C ommunications *The Reporter* have received via social media and email suggest that Bonaire will lose stayover tourism by pandering to cruise ships. (see Letter to the Editor in this edition and comments on *The Reporter's* Facebook page.)

The correspondents are concerned that the hundreds of thousands of cruise visitors will undermine the health of the island's reefs and the road traffic and parking problems will inconvenience residents and overnight visitors while not contributing to the cost of managing the environment or improving the infrastructure.

► The Bonaire island government (OLB) experienced problems with its domain name bonairegov.com last week. As a result, it was not reachable by e-mail and its website, www.bonairegov.com was not active.

The recovery actions have been initiated. The problems should be resolved by the time you read this.

▶ It's a compassionate social benefit: If a person with a low income (no higher than \$1,073 per month) needs financial help for a large and necessary expense and has no money to pay for it, the RCN unit Social Affairs and Employment (SZW) can help. For example, when a refrigerator or stove breaks down, or when someone expects a baby, but does not have money for the layette. Special assistance is arranged for the specific situation. To determine eligibility, an employee of the RCN's SZW unit checks by interviewing the needy person and a home visit if appropriate. The assistance is always in the form of goods or services not cash.

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

On the Island Since... 2013 – John Joubert

44 Was born in Medellin, Colombia, but both my parents are from Curacao. When I was a couple of months old my mom and I went back to Curacao, where I grew up amidst my family. Then, when I was seven, I moved to Bonaire with my mother and stepfather. I stayed here for two years. After one year my mom and stepdad left for Holland to see how it was and whether they'd want to stay there for a longer period of time.

As it wasn't a sure thing that we were going to live in Holland permanently, they didn't want to interrupt my school so they left me with my granddad, Edgar Joubert, in his land house on Bonaire. It was a great time; I had a lot of freedom, there was plenty of space and I could play in the outback as much as I liked. I went to Papa Cornes elementary school and I loved – and still love - to swim. Together with my opa I went often to Slagbaai and Pink Beach. He really tried his utmost best to make it fun for me. After one year my mom and stepdad decided they wanted to stay in Holland and we settled in Hellevoetsluis, in the south-west of Holland, not far from Rotterdam.

Well, life went just ahead and in 2009, my girlfriend, **Maria-Olga**, who was born in Venezuela, and I, got married on Curacao. In 2010 our son **Jayden** was born in Rotterdam. At first we had planned to stay in Holland for another 10 to 15 years but the birth of our son changed everything. It was overwhelming to be new parents and we had the feeling we needed help and we missed our family.

So, in 2011 we went to live on Curacao. Jayden was eight months old. It was great. We lived close to cousins, uncles and mother but it was also tough because my mom had a freight forwarders company and I began running it. There was a lot to learn but at the same time I had to make sure everything went well. And it went well - we stayed for three years and worked very hard but one day, when I came to Bonaire for a funeral, I found out this was where I wanted to be. I'd forgotten I could be at the sea in a minute and how much I'd missed that. So, when I came back to Curacao, I told my wife I wanted to live on Bonaire again. She didn't agree; we were just building up our life on Curacao. However, I didn't give up. I went online and saw a job vacancy

land. Once we even attended the same New Year's Eve party! We became colleagues and followed the same customs training which we finished in July, 2016. In the meantime we'd become friends and that's how 'Pampered Dogs Bonaire' started. Both of us love dogs from when we were little and one day, when we were talking about the dogs we had, we came up with the idea to wash dogs on location, at people's houses. We're bringing (flea and tick) shampoo, nail cutters and towels and the only thing we need at the person's house is water. That's what we decided, to keep costs as low as possible. So far we're doing well and it's fun! Even dogs that are scared of water become quiet and let themselves be washed. It costs \$20 to have your dog washed; including grooming it's \$45. It's a fixed price, but it does depend on the size of the dog."

Deederick says, "I've loved dogs ever since I was a child and to me it's never just a dog – they are my family. I can't imagine a life without a dog. To me it's the same as a child. When I'd fin-

shinier and they loved it. So then we reached an agreement with the franchiser in Curacao and we've already placed three orders in a short period of time, which impressed him a lot."

