he Executive Council of Bonaire lost its majority backing last week, just two months being in power, when two members of the MPB (blue party)-led coalition withdrew their support. Island Governor Edison Rijna confirmed he received a letter signed by Council members James Kroon (UPB) and Jeanoushka "Nunu" Raphaela (Independent) saying they are unhappy with the social policy and an alleged lack of action on improving living conditions for the needy. Councilman Kroon said his main objection was the awarding of a job at the Bonaire Holding Company valued at \$10,000/month to MPB leader Elvis Tjin Asjoe.

"Without a majority there is no island government," said Governor Rijna. Unlike the national government the island government cannot be dissolved to hold new elections, so the Council members remain in office until a new coalition is formed to complete the rest of the governing term. Editorials in the local Papiamentu language newspapers expressed frustration at the behavior of the political parties involved at the expense of the people of the island.

- ▶ Persons who receive an Old Age or Widow & Orphan Pension and who live in care institutions are now eligible to receive pocket and clothing allowance directly rather than through the institution. The amount is \$59 per month for Bonaire. Saba and St. Eustatius residents get more, \$71 or \$72.
- ▶ Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport will be the first in the world to employ shoe scanners, eliminating the need for passengers to remove their shoes during security checks. Last November, the Airport began testing another new form of security scanner which removes the need for passengers to take liquids and laptops out of their luggage. It is not clear when the new scanners will be widespread.
- ▶Other Caribbean former colonial possessions besides Bonaire and St. Eustatius are agitating for a change in status. In early February Puerto Rico Governor Ricardo Rosselló announced a law to hold a non-binding referendum that would allow the US territory to vote on statehood. The referendum, to be held in June, will allow the voters to choose between statehood and independence/free association.

On Bonaire there appears to be minimal campaigning and general interest in the upcoming Dutch National elections. Of the 81 political parties which originally announced their intention to run in the March general election in The Netherlands, 31 have met the conditions for inclusion on the ballot paper, the election council has confirmed. New parties have to show they have support in all 20 voting districts to qualify and some have complained that local authorities have made it more difficult than necessary to collect the necessary paperwork. Of the 31 parties which have been approved, 19 have been given until Friday to make sure they have gathered sufficient support. This includes two of the three right-wing populist parties led by supporters of last year's referendum on Ukraine: Geen Peil and VNL. The average inflation rose on Bonaire to 0.5% over the full four quarters of 2016. This had been only -0.9% in 2015. Consumer prices on Bonaire increased by 0.5% in Q4 relative to one year previously. Since Q1 2016, Bonaire's inflation rate has remained at more or less at the same level. Inflation was kept low due to the price reduction of electricity over the past quarter, a decline by over 6%. The increase in the price of petrol on the other hand, had an upward effect on inflation. Although more or less equal to Q3, the price of petrol did

Local air transport developments following the grounding of all InselAir MD-80 jets several weeks ago:

- → Insel Air reported it is losing \$1.5 million a month
- → On February 1, the US Consulate
  General Curaçao informed US citizens that it temporarily prohibited
  US Consulate personnel from flying
  on Insel Air. The Consulate adopted
  this policy following an internal review of safety-related considerations.
  On December 27, 2016, an Insel Air
  flight bound for Curaçao was forced
  to land in Colombia due to an inability
  to pressurize the cabin. On January
  13, 2017, an Insel Air flight bound for
  Miami lost cabin pressure and was
  forced to make an emergency landing.
- → In the last six months, five and perhaps more Insel Air flights have returned to airports after takeoff due to pressurization or other critical problems.
- → Dutch Kingdom civil servants working or traveling in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom were temporarily also not allowed to fly with InselAir for business trips.
- → Violence broke out at Curacao's

  Hato airport where hundreds of in-

transit passengers were stranded. Delays of up to eight hours were common, but some desperate passengers had been stuck for as long as five days. Police had to be called to restore order.

