

Working 24/7, Bonaire's HBOT chamber has saved lives for 35 years

A conversation between Dr. Dick van der Vaart and a Dutch admiral in 1985 resulted in Bonaire having one of the few Hyperbaric chambers in the Caribbean. The admiral asked if van der Vaart would be interested in some old chambers that were soon to be scrap metal. The resounding answer was, 'Yes, definitely, we will accept everything!'

Van der Vaart had moved to Bonaire from the Netherlands in 1983 to serve as a doctor, but he was also a diver enjoying divers paradise.

"I thought being a diver and a doctor we could easily keep them [the divers] on Bonaire without flying them through the air and worsening their symptoms of decompression sickness," said van der Vaart.

He began learning about diving medicine and did his first theoretical training with the Dutch Navy. And in 1986 a Navy ship showed up with Bonaire's first hyperbaric chamber delivering it directly onto the pier. The second-hand chamber was well maintained, efficient and in good shape.

Van der Vaart said, "It was essentially the size of a one man submarine."

The chamber was approximately three meters long (9.84 ft) and 1.6 meters high (5.25 ft); in other words, a normal size adult could not stand up in it.

Chamber supervisor Pam Teitel, who has worked with van der Vaart since the beginning, explained that when a nurse would be inside with the patient for monitoring, she had to sit on the floor or a small bench. The door was big enough for walking patients, but if paralyzed we built a roller similar to what a grocery store uses for boxes.

"We did have to have a few people 'suck it in' to get their belly through!", said Pam.

Bonaire's HBOT (Hyperbaric Oxygen

Therapy) chamber is not just for diving accidents. It is also used in wound treatment to enhance wound healing. Bonaire's first wound patient was back in 1989 and wound treatment has been done ever since. But it did take time for the medical community to accept hyperbaric medicine as a valid treatment.

Van der Vaart said, "The challenge was to raise the awareness about the existence of HBOT on our island, getting my colleagues to recognize that we sometimes can help their wound patients."

In 2008, after 23 years, a new facility was built and a new chamber was ordered. The new chamber's hull was made in Romania with Romanian steel and the control panels and electronics came from Holland. It arrived by ship and was lowered down into the building and then the roof was added. The chamber was fully operational late 2009.

At 4.80 meter (15.75 ft) in length x 2 meter width (6.56 ft), it was much bigger than the old one and comfortably fit a nurse plus two divers lying down or five sitting wound patients. Unfortunately the

Rutte's party re-elected

Mark Rutte, 54, is on course to become the longest serving premier in Dutch history. In the parliamentary elections Rutte's liberal-conservative People's Party (VVD) won 22% of the vote and a predicted 35 of the 150 seats, though it lost 8 seats. The Labour Party (PvdA), VVD's main ally in the outgoing coalition, was decimated, winning less than 6% of the vote and losing all but 9 of its 38 seats. The center-left Democrats-66 (D-66) won 15% for 24 seats, while the Christian Democrats (CDA) won 9.5% for 19 seats. Those two parties are likely to join VVD in a new coalition.

Leftist parties won only 25 seats, a decrease for them, while the far-right parties combined for 35 wins, a gain. However, their power has been diluted by fragmentation into smaller parties. The covid crisis was the dominant issue in the election. Turnout was high, at 82.6%. Rutte will serve his fourth consecutive term in power.

On Bonaire, 4,065 people voted of the 13,490 who were eligible. The CDA, with 1,261 votes, won the election here. D66 was second with 503, and Rutte's VVD placed third with 412.

"The voters of the Netherlands have given my party an overwhelming vote of confidence," Mr Rutte told reporters in parliament. He conceded that "not everything has gone well in the last 10 years" but said the main challenge was to rebuild the country after the Covid-19 pandemic.

Having won 35 out of 150 seats, VVD has a mandate to form a new minority government. Together the three parties-the VVD, the center-left D-66, and the CDA-claim a total of 71 of the 150 seats In the Second Chamber, or Parliament, the VVD will

need to bring at least one more party into the coalition to form a majority.

In the 75-seat First Chamber, or Senate, the incoming government will inherit a one-seat minority. The next senate election will come in 2023.

