In 1943, Simone Melchior Cousteau became the **first woman** SCUBA diver when she tried a new invention called the aqualung created by her husband Jacque Yves Cousteau and Emile Gagman.

Bonaire has seen a lot of women diver "firsts" since the early days of diving. Many made significant contributions to diving here and elsewhere, but they began on Bonaire. Several are responsible for some of the earliest photography taken of Bonaire's beautiful coral reefs like underwater photographers Geri Murphy of Skin Diver magazine fame and Pam Broderton. With their images Bonaire became a major dive destination.

Bonaire has a long history of women divers making a difference only in the diving community, but more importantly, to the economy and the environment of this nature rich island.

We have listed a few of the many unique women who have made exceptional contributions on Bonaire.

Linda Baker has been instructor at Carib Inn for 29 years. She was the first ever recipient of REEF's Golden Hamlet Award for completing 1000 REEF fish surveys. They actually created the award for her. Linda logged a year underwater November 11, 2014 and her 10,000th dive on December 11, 2018. She is also a supervisor at

Bonaire's recompression chamber.

Elsmarie Beukenboom was the former director for STINAPA Bonaire in 2005. She was a driving force behind Tene Boneiru Limpi (Keep Bonaire Clean) and the reforestation project on Klein Bonaire. Elsmarie played a significant role in setting up a working program in combating the lionfish.

**Babs Van Heet Camp** was the first female owner and manager of a dive shop, The Dive Inn, on Bonaire.

Caren Eckrich currently works for STI-NAPA as a biologist. She previously ran Sea & Discover, teaching kids and adults about the coral reefs. Caren worked for CIEE teaching coral reef ecology and scientific diving.

**Sabine Engel** is the project manager for ecological restoration of Lac for STINA-PA. She developed the Mangrove Maniacs

Kalli De Meyer revitalized Bonaire Marine Park and was implemental in changing it to "Bonaire National Marine Park". She has dedicated nearly 30 years in nature conservation and sustainable resource management in the Dutch Caribbean. Kalli was the founding Executive Director of DCNA and an inaugural member of Women Divers Hall of Fame.

**Kitty Handschuh** is the current manager at Carib Inn and has worked there since

1987 as a divemaster and instructor. She served on the board for the Foundation Preservation Klein Bonaire and on the board of STCB.

Malin Kaisjer and Pam Teitel are the first certified cave divers on Bonaire and mapped caves for John Burge. She has been an instructor since 1988 and master instructor since 1992 certifying countless students and continues to do so. She is a supervisor in Bonaire's recompression chamber.

**Jenny Marchena** is the first Bonairean female dive guide/instructor in Bonaire

Mabel Nava has been the STCB (Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire) manager for 14 years. She has molded STBC into a viable group in providing the critical protection needed for Bonaire's turtles. In addition, Mabel educates the youth of Bonaire about the environment and works with them in monitoring Bonaire's turtle nests

**Jeannette Nolan**, certified by Captain Don Stewart, is the first female Bonairean to be SCUBA certified on Bonaire.

**Susan Porter** was certified in 1970 and author of Bonaire Shore Diving Made Easy, since 2005. The book was originally penned by Jessie Armacost. Susan has dived all 73 sites listed in the books.

**Dee Scarr** has operated Touch the Sea since 1982 teaching divers how to inter-

act with marine animals. She authored the "What's That" Dive Training column from 1991 to 2000. Dee is responsible for the sponge reattachment project of the Town Pier tying 700 plus sponges to the pilings that had been cleaned. She is the author of three books, many awards and an inaugural member of the Women Divers Hall of Fame. Dee played a major part in the Save Klein Bonaire campaign.

Suzi Swygert was the memorable woman diver in the yellow wet suit perfectly posed in most every underwater Bonaire image gracing the pages of major dive magazines in the 80s and 90s. She is a writer, photographer and co-author of several books on Bonaire. Suzi was also a major force in activating the STINAPA Junior Ranger program.

**Pam Teitel**, an instructor for 35 years, was Bonaire's first course director. Pam

Bonaire joined thousands of women scuba divers around the world on July 20 to celebrate Women Divers Day at Dive Friends. The global celebration is arguably the largest single day of organized diving. On this day women celebrate their passion for the ocean, the environment and themselves.

# FLOTSAM and JE

#### Caribbean Netherlands bans the use of single-use plastic.

Saba, St. Eustatius and Bonaire—islands surrounded by beautiful coral reefs and economically motivated to protect the marine environment—have agreed to end single-use plastic no later than 2021.

