Does it seem there are more oil tankers floating offshore of Bonaire these days? More than a dozen oil tankers are waiting to discharge around ports of "Petróleos de Venezuela" PdVSA including its terminal in Curaçao as ship owners and oil providers refuse to unload cargoes until the state-run firm makes payments, according to sources and vessel tracking data.

Many of the ships have arrived near the ports under a type of prepayment agreement that involves loading cargoes and paying for them just before delivery. Previously, sellers would extend credit to PdVSA. Now, suppliers want cash before delivery because low oil prices have exacerbated the government-owned company's existing cash-flow problems relating to insufficient revenue in hard currency and loan-for-oil agreements.

▶Did you know that the independent Dutch consumer research agency NI-BUD, noted that the cost of living on Bonaire is 19% higher than in the Netherlands (in 2015).

▶If you've recently finished electricity installation and you have not yet asked WEB for the inspection and connection, you'll have to wait until next year to get it. WEB and the government division responsible for the inspections announced that the last day for inspections and connections this year was December 8. They will recommence on January 14, 2016. The reason given is the need to avoid too many connections during the coming holidays with the possibility that the pending connections will not be completed before the end of the year.

►THE HAGUE--The Second Chamber of the Dutch Parliament wants a permanent solution for the limited fi-

nancial resources that the Dutch National Ombudsman has to work with in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. Member of the Second Chamber, Roelof van Laar of the Labour Party PvdA, called it "unacceptable" that the Ombudsman would not be able to fully carry out his tasks in the Caribbean Netherlands due to financial restrictions.

Ombudsman Reinier van Zutphen informed Dutch Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations, Ronald Plasterk, late September this year that the 250,000 euros that were allocated for 2015 and 2016 were insufficient. He was left with no choice but to cancel last month's working visit to Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. The Ombudsman said he needed at least 350,000 euros per year.

The Minister explained that the Ombudsman received a total annual subsidy of 15 million euros for the entire Netherlands and that for 2015 and 2016 an additional, incidental amount of 250,000 euros had been allocated to cover the Caribbean Netherlands.



▶In October 2015, the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccine against cervical cancer was added to the childhood vaccination program on Bonaire. With the addition of the HPV vaccination the childhood vaccination program is at the same level as the program in the European Netherlands. The HPV vaccine protects girls against cervical cancer later in life. Cervical cancer is the second most common cancers in women.

The HPV vaccine consists of two vaccinations given to girls between 9 and 10 years old. Girls aged 10 to 13 years also get the opportunity to be vaccinated. Youth Health has already sent an invitation and a consent form for vaccination to parents. Youth Health Care workers have in recent weeks vaccinated a large number of children. In May 2016, this group will get the second HPV vaccina-

tion. The HPV vaccine is given simultaneously with DTP (Diphtheria / Tetanus / Polio) and / or the MMR (Mumps / Measles / Rubella) vaccination. Next year, in April 2016, a catch-up campaign carried out giving all girls aged 13 to 15 years the opportunity to be vaccinated. Further notice on that will follow in due time.

▶InselAir plans to expand its operations to the US once Curaçao gets back its Category 1 status from the American Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Destinations that the regional airline has in mind are Atlanta, Fort Lauderdale and Boston. It is possible that these new routes will be flown from Aruba if Curaçao does not qualify. The final test for the Category 1 status is probably in March next year.

Last week Insel Air aircraft were plagued by mechanical problems and the consequent flight cancellations resulted in an angry demonstration by disappointed passengers in Curacao's Hato airport. The police had to be called in to restore order.

available at Addo's Bookstore and Flamingo Bookstore. The Governor was impressed by the quality of the book and thanked the management of the foundation for the good work they perform to make Bonaire society aware of Alzheimer's disease.



▶The (so called) "rainy season" has started with increased probability of breeding sites of mosquitoes that can transmit diseases. Diseases that can be transmitted by *Aedes aegypti* mosquitos (photo above-note the stripes) on Bonaire are Dengue and Chikungunya.

The Aedes aegypti mosquito is also a vector for the Zika virus, long known in Africa and Indonesia and more recently in Brazil and Colombia. The Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) in a press release reported that there are now as of last week, five cases of Zika virus in the Caribbean region. But NOT on Bonaire and on the neighboring islands.

Dengue has been around for a long time in the Caribbean. In Bonaire a similar, but not as virulent disease, Chikungunya was first identified in late 2014. In the rainy season in early 2015 the Chikungunya virus infected more than 500 people on Bonaire. They are immune to this infection in the future, however.