The spread of votes in the Netherlands paints a picture of a polarized nation divided over Covid, culture, and the Dutch future in Europe. Parliament will have 17 parties, the most since 1918. While the left wing parties lost heavily, the Dutch far right, though fragmented, won more seats than ever before.

However, the balance of voting indicates a country moving toward the center. Rutte's win does not seem to validate his record so much as express voters' hope that his managerial skills can navigate the country back to normal.

The most dramatic election result was the demotion of Geert Wilders' nationalist, populist, extreme right wing Party of Freedom (PVV) from the number two to the number four slot as it dropped from 20 seats to 17. The more moderate D-66 and CDA parties moved ahead to second and third. However, the extreme right wing increased its overall share of the vote with the help of other, recently formed parties.

When Sigrid Kaag, leader of D-66, learned her party would now be the second largest in parliament, she jumped on the table with happiness. "What a wonderful evening," she tweeted. "Now let's get to work, the future won't wait. It's been confirmed that the Dutch are not extremists, but are moderate." She said voters were ready for "the optimism and vision" of her party. Kaag, a multilingual former UN diplomat and ardent supporter of the European Union, challenged Geert Wilders robustly during the leaders' debates.

More than 16,000 people have died of Covid-19 in the Netherlands, and anti-lockdown protests in the country have turned violent. A night-time curfew is currently in place, as is a ban on public gatherings in the daytime, in order to try to curb the country's high infection rates.

As a result, the country conducted its first pandemic election. Most of the election campaigning occurred as television debates. People cast their votes in sanitized ballot booths, and those classed as clinically vulnerable were able to vote early.

Covid-19 round-up

The pandemic strikes hard

As of March 23, 2021, there are 461 active cases of Covid-19 on Bonaire, four times more than at any time before. Three of the active cases are visitors. Seventy-seven people were tested yesterday. Twenty seven were positive. Recently one person died and twenty-nine recovered. Six people are hospitalized on Bonaire, while four had to be sent to Curaçao and one person to the hospital on Aruba. Three people are in the intensive care department of Bonaire's hospital. Bonaire's fatality total is 10.

Younger people and the new variant blamed

The social behaviors of Bonaireans in the 20 - 29 age bracket, plus the new more virulent COVID-15 strain, the British variant, together seem to account for the current massive outbreak. Governor Rijna cited those two causes when explaining why the Government has had to raise the Risk Level from 3 to 6. Public Health doctor Marian Luinstra warned that the new level 6 restrictions will be slow to take effect because the spread has already happened. Restrictions are a means of preventing the spread of infection, not solving it.

All adults to be vaccinated, starting immediately

With sharp rise in infections threatening to overwhelm the limited care capacity on the island, the vaccination program is shifting into high gear. An additional 11,700 doses of the BioNTech / Pfizer vaccine have arrived from the Netherlands and all adults will be eligible for vaccination. The daily vaccination rate will be more than doubled.

On Thursday, March 25, the Public Health Department will start vaccinating additional risk groups and people in vital professions, such as employees in the fire brigade, Royal Netherlands Marechaussee, enforcement and the police. Beginning March 29, anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 can register for an appointment. People between the ages of 50 and 60 will be scheduled first. Of the 5000 people in the primary target group-the over-60s and the healthcare staff-about 65% have already received their first injection.

The number of injection days will be increased from five to six per week and more lines will be available. At least 500 people will be injected per day, more than double the current rate.

Rijna: "If everything goes well, by June

a large part of the community can be vaccinated. As of now, I want to make a call to every citizen over 18 to register as soon as possible for vaccination. There will be more vaccination sites. If a large number of people vaccinate, it helps break the spread of the virus that has infected so many who have become ill."

CITES species must stay at home

The Dutch Caribbean Nature Alliance (DCNA) has made posters, signs, and brochures to raise awareness about the protected status of flora and fauna in the Caribbean Netherlands.

Almost 200 species living in the wild in the Caribbean Netherlands are protected by CITES. The list includes turtles, iguanas, and birds of prey, as well as various orchids, cactuses, whale species, rays, and bird species. The corals these islands are known for, living and dead,

are also protected under CITES and can therefore not be taken away.

What does this mean in practice?

