Bonaire's inter-island air transport situation is becoming desperate. Last week InselAir planes were grounded for three days due to maintenance issues. Travelers have to rely on the more reliable smaller aircraft,

like Divi Divi, with only a third of the capacity of other companies.

Good and affordable cars from the US are offered for sale at a good price. In the advertisement, all information about the car is neatly stated. Negotiations with the seller all seems legitimate. The buyer must initially pay only a deposit. The remaining sum must be paid on arrival of the car. The buyers also receive a neat letter from the shipper that the car will be shipped and that the shipment can be followed via the track & trace code in the letter. These cars never arrive and the victims do not get their money back.

The Dutch Caribbean Police Force advises to be cautious when buying cars via the internet.

The Tourism Corporation Bonaire is preparing for the busy cruise ship season. In addition to the downtown Wilhelmina Plaza market there will be a "Cultural Cruise Market" in Rincon to spread the visitors over the island and to give an opportunity to the people of Rincon. The market will be at the Plaza Commerce in front of the gas station in Rincon every cruise ship day from 8am to 4pm. The plan is to have a tourist information booth, stands offering local handmade products locally made food and beverages and entertainment.

Princess Beatrix of the Nether-

lands will be in Bonaire the last week of November to visit at the invitation of the Bonaire Na-

tional Parks Foundation STINAPA Bonaire. The Princess, who will be in Bonaire from November 28 to December 1, has a hectic schedule for an 80-yearold woman.

On her arrival on November 28, the former queen will **be met** at the Flamingo Airport by Acting National Government Representative Jan Helmond and Bonaire's Island Governor Edison Rijna.

-On Thursday, the Princess will visit the headquarters of STINAPA where she will receive an explanation of the management and protection of Bonaire's nature parks. Princess Beatrix later on Thursday will visit Strea Briante (Bright Star) School, the winner of the first Caribbean UNICEF Children's Rights Festival. The Princess will watch the film together with the pupils after which she will engage in a talk with them.

-Also on Thursday, the Princess will attend the "Economy and Nature in Balance" symposium. Thursday's events will conclude with a reception at Governor Rijna's official residence.

-On Friday, the Princess will visit Washington Slagbaai National Park. The Princess will receive a tour of the visitors' centre, drive through the Park and speak with rangers, researchers and staff.

- On Friday afternoon, Princess Beatrix will visit the cultural residents Hòfi Kultural. The Princess, who has a keen interest in arts, will meet with the initiators and residents, and unveil a piece of art.

-On Saturday, Princess Beatrix will attend a debate of the STINAPA Junior Rangers. As part of their training, the Junior Rangers organize a debate every year. This year's theme is: Will sustainable development hinder or benefit Bonaire's economy?"

An Island Council motion by the MPB Party to instruct the Island Government to explore connecting the Gotomeer with the sea was delayed because of the previously mentioned agreement signing. It recommends that an environmental impact report be required to study the consequences of the opening of Gotomeer to the sea. Funds for this can be applied for several agencies and this study can be the subject of a doctoral thesis by students from Wageningen, U. of Groningen or Utrecht.

ast Wednesday, motivated by bipartisan political and private frustration over inability of elected officials to administer the island, an ambiguous financial report and a deteriorating infrastructure, the Bonaire Island Council handed over self-government to Dutch bureaucrats. The Council vote was unanimous (with one abstention, PDB's Clark Abraham). Island Governor, Edison Rijna signed on behalf of Bonaire, State Secretary Knops for the Dutch government. The 22-page agreement was 13,300 words long but was only available for review 48 hours prior to the vote.

While Bonaire's elected officials remain in place, unlike in St. Eustatius where the Dutch sent local officials were sent home, island affairs will be run by a specially appointed "program manager's administrative agreement" to reorganize the financial management and the island's administrative organization. The new administrative agreement covers a period of four years, with an interim evaluation at the end of 2020. According to Knops, the agreement should lead to "visible results in the area of traffic and infrastructure. healthy food and affordable social housing on the island." Next year's local elections may be postponed.

Until something changes the island will be administered by civil servants of the Dutch BZK (*Ministerie van Binnenlandse Zaken en Koninkrijksrelaties*- Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations).