The measures to be taken to prevent the spread of the Zika virus are the same measures as for Dengue and Chikungunya. Both Zika, Chikungunya and Dengue are transmitted by one type of mosquito, *Aedes aegypti*. These mosquitoes bite during the day, especially in the early morning hours and late afternoon.

Zika is a mild infectious disease. The symptoms resemble those of chikungunya, with fever, rash and joint pain. Usually the symptoms are fairly mild. and usually last no longer than a few days. Up to now, no complications are known and there are no people have died from this virus.

Newcomers are often surprised that from now through mid-January it is almost impossible to get repairs and construction done on Bonaire. That's because many of the craftsmen who provide such services return to their homes in South America. Even WEB and the government divisions responsible for the inspections of new construction announced that they will not be available but will recommence on January 14, 2016. Their reason is the need to finish pending work before the end of the year.

was born on Curacao and I had a But... that same year, in that same class, I very quiet childhood. My parents were both working full-time and my grandmother, who lived with us, took care of my sister and me. I was the elder. My dad worked for the Department of Navigation and Maritime Affairs as a supervisor and my mom worked as a secretary for the Frisian guy from Leeuwarden... very Central Bureau of Statistics. I graduated as a social educational worker.

When I was 20 I left for Holland to continue my studies. A year before I went I'd spent the summer vacation with my uncle who lived in Leeuwarden, Friesland, a province in the north of Holland. I went to see what schools and trainings were available, what my possibilities were and also I got a glimpse – like travelling by train – of what it was like to live in Europe. When I actually went the following year, it was very exciting. The only person I knew was my uncle and I had to sort things out mostly by myself and find my way. Nevertheless... it was fun!

My co-students were very social and

met my husband and on July 28, 2014, we got married." She smiles. "I always find it funny to say that on July 28, 2009, I stepped on the plane in Curacao to fly to Holland and exactly five years later, on that same date, I got married to a real funny!

Well, in the beginning of this year I saw a vacancy on the internet for a group worker at Fundashon Rosa di Sharon of pastor Ramiro and his wife Tamara. I was still in Holland, but together with my husband we made the decision to come and live here. We told each other, 'It's now or never!' It was a big step, but we took it!

I'd been on Bonaire before, but I must have been like five years old, so that didn't trigger any memories. My husband had never visited the Antilles – he just followed me, haha! He immediately found it very chill – ciao to the hectic life of commuting by train and bus, just sweet! For me it was simple. I felt at home instantly.

nice people who came from everywhere around the world: Russia, Germany and China and many other countries so I wasn't the only new kid on the block. I went to obtain my Bachelor's in Social Work, but when in December 2010 I found my uncle deceased in his house, it was a big blow. In the meantime my sister was also in Holland, studying in Groningen, not far from where I was, but somehow I felt very lonely all of a sudden. It was like I was in shock. My uncle was only 53, so it was completely unexpected. Then, one month later, in January 2011, while crossing the road on foot, I was hit by a car and the impact was so powerful that I was launched and came down on the other side of the road. Miraculously, the only thing I had was a severe concussion and had to spend a month in rehab. However, it wasn't easy; I suffered frequently from real bad head aches and I couldn't smell or hear very well anymore. The consequence was that I couldn't manage at school any longer and I had to quit.

From the moment I'd arrived in Holland in 2009 I'd started working night shifts at Fier Fryslân, an institution for girls and women who were victims of human trafficking, or who had been lured into prostitution by so called 'lover-boys' and women who were brutalized and threatened because of what's called 'honorrevenge.' I only worked nights; I had to stay awake, check on the women and be there for them. I worked there for six years.

In 2012 I went back to school, again to try to get my Bachelor's in Social Work. but then I noticed that it had become undoable for me. Because of my hearing problem it was too hard to follow lectures and my headaches became unbearable.

Now I'm working full-time and all shifts at Rosa di Sharon and I'm a group leader for girls aged 12 to 18. It's a Christian institution for girls who cannot live at home for various reasons. With everything we do we ask for the help of God and I like that. It was also the reason why I applied for the job. God is my Everything, and working from that principle is very beautiful and satisfying. The girls who live with us don't have to be religious, but we do pray with them and also we go to church with them every Sunday. At the moment we have seven girls in the house; that's about the capacity we can work

The difference between the work I did in Holland is that here I work with young girls and we are more family orientated which is very important - while in Holland I worked with mostly older girls and women, like 30-year- old victims of human trafficking. In Holland everything is more out in the open and people talk about things like the 'lover-boy' issues quite frankly, but slowly and surely things are changing here too. People are becoming conscious of the problems we are dealing with on Bonaire and not only are they starting to talk about them, but also people are starting to look for help. Nowadays on Bonaire there is a whole range of different and professional options to go to. The two countries are very different, but in the end my job comes down to the same thing it's all about helping people.

