

MORE INSELAIR WOES



ast Monday, March 19, the num-✓ ber 1 engine of the InselAir Fokker 50 turboprop aircraft PJ-KVM, en-route from St. Maarten (SXM) to Curacao (CUR), flight 512, shut down automatically at 20,000 ft. due to an unknown failure. Repeated engine restarts were attempted, but failed. The 53 occupants were relieved when their plane returned to SXM, landing smoothly at approximately 2:53pm. The flight originally departed at 1:15pm. The emergency operations that had been initiated at the airport stood down at 3:15pm following the safe landing. Following the event InselAir was unable to put a plane in the air for several days. All its aircraft were down for repair.

To meet the demand for flights among the ABC Islands, **Divi Divi Air** used both its new Twin Otters to handle about 100 passengers. The Otters have less than half of the passenger capacity of InselAir's Fokker 50s which are supposed to fly four flights each day. Aruba Airlines was flying its normal daily BON-CUR flight as well. InselAir normally has two operational Fokker 50s for all its ABC Island and St. Maarten flights.

►It was reported earlier that InselAir wants to acquire three aircraft of its own, with financing of \$1.5 million almost complete. In addition, the company plans to lease aircraft to save on maintenance costs. The airline is still under deferment of payment of its past debts.

Last week Jan Heppener was named as the new CEO of Insel Air. He replaces Gilles Filliatreault, who leaves on 1 April. The 70-year-old Heppener is a figurehead of Dutch aviation having worked for 45 years for Martin Air, Air Holland, Transavia, ArkeFly and Corendon Dutch Airlines.

► The Hague - Staff shortages at the **Dutch Ministry of Defense can lead to** reduction of the strength of the armed forces that are stationed on Curação, Aruba and Sint Maarten at a time of strained relations with Venezuela.

Chairman Jean Debie of the trade union for defense personnel, the VBM (yes, Dutch military are unionized) has been warning for some time about the consequences of the growing outflow. Last week it was announced that 73 marines left in the first quarter of 2018, three times as many as in previous years.

"This is not yet the case at the moment because the troops are being sent out for three years," says Debie. The good news is that assignment to the Caribbean is high on the wish list of many military personnel. Debie is committed to continuing the presence of Defense on the islands. "They are part of the Kingdom. We have tasks to do

▶Work on the rebuilding of Bonaire's center pier is progressing steadily. A steelwork is being built under the water to make the forms for concrete pouring. Local workers who are qualified are being hired. The contractor, the Knoll company, wants as many local people as possible to work on the project.

Do you have a complaint about a government department that you cannot seem to come to an agreement with? Would you like to be heard about your complaints and speak to one of the representatives yourself? Then take yourself to Jong Bonaire beginning Monday, March 25, from 5pm to 7pm, to speak with a representative of the National Ombudsman. In the European Netherlands citizens must first show an attempt

to consult with their adversaries before meeting with the Ombudsman, a requirement not mandatory in the BES Islands.

▶ Fifty-seven-year-old Rignald H., the Coast Guard officer who became complicit in the robbery that resulted in the death of police officer Ferry Bakx in 2016 has been jailed for 12 months as requested by the Prosecution. He passed flight and navigational movements of the Coast Guard to his brother-in-law who coordinated the robbery. He violated his oath of secrecy. Rignald had worked for the Coast Guard for 25 years.

►In recent weeks seismographs in Grenada have been recording tremors from the underwater volcano, Kick 'em Jenny, which can erupt at any time. The volcano is 8 km from Grenada and about 750 km from Bonaire.

Boats sailing in the area are requested to stay away from the underwater volcano after the increase in seismic activity increased significantly in recent days.

Kick 'em Jenny is one of the most active volcanoes in the eastern Caribbean Sea above Trinidad and Tobago. It is 1200 meters high and the top is 200 meters under water. Prof. Richard Robertson, from the West Indies Seismic Research Center (SRC) in Trinidad, said that there is no indication that the increased seismic activity could generate a tsunami.