Critical to the agreement was the release of \notin 9 million in projects for

the island. Prior to the agreement former Bonaire political leader **Ramonsito Booi** observed that fiscal trust had deteriorated since the days when the Dutch could "hand over NAf10 million with a simple agreement" as it did to assist in the purchase of Klein Bonaire.

Booi offered the idea that perhaps "We should have the courage to think about a total integration in the Dutch government, where Bonaire becomes part of a province. After all, provincial governments, unlike ministries, are used to working together with municipalities."

Democratic Party leader Clark Abraham said, "We are giving the leadership away and pushing the island council aside, because the program manager is accountable to The Hague, not to us (Bonaireans)."

Elvis Tjin Asjoe, whose opposition MPB Party voted in favor, was quoted as saying, "Thanks to this agreement, many things will be achieved which are important to the island and the population."

Nevertheless Secretary Knops said he, "does not think there is intervention by The Hague. The Executive Council and the Island Council are in agreement with the agreements and also remain in office."

Bonaire's autonomy has been reduced. The Public Entity governing model established in 2010 has been demonstrated to be a failure. How much autonomy will Bonaire have after 2020 or when the four years are over? James Fines and his NKBB movement wants to refer back to The Netherland's colonial days and have Bonaire declared a non-self governing territory by the United Nations like French Polynesia. Total independence and reconnection with Curacao appear to be dead issues. What the majority of Bonaireans want is uncertain. Some say hold another Referendum, but that is not part of the recent agreement. \square G.D.

Born on Bonaire... January 30, 1961 – José Reyes



José Reyes

66 was born at Kaya Grandi **1**84. My father, **Manuel** Fernandez, was Venezuelan. He owned two fruit boats and would come to Bonaire every two weeks. My mother, Lucia Reyes-Martijn, is Bonairean, she is 84 and presently lives on Curacao with my sister Lupe who has her own TV show and who's pretty wellknown there. My dad passed away on my 30th birthday. He was 79.

Growing up I became a tennis player; tennis was my first love. I lived at the tennis court. Right after school I made sure to be there every day at 1.30. I would not even go home to eat; I would buy food at the nearest Chinese. The earliest I would go home was at 7pm and the latest at 10 at night when they would shut down the lights. Rudy Domacassé was my trainer, but he was (and still is) my cousin, and I have fond memories of Pachicho Thodé, who would also come to train with me.

In 1972, when I was 11, I participated at a Pan American tournament on Curacao and I came in third! Then, when I was 12, we moved to Venezuela to live in Puerto Cabello. I didn't want to go but my parents tricked me by telling me there were lots of tennis courts in Venezuela where I could continue and grow in the sport that I loved so much.

However, it wasn't the case; I never saw a tennis court in Puerto Cabello, so I buried my love for tennis and I've never watched one single game up to this day. The first time I picked up a racket aft all those years, was this year on Bonaire, to play with my cousin Robby Domacassé. I am very sure that if I would have continued in the sport I would have been playing in the world's top matches.


1982 I was offered a scholarship in Los Angeles for one year, to train with Kaicho Kiyoshi Yamazaki, who is the overseas Chief Instructor and president of Japan Karate-Do Ryobu-Kai. I graduated black belt in 1983 and opened my first dojo in Cabimas, a city on the shore of Lake Maracaibo in Venezuela, and it's still open. In 1989 I was part of the Aselection of Venezuela in the category 70-75 kilos and in 1990 I was ranked 5th at the World Championships in Mexico. From '89 till '97 I won many championships, national and international and during that time I opened four more dojos. My challenge was to create karate champions in Venezuela and I succeeded throughout the years.

myself, always the same person. So, when I found God, I wanted to share that happiness with others. Three months after my encounter I started preaching from the heart because I wanted people to know that Jesus Christ is real.

And as I always had the calling to help people, I started learning natural therapies. I studied traditional Chinese treatments- acupuncture, moxa (moxibustion) and cupping. Then I studied naturopathy – natural remedies like hologram and osteo treatments for pain relief - in Venezuela for four years. At first my patients were purely my karate students and their families and I would never charge them. It was passion, not work. At this point my two loves were God and karate but also curing people, although, the way I see it, God is curing those people, not me. I feel blessed to be able to serve God this way.

