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The situation for children in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba has im-

proved in some areas in the past few years, but United Nations Children's Fund in the Netherlands, UNICEF Nederland, and the Defense for Children organization are still very much concerned about the conditions in which children on the islands grow up. The report made mention of the 2013 study by UNICEF Nederland that showed that the situation of children's rights on the three islands didn't comply with the requirements of the United Nations (UN) Children's Rights Treaty. The 2013 study, compiled after several visits to the islands and consultations with authorities, organizations and children themselves, reported intense poverty, domestic violence and the lack of figures on children and the problems they face.

There are also problems with the quality of youth care, the lack of youth criminal law provisions, a lack of knowledge on children's rights and possibilities for children to participate. Data registration and monitoring about youth care, exploitation, physical abuse, undocumented children, children without a permanent residency, online safety and children that have come in contact with criminal law are barely available in the Caribbean Netherlands. Because of the lack of data, there is no good view on the situation of children and therefore their improvements cannot be monitored properly. The Dutch Government has made funds available to expand the Youth Monitoring function with data from the Caribbean Netherlands. A study is currently underway.

► THE HAGUE—The Dutch Government will have to look into a way to significantly increase the family allowance ("kinderbijslag") in Bonaire, St. Eustatius and Saba. A majority of the Second Chamber of the Dutch Parliament supported a motion calling for an increase of the family allowance to US \$150 per child per month. Currently the family allowance stands at \$40 per child per month.



Have you seen the palm trees along the waterfront facing the new Terramar building? They were planted there by Ap van Eldik's Green Label Garden Center. What an elegant addition. And it looks like they've been there for years.

The motion was submitted in the wake of the debate last Monday with Dutch Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations **Ronald Plasterk** and the response of the Dutch Government to the Spies report. During the debate, held in the presence of the Island Council, Minister of Interior and Kingdom Relations Ronald Plasterk said that he was willing to see if there was room in the 2017 budget, but he couldn't make any promises.

► Minister

Plasterk visited Bonaire earlier this month. His working visit focused on selfreliance and cooperation within the King-

within the Kingdom. He spoke

with young people who are going to study in The Netherlands and talked with them about their plans for the future and the possibility to return to the island.

The UK voted by 52% to 48% to leave the European Union (EU). What



does it mean to Bonaire? Traveling to Europe should be less expensive as the dollar strengthens after years of being of less value than the euro. The British pound fell to its lowest level against the US dollar since 1985 while the euro slumped around 3.5%. In the Netherlands, Dutch anti- immigration leader Geert Wilders called on Friday for a referendum on the Netherlands' membership in the European Union. Call it "Nexit?"

And if some Bonaire activists get their way there will be a "**Bonexit**" from The Netherlands,

• Enforcement of the laws protecting Bonaire's endangered species is usual but protecting other country's endangered species from import to Bonaire is also important.

On February 12, 2016, the Public Prosecutor BES received a file from the Department of the US Fish and Wildlife Service Office of Law Enforcement in the US. This case alleged the illegal import of endangered birds such as cockatoos and parrots from the US to Bonaire. On the basis of this file suspicions arose against a resident of Bonaire with the initials J.A.P. and a customs officer with the initials C.A.B.F. The suspicion involves official bribery, complicity in forgery and violation of the BES Law of Principles Nature and Protection . Both suspects were heard last week by the National Criminal Investigation. The study is not yet complete and will continue over the coming months.

Embezzlement? I absolutely do not acknowl-

edge that. If the situation was really as bad as the 50Plus Party says, I would have expected protesting people in

▶ Recently Bonaire medical General Practioners (house doctors) signed a renewed agreement with the BES Healthcare Insurance Office (ZVK). This agreement secures continued cooperation in 2016. The ZVK sees GPs as an important medical services gatekeeper and director of care.