John continues, "What makes me happy is the positive feedback we're getting from our clients. We do free home delivery, almost 24/7 and if necessary... within 30 minutes but not at night. Our dogclients are all different, big and small mixes, but also pedigree dogs. This food you can keep on giving from puppy to adult and it's also for small sized dogs. We have different kinds of food with more or less proteins and fat but also grain free food for dogs that are prone to skin problems. We find it important that dogs in general are getting more attention and better care and if people don't have time to do so or they can't do it themselves anymore but they want their dog to be clean and fresh, then we come to pamper your dogs! We're always doing it together and we check first on the dog to see what it is we're going to do. The grooming we do at home and if the dog can't be washed at the owner's place, we'll take it home as well.

In December 13 swimmers from the Bonairean Aquatics Club "Barracudas" participated in the 9th Siegfried Francisco Invitational on Curaçao. Eight Caribbean Netherlands swimming clubs took part in this competition.

After three days of swimming, the Bonaire Barracudas swimmers took a total of 250 seconds off their best times, resulting in 38 personal bests.

Notable were **Kiki and Stijn de Valk**, **Elina Bosma and Koen Verhoeven** who all swam beautifully in their first competition. Elina received a performance ribbon and 8th place in the 100m freestyle and Koen a 7th place and ribbon for the 50m backstroke.

Other performance ribbons were received by Ruben Volmuller on the 50m freestyle and 50m breaststroke, Jonathan van Meerten on the 100m backstroke and 200m freestyle **Quinn Divine** -Dalm on the 100m backstroke and Melissa van Blerk on the 100m breaststroke and 100m backstroke. Melissa also won a beautiful silver medal on the 50m breaststroke in a brilliant time. Nicole Pedersen achieved one 6th place, one 7th place and three 8th places in beautiful personal records. Valentina van den Berge improved her times on all of her distances. Brothers Basi and Marcel Spruit were ready to go. Basi got a nice 8th place on the 200m breaststroke and swam several personal records. Marcel won two gold medals at 50m &

100m breaststroke, two silver medals at the 200m breaststroke & 50m butterfly stroke and three bronze medals at the 50m back crawl &100m freestyle.

Trainer **Anita Smits** won three gold medals on the long distance swims: the 400m medley and the 800m & 1500m freestyle.

At the end of this month The Barracudas Water Polo team will travel to Curacao for another competition. Interest in swimming as a competitive sport is accelerating on Bonaire under the guidance of experienced coaches. Bonaire has the potential to offer its swimming youngsters the same opportunities it offered its windsurfers a generation ago.

Currently most training takes place at the sea-pool in front of the Arthur "Tului" Domacassé Park on the waterfront. Organizers are hoping that a competition-size swimming pool will be constructed on Bonaire because international competitions are all in pools. hat the temperature in the sand decides if baby turtles become male or female?

Turtles are some of the coolest animals in the ocean as can be seen in the popular movie "Finding Nemo." If you don't believe me, you can see sea turtles for yourself in many places around Bonaire, which is home to three of the world's seven species of sea turtles. They will act all cool and relaxed as long as you don't chase them in the water where they spend more than 99.9% of their lives.

Every once in a while the female turtles have to do something that is not so cool but very important; they have to leave their home - the ocean - and come up on to dry land to lay their eggs deep in the sand. This is a short but exhausting trip for an animal that is used to near weightlessness in the water and swimming with flippers. Nesting usually takes an hour or two. The female turtles do this several times during the nesting season, which lasts from April/May through December in Bonaire. In 2018, the conservation organization Sea Turtle **Conservation Bonaire recorded 105 nests** on Bonaire and Klein Bonaire. When the eggs with the baby turtles inside are deposited in the sandy hole that their mother made, they don't yet have a sex; they are neither male nor female. But after the eggs are buried deep down in the sand, something happens and when they finally hatch and crawl out of the sand and into the ocean 60 days later, the sea turtles have become either male or female.

In humans, a specialized chromosome that we get from our father's sperm decides if we will be a boy or a girl. But turtles don't have these chromosomes. Instead, it's the temperature in the sand that decides what sex a sea turtle will become. If the temperature in the sand is below 29°C, the eggs will develop into male sea turtles and if the temperature is above 29°C, they will develop into females.