When I'm not working, I'm at the Saturday Bonaire Duradero market at Jong Bonaire where I sell my own beauty products. At the market you get an idea of what local people have to offer. The food that's sold is really delicious and the handmade handbags and jewelry are very

pretty and of good quality. There are many husband who is ever so sweet! I also have new initiatives, and my own line of natural a Facebook page Shushu's Divine Prodproducts is one of them. It all started in Holland when I couldn't smell well anymore and I was looking for air-fresheners for the house. It appeared to be that my husband was allergic to chemical products and so, via Pinterest, I found some great ideas, but they weren't mine, they were somebody else's. I found the person who made the products and I mailed her, saying her products were out of this world because finally I could smell luscious fragrances. She mailed me back saying that if I wanted to start a little business with these products she would be okay with

And so what I started in Holland continued on Bonaire where I got even more inspiration for new products. I'm making body scrubs with real fresh fruit and Bonairean sea salt and I developed a sugar scrub with fruit and olive/coconut oil. Also I use turmeric and honey. I make body lotions and shower gels as well - for her and him - and I sell air-fresheners which make your home smell delicious for about three weeks. Then it's time for a new one! I'm always looking for new inspiration and trying things out, but I insist on keeping it natural.

When I'm working on my products I feel very peaceful; it's me-time, this is really for Shurna! Of course I always test my products, first on myself and then on my

ucts where everyone can find more information and where people can contact me.

Well, in Holland my husband was training as a landscaper, but he couldn't find an internship. Here he found one at Green Label and now he can finish his education.

Our plan is to stay on Bonaire for a long time. I still have my parents and my grandmother on Curacao, and in the meantime my sister graduated and she's back too. I have a wonderful relationship with my family and they miss me but from here it's very easy to go visit so our next vacation will be on Curacao.

I love it here; I think there are plenty of opportunities on Bonaire to grow, but we have to grab them. I like that the island is small and that you can go anywhere in no time. I also like that we have good connections to go to the States, Holland and Curacao.

You know, in Holland we had everything. We both had jobs, we had a house and a car. We were all set and yet we made the decision to start a new life to-


The Bethlehem Steel plant was in operation for nearly a century producing almost 3,000 tons of iron per day. Most of the iron was used in steel-making that was used to build the country's skyscrapers, bridges and ships for the U.S. Navy.

BONAIRE ROBBERIES AND POLICE

Dear Editor:

After a recent scuba diving vacation to Bonaire I have to write this letter with my opinion of recent changes on Bonaire. We have been



coming to Bonaire at least once a year for the past 6 years staying 2-3 weeks. Over this time period we have heard of more criminal activities with items stolen from trucks at dive sites and more robberies. Our last trip to Bonaire allowed us to experience the criminal activity first hand. We went to supper on Tuesday, December 8 at 7 pm locking the house where we were staying. When we returned approximately 9 pm upon unlocking the front door we were met with a house that looked like a hurricane had struck it. All the drawers were open and over \$8000 worth of televisions, computers and cameras were missing. More important to me was that the robber had stolen a bag of insulin pump supplies.

According to the police we should not have brought the stolen items to the island to tempt someone to steal them. We locked

the house and the robber broke into the house. The owner of the house had to prod the policemen to even go into the house to look around. Do they not care how someone is breaking into a house? The policeman also suggested that we should keep anything of value with us at all times. I can just see scuba divers taking all their valuables on their dives. In talking with people on Bonaire after this event occurred I found out that this is common event. One resident told me she had been robbed four times.

I had to spend the day seeing a doctor to get a prescription for insulin needles and then going to different pharmacies to find the needles. The bag of insulin pump supplies that was stolen contained a glucometer which is paired to my insulin pump to communicate blood sugar values, extra glucometer strips, replacement setups for my insulin pump to deliver insulin and sensor setups which actually measure blood glucose continuously sending information to my pump. No replacements were available on Bonaire and it would have taken at least a week to get replacements. Luckily I had changed my setup the morning prior to robbery and did not need to change for a couple of days. This allowed me time to return home where I have more supplies.

The police in Bonaire need to put more effort into preventing such robberies. There has to be a market for the items stolen or the robber would not be stealing them. The police need to investigate where stolen items are going, stopping the market. I am sure that the robber did not sell the insulin pump supplies because they would have no value to him. He probably threw them in the trash but by stealing them he could have killed me by sending my into a diabetic coma.

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

a "consultation" with the people and not an exercise in choice of government.