Exporting living and dead species included on the CITES list to another country without a CITES permit - also from the Caribbean Netherlands to the Netherlands and vice versa – is prohibited. The regulations also apply to parts of products made of or from these species, such as food products and exotic leather ware, wooden sculptures, ornaments, musical instruments, and local medicines. Violation of these regulations can lead to penalties and/or legal action.

Check in advance: is it protected?

The mere fact that something is for sale or that you found it on the ground or in the sea, does not mean that you are allowed to take it or that you can travel with it. When in doubt as to whether you can take a species (or a part of a product made of or from this species), you can contact the local CITES authority with the National Office of the Caribbean Netherlands (Rijksdienst Caribisch Nederland, RCN), the customs authorities, the public entity, or the local management organisation of the protected nature area.

Working by order of the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality

(ANFQ), DCNA has produced the Cites posters, signs, and brochures in four languages (Dutch, English, Papiamentu, and Spanish). Distributed in advance of the return of tourists, these materials can be found at the airports and ports, and at the government offices, customs offices, nature park management organisations, diving schools, and hotels throughout the Caribbean Netherlands.

What is CITES?

CITES is the convention under which the international trade in endangered species of wild flora and fauna is regulated and, if necessary, prohibited .

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POLICE REPORT

Property crime

Mar. 5. Two men aged 26 and 18 years and a boy, 14, were arrested for stealing goats. They had taken two goats in the vicinity of 1000 steps at the Kaminda Turístiko to a house in Rincon. When goats have no markings, the Public Entity (OLB) is responsible. The goats go to the Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries (LVV) department until an owner registers. If no owner signs up, the goats are slaughtered.

Mar. 16. An industrial blow-vac machine for blowing leaves and a Trek Navigator bicycle, were stolen from a yard of a house on Bulevar Gobernador Nicolaas Debrot. The bicycle was found a little later against the fence of the neighbors.

Mar. 17. A black freestyle bicycle with stickers on the frame was stolen. The owner of the bike, a 6-year-old boy and a few more children were playing outside around 6:45pm. A boy of about 13 years old asked to borrow the bike so he could show some tricks. The boy agreed. The 13-year-old boy performed some stunts and then drove off by bike.

Arrested/held in custody.

Mar. 12. Around 2:30 am, a woman, 30, was arrested for disregarding police orders and for threatening officials in office. The suspect was involved in an argument between friends in which a car window was destroyed.

Traffic accidents/violations

Mar. 14. Two cars collided head-on on the road to Rincon. Both drivers were treated on the spot, after which one driver was taken to hospital.

Mar. 14. A scooter was seized on Kaya Caracas after a short chase. The driver was given a police report for driving without a helmet, license plate, driver's license and insurance, and also for not being able to show identification.

Mar. 18. At around 11pm two service vehicles of the Dutch Caribbean Police Force collided at the intersection of Kaya Avelino J. Cecilia and Kaya Nikiboko Noord. The patrols were looking for a vehicle that violated the emergency ordinance. One victim was taken to the hospital for medical treatment and three other occupants were taken to the hospital for a medical check-up. The Traffic Department and CRS are responsible for further investigation.

Traffic checks

Mar. 9. A patrol saw a scooter with three people on it and all three without helmets. They ordered the driver to stop and gave her a police report. She was informed that as a driver she is responsible for the passengers.

Mar. 8-10. During regular traffic checks, fines have been issued for driving without a helmet, without valid insurance documents, without a valid driver's license, for holding a phone while driving and for driving without a seat belt. The cost of driving without your seat belt is

\$110 and holding a cell phone while driving is \$225.

Mar. 10-12. Several drivers were fined during regular traffic checks for driving without valid insurance papers or driver's license. Fines were also issued for driving without a seat belt, using the phone while driving and driving without a helmet on the scooter. The fines for the above violations varies between \$30 and \$225.

Mar. 12. During a routine check, a vehicle was checked under the Opium Act following a strong marijuana smell coming from the car. A small amount of marijuana, fireworks and scales were found and confiscated. The vehicle's papers were in order.

