n the motion of the MPB (Blue Party) at the island Council Meeting of October 30 the Bonaire Government (OLB Public Body) was instructed to begin a process to prohibit the use of the use of polystyrene (foam) food containers, disposable plastic disposable bags and plastic straws as of 1 January 2020.

► Two important Bonairean companies are alarmed that Flamingo Field (Bonaire International Airport NV (BIA).) is in such "administrative chaos" that it threatens the functioning of the airport.

The two - Airhandling Services Bonaire NV (AHS) and Bonaire Air Services NV (BAS) - have had their attorney, Lex Gonzales of Bonaire Law, demand the Island Council to intervene. They urge the Island Council members to expeditiously appoint qualified officers to the airport's Management and the Supervisory Boards. If this does not happen very soon, then AHS and BAS fear "the worst" for the near future of BIA, their own companies and staff.

Gonzales' letter points out that the "interim technical director" Mario Bikker, who is managing the airport now, cannot and must not take legally valid decisions on behalf of BIA. His appointment on 22 February was unlawful because he had already passed the statutory age limit and, moreover, no nominations had been made by the Supervisory Board, according to the lawyer. The candidates nominated by the Bonaire Executive Council were rejected by State Secretary Knops because they did not meet the requirements - after which no new candidates were nominated.

Since Bikker, according to the commercial register at the

Chamber of Commerce, is only "limited competent," he has, according to Gonzales, exceeded his mandate by entering into or breaking agreements on behalf of BIA. The direct rea-

son for AHS and BAS to sound the alarm is that Bikker canceled the ground handling concessions of both companies on 24 September 2019. From that moment on they are no longer allowed to "handle any aircraft at Flamingo Airport." Bikker this year granted a settlement concession to Progressive Air Services BV (PAS), a one-man company, but that company does not meet the

(international) requirements: PAS has no qualified staff, owns no equipment, has no liability insurance, but does have debts.

AHS and BAS said they will seek to recover the damage they expect to suffer as a result of Bikker's wrongful actions. A copy of the 14-page letter plus appendices has been sent to the Dutch Ministry of Infrastructure and the Environment, the directors of the airlines which the companies service: KLM, TUI, Delta Airlines, United Airlines and Winair.

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

► The price comparator published by the consumer organizations FTpKB and Unkobon in collaboration with the Ministry of Economic Affairs provides an insight into the prices of a basket of 60 products at 15 supermarkets. It revealed that in October, the prices of the representative "market basket" slightly decreased compared to the prices of fairs and Employment (SZW) September. On average, prices fell by almost 2%. The lowest prices found dropped by almost 1% and the highest prices found dropped by almost 3%.

The large price drops that we see at some supermarkets are mainly due to the fact that in October besides a name-brand of a product, a cheaper (house) brand is also offered. On the unkobon.org website you will find the price observations of all products listed by supermarket. Striking is that the total of the highest prices (\$495) is 2.4 times as high as the total of the lowest prices (\$206). Price conscious consumers can save hundreds of dollars per month by patronizing lowprice markets.

► There's still another chapter in the story of Bonni, the turtle. After returning to Bonaire four times to lay eggs, the "Turnaround Turtle" came ashore on Bonaire again and attempted to dig her sixth nest (!) of the season, but - unfortunately - did not succeed. Right after she started digging, 'Bonni' hit a

large rock, which prevented her from digging any further. She then decided to turn around, to go back to the ocean. The last signal from 'Bonni's' transmitter shows that she's back in the Los Roques - an area rich with coral reefs and seagrass. STCB will continue to monitor her movements and will update us if anything changes.

► The Ministry of Social Afwill lower the health and retirement premiums employers must pay for every employee from 18.4% to 13.4% effective January 1, 2019. It's reasoned that since the mandated minimum wage will be raised 5%, this reduction will make it easier for employers to comply. It's hoped that wages can increase and the purchasing power will go up. Benefits such as the social assistance, widows, widower and orphan pension (AWW) and the old age pension (AOV) will also increase along with the minimum wage. The exact amounts will be communicated later this month by the Ministry of Social Affairs and Employment.





► Once again Bonaire's renowned underwater photographer Ellen Muller has produced a calendar for the coming year.



