



S ince the last edition of The Reporter another new island government (BC) has been put forward. The Papiamentu newspapers are calling it the "Vengeance (Vengansa) Coalition." Following the collapse of the short-lived Island Government Executive Council on 27 July a new alliance of council members was proposed to Governor Edison Rijna.

These five members of the nine-seat Island Council—Independent Jeanoushka "Nunu "Raphaela, who withdrew her support from the previous government causing it to lose its legitimacy; another independent, Esther Bernabela; old-guard Democrats (PDB-red party) Robbie Beukenboom and Marugia Janga; and Patriotiko Party member James Kroon (UPB-green)- sent a letter to the Governor. It said the sitting Executive Council (BC) can handle only current business and not initiate new policies and act as "guardians of Island Government" until a new coalition has been formed and a new BC sworn it.

► When the We Dare to Care Foundation opened its children's park (Parke Libertat—S. James Finies aka Parke Publico) in 2005 there was no similar facility on Bonaire. Over the years admission to the privatelyowned park has been essentially free. The anticipated government funding to maintain the park has never appeared while the government has opened and supports other similar parks.

As a result the Foundation, led by **Davika Bissessar**, has decided to introduce a sliding scale of entrance fees depending on the financial status of the users. The entrance requirements as of September 1, 2017 are:

Low income families and government after school programs—Free. Yearly pass (must be qualified by the Foundation based on NI-BUD\* standards)

**Special privilege families**—6 months, \$60/1 year, \$110 (must be qualified by Foundation) **Standard Families**—6 months, \$115 / 1 year, \$222

During the month of August families can apply for their entrance pass at the park from Monday to Friday from 4pm to 6pm or call whatsapp: +599 786-4576.

InselAir over two weeks ago when InselAir had no flyable planes for one whole day. Connection to Curacao was curtailed except for flights by eight-passenger Norman Islanders from Divi Divi Air and charters from EZ Air.

Both of the old InselAir Fokker 50s flying the route needed maintenance. Some were so bad they had been scrapped. Outgoing Bonaire Commissioner Clark Abraham was outraged and announced Bonaire would have an airline flying between the ABC Islands this year.

Then the unions threatened a job action unless the current InselAir management was replaced.

Then WinAir added another jet flight from St-Maarten to Curacao, a previously lucrative route for InselAir.

But the storm clouds may be clearing. The first official word that Avianca Airlines will become involved with InselAir operations was announced by Curacao

**Bonaire suffered its worst insult from** minister Steven Martina yesterday at a press conference and the minister in charge of aviation, Zita Jesus Leito, said one of the old MD80s had passed inspection and soon would begin flying. And reportedly an unnamed European airline may begin service with a 34-passenger plane as well.

> However, if the Curacao government decides to give Avianca and parent company Synergy permission to administer InselAir's routes, the yet-to-fly, Curacao-registered airline Ava Air will take them to court. Ava says it has met all the requirements of airline operation for quite a while but hasn't been granted all the needed permits.

> Trade union UGTK / Cadmu, who represents the interests of Insel Air staff, wants André Delger and Gilles Filiatreault, the airline's bosses to resign. This is stated in a letter sent to the government. The battle between Insel Air and the trade unions has hardened, as the restructuring plans cut the staff. About 130 of them must be gone, voluntarily or forced.

► Recently Curacao's water company discontinued adding fluoride to its drinking water creating a controversy. For many years it had been added to the desalinated water to promote dental health. **Bonaire** has never added fluoride to its WEBprovided water, considered to be the best tasting water in the Caribbean. Visitors are encouraged to forego store-bought bottled water and refill bottles with Bonaire tap water.



**STINAPA Bonaire brought a** shortfin Mako shark to CIEE Bonaire last week after it was found washed ashore. This is the largest animal the staff at CIEE had necropsied at the station. The shortfin mako has the fastest recorded swimming speed of any shark and is highly intelligent. It is listed as a Vulnerable Species by the IUCN. There was a hole under the lower jaw where the shark had been

hooked and a wear-line where fishing line likely rubbed the skin of the shark. As far as we know, the shark was dead when it washed ashore.