Vessel in distress

Mar 12. A sailboat went on the rocks near Lac Bai. In response to the vessel's distress call the Coast Guard Rescue & Coordination Center (RCC) sent a Dash patrol plane to the location. When police and the Royal Netherlands Marechaussee (KMAR) arrived, they found one person was already on land and three people retrieving their belongings from the ship. There were no injuries, and the boat was later taken out of the water. The yacht was sailing under the Dutch flag and was on its way from Bonaire to Grenada. The captain stated that they were sailing too close to shore and hit something.

Emergency ordinance

Mar. 12-13. The Dutch Caribbean Police Corps, in collaboration with the Royal Netherlands Marechaussee (KMAR) and the Supervision and Enforcement Directorate of the Public Entity, carried out a multidisciplinary check in various neighborhoods on Bonaire.

Three people were arrested for violating the emergency ordinance and for failing to obey orders from the police: a man, 48, a man, 40 and a woman, 43.

Catering establishments were checked. Some complied with the rules, but some were give warnings and / or tips on how to prevent illegal gatherings. A total of 13 reports were issued to citizens who did not comply with the rules.

On a beach nine people received a police report for non-compliance with the emergency ordinance and for lighting a campfire on a beach.

Mar. 13. During a multidisciplinary inspection in various neighborhoods and on the beaches four people were arrested for violating the emergency ordinance, for disobeying orders from the police and for threatening and insulting officials in office: the men were aged 25, 42, 32; the woman, 32. At some locations warnings and / or tips were given and people were asked to leave the location. The beaches were busy, but mostly small groups here and there adhered to the distance rules.

Mar. 17. The police received a report in the afternoon that a large group of people were present on a beach on E.E.G. Bulevar. A group of about 70 people were on land and in the water. Everyone was asked

Mar. 18. Curfew violations: 23 people were fined \$150. A few catering establishments that were selling alcoholic beverages after 8pm were ordered to close. Mar. 19-20. During the day two gatherings were dispersed, one at a home, another at a snack. After curfew some catering establishments were closed until further notice for selling food and upgrade to another property. drink after 8 pm. Police gave 13 people reports for violating the curfew of 9 pm. Two people were arrested for curfew violations.

Mar. 21. Beaches were also checked for gatherings and alcohol consumption after 4:30 pm. Several police reports were given and alcoholic drink was seized. A person was arrested for violation of the Aliens Act BES. A catering facility was closed by Supervision and Enforcement for serving after 8 pm. Police gave 14 people reports for violating curfews.

Government improves social housing

Rent measures approved. Legislation passed in The Hague will increase transparency in rental rates on Bonaire. It will also improve rental assistance for low income families who live in social rentals, and later may apply to low income families in the private rental market as well. A housing valuation system will determine whether the requested rent for a dwelling is appropriate, and a Rent Committee will help assure rent transparency and proper support for low income tenants. The committee will also help them resolve disputes. Similar provisions will apply on St. Eustatius and Saba. DMR

Assisted living. Care and Youth Caribbean Netherlands (ZJCN) will start a two-year pilot on Assisted Living on March 15, 2021. A recent study into the problems of young adults in Caribbean Netherlands identified the importance of housing and extra guidance for vulnerable young people.

The pilot is intended for young people from 16 - 23 years old in Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius who cannot return to their homes. At the assisted living facility, the young people enter into an intensive training programme in three phases to learn how to live independently. The aim is to ensure young people are able to live independently in about two years.



Intel coming from the Bonaire Animal Shelter is warning of a pending insurrection at the shelter organized by BALA (Bonaire Animal Liberation Army), cats and dogs united in strength and dignity.

A major escape is planned for sometime after midnight, April 1. Wire cutters are reportedly being smuggled in by a sympathetic volunteer at the Shelter.

Plans include a march to the Lt. Governor's office with a list of demands including: Forever Homes for All, Daily Walks, Freedom from Cages and Chains, Food and Water and Treats for All, Legalization of Catnip and Unending Love for all Four –leggeds.

No violence is planned but Governor Rijna will be held under house arrest until all demands are met.

The Reporter will keep you updated with this serious situation as it unfolds.

Try calling in the evening after everyone that wants testing is done. I have not seen much on Bonaire that was better organized than the vaccination center. They moved people through with perfect efficiency. Congratulations to all involved.

