
onaire is in trouble with b the Board of Financial Supervision (Cft) and, unless it shapes up, local financial control will be taken away from the local government and supervised by Dutch ministries. Dudley Weedervoort, head of Bonaire's Finance Department, held a press conference to explain that all was well. He said to Island's finances were sound, all debts were paid and there was a surplus. He added his department was working hard to raise its level of management

The Board has called on both the Bonaire Executive Council and the Island Council to be more decisive. The Cft has repeatedly said that Bonaire is not complying with the legal standards on too many levels. In addition, agreements made with the Council have repeatedly been inadequately fulfilled or never accomplished. "If this situation does not improve, an advice for an intervention will become unavoidable," according to the Cft chairman Raymond Gradus. For example the 2017 accounts and the 2019 budget are not complete.

If the Cft does not see sufficient progress in this process and in the implementation of a modified plan, then an escalation by means of an advice to the State Secretary of Interior and Kingdom Relations to proceed with an intervention will become inevitable. The Cft has called on the Executive Council to prevent this.

The Cft BES consists of chairman Raymond Gradus, former MCB Bank Managing Director Herbert Domacassé and former Dutch Minister Henk Kamp.

▶ Violent thunderstorms shook Bonaire in the morning hours of October 14. Continuous thunder, brilliant lightning and torrential rain lasted for over an hour and continued



somewhat diminished for the entire day. The system had even begun to rotate like a hurricane. Scattered power outages were widespread but quickly restored by WEB crews. Dozens of Internet routers were burned out by nearby lightning strikes. It was reported that Telbo ran short of replacements. As we go to press a tropical wave is persisting over the island, bringing overcast and scattered showers.

▶ Although reconstruction of the South Pier continues it will be able to accommodate cargo and cruise ships while the work is being finished. The rebuilt pier will incorporate innovations that should extend the usefulness beyond the originally planned 10 years to perhaps, if properly maintained, to 30 to 40 years.

As the rebuild progressed, it appeared that the repairs to the pier were much greater than previously estimated. Two and a half more months of work is needed. In addition, the construction of the new large mooring post (dolphin) was underestimated. The work was to have been completed on October 1, but the end date is now in mid- December.

However, the harbormaster, has agreed that the delay is acceptable as long as all scheduled ships can use the South pier as needed. The Roll On/ Roll Off Don Andres ships, as usual, will be handled on the Middle Pier. The Middle Pier was rebuilt earlier this year.

Agreements have been made with the companies that supply sand, gravel and cement for the concrete industry and construction to continue to supply Bonaire without hindrance. The large cruise ships can also continue to use this pier.

► InselAir continues to frustrate travelers in the ABC Islands. It remains the sole larger-plane carrier with a daily schedule to all ABC islands.

It had no flights to Bonaire for the start of Regatta, stranding many visitors in Curacao with no access to food, drink or overnight accommodation. It prompted its new head-man, Lars de Branbander, to make an unprecedented personal apology to its customers.

It has only one aging jet used for longer flights, and one aging turboprop to meet its schedule. Despite this situation it announced expansion plans. An "aviation industry doctor" recommended the company focus on its Caribbean business.



▶ But competition is growing. Scheduled flights of EZ Air are getting closer with the certification of more pilots for its 20-passenger Beechcraft and impending delivery flight from Florida of two planes. WinAir has a limited schedule of ABC Island flights. Aruba Airlines also flies inter-island and connects to Miami.

► As previously announced in *The Bonaire Reporter*, in





Prices also rose on St Eustatius and Saba, by 1.1 and by 4.4% respectively according to Statistics Netherlands (CBS). Bonaire consumer prices rose more rapidly mainly due to electricity prices continuing to rise, 18% relative to the previous year. The price of gasoline went up by nearly 17%. Not all prices rose. For example, fresh fruit and fresh vegetables became cheaper than a year ago.