- → Four InselAir MD-80 jets and the Fokker prop jet registered in Aruba remain grounded at Hato Airport by the Aruban Civil Air Authority.
- Air Aruba, Aserca Airlines of Venezuela and Avianca of Colombia have approached Aruban Minister of Transportation Mike de Meza showing their interest in taking over Curaçaobased InselAir's routes from Aruba. "The Dutch government also indicated that they want to know what role KLM or other Dutch airlines can play in this," said the Aruban minister. A decision was been made to deregister all InselAir planes. If that is done, InselAir Aruba will no longer be viable.
- → If the InselAir Aruba planes are subsequently certified as OK by Curacao authorities, experts feel that will compromise Curacao's integrity to certify airworthiness of aircraft.
- → The new Chairman of InselAir has said he is considering discontinuing InselAir's Aruba division.

- \*\*InselAir Curaçao had another MD-80 jet written off as obsolete and taken out of service, while the remaining two are currently without engines awaiting a major overhaul.




was born in Surinam in 1986. My mother is of Javanese descent and my dad is a real Surinamese mix. Because he's light they call him a 'Boeroe,' which is the name for a white Surinamese person. I'm the eldest. I have one sister who is six years younger, Martina, and a brother, Kevin, who is one year younger. In Surinam we lived with my grandparents from mother's side. They had a very big property and during the weekends the whole family, including all our cousins, would come over and we would play outside from dawn till dusk. My mom worked at the library and my dad was a teacher, but I remember him always sitting at the window, painting. I used to pick him flowers, making small bouquets, just for fun, just for love, and he really appreciated it.

When things in Surinam got bad and the money was devaluated, my parents started looking for a better future for us. First they concentrated on Aruba, but when it didn't work out Bonaire came up out of nowhere. My dad arrived here first and six months later we followed. I was nine and I remember it clearly. We moved into a house in Rincon, the last house before Altamira. Once we even climbed the Altamira from our house all the way to the top! We also started with judo and we made the connection there with the people, and until this day we have that bond with the people from Rincon. We lived there for about six years.

When I was 15 we moved to Kralendijk 'where it was all happening!' We did a lot of swimming at Flamingo Beach and climbed the ropes when the occasional cruise ship came into town. We went to the movies and the game room which was a really big hit! Every end of the month it would be 'hot' on main street with everybody in town, mainly walking between City Café and Karel's, just hanging out.

Then I finished high school and still I didn't know what to do. I wanted to do something with art, but I didn't have a portfolio so I

couldn't get into art school in Holland. However, I had to make a choice because the next step was moving to Holland to study. I talked to my dad about it. I didn't want a very complicated study because I am dyslexic. The most important thing to me was that it would be fun! My dad advised me to become a teacher so I would have long vacations which I could spend painting. So I decided to become a teacher in healthcare and wellbeing. It was a perfect little group; only 12 girls and it just clicked. Five years later I graduated from the Hogeschool van Amsterdam, the Amsterdam University of applied sciences.

came back in 2015, so we had a lot of catching up to do. Then I got my job and life became much more serious.

I'm teaching some biology, plus healthcare and wellbeing. This year we began with trade college, a vocational education starting in the first school year of SGB. We do small projects like conscious social behavior, first aid, but also I really enjoyed my time in Hol- practical projects and technical

Being a teacher you need to create a safe space where the child can blossom and learn to be kind and good hearted in connecting with others. We have to make them realize that we are all one and the same. We all want to succeed and we all want to be treated well and we all have our differences which we need to learn to

am in a brand new relationship which gives me a whole new outlook on life. When I am free I walk with the dogs. I would like to pick up singing and painting again and I feel 'chill.'

Bonaire has definitely changed and I think it's a good thing we're growing. For some people growth comes easily while it's a struggle for others. We have to make sure those people catch the flow as well. We have to respect the culture and the authenticity while we are growing, and we have to prepare the children so they will be able to make the transfer and fit in with the new society of this world – not only within the Bonairean community. I wish they find their place in society and I hope they'll understand their value to the island and that in the future they will be able to share their knowledge and skills with the people of Bonaire.

