But there is a "catch." The investments above will be made "the moment that there is good governance and sound financial management." State Secretary Knops is in contact with the executive council of Bonaire about the improvements that are necessary and the way he can support them in this. The State Secretary would like to come to a governmental agreement with the public entity of Bonaire, in which priority themes are covered and in which further concrete detailing is given to good governance. The resources for the projects for Bonaire will be assigned as soon as this governmental agreement is ready, when there is agreement on good governance and financial management and the management plans for the projects are ready.

▶People who need special social support for illness or disabilities like home cleaning, meal supply, transportation and handyman work on houses, can now get it via the Health Insurance Office BES (ZVK). Although the Dutch Social Support Act (Wet

Maatschappelijke Ondersteuning WMO) does not apply to the BES Islands, an agreement for Bonaire's Fundashon Kuido pa Bista i Oido (FKBO) was adopted last week.

►InselAir is again expanding. It started new flights from Curacao to St. Maarten and Paramaribo on June 28 and July 6, respectively, with an E190 leased from Conviasa (Venezuela). Meanwhile, Maduro & Curiel's Bank (Curacao) and a consortium of other InselAir lenders got some of their money back when Aerotask (UAE) successfully closed the sale of six P&W JT8D jet engines and two of their old MD80s. Next week InselAir is expected to announce its new strategic partner. Curacao Minister of Economic Development Steven Martina will choose from four candidates. The partner gets 49% of the shares. The controlling majority remains in the hands of the government of Curação.

Although not announced, the InselAir on-line website lists future CUR-MIA flights.



▶It's relatively simple for foreigners to get married here. Destination weddings have been popular for over 30 years on Bonaire. To smooth the process consider the following:

- Copy of your birth certificate, not older than one year.

older than six months.

- Certified copies of your passports.

In the event that you have been married before, you must submit a divorce certificate or death certificate from your former partner, not older than six months.

Depending on where you were born, an *apostille* or legalization of documents may be required.

In accordance with the law, the civil affairs officer may request additional documents if necessary. All this information also applies to marriages between people of the same sex.

► The final exam results for this year were much better than in previous

years. More than 81% of the community high school (SGB) exam candidates passed the end-of-year Central Examination. This is 7% higher than the three previous school years, which topped out at 74%.

Results of the different tracks

- 89% of the VMBO (Vocational) track was again the leader.
- 86% of the MAVO exam candidates passed, an increase of 18%.
- 60% of HAVO graduates are successful, 1% more than in 2017 and
- 83% of VWO graduates, by 20% more than in the last school year.

Last week the certificates and diplomas were presented to the large group of successful students.

The Chamber of Commerce wrote a letter to Lieutenant Governor Edison Rijna about the plan to close the South Pier. The news—that for renovation, the south pier would be completely closed for three months—came as a surprise for everyone on the island. The entrepreneurs who are dependent on the import of goods seem to be hit hard by this, and a number

of companies in the construction sector in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce drafted the letter and sent it to the Lieutenant Governor.

The Chamber of Commerce offered a proposal, by letter, to open the Pier twice a week in August and September so container and bulk carriers can deliver the necessary stock to the island. The letter also proposes to extend the working hours of the staff working on the pier so that there is no delay. As far as known, there is no work on the South Pier during the weekend or in the evening.

▶ Rules for drone operations are finally established for the BES Islands. Violation of the rules, according to the Public Prosecutor, can result in jail time, a fine or confiscation of the drone. Civil liability damages are applicable in situations of personal injury.

A recent verdict by the Court of First Instance in Bonaire resulted in a drone pilot receiving a suspended prison sentence and one-year probation, for illegally flying the drone over the Bonaire prison.

Guidelines:

- ◆ Drone weight under 25 kg.
- ♦ Maximum altitude 120 meters
- ♦ Prohibited to fly over prisons, crowds and active construction sites
- ♦ No night flights
- ♦ While in flight the drone must remain visible at all times.
- ♦ Prohibited to fly in the vicinity of the air traffic control tower of any airport.
- ♦ Airplanes and helicopters should always be given priority.

