in the end they arrived just one day before the opening, and that was a relief. A lot of work was done in that day and they got a lot of help from the people of Rincon. The presentation was really funny, with a lot of pictures of all the people who had helped as volunteers. A lot of elders from Rincon had provided them with stories and knowledge about the past.

After Danilo and Heleen there were speeches held by **Gilbert Isabella** (*Rijksvertegenwoordiger*- Kingdom Representative), **Commissioner Benito**

Dirksz (gedeputeerde), Timoteo Silberie (SKAL, cultural department OLB) and historian Bòi Antoin.

Gilbert Isabella was delighted to be able to give a gift out of his budget for local initiatives: he offered a free ticket for the exposition for every child from group 8. His enthusiasm for Mangazina di Rei lies in its goal to preserve his-

tory, old habits and developments on Bonaire and pass them on to the youth of today. Benito Dirksz mentioned the importance of knowing about the time of slavery and the impact this has had. Timoteo mentioned that at first he wasn't very pleased about the new exposition because it meant that Mangasina di Rei had to close for some time, but now he is convinced it was worth it. He mentioned the educative goals of the project: how children can learn from older people. The Mangasina also plays another important part: it is very attractive for tourists to learn more about Bonairean nature, culture and traditions. Bòi Antoin mentioned the importance of Rincon, the first village for slaves on Bonaire, surrounded by nature. Family names are a memory from those days. They originate from all parts of the world like Spain, Africa, Holland.

And then the moment came for which

everybody had come: the curtain was drawn and everybody was invited to come in and see the exposition.

I can tell you it is a very interesting exposition with a lot of information about nature, culture and history. A lot of pictures and facts even the real locals do not always know. For example do you know the answer to these questions?

- ♦ Why do so many older people in Rincon have their birthday in September?
- ♦ What role did the church play in education and was there any school during the time of slavery?
- ♦ What kind of food is really local?
- ♦ What instruments were played and where do the melodies come from?
- ♦ I will give the answer to the first question. For the other answers you will

have to go to the exposition in Mangazina di Rei!

◆ The answer is: just after the period of slavery most of the Rincon men went to work abroad, then came back to Bonaire for the Christmas holiday. Then after nine months, in September, you would

get the results of their visit in the form of children.

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A Garden? Just Do It

Spondias Mombin. Hmm, strange words. What is it, you wonder?

Well, I tell you what. It's a fruit which grows right here on Bonaire known as **Hoba.** It's not a popular fruit because it is small with a rather big seed and it's sour. But don't underestimate it. When you make a jelly from it or syrup or stew it with some brown sugar and cinnamon, it tastes like heaven on your tongue.

One grows in my neighbor's yard. It's a big tree and about twice a year there were buckets full of fruit just spoiling there. When I showed my neighbors how to make different things with this Hoba they and their family enjoyed it so much that since then I have had to stand in line for it. There are some Hoba trees growing on Bonaire, and I want to tell you more about this great fruit.

The Spondias Mombin or Spondias Purpurea is a species of flowering plant in the cashew family, anacardiaceae, known here as Hoba. It's native to the tropical Americas, including the West Indies. It's most commonly known as jocote, derived from the Nahuatl word, xocotl, meaning any kind of sour or acidic fruit. There is also the purple mombin known on Bonaire as the Maka Pruim (in Dutch, Rode Mombin). Also well known in the tropics is another fruit of that family: the Golden Apple (Pommisiter in Surinam).

The Mombin fruit is rarely cultivated. The mature fruit has a leathery skin and a thin layer of pulp. The fruit hanging in numerous branched, terminal clusters of a dozen or more is ovoid or oblong, has an aromatic, very juicy and very acid pulp. Fruits ripen in August and in December-January.

The tree is fast growing in the sun from large cuttings which root quickly. The tree can also grow from seed and new plants can come from the thick roots. The tree can become huge, up to 30 meters high, which can be a sweet house for birds and iguanas on Bonaire.

Twice a year the tree bears fruit, then for some months one can pick buckets of Hoba. Fruiting usually starts at about five years of age. The older the tree becomes the more fruit it bears. Often just after the last fruits, the tree starts blossoming again and then some months later one can again enjoy the yellow-orange ripe fruit.