The PCN was accused by **Jan Nagel**, a senator for the seniors' party 50Plus who pronounced: "Millions in pensions have disappeared." Around 300 civil servants allegedly lost the pension that they built up since 10-10-10. "Embezzlement," Nagel said. Civil servants in Bonaire, Saba and Statia are members of this pension fund

The PCN pension fund acknowledges that there are **problems with several hundreds of dossiers of the workers**. "But the seriousness of these problems varies wildly. The problems arose on 10 -10-10 when the responsibility for the pensions of civil servants on the three islands was transferred from the general pension fund for the Netherlands Antilles (APNA) to PCN.

Dutch Minister of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations **Ronald Plasterk** submitted a motion calling on the Dutch Government to establish an independent committee that would investigate the missing millions in pension premiums and report back before October 1, 2016. He said the Dutch Government is willing to supplement the possible losses in pension years of (former) civil servants and teaching personnel who worked in the BES Islands before October 10, 2010, however a thorough investigation is needed first.



▶ On June 22, James Finies the leader of the "We Want Bonaire Back" (*Nos Kier Boneiru Bek*) movement, pleaded his case for Bonaire self-determination at the United Nations in New York. According to a NKBB Facebook post he "spoke most eloquently about his people's plight in the United Nations along with South Africa, Uganda, Syria, Tanzania, Nigeria, Venezuela, Puerto Rico and the Western Sahara."

Following his address, Dr. Carlyle Corbin, an international advisor on global governance and former Minister of State for External Affairs of the US Virgin Islands and past UN expert on self-determination, spoke in behalf of the NKBB. According to the Facebook post Fines mentioned "Human Rights violations that Holland is committing in Bonaire." He spoke during a meeting of the 2016 UN Conference Special Committee on Decolonization, which considers the rights of non-self-governing territories of former colonial powers. Bonaire is currently not listed as a non-self-governing territory by the UN. Following his address Mr. Finies was congratulated by others at the session.

66 met Javier Boezem ('On the

Island Since,' Bonaire Reporter May 30-June 13, 2016 issue) in Gorkum, Holland, at a jam-session. It must have been around 1996. From then on we played for two years together in a band called 'Mmaf,' doing lots of gigs. When Javier returned to Bonaire in 1998 I went to see him and fell in love with the island. It appealed a lot to me because I could

find myself and my culture in the closeness of the families here, and I found a whole new family on Bonaire as well the Boezem family. I stayed for a month at Javier's father's kunuku and it was one of the most beautiful episodes in my life such a good time. That's how it all started.

I was born in Morocco but grew up in the Netherlands. I've got the best of both worlds and I do feel I am from both. Well, in the meantime from all three, because now Bonaire is included too. I am a musician. I play the guitar and I've played all kinds of music but what I love most is fusion - my North African roots and western music combined. I've always played in bands but also taking care of the business aspects like finances and contracts because that's something I like to do too.

Marieke and I met in 1999 at a festival where I was going to perform and where she was working. She had her own onewoman business, organizing and consulting in the cultural sector. After I graduated and got my Bachelor's in marketing Marieke and I founded our company, 'Mobility in Music.' The original idea was to make professional artists mobile in their arts by taking care of finances, administration, acquisition and management and promotion. Then we started to develop and organize our own projects, and in 2000 'Mobility in Music' became a partnership."

"We began organizing all sorts of artsand culture projects," Marieke says, "and in 2001 when Rotterdam became the cultural capital of Europe we accomplished quite a number of beautiful projects, like the 'Girls Festival' – only accessible for girls because they're completely different dynamics with just girls. Beforehand there was a range of workshops and the festival itself took one afternoon. Also we organized a project for Moroccan youngsters, 'Habibi Maghribi,' which means

The last big projects before we came here were developing a music school for Caribbean brass bands, and Marieke created 'Music Matters,' about meeting and getting to know each other through music. I will share my wondering about this waste and nature with you and hope that this might contribute to putting waste where it belongs: in the landfill.