And when I speak about adapting, I am speaking out of experience because I know what it is to adapt. When I moved from Surinam to Rincon I lost my big beautiful family that had to stay behind and we were alone. Then I moved from Rincon to Kralendijk and from the capital of Bonaire I moved to Amsterdam which again was a change and a challenge. Then I came back to Bonaire and had to adapt again. So I know change can be a very good thing because it expands the way you think and feel and you learn more about people, but mostly about yourself." ■





he 29th International Catch and Release Bill Fish Tournament as well as the associated Local Fishing Tournament were considered very successful. In the International Tournament 29 boats from Bonaire, Aruba, Curacao and Venezuela took part. This is somewhat more than previous years. Last year there was a fantastic 59 releases compared to this year's more normal number of 34 releases. The Local Tournament on the other hand had a decline in attendance with only eight boats participating. This tournament is open to all boats and targets fish for eating. The fishermen are able to keep or sell their own catch, so there was a big variety of "fish of the day" around the island this week!

#### Results:

In the catch and release tournament, Pasa Largo from Curacao reeled in the prize for the first release on Friday, 35 minutes after baits in the water. In the catch and release each fisherman takes pictures of the fish at the boat along with a card with a particular code given over the radio so the judges can be sure it is not an old picture. The fish are then released to roam the seas again. Sailfish and White Marlin are worth 150 points each, while the larger and feistier Blue Marlin is worth 300 points. If a fish of over 300 lbs is caught, it may be brought in for additional points.

The three winning teams were tied with 900 points. The First prize went to Naria from Aruba who reached that total first at noon time on Saturday. They also won for the first release on Saturday only 39 minutes after the baits hit the water. Pasa *Largo* with only a captain and one fisherman on day one and two fishermen on day two, compared to all other boats with three or four fishermen, reached the same total two hours later to secure second place. Ilisa, an all-ladies team from Aruba, held third place until Tara also from Aruba snatched the third place prize in the very

end, managing to call in a strike only one minute before the lines out deadline and

Dean Hendricks on Le Grand Blue from Bonaire brought in a monster Yellow Fin Tuna of 44kg to win the prize for most tuna.

The local tournament saw fewer than normal boats, but also extremely varied results. Andy on Fatima placed first in the large boat category (over 17') with 55 fish totaling 108.5kgs, while Giordano arrived with nine fish tipping in at 41 kg. Grace, the only sailing boat in the tournament had zero environmental impact with a solar electric engine, sails, but also no fish. As said, everyone can participate!

In the small boats, Randolf on Kuna managed to bring in 77 fish for a total of 86kg for first prize. There were no other fish in this category, guess he caught them all!

The evening parties were great with a different buffet each evening and super music from RPM live and Esso. There was even a pop up boat party for the boats along the shore on Saturday as a last minute feature for the event.

None of this would be possible without the help of the many sponsors that contribute to the great success. DARK CHOCOLATE: A DELICIOUS **HEALTH FOOD?** 

or many people it seems that eating healthy involves giving up many of the things they love. Many of us prefer high-fat, high-sugar foods to vegetables and fruits, red meat to fish, French fries to brown rice, etc. But the good news is that it has become increasingly clear that chocolate, one of the true comfort foods that many people love, is not only good to eat but good for your health as well.

Cacao has been cultivated for almost 2000 years, but only recently has it been the subject of formal scientific investigation. More than 400 articles have appeared in the medical literature concerning the health effects of chocolate, and the consensus is that chocolate is one of the new health foods! However, before you run out and stock up on chocolate bars from the grocery store, there are a few simple things you need to

There are three main types of chocolate; white chocolate, milk chocolate and dark chocolate, and it appears that greater health benefits come from consuming dark chocolate than the other varieties.