This was a female mako and had a total length of 2 m (6'6''); with a fork length of 1.8 m. A female shortfin mako becomes reproductive at a fork length of 2.75 m, which is approximately 18 years of age. This shark was probably 8 - 10 years old and was not large enough to have reproduced in its short life. The largest shortfin mako listed on wikipedia was 3.3 m (11') and was 32 years old.

CIEE staff collected tissue samples that they hope to have analyzed for heavy metals and parasites. They found two types of parasites that they preserved in the lab. One is a parasitic copepod that was on the gills and attached to the roof of the mouth. The parasites will be studied as well.

Thanks to the people who reported the shark and to the Marine Park for bringing it to CIEE Bonaire! (press release)

► CIEE may leave Bonaire following the upcoming Fall semester. If it does it would represent a major loss to the local community. We haven't heard this officially and hope it is untrue.

TUI, the European tour package airline, will fly from Amsterdam to Bonaire one extra day per week beginning November 1, on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, using a Boeing 787 Dreamliner with stops in either Aruba or Curacao.

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# **On the Island Since...** 2007 - Tineke and Maarten de Groot-Looman

y family has always lived on Aruba and Curacao. When Maarten was with the Marines, he was stationed on the islands twice, so he was also familiar with the region. We lived in Holland. Maarten worked with the same company for 21 years and I had my own business but we wanted a change, a challenge."

"After looking around," Maarten says, "we chose Bonaire. The people were friendly and it was small-scale and peaceful. After our arrival we started taking care of vacation homes. I would pick people up from the airport and maintain the pool but it wasn't really my thing. Tineke was more involved in it.

One day I was talking to the general manager of Plaza and he asked me to put Plaza's logistics back on track. I was okay with it but didn't want to do it for a longer period of time. I was still looking for the restaurant of the Beach Hut at Sorobon rising. Here, at the Beach Hut, we had was available, I decided to rent it from Patun, Elvis and Roger. The only experience I had in that field was being a customer – but together with two guys from Plaza I made the leap in July 2008. I opened the day the Pro Kids event started. It was a coincidence but it worked out great! Shortly after, my two partners started to become homesick and within a year both of them left the island and I was running the business on my own. But it went well and soon enough the local people started calling me 'Grandi.'

"Let me tell you a little story," Tineke laughs. "My mother, who lives in Holland now, has an Antillean nurse who helps her with everything. When the nurse saw a photo of Maarten and me on my mom's cabinet she asked my mom, 'What's Grandi doing on your cabinet?' Ha! That was so funny!"

"Well," Maarten says, "after having worked alone for a while, Marjolein started helping me out in November 2008. She was a flight attendant with Transavia and had a winter stop and was staying in one of the apartments Tineke was taking care of. When she told Tineke she was looking for a temporary job, Tineke immediately sent her to the Beach Hut. Not long after she decided to stay. Later in 2009, Tineke and I quit taking care of the apartments so I could concentrate completely

on the Beach Hut. Tineke did the administration, which she is still doing. And I am very lucky to have a super team here. My personnel is always in a good mood and very friendly. And when the cruise ships come in it's no big deal for us, we are so attuned to each other that everything runs smoothly.

Sometimes, when I arrive here in the morning, I take photos and post them on Facebook for my friends who are working at an office." He grins. "Comments are hilarious! On a regular basis I go to Denver, Colorado, where I stay with friends because I get so fed up with this view I have here, believe it or not! However, days before I'm returning to Bonaire I'm thinking, 'Great! Time to go home!' And then, when I arrive at Sorobon, it hits me: This is it! No place like this in the whole wide world!"

tions. I think that when you help the animals, you also help the owner. When people have a clean, healthy and happy pet, their relationship with their pet becomes different. It doesn't cause stress or anxiety anymore and it gives them joy and subsequently the animal becomes part of the family. Whether it's a dog, a cat or a Lora - or any other animal - when you take good care of your pet, it becomes more fun, more sociable and more affectionate.