es! How lucky I am, I see an interesting scene on the side of the dog-outlet road. It looks like a do-ityourself package from Ikea that was just unpacked. With my expert eye I imme-

diately notice that a lovely office may be created here although it looks a little messy. I see neat partitions, cabinets and desks that can be put together in no time (or usually a lot of time) by driving in some screws. This really is a prime location with lots of peace, space and wind. Why do so many people actually pay rent for office buildings that are unbearable without air conditioning, in which you are locked up in a box and get a slap of warmth when you walk outside after a long day? Why is this selfflagellation and closure from all that is worthwhile? It can be done differently and the pioneering work is taking place before my eyes: the new working in the outside, the real open air plan office.

I imagine the conversations. They will be quite different in such an environment than the gossip that you usually hear in offices. "John, do you know where those papers are that I had on my desk?" "What do you mean, those papers are of course gone with the wind." "Will it rain today? Then we need to get the tarp out, otherwise we can buy new laptops again." "Is it your turn to make coffee today? Then you must also pick up a new gas bottle and a water tank." "Did you already dig a new latrine hole?" "Watch out for that donkey behind you, otherwise you'll lose your lunch." "Hello, can you repeat your question? I couldn't hear you because of a donkey whinnying and a goat bleating at the same time." "Yes, of course you can visit us. If you drive the dirt road you turn right at the 18th cactus."

After a week of screwing and sawing the office is officially opened and it is time to interview the people who took the risk to make this bold project work: the manager and his office manager.

Manager: "We're in a prime location which costs us nothing. Thus we also make consumers happy. Our overhead costs are significantly lower than those



of other comparable offices."

Office Manager: "When recruiting staff we have taken into account the work environment. Survival tests were the most important selection criterion and people with camping experience had an advantage. Ever since our personnel is wearing camouflage clothing we no longer suffer that much from the attacks of birds of prey and starlets. Our employees enjoy their work to the fullest in nature and they go home completely relaxed. In short, everyone is happy to be working here."

Upon my departure from this heavenly place I meet a few employees. When I ask how they are doing they respond wearily. "I just returned from a period of illness due to a heat stroke and have carried my desk into the mundi to catch a little shade of cactuses." "I was bitten on my toes by an iguana and just recently got rid of my crutches. I work with a pole next to me to keep them away and I wear boots now. I still dread every sound; that's why I am in therapy." The next worker explains that she was discharged last week with symptoms of poisoning, because the water she drank had been exposed to the sun too long and was defiled. "No one wants to work overtime, because when it gets dark it's very scary. Don't tell our bosses we said this, they think we are posers. They themselves do not know what we go through; they work in their cars with air conditioning which makes us work in their petrol fumes."

Well, there you are, people. Even under the best of

circumstances there are always people who are malcontent and whine. Positive thinking is not for everyone... ■ *Story* & photo by Justine Verschoor

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20 Years Ago In These Pages Scenes familiar in the 90s

BONAIRE IN FEBRUARY, 1996 – 20 YEARS AGO Looking back at some of the stories from the pages of *Port Call*, *The Bonaire Reporter's* earlier name:

BANK ROBBERS ESCAPE BY SPEEDBOAT



O n Thursday, February 8, 1996, shortly after 8 am, five heavily armed men entered the main branch of MCB in Playa. They told everyone to lie down and emptied the cashiers' tills. The vault time lock hadn't opened yet. A woman customer entered the bank and a gunman shot her in the leg. A security guard was hit over the head and knocked to the floor. An employee phoned police but was reluctant to call in an armed squad because of the possibility of a hostage situation developing. They got NAf 39.000 (about \$22,000) and US\$4,000 plus the customers' money.