Picture Yourself With The Reporter At St. Patrick's Catherdral, NY





On the Island Since... 2015 – Vera Dohmen

• F or 20 years I worked in education in The Netherlands, mainly with children with learning disabilities like dyscalculia, dyslexia, ADHD and autism. I was a regular group teacher, but twice a week I took these children from the group to teach them separately. When I got my Master's in Special Education Needs, I chose to teach children with learning disabilities. While working on my Master's at the HU University of Applied Sciences Utrecht, I was already looking for a new challenge. When I heard there were plenty of vacancies on Bonaire I went home that afternoon and suggested to my husband, 'Shall we go to Bonaire?'

I'd worked in Surinam as a trainee and already then I'd made my decision to work outside of Holland at some time in my life. But I had a family: two children- a 12-year old son, Jordi, and a 10-year old daughter, Femke, so it wasn't so easy.

My husband and I came here first for vacation in 2014 to see if we wanted to live here. We found out there was plenty of work for me, but for my husband, who was a truck driver, it wasn't the case. However, earlier in his life he'd been a carpenter, working in construction, so he did see some possibilities there.

Well thought out and quietly, we arranged everything in one year so that our son could finish elementary school in Holland, and our daughter had one more year to go on Bonaire. We arrived in 2015. Our son went to Liseo and our daughter to Pelican school. I started working at Kristu Bon Wardador elementary school and was very enthusiastic to experience what education was like on Bonaire. Not long after I found out there were a number of problems: children with learning disabilities and behavioral problems, and there was a back-log in the Dutch language. I wanted to do something about it, but I couldn't work it out at school so I started my own practice and quickly I had a large number of applications When we were still in Holland, we'd bought a house in Belnem which we were planning to convert into a small-scale apartment complex. We bought it, including the tenants, so next to my job at school we knew we would have income from rent which was important because my husband didn't have a job. The complex had to be renovated and that's what my husband started doing. Nowadays we have switched

to vacation rentals and for Mario, my husband, it has become a full-time job, not only the maintenance and garden upkeep but also showing people around. I like it too and I often help him with it. Vacationers are always enthusiastic and in good spirits and it feels great to give them an even better time.

Well, when I started my Teaching Practice, 'The Talent'- Onderwijspraktijk 'Het Talent'- I had a waiting list in no time. Children are signed up by their parents or by their school. I usually work with children from the third grade up to and including high school. The parents first come for an introductory meeting and I tell them what it is I can do and I listen to what they have to say. I then do a didactic research to see at what level the child is functioning and also to see for myself what the problem is. I also contact the school by means of a

place, a place that doesn't exist on Bonaire.'

These children are just gifted children. We do not focus on low-gifted children, because that's a whole different target group. The children we're working with are certainly talented children, but due to their developmental disorder they need specific education as they don't function in large groups. To be able to create a place for these children, I started writing an educational plan and I went to look for people to set up a foundation so that we could start that school. The people I found in no time. I had a waiting list for my educational practice and I'd expanded my practice with other remedial teachers who were eager to help in setting up a school for children with special educational needs.

The foundation was established in June this year and the school which we named



questionnaire. When I have collected all the data, including the opinion of the child, I make a guidance plan. In it I set goals I want to work on and the time frame that we will invest in and when we will start evaluating, because at a certain moment we have to see if the support is effective. If that's the case we just continue, but if it is insufficient we will adjust our plan.

I've been doing this for two and a half years now. It's one-on-one guidance, and I think it can only be effective that way as it is a personal plan. Each and every child learns in a different way and that's why it often goes wrong at school. Here I teach one child at a time. I was hired as well by schools during the morning hours to support children primarily individually. I noticed there that there are also children who have trouble functioning in a regular situation in the classroom because of all the stimuli and the education that does not adequately meet their educational needs.

'Het Koraal' (The Coral) started last August. Presently the school is located at Kaminda Lagun #50. It's a regular house with a second floor – but we're still looking for a permanent location. It's a private school, which means that parents have to pay for it themselves, which is unfortunate, but the law for special education is not in force on Bonaire. If you want to establish a school on Bonaire paid for by the Dutch government you have to start with 200 pupils.

There are not 200 pupils on Bonaire for this kind of special education with autistic children or children with other learning disabilities. Anyway, it wouldn't be good, because these children need to be in small groups, up to 10 to 12 pupils. So, that's why we have to ask the parents for money. The school costs \$300 a month, which is a lot of money for people on Bonaire. At the moment we have six children, and for those tra. children we have one teacher and a teaching assistant, which is necessary in case something happens and you need assistance.