He explains that an eruption probably would not expel enough material to move

JELLYFISH ALERT FOR BONAIRE

Tropical islands like
Bonaire are surrounded by warm seas
that are pleasant to swim
in. But there are times
when human swimmers
must take care because
other creatures are swimming too. STINAPA reports an increase in the
number of jellyfish near
the shore. This is due to a
combination of plankton
bloom, which attracts jellyfish, and strong east wind

lyfish, and strong east wind. There are several types to be aware of:

PORTUGUESE MAN OF WAR

It is a *cnidarian*, an invertebrate life form that include corals, sea anemones, sea jellies, sea pens, and hydras. The Portuguese Man of War has a segment of about 25 cm. in diameter filled with a gas. The gas floats it to catch the wind to "sail." It has very long, thin, up to **70-meter-long** tentacles to stun its prey. Usually the Portuguese Man of War lives in colonies far out at sea. During wind reversals, however, they can come close to the coast. A sting is extremely painful.

BONAIRE BANDED BOX JELLYFISH

The time around full moon is the mating season of the box jellyfish, *Tamoya ohboya*. Jellyfish mate in the evening near the coast. Swimming is not recommended during this time. It is a translucent "balloon" swimming sideways. The sting is very painful and can be dangerous.



Each month during the first 10 days after the full moon a couple of these box jellies are spotted on Bonaire.

COMB JELLYFISH

Comb jellies are oval shaped box jelly-fish with a bright striped "comb" with which they propel themselves. These jellyfish **do not sting**. And they are great food for sea turtles! The spot winged comb jelly glows in the dark when something moves. Wave your hand in the water when you see them. A beautiful sight!

Medical Assistance And Self-Help

In 2016, the hospital on Bonaire put protocols in place for bites and stings, including those of jellyfish. Self-help tools are hot salt water, vinegar (note: not for stings from the Portuguese Man of War) and the medicine, Sting No More, available at dive shops and pharmacies. Do not use: urine, fresh water, scratching or rubbing. \square *Press release/G.D.*

woman who sewed clothes in order to make money to raise her children. We were six boys and four girls. When I was very young I was already doing housework like I was an older person, so there wasn't much time to play. It wasn't a carefree childhood and my house was not a peaceful home. My father was never home, he was working and he died when he was 42. I felt a lack of fatherly love and protection. My mom was more concerned about putting food on the table – which was her way of showing us love—but for a child growing up it wasn't enough.

I had many questions of why life was like it was. Then, one day, sitting at the back of the house, I looked at the sky and I thought, 'there must be something out there.' I was going to the Catholic Church but I was still searching. Every time when there were troubles at home I talked to Him who was living in that sky, but I had not met Him... yet. Then one day, my mom let me go to Curacao to spend time with my grandmother who was a devout Catholic. My grandmother told me she'd heard this pastor, Kenneth Thijm, preaching on TV and it touched her deeply. The very next Sunday she attended his service and when the pastor did an altar call, my grandmother went forward. The pastor prayed for her and miraculously she got healed from an arm that had been off and on dislocated from the shoulder joint for 36 years. So when my grandmother told me about what had happened I said to her I wanted to know that God that has so much power. I went to the church and there I had a life experience with God and I gave my life to Jesus. Since that moment I never felt alone again and I came to realize my reason and purpose in life. I was 13.

I went back to Bonaire where I finished high school at 17. Then I told my mother I wanted to go to bible school to become a missionary and a preacher. I went to Curacao to New Life Bible College where I was one of the first students. After I studied for three years they wanted to send us as missionaries into the world, but I wanted to go to Holland to continue my studies at Johan Maasbach Bible School.

Once in Holland it appeared I was too late to enter the school year so I started

working and took some courses. Then I like a modecided to return to Bonaire. I was full of fire for the Lord and I wanted everybody to know about Him. On Bonaire I started preaching and teaching and it wasn't easy because the Catholic pastor had handed out children.