Medicinal Uses

The fruit juice is used as a fever reliever and a diuretic. The bark is used as a purgative or cathartic and in local applications for leprosy. The bark extract is used for severe cough, causing relief through vomiting. The dry pulverized bark is applied as a dressing to a circumcision wound. An extract of mashed leaves is used for washing a swollen face. The leaves, ground with sugar, are rubbed on the mouth and gums. A leaf infusion is a common cough remedy or used as a laxative for fever with constipation. Leaves crushed with lemon are effective for worms in children. An extract of pounded leaves is used as an eye lotion and a juice pressed

from young warm leaves is given to children for stomach troubles. In Surinam's traditional medicine, the infusion of the leaves is used as a treatment of eye inflammation, diarrhea and venereal diseases. A tea of the flowers and leaves is taken to relieve stomach biliousness, cystitis and throat inflammation. The seed has an oil content of 3-5%.

What to do with Hoba

The extracted juice is used in making ice cream, cold beverages, jelly and jam. In the Amazonas the fruit is used mainly to produce wine sold as Vihno de Taperiba. In Guatemala the fruit is made into a cider-like drink. Mexicans pickle the green fruits in vinegar and eat them like olives with salt and chili as they do with purple mombin.

In certain areas in Asia the leaves are eaten as a vegetable. It tastes a little bitter but it goes well with dried fish or shrimp.

And I just stew them with some sugar for awhile and they become the most delicious dessert.

Other common names for *Spondias Mombin*

In the Spanish speaking Caribbean it's called *Jobo*, derived from the Carib language. In the English speaking Caribbean, Yellow *Mombin* or Hog Plum. In Surinam its called *Mope*; in Brasil, *Caja*; in Peru *Mango Ciruelo*; in Jamaica, Gully Plum; in Ghana, Ashanti Plum; in Nigeria, *Yeye*, *Ambaralla*; in Srilanka, *Amra*; in Hindi, *Junglee Aam*; in Vietnam,

Coc; in Panama, Mangotin and on Bonaire and Curacao it's known as **Hoba.**


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Barracuda Swimmers Win



rom October 30 to November 1 was the 14th Aruba Dolphins Invitational place. This very well organized swimming competition was held in the 50- meter pool Pisina Olimpico Roly Bisslik on Aruba. For this event special medals were designed in honor of the 40th anniversary of the Aruba Dolphins swimming club.

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Is Bonaire Ready to Control Plastic Bag Pollution?

LOCAL PROJECT SAYS IT'S AS SIMPLE AS "BRING YOUR OWN BAG"

A local sustainability project is betting that island residents want to tackle plastic bag pollution on Bonaire. And the project, **Boneiru Duradero**, plans to make it as easy as possible.

Single use plastic bags are an increasingly visible source of litter and pollution. "It's so easy to use single-use plastic bags – they're free and plentiful," said Sharon Bol, project coordinator of Boneiru Duradero and board member of Tene Boneiru Limpi and Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire. "But it's also pretty easy to find alternatives, and we think Bonaireans are ready."

Indeed, evidence is mounting that Bonaire may be getting tired of plastic pollution. A Facebook page called "Styrofoam Free Bonaire" has begun posting tips on using reusable containers and bags for takeaway foods and groceries. Created by a local resident in July, the site quickly attracted over 350 members.

But while visual pollution is concerning residents, that's not all that's worrying them. Plastic bags pose an increasing threat to the health of people and animals, on land and in the sea.

In a sevenday period in late August, concerned divers posted seven online reports of large amounts of plastic garbage floating in Bonaire's lagoons and nearshore reefs. The divers expressed frustration at the amount of

the amount of floating plastic and their inability to collect it all.

To combat the plastic debris, some dive operations host both underwater and beach cleanups that attract increasing numbers of divers every year. In the first nine months of this year, volunteers with one dive company, Dive Friends Bonaire, collected over 30 cubic meters of plastic debris. (See Dive Friends Cleanup Dive article on page 7.)

A recent study reported that 90% of seabirds have ingested plastic. Sea turtles, fish, and other marine animals also mistake plastic bags for food, and once swallowed, the bags prevent food uptake, causing starvation. Such losses reduce

available food for human consumption and can cause declines in water quality and the marine environment that draws tourism to local economies like that of Bonaire.