They signed an agreement with State Secretary Stientje van Veldhoven (Infrastructure and Water Management) during her recent visit. Van Veldhoven said, "The picture of a turtle with a straw in its nose is a notorious example of what discarded plastic can do. These turtles are swimming here, in the Caribbean Sea. And this step that we now take is also good for the climate; throwing away plastic after single use and burning it, is simply a deadly sin."

The three islands will draw up a plan of action within one year to eliminate single-use plastic effective 2021. The Ministry of Infrastructure and Water Management will contribute financially and provide legal expertise. Experiences from the European Netherlands will be considered, such as the results of the recycling of plastic packaging and the ban on free plastic bags.

#### New fuel handling facilities for Bonaire

New fuel handling facilities are going to be built on Bonaire. For planning purposes, the government is using a business model that will close the Hato location, expand the airport south terminal, and build two storage tanks near the Contour Global power plant. A pipeline will connect Contour Global to a delivery pier at BOPEC.

The airport facility will handle gasoline, diesel and kerosene. The Contour Global facility will handle fuel oil. It will assure that Bonaire can supply fuel oil independently without depending on a third party. At this point, Curoil will continue to be the Island's fuel supplier.

Bonaire has experienced long term fuel supply problems that became temporarily critical when BOPEC was seized.

A cooperation agreement will be concluded in the autumn in which Curoil, the Public Entity and the National Government will make agreements about roles, financing, process, permits, organization and feasibility study. The plan must be affordable; the security of supply must be guaranteed; and all modern safety and environmental requirements must be met. The construction will take approximately two years.

A Taskforce, "Long Term Fuel Supply Bonaire," has been working together on a structural solution of the fuel storage problems on Bonaire. It included the Public Body Bonaire (OLB), the Ministries Economic Affairs and Climate (EZK), the Infrastructure and Water Management (I&W), and Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations (BZK).



► The quarterly Clean Up Dive is Saturday, July 27th. Volunteers should check in at 9:30am at North Pier for a 10am briefing.

Divers should bring their certification cards (unless yours is on file), BMP tags and dive knife or shears for cutting fish line. You can contact Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire for more information about their turtle shaped line collectors. cepa@bonaireturtles. org Divers will be cleaning up around the pier. Diving under the pier is strictly forbidden as it is unsafe.

Non-divers are also needed to help with counting and logging the items removed from the water for PADI Project AWARE Dive Against Debris. The counting and logging will be conducted at Yellow Submarine after the dive.

At 6:00 pm, DiveFriends hosts a potluck BBQ for volunteers at their Hamlet Oasis location. It's a potluck, so please bring a snack, side-dish or dessert to share and they'll provide the main course and one beverage.

The clean-up is run by DiveFriends in collaboration with STINAPA and

Van Veldhoven, State Secretary Infrastructure and Water Management, together with Commissioner James Kroon (Environmental Planning), start site preparation for a fireworks storage facility in Santa Clara. For some time now Bonaire's fire department has been concerned that fireworks brought to the island are not stored safely.

#### WARNING FOR ALL USERS OF DIESEL FUEL.

The picture on the left shows a bottle with clean diesel fuel. On the right the residue that remained in the bottom of a 20 liter jerry can with diesel from a local gas station. Two months ago we took this sample to Curoil, the supplier of all fuels on Bonaire. They promised to investigate the contamination and let us know, but despite several reminders we never heard back from them. We repeated filling the jerry



can with diesel, found a similar residue and took a sample to the government inspection office (Directie Toezicht en Handhaving) but they showed no interest and referred us back to Curoil. Butcher, inspect your own meat!

You will recall that several months ago the gas station owners temporarily closed their stations to protest the poor quality of the Curoil fuels. *Rene Hakkenburg* 

(On receipt of this letter to the editor The Reporter queried Curoil and this is the response we received.)

Curoil recently received a complaint regarding the quality of the fuel. Within Curoil quality is a priority and it is within this context that Curoil immediately handled this complaint and took precautionary measures. Curoil supplied all gas stations with complementary filters to capture any dirt particles. In addition, Curoil has had the fuel tested by an independent party and the results showed that the diesel is an accordance with the applicable quality specifications. Furthermore, Curoil, partly in conjunction with the gas station owners, examined the entire distribution chain and took precautionary measures to further ensure the quality of our products.

The laws for boats on moorings within the Bonaire National Marine Park are quite clear. Various individuals try to interpret these rules but do not seem to understand them. One rule in particular is commonly misunderstood.

#### Only one boat per buoy or up to three small boats of 12 feet (3 meters).

This clearly states that only one boat **OR** up to 3 small boats. This does not say one dive boat AND one or more small boats.

It is both common courtesy and common sense not to drive a boat up to a mooring where divers are in the water. If there is an emergency, these small boats can cause delays and generally be in the way. Also it seems that many boat owners do not know the actual length of their boats and do exceed this 3 meter rule.