To me an animal is part of the family and that's why we have 12 dogs, hahaha! I've found abandoned and totally miserable puppies, but we also have a bunch of old dogs that people left behind because they were old. To me it's like a potato chip commercial where you can't eat just one -I can't stop taking them in! And Maarten is and you should not have the Western picjust as weak as I am!"

only put one row and often not even one, when the water rises up to the door. When you think about it: What has happened in only nine years?

Well, aside from doing the administration I am not involved in the Beach Hut. After having worked at the Animal Shelter for a short while in 2007, I became convinced that there should be more awareness about sterilization and castration of dogs and cats. Also, people needed more information about how to take care of their animals and what to do when their pet gets sick. All this to prevent dogs or cats ending up at the Shelter or worse, being euthanized, because there were and still are too many animals. I didn't know how to go about it, but then, Marina Melis putt me in contact with Stichting Dierenhulp – the Animal Help Foundation - in Holland and with their help, Jan Laarakker, a vet, and I started offering sterilizations and castra-

and irritated, but when she saw what was in the box, she was so happy!" They look at each other and laugh. "We can't help ourselves! All our dogs are allowed to stay inside the house and we - the personnel are permitted to live there too!


What we're presently discussing with the government and the other animal welfare organizations on the island," Tineke says, "is that when you remove on short notice all (stray) dogs from the streets and take them to the landfill, no problem will be solved, because their places will be taken in no time by other dogs. We have to start at the source, which still means sterilization, castration and awareness. Therefore, I go with a colleague into the neighborhoods on certain days, and we go from door to door asking people if it's alright to castrate or sterilize their pets. Those are also the moments that we offer medical treatment which we provide on the spot or I make an Story & photos by Greta Kooistra

appointment with Jan. We also help with the housing of the animals and many other issues that show up. At the same time, people get to know us and they learn to trust us.

The vision of Stichting Dierenhulp is that through sterilization, castration and guidance you will get a healthier animal population and eventually people will keep their animals in their own yard. I think the situation on the island has improved and there are definitely fewer poor wretches roaming the streets, thanks to the effort of more and more organizations who are committed to the animals and their welfare.

Still, I find we have to aim for the perfect outcome, otherwise I couldn't do it. But you also have to look at the circumstances ture in mind. You must look at what's achievable for people and animals and respect people's dignity. Everything Jan and I are doing is being paid for by the foundation which was founded by Mark Vos. We are not subsidized by the government; our funds come from gifts from Holland but also from sponsors here on the island.

Never before have we worked as hard as we work here." She laughs. "In Holland we had office hours, vacation and weekends. On Bonaire we're just going on and on." "But we are a strong team," Maarten says. "We've been together for 33 years and we support each other in everything we're doing. We love to travel and we went to Chile together, which was an amazing trip and very special because usually we have to go separately because of the dogs. Each of us went to the Azores several times to visit our dear friends, Sean and Marjolein, and to see what life is like there. Sean is my buddy and we miss them. Then there's our unrest and wanderlust because



still freedom and tranquility and still the island has more nature than people."

tural improvement and expansion since the 2010 restructuring of the Antilles. Jacobs Architekten NV is responsible for the design of the school.

We live on a beautiful, but small island, where everything we do has a direct impact on our nature and our environment. Solid waste is one of the biggest challenges that Bonaire is currently facing. Our landfill is reaching full capacity and expansion into nature areas is simply not an option.