December 2017 my sister Lupe came to Bonaire and had a chat with a deputy and I got the opportunity to come to Bonaire to do more with karate for Bonaire. I didn't want to leave Venezuela, because when I left Bonaire as a kid. I never intended to return: I felt that my family had robbed me of all my chances to become a top tennis player. And over the years, living my life in Venezuela, I got used to fast paced city-life and the hustle and bustle of a country that was booming. At that time Bonaire seemed slow and small to me and it didn't appeal to me at all.

When I came to Bonaire this

discover the purpose God has planted in them. Karate can also help. I am a Sensei 5th Dan. When you practice karate, you connect with your entire being, with every muscle and tendon and with your character. You are aware of every single thing in your surrounding and of every feeling of those around you, because all your senses are wide open. I never use the self-defense technique as a

therapy, but I am not prescribing any medicines. My intake is a health scan, quantum magnetic resonance, followed by an evaluation, and from the evaluation I will come up with recommended therapies which I do charge for. The idea is for the pain to be gone, preferably in one treatment and for the patient not to come back as a patient but for karate practice because he or she will feel healthy again and would want to stay healthy!

My purpose in life is helping people to understand their physical, emotional and spiritual health. That is what I came for. Every day my doors are open for everyone at Kaya Kanari 42 or people can call me at 795-3473.

I enjoy every day that I am here. I still have three dojos in Venezuela and one in Peru that I will keep on running. I also have five children, both in Venezuela and in the US, and I have five grandchildren of which the oldest is 19. So that's my life. Here I am no longer a foreigner. When I arrived in January I was Venezuelan. Now I feel Bonairean and after all, that's what I am."

On Saturday, November 10, at the national meeting day of *Stichting Dierenlot* in Gorinchem, The Netherlands, *Stichting Dierenlot*, a Dutch-based organization supporting animal foundations in **The Netherlands, honored the Foundation FKK Animal Rescue Bonaire**. More than 1200 visitors attended.

FKK Animal Rescue received a second animal ambulance, which was very welcome and necessary. Now, FKK will be able to respond quicker and more efficiently to emergency calls. But there was more to come, and that was entirely unexpected!

Stichting Dierenlot also holds an election for "Animal Aid Worker of the Year." BONAIRE VEGETATION

hat the vegetation on Bonaire used to look very different from now, and that it is due to the activities of humans, pigs, donkeys and goats?


We humans tend to change the environment of the places we go, through many different kinds of actions. Some of those actions involve the removal of vegetation to build homes, cutting down trees to use for fuel or building materials and cultivating the land to grow crops to feed ourselves. Indeed, 75% of the Earth's surface is under pressure from human activities.

Here on Bonaire it seems to have been only small impacts that were made by the Amerindians that lived here before the American continents were "discovered," presumably because they were so few in number. When the European colonizers came, they started to cut

down trees on a much bigger scale than the indigenous people ever had. They also brought goats, donkeys and other tured or scratched by spines, chances are animals. Some of them were let loose, free to roam the island in search of food, and reproduced without control. This had devastating effects on the vegetation, and by 1816 almost every tree on Bonaire and Klein Bonaire was gone due to human activities and free roaming animals.

After the exploitation of wood that took place until 1816, some actions were taken to reduce the devastation. Unfortunately, there was no enforcement of the regulations and they did not apply to private lands. Deforestation actually continued into the 1950s because of the cultivation of *Aloe* Vera grown and harvested on the island and can handle the goats, donkeys and pigs the cutting and burning of wood to make charcoal. These activities continue today, but on a smaller scale.

Today, much of the island is protected and there is a good possibility that the landscape could start to return to its normal state with more trees, both in total numbers of trees and also in numbers of common species. But for this to happen something needs to be done about the free roaming grazing animals: the donkeys, goats and pigs. Compared to Curacao which has a similar climate to Bonaire, there is far less woody vegetation cover on Bonaire. Scientists consider the donkeys, goats and pigs to be the major cause of this.

is hard to get around without getting puncthat it is because of the Kuida or Obada. At least the Kuida is a native tree on Bonaire but should probably be found in much fewer numbers if the grazing animals didn't eat their competitors. When the Kuida is found in other parts of the world, it is classified as an aggressive invader.