All the people of the church had left me because of the divorce and I was alone with my problem. There was nobody to give me advice but my one and best friend, God.

When Kenneth first came to my office to fill in the forms, he saw I was very upset. He took my face in his hands and said, 'Sweetheart, I can see you're having problems, but I want to tell you one thing: God is bigger than your problems.' Those words

Before he met me, Kenny had gone through a tough divorce, and it came to a point that one day when he was driving in Miami he asked God for him to have an accident and die. But then the Lord spoke to his heart and told him he would go to Bonaire where he would marry a Bonairean woman. The moment he walked into my office he knew he had found her! It was

Then, in 2002, the Lord spoke to me, telling me I should start a Ministry from

Prayer and Intercession Foundation. I started the church services at my house and I have seen and still see many miracles happen in the lives of people: healing, deliverance and salvation.

When the real estate market dropped a bit I decided to take a job at Van der Tweel supermarket where I became the head supervisor. I worked in that position for more than four years with a lot of pleasure, but I never stopped working in real estate and people always knew where to find me. Stephan, my second son, finished school in Holland and is working for IND and he's married. My daughter Emily is studying architecture in Italy and my son Erich finished high school, did MBO (intermediate vocational education) and is taking a sabbatical now.

Last year I decided to go back into real estate full-time and from January 1st this year I started with **Mi Kas Realty** (info@mi-kas.com) and it's going very well. Besides that, I am also working with the Ministry, preaching and teaching. We obtained a plot of land in Belnem where the Ministry is going to build a multifunctional building where all kinds of activities with children, youngsters and older people will be held. 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o stay hydrated, you need about 2 to 3 liters (9 to 12 cups) of fluids every day. Being active increases your needs due to the fluids you lose through

Depending on the sport or exercise you do, its intensity, the weather, and your individual sweat rate, you could lose anywhere from 0.3 to 2.4 liters (about $1\frac{1}{4}$ to 10 cups) of sweat per hour. It's easy to see how exercising in hot weather can lead to large sweat losses, but it can also happen in cold weather sports like hockey and skiing and even in water sports like swimming.

If you don't drink enough to replace your sweat losses, you can become dehydrated. This can leave you overheated, tired and hurt your performance. Signs of dehydration are thirst, dizziness, headache and muscle cramps. Severe dehydration can increase the risk for heat illness and heat stroke.

Steps you can take:

Stay Hydrated

- Drink throughout the day. Choose water most of the time, but 100% fruit juice, milk, tea, coffee, and sports drinks also provide fluids.
- Check the color of your urine. Plenty of pale yellow (e.g. lemonade color) urine is a sign you are well hydrated. A small amount of dark yellow (e.g. apple juice color) urine could mean that you are dehydrated.
- Drink enough fluids during exercise. To know if you are drinking enough to replace fluid losses, weigh yourself just before and right after you exercise. Be sure to empty your bladder and remove sweaty clothing before weighing. If you lose more than 2% of your body weight during exercise, it means that you need to drink more. For example, a 70 kg (154 lb) person who loses more than 1.4 kg (3 lb) during exercise is not drinking enough. Weight loss right after exercise is water loss, not fat loss. Fat loss occurs slowly over days, weeks and months.
- Choose water or a sports drink during exercise. Sports drinks can be useful in the following situations:
- intense exercise
- exercise lasting longer than one hour
- exercise that takes place in hot or humid weather
- when you wear heavy sports equipment like in football and hockey
- when you have more than one sporting event per day, such as in a soccer tournament. In addition to providing fluids, sports drinks provide energy (carbohydrates) for your muscles and brain and electrolytes (salts) to replace what you lose during exercise.
- Avoid carbonated soft drinks, fullstrength juice, fruit drinks or energy drinks during intense exercise. These drinks prevent you from drinking enough to be hydrated as they may cause stomach upset and are too high in sugar for best absorption.
- Avoid over hydration. While it's important to drink plenty of fluids when



you exercise, it is also important not to drink too much. Drinking too much, either before, during or after exercise, can cause low blood sodium levels (hyponatremia), which can be danger-

Symptoms of hyponatremia include:

- o swollen hands and feet
- o vomiting
- o confusion
- o wheezing
- o weight gain during exercise or a competition
- o in rare cases, even death.
- Use your thirst as a guide. If you aren't sure how much you should be drinking, pay attention to your thirst and review the following fluid guidelines.