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**SABADECO PIER DISPUTE** 

To the Editor:

Today was an eye-opening legal experience for members of all the Sabadeco neighborhoods. Many attended a court hearing regarding the Sabadeco pier. It seems that the person who recently purchased the house on the north side of the pier decided that he would close and lock access to the pier even though he doesn't own the pier or the driveway to the pier. Legally he is only entitled to an easement as opposed to the whole driveway from the road in Sabadeco Courts to his gate which is just inside the main gate entrance to the pier on Sabadeco-owned property. The new owner, who just moved here a few months ago, has an iron gate directly at the entrance to his property but feels that he doesn't have enough security and needs to lock the first gate as well, thus keeping Sabadeco residents from using the driveway to the pier and the pier itself, both of which are the property of Sabedeco, not the owner in question. In addition he has implied that he doesn't want to be bothered by Sabadeco divers and snorkelers using the dock – which, interestingly enough, is the property of Sabadeco and not his.

There was much back and forth between the judge and the attorneys and it soon became clear to many of those present that the judge thought it was fine to give the Sabadeco agreed to allow the gate to be locked, that Sabadeco should order and

pay for keys to be given to 30 Sabadeco residents (the number of keys the new owner is willing to allow), yet Sabadeco residents who win the 'lucky key lottery' must give the NEW OWNER a \$50 deposit for each key. As the new owner is not a famous person, royalty, or someone in witness protection, additional security at the expense of the many to satisfy the desires of the few seems quite an odd notion and pretty much over the top. The majority of non-Dutch people affected by this situation are struggling with the logic of the judge. In fact the Dutch residents of Sabadeco are questioning it as well. The final judgment will be made soon yet it will undoubtedly be some form of locking the gate. Hopefully Sabadeco will appeal this lopsided situation.

It was just revealed that the house in question is now a rental property. The significance of this is that the major issue at the hearing was that the owner personally was fearful for his safety and required more security. Now it turns out that the owner wants to rent the house and his ad implies that the rental includes a private pier. Umm- let me think here. If the gates are locked and the pesky residents who are entitled to use the pier are kept out then yes we now have a private pier in the rental agreement. Ka-ching! Up goes the rent. If the owner's personal safety was the main issue, now that the situation appears to be a commercial enterprise innew owner extra security (why?) as long as stead, shouldn't the 'lock the gate issue' be moot? Stay tuned.

#### What To Know About Vitamin D

our body makes vitamin D under your skin when you are outside in daylight, which is the reason vitamin D is sometimes called the 'sunshine vitamin'. A vitamin is something that helps our body function – a 'nutrient' – required in small quantities in the diet because it cannot be synthesized by the body.

#### What does vitamin D do to your body?

Vitamin D works with calcium and phosphorus for healthy bones, muscles and teeth. Vitamin D also plays an important role in protecting muscle strength and preventing rickets, osteomalacia (soft bones) and falls.

Even if you have a calcium-rich diet (for example from eating plenty of low-fat dairy foods and green leafy vegetables), without enough vitamin D you cannot absorb the calcium into your bones and cells where it is needed. Vitamin D may have many other important roles in the body, but there isn't enough evidence at the moment to make any conclusions.

#### What happens if I don't get enough vitamin D?

Some babies are born with low levels of vitamin D and some do not get enough in breast milk; this can result in fits or rickets. Older children who do not get enough vitamin D can also develop rickets. Rickets can cause permanent deformities to the bone, weaken muscles and reduced growth.

Adults who don't get enough vitamin D can develop osteomalacia. This makes the bones softer as the minerals needed to keep them strong cannot get into the bone. People with osteomalacia experience bone pain and muscle weakness.

When is vitamin D made in the skin? The amount of vitamin D you make depends on how strong the sunlight is. You will make more in the middle of the day, when the sun is strongest. You will also make more when you are in direct sunlight than in the shade or on a cloudy day.



It is the sun's ultraviolet rays that allow vitamin D to be made in the body. You do not have to sunbathe to make vitamin D. However, strong sun also burns skin so we need to balance making vitamin D with being safe in the sun - take care to cover up or protect your skin with sunscreen before you turn red or get burnt. This can be a problem if you spend a lot of time outdoors on Bonaire.