It is expected that the island government, the OLB, with this mandate in hand will enter into talks with Holland about adjustments to the existing arrangements as promised in the Spies Report, as well as modifications to the Public Entity structure. It is probable that another, but binding, referendum will be held next year.

People could only vote at the polling

stations indicated on their voting cards, a change from the usual "at large" method of past years. This confused some voters.

Nort Salinja and Jong Bonaire polling stations polled the largest proportion of Yes votes, but not enough to overcome the No votes there. In Rincon there were five times as many No votes as Yes.

In the Netherlands early reactions were not slow in coming and were mostly favoring the severing of Bonaire from Dutch influence. \blacksquare *G.D.*



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

Bonabista/Bonaire -

t must have been in the late 70s of the last century that I saw the first Chevrolet El Camino in my humble life. Those days I rode my high compression BSA A65 Lightning, an old fashioned and tough British 650 parallel twin with push rods, from Eugene, Oregon, to Fire Island, New York. Way back in history for me the United States of America was like a movie in real life.

Apart from some old V-8 engine powered stock cars and some vehicles used for funerals I had never in my entire life seen an American car in reality. So, every now and then, I bought a six-pack and took position under a tree in the grass that divided the two roads of a dual carriage way in Eugene. There were gas guzzling V-8s all over the place, limousines, step vans, pick-ups. And, quite rarely, there was the El Camino, a sleek, aggressive looking, lean, mean, low and fast cross-over of the American idea of a sports car and an every-day workhorse...

The first time I wrote an article about a Chevrolet El Camino was in 2007. It was Henk Schippers who attracted my attention by driving his red El Camino with two big white stripes from the hood to the rear. Henk fell in love with his El Camino, spent a fortune on it, broke the speedometer cable during testing the top speed of his high power output V-8, brought it to Bonaire. Henk had his El Camino for years and years. But time goes by and we grow older as all mortal creatures do....


Then, after years, in 2014, another El Camino popped up. I spotted the vehicle and followed it. Finally the driver parked it in Bonabista, a new neighborhood on the windward side of the road to Rincon. I stopped my Puma-powered Land-Rover and introduced myself. We shook hands. Ike van Uningen, proud owner of a metallic blue Chevrolet El Camino. Sunglasses, a straw hat, a NYPD T-shirt. The Chevrolet: metallic blue with a carbon structure wrapping on the hood and the tailgate in the back. This second El Camino on Bonaire appeared to be built in 1986. The sleek monster came all the way produced in the States for the 1959 model from Mexico to California to The Nether- year of Chevrolet in response to the suclands to Bonaire. Ike is a regular visitor to cess of the rival Ford Ranchero. This first our tropical island. He visited Bonaire some 20 years ago for the first time. He is

busy building a house in Bonabista and he imported his beloved Camino in 2013. Ike says, "I really love my El Camino. In my opinion the car is a very good looking mean and sleek workhorse. She is fast, comfortable and handy, especially when you work in construction. The five-liter engine is very powerful, revving is low, torque is immense. Everything on this car is powered: power steering, power brakes, you name it. Only the windows I have to roll down and up by hand. I really like American cars because of their appeal. In history I had a GMC truck with side steps. Vehicles like that are almost unknown in Europe where they have smaller cars to cover shorter distances. Once you have been in the States you realize why there is no substitute for cubic inches!"

Ike opens the hood. The engine bay is filled with metal. A huge carburetor supplies the liquid. He opens the doors of his two seater. There is a lot of chrome and luxury in the car. Comfortable seats, automatic gearbox, air conditioning. He likes the 10-spoke light alloy two-tone wheels. Five nuts connect each wheel to the car. Wide 255/45/R18 rubbers are mounted. This time the El Camino has a day off from work. Today the rear bed does not have to carry and transport building materials. (Ike informs me about the air suspension in the rear and the valve next to the lid of the gas tank. The rear suspension can be assisted by rubber balloons filled with air to adjust the level of the car to the load of the vehicle. Smart idea!)

Then he turns the key of the ignition of his full metal American dream. "Gloh, gloh, gloh, gloh, gloh, gloh, gloh." Yes, this is a real V-8. Ike changes the

Kabrito Stoba (Goat Stew).