Do NOT tie up to a mooring when another larger boat already is there. Bruce Bowker

Letter to the editor,

A brutal string of Bonaire's Historic Donkey deaths has wildlife lovers heartbroken and the crisis isn't over yet.

A pregnant mother and her foal was killed when a speeding vehicle struck her. Their deaths were followed by six more donkeys killed and vehicles damaged, on our roads in a two week period. To date there have been 30 donkeys killed in traffic related accidents this year.

Bonaire local government and Dutch approval of The Donkey Salvation Plan, "Back to Nature" is urgent. The plan has been presented to the government six times. The plan is needed to protect Bonaire's Historic Donkeys, other imperiled animals, people and their vehicles.

However, It does not end there. The inhumane and unreasonable catching of the donkeys of Bonaire must stop now if we are to keep a sustainable amount that will allow a healthy breed to continue to exist.

This has been noted by many international geologist and equine professional by letter to our Governor. Some state, our "Historic Donkeys" that have been isolated here for 500 years are defiantly of international interest.

Persons without proper, extensive information are threatening Bonaire's healthy breed by rapidly eliminating our Historic Donkeys that are close descendants of the African Wild Nubian Ass. The animals have been taken from their natural Bonaire habitat by inhumane catching and the females have been isolated in an area without natural forage and shortage of food on occasions. Estimates raise as high as 700 animals

Please note once these species go extinct, we'll lose them forever.

Rightfully, the inhumane catching was stopped by the Red and Green Coalition Government until proper impact studies could be done. This rule was over turned, in 2019, by the ombudsman visit due to a letter to OLB with improper facts, that they did not attempt to verify.

Therefore the catching of the females and young has been allowed to continue due to this ruling. This is adding a round-the-clock threat to Bonaire's historic donkeys and their economic value that can extend to Bonaire's population.

Imagine a family living peacefully and a mother and her newborn calf being separated because persons with out proper studies refuse to abandon their elimination agenda.

## Ask Kate Bonaire real estate advice

Question: Are there any restrictions on foreign citizens buying Bonaire property? How long can I stay on Bonaire if I'm not a resident? Lena

Hi Lena, Anyone may buy a property on Bonaire, you do not have to become a resident of the island. American and Dutch

passport holders may stay on the island up to six months in a calendar year, passport holders from other countries are limited to three months in a six month period, with the six months beginning at time of arrival on the island.

You don't need a visa if you are a passport holder from a country whose nationals are exempted from the visa requirement (this includes visitors from European Union countries and the United States.) If you do need a visa, your time on the island is limited by the date on the visa.

#### Remembering Hans Hass Protecting Klein Bonaire

It was not until 1970 that Hans Hass returned to the sea as a diver. He began to make a series of films for television, and in 1976 he visited with his wife Lotte again Bonaire. Again he lived in a tent under the DiviDivi tree on Klein Bonaire, and dove at the wreckage of the Windjammer on the northwest coast.

He conducted an interview with Don Stewart about the development of scuba diving and tourism on Bonaire. About his visit he produced the TV-film "The Human Fish"

Hans Hass laid the foundation stone for all his future projects on Klein Bonaire in 1939. It was there that Hass set himself all those goals he was to achieve in the course of the years to follow. Therefore, there was no question for him to support a petition in February 1997 for a group that wanted to protect Klein Bonaire. "PORT CALL. Bonaire's waterfront weekly" (*The Bonaire Reporter's* predecessor) published his handwritten open letter:



"Plea for Klein Bonaire!

In 1939 I made Klein Bonaire our headquarter for skin diving and underwater photography. In fact we were the first to explore coral reefs in such a way - so Klein Bonaire is a historical spot for modern diving .A tourist development of Klein Bonaire would be a shame. Klein Bonaire should be kept as it is. Please transform it not into a tool of commerce.

Prof. Dr. Hans Hass"

2019 is Hans Hass' 100th birth year. 60 years after Han's first visit to Bonaire, we thank author Michael Jung for allowing us to publish excerpts from his book in remembrance of Hans Hass' life and contributions. Here the circles close.

## Former OTB director charged

On July 15 Lieutenant Governor Edison Rijna brought formal charges against S. Balentien, past director of the government NV, Oil Trading Bonaire (OTB).

In recent weeks the media has reported that the past director of OTB, S. Balentien, overpaid himself by more than \$ 388,000 between 2014 and 2018. Balentien claimed that the payments were intended as an 'advance' on a modified management agreement and promised fee increase.