#### People at risk for having low vitamin D are:

- people over 65 years old because their skin is not as good at making vitamin
- people with darker skin tones that is people of Asian, African, Afro-Caribbean and Middle Eastern descent - living in northern climates
- if you always cover most of your skin when you are outside
- anyone who spends very little time outside – the housebound, shop or office workers, night shift workers
- if the air is quite polluted
- babies and young children, and children and adolescents who spend little time playing outside
- pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers
- Foods containing vitamin D: cod liver oil contains a lot of vitamin D (don't take this if you are pregnant)
- egg yolk, meat, offal and milk contain small amounts but this varies during the seasons
- oily fish such as salmon, sardines, pilchards, trout, herring, kippers and eel contain reasonable amounts of vitamin
- margarine, some breakfast cereals, infant formula milk and some yoghurts have added or are 'fortified' with vitamin D

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### On the Island Since... 2007 - Niels Hogeveen and ... 2015 - Dennis Claassen

ebruary 2006 —I came here on vacation for a month," Niels says. "The first week I didn't like it, the second week I got used to the temperature, the third week I thought it was paradise and the fourth week I didn't want to leave anymore. But I went back to Holland where I worked as an assistant location manager for Praxis, a home improvement supplies retailing company. However, during the following days and weeks Bonaire was the topic of all my conversations; I just couldn't stop talking about it! I started thinking and came to a conclusion, then I put my house up for sale. Within six weeks it was sold. Of course I had to finish my work in a proper manner and so I came to Bonaire in February

I became the manager at Pasa Bon Pizza and from there I went to It Rains Fishes. I worked in various restaurants and at Plaza Hotel as an activity manager. During that time Dennis came here for a vacation to celebrate his dad's 65<sup>th</sup> birthday, as his dad lives here on the island, just like my parents who'd moved here before me."

"I'd been travelling frequently," Dennis says, "working as a steward for Air Holland, which later became TUI, and also privately to the fanciest places. I was living in Amsterdam for 15 years, had a good job, a good salary and I was in the process of buying a house – a long cherished wish I could finally realize - and although everything seemed to be working out fine, I noticed I was restless and wondering if this was it. Then I went to Bonaire for my dad's 65<sup>th</sup> birthday but before going I contacted Niels, who was an acquaintance of mine, to ask if he was still living on the island. We met when I was vacationing here and it was fun. We got to know each other better and found out we got along well, so I came for the second time to Bonaire shortly after. Then I felt I had to make a decision: to let it go or to do something with it. Lots of mixed feelings really, but in the end it was Niels who gave up his life on Bonaire after having lived here for six years and he moved to Amsterdam with me.

In the beginning it was so much fun: our jobs, our own house and the life we lived in the city. But somehow, after a little bit, the idea to move to Bonaire resurfaced again. I wasn't flying anymore and I felt

ready for a new adventure."

Niels continues: "The city wasn't a problem for me, but the mentality was. It seemed like people were very much into themselves and life was fast and mostly about career, image, ego and material things. It just wasn't my style."

Dennis continues, "I was working for 'Suitsupply', a very successful men's fashion brand. It was a jet-set scene involving very successful people and I was sensitive to it. I went to parties and happy hours with the in-crowd. On the other hand, I slowly started to resent the lifestyle. Somehow – and mainly because of Niels – I began to see there was a lot of fakeness and being just a simple guy from the south of Holland who moved to Amsterdam to live the life, I felt that after 15 years, it was enough. It wasn't so important to me anymore.

on vacation to Bonaire once since I lived in Amsterdam and it had been very hard to say goodbye, so when we planned for a second vacation to see what we were going to do on Bonaire, it sort of hit me. We were having dinner, talking about the coming vacation and then I told Dennis, why don't we arrange everything so that we can stay on Bonaire?"