STINAPA regularly monitors the many different tree species on Bonaire to see if and how the vegetation is changing. During the recent drought, we have seen that even some of the trees that are resistant to grazing are having a hard time. The Divi Divi is one example of a tree that, in some areas, pretty well, but it can't handle drought very well at all.

In a world where climate change is making events like droughts, heavy rainfall and tropical storms more common and life harder for many native species of trees and animals, it is really important that we help to reduce the negative effects from other sources. One way to help is to keep the populations of goats, donkeys and pigs on Bonaire under control so that they don't overgraze the native vegetation.

History tells us that the vegetation has already changed greatly from its natural state. Let us work towards solutions for raising livestock in a sustainable way in order to restore some of the natural veg tion and beauty of our island, for a healthier Bonaire. **D** *Caren Eckrich*, STINAPA biologist.

Grazing by goats, donkeys and pigs slows the change towards a more natural habitat since they eat the young trees and destroy their roots as well. Grazing also benefits some species of trees that are not being eaten by the goats and donkeys, like the Kuida and the Obada (Papiamentu) or the tos Mesquite tree and Twisted acacia. These trees have thorns for protection and can be found in large numbers all over Bonaire. They can also grow as thorny bushes, and if you have found yourself in an area where it

Fernando Nava Bravo. The game, Saviors of Kimeria -Bonaire Squad is a fast cooperative game with an educational twist.

The game tells the story of the planet of Kimeria, distant but similar to Earth. However, Kimerians polluted the planet so much that all their animals, called Kimeras, became extinct.

They have now cleaned up their world and are trying to bring their Kimeras back to life, but to accomplish that they need to combine DNA from different animals.

Doctor Maganda, a Kimerian scientist, searched throughout the whole galaxy until she discovered that only Bonaire has the animals with the DNA that, if combined in a precise form, will help them unravel the extinction of their fauna.

She constructed a "warp portal" to receive the DNA samples, but the portal is only stable for 30 seconds at a time and can reconstitute only one Kimera.

Now Dr. Maganda needs our help to collect and combine the needed DNA samples and place them in the portal before it collapses.

The player's mission is to work together to combine the Bonaire animals needed to form each Kimera in less than 30 seconds, one Kimera at a time. Once all 16 Kimeras have been recreated and placed on their spot in the map, you win.

The game includes a neoprene mat game board, a 30-second hourglass, 27 animal cards and 16 Kimera tokens. After the cards are dealt, a player has 30 seconds to combine the cards in his/her hand to assemble the Kimera that was revealed on the token they selected. If successful, the Kimera is "un-extincted" and is placed on the game board

Hopefully, the games will be at the December 22 Christmas Market and in shops like Top 1 Toys and VDT before Christmas, but as Fernando Nava Bravo, the developer, said, "You know, importing to

Bonaire is a roller coaster.³

Currently the cards are in English and Papiamentu, but the instructions are in English. For the next update, instructions will be in Papiamentu as well. "How to play" videos for Youtube in English, Spanish and Papiamentu are planned.

The game will cost \$40. Development of an app and website is underway as are more support videos. The game takes approximately 30 minutes and is good for between two and seven players

But Kimera is more than entertainment. It's a learning tool. Fernando told us, "During the design phase I play-tested the game with my daughters, 6 and 9, and their friends. After a few games they were more knowledgeable about the animals of Bonaire, and they even picked up the Cartesian system (when placing the Kimeras in their location). But also they related to the story of Kimerians and how they polluted their world as related to us and Earth.

I am a firm believer that better games can help introduce complicated subjects to children, and I am very happy to see how my kids are learning about the fauna of Bonaire, because the first step to value our animals is to get to know them."

Saviors of Kimeria is the first 100% original environmental board game fully conceived and created in Bonaire.

If you like the game and its concept there are sponsorship opportunities available.

Since the game is in English and Papiamentu it makes it accessible to most people in Bonaire, but it's also attractive for tourists looking for a different souvenir and for a family experience.

This first run of the game will consist of 100 sets to be sold exclusively in Bonaire, and will be released between December 2018 and February 2019.