Fluids before, during, and after exer-

Here are some guidelines for how much fluid you may need to drink to stay hydrated and perform at your best. Individual needs may vary. To help your body absorb the fluids you drink, sip them slowly rather than drinking them all at

- 4 hours before exercise —Drink 250 to 500 mL (1 to 2 cups) of fluid.
- 2 hours or less before exercise —Drink 125 to 375 mL (½ to 1½ cups) of fluid if you have not urinated or only produced a small amount of dark yellow urine.

During exercise —Sip fluid during your activity. Avoid gaining weight, which can be a sign of over hydration.

Immediately after exercise —If you drank regularly during your workout and there was no weight change, drink according to your thirst for the rest of the day. If you didn't drink enough and lost weight, drink 500 to 750 ml. (2 to 3 cups) of fluid per 0.5 kg (1 lb) of weight you lost. Water is a good choice, but milk, 100% fruit juice, and sports drinks are also options as well as high water-containing foods like fruit, vegetables and yogurt. *Lucinda* van der Wardt

The First Catholic Gift Shop



oming to Bonaire is the Coromoto Gift Shop, the first Catholic gift shop in the Diocese of Curaçao, a diocese that serves not only the islands of Bonaire and Curaçao but also Aruba, Saba, St. Eustatius, and St. Martin.

Built in only seven weeks, the Gift Shop is one of two major projects Pastor

The second project is the renovation of the Chapel of Mercy at the church, which will now house the tabernacle and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.

On a recent morning, parishioner **Juan Jose**, who is from Venezuela, was skillfully cutting tile and working with a level and tape measure to make sure everything was perfect for the renovated chapel and the sacred items that will be housed there.

Back in the gift shop building, parishioner **Yana Albertus** was busy cleaning the windows, shelves and counters in the new gift shop, getting it ready for the merchandise that will be brought in for sale.

All of this is in preparation for the grand opening of the Gift Shop and reopening of the Chapel of Mercy on Palm Sunday, March 25, after the 9am mass. That date also coincides with the four-year anniversary of Fr. Baak arriving in Bonaire and coming to our Lady of Coromoto

The Gift Shop will sell rosaries, bibles,

candles (for weddings and baptisms), statues, medals, crosses and prayer books. Most of the merchandise was purchased online from the US, Colombia and Holland. The bibles and prayer books will be available in all languages important to the people of Bonaire: Papiamentu, Spanish, English and Dutch.

There are also tables and chairs inside where people can sit, have coffee, and visit with fellow parishioners.

The Gift Shop will be open from 5 to 7pm, Monday through Friday. During the weekend it will be open on Saturday from 5 to 6pm before the English mass, and on Sunday after the 9am mass from 10 to 11am.

The Chapel of Mercy will be open from 8am to 6pm for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. The outside entrance to the chapel features a Dutch door in

Saryassum Impact



On March 19 Governor Rijna and STINAPA Director Arjan de Wolff offered a comprehensive report of the island's efforts to remove the sargassum weed

A ccording to Caribbean leaders, it's a disaster that will take at least 100,000 people and \$120 million to clean up. And its reoccurrence is a definite possibility.

Early this month huge, battery-acidstinking mats of sargassum algae demonstrated their ability to foul the beaches and near-shore waters of the Caribbean. In some places the mats were 10 feet deep. These great piles of seaweed can kill off native species and result in ocean dead zones when they rob waters of nutrients and then die off, pulling lifegiving oxygen out of the water by decomposition.