"At that instant I thought, 'why not!" Dennis says, "yes, it was a bit fast - but three days later the rental agent knocked on the door and the ball started rolling. In three months we completed everything and we never used the return ticket! It was know now: hospitality is my thing! September 2015. We moved in with my dad and started looking for a house to rent. I went to work at Spice, doing the breakfast service and Niels became the restaurant manager at Sorobon Beach

From there on it went very fast. I'd been I was interested in vacation rentals, then I met Rob van den Berge and Lolymar Sanchez who own 'Island Time Vacation Rentals.' They invited me to join their staff. I'm still doing that, but no longer full-time, because we got the opportunity to manage Coconut Grove, a small scale apartment complex of six units at Kaya Nikiboko-Zuid. First we remodeled it thoroughly, and we're still not completely done, but in the meantime we are in business. Most of the time I'm there while Niels is also working at Haafkes. What I learned at Island Time I can now use and give it my own twist. But one thing I

> "Life on Bonaire has changed tremendously since I came here 12 years ago," Niels says. "Personally I think it's a pity that it's changing so fast and I really hope Bonaire can keep its Caribbean flavor, in spite of all the changes. # Making Bonaire "Accessible"

VISION DISABILITIES

n October 15 the FKBO (Foundation for Care of the Disabled) celebrated "White Cane Safety Day."

According to Wikipedia this is an observance celebrated in October each year since 1964. This day is set aside to celebrate the achievements of people who are blind or visually impaired and the important symbol of blindness and tool of independence, the white cane

On Bonaire the celebration was held in the garden of the former *Kas di Kuido* (elderly home). The guests were told about this special day, they got an explanation and even a good chance to experience the use of the white cane while blindfolded.

The staff and director of the FKBO made their guests feel what it is like to be blind and how to make use of the white cane. The white cane can be seen from afar and it makes clear that the person using it has problems with his or her sight. This is the so-called recognition cane. The other white cane can also be used to explore and scan the surroundings.

Although the cane is visible, oftentimes the car drivers do not stop for a blind person who wants to cross the street. This makes it unsafe for visually impaired persons to be out on the street alone.

Guests stepped out in the Kaya L.D. Gerharts together with a buddy. They stepped off the curb and crossed the street and back. All traffic stopped! Was this because of the white cane? Or because of the buddy and the TV camera? It certainly was



an eye-opener for the public.

The invited guests were also very impressed and even touched. Some even promised to give the visually impaired more attention.

Normally one does not see many white canes as most people don't use it. Only 2% do. Most rely on their useable vision, a guide dog or a sighted guide. We do not see many dogs on Bonaire though. Maybe this is because a dog is very expensive and the training takes a long time. But... it would be a very interesting item to explore.

Bonaire needs to be accessible for every-body, hence also for the visually impaired! Should you be interested to become a volunteer at the FKBO, you may give them a call: 717-5765.

And they kicked this off with their special project for December 3, the International Day for the Handicapped, the painting contest plus the plans for making the beaches more accessible by rubberized paths and special beach chairs.

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# Garden?

#### RAINY SEASON

guess our rainy season started. What Lweather! For days there is hardly any sunshine, dark, rainy, cloudy, nasty streets, wet clothes that do not dry, mud under my shoes and on my bike, frogs and mosquitoes. Not nice for tourists who look for sun, beaches and things to do. Sorry for this bad weather, but we on Bonaire love this rain. Oh yes, look at nature. It turns green all over the place. Plants look fresh again; trees are full of leaves and some with nice juicy fruit already. Farmers are happy because there is now grass enough for their cattle. And for animals in the wild like iguanas, loras, donkeys, lizards, certain type of birds, frogs, goats, this rain is a blessing. It means plenty of food and water after a very dry hard period of surviving.

Also we gardeners are happy with this rain. We lost many plants during the very dry months and with the expensive WEB water it was not easy to keep the garden in good condition. My fruit trees were giving less fruit than they normally do and the fruit was smaller, less juicy and not so tasty. Also is the best medicine against it. my veggies like peppers and eggplants were small and hard.

But I never give up (the best, healthiest food is that I grow myself in clean soil); a few months ago I started with new veggie plants so all are big and fresh now and have started giving nice vegetables. I have just eaten from my veggie plants already, fresh from the land with a great, pure taste.

I also catch rainwater in buckets and empty these buckets the same day onto the big plants and trees so even the roots deep down get a lot of water. Rain water is the healthiest water for plants because of all the minerals that keep the plants in a healthy condition.