"What can I do to help solve this waste problem?" asked Lorella (Lola) Scandaletti co-owner of Capriccio Ristorante. Lola decided that she would no longer use Styrofoam to-go boxes and switched to a nature friendly alternative. She noticed right

away that biodegradable packaging costs a little more, especially when you buy it in smaller quantities. So, the next logical step would be to increase the buying volume. Already Pasa Bon Pizza and Go Green Restaurant are using these boxes. Lola approached Sharon Bol of Boneiru Duradero, a WWF/NL sponsored project on Bonaire and that is how the idea started for a collective Non-Profit buying platform. Their first goal is to reach out to local restaurants and get a feel for the quantities of to-go boxes that restaurants use. The ultimate goal is to buy biodegradables collectively at the lowest price! When you buy collectively you can order bigger quantities, negotiate a better price and share the costs of shipping and handling. Pilot testing with kraft-paper food boxes on Bonaire already shows that tourists are willing to pay a little extra for nature friendly food-containers.

During the months of August, September and October, Bonaire's coral will reproduce. This phenomenon, known as the Coral Spawning, takes place two to three times a year and is one of the most unique natural phenomena on earth. For most divers, coral spawning is an experience they'll never forget. In addition to the coral, other underwater organisms continue to spawn in these months, such as sponges and brittle stars, and also contribute to the special spectacle. According to Carmabi Curacao, for the best experience plan to dive six to eight nights after the full moons in August, September and October. Full moon nights are August 7, September 6, and October 5. G./L.D.

**B** onaire has a long maritime history. Ship building was commonplace and before engines became the norm, the fishermen set to sea in sailing boats both large and small. These were replaced by power boats, and the fishing boats were only seen once a year in the Regatta. With only one big race per year, even this event sadly fell by the wayside. Most of the boats are now filling with weeds on various kunukus.

The island's local government has made it priority for this year's Regatta to bring the fishermen's boats race back for the 50<sup>th</sup> Regatta, as this is how Bonaire's Regatta started. Many in the community had their own desire to bring the boats back, but without help, it was an insurmountable goal. Hype Events, the organizers of Regatta this year, are organizing a group effort to make it happen.

#### The Group

Together, we will figure out how we can get the boats to the Kas di Regatta which will be our repair central.

Once we have the boats there, they will be evaluated and repair work can begin. We have many craftsmen already set to assist with the repairs.

If you do not have a boat but would like to be involved, you can come on down and work alongside the craftsmen and get a firsthand view of how the work is done.

Not ready for repair work? Support us with a pot of soup, a bag of ice or a cold beer to fuel the workers. Together as a community we can make this happen.

Material support is always welbeing used? We will work to repurpose. We need not only the boats, but trailers to get them to the sea, lead for ballast and other fitting and items

necessary. Financial support is required as well. Many materials still need to be purchased, future races to be organized and more to

make this all work. Once the boats are ready to sail, there is

need for crew. These boats are not simple sailing vessels

as are many modern boats. Experienced sailors are important. Check if there are spots open to sail in the races if you feel you qualify.

Cheer - of course we need you all to come out and cheer for these beautiful boats at the Regatta. Take and post photos, embrace the traditions.

Sea Hawk, a manufacture of paints and Epoxies has already donated nearly \$4,000 worth of materials to begin the project. We look forward to others joining forces with us to make this a great success.

#### Long Term

Of course, once restored, how do we ensure the boats do not fall to the same fate again? Our goal is to have a minimum of four events per year to keep the boats and sailors active and involved.

Budget Marine is already planning a big event for December that will include a Regatta, triathlon, walk, festival and more. If there is anyone interested in sponsoring or organizing more events, let's get together and make it happen. If





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# A Garden? Do

## ROOTS

nother nice thing to do on a rainy day is be busy with art. For me its writing, and at this moment writing about nature for *The Reporter* while listening to the rainfall. Such a peaceful inspiration that makes a lot of good ideas come into my mind.

While watering the plants this morning (before the rain started), I noticed two wild cats in the yard, hunting for the birds. I have no dog so they are often around. And because the birds love my garden, they also are often coming and going. So for the cats it's a perfect place to hide in the branches and catch the birds. This morning I found a just half eaten lora, the feathers all over the place. Oh no! This is not a Bloody Mary, but a bloody Lora. What a pity, but this was pure nature

My neighbors and I are busy replacing our wall because so many roots destroyed it. As I said many times, roots can be a serious danger for buildings and walls. But not all trees have dangerous, invading roots. So I made a kind of list of different trees and what their roots do

for you to consider when planning your garden.