Environmental forecasters say more events like this are to come, fueled by increasing farm fertilizer-fed nutrients in the sea, warmer ocean temperatures, a slowing of the Gulf Stream, erosion of Amazon Forest soils and a decline in biodiversity.

Bonaire got a large share of the weed. To clean Bonaire's sargassum invasion, that began on March 6 along the southeast coast, STINAPA, using traditional and social media outlets, mobilized hundreds of people and heavy equipment. Director de Wolff reported that his staff put in ±2,000 hours of work plus ±5,600 hours by volunteers. Thirteen dump trucks made 115 trips, fed by 13 loaders, five excavators, three bobcats and innumerable wheelbarrows and rakes. Despite the mess on the east coast, the "tourist and diving beaches" in other parts of the island were basically unaffected.

Over 15 companies and individuals sponsored machines and tools with heavy equipment, rakes, wheelbarrows, surfboards and kayaks. Other companies and individuals sponsored food and beverages for workers. More companies and individuals sponsored other necessities like meeting rooms, toilets, transport, megaphones. Over 10 companies sent organized groups of volunteers. And to top it off more than 40 companies and individuals made cash donations.

STINAPA estimated that 151,503 sq meters of sargassum covered about 15.2 hectares (37.6 acres) with a volume of 45,450 M³ to an average depth of 30 cm on Bonaire's shoreline. By the end of last week it was mostly cleaned up.



STINAPA biologist Caren Eckrich painted a grim picture of the poisonous and suffocating effects of the sargassum mats, "Many of the sea creatures perished," she repeatedly stated.

The experts seem to agree that this sargassum invasion is not an isolated incident. To minimize the impact of similar disasters STINAPA believes that Bonaire should begin to prepare, especially because tourism is the main element in the island's economy. It has already demonstrated how to reorganize and crisismanage its 28 staff and mobilize volunteers.

In his presentation STINAPA Director de Wolff went on to say an early warning system either provided by forecasters or satellites backed by a dedicated budget is a first step. Resources to investigate improved protection and prevention whether provided by watercraft, pollution booms or other means and deploy the best solution.

STINAPA and the Dutch and Island Governments should reinforce their coastal cleanup capabilities to minimize the environmental and economic damage that the ocean can deliver, be it high seas, oil spills, shipwrecks or repeats of a sargassum invasion.





The Loras Are Back!

he Echo Foundation reported that after two years of declining numbers of parrots being counted during Bonaire's annual roost count, they were very happy to tally over 1,023 birds being counted across 25 sites on Bonaire (9 inside the Washington Slagbaai Park and 16 outside). We are grateful to the enthusiastic volunteers, members of the Echo team and STINAPA Rangers for their willingness to wake up in the pre-dawn hours to sit and wait for the parrots to start their day. This was the second highest number of parrots being recorded during the annual one-day roost count.

In 2016, 900 Loras were counted, followed by only 700 in 2017! These low numbers have been partially explained by the behavior of the Loras as they dispersed themselves more and more in smaller groups and at new, sometimes unknown roost locations. Last year, several teams reported hearing Loras or seeing them flying nearby but not within the area that they were surveying. This indicates that we might have missed at least some part of the population.

This year, additional efforts were put in finding these new locations, as well as checking all of the well-known roost spots. Unfortunately, the numbers in these socalled pré-roost count checks gave us a worrying low number, indicating an actual decline in the population. New sites have been found, however, and days before the actual count, some last minute changes were made to find as many Loras as possible.