The Public Prosecutor's Office in Bonaire (OM) reviewed the file previously submitted by Gov. Rijna, and has found no signed agreements and no clear verbal commitments to justify the amounts paid. Because the charges concern a government NV, the national criminal investigation department will conduct the investigation. *Source: Department of Public Body Communication Bonaire*

Inspired by its world class diving, collision of cultures and starkly beautiful desert climate, it was an easy choice for author Nick Sullivan to set the location for the first book in his Caribbean Dive

Adventure series, Bonaire!

Deep Shadow is an amazingly fun and easy read that you will not want to put down until you are finished. It's an action and adventure novel, mixed with a little romance. The book tells the story of two fictional dive masters, Boone Fischer and Emily Durand, who go on a shore dive hoping to find dolphins but see something a lot more interesting. Their characters are based on dive masters Mr. Sullivan has met over the years.

The book is filled with many Bonaire references. It opens with Boone and Emily shore diving at Willemstoren Lighthouse, where they find something other than a dolphin, "but it'll do."

Boone and Emily work for the fictional dive operation, Rock Beauty Divers, located next to Hamlet Oasis. The manager of Rock Beauty Divers, Thomas Dupont, known throughout the book as "Frenchy the Belgian", and the dive operation, has some similarities to the old Divi Flamingo shop from years ago. The author named the dive shop after the fish he has never been able to successfully photograph.

Another character in the book, Martin Petersen, a native Bonairean, runs a snack called Washington-Snackbaai, which is where La Fama Snack is actually located in Rincon. A "snack" is a specially

licensed business on Bonaire. It cannot have more than five tables, must sell inexpensive local food, and, one of the most important regulations, beer must be under two dollars and kept at the freezing point.

Martin would make Boone his breakfast pastechi, and offer him advice. Martin's character is loosely based on Norman, the owner of Le-Ma-Se Snack.

As you go through the book, readers familiar with Bonaire will appreciate all the local flavor and references. When a character needs to write down a phone number, he pulls out a piece of paper and writes the number on the back of a receipt from Zhung Kong supermarket.

Emily's dive flag nails were inspired by a dive master the author met at Rum Runner's at Captain Don's. He also loved Buddy Dive's BBQ night and incorporated that into the book as well.

An avid diver, Mr. Sullivan's attention to detail about the sport is clearly evident. His first dive vacation was to Bonaire twenty years ago, and he has made multiple trips since then. Commenting on his first trip to Bonaire, he says, "I realized scuba diving was the greatest form of recreation there is." He added, "I dream of moving there (Bonaire) one day.'

Mr. Sullivan has been a professional actor since the early 1990's, appearing in


The start is at the end of the asphalt road to Lagun. Signs and flags are positioned leading the way.

## Chatting about parrots and people



The babies

While it's low season for others on the island, at Echo we celebrate the High Season for the Lora's. We recognize that the population is stable and growing. Not only are they seen in bigger groups in the neighborhoods trying to survive but In the last days the baby squeak (highpitched clicking sound the babies make) has increased among the flocks foraging for food in Rincon. With all the new members joining the existing flocks at the peak of the 2019 breeding season, there are still more fledgling learning to fly.

At the Dos Pos Conservation Center we have reached new milestones from cozy cuddles in captivity to spreading wings into the wild. Jhon and Nathan, the first babies to be born at the center last year, left the flying aviary where they have been trained to fly long distance and enjoy native forages for the last three months. They were released together with Oscar, another feathered friend rehabilitated at Dos Pos, leaving our flying aviary empty. Not for long, because we have had successful captivity breeding for the second time. This is something else to celebrate. Out of the eight eggs that were laid by two ambassador couples in May, not two, not four, but six babies were hatched at Echo, Dos Pos.

Ms. Pink and Bruce accepted that Jhon and Nathan were better off in the wild and were excited to be part of the captivity breeding program again this year. To keep it natural, they were returned to the

same artificial nest in room four they used previously. They have been there since the beginning of the year. Now they are raising their three babies next to first time breeders Earle and Sylvia that are also rearing three healthy babies.

Parents of the captive breeding program all came from a dark box confiscated in 2011 by the police. Now after

all these years, they found the courage to return to the dark, wooden nest box to rear healthy chicks that will be able to do something they have never been able

We hope that with the little rain showers of the last few days the parrots and people can rely more on the well deserved wild fruit season. To secure a healthy habitat for the released ones and all the new babies born this year; Echo is preparing to kick off the fourth tree planting season of the reforestation project commissioned by the public entity of Bonaire together with STINAPA. The first tree planting day of this season will be on World Nature Conservation day, July 28, at Pos Bronswinkel in Washington Slagbaai National Park. We will repeat this community event every two weeks till the end of the rainy season.