We had a meeting with the education inspectorate from the Netherlands. They were very enthusiastic about the possibilities and as a result of this conversation there will be a second interview and they will see if the school can be recognized. We assume - in view of the reactions - that it will work. In addition to the contribution of the parents, we also looked for sponsors. In the end we got all the teaching materials and methods free of charge from the Netherlands. We have received so much. We are really stunned, but very happy with it!

At the moment we're working for free really, because the rent has to be paid and with six students there's not much left and everything that's donated are material things. We regularly seek contact with Youth Care and EOZ to look for a partnership - which I would really like - so that the Coral School can become more affordable for more parents. In the end it would be good if there was a change in legislation regarding special education, so that special education on Bonaire will be paid by the Netherlands.

So far, this is not really a business venture. It's a passion for education, especially for children with special education needs. I think every child has a talent and you should use that talent. I think these children can do more than people think. They can contribute to the development of Bonaire and build their own lives if you guide them well and give them a fair chance. We're still very small scale and of course - ha! there are people who say we're not going to make it, but if we all think that way, nothing will ever happen! If we continue this, something beautiful will be created!

Bonaire is just lovely and because of my work I'm in touch with people from all different nationalities, which I love. Our children are doing well at VWO and they're feeling good and of course they're typical teenagers! We're all happy here and I still love to go for a drive and it's always different and always beautiful. Life is what you make of it." Story & photos by Greta Koois-

To lower your chances of diabetes it's a year-round lifestyle. On Sunday, November 18 we will offer many different ways to keep fit. **Walk** – a 6.4k / 4 mile walk. Pick your pace and go! **Triathlon** as a team or as an individual, sprint or mini-sprint distance! **Sail** or go **Fishing!**

Diabetes awareness is key to prevention.



Exercise helps your body use insulin, which controls your blood

sugar. It burns extra body fat, lowers blood pressure, cuts LDL ("bad") cholesterol, and raises HDL ("good") cholesterol. All this lowers your chance of Diabetes, Heart disease and Stroke.

Walk and Triathlon

Pick your pace. We have a 4 mile walk, a ¹/₄ triathlon or mini triathlon. The Walk will begin and end at the Hato Circle by Coco Beach. The start will be at 7am.

hat the Queen Conch is a giant snail that lives in the ocean? In Papiamentu the Queen Conch is known as Karkó. It may live to be 30 years old, reach over 30 cm in length and usually weighs over 2 kg. The Karkó is in a group of animals called mollusks,

meaning that it is related to other squishy animals like the octopus and even land snails.

The *Karkó* lives in sea grass beds like the ones in Lac bay where they eat algae, dead sea grass and other tiny food items that they find in the sand. Sometimes they stay hidden in the sand for up to 1 1/2 months, maybe in places where they find a lot of food inside the sandy bottom. Most of its soft body is hidden inside its shell, and when the snail grows, the shell grows as well, just like the bones in our bodies.

The thick shell is a very good defense against those that would like to eat the Karkó, like sharks, rays, crabs and turtles. If it knows that one of those animals is coming too close, it can hide its whole body inside the shell and cover the opening with a type of hard lid that is attached to its foot. The lid works like a door that they close and lock. No one can get in. On most other snails this lid is used only to close the opening of the shell, but the *Karkó* has a lid that looks very much like a claw and it uses this claw to defend itself from being eaten if an enemy catches it. It also uses the claw to hop along the bottom instead of gliding along the bottom like other snails.

The outside of the shell can range from light brown to orange in color, but the colors can be very hard to see because most of the time algae grows on it. Sometimes you can even see other animals like anemones growing on the shell. The inside of the shell is clean, and beautiful pink, orange and white colors can be seen.

In the past, Karkó was an important fishery in Bonaire and its shell was valuable and could be traded or sold. However, throughout the Caribbean and in Bonaire, this yummy snail was overfished and faced the threat of extinction. In 1991 the Bonaire government decided to outlaw the taking of Karkó in Bonaire. STINAPA launched an informative awareness campaign and monitored Lac Bay every couple of years. It was added to the CITES list in 1992 and international trade was highly restricted. However, even after 27 years of protection in Bonaire, our Karkó numbers in Lac Bay have not increased. Why? There could be several reasons for this. One, a Karkó needs to find another Karkó to mate, but when the population is very low, it becomes very difficult to find a mate and



it takes a very long time for the population to recover. **Two, there is constant poaching in Lac Bay by a handful of people. Poaching is the illegal taking of protected species.** Despite many interventions by STINAPA rangers and the police, poaching continues to be a major problem in Lac Bay

One of the biggest problems with poaching, besides being completely illegal, is that when the large *Karkós* have been killed, the poachers go for smaller and smaller *Karkós*. Smaller *Karkós* contain less food so they poach more and more of them in order to sell them for the same money (also illegal!). Then there are no adult conch left to restore the population, which is what is happening in Lac Bay. It takes *Karkó* 3.5 years to mature and reproduce – at this point they have a flared shell and the lip is 1.5 cm thick.