FIELD TRIP - RAMPS AND ART

t was time for a field trip. I accompanied Arti de Vries, chairman of MIVABO. He coordinates the project OLB (island government) initiated, where inhabitants who are 60 plus and those who suffer from a limitation get a ramp from their front door to the street. This way they can leave the house safely and get into the wheelchair-taxi and back again. We left for Rincon to see how far the project is developing. In Rincon there are nine inhabitants who applied and had their petition approved.

Not every house is suited for the purpose because there is no house that is built the same way. At some houses the ramp had to be built from the kitchen and there were porches to consider. It turned out to be a huge puzzle, but the man on the job did his utmost to comply and to make safe ramps that meet the standard. As soon as the project in Rincon is finished, the other barios will be taken care of.

It was also time to pay the **FKPD** (handicapped center in Rincon) a visit and take a look at the art project MIV- ABO started. A real competition is going on and FKPD is the first project we paid a visit to. A lot of art supplies were generously donated and this was appreciated very much. We were welcomed very warmly and it was so good to be back after so many years.

The artists were right at it, painting beautiful paintings, using nice and bright colors, and those who could not express themselves were assisted by an employee. They told us what was painted, and why, what the painters wanted to express, the stories behind the pictures. The artists were very proud of their art and the fact that it is a competition made them fierce. They all want to win. They explained that all the art will be on display in a real art gallery and the winning art will be used in an artsy project with restaurants, where the paintings will be printed on special decal paper, then embedded in an "underplate," get glazed and baked in a kiln. Not all the artists had finished their painting, so we can anticipate even more exciting art from the FKPD at the exposition.

After that we left for **COCARI** (day care for the elderly). We noticed that there was no art for us to see here yet so we got a rain-check and will be back in two weeks.

We headed back to Playa and because of all that gorgeous rain it seemed we drove through awesome green meadows.

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

he best time to experience new things in your garden is now. And while I'm going around on my bike I see so many nice pergolas and trellises covered with beautiful vines. Yes, this rain has let miracles happen and while Bonaire can be so dry and tough for plants, it is now green and there are beautiful gardens all over the place.

The Pergola

So first let me introduce the pergola. What is that? A pergola is a shaded outdoor garden feature like a shaded walkway, passageway or sitting area of vertical posts usually supporting cross-beams and a sturdy open lattice, often upon which woody vines are trained. There are also freestanding pergolas that can provide a sitting area that allows for breeze and light sun, but offer protection against direct sunlight.

Pergolas also give climbing plants a structure on which to grow.

On Bonaire there are some beautiful plants one can use for a pergola. But before going to the plants first look from which one can make a pergola. There are different materials like wood, vinyl, fiber-

glass, aluminum, CPVC, brick or stone. Think also of beach wood to make an adventurous looking pergola. But wood is high maintenance, so an alternative can be vinyl, fiber glass, aluminum or CPVC. These materials do not require yearly paint or stain like wood.

When looking around I see so many climbing plants full of flowers, and it's lovely to see them hanging around and on a pergola. A grapevine is a nice plant which grows easily in this climate. I often get grapes from my neighbors who get them from Rincon. They are small dark purple grapes that grow on a vine on a pergola on their porch. So nice to pick and eat from those grapevines while enjoying a visit in the shade and breeze in the afternoon. The grapes are a little sour, but still good enough to eat. Sometimes I make juice from them or mix them with other sweet fruit. Delicious! The vines can be trained into a variety of styles, depending on what you like. When you want grapes, the amount of sunlight, humidity, and wind is important to consider.

Other plants for the pergola can be trinitaria (bougainvillea). There are different colors and you can keep it to one

color or make a combination of colors. Remember this plant has sharp thorns so consider that if it's where you sit and relax

see it in many yards on balconies and porches. This plant grows easily on Bonaire and it can totally cover a pergola or fence very quickly. Then there is also the mandavilla, a vine with yellow flowers that blooms the whole year round. It's a beloved plant on Bonaire. You'll spot its yellow bells hanging over pergolas, fences, porches, balconies and trellises.