The robbers had come to Bonaire via small speedboat with 2/75- hp motors . the previous day and tied their boat to the

Windjammer pier (between Karpata and BOPEC)

The next morning the robbers stopped a mini van near Rincon and tied the driver to a tree. They used the mini van for their getaway with Bonaire police in hot pursuit, back to the speedboat where two accomplices were waiting for them. Also involved was a rented jeep driven by two other men. The criminals jumped from van to speedboat but the jeep wasn't seen and boat sped off. Bonaire had no boat available that could catch them and the robber's boat could be seen speeding toward Venezuela by people in Kralendijk. Police alerted coast guard and search and rescue F-27 aircraft, Pluto. The boat headed for the Venezuelan coastline just south of Punta San Juan. The Pluto was soon overhead but couldn't force them to stop as it was not armed. The speedboat entered the River Heque and disappeared.

Later the jeep was found abandoned. Since the driver and passenger of the jeep didn't board the speedboat, it was assumed they were still on Bonaire. In fact, several days later a bank employee saw one of the robbers at the town pier. Police arrested the man who confessed but had gotten lost returning to the speedboat. Videos of the robbers are being studied as well as fingerprints. Interpol is also involved. There is no treaty of extradition between the countries so that if they are caught in Venezuela they will be tried and convicted in that country.

Take a quiet walk with Mother Nature. It will nurture your mind, body, and soul (Anthony Douglas Williams).

quick drive north from A Kralendijk, through Hato, leads us nature fans to a sandy parking lot, just before the bend farther north to Sabadeco, where we park our good ole "Sjors." We start out slightly nauseated from a chilling encounter with Mr. Iguana Head. Yep, we stumble over a bloody head sans body.

After a few moments of shocked silence, we dash (in fear?) onto a sand path (Hato-Sabadeco), which leads us into a vast array of blossoming acacias. They look like useless spiny shrubs when not blooming. Goats and donkeys tend to ignore these armed-to-the-teeth bushes, except in case of dire need. Then during exceptionally arid spells they'll attempt to eat its leaves .

However, the acacias have now produced yellow/orangey spherical flowers, fluffy in structure.

Further down the road we spot a lone prickichi (parakeet) nibbling on a few petals. We cherish the scene in front of us: the blooming bushes booming with bird life. What a contrast to the murder scene at the start of our trip.

After a 10-minute trek on the path, we descend left to "Andrea 1" snorkel and dive site for a brisk beach stroll. Over rocks and coral rubble we climb to make our way to "Andrea 2." For about 30 minutes the overwhelming perception is of crashing waves and howling winds. I love it! Meanwhile, I have to mind the winding trail between the boulders, the stones and the pebbles. A green heron is peering at us from below. These elegant birds use their dagger like bills to snatch up fish. As bait these smarty-pants might well use twigs or insects (Wikipedia).

At the end of "Andrea 2," we ascend to Sabadeco Court and continue on to Sabadeco Shores.


Still in Court, we are welcomed by an array of white and magenta colored Bougainvilleas. These thorny ornamental bushes or trees sprout flower-like spring leaves. The actual flower is small and white but surrounded by different colored bracts, such as pink, magenta, purple, red, orange, white or yellow (Wikipedia). One of the neighboring house yards displays



Protecting Bonaire's Wild Treasures

he breeding season of the Bonaire Amazon Parrot, the Lora is in full swing. Please do not disturb!

This is a reminder message that the Yellow-Shouldered Amazon Parrot (Amazona barbadensis) which lives on Bonaire is a protected species. Worldwide there are only thought to be between 2,500 and 7,500 Loras remaining. We have at least 1,000 here on Bonaire, but we need to do what we can to keep them safe and healthy. Since 1952, our Loras have been protected by law. Therefore it is illegal to capture, kill or otherwise harm the Loras.