The staff of STINAPA counted inside the Washington Slagbaai Park this year with the help of some additional volunteers. Outside the park over 50 volunteers visited 18 different sites. The Loras are counted in a simultaneous count, which requires everyone to set off in the very early morning (pre-dawn) hours to locations all over the island. As the Loras wake up and depart from the tree where they've been sleeping, they are counted. Each Lora is only counted once. By adding the numbers which have been simultaneously counted

across all the sites, the organizers are able to get a sense of the minimum number of Loras on the island. This annual census is important for parrot conservation on Bonaire and for protecting the Yellowshouldered Amazon Parrot (Amazona barbadensis) globally

This year's count was organized by Echo, in association with STINAPA and the Department of Environment and Nature of the public entity.

Our gulls and terns are you'll miss back! Although it), Laugh-Laughing Gulls are loud and sometimes annoying, I love it when these migratory seabirds return to Bonaire in March and April because their call reminds me of the beach and of summer. Laughing Gulls, named for their call that sounds like "ha ha ha," are rather large and easily recognized by their clearly defined black heads. They are not easily frightened by people and sometimes even steal food from beach-goers and fishermen (as well as from other birds).

If you are a keen nature lover, you are in for a treat in the coming month. Terns, gulls, stilts (and other birds) are all fattening up in preparations for breeding. They will perform elaborate courtship displays and chase off competing suitors. Laughing Gulls will put their heads toward the ground, toss their heads backwards, call, flap their wings, etc., etc. Once they choose a mate, the pair will build a nest on the ground. These nests tend to be extremely camouflaged. After mating (don't blink or

ing Gulls will lay two to four eggs that the parents take turns incubating for approximately three weeks. Then the

fuzzy chicks hatch and then the real work begins - feeding those hungry mouths! It takes a little over a month before the chicks fledge. As you may imagine, this is a very dangerous time for the little chicks. In the past, they might be eaten by other, larger birds. However, there are now many wild (feral) cats (and dogs) roaming many islands that often eat seabird eggs and chicks.


Seabird populations worldwide are suffering from commercial fishing (accidental bycatch) and predation from invasive species (rats, mice and feral dogs and cats). If you think about it, in the past, islands didn't have these species of mammals preying on seabird nests. What can you do to



help? From April to August, Please be extra careful when walking along the coast. If seabirds are flying above you or dive-bombing your head OR you hear agitated birds squawking at you, then slowly back away. You are probably close to their nest. Because the eggs and babies are so small and very camouflaged, it's easy to accidentally crush them. And if you think there are nests nearby, please don't hang around trying to find them. Why? When you approach a nest, the parents leave the nest exposed and the longer the eggs and/or baby birds are left baking in the sun, the less chance they will survive.

Private Plane Tourism

How many cruise ships does it take to equal the economic impact of single "Fly-In" Rally? The pilots of the 14 planes and their passengers, 35 people, stayed overnight in Bonaire hotels, ate in our restaurants, purchased fuel, rented cars and did the "normal" touristy things... in a big way.

We don't know the answer but we do know that Bonaire was perhaps the favorite stop of the international private pilot aviation event that started in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, on March 12 and will fly a total of 4,146 NM, visiting 10 Caribbean countries including The Bahamas, Grand Turk, Anguilla, Tobago, Colombia, Panama, Costa Rica, Roatan, and Mexico, before returning to Florida on March 29. Flying times between destinations vary from two to six hours depending on distance and the aircraft's speed. Take-offs are staggered, with the slowest planes leaving first, so the landings are more or less simultaneous. Each aircraft is equipped with a "black box" that continuously transmits the plane's location while underway. You can track their progress on the website https://airbly.com/

The planes are relatively small, mostly single-engine, carrying

from two to six persons. It's expensive not only to enter the event, inspect the planes and climb inaround \$3,000 per person, but to that must be added the fuel cost, maintenance, insurance and the expenses for 18 days. Part of the fees go for charitable donations and supplies for schools in undeveloped countries. The Rally aims at increasing awareness of aviation. The event included pilots from the US, Canada and Switzerland and was conducted in collaboration with hosting destinations. Seminars, workshop, flight formation clinics and orientations prepare the participants. Bonaire's TCB did an outstanding job of making the flying visitors wel-

One of the challenges facing international travelers these days is Customs, Immigration and Border Control formalities and private air travelers are no exception. To ease the entry of the planes and passengers, the TCB greeted the arrivals and helped walk them through the formalities. Catherine Tobenos, the coordinator of the Rally, exclaimed that it was one of the smoothest entries of the trip.