Today, there are only a small number of people who poach, but they are robbing all of us, especially the fishermen who follow the laws. Fishermen, as well as everyone else, benefit from a healthy ocean.

What you can do: if you see conch on the menu of a restaurant or a snack, always ask where the conch comes from. Remember that no conch served on the island could be called "fresh" since, if it is legal, it does not come from Bonaire, and it has to be transported into the island in a frozen state with a special CITES permit - meaning it comes from a place with a sustainable and regulated (legal) fishery. It the restaurant owner/server is unaware of this, don't order conch. If you see someone handling a living conch, call the police and/or STINAPA 786-8444. Remember that it is also forbidden to take shells. Our choices matter.



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A Bonaire Champion Davidlee Winklaar

The World Association of Kickboxing Organizations (WAKO) has a new Pan American K-1 kickboxing champion. He's Bonairean **Davidlee Winklaar**. From the 715 entries from 15 countries, Davidlee, 25 yearsold, was the only athlete from the small island of Bonaire, and he became the champion.

Nurtured on the island, mainly selftrained, he won the Champion Belt at the recent Pan-American WAKO Championships held October 23-28, 2018, on Mexico's Mayan Riveria in the state of Quintana Roo, Mexico.

By any measure it is a great achievement that shows how serious he is about this sport.

It all began on the 23rd with the official competition registration, weigh-in and medical control. The next day during the opening ceremony he proudly walked carrying the Bonairean Flag.

His first fight was on Wednesday the 26th. He won this fight in an impressive 10second knock-out of his American opponent, which immediately qualified him for the finals. "This fight went so fast. I remember that the president of WAKO Netherlands told me not to focus on knockout and to fight for the points. However, I do know I have a strong left hook and overhand right. I analyzed my opponent and saw the possibilities for a knockout. We made our fightplan and stuck to it. When I saw him stumble, I knew he would not be able to stand back up. I didn't celebrate until the referee called it. I was confident I was going to win this fight but I could have gotten hurt in the

process, so I'm grateful. I made it to the finals."

The final fight was on Saturday the 27th. His Canadian opponent put up a strong battle. "The Canadian fighter was more experienced than I am. In the second round I managed to land more punches, including two knock-downs. I didn't knock him out but I won by a unanimous decision." Winning this battle made him not only the absolute champion of the K-1 WAKO Pan American Championships but also qualifies him for the World Championships.

His return to Bonaire was triumphal and emotional. The crowd, consisting of family, friends, supporters and fans was huge. When he stepped out of the baggage hall his mother embraced him passionately. Then

his sister, nieces and other friends added their hugs and kisses. As the media was interviewing him, the crowd started singing the national anthem, which created an impressive moment of Bonairean pride. As he was driving home, the fire brigade blew all their horns. Even the crowd that was at the airport also stopped to celebrate in the middle of the road for a brief moment.

Davidlee started practicing karate when he was 12 years old. When he was 18 he started kickboxing. By his 19th birthday he had already decided that he wanted to become a superstar in this sport. Some of his role models are Tyrone Spong, Floyd Mayweather, Andy Souwer, Nieky Holzken, and Badr Hari.

A s soon as I read that certain people remembered their awesome youth and all the fun they had, I decided to write a **poem for him**. And why, you may ask?

Well, there was this person who did nothing else but bully him every day at school. It got so bad that he didn't even want to go to school any more. And that was quite something, because school was the place he loved to go. There he could prove that he was no retard and that he knew more than any of them.

He was born with cerebral palsy and was only diagnosed when he was six years old. Before that everybody always thought he was kind of odd. His sister was the one that he wanted to have read to him, from his beautifully illustrated children's bible. And when a word was misspelled or pronounced wrong, he got very upset, because it had to be said another way. That was when his family learned that he knew many books by heart.

He could not play like other children; he invented his own special way. And he knew so many facts, especially about history...


When it was time to go to school, he could not even hold a pencil. But there was this young ambitious teacher who

took him under her wing and she taught him with love.