The only unpleasant thing to say is that mosquitoes love to live in these vines. The more bushy and dark it is, the more mosquitoes and bugs you have around. But you can do something about it. Candles with citronella smell or smoke of the dry coconut. Or just a simple fan blowing away the mosquitoes.

The Trellis

Another decoration in a garden can be a trellis. This is an architectural structure, usually made from an open framework or lattice of interwoven or intersecting pieces of wood, bamboo or metal that is normally made to support and display climb-

ing plants. There are many types of trellises for different places and for different plants. Rose trellises are popular and, for Bonaire, a trinitaria trellis is great with so Another plant is the purple trumpet. You many flowers the whole year round and it's always green.

> Some plants will climb and wrap themselves around the trellis without much artificial help while others need training by passing the growing shoots through the trellis and / or tying them to the framework. Trinitaria need to be tied. Watch the thorns and be careful when busy tying.

Trellises are vertical, while a pergola refers to trellis-work that is laid horizontally above head height to provide a partial "roof" in a garden.

You only need to start with a beautiful pergola or trellis and vines.



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THE SEVEN SISTERS

hat are the names of the stars in the Seven Sisters star group? There's Alcyone, Maia, Merope, Sterope, Taygeta, Celaeno, and Electra.

These are also the names of the seven daughters of Atlas... and are also stars in the brightest cluster in the sky. Known as **The Pleiades**, the

Seven Sisters make a great sight in the evening Sky Park sky.

I always look forward to seeing not one, but two star clusters in the sky. The starry cousins of The Pleiades, nicknamed The Hyades, aren't too far away.

Where can you find the sisters and their cousins? On any night this week around 8pm, face east. Let's find the Seven Sisters cluster first since it's the brighter one. One third the way up, when you face east, at first glance you might miss them. The Pleiades may look like a small, faint cloud at first, but if you gaze a little deeper you may be able to pick out 5, 6, or 7 individual stars in the cluster.

For the ancient Greeks, the Pleiades were a group of sisters fleeing the amorous advances of Orion the hunter, and they only escaped by divine intervention. The gods took pity on the sisters and turned them into doves. They flew away from Orion and landed up in the sky where they sit today.

Do they look like a little dove to you? A sharp-eyed first grader told me what he saw instead. You know there's a big dipper and a little dipper right? He called this the "dinky dipper."

I know they're called the Seven Sisters, but the Pleiades star cluster really consists of nearby. In fact it'll look like the Moon hundreds of stars

The seven brightest sure look like a "dinky the next. dipper," but zoomed in we can see a lot more.

Let's place the Sisters named earlier. The brightest is called Alcyone. Forming the rest the Dove, aka the dinky dipper. of the bowl is Merope, Electra, snd Maia. The fainter sisters are Sterope on the top, Taygeta and then Celaeno.

But what are the two brighter stars making get them out and behold the many stars the handle of this dinky dipper? Those stars bear the names of the parents, Atlas and Pleione.



So when you're straining to see the Seven Sisters with the naked eye, sometimes you can see a parent or two and miss a dimmer Sister. This cluster was formed from one huge **nebula** and is about 400 light years away from us. These blue stars are massive. Alcyone, for instance would be 10 times wider than our Sun and shines 2400 times brighter!

Now let's find the other star cluster, the Hyades. Look for a sideways, V-shape of five stars below the Pleiades. This is the face of the constellation Taurus the Bull. Anchoring the bottom left of the v-shape is the really bright orange star named Aldebaran. And Aldebaran marks the eye of Taurus the Bull.

The stars in and around the v-shape are really part of a large open cluster of stars called the Hyades.

You can see some of the brighter Hyades with the naked eye and lots more with a pair of binoculars.

The Hyades are the closest open star cluster to Earth, at only 150 light years away. In total, there are about 250 stars in the cluster.

Keep an "eye" on this part of the sky later in the week because on November 22nd and November 23rd the nearly full Moon will be hopped over the Hyades from one night to

So, there you have it. Look to the east after sunset for the two star clusters. The brighter, and easier to find cluster is the Pleiades, aka

And the fainter one inside the face of Taurus the Bull is the Hyades.

If you have a pair of binoculars, definitely within the two clusters. The universe is amazing. Dean Regas & James Albury

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
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


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