Research has centered on two main types of ingredients found in cacao and chocolate: stearic acid and bioflavonoids. Stearic acid is a saturated fat, meaning it is solid at room

temperature. Since dietary saturated fats tend to raise both total cholesterol and harmful LDL cholesterol levels in the bloodstream, health authorities such as the American Heart Association and the National Institutes of Health recommend that people limit their consumption of saturated fat to less than 6 to 10% of daily calories. Stearic acid is the most common type of fat found in chocolate, yet studies have shown that it is unlike most other types of saturated fat and does not raise either total or LDL cholesterol levels. It also changes the platelets in the blood stream and reduces the risk of blood clots. Studies have shown that dark chocolate may actually boost your HDL ("good") cholesterol, too.

Bioflavonoids are dietary antioxidants. Many of the mainstays of a healthy diet such as fresh fruits and vegetables, green



tea, and red wine are rich in bioflavonoids. Bioflavonoid intake has been found to lower the risk of having a heart attack or stroke. Dark chocolate contains more bioflavonoids than green tea, apples, onions and red wine. Dark chocolate also has two and half times more bioflavonoid content and much less sugar than either milk chocolate or white chocolate, which is why it is the preferred

Silent inflammation is currently regarded as the common pathway leading to numerous diseases such as heart disease, cancer, arthritis, diabetes and Alzheimers disease. Inflammation in the body is measured with a blood test known as the C reactive protein (CRP) and studies have shown that consumption of dark chocolate significantly lowers CRP levels.

A relation with stress has also been found. When we are stressed our body signals out chemicals that raise our blood pressure and help us fight the stressor. A recent study looked at how the body responded to stress by measuring these chemicals (cortisol, epinephrine, adrenocorticotropic hormone [ACTH], and norepinephrine) in 31 men consuming dark chocolate ("Noir 72%"; Chocolat Frey AG, Buchs/Aargau, Switzerland) versus 34 men who received a placebo chocolate that did not contain flavanols. The men then underwent a significant stress test. What these researchers found about the effect of chocolate was significant. Those men consuming dark chocolate had lower levels of cortisol and epinephrine after the

You should buy dark chocolate bars that contain at least 70% cocoa content. I typically eat two small squares about four to five times a week and I usually combine that with soms nuts like walnuts or almonds or some blueberries to make this snack even healthier.

The benefits of dark chocolate need to



# Bonaire On TV



# New Crab Discovered In Bot

How about a little eye candy? A new species of hermit crab discovered in Bonaire is just the ticket.

It's called the candy striped hermit crab, named for the bright red stripes that run up its white claws and legs.

Ellen Muller, a photographer and naturalist on the island, inadvertently snapped a photo of one while taking a picture of a flaming reef lobster on a night dive in Bonaire's National Marine Park.

s Ellen herself writes, "On a night dive, in December of 2015, I took some photographs of a Flaming Reef Lobster (*Enoplometopus antillensis*). Back home, when I looked at the photos on my computer I noticed an unusual looking, extremely small hermit crab with coloring unlike any that I had seen before.

I sent the photo to a crustacean expert, Arthur Anker, who suggested that I forward the photo to Rafael Lemaitre who specializes in hermit crabs. Neither had seen anything like it, but the detail in the photo was too poor to make a positive identification. I was told to try and get some better close up photos.

Thinking this was going to be like finding a needle in a haystack I went back to the area where I photographed the lobster and luckily I found three of the hermit crabs and got some decent photos.

Rafael's message, upon seeing the photos, 'This is amazing, it shows how little we know of the Caribbean. I still can't be sure, but even with your earlier photo I had the suspicion it might be a species of Pylopaguropsis, of which several species in the Pacific have similar striking color patterns. There are 16 described species worldwide, but only one is known from the western Atlantic (and it is not that one on just color differences). The species in this genus tend to have very massive right chelipeds, with a flattened chela, much like it appears to be in the photos you just sent. All subject to confirmation by examination of specimens.'