In 2002 over 600 parrots which were already in captivity for years were given special bands which made them registered, legal pets. Since that time it is illegal to have a

parrot which does not have one of these bands

After a very weak rainy season, our Loras, like many wild animals on Bonaire, are hungry. They may come to your garden or kunuku looking for food since there is not much available in nature. You can try to protect your trees or fruits with nets or bags. Or create a feeding table by putting out native fruits or seeds so that they leave your trees alone. Keep in mind that our Loras are a part of nature and are protected by law. If you would like to report a Lora which has been illegally captured or killed, you may notify the Police (717-8000) or RNO 717-4800. Failure to respect the loras protected status

can result in very severe penalties. ■

Echo Foundation press release

uring the past few months Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) observed an increase in incidents of tourists and residents harassing sea turtles. STCB posted on social media explaining that taking "selfies" or pictures holding turtles and following sea turtles very closely with cameras is considered harassment. "This increase in selfies

with endangered sea turtles and other marine life posted on Facebook and Instagram documented these latest threats for animals, as they are being used in order to accumulate "likes."

"STCB is extremely concerned about this new trend, as the number of likes clearly demonstrates that many visitors to and residents of Bonaire do not perceive this as extremely disrespectful to Bonaire's wildlife. Imagine that someone is stalking you with a camera within a distance of two feet or grabs you from the sidewalk to take a selfie."

The Marine Environmental Ordinance states that it is prohibited to disturb or destroy sea turtle nests or to remove eggs from the nests; it is prohibited to be in possession of, to have for sale or delivery, to offer for sale, to sell, to buy, to trade in, to donate or to transport eggs of sea turtles.




"It is prohibited to kill, catch or be in possession of sea turtles. It is prohibited to offer for sale, sell, buy, trade in, donate, or offer for consumption, sea turtles, sea turtle meat or other products of sea turtles," says STCB.

Violating this law can result in a maximum fine of US\$560,000 and/or a jail sentence and confiscation of relevant equipment [spear gun, car, boat – *Ed*.].

STCB does not feel comfortable posting a photo of someone harassing a sea turtle on their social media, as they know it will cause a huge amount of angry comments towards the person in the photo and sometimes towards STCB as well. "However, STCB wishes to give a clear message to the general public that taking selfies with sea turtles or other marine life is both disrespectful and illegal, and above all it is absolutely unnecessary." ■





How Swine Smart Are You?

This story is a part of an ongoing series contributed by Echo, an organization who has been mandated by the Island Government to conduct a pig control program on Bonaire.



"BREEDING LIKE...PIGS?!"

he title of this article is another spin on a common saying because "the wild pig is the most prolific large mammal on the face of the Earth (TAMU, 2013)." Female pigs or "sows" are sexually mature as young as 6-8 months of age, though they typically wait until they are 10+ months before they have their first litter. Wild pigs can have 1-2 litters per year. Each litter will have 5-6 piglets; though they can have up to 12! We have seen litters of 8 piglets on Bonaire. Wild pigs have an average lifespan of 4-8 years, depending on a variety of conditions. So a female pig left unmanaged could produce dozens of piglets throughout her lifetime, thus exponentially increasing the impact of wild pigs on the environment and their competition with native fauna for limited resources.

So, time for another quick math quiz

I have 2 pigs that produce 6 piglets. Four piglets are females and 2 are males. My neighbor also has pigs and 10 months later all 4 of my piglets have produced their own litters. Two had 4 piglets each, 1 had 5 piglets and 1 had 8t piglets. Of the litters with 4 piglets, 6 are female and 2 are male. Of the litter with 5 piglets, 2 are female and 3 are male. The litter with 8 piglets had 4 females and 4 males. How many piglets in the 3rd generation are female? How many were male?

All of those piglets were produced within two years!

Great white shark tagging. Yikes!

While most scientists tag sharks from a boat, some people tag sharks while free diving! Not much is known about sharks because they 1) live in the oceans 2) are migratory and travel great distances and 3) they are difficult/ dangerous to handle.

While sharks are being hunted by the millions, time is running out for scientists to learn more about them in an effort to raise awareness and increase protection. Tagging studies help scientists understand migratory routes of sharks as well as how shark populations are connected. One organization that is having great success in tagging sharks is The Waterman Project. Watermen are men and women who volunteer their breath-hold skills to assist scientists in their research on large marine animals. These free divers (people who swim underwater on a single breath of air - without noisy scuba tanks) approach sharks, including great white sharks, in order to

tag and photograph them. This method of tagging is much less stressful to the animal than the traditional method of a shark being captured, drawn next to a boat and restrained while a tag is inserted. For some easily stressed species of sharks, like hammerheads, tagging them while free-diving is much more successful than any other method. Is it dangerous for the free-divers?