Since temperatures are rising due to climate change, there is a real concern that in the near future there will be too few males

around for the sea turtles to be able to reproduce. In many places, there are already more female than male sea turtles hatching.

Researchers are trying different ways to lower the temperature in sea turtle nests so that more males will hatch and balance the sex ratio. Since many organizations that are working to protect nature have really tight budgets and seldom get enough funding from governments, there is a need for these methods to be not only as effective as possible, but they also have to be low cost and low-tech. In a number of experiments made on Bonaire's sister island, Saint Eustatius, researchers tried out different techniques of reducing the temperature by 1) shading the nests with different materials and 2) moving the eggs to a new location. The most effective material to lower the temperature by shading the nests turned out to be palm leaves which lowered the temperature by an average of 0.6° C. Relocating the nests to another beach was also proven to be effective since the temperature in the sand could vary by 1.9° C between beaches that were only one kilometer apart. These conservation strategies can be useful to reduce the impacts of a warming climate and help ensure that sea turtles will continue to be cool and beautiful animals that may be seen and enjoyed by Bonaire's






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Bonaire By Numbers

Employee jobs by economic activity, 2016*







Jobs On Bonaire Lack of education is the predominant reason people say they are unwilling or unavailable for work. Other smaller groups include people who are unable to work due to a disability (12%) or because they have to take care of family (8%).

Employee jobs: There are 9,300 employee jobs on Bonaire. The sector with the highest number of jobs is wholesale and retail trade, followed by the public sector and accommodation and food service activities.

Employee wages: The average annual wage on Bonaire stood at \$23,700 in 2016, almost the same as in 2015. The median wage amounted to \$19,000. This means that half of all employed people

earned wages below this level while the other half earned higher wages.

Wages vary widely, depending on the characteristics and type of work. In 2016, women's wages were 8% lower than men's. This pay gap is narrowing: in 2011, the difference was 18%.

Education

Bonaire has eight government-funded schools, including seven primary schools. The secondary school offers both general and vocational education.

On October 1, 2017, Bonaire had 3,525 pupils enrolled in these schools. Slightly over half were in primary education, nearly one third in secondary general education and 15% in secondary vocational (MBO) education. Apart from these schools, there is one private primary school. **D** *Press release*

More Bonaire Ambassadors Named

L ast year 155 people were named Bonaire Ambassadors: 116 from the USA, 16 from The Netherlands, seven from Germany, six from Canada,, four from Norway, three from Switzerland, two from Argentina and one from England .

A Bonaire Ambassador is a visitor who has been a guest on the island 10 or more times. The Tourist Bureau (TCB) makes the awards usually based on the recommendation of a Bonaire hotel or dive shop. There are three basic levels: bronze for 10 years, silver for 15 and gold for 20. The loyalty program was established by **Delno Tromp** when he was part of the TCB

A Garden? Just

OUT WITH THE OLD, IN WITH THE NEW

t's 2019, a new year and new things. Happy new year to all of you. Wishing you a great year with good health, success in all your goals and wishes. And a lot of fun in life.

I want to get rid of old things at the end of the year. And one of the things I needed to get rid of was my big pumpkin plant. Yes, with pain in my heart, like a devoted gardener, I loved my pumpkin plant. It was growing so beautifully, with some flowers every morning, a few female and a lot more male flowers. And a lot of bugs and bees coming and going in the flowers. Because of these bugs' activities the female flowers got fertilized and that is how I got some nice pumpkins.

The plant was growing very fast, like it had a motor inside. Every morning I saw more stems and big leaves. In my opinion no plant grows so fast as a pumpkin plant.

I used to pick the flowers after 9 in the morning when they were ready to close. Pumpkin flowers can't stand heavy sunlight so as soon as daylight gets too strong they close. By that time bees and bugs had their food from the flowers and meanwhile the female flowers got fertilized. So I picked the flowers, washed them, and cut them in small pieces. I scrambled an egg, added two flowers in one egg, then fried it. It's delicious and very healthy, lots of minerals and vitamins. Also the young stems with very small just developing leaves are good to eat. I chop them in small pieces and add them to cooked potatoes with some butter and salt and mash it all, ending with a green puree.