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PLASTIC BAG NIGHTMARE

TO ALL WHO ARE CONCERNED ABOUT THE EARTH:

Everybody in the world is crying out about living responsibly, doing the right thing, hoping that our kid's kids have a

world to live in with the possibilities we still have and that there are still places which we could call real Nature.

Everywhere in the world MONEY is the motivation behind everything: Amazonas, Nigeria, Papua New Guinea, and so on. Now this is where I have doubts about Bonaire. Rules of the Marine Park, Do Not Touch the Corals, Help the Turtles, Don't Fish... and so on.

I was in a Chinese supermarket some days ago. A customer born in Bonaire, bought four small items, two onions, some carrots, a can of something and cigarettes. Each of these items was put in a separate PLASTIC BAG, and then the four PLASTIC BAGS were put in one bigger plastic bag for easier handling.

So one customer with four items ended up for convenience with five plastic bags.......Just one question: Where do these bags end up? Mathematic is a hobby of mine, so let's do a simple calculation: 1,000 customers per day, average two bags a day, makes 2,000 plastic bags per day, times 30, makes 60,000 per month, times 12 month, equals 720,000 bags a year, let's say the last 10 years.....7,200,000 bags in the sea, in the *mondi*, at the Landfill. On the Island Since... 2000 - Kanchan Kundnani

come from the center of India; Pune is my hometown. It's a very modern metropolitan city with huge shopping malls, multiplexes and big universities. Therefore it's called the 'education hub.' It's the ninth most populous city in the country. I was born and brought up there, then I got married and came directly to Bonaire. I just followed my husband who had settled on Bonaire.

So, when I arrived here it was very, very different! In India you have friends, sisters, family, neighbors, and you are never alone. To be alone in India is the hardest thing and it hardly ever happens, because there is always someone who cares for you, even when you sneeze someone will say, 'Bless you, are you okay?'

When I came to Bonaire, to our small rental apartment, one of four, all with bars on the windows and right next to Bon Awa, the very same day the owners of Bon Awa were murdered. I got so scared and I thought, 'Is Bonaire like this?' It was freaky! But soon I found out that Bonaire was very quiet; no traffic, no people. The only thing I knew was that one neighbor had a red car and the other one a blue car, but I never saw the people and I didn't speak the language. The first word I learned was 'Si'. I would speak to my housekeeper in English, presuming the whole world knew how to speak English, but she only spoke Spanish and would answer 'Si, si si!' And I would ask my husband, what does she mean?

The first six months were very difficult. I missed my family, and smart phones or Skype didn't exist. We would go to one of the internet places and email our family. And we would take pic-

tures and have them printed at Paradise Photo. Then we would send them to the family by post and it would take one month for the pictures to arrive in India. That's how it was back then.

The only person I knew was my husband. I had no family and no friends. I was a vegetarian and the only vegetarian food you could get was batata ku pindasous (fried potato with peanut sauce) and I loved it. That was the first food from Bonaire I got introduced to. Then my husband wanted me to cook nonvegetarian food, which I didn't know how to prepare because I come from a vegetarian family and I never had even touched meat or chicken. I had never even seen it. Then he got me a whole chicken and I had to cut it up. It was a nightmare. I felt like I had killed someone and I cried for two days; it was so painful

When I started learning the ways of Bonaire and the language and when I started working in a shop I got to know people and my circle grew. I was working at the store from 8am till 8pm, then I would go home and do the chores there. I did not know how to swim but we would go for drives and we took pictures of the salt mountains and we told my family in the letter that it was snow, just joking.

In 2002 I had my first child, a boy. He was a premature baby. I had some complications and they sent me to Curacao. I thought I would be back in three days, but I came home after four months. The baby had some challenges and the first two years we had to work really hard with him, then he was much better. Now he's perfectly fine; he's 16, a big boy. The following year I took him to India so the family could see him. It was amazing to be back and be with my family and eat Indian food which is the best on this planet, but I was also happy

to return to Bonaire, and the drive from the airport to our house was the best thing to happen. It felt so good to be home. In three years I'd grown to like the peace and quiet.