Ingredients for 2 kg goat stoba:

Lime or lemon juice, salt, olive oil, vinegar, meat bouillon cube, 1/4 teaspoon cumin, 1/2 teaspoon curry powder, 1/2 teaspoon marjoram, some dry celery,1 teaspoon piccalilli, 4 teaspoons ketjap asin, onion, 250 gr mushrooms, 1 green pepper, 1 tomato, garlic, 1 Spanish pepper, 2 soupspoons tomato puree and about 250 ml

Preparation: One day before: marinate the goat meat with vinegar and lime or lemon juice. Combine it with all the spices, except onion ketjap, celery, tomato and

The next day: chop onion finely and fry in a big pot. Add the marinated meat, fry it all, then add water, bouillon, green pepper and celery. Let it simmer on a low flame for about 2 hours. Add water if it gets dry. Taste for flavor.

Chukulati Pinda (Warm Chocolate Peanut Drink)

Ingredients: 100gr pure chocolate, 3 tablespoons peanut butter, half tablespoon cinnamon, drop vanilla essence, 750ml milk.

Optional: marshmallows and mint leaf on top to decorate.



Break chocolate into pieces, put in a pan with peanut butter and let melt softly. Stir all and add cinnamon and vanilla essence. Keep stirring and at the end add milk and keep stirring until it's hot and melted. Serve hot with marshmallow and mint leaf.

Add a Salad

Make a nice salad from sliced avocados, cooked potatoes, cucumber, tomatoes, green pepper, sweet corn, some olives, lemon juice, salt and pepper.

You may add sliced cooked chicken and/or sliced hardboiled eggs. Add chives and parsley.

More favorites

Fish Soup

Ingredients: Vermicelli, homemade fish bouillon from fish parts with laurel leaves, garlic, onion, salt and pepper and/or fish bouillon cube, whole corn.

Preparation: Add to fish bouillon: whole corn cut into smaller pieces, carrot, celery, chives, drops of lemon juice and a whole green pepper. Cook together. At the end add roughly chopped fresh celery.

Arros Bruha (Stewed Rice)

<u>Ingredients:</u> 1 cup of black beans from can or home cooked (save cooking water), olive oil, onion, garlic, laurel leaves, tomato paste, 1 cup uncooked rice, cilantro from the garden, salt, paprika.

Preparation: Fry onion, garlic, pepper until soft. Add tomato paste and black beans with water. Add more water if necessary. Add salt and black pepper. Let simmer, covered, until done. Can be cooked in a rice cooker. Add cilantro at the end.



PLANETS OF THE NEW YEAR



s we close out 2015 and ring in A 2016, we're sorry to say that there are no planets visible just after dark in the Sky Park right now. But early birds rejoice! There is a boat-load of them that you can check out just before dawn. We have Jupiter, Mars, Venus, Saturn, and the Moon around in the morning sky to ring in the new year.

On Sunday January 3rd, 2016 (Happy New Year!) face southeast at 5am. In the early morning you'll see a waning crescent Moon bracketed by two stars of similar brightness. The one on the right is blue and twinkly, while the one on the left is orange and less twinkly. The blue star is called Spica and it's the brightest star in the constellation of Virgo the Maiden. She's the second largest constellation in the sky.

The orange star isn't a star at all, but is really the red planet Mars. The Moon will be visiting the duo on the morning of the

At around 6:15, low in the southeast you can find two other planets among the stars of the constellation Scorpius the Scor**pion**. The brighter planet is so suspiciously bright that many people mistake it for a plane or UFO. That's Venus, our sister planet, who, when we look up close, is covered in clouds. These clouds reflect a lot of sunlight, making Venus the brightest planet from Earth, and they also trap in a ton of heat. So Venus is the hottest planet in the solar system with temperatures of

about 900 degrees Fahrenheit.

We have another planet down and to the left of Venus. It might be hard to find at first but keep trying every morning and you're sure to see Saturn. Saturn is way bigger than Venus, but is over a billion miles away from us, so it doesn't shine super-bright in our Earthly skies.

On January 6th, same time of morning, the Moon will appear closer to the two planets and on the 7th will move on in its orbit, and be down and to the left of Saturn.

There is one more planet to talk about, and you can see it high in the southwest just before dawn. On the morning of December 31, New Year's Eve, the Moon will be right next to it. That's giant Jupiter, largest planet in our solar system and unmistakable to the naked eye.

In a telescope Jupiter shows off its atmosphere with stripes of different colors and, on occasion, the Great Red Spot. Plus it has four large moons that revolve around it, creating ever-changing alignments as seen from Earth. As 2016 begins, the Moon will move away from Jupiter. On January 3rd, it'll be right next to Mars.

So there you have it. A terrific reason to wake up early at the start of 2016. We'll have the Moon next to Mars on January 3rd and 4th. The Moon next to Venus and Saturn on January 6th and 7th and Jupiter high up in the south as dawn breaks in the Bonaire Sky Park

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
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