You are invited to help us reforest Bonaire's dry forest with native trees. The new trees are also beneficial for people. Echo's aim is to safeguard the population of the yellow shouldered Amazon par-

State Secretary Van Veldhoven endorsed several specific environmental projects during her working visit to Saba, Sint Eustatius and Bonaire July 14-18, 2019. She heads up the Ministry of Infrastructure & Water Management (I&W).

On Bonaire, she initiated:

- site preparation for a new, safe fireworks storage facility in Santa Clara (see page 2);
- closing the Morotin landfill in Rincon, the largest illegal landfill in the Caribbean Netherlands;
- supporting the asbestos removal project at the former shrimp farm near Sorobon. She also signed agreements on all three islands to ban single-use plastic. (see page 2).

#### Sharks are protected in Bonaire's marine park.

STINAPA has been told that sharks are still being fished. Sharks have been protected by law in Bonairean waters since 10-10-10.

STINAPA stresses that sharks are legally protected. It is strictly forbidden to fish and / or buy sharks and manta rays. All species of sharks and manta rays in Bonaire's waters are protected by local and international laws

Sharks and manta rays are globally protected because they are threatened with extinction. This is mainly due to industrial overfishing in which the sharks are caught for their fins and then thrown back into the water alive and left to die. The shark is a very important species. Sharks keep marine life in balance and healthy. If we destroy of the shark population, we are also destroying

the ocean and our eco-system in which we live.

Many countries and jurisdictions throughout the world have enacted complete or

partial bans on shark fishing. Many airlines and hotels have refused to transport, serve or sell shark fin products.

## Gibi's Lora café in Rincon



During the drought hundreds of Bonaire's yellow shouldered parrots, (the Lora) fly to one good hearted man in Rincon, Gilbert "Gibi" A Coffie.

At the same time every morning and evening Gibi sets out water, bird food

and peanuts. If you drive by, you will see the beautiful Lora perching in the trees to wait for Gibi to feed them.

In 2012 Gibi noticed Loras in the street eating Calbash fruit. To save them from passing cars, he moved the fruit to the

fence and then later into his yard. He began feeding them bird food on mounted trays, a small table and even on his roof. In 2015 the birds decided Gibi was an okay guy and began landing on his body and perching on his head. Now they even eat from his hands. The birds flock around him squabbling over who has the prime spot on his body.

"They come for about eight months of the year and then when it is green they go away; but a few still come," said Gibi.

Approximately 100 Lora visit Gibi every morning and evening. He said they are here waiting everyday at 5 o'clock. His neighbor Myrna Yanga's home is the second stop for the Lora. Although they aren't quite as outgoing with Myrna, she enjoys them and feels it is important to help them during the drought.

The birds go through quite a bit of food between the two food stops. Gibi uses a huge bag of bird feed and a bag of whole peanuts every week feeding the Lora.

Echo director Julianka Clarenda said, it

## **Spotted Morays and Cleaners**

In this first photo you can see the cleaner goby on the moray, and also the whiskers of the banded coral shrimp, another cleaner, on the moray. The shrimp itself is difficult to see because it's facing the camera and only has one claw, but there's no question it's there.

More than once, I've seen cleaner critters jump aboard a moray swimming along the reef. They provide a quick servicing, then return to their stations before they ride the moray too far.

Cleaner animals really like spotted mo-

"Well," I thought, "if the moray is so willing to share its cleaners, maybe it would share them with a person, not just another fish!"

Would you believe that I couldn't get a single person to volunteer for this modeling job? Not one! I got to be both photographer and model.

This was in the (g)olden days of the Nikonos, and I used a thingy called the Close-Up Kit, which covers an area about 9"(23 cm) x 5" (13 cm). A small strobe was attached to the system, so I was able to take photos with only one hand, a good thing since my other hand had to be my model. We were under the Pier, the bottom be-




neath me was sand and rubble with no coral at all; I could very slowly move closer to the moray and shrimp.

Once I was close enough, I positioned the camera, then very slowly extended

my hand. The moray wasn't disturbed. After a couple of minutes one scarlet lady jumped aboard my hand and began busily cleaning my cuticle while the other stayed with the moray. I snapped the shutter.

The photo was taken with the camera a little crooked - maybe it wasn't all that easy to

## A Garden? Just Do It!

#### Prepare your soil.

Some rain showers came down the past two weeks right above my yard and, of course, in my living area. The rain prompted me to prepare my soil. People think that water is the most important thing for a plant. But that is not true. There are more necessary ingredients for a successful garden.