In 2004 I had my second baby, again a boy. He was also born on Curação, but it went much better. His birthday is this week, the 21^s and he's going to be 14. Both boys are going to Liseo. They love to travel and explore the bigger world, and if all goes well one wants to go study in the US and the other one in Holland.

relaxes you and makes you beautiful at the same time. When I was 12 I started taking classes in henna, however, I didn't really pursue it until after I had the accident in 2015. Then I started practicing and went deeper into it. I dug out my old skills and polished them. That's how my henna journey started and now I love doing it.

To me, doing henna feels like meditation. You make people smile, they feel happy and seeing them happy makes me feel happy. I do henna at the cruise



Getting a henna tattoo is always fun... and painless

In 2014 I went to India and brought back some henna with me. Then, in 2015, I had an accident. I was working at Forma as a teacher and we had a sports day and were playing the jumping sack race. The sack was too small and it twisted around my legs and I fell and broke my leg in two, literally. They rushed me by air ambulance to Aruba for surgery and it took me 18 months to get back to normal. It was really painful, worse than having a child. But that's when I got into henna, to keep myself busy. They and downs of life. say, 'In every setback there's a gift,' and I found my gift of henna in this.

In India henna is part of the culture. When a baby is six months old we put henna on them. Henna is about beauty; it's to adorn yourself, to make yourself prettier. Firstly it's a medicinal herbal plant with a lot of benefits, like being anti-fungal, anti-viral and it helps to cool down the body temperature. So, basically when you do henna, it

ship market and I love it; the vibe is so nice. Every appointment takes around 30 minutes because it's an art and you go slow as you draw from scratch - no stencils directly on the body.

At the market you meet all different kinds of people and they gossip and chat while waiting in line and everything comes out: marriages, divorces, family affairs and the children. It goes deep and it can be a bag of goodies or a bag of worms, the ups

The henna tent sees everything. And sometimes it's so inspiring. There are people who have gone through surgery or a mastectomy and when they see me they are so excited and they say, 'I've been looking for you on all the islands.' Last time I had a girl from France who had a breast mastectomy and reconstruction but it wasn't done right. So, in the tent we created a private space and when I was done she had tears in her eyes. She took

photos to get a real tattoo of the same design when she got home. There are also people with scars who find themselves ugly. They come to me and once I've put on the henna they see the same scar as beautiful. There was a 16 year old girl from Colombia with a scar from the waist to the ankle and I turned it into a work of art, and finally she dared to wear a bikini. It really means a lot to people. Also, before getting a real tattoo, you can do henna and see if you like it and whether you should do the real tattoo or not. And if you have a body part you're not so proud of, adorn it with something beautiful, a tattoo, a piercing, or henna and then the perception of that part changes.

I am also doing private appointments, birthday parties and baby showers and bridal parties, anything. It's entertainment, it's fun. Just go to my Facebook page, Henna Studio Bonaire, and text me or call 782-1855.

I've started creating henna art as well, which I'm selling at the market, and now I'm preparing for the coming season. Next to that I teach English classes and I'm a mommy and that never finishes. I am not a party person, but I love socializing or going snorkeling with the boys and I always keep myself available for

I still travel and every place has the good and lesser things. But Bonaire feels like my home; I can travel everywhere and do everything and then I come back to my home as this is where I belong now." ■

Last week on July 10th, STINAPA ranger Luigi Eybrecht filmed a West Indian manatee (Trichechus manatus manatus) swimming near Bonaire's fringing reefs. This may be the first confirmed sighting of a manatee in Bonaire. Manatees are harmless marine mammals, also called sea cows, which feed on marine plants including sea grass, algae and even mangrove leaves. The West Indian manatee subspecies is endangered with an estimated population of 2,500 mature individuals, although very little is known about their population and distribution. Source -STINAPA. 



otholes continue to plague Bonaire, and no better example is the one on Kaya Gobernador N. Debrot, in the southbound lane in front of MCB Bank. It measures 43cm (17 inches) wide, 58cm (23 inches) long and up to 16cm (6 inches) deep. Earlier this year a tourist commented that it was so big they should put a yellow rock next to it and name it as a new dive site. Recently it reached a point where vehicles heading south had to swerve into the northbound lane into oncoming traffic to go around the pothole.