But after school he hardly ever went with his friends to play at their houses. He played with them only at the beach or on the streets. He also was alone a lot, all by himself.

Later we learned that his friends' fathers did not want their sons to play with him. And we also learned that, always when there was something physically he could not perform, he went alone, by himself to the beach, where he trained and repeated until he was able to do it.

And books he loved to read, always reading he was. You could ask him anything, any fact you wanted. He always knew the answer.

And mom loved him more that words can say. She fought for him and saw to it that he got everything he needed.

But about the bullying he never told us. He kept it to himself, always. Only later we learned about that. His own father even tried to kill him because he could not mow the lawn like one should. So when he did not want to go to the mainland to study, mom kept him at home. Home is where he was safe.

And he was so intelligent. It was such a pity that he hardly got the chance to prove that. Because of all his reading, he came to love history and that became his specialty. He got a job at the local museum and was very happy there. But his boss, who was just the same age, also bullied him. Every single day.

The wife, he desperately wanted so much, bullied him and treated him like a dog. So he came home, back to mom, where he was loved and nobody bullied him. When mom passed away, he had only me. I took care of him and fought for him and even wanted to take him along with us to Bonaire. But then two weeks before Christmas he did not open the door to the homecare workers and we had to break in. We found him lifeless on his couch. Surrounded by all his books and I was so very afraid that he had taken his life.

I was so happy when the doctor told me that he did not take his own life, but that he had suffered a major heart attack.

This is why I hate bullying and people who bully. Take, accept and respect people as they are. This one

is for you, my little brother Abraham. □

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Garden? Jus **MOSQUITOES AND MORE**

clouds around me. It does not make any difference, daytime or in the evening. In every dark corner, in the shade of trees, even on my porch where my garden shoes are, the mosquitoes are hiding, ready to hit. They come in all sizes and shapes, from the very big black ones that stick on my body like airplanes to the smallest ones which you can hardly see. Behind each door they are waiting, to fly inside as soon as the door is open. Horrible things. So to work in the garden is hard these days. I have to cover myself totally: long sleeves, rubber boots, a cap, long trousers. Man, this is hot. And still I have to treat myself with a mosquito spray.

By the way Stephanie from South Africa, living here for years, specialized in alternative healing, makes a liquid from the neem tree against mosquitoes. It's skin -friendly and safe for children too. I'm busy these days trying it out and I've had good experiences with it. So maybe for you too it's an alternative solution when you don't want to use the those regular mosquito sprays. You can find them at Elements on Kaya Grandi.

Anyway, mosquitoes are a big problem.

It's really tough these days to work in the garden. Mosquitoes—like dark They say that some types come from the mangroves in Lac Cai when it gets dark, like the big black ones and those wimpiries, which are the tiny ones for sure, come from there. These wimpiries can go through any screen, so the only way to prevent their entry is to close all the windows around 5:30pm, then open them again about 8pm. Otherwise you might have these guests in your bed.

> Mosquitoes also live in grass, and you may not notice that they are on your toes when you're busy trimming and cleaning the garden. Grass also cuts into your skin and itches a lot. Then as soon as you are in contact with some water, like sweating, your whole body starts itching from grass, mosquitoes, ants and other bugs. You can even have allergic reactions. When I want to sit on the porch and there are too many mosquitoes around I set some dry coconut skin on fire. It only smokes a while and doesn't turn into a real fire. The mosquitoes cannot stand the smoke and stay away. I put the old, dry skin in a metal container. But when you're having a party in the yard you also can put the dry smoking coconut skin in several places around on the ground. It smokes a lot and chases the bugs away. Also lemon skin and lemon leaves are good to have

around you on the porch. A type of oregano, called "bilslip" here, also helps a bit. best. Meanwhile it's a perfect time to This plant grows easily and it's very nice in soups and fish or meat stews.

Of course it's nice to have all that rain. But this mosquito problem is a true headache.

I collect rainwater in a big one-cube container and add some chlorine liquid. Or vinegar. Mosquitoes need clean water to breed. So with the chlorine in the container they stay away from my collected rain water. This little bit of chlorine doesn't damage my plants, in my experience. But try it out first with a little bit of bleach or vinegar in your collected rainwater and see how your plants react.

So now there are too many mosquitoes but hardly any pies-pies. And that is a blessing because the pies-pies come in the dry season and kill all the plants when the drought continues for a long time. So enjoy the garden with enough rain and no pies-pies.