In light of the current spike in cases I hope that the Netherlands will send the vaccines much much faster!


The extremely contagious British variant combined with the young and strong who feel invincible have greatly fueled the cases on Bonaire. Particularly students and young adults who may only get a mild case or not be sick at all, feel free to get together and party. Then its spread onward to their families, friends and coworkers. Sick or not, we are all suffering for it now with the surge in cases and lockdown. Personally, I think the most important measures of the current lockdown so far are no alcohol at the snacks or public places, takeaway only and curfew. Stop the parties. Many people are still not taking this seriously enough, this doesn't mean move the get togethers earlier or home. Please be careful!

People are bitching that the government didn't act correctly, while half the people are saying it's because they didn't do enough while the other half is saying we should forget about covid, get back to business. Dealing with the huge surge and the start of the vaccinations makes for an added challenge, but I think they need to do more. For example, if we have to lock down, why are we still letting flights come and go??

Once positive, contact tracing and quarantine need to be stepped up. The published number has never reached 3 quarantined per sick person in this outbreak and I think it should be at least that or more. Hopefully people are acting responsibly themselves by alerting their contacts who can self-quarantine, but there should be more guidance.

We have more active cases now than the total cases since the start of Covid and half of the deaths have been in this month. The hospital is getting overrun. Slow vaccination rate Peter McNiff

Dear Governor Rijna,

Maybe it's me, maybe I'm the only person on Bonaire frustrated by the vaccination program's progress? Maybe this virus is not that serious, but we're in lockdown so it must be, right? Then why is the vaccination program lacking any sense of urgency? Why are you not pushing them to work seven days a week, why? Why are they working office worker hours? Why?

At the current rate of vaccinations it will take until the middle of October to be done with the 14,000 (28,000 doses) vaccinations. Meanwhile the UK variant, that you allowed to get on the island, is tearing through the population and the vaccination program is averaging ~ 196 shots per working day and apparently oblivious to the urgency.

The vaccination program must be active seven days a week, just like the virus. By working weekends from the start we would have administered an additional ~955 shots, but we didn't and I can't understand why? If it is a matter of able bodies, I think you have enough volunteers on the island willing to help in anyway they can.

Working seven days a week, even at the current leisurely vaccination rate, will end the program two months ahead of the current schedule. The island could be done in the middle of August instead of the middle of October.

The risk you run is the UK variant will kill more and more people on the island, and your inaction at this juncture, will be the cause.

If there are reasons why you can't go any faster, now would be a good time to explain. *Sincerely, Peter McNiff*

Certain activities are socially distant by nature: Tennis, beach tennis, table tennis, volleyball, sailing, soccer, baseball, bicycling, swimming. One does not want to get hit with a bat, racquet or paddle and one wants to cover as much space as possible, meaning it does not make sense to crowd each other, ever. When two healthy people converge in a sport, so what? They are healthy and trying to stay that way. The chance of infection or disease is again minimal.

The restriction notice that is most disturbing: Indoor soccer: must play indoor soccer outdoors only.... nothing further need be said.

If the government wants to eliminate socializing and maintain social distancing, make rules for spectators and require appropriate distancing in stadiums, dugouts and benches. Make gym cleanliness mandatory.

In the year plus that we have been plagued with this issue less than ten percent of the population has tested positive out of the 25% of the population claiming to be sick that have been tested. We have been given no information on the severity of the infections save the minimal hospital admissions and the fact that 6 people have died while being infected with COVID19. No one wishes anyone ill but I know personally that one of the deaths had many other deadly complications and my guess is the others that died were not healthy to begin with.

Sick people should stay away from others and at risk people should take any precautions they deem necessary.

PLEASE rescind these restrictions immediately to let people play and stay healthy. *Charles M. Baltayan*

New Subspecies of Conch Found on Bonaire Commercial Value Immeasurable Environmental Positives and Negatives

All this rain has had some exciting consequences!

First the super rains filled the area between Breezes 'n Bites and the new construction south of them. Next, we got an exceptionally high tide along with a wind reversal strong enough to push sea water into the rainwater.