To have a good harvest, it is important to prepare the garden soil a few months before planting and sowing. The planting area should be a total mix of healthy soil with nutritional ingredients that will feed the plants so they grow strong and produce enough vegetables and fruit. First step is to gather all necessary soil: black dirt, red dirt, dry leaves and/or organic compost, charcoal and or ash and manure. The best manure is from rabbit, bats, goats and cows. Chicken and donkey manure needs preparation and to rest for a long time before using, otherwise the plants will get bad and dry out. The PH of donkey and chicken manure is too high and too strong, so most plants die when this manure goes fresh into the soil. It has to rest first and dry in the sun. Then soak it in water and rinse and repeat the procedure a few times. Donkey, horse and chicken manure has to get old and dry and to look like a rough powder before using.

The other mentioned manures are softer for plants and will feed them fat. Mix manure with the dirts and rotten leaves, compost, used charcoal (it can be from BBQ) and ash in a big container or on the ground and let it stay a while. After a month spread this mix over the topsoil of your garden and mix it with this topsoil and leave it to rest again. Preparing soil needs time including the time that it has to rest. With the water and wind, the soil is mixing itself and becomes a healthy topsoil for the next planting season. It's very good to mix the topsoil with very dry old grass without seeds. Also wood dust, which one can get from carpenters. But ask first if this is pure wood, so its not treated with pesticides. This wood dust keeps the topsoil moist and it's good for the plants. Also keep a heap of cut grass dried in the sun to mix with topsoil. Tea bags are also a good solution to keep soil moist. I have been told that used coffee pads and grains are very good against bugs and will not harm the plants. When you have your garden ready, and the young plants

are planted, just add some dry manure on top of the soil every three weeks. This manure keeps feeding the soil and keeps your plants strong. Good mixed soil with a balanced PH keeps your plants healthy and keeps sicknesses and some bugs away. Stronger the plants are less sensitive to viruses and bugs. They can withstand the drought and strong wind better.

#### Easy-to-grow Napoles.

Some people want to have green in their yard but want the plants easy to grow. There is an easy plant which can be consumed too. Do you dare to eat cacti which are called nopales? Look at the picture. We all know them because Bonaire is full of all types of cacti including these types. And you know what, it's an amazing vegetable and it becomes more and more a popular food in the world. The nopal cactus is more known as the prickly pear cactus. It is native to Mexico and famous for its health benefits, due to its high antioxidants that have anti-inflammatory properties, fiber, carbohydrates, vitamin A, vitamin C, vitamin K and minerals.

Nopales are the pads of this cactus. They are eaten as a vegetable and can be sauteed, eaten raw, turned into juices, jams, tea or cooked as a stoba. Look for the many recipes to make a great dish. There are three different colors of prickly pears: red-purple, white-green and yellow-orange. The red-purple variety has the most anti-oxidants.



The cactus has been used in traditional medicine. Cactus nopales and fruit are used to treat: glaucoma, wounds, fatigue, liver conditions and ulcers. Fresh nopal juice lowers blood sugar, cholesterol and benefits diabetes.

To cook the pads, remove the thick green skin and thorns; then rinse to remove the slimy texture. Diced nopal can

be sauteed in olive oil, then added to a salad, tacos, fajitas or scrambled eggs.

So if you like new recipes, try nopales, and if you don't have it in your garden, start planting it now. It loves Bonaire soil.

A woman with mental retardation who wants nothing more than to be recognized and learn to live on her own. She just wants to be able to be the special person that she is.

A young man with mental retardation

who is angry at the world because he has been neglected from his birth on. He wants to be understood and loved. That is all.

Not only the persons with a handicap, but all the care-takers need attention too. Especially those who take care of a loved one at home.

There is the lady who is always at the side of her husband, after he suffered a bad stroke many years ago. Later he had smaller strokes and yet, she is always there for him, together with their daughter



"We would prefer they eat more of the wild fruit like the Calbash or Watakeli seeds. It might also be a great project for people to donate their old fruit to feed the parrots," said Julianka.

Gibi has a true love and appreciation for the Lora. He says they are the smartest birds on Bonaire.

Gibi is a craftsman and part-time mechanic by trade. He says he's good with his hands and can fix everything! Myrna works a few days at the Museo Chich'I Tan.

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## **DID YOU KNOW?**

#### Did You Know... that there are five different species of terns that nest in the Pekelmeer area?

The terns that nest in the Pekelmeer area are the least tern, the common tern, the cayenne tern, the royal tern, and the roseate tern.

In addition to being a Ramsar site and Important Bird Area (IBA), the Pekelmeer area managed by Cargill is also a Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve (WSHRN) site. A WHSRN site is a place deemed to be important in the life cycle of many different shore bird species. While there are over 106 WSHRN sites, only two of these are in the Caribbean. And Pekelmeer is one of them! This unique environment plays an important role in the lives of many birds and many are endangered species that travel long distances to get to places where they can

lay their eggs and raise their young. The five tern species you can see in Bonaire also fall in this category; they make an incredible journey just to get to our beautiful Bonaire and raise their chicks.