While on Bonaire the Rally hosted a visit by local schoolchildren from of Kolegio Kristu Bon Wardado and Kolegio San

Bernardo who were allowed to side, take the controls and imagine they were flying high.

A number of the crews went diving and exclaimed about the beauty of Bonaire's reefs. And they didn't have to worry about a no-fly requirement after dives because, in the words of one pilot, "We fly low."

Unfortunately, the Swiss entry didn't make it to Bonaire because of a landing accident in Anguilla when the plane's propeller hit the ground. And another plane had minor mechanical problems and was being checked out by Bonaire aircraft mechanics.

Technical coordination for Bonaire was ably handled by local private pilot Wietze Koopman.

Long-time Bonaire resident Rene Hakkenburg said fly-ins are actually not new to Bonaire. In the 60s it was fairly common for groups of private aircraft to visit Bonaire. They usually originated in South America.

HARVEST TIME

e've had a good rainy season and now a good harvest too.

Everything in my yard grew like crazy. It's nice to have a lot of fruit and vegetables now but less nice is all those weeds which pop up just as soon as you finish weeding and trimming. Certain parts of my yard are like a jungle. Look at the lower photo. In a few months I got, just like that, a papaya jungle. I guess when I watered there were some seeds in the water and that's how my papaya jungle started. And you know, for the first time I got papaya fruit too, after all those years of trying so many trees but never getting papayas!

So never give up, you never know!

Not only are fruit trees growing like a jungle in my yard because of plenty of rain. In my neighbor's garden the typical Bonairean bacoba plants (sweet finger banana) grew up into real bushes full of bunches of bacoba. Nature is a really strong force when conditions are perfect.

So have you noticed that there is a fruit explosion on Bonaire? Look and you'll see fruit trees—mangos, guaba, mispel, carambola (star fruit), pommegrate, bacoba, cashew fruit, coco, tamarin, cherries(shimaruku), golden apple, birambi, papaya, appeldam, sea grapes, amandel, yellow - and water melon.

OUR WHEELCHAIR-CHALLENGES ON BONAIRE, PART 6.



f you are well and do not suffer from any ailment or impediment and you can always do whatever you want, go where you want to go and with nothing to keep you, it is very hard to imagine how life is for a person who suffers from limitations.

But believe you me, life is a bitch when your body does not do what it is supposed to do, when you have to depend on other persons to help you to get what you want, to do what you want. And you always have to compromise. As soon as you get sick, your life starts being the life of others, because you need them. And the waiting starts, waiting for everything: the doctor, the therapist, the lab technician, an appointment, even in front of the special bathroom (because an able-bodied person is using it).

You cannot travel as you please. You always need special help, special forms to fill out, and so on...

That is why the taskforce and platform for $\,$ it would be. \square accessibility of which MiVaBo is a part wants to make life better and make sure that these things improve. MiVaBo offers as-

sessments of your shop, your home, your office, your airport. They make a walkthrough, ask many questions and bring a huge list of requirements, measurements and more to make sure that your building complies and that it is accessible for persons with any limitation.

Almost two years ago a large group of persons with limitations paid B.I.A. a visit. They came in wheelchairs, with walkers, with a scooter and with their red & white stick. The location was inspected, while they got a tour of the place. After that they sat down with the management and the form was filled out, tips were exchanged and promises were made.

As soon as the renovation will start, this list will be a guide for the contractor, and we do sincerely hope that as soon as the new airport is up and done it will be perfect and accessible for everybody.

And that, combined with that awesome Aviramp[®], traveling will be a smooth thing for everybody with limitations.