As it continued to get bigger vehicles had to start alternating who would go around the pothole. A northbound vehicle would stop allowing the southbound

car into the northbound lane to go around the pothole. Then the next southbound car would stop allowing a northbound vehicle to pass. This would go back and forth, one car at a time.

On Wednesday, July 4, 2018, Vicente H. Figaro, Head of Public Works Management for Bonaire, and his crew, were once again making a temporary patch for this pothole. Mr. Figaro explained that the government is currently in the process of getting estimates to repair all the potholes around the island. In the future, the road will be repaved, but the temporary repairs are necessary for safety.

CONSUMERS WANT ACTION

nkobon, the Consumers Union, and Henri Verhoef, initiator of Facebook Action for better roads on Bonaire featuring potted flowers in potholes, have joined forces.

In recent years, repeated and urgent attention has been requested from the government for the very poor condition of the roads on Bonaire. That the condition of the roads is so disastrous for the (traffic) safety of residents and tourists, that this leads to a lot of damage and costly repairs to vehicles, and also causes unnecessary dust nuisance on the island.

At the beginning of this year about 5,000 residents and visitors from Bonaire signed to draw attention to the poor state of maintenance of our roads. They believe life-size problem and that the policy makers / authorities here have to make real work of it.


The signatures were presented by Mr. Verhoef in February, with a petition to representatives of State Secretary Knops representing the Dutch government and to

Manatee around Bonaire. Could the sargassum weed in the sea be its food?

here was a manatee in Bonaire?

Manatees are large (up to 3.3 m long) marine mammals that are very chubby (up to 400 kg), quite adorable and swim very slowly. They eat seagrass, algae and other marine vegetation and, because of their appearance and diet, they are also called sea cows. The one seen in Bonaire last week was a West Indian Manatee two varieties or subspecies – the Antillean Manatee and the Florida Manatee.

STINAPA ranger Luigi Eybrecht was diving near Playa when he encountered a slow swimming manatee, something he never thought he would see in Bonaire. In fact, according to **Dolfi Debrot** of Wageningen University, this may very well be the first confirmed record of a West Indian Manatee in Bonaire! He should know - He was first author in an article titled, "A historical review of re-(Trichechus manatus), of which there are cords of the West Indian manatee and the American crocodile in the Dutch Antilles" (Debrot et al, 2006) in the Caribbean

Jet Bla

n electric, jet-propelled bike, originally built for fun by 13-year-old Marcel Spruit, might be another example of how residents of Bonaire are producing innovative ideas to protect the environment.

It wasn't the runway at Flamingo International Airport, but Kaya Gobernador N. Debrot that provided enough roadway for Marcel to demonstrate his unique bike.

Using two Electric Ducted Fan (EDF) Jets, normally used by hobbyists for radio controlled airplanes, Marcel mounted the jets on the rear of his Specialized Hardrock Sport bike he purchased a year earlier. "I had a design planned in my head and finished it in two to three days," he said.

Both his parents helped Marcel on his jet bike project. His father, **Jerome**, helped cut the wood needed to mount the project to the bike. His mother, **Agnieszka**, sponsored the project, which quickly totaled almost \$500. Marcel explained that his mother said, "It's a learning process so I will get you the parts. I support good hobbies."

Education is very important in the Spruit family. Marcel said, "We don't have a Wii or an X-Box in the house," adding, "I don't like sitting inside all day."

His mother tells him, "Do your homework first, then, if you have time, you can do your projects." Marcel admits with a smile, "Sometimes I try to sneak in my projects first."

Those projects included a radio-controlled

(RC) car with a propeller on the back and another RC car with an EDF jet engine mounted on it.

Marcel researched all the parts online. Two EDF Jets, \$94/each, two speed controllers, \$50/each, two batteries, \$120 for the set, and the receiver and remote, \$15.