First, don't plant big trees too close to your fence or wall. You might have some space between your fence and your house, but your neighbors may not. That means that roots can damage their house even though the tree is in your yard. That can bring troubles to an otherwise nice relationship with your neighbors. So the best place is to plant those giants in a more open space in your yard. Consider this list:

**Big trees with big invasive roots:** Mango, Tamarind, Knippa tree, Neem tree, July tree, Mispel, Baby Druif, Druifi Surinam, Hoba, Watapana, Golden apple.

Trees in between which can damage too: Sunsaka, Carambola, Avocado, Wayaca, Appledam, Noni, Cashew, Palm trees, Birambi, Guaba, Kalbas, Makapruim, Sor-

wood.) Even dead roots from small plants like the oleander or roots that can keep on growing and start a new tree, and suddenly you see it growing from under the house.

Roots are not always dangerous. In places on Bonaire where there is no "klip" (rock surface), roots grow deep into the soft soil and are no danger for houses. Trees are only dangerous when they cannot grow deep into the soil, so they spread their roots on the surface and go in the direction of where they can find water. Soil drainage depends on the area where you live.

Lastly, here are a few nice things to know:

Once a friend from Trinidad visited me. When she saw a Neem tree on my street she got crazy. She wanted to take almost the whole tree to Trinidad. She told me that

# DID YOU KNOM?

That the Flamingo Tongue Snail (Cyphoma gibbosum) stores toxic compounds from its food sources in its mantle to make itself toxic? The Flamingo Tongue Snail has developed an immunity to the toxins and uses it for its own benefit to become distasteful for most predators. Clever little snail...

The Flamingo Tongue Snail grows to about 2.5

cm (or 1 inch) long, and can reach an age of 2 years. It has two eyes and a sharp tongue called a radula that it uses to scrape and eat the skin (live tissue) of gorgonian corals, leaving behind the hard skeleton. Gorgonians are flexible corals which include sea fans, sea plumes and sea rods. The Flamingo Tongue's mantle extends all the way around its shell and has some amazing patterns with yellow colors and orange spots, which is thought to be a signal to predators that it is toxic and to leave it alone. The mantle is in fact toxic because the toxins that it absorbs by eating gorgonians are stored here. The mantle also serves as the snail's lungs, absorbing oxygen and releasing carbon dioxide. When the snail is being attacked, it temporarily retracts its mantle into its shell, revealing its rather boring, whitishcolored shell.

Even though the Flamingo Tongue is toxic, that doesn't mean this snail has nothing to be afraid of. Pufferfish, Hogfish and Spiny Lobsters seem to like eating this snail, regardless of the distastefulness of the toxins. It's lucky they have predators since this is necessary to keep the snail population in check. Should these predators become scarce (e.g. due to overfishing, diseases, etc.), the snail population could grow beyond sustainable numbers and may have devastating consequences for the gorgonians. Bonaire witnessed a Flamingo Tongue outbreak in the fall of 2009, but numbers went back to normal within months and not much is known about the effect they had on gorgonians during the outbreak. A single

lthough it is not a A tree native to Bonaire, the bright red Flamboyant tree is flowering abundantly on the island right now. It's also known as the royal Poinciana or Flame Tree, **a** species of flowering plant in the bean family Fabaceae, subfamily Caesalpinioideae. It is noted for its fern-like leaves and flamboyant display of flowers. In addition to its ornamental value, it is also a useful shade tree in

snail, however, never intends to kill its host, but moves to other hosts to allow the coral to regenerate.

Like many other gastropods, the Flamingo Tongue Snail leaves a trail of mucus when moving from host to host. When another individual comes across this trail, it will follow it in the hope of finding a good host gorgonian and possible mating opportunities. The mating process may last up to 4 hours. After 4 days, the female lays as many as 300 eggs on the grazed part of the coral. Within 10 to 12 days the larvae emerge, are planktonic for an unknown time period, and eventually settle on or nearby a gorgonian to begin their lives on the coral reef.