What can you do against mosquito bite wounds? I see children scratching and making wounds, many on their legs. Well, the sea is a good wellness place to heal. Salt from the sea is a natural wound cleanser. So let children go swimming when their body is full of mosquito bites. Another healer is aloe. Rub a piece of aloe over the wounds; the liquid is a great skin healer. When you don't have aloe in your garden, just ask people for some when you see it in their yard. For sure you will

get some. The old, thick pieces are the plant some aloe in your garden. It takes up hardly any space and with all this rain it will establish itself quickly. It's a must in your garden, good for many health problems. It's a medicine plant, right here.

An update of my vegetables these days: Peppers and eggplant, pumpkin flowers and the soft young leaves which I consume too, red and green spinach, postelein, bembe, eggplant, yuca, yambo and tajerblad, plantain. From each just a little bit. No need to have a lot of each. Just two or three plants is enough. With this rain, you get more than enough food from the plants. So you can start gardening in a little space and have your own veggies and herbs.

Of course the herbs are growing like crazy too. Basil, yerbihole, different oregano, mint, lemon grass, ginger, kurkuma. There is so much and every day I enjoy these herbs in my tea and food. The funny thing is that I don't need to plant them. They pop up everywhere in the yard. Lucky me.

So its a great time for gardening. Don't miss this opportunity. So just do it. 🗖 Story & photos by Angliet, Nature

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POLYGON PARTY

We've finally reached that time of year again when we can see a multitude of celestial polygons, all in the Sky Park at the same time! We have a triangle, a square, a pentagon and a hexagon. So, get ready, while we connect the dots.

Just after sunset, any night this week, face west and pivot eastward. The number of sides that each of our polygons displays increases by one as we travel eastward. So, let's start facing west and the first polygon we will see has three sides and three angles. It's none other than the **Summer Triangle**.

This pattern of bright stars is what we call an **asterism**. It's a geometric shape made by using bright stars from multiple constellations. The stars of the summer triangle are **Vega**, the brightest star in **Lyra the Harp; Altair**, the brightest star in **Aquila the Eagle;** and **Deneb**, the brightest star in **Cygnus the Swan**.

Moving upward to almost overhead is our next polygon and it has four sides and four angles. The stars that make this polygon are all in the same constellation. We call it the **Great Square of Pegasus** and it represents the body of the flying horse belonging to **Perseus the Hero**. Start at **Markab**, which marks the base of the neck of Pegasus, then move northward to **Sheat**, which marks the point where the legs attach to the body.

Imagine drawing a line from the horse's stomach eastward to the star **Alpheratz** which is a star that Pegasus shares with **Andromeda the Princess**. Then, if we move southward to finish off the square, we arrive at the star **Algenib**, which completes the rear and back of the horse.

So far you've seen a triangle... with three sides... and a square... with four sides... Now need a five-sided polygon, a pentagon!

And we have an excellent candidate for this if we aim eyes to the northeast. The brightest of the stars in this pentagon also happens to be the closest of them, at only 42 light years away. **Capella** marks the apex of the pentagon-shaped constellation called **Auriga the Charioteer.** The other stars that mark this constellation, traveling in a counterclockwise direction are, **Menkalinan** which is 48 times as bright as our **Sun**, is 82 light years away and marks the shoulder of



the **charioteer**. Moving southward we have the star **Mahasim**, which marks the wrist of **Auriga** and is a **binary star system** over 166 light years away from us. Moving further southward we run into my favorite star in Auriga, **Elnath**. This star is approximately 131 light years from **Earth** and is a star that Auriga shares with **Taurus the Bull**, marking the end of one of the bull's horns.

Lastly, we move westward to the star **Kab** -**dhilinan** which is roughly 500 light years away from us and is approximately 127 times the width of our **Sun**.

We need a six-sided figure. If you go outside just before 10pm, the last stars of the **Winter Hexagon** will be rising in the east, just before the Summer Triangle sets in the west.

The hexagon begins with Capella and moving downward toward the horizon you have **Castor and Pollux**, the heads of the **Gemini twins**. Closer still to the horizon you have **Procyon in Canis Minor** and further south you have **Sirius in Canis Major**. Moving upward you have **Rige**l, the foot of **Orion** and then up to Orion's left you have **Aldebaran**, marking the eye of **Taurus**. Finishing off, head back to Capella to complete the hexagon. Four separate shapes, made by 18 stars, in 10 constellations! So get outside and make some pretty polygons in the Bonaire Sky Park. ■ *Dean Regas & James Albury*

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
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






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