For humans, the threat may turn out to be as bleak: plastic breaks down in the marine environment into microscopic fragments that accumulate in the bodies of food fish. Human health authorities are investing millions of dollars to study the health threats posed by eating plastic-contaminated food and water.

Boneiru Duradero will encourage vendors and customers at its new Marshe di Playa to "Bring Your Own Bag." The first Marshe di Playa opened Saturday, October 31st at Jong Bonaire. The weekly Saturday market will open from 8am to noon and will offer high-quality, locally-made products, including fresh vegetables, fruit, and herbs, garden plants; jewelry, cloth-

ing, and art, and Creole cooking.

Now Boneiru Duradero and **Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire** have joined forces to reduce the use of single-use plastic bags on Bonaire. Plastic forms a direct threat to Bonaire's sea turtles and other marine life. The collaboration initiative will produce a comparative analysis with the best worldwide practices to reduce plastic. Building awareness on a local level is also important. People on Bonaire have to realize that reducing plastic can be as simple as bringing your own bag whenever you go out to shop.





*to find it... just look up

"HERE COME THE LEONIDS!"

n Wednesday morning November 18th, from midnight to dawn, we may get to see the annual Leonid Meteor Showers and like the Perseids back in August, the Moon is going to help by staying out of the way. Far from lights on any clear moonless night you're likely to see a few meteors if you stay out long enough and keep looking up.

Meteors have long been called **"shooting stars"** because that's what they look like. But they're not really stars shooting across the sky

In fact when you see a meteor you are seeing a tiny speck of space debris, anywhere from the size of a grain of sand to pebble sized, slam into our **Earth's** atmosphere at such high speeds that the particle's impact with the molecules of air causes these gasses in our Earth's atmosphere to glow kind of like the way a fluorescent light does

So when you see a "shooting star" you are actually seeing the gas atoms in our Earth's atmosphere glow all along the path that the space debris, the meteor, has traveled. So on any clear, dark, moonless night you can see a handful of meteors, if you have a lot of patience.

But about 12 times a year, we experience what we call a **meteor shower**. And every November we have the Leonid meteor shower, so named because its meteors appear to radiate from the **constellation Leo the lion**. Meteor showers are a bit different from the meteors you see every night because the meteors in a meteor shower are predictable and are **comet debris**.

You see, every time a comet passes through our **solar system** it sheds some of its debris along its orbit and if the Earth intersects with the comet's path we'll get a meteor shower. Meteor showers are somewhat predictable because the Earth returns to about the same spot in space at the same time each year.

And every November we plow into some of the debris trails of **Comet Tempel-Tuttle**, a comet which visits the **Sun** every 33 years. In the years just preceding or following Tempel-Tuttle's passage we pass through denser debris trails and we may experience meteor showers with greater than usual intensity which we call **Meteor Storms**. The last storm from the Leonids



was in 2002.

You never know when one of these storms may happen, but the best prediction this year for the Bonaire Sky Park is to go out from 1 am through dawn Wednesday the 18th. That's the night of the 17th and morning of the 18th.

Leo is going to be even easier to find this year, because the **planets Venus**, **Mars and Jupiter** will make a nice trail of light pointing directly toward the head of Leo the lion. Venus will be closest to the horizon, Mars will be above Venus and Jupiter will be above Mars


As the night goes on, the **Meteor Radiant** will rise higher and higher and the bright **star Regulus** will be to the west of Jupiter. You may even see a few really bright meteors with long trails! Or maybe not.

And one more thing, the Leonids are the fastest of all meteors because we are hitting them nearly head on. They slam into our Earth's atmosphere traveling at speeds over 158,000 miles per hour.

For those of you who aren't going to stay up all night we have the First Quarter Moon visible in the southwest just after sunset. The Moon will be just above the star Deneb Algedi, which marks the tail of Capricornus the sea goat. Capricornus is just to the east of the teapot in Sagittarius. We don't mention Capricornus often, but legend has it that he was once Pan, the half -man half-goat Greek god of nature. Typhon, the titanic fire god, startled him one day, and in Pan's attempt to turn himself into a fish and escape, he panicked and only his back half became a fish. His front half stayed a goat. Making him, a goat fish....Or a fish goat.

Get outside before dawn on Wednesday the 18th to watch The Meteor Shower and look for Venus, Mars and Jupiter to join the show.