So my pumpkin plant was doing great, in fact too great. It was very dominant in the yard, taking so much space and crawling over all my other plants which couldn't get sunlight and had no space to grow. The pumpkin plant started to grow on the wall of my house where I have my bedroom. My view was blocked and I saw little bugs crawling on the stems to the window. No, no way these bugs in my bedroom! So I decided to get rid of the pumpkin plant with pain in my heart. On the other hand I like to see my yard with the other nice plants again and to have space to start with some new plants.

So on the third Sunday morning of December a friend and I started chopping up the pumpkin plant and pulling it out of the soil. Can you imagine: two very high heaps. We put the heaps into boxes because my friend wanted to make compost. So that helped me to overcome the sad feeling about the beautiful pumpkin plant. It's also nice to start the new year with a lot of space in the garden for new plants and fun in gardening.

Garden Challenges

The new year has of course new garden challenges. I know already that this year might be a tough garden year. It's said that El Nino weather will be dominant in the big trees. And for sure all plants will the Caribbean, and that means very dry weather during almost the whole year. You may have noticed that there wasn't much rain in the past month. Normally we yerba hole and spinach will have a chance have a good rain at the end of the year until the beginning of February. That is not what we see now. Normally I don't need to water the plants in December. But for that and think of the Neem tree leaves I did this time. So be prepared for this phenomenon. Look for plants that can stand very dry coco, tamarin, mango, knipp, mispel, cashew, soursop, hoba, pomegranate can take dry weather and hot sun. Maybe they cumstances. will grow very slowly, but they can stand El Nino. Papaya, cherry, bacoba, moringa a good soil mix from compost, charcoal, will suffer a lot and you might lose them. Always save the rain water for these plants. Their roots don't go deep into the

ACCESSIBILITY IS A HUMAN RIGHT

All those elderly citizens with mental handicaps also need attention. They are not children and also need specific care and well trained mentors.

We all love Bonaire, we live here and we need our island to be a safe haven for eve-

Maskarada-A Unique Tradition

Maskarada is one of the most cultural, authentic, original and fascinating traditions on Bonaire. Every New Year the group of silent, mysterious, masked people starts at either at the Bestuurcollege (government house) or the governor's home to dance, to tease the onlookers and perform little skits—the same every year.

This year they first performed the Governor's home. Later the group moved on to other sites like the hospital, the old folks home and then to the houses of people in the barrios. It is said that good luck will come to those who invite them into their homes. They make another appearance on January 5 and 6 (Three Kings Day, Epiphany).

They arrive silently, following a group of musicians – an accordion, a tambu (drum), a raspa (file) and a quarto (large ukulele), and the skits and dancing begin.

Maskarada has been going on in living memory of even the oldest person on Bonaire, it is said, except for when it might have been rained out, and in 2012 when the group, the costumes and props all became worn out and could not appear.

Maskarada is important because Bonaire is the only island of the Dutch Caribbean where this unique custom exists in this form. Maskarada had some bad times awhile ago with lack of financing and assistance. But over the past few years thanks to the energy of the North Salina volunteers organization, Maskarada is back. All has been rejuvenated—the actors, the glistening costumes and the sparkling props, the enthusiastic musicians.

This year the costumes are even more fantastic, unique, beautiful. Everyone smiled as the cast performed their skits — hooking the shark which goes into death throes, the matador facing the bull, and of course the dancing with the audience.

Congratulations to the Nawati/North Salinja group for keeping this beloved tradition alive. \square

A NEW NEAR FOR THE SHELTER OLD YEAR RESULTS

The New Year has begun and Animal Shelter Bonaire is looking forward to another year of caring for unwanted animals and educating our community on proper companion animal care and the absolute necessity of sterilization. As we look back on 2018, the numbers indicate that the Shelter's mission is meeting with some success.