A mistake that people make when collecting the snail for decoration purposes, is that they are convinced the shell contains the beautiful colors. This is not the case, since when the snail dies its colorful mantle also dies and disappears, revealing the pale shell underneath. In Bonaire, collecting is not permitted and we here at STINAPA encourage everyone to enjoy the Flamingo Tongue Snail's wonderful appearance while it's

Small trees or shrubs which you can plant close to a wall or house: Papaya, Cherry, Banana, Coco, Pomegranate, Skopappel, Lemon, Tuturutu, Hibiscus, Cactus, Parchita.

When you don't want a tree anymore, remove the roots too. Dead roots get rotten and that's exactly what termites like. So dead trees and roots in your yard are also dangerous for nearby houses. (This includes beach wood, pallets or building Neem leaves are so expensive there and that you can't find them easily and they make a lot of home medicines from it. So I told her to become rich with Neem from Bonaire and that some of us here would be happy that that they all would move to Trinidad. So you see, what is too much here is needed in another place. 


Have you seen Lyra the Harp? On any night this week, at about 10 pm Sky Park time look toward the east. You will see a grouping of stars we call the Summer Triangle. The brightest star in the triangle is actually the fifth brightest star we can see from earth and its

name is Vega.Vega is the star at the top of the triangle, and that's where you can find Lyra. The next brightest star in the Summer Triangle is Altair in Aquila the Eagle and the third brightest is Deneb in Cygnus the Swan. Lyra is often said to be the small harp that belonged to Apollo and was later given to Orpheus. Orpheus was so skilled at playing the harp that the music was said to charm anyone who heard it, even animals. When Orpheus played the harp, he could even charm inanimate objects like trees and rocks. Furthermore, when Orpheus joined Jason and the Argonauts, his music was able to muffle the songs of the dreaded sirens whose voices tempted the Argonauts.

Quite a few cultures saw this grouping of stars as a harp. In Wales, they refer to it as King Arthur's Harp and in Persia they called it the Lyre of Zurah. Lyra is also known as Praesepe Salvatoris (the manger of the infant Savior) and to the Incas, they saw it as Urcuchillay, a god in the form of a llama who watched over animals.

Of the 25 stars that are within the boundary for the constellation Lyra, five of those stars are bright enough to be visible with the naked eye from towns. The brightest one is of course Vega. Vega's blue-white color tells us that it is much hotter than our own yellow-orange Sun. In fact, compared to our Sun's temperature of 10 thousand degrees Fahrenheit, Vega blazes away at a fierce 17 thousand degrees Fahrenheit. Vega is also considerably larger, for while our Sun is a little

under a million miles wide, Vega is almost three million miles in diameter, which makes it easy to understand that if we could place our Sun and Vega side by side, Vega would shine 58 times brighter than the Sun.

Near Vega, there are four stars that make a parallelogram. Traveling counterclockwise from Vega, we have Zeta Lyrae, Delta Lyrae and the two on the far end are, Sulafat and Sheliak. As far as statistics go, the stars in Lyra are quite impressive. Zeta Lyrae and Delta Lyrae are both binary star systems. Zeta is 156 light years away and Delta is approximately 1,100 light years from us. By comparison, Vega is very close to us at only 25 light years away. Sulafat is 2400 times as bright as our Sun and is about 620 light years away. Meanwhile, Sheliak is over 26,000 times as bright as our Sun, has a surface temperature of over 54,000 degrees Fahrenheit and is 960 light years away. Sheliak was also mentioned in an episode of Star Trek, The Next Generation.

One last thing about Lyra. Did you know that the Sun and all the planets in our Solar System are heading towards Vega? Our Solar System is racing towards Vega at the incredible speed of 12 miles per second, and even though Vega is only 25 light years away, at this speed it would still take our Sun almost 500 million years to reach Vega.


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




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