If you are going to build a new office, shop, etc. you must contact DROB first. They will give you any information you may need in order for you to build something fit for persons with limitations, according to the law.

Homes also need to be fit to live in for persons with limitations. Oftentimes the bathrooms are the first things that need to get adapted. Thresholds need to be removed, the doors need to get wider, a special stool has to be placed to make sitting down and showering easier, the toilet needs to get replaced by a higher one.

A special chair will be needed, for the person to sit more comfortably, a higher bed is needed to make help more accessible, and at last... the path to and from the road needs to get hardened and wheelchair-accessible, because the help "starts at the gate" and not at the front door.

If your home needs to be adapted, you can

contact MiVaBo. They will tell you how to get this help and where to go and most of all.. how much this will cost. Not everything is for free, although we wish much of the time

Spray often with some this way too—by only growing it all by vinegar or ammonia to prevent an infestation of these insects in your yard and close to your house.

Besides fruit I've gotten a lot of vegetables too: eggplants, peppers, spinach, tajerblad, purslane. They don't look as

nice and as big as in the supermarkets, but to me they mean the healthiest sweetest vegetables I consume. They're unsprayed, they grow in healthy soil under the sun. They're picked when my pot. They're not stored in a fridge or cooler, just from my yard to my mouth. You can enjoy your fruit and vegetables yourself.

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

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2018'S 2ND BLUE MOON ON MARCH 31

ast month, February 2018, had no full **⊿ Moon.** Did you miss it? But don't fret or blame it on climate change because March will have two full Moons. And one of them will be blue. Most Blue Moons are not blue in color.

The name Blue Moon used to indicate something rare. Not anymore! Popular culture has defined several kinds of Blue Moons. The next one will be March 31. Our last was on January 31, 2018. It was a supermoon, too, and underwent a total eclipse. But another Blue Moon is coming right up.

They're both Blue Moons by the monthly definition of the term: the second of two full Moons to fall within a single calendar month. The second (and last) Blue Moon of 2018 will be on March 31. We haven't had a year with two Blue Moons since 1999 and won't have one again until January and March, 2037.

Using the name Blue Moon to describe the second full Moon of a calendar month is now the best-known and most popular definition. By this definition, there was a Blue Moon on July 31, 2015, and then – of course - the recent one on January 31, 2018.

The time between one full Moon and the next is close to the length of a calendar month. So the only time one month can have two full Moons is when the first full Moon happens in the first few days of the month. This happens every two to three years, so these sorts of Blue Moons come about that often.

The idea of a Blue Moon as the second full Moon in a month stemmed from the March 1946 issue of Sky and Telescope magazine, which contained an article called, "Once in a Blue Moon," by James Hugh Pruett. Pruett was referring to the 1937 Maine Farmer's Almanac, but he inadvertently simplified the definition. He wrote:

Seven times in 19 years there were — and still are — 13 full Moons in a year. This

gives 11 months with one full Moon each and one with two. This second in a month, so I interpret it, was called Blue Moon.

Later, this definition of Blue Moon was also popularized by a book for children by Margot McLoon-Basta and Alice Sigel, called Kids' World Almanac of Records and Facts, published in New York by World Almanac Publications in 1985. The secondfull-Moon-in-a-month definition was also used in the board game Trivial Pursuit.

Today, it has become part of folklore. As the folklorist **Philip Hiscock** wrote in his comprehensive article, "Folklore of the Blue Moon: Old folklore it is not, but real folklore it is."

Can a Moon be blue in color? Yes, but it's very rare to see a blue-colored Moon. You need unusual sky conditions - certain-sized particles of dust or smoke – to create them.

Blue-colored Moons aren't predictable. The sorts of Moons people commonly call Blue Moons aren't usually blue. Bottom line: A blue-colored Moon is rare. But folklore has defined two different kinds of Blue Moons, and Moons that are Blue by name have become pretty common. The next Blue Moon is March 31, 2018 . □ Bruce McClure and Deborah Byrd