Terns are fascinating birds. You can often see them flying along the shoreline or near the saliñas looking as graceful as ballerinas. Observe them long enough and you are guaranteed to see them diving for fish in incredible displays of aerial acrobatics. The five species found on Bonaire come in a range of sizes: the smallest of them, the least tern, is only 24 cm long, while the royal tern, the second largest tern species in the world, is more than double their size at a whopping 50 cm long. Terns nest in large colonies often

consisting of different species. Like many bird species, terns have a variety of calls, or vocalizations, that are often meant to communicate a specific message. You can just imagine the cacophony of sound that is a tern breeding colony.

Cargill, recognizing the importance of these amazing birds, together with STI-NAPA, conducted surveys during the nesting season from 2014 to 2017. Not only were all the known nesting sites surveyed to count the number of nests with eggs and the hatchlings, under the guidance of IMARES an artificial nesting island was created. The purpose of this island was to attract more birds to a safe nesting area away from potential predators. From these surveys we learned a lot about the terns in the Pekelmeer area. One of the most exciting findings was in 2015. STINAPA biologist Paulo Bertuol discovered that roseate terns were nesting in the saltpans; as far as we know this was the first recorded incidence of this species nesting on Bonaire since the 1960s! Unfortunately it was not all good news. The survey also found that the greatest threat to tern nesting success was feral cats. On multiple instances cats were recorded attacking the nests resulting in either the eggs being destroyed or the chicks being killed. This illustrates why it is so important to not release unwanted strays into nature around the island. Cats are incredibly well adapted predators. On many islands they have driven many ground nesting birds to near extinction!

This year STINAPA, together with Cargill, went back for a one time count of

the tern nests, hatchlings, and chicks. The results were overwhelmingly positive. Once again roseate terns were found to be nesting in the saltpans. We even found two adorable fluffy chicks. As for the other tern species that also use this area, their populations also seem healthy and are doing well. The numbers from this year are looking even better than those from previous years.

The terns were not only using breeding sites identified in previous years, including the artificial island, they also seem to have branched out into novel territory, a possible indication of growing populations. Because terns and many other species of shorebirds lay their eggs on the ground it becomes extra important during nesting season to be careful around the shorelines and the saliñas; you wouldn't want to accidently destroy a nest!

#### First sea turtle nests of 2019 hatch



Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) is excited to share that the first nests of the 2019 sea turtle nesting season have hatched! The first hatchlings, 114 loggerheads, headed to the water on June 21st and STCB expects the first hawksbill nest to hatch this week.

Each year, an average of 100 sea turtle nests are laid on the beaches of Bonaire and Klein Bonaire. During the nesting season, STCB trained volunteers patrol the beaches every morning, looking for sea turtle tracks and other signs of turtle activity. If a nest is found, the volunteers and STCB staff locate the egg cavity, which contains between 100 and 200 eggs, depending on the sea turtle species. The nest is then marked, so it can

be monitored daily during the incubation period of 50-60 days, to ensure that the nest remains safe and undisturbed.

Companies, friends and families help STCB keep the eggs safe by adopting the nests laid by (critically) endangered green, hawksbill and loggerhead turtles. With their support, STCB monitors the nesting beaches, places barriers around nests that need additional protection and collects data that help determine, amongst others, the hatching success of the nests.

Bonaire residents and tourists can support the conservation work of STCB, and learn about Bonaire's nesting population at by joining a sea turtle nest monitoring patrol on Klein Bonaire. Between May and November, STCB conducts patrols three times a week, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning. During these patrols, you can help STCB's turtle experts look for new activities, including false crawls, attempts and new and hatched nests.

### Finding the Milky Way

Light pollution is a big problem. City lights, illuminating signs, parking lots, buildings. The more light that we shine up, the less light the stars shine down. Even though it's invisible from cities, we can share a sneaky tip to find the Milky Way in your sky.

Let's pretend it's 11 o'clock at night and we're far from city lights. In the countryside it is so dark. You can see so many stars that you can't even count them all. We're facing south and you can also see a faint band of light. It will span nearly 180 degrees of the sky. This is the Milky Way. When you look at the Milky Way, you are observing billions and billions of stars. This is the galaxy we live in and its stars are all around us.

There are so many stars in our line of sight that they appear as milky clouds. Most ancient cultures were just as fascinated with the Milky Way as they were with any planet or constellation. You can definitely see why. Out in the country it dominates the sky.