When fully charged, the batteries provide 7.8 HP and provide enough power for each jet engine to produce 3.5 kilos of thrust, for a combined total of 7 kilos of thrust. The thrust produced was so strong it broke the metal mounting frame that attached the jet engine assembly to the bike. Marcel had to secure it with tie-wraps..

Since it takes three to four hours to charge each battery, and remember there are two

batteries to charge, and yield only about five to 10 minutes of operational time, Marcel explains, "It was built more for fun than transportation."

Noticing the limited operational time, his father suggested that Marcel add a generator. Of course Marcel had already figured out that adding a generator was not possible, explaining to his dad, and anybody else who asks, that the connection plug is already being used to provide power to the speed controllers and the jets.

Marcel, and his family have lived on Bonaire for almost eight years. He just finished his first year at LiseoBoneriano High School. After his second year he will have to start choosing his major. He says it will involve physics, chemistry, and technology. After high school he hopes to attend Delft University of Technology in Holland. Besides his hobbies and projects, Marcel is a competitive swimmer with the Barracuda Swimming Club on Bonaire.

A small crowd gathered around Marcel and his bike recently in the parking lot outside Zhung Kong on Kaya Gobernador N. Debrot, as he explained and demonstrated his project to the onlookers. Everybody was impressed with the thought and detail he put into his work, along with the amount of wind power the two jet fans generated.

Marcel almost surely owns the only jet powered bike on Bonaire. As he finished explaining his project, he added with great pride and excitement, "I almost forgot the most important thing. I can get a maximum speed of 50 km (31 miles) per hour!"

That speed was quite evident as he engaged the jet engines, via the speed control-





lers on his handle bar, and rocketed home north quickly getting smaller and smaller in view to anyone watching. □Story & Photos by Alan Zale

Menopause and Weight Gain

enopause (the time in a woman's life when periods stop) usually happens between the ages of 45-55 years. As well as a loss of fertility, other physical changes may happen including an increase in blood pressure, changes in cholesterol levels and weakening of the bone. These symptoms are mainly due to falling estrogen levels and can last for just a few months or for several years. The range of symptoms and how severe they are, can be different for each woman. Early symptoms can include weight gain, hot flushes, night sweats, irritability, poor concentration, more frequent headaches, joint pains and irregular or heavy periods. Over the long -term, loss of estrogen increases the risk of heart disease and bone weakness.

WEIGHT GAIN

During menopause, muscle mass reduces, meaning that fewer calories may be needed. Over time this can lead to weight gain. Being careful about energy intake and doing more physical activity can help prevent weight gain. Thirty minutes of fast walking a day could lead to around 7kg (15lb) weight loss in a year, and also reduce the risk of heart disease. From the age of about 35, there is a slow loss of calcium from the bones in both men and women. However, this increases during menopause because of the loss of estrogen..

Many nutrients help keep bones healthy, so it's important that the diet is balanced. You can do this by choosing a variety of foods and consuming plenty of fruit, vegetables and foods from the milk and dairy group as these are a source of calcium. For most women this would mean aiming for two to three portions of calcium-rich foods every day like semi skimmed milk, cheese, yoghurt or a milk -based pudding like custard or rice pudding. Vitamin D is also very important for bone health. It is made in the skin in response to sunlight.

Women over the age of 65, those with dark skin from African, African-Caribbean and South Asian backgrounds or who have low sunlight exposure tolerance should consider taking a vitamin D supplement of 10 mcg per day all year round.

Foods that contain vitamin D include: oily fish, cod liver oil, red meat, butter and margarine, fortified cereals, and eggs.

HEART HEALTH

It is thought that during menopause a woman's risk of developing heart disease registered dietitian goes up to the same level as man's of the and sports instructor same age. There are some very simple lifestyle changes you can make to reduce the risk:

Eat fewer saturated and trans fats:

-Cut down on fatty meat products, choose lean cuts of meat, avoid processed meat products.