But not all plants need so much water or can stand all that water. There are plants that even die of too much. I move my cactus plants and desert rose to under my porch. I also keep an eye on certain plants that might suffer from so much rain. When I see them hanging, I will move them too.

Don't leave water in containers overnight. Think of dengue mosquitoes. Also, give the yard a good clean up. Remove pots and pans, empty containers, bottles, tires, buckets, yes ,everything that can contain water. Clean rain water in every possible empty container is the most perfect condition for

the dengue mosquito to breed, so prevention

Not only are the plants doing well these days but also the weeds. Oh, that gives me trouble. Weeds grow like crazy as soon as a few drops of rain come down. It's a fight I never win and costs me so much time and energy. Every day I spend time pulling weeds out before they get seeds. I counted how many types of weeds I found already in my yard. It was nine. So after a while I still need to pay a gardener to trim these weeds when I cannot handle it anymore. Another \$150 box from Selibon? Yes, that is what weeds cost me twice in a rainy season. That's why I start to pull it out first by myself to avoid another \$150 box.

Another thing these days in my garden are the small brown lizards with a straight tail. There are more and more of them, hanging out everywhere, even on the walls of my house. As soon as a young plant pops up, these lizards are there to eat the young top and or the young leaves, a new thing to fight against. Friends also complain, asking me what to do. I got a solution from another friend who said that walls of plastic bottles help. The lizards cannot climb on plastic. Another maybe easier way is to put plastic buckets, open top and bottom, around the young plants or over each plant. Your garden may look like a plastic field, but once

the plants are bigger, the lizards are not that interested anymore and the plant is stronger to survive the bites of the lizards.

A strange thing is that cats don't eat these lizards. I often have wild cats in my yard, hunting the birds, but they never chase the lizards. Locals told me that lizards have poisons which make cats and dogs very sick when eaten. So these lizards have no enemies and that's why they are so prolific. I wonder how cats and dogs know that they should not eat the lizards?

One of the plants the lizards are crazy for is the flower of the pumpkin. I have a big bush of crawling pumpkin besides my beerput. Once I had a great tasting pumpkin, of which I planted the seeds a few months ago. Now the fat plants have giant leaves and everyday a few flowers. If the lizards have not eaten the flowers yet I pick the male flowers in the morning just before they close again. Do you know that you can eat these flowers and that they are very healthy? I chop them and add to scrambled eggs. It's just like a pancake and delicious. It's also good as a tea for certain health problems like yellow fever. Also the very young leaves at the top of the pumpkin vine are a very healthy nice vegetable. Add to mashed potatoes with some melted butter. Cook a bunch of young vines together with the potatoes, add butter and salt, mashed and you will be surprised how nice this tastes. So I use all of the pumpkin plant, I don't need to wait all the time for the pumpkins. But if you cannot wait for a ripe pumpkin, a green pumpkin is also good to eat. Locals make a dish of it, stewed with salted beef or salted fish. I add also some curry powder, cumin, garlic and pepper, a bit of ginger and onion. Try it, you will beg for more.

This is a perfect time to plant pumpkin seeds. There are a number of varieties. The plant needs a lot of space to crawl (which I limit by making a kind of fence from stones on the ground. When it crawls over the stones I put the vine back in its limited space). And don't forget to put open buckets over the young plants to protect them from the brown lizards. How do you know the pumpkin is ready to pick? When the vine turns brown and old you know the pumpkin gets dry and is good to cut from the plant.

Frogs are around now and sometimes I find one in the bushy pumpkin plant. But most of the time they are in the banana trees and palm trees in the little bit of water where the leaves hook onto the tree. So when cutting a bacoba bunch from the tree, you might be surprised by frogs jumping over your head. It's all in the game and a frog does not hurt nor is it dangerous.

Last but not least, an update of fruits on the island, ready to pick. Delicious mispel, juicy knepa, purple druif (grape) Surinam, hoba, pomegranate, soursop, baby druif, some leftover tamarin, the last mangos, sweet papaya, big bunches of bacoba, appeldam, birambi, golden apple, carambola, guaba, coco.