STERILIZATIONS: A record number of sterilizations for 2018! Through the Shelter's Free Sterilization Program, 524 pet owners had their dog or cat sterilized! Considering that one un-sterilized female cat and her offspring can produce 420,000 kittens in 7 years and one unsterilized female dog and her offspring can produce 67,000 puppies in 6 years, sterilizing 524 pets in just one year prevented hundreds of thousands of unwanted animals from being born on the island. Despite this wonderful progress over the 14 years of the free sterilization program, the number of abandoned animals also continues to grow. Continuing education about the Shelter's free sterilization program, increasing the numbers of sterilizations and obtaining financial support for the program are critical. We need your help! ADOPTIONS: Loving homes were found for 161 shelter residents in 2018. 56 cats/kittens and 105 puppies/dogs were welcomed into their fur-ever homes during the year. There are still plenty of healthy, loving cats and dogs that are looking for their home, so please pass by the Shelter if you are thinking about adding a pet to your family.

RETURNED TO OWNERS: Thanks to the pet microchipping program and the Facebook page "Pet Alert Bonaire," 22 animals that were lost and brought to the Shelter were reunited with their rightful owners. It is important that owners of



both cats and dogs take advantage of the microchip process to insure a speedy reunion in the event their pets becomes lost. Animal Shelter Bonaire and the other animal welfare groups on the island are cooperating in the establishment of a comprehensive database of chip numbers to allow quick and easy access to owner information. If your pet is chipped, please register the chip number and your contact information with Animal Shelter Bonaire or any of the veterinarians or other Bonaire animal welfare groups.

appy New Year! Welcome again to the Bonaire Sky Park. No fee increase for visitors this year, it's still free.

Let's highlight the best, most astronomical and extra-terrestrial events of 2019. We have a lot to look forward to, including a total Lunar Eclipse and a Planetary Conjunction in January.

We'll pick our best meteor showers of the year and preview an event so rare, that it won't be visible from Caribbean again until the year 2049. So, let's head to the future and see what's up in 2019.

The first major astronomical event of 2019 happens on the night of Sunday, January 20th. It's a Full Moon that night, And Bonaire is dead center in the path of a total lunar eclipse. Let's follow the "blood moon"... across the night of January 20th. Duration: 5 hours, 11 minutes, 33 seconds Duration of totality: 1 hour, 1 minute, 58 seconds

After 1:43 am on Sunday, the shadow will begin to wipe away, leaving the Full Moon back to normal again at about 2:50 am. So, mark your calendars for January 20th, so you're not a day late.

Remember back in the summer and fall in 2018? Back when we had all those planets in the nighttime sky? We had Venus, Jupiter, Saturn, and Mars. Well, now only Mars is remaining. You can look a safe solar filter. After all, you'll be starfor the red planet shining high in the southwestern sky after dark in January. The others headed to the morning sky, and you can see the two brightest planets before sunrise in the southeast. The brighter planet is Venus and the dimmer one is Jupiter.

Every so often, these dazzlingly bright planets appear close together in what is called a **conjunction**. Keep close tabs on Venus and Jupiter this January because as



the days roll on, they'll get closer and closer. And on the mornings of January 22nd and 23rd we've got a conjunction!

Although we can predict the dates of the meteor showers in 2019, it's hard to say if any of them will produce stellar shooting star shows. I always like the Perseid meteor shower that happens each August 13th. You have to stay up late. But in 2019 the nearly full Moon may wash out many meteors

In autumn, we have the **Orionids** which peak on the morning of October 22. And then there is the Lenonids on the morning of November 18. Don't expect the sky to be falling with any of these meteor showers. But you won't know what you'll see until you look up!

Finally, we have a super rare astronomical alignment happening in 2019. It's called a Transit of Mercury and it happens when the tiny planet Mercury comes between us and the Sun. On November 11th, Mercury will slowly cross in front of the Sun's disc and make a teeny, tiny eclipse. However, you'll need to prepare. The transit of Mercury will happen during the daytime between the hours of 8:30 am and 2 pm Sky Park time. You will be able to see the whole thing, BUT you will need ing at the Sun, which is bad to do without protection. Otherwise you will go blind. And finally, you'll need magnification. Mercury is so small that you'll need to magnify it. So you'll need safe filters that fit on binoculars or a telescope. Now you have plenty of time to prepare for the transit of Mercury and everything else coming up in 2019.■ G.D./Dean Regas & James Albury

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
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