Despite what many people believe about sharks being ferocious and aggressive beasts, most people who have actually encountered sharks say that this is not true – that sharks have a healthy respect for humans and usually don't attack unless provoked. If you find this sort of thing fascinating, **don't miss Great White Shark 3D playing at Empire Cinema** (www.empirebonaire.com). 

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

Circum-polar Constellations and Seasonal Stars

Y ou know, we can see some stars and constellations all year round in the Bonaire Sky Park - like the Big Dipper and Cassiopeia, while others are only visible during certain seasons - like Scorpius and the Summer Triangle. Why is this? Because there is difference between circumpolar and seasonal stars.

On any night this week, face north at around 11pm. First, find the Big Dipper standing on its spoon high in the northwestern sky. These seven stars also mark the rear end and tail of Ursa Major, the Big Bear.

We can use the two stars on the end of the spoon to point us to Polaris, aka the North Star. Polaris marks the tip of the tail of the Little Bear, Ursa Minor... Or the end of the handle of the Little Dipper.

Now if you continue that line from the Big Dipper's handle through Polaris, you reach a constellation that looks like the letter, "w". This is the beautiful Cassiopeia the queen sitting on her throne.

These three constellations- Ursa Major, Ursa Minor, and Cassiopeia-are visible in the sky nearly every night of the year. The reason why, is that, as the night rolls on, the stars will appear to rotate around a pivot point - near Polaris.

This motion in the heavens is really caused by the rotation of the Earth. Our daily spin causes stars to rise in the east and set in the west. But in the north we can watch the stars spin a full 360 degrees without going below the horizon. That makes them circum- polar stars.

When you look at stars farther from Polaris, they seem to make a bigger circle in the sky. So the farther south you look, the less amount of time each constellation is above the horizon.

As the Earth orbits the Sun, our perspective on the distant stars changes. When we're on one side of the Sun, like in winter, we can more easily see constellations like Orion and Gemini at night. But when we're on the other side of the Sun, like in summer, we can't see Orion and Gemini as well because the glare of the Sun is in the way. Those constellations are only above the horizon during the daytime. In summer when the nighttime part of the Earth is



pointed that way then we can better see the constellations like Scorpius and the summer triangle. These are seasonal constellations.

But no matter what season it is, we always have a good view to the northern sky. So we, near the lower part of the northern hemisphere, can view Ursa Major, Ursa Minor, and Cassiopeia all year long. That makes them circum-polar constellations.

So now that we're in summer, let's check out the summer triangle. Look high in the east and you'll find its three bright stars. We can see the brightest star, Vega, is at the top, bright white Altair is to the right, and dimmer Deneb is to the left.

Vega is the brightest star in the constellation Lyra the Harp, Altair is the eagle eye of Aquila the Eagle, and Deneb is the tail of Cygnus the swan: three great summer constellations in one big triangle.

Another easy-to-find summer constellation is low in the southern sky. There's Scorpius the Scorpion. You won't need to strain your imagination to see a scorpion in the long fishhook of stars that make his tail and stinger.

The brightest star in Scorpius is a beautiful, red star Antares. Antares means "rival of Mars" because its color is similar to that of the red planet. And this summer, Mars is nearby so you can compare the two more closely. Antares, the star, will twinkle a lot, while Mars, the planet will not. So get outside tonight and see how the stars move over the night. It might take a few hours (or days) but you'll notice the difference between the circum-polar and seasonal constellations. Say hi to our old friends, Ursa Major, Ursa Minor, and Cassiopeia. And ring in the summer with the summer triangle and the Scorpion.