Some bright and famous constellations can be found along the Milky Way such as Cassiopeia the Queen, Cygnus the Swan, and Sagittarius the Archer. Cassiopeia is one of the most recognizable constellations and on summer evenings, she sits on her throne in the northeastern sky. Those stars that look like the letter w—that's a queen if you use your imagination. In that case, picture this w-shape of stars as Cassiopeia's crown, sparkling with five stellar jewels. Now, kick back and look high in the eastern sky. You'll see three very bright stars marking the summer triangle. The summer triangle includes three constellations: Lyra the Harp, Cygnus the Swan, and Aquila the Eagle.

Let's focus on Cygnus since it's probably the easiest to identify because of its cross-like shape. In fact, it's also called the northern cross. Cygnus' brightest star is Deneb, which marks the tail of the swan. Cygnus is located in an extremely rich part of the Milky Way, so imagine it flying along the great river in the sky.

Near Deneb, the Milky Way branches into two channels leaving a dark region in the middle called the Cygnus rift. Now face south. Here the Milky Way threads between two zodiacal constellations - Scorpius and Sagittarius. Scorpius the Scorpion is easy to spot with its bright red star and its curved tail-stars. The stars in Sagittarius resemble more of a teapot than a centaur wielding a bow and arrow. But when you look between Scorpius and Sagittarius, you're peering into the center of our galaxy. In that direction, there are billions and billions of stars, and at the very center lies a supermassive black hole.

Of course, you can't see the Milky Way if you're a city-bound star gazer. Even though the Milky Way disappears in the city, we still have three constellations clearly visible to guide us. Cassiopeia, Cygnus, and Sagittarius. And that's where the Milky Way is - even if you can't see it. Once you identify Cassiopeia, Cygnus, or Sagittarius, scan these regions of the sky with binoculars. With just a little magnification, a wealth of stars will be revealed to you. You can start counting those billions and billions of stars as you keep looking up.

#### Train your mind

## Backin' Up Is Hard To Do. (Apologies to Neil Sadaka.)

Take a picture with your phone. Easy. Write a document on your PC. Easy. It all goes in that device and stays there forever, even when it is lost, stolen, dropped in the water, electrocuted, run over, eaten by the dog, peed on by the cat, or otherwise quits working. No problem. What, me worry? Apple, Microsoft and Google-Android look after me... right? WRONG!!!



Your computer, phone or tablet is made up of billions and billions of electronic bits, fans, motors, and other parts – and the failure of any one of them can cause your device to come to a dead stop – sometimes with magic smoke pouring out, sometimes just sitting there with a blank screen. So, now what?

First and foremost – You did make a backup, right? Great – Then you have only lost what you added since your last backup. When was it? 2005 you say... the day you got your computer.... Nothing since? Hmmm, I hope you have a nice life – I hear the ocean calling me. Bye. If you have been making backups, then you are prepared for this and can handle it on your own. But, if you haven't got a recent backup, then here's what you need to know.

#### Phones/Tablets

Most phones or tablets have some sort of automatic backup. I am not familiar with the Apple systems, but for Android, the files, settings, programs, etc, are usually backed up automatically to your Google Drive account. If you need to get a new phone/tablet, then you can usually just log in to your Google account as part of the setup procedure and all the information is put onto your new device.

#### Computers

A bit harder – since there is no real automatic system provided with the operating systems (Mac, Linux or Windows), so you need to figure out how to do it. There are various backup programs you can use and they use either a cloud based backup storage or backup devices that connect to your computer, such as external hard disks that plug into your USB port or Network Storage Devices.

Some programs make an exact duplicate (image) of your hard disk (One that provides this is called "Casper"). This allows you to just swap the dead hard disk for the backup and continue working and is the fastest for a hard-drive only problem. Others do a partial backup on a daily, weekly or monthly basis and only copy the files which have changed. This is a bit harder to recover from.

I personally use 3 external USB hard drives that I rotate and backup a full image on a weekly basis, a 3TB Network Storage Device where I do a daily backup, and Dropbox to store certain files on the cloud.

One thing to remember is to test the recovery process. The last thing you want to find out when you lose all your files is that the backup didn't work.

And even though you have to spend a bit of money on hardware, just remember, how valuable all those pictures of your children and family are which you can never replace?

USB drives are available at Super Store, City Shop, Bondigro, and online for approx \$100 and up, depending on the amount of storage you need.

One last point to remember – do not store your backups beside your computer. If you are broken into and a thief steals your laptop, he will probably take whatever else is on the desk as well. Store them in places nobody would look.

Good luck, and I hope you never need your backups....Brian Niessen, The Geek.

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