After obtaining the proper

paperwork a few specimens were sent to the Smithsonian Institution and it was confirmed that these hermit crabs are indeed a new species. Special thanks to Rafael Lemaitre who was so enthusiastic about describing this beautiful little crab. Thanks to VIP Diving, Frank van Slobbe, Paul Hoetjes and CIEE's Rita Peachey and Amy Wilde for their help with this new spe-

cies.





# A Garden?

# Do It



Any kind of container will do

#### DRYING OUT

f course you have noticed that the rainy season is at its end. Some drops here and there, but the heavy showers are over. And you know that plants are getting dry again. How is it possible that the soil got so dry and hard so quickly again after all those months of rain?. Now I have to water my garden every three days, otherwise I will lose my beautiful plants, veggies, fruit trees and their developing young fruit. But even with my help, the plants don't look as nice as when there was so much rain. And the strong blowing wind together with the harsh sunlight have made me lose some nice ones already. They were too sensitive to survive.

Don't fight against it. Now is the time to let the land rest. Clean your garden, trim trees, add manure and compost to the soil and let it rest. And enjoy the harvest of a good rainy season.

Yes, nature has no mercy but still it's always good. It depends how you look at it. For example, while that grass was growing like crazy with all that rain (and we did complain about that grass) gardeners had a lot of work, while for a long time there hadn't been so much to do, so less money to earn. But for building contractors the rain was terrible because often they couldn't continue their job. Now they are happy once again.

So in nature there are always some who benefit from the situation and some who have to wait for awhile. Now there will be a lot of people who need a gardener to fix the yard with all that grass and wild plants.

### A subject worth talking about is "The Gardener."

There are many around who have different ways of doing the job and the prices they ask. To avoid trouble, which can happen a lot, make sure all is clear to each other and put it on paper and have it signed when it's a big job. We often think that gardeners know about plants. And that is the first mistake. Often they don't have any knowledge about your herb garden or your fancy tree. They know about trimming, cutting and raking and that is what you want them to do. But often they trim too much of your trees or not only take grass away but also all your herbs and a just-planted new collection of exotic plants.

So be there while the gardener is busy in your yard and show him exactly what you want and how you want him to do the job. How, when, where, what and how much those words are important.

The price. Do you want him to only take grass away and /or to trim trees or to take trees away? To rake, trim your fence, dig holes for new plants and take all that stuff to the landfill? Make sure you have been clear enough and that he understood you well. As I said before, put it all on paper including the price.

About the price there is **job price and hour price**. If it's just a small job you can go by the hour price. But when it is a big job, you have to figure out what

is best for your pocket: hour price or job price? When the price is based on a the whole job, the gardeners work fast to get the money fast and go for the next job. (It's up to you to make sure that all the work is done). But when it's going by the hour, they go slowly to take more hours, so more money. And lastly, sometimes it brings the price down when you have your own gardening tools and equipment. So bring this up when you are busy settling on a price. And make sure when they are leaving that all your gardening tools are still there. Most of time, I'm also busy in the yard when they are, so I have supervision over the whole situation.

Don't pay in advance. You might not see them again. Make a deal when and how you pay. Some expects some food and or water. some comes with their own drinks.

When you want to take a tree out, I've heard you need to ask certain organizations to remove the tree. Some trees are protected and even when it's in your yard you need permission to pull it out. Check with Stinapa (717-8444) or LVV (717-8836). Certain trees are good to make charcoal. Some people from Rincon will be very happy with the wood from your trimmed trees. They will pick it up. You don't need to pay for that. And some people who have cattle in their kunukus are very happy with certain leaves and grass from your yard. For example the banana tree which contains a lot a water is very nice for cattle. So make some kunukeros happy with all that fresh stuff from your yard. Your gardener might know someone who will be pleased.

I have gathered a lot of nice fruit and vegetables from my yard this week, maybe the last for this season. Yes, last but not least They are terribly sweet and good, right from the garden.