- Cut back on fats and oils high in saturates such as lard, ghee, and coconut oil. - Use fats that are high in unsaturated fat (monounsaturates and polyunsaturates), such as rapeseed, olive and sunflower oils/spreads, avocado, unsalted nuts, and
- Choose semi-skimmed, 1% or skimmed milk rather than whole dairy products - Grill rather than fry foods whenever
- possible and go easy with creamy and cheesy sauces (e.g. carbonara).
- Reduce your intake of processed foods such as crisps, biscuits and pies. -Reduce your intake of refined sugars like sweets, cakes and soft drinks.
- Moderate intake of caffeine from drinks like coffee, tea and colas or choose decaffeinated drinks if you are sensitive to its stimulatory effects. Keep to sensible alcohol limits – no more than 2-3 units per day or avoid altogether if you feel it makes symptoms worse.
- Reduce salt by avoiding processed foods like ready meals and cooking
- Aim for at least two portions of fish per week, one which should be oily fish like canned sardines, mackerel, salmon, fresh tuna, trout and herrings.
- Eat a minimum of five different colored fruits and vegetables each day
- Eat some fiber containing foods every day: Oats, wholegrain cereals and breads as well as pulses like lentils, chickpeas and beans are all excellent sources.

What about plant estrogens?

Plant estrogens are a group of substances found in plant foods such as soy and red clover. They are similar, but much weaker than human estrogen. It is thought that if they are eaten regularly they may have positive health benefits including reducing hot flushes and improving levels of fat in the blood, but more research is needed before the helpful benefits of plant estrogen are proven. Sources of plant estrogen include calcium-enriched soya products like milk, yoghurts and soya and linseed breads or a red clover supplement.

If you think you might want to take nutritional supplements, get some advice from your dietitian, doctor or pharmacist. Lucinda van der

s the construction of a major new hotel about to begin? Three large, blue shipping containers, along with some fencing, appeared at the Hato traffic circle, near the entrance to the old ex-Bonaire/Sunset Beach at the end of last month. In 2016, the mega tour group TUI announced plans to construct a \$30 million, 197-room, "green" resort with full public access to the beach, on the site of the original Bonaire Beach, later Sunset Beach Hotel. It will be named the Chogogo Hotel under the Time to Smile brand, similar to the TUI Chogogo resort on Curacao. Construction was to begin in web, though last updated in 1998. The the second half of 2017 with completion $2\frac{1}{2}$ years later.

Once a showcase resort hotel with casino attracting vacationers from the US, Sunset Beach closed approximately 20 years ago. The property sat abandoned for many years, eventually being destroyed by a fire and then finally torn down.

It has sat mostly vacant, until the nowpopular Coco Beach Bar was constructed in a corner of the property. Signs came and went announcing projects that were to be built on the site but never materialized. Ironically, prices and accommodation information about the old Sunset Beach Hotel can still be found on the original Sunset Beach Hotel sign, faded over time by the elements and partially covered by flyers, still stands. □ Photo & story by Alan Zale

I started already (oh yes, I'm right there making use of all these natural elements) with young tomato plants, sweet pepper, string beans, pumpkin, eggplants, hot pepper, yambo, bitter melon, tajerblad, red and green spinach, purslyn and herbs like yerbihole, basil, oregano, lemon grass, mint, bislips and cinnamon plant. I also have seeds from young papaya plants, carambola plants, cashew plants and cherry plants. Fruits that I pick in my yard are papaya, carambola, coco,

I had friends over for lunch a few days ago. I did not need to buy a lot. All the fruits and vegetables I picked from my garden. My guests were surprised with the great lunch prepared with fresh stuff from my garden, just picked an hour ago. How much more healthy could it be?

Of course I planted some flower seeds too. I tried some difficult ones like Afrikaantjes. They came up but they cannot stand this hot climate. So I put it them in the shade, out of the strong wind. It's a try out; I like to experiment. White and purple magdaleentjes (periwinkle), cats tails, stanvaste and different kalanchoe pop up everywhere in the yard.

Root plants with flowers became a jungle in my backyard, just in one week because of so much rain coming from the roof on top of them.

And what to say about my orchids? They are my pride. Look at the photos. I never saw them like that. One of them had flowers for the first time. Its a miracle and it has a story. I was in Medellin walking around at a flower market when a man was just emptying his bucket with

Journal of Science. Yes - American Crocodiles are sometimes spotted in the Dutch islands as well (Klein Curacao in the early 1930's)! They also mentioned that manatee fossils were found in Bonaire near Fontein dating back to the Pleistocene (12,000 - 2.5 million years ago).