So it's time to do things. With this rain work in your garden and gather fruit for your jam and jellies, your breakfast with pure island fruits, homemade juices, syrups and pancakes, healthy lunches and dinners.

#### Vitamin D supplements

Taking a vitamin D supplement as well as eating foods rich in vitamin D and spending a lot of time outside in sunshine is not a problem.

However, do not take more than one supplement containing vitamin D (count cod-liver oil as a supplement) as you could exceed the 10 micrograms recommendation. Always choose a supplement tailored to the age group or condition, as fish liver oils and high dose multivitamin supplements often contain vitamin A, too much of which can cause liver and bone problems, especially in very young children, and the elderly.  $\square$  Lucinda van der Wardt




# Corals Spawn!

#### Oscar Is Looking For A Home \*



#### MONSTERS FOR HALLOWEEN IN THE SKY PARK

t is almost Halloween, so let's look for our favorite monsters in the Sky Park. These are the stars and constellations that struck terror in the hearts of our ancestors.

And they include a dragon, a sea monster, and a woman with snakes for hair.

And finally we'll find the star cluster that signaled the day of the dead.

On October 31 face north at 8:30pm. We're going

dragon-hunting and looking for Draco the Dragon.

Our guide star is low in the north – **Po**laris a.k.a. the North Star. It's not terribly bright but you should be able to spy it from most locations. The dragon's sinuous body is nearby... But the dragon's head holds the brightest stars in this monster constellation. Look for three stars in a neat triangle. And if you're in a darker sky, you might be able to make out a fourth star. Along came a god named Marduk who slew the great beast. Marduk then sliced the dragon in half – one half becoming the **Earth**, and the other, the heavens above.

Then look halfway up in the northeastern sky now for the Constellation Perseus. He's a toughie to find since the stars don't look like an armor-clad hero with winged sandals. With a lot of imagination, we can see Perseus holding something in his outstretched arm. To the ancient Greeks it's the star Algol, a.k.a. the winking eye of Medusa. She's the gorgon with snakes for hair. But other cultures had some very frightening Hindus all had festivals for the dead near names for this star, like: The Specter's head, November 1st, in honor of the Seven Sisters. Ghost's Head, Satan's Head, the Double Eye, and my personal favorite, Oiled Up Corpses.

Why such scary names? Algol is no ordinary star - it's a special type of star called an Seven Sisters would be straight overhead. eclipsing variable. Algol is really two stars that orbit each other. When the bigger, dimmer star blocked the light of the smaller brighter star the ancients noticed. During these eclipses Algol dims like clockwork every 2.87 days. So, see if you can see the winking eye of Medusa this month. It won't turn you to stone. Perseus is using Medusa's head to save princess Andromeda from a



briny behemoth– the sea monster, Cetus. Look farther to the southeast, and maybe you can make out the sea monster. However, his outline looks more like a recliner chair. Nevertheless, this was Poseidon's vicious pet sea monster who we see turned to stone by... Medusa's head!

Algol strikes again!

Several cultures selected November 1 as a special day to honor their dearly departed. It marks a halfway point between fall and winter, plus the coolest star cluster does something special that night. At midnight, the Seven Sisters, or Pleiades, are an open cluster of stars visible in the east. At first glance they look like a little cloud, but upon closer examination you may be able to make out the individual stars in the cluster.

A sharp-eyed first grader told me they looked like a dinky dipper. This "dinky dipper" features heavily in All Hallow's eve celebrations around the globe - when they are highest at midnight.

Maya, Aztecs, Peruvians, Japanese, and

As the night rolls on, the Pleiades rise higher and higher in the Sky Park. And at local midnight they reach their highest point. In fact, from the Yucatan peninsula, the The great Mayan pyramids would point directly at the cluster.

So, look for Draco the Dragon in the northern sky, Medusa's head, Algol in the northeast Cetus the sea monster in the south-

And, if you dare, stay up until midnight to see the Seven Sisters ride across a spooky sky. Have a happy Halloween. ■