### The Great Orion Nebula

ne of the best things about winter is that it always brings the return of one of the true wonders of the universe, an object in deep space. On any night this week at about 8 pm look to the southeast and you'll see what has to be the second most familiar pattern of stars (after the **Big Dipper**, that is), a pattern which is loaded with bright stars, known as Orion the Hunter.

To find him look for stars, Alnitak, Alnilam and Mintaka.

Above these three belt stars you'll see two brilliant stars marking Orion's shoulders, Betelgeuse and Bellatrix. And below his belt, two other stars mark his ankle and his knee, Rigel and Saiph.

We've written about Orion's bright stars, but for this time we would like to zero-in on one of Orion's more subtle objects. Look below the belt stars for three much dimmer stars, the stars we call the Sword of Orion. There we will find one of the most awesome wonders of our nearby universe.

If you look very carefully at these three stars you'll notice that no matter how sharp your eyesight, the middle star always seems to look fuzzy or slightly out of focus. That's because this star is not a star at all, but something we call a Nebula. A nebula is a cosmic cloud of gas and dust and the great Nebula of Orion is actually a stellar recycling center. Within this Nebula, brand new stars have been, and are still being born from the surrounding cloud. In fact, you can see this Nebula using even the cheapest pair of binoculars. This cloud is illuminated by four recently-born stars arranged in the shape of a baseball diamond called the Trapezium. These four stars can actually be seen with a small telescope. Now, although the Orion Nebula looks tiny, in reality, its size is mind-boggling.


Believe it or not, there is enough material in this Nebula to produce over 10 thousand

Just to give you a refresher, a Light Year is not a measure of time, but a measure of **distance.** Space is so big and the stars are so far away that astronomers don't measure the distances between the stars in terrestrial units like miles or kilometers. We use the term Light Year.

Light travels at a whopping 186,000 miles per second, which is almost 670 million miles per hour! This means that if you were to travel at the speed of light from the Earth to the Moon, you could make the trip in a little less than two seconds. If you traveled from the Earth to the Sun at that same speed, you could make the trip in a little over eight minutes. And if you were to travel from Earth to Pluto at the speed of light, you could make the trip in a little over five hours.

Modern telescopes have allowed us to look deep inside the Nebula and see newborn stars and discs of material. These discs could be forming planets like those in our Solar System. It could take thousands or even millions of years for these protoplanetary discs to turn into Solar Systems, but we'll keep watching and you should too! Look for the Orion Nebula this week and peer deep into space

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# did you know?



hat the rains are bringing unusual critters to Bonaire? With the recent rains, Bonaire has transformed into a lush, green island again. It has been so dry for so long that I had almost forgotten how beautiful and vibrant the mondi (countryside) could be. The vegetation is flowering and producing fruits and seeds. Trails that were easy to walk a few months ago are now completely overgrown.

On one hike near Playa Frans on our way to do the Caribbean Waterbird Census, a colleague of mine and I spotted what looked to be a VERY small hummingbird flitting from one flower to another in search of nectar. Then we saw another and another. They were everywhere, busy feeding on the nectar of the flowers, especially the flowers of what appeared to be basora kòrá/Black Widow/Melochia tomentosa.

We tried to take some photos, but the little buggers wouldn't sit still for even a second. We were able to get some beautiful photos from Arjen van Dorsten who, with the help of Herman Sieben and Johan van Blerk, identified the moths as Aellopos/Clavipes Sphinx moths (Aellopos clavipes). Distributed throughout the tropics and subtropics of the Americas, they begin as caterpillars, form pupae that develop in underground

chambers, and emerge as moths. Unlike most moths, they are active at dawn, dusk and in the middle of the day.

They are strong fliers and have been known to carry on with their greedy feeding even when it's raining. Moths from this family have extremely long tongues (proboscises) that may extend longer than 12 inches/30 cm in order to reach the nectar from very long flowers. If you haven't spotted one of these adorable moths yet, it's time to find a field of flowers (they are abundant in the northern part of the island),

be patient, and hopefully you'll get lucky. Caren Eckrich,