Although Antillean manatees are often seen in Belize, Mexico and the Dominican Republic and their range extends throughout the coastal areas of the Caribbean, Central America and South America, Bonaire is thought to be too small and isolated with too little food to attract manatees. Which makes you wonder what this lonely manatee was up to. Perhaps he/she was lost and just passing through?

The Antillean subspecies is endangered (the Florida one as well) and the population is estimated to be less than 2500 mature individuals and declining. Recent DNA results suggest that there might actually be three subspecies – not two: one from Florida and the Greater Antilles, one from Mexico, Central America and northern South America west of the Lesser Antilles and one from northeastern South America. The one Luigi saw was most likely the second one. There's so much we still don't know!

Why are they endangered? Like the now extinct Steller's Sea Cow and the Caribbean Monk Seal, manatees were (and still are in some places in Central and South America) hunted for their meat and other usable parts. Even though many countries have created laws to protect them from being hunted, manatees swim very slowly and often feed on seagrass in shallow water, and, as a result, many are struck and killed every year by boats and boat propellers. Yet another reason for staying alert and boating at low speeds in shallow

Fun Fact: manatees have whiskers all over their bodies called vibrissae. These whiskers are ultra-sensitive. Facial whiskers aid in finding/sensing food and other items and even move food towards the mouth. Body whiskers are believed to be able to detect water movements/currents.

I've had the pleasure of encountering manatees twice in my life: once while diving on a shallow coral reef several miles offshore in Puerto Rico; once when kayaking with my

family in Bradenton Beach, Florida. The ones in Florida were so gentle and curious that they would come right up to the kayak and nudge it possibly using their vibrissae – to investigate. Our oceans are incredible and diverse and I am of the strong opinion that patience, persistence and curiosity is always rewarded with fabulous finds. Go find yours!

PET SAFETY TIPS

It's definitely summer time on Bonaire! For the and le next three months we can expect very hot days. in the While we humans can complain about it, our pets are not gifted with the linguistic ability to tell us how hot they are. As temperatures increase, it is imperative that we keep our pets cool and safe so here are some hot weather safety tips to help you do that.

- Do not take your dog on errands in the car. Dogs cool themselves by panting which exchanges warm body temperature for cooler air outside. If the outside air isn't significantly cooler than their body temp, their cooling system doesn't work and they can get heatstroke. Studies show that on a 89 degree day (32 C.), temps inside a car (even with windows slightly open) can raise to 109 degrees (43 C.) in 10 minutes and 123 degrees (51 C.) in 30 minutes! Temps in dark colored cars can rise even more, reaching temps of 200 degrees (93 C.)! Is taking your dog with you on an errand worth risking its life?
- Provide constant access to clean cool water at home; ice in their water buckets; a few water bowls in different places. Deep bowls of cool water will stay cool longer than shallow bowls
- Always provide more than one drinking bowl on hot days in case one gets tipped over and keep the bowls in shade so the water can stay as cool as possible.
- Provide shade and shelter from the sun, even if you have provided a kennel/dog house, it must be in a shaded place.
- Provide a small paddle pool for your dogs, and for cats a couple of wet towels on the floor for it to cool down on if required.
- Freeze large containers of water (in ice cream containers) to make big ice blocks for dogs to play with and chew on or put in the dog or cat's water bowl. This helps to keep them cool and hydrated. "Pupsicles" will also keep dogs happy and entertained, frozen chicken or beef broth popsicles.
- Don't take your animal out for a walk unless early morning or late in the day. If the asphalt/ pavement is too hot for your bare feet, well guess what — it's too hot for your dog's paws and can burn them. Always check the asphalt/pavement with your bare feet before walking your dog. If the outside temperature is 86 F. (30 C.), the asphalt is 135 F. (57 C.). Do not over exercise active dogs, limit play to short

- Most animals just relax and sleep in the heat they may be grumpy so give them lots of time out. Instruct children to also allow them to rest
- Cats are a lot more tolerant to heat than dogs but will pant to take on cooler air if they are particularly hot. Heavy panting can be cause for concern so you must act fast, wrap them in a cool, wet towel and seek veterinary advice.
- Pay attention to your pet's feet. Cats and dogs have their sweat glands on their paws. If your pet is leaving wet paw prints, it is sweating and will need to replenish its fluids. You can try cooling it down by dipping its paws in water, but with some cats this may not be appreciated!
- Apply pet sunscreen if your dog or cat has a light-colored nose or ears. Mammals burn just like humans, and can even develop skin cancer. Be sure the sunscreen is safe for animals.
- Elevate your pet's bed. Cloth-covered plastic frames with short legs will allow your pet to sleep in comfort during hot weather, and the air passing under the bed will help keep your pet cool.

Do you suspect heatstroke? If you think your pet has overheated, place cool (not ice cold, as this can do more harm!), wet washcloths on his head and

neck, and cool compresses on his belly and under his back legs. Call your vet's office immediately and seek their advice about next steps. Heatstroke can quickly lead to coma, cardiac arrest, and death, so don't hesitate to seek veterinary attention as soon as possible. Jane Disko-Madden

THE FOURTH PLANET FROM THE SUN

ast month on June 27th, Sat- urn and the Moon had a cozy conjunction on the same day that Saturn was at its closest approach to the **Earth**. Well this month, also on the 27th, we have another pairing of the Moon and a planet. This time, its the fourth planet from the Sun, the ever popular and angry red planet, Mars.

On the same day that the red planet is at its closest to us, the Moon will also be turning red. A total lunar eclipse, but not in the Bonaire Sky Park, but in European Dutch skies. But because of the timing of the eclipse, if you're on vacation in Europe you'll be able to see it!

Well, let's check out the sky on July 27th from the Sky Park. Mars has fascinated astronomers for centuries, especially when it came to its peculiar movement, brightness and color changes.

Every 26 months or so, Mars goes from a pale orangish-yellow to a bright orangish-red. Mars got its name because its red color reminded the ancient Romans of blood, war and violence. So, they named it much closer to the Sun than others. after their god of war. So, every 26 months, the brightening of Mars reminded people of this celestial connection with the god of war, and they came to expect the unleashing of war, revolutions, disasters and death.

But why does Mars change color, size and brightness every 26 months? If we view our solar system from high above the Sun, we can see the orbits of both Earth and Mars. Earth takes a little more than 365 days to orbit the sun, while Mars takes almost 687 days.

When Mars and Earth are at their closest is this year, you get a close and bright to each other, Mars is said to be at opposition. When a planet is at opposition, it's exactly on the opposite side of the sky from the Sun. The tricky part about Martian oppositions is that they are not all created equal. For example, the Martian opposition of August 2003 was one of the closest oppositions in recorded history, where Earth and Mars were only 34.6



million miles apart.

Compare that to the opposition of March 2012 when Mars was a whopping 62.6 million miles from Earth. The reason that Mars' distance varies so much is because of the shape of Mars' orbit.

Johannes Kepler demonstrated that planetary orbits are not perfect circles, but a shape called an ellipse.

Mars' orbit is more elliptical than Earth's, so there are times when Mars is

When a planet is at its closest to the Sun, we call that **perihelion**. The perihelion point for Mars lies in the constellation **Aquarius**. The point when a planet is farthest from the Sun is called aphelion, and for Mars, that point is in Leo the lion.

Perihelion and aphelion are on opposite sides of a planet's orbit and as a result are on opposite sides of the sky. So, if you look at the zodiac, what constellation is on the opposite of the sky from Leo the Lion? Ta-da! Its Aquarius! So if the Sun is in Leo and Mars is in or near Aquarius, as it opposition, But switch it around, and if the Sun is in Aquarius and Mars is in Leo, you get a distant and faint opposition.

So get outside on Friday night, July 27th, and get the best view of Mars we've had since 2003. And if you happen to be in the Netherlands that day, check out the total lunar eclipse as well.