Shortly after that, the instructors of the Limited Visibility Diving courses, which were held in the Seaside Puddle since all Bonaire's marine waters are too clear to qualify, began to notice snails living in the Puddle. The snails were soon identifiable as queen conchs, and they were growing very quickly. In fact, in just a few weeks, their first generation reached maturity, has mated at least once, and their babies are almost finger-length already!

Scientists have confirmed that the combination of warm, shallow, brackish water apparently caused "normal" conch eggs, which splashed into the Puddle at the high tide/wind reversal, to develop normally – except at an astonishing rate.

Currently the property is being considered for mariculture, research, recreation, sale, environmental protection, and *(continued on page 33)*

According to the informative video channel, an electric motor from an old forklift will get the car moving. Batteries will store the energy created just like on all electric vehicles.

Protecting Bonaire's caves: Honoring Year of the Caves, 2021

International Union of Speleology, designated 2021 as the International Year of Caves and Karst, therefore, CARIBSS

(Caribbean Speleological Society) is taking this opportunity to raise attention to Bonaire's Caves & Karst Nature Reserve.

On December 13, 2019, the caves and park were officially inaugurated by deputy Elvis. Tijn Asjoe. The pilot project is an area about 30 hectares located around Barcadera and was established with the support of LNV, Openbaar Lichaam Bonaire, WILDCONSCIENCE BV, CAR-IBSS, DierenLot, and Nos ta biba di naturalesa.

The park helps to ensure that residents and visitors to Bonaire receive quality education and information about the ecological importance, value and protection of caves. It further ensures that the resources in these cave systems are used sustainably and that human safety is a high priority in all cave activities.

Visitors can access the park under the supervision and leadership of CARIBSS certified cave tour guides that are allowed to conduct park tours.

The park has enough caves to avoid overcrowded visits. Additionally, the geology, flora and fauna of the Bonaire

limestone terraces is showcased in the more than four kilometers of hiking trails. It has multiple caves with several chambers. Only two of these chambers are closed to protect the reproduction and maternity activities of native bat species. One cave, Kueba di awa, is known for its access to underground water.

The majority of the area is fenced off to protect the delicate flora in the park from goats. Three entrances with gates allow park access. To maintain the original state, there are no built-in walkways or signage. The paths are rocky, rough and not easy to follow without a cave tour guide.

Unfortunately, a number of people are entering the park without certified cave guides supervision. This has resulted in littering and gates left unclosed enabling goats to enter causing physical damage to

St. Maarten asks UN to protect it from Dutch

The St. Maarten Parliament has appealed to the United Nations for protection from Dutch racism and neo-colonization. It complained that the Netherlands is using the pandemic and past hurricanes to "neo-colonially" force St. Maarten to give up its sovereignty. Lawyer Peter Choharis pointed out that over the centuries the Netherlands created the governing culture on St. Maarten. "If corruption and mismanagement are such big problems, whose fault is that?" (Writer's note. This is not an April Fool's story.)

Dutch Undersecretary of Home Affairs and Kingdom Relations Raymond Knops said he was unpleasantly surprised by the petition. He said it contradicts St. Maarten's earlier acceptance of the conditions, including the implementation of reforms, that are attached to the Dutch liquidity support for the duration of the coronavirus crisis.

Knops said that since the start of the coronavirus crisis, the Netherlands has assisted St. Maarten, as well as the other Dutch Caribbean countries Aruba and Curaçao, with a broad support package, consisting of, among other things, medical assistance, food aid for the most vulnerable residents, and budget support to cope with the financial adversity. He noted that only one condition was attached to continuing the support: that the local governments agree to financial reforms.

Knops acknowledged the island's right to autonomy and explained, "I have come to the conclusion that St. Maarten at this time cannot carry its autonomy. I repeat: I don't want to take away St. Maarten's own autonomy. To the contrary: I want to help them so they can fully carry that autonomy in a couple of years." Knops said that the Dutch government will fully assist St. Maarten with the implementation of the necessary reforms.

The St. Maarten parliament submitted its petition to the UN Special Rapporteur on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance Tendayi Achiume, and to the Working Group of experts on people of African descent. *DMR (the St. Maarten Daily Herald, the Curaçao Chronicle)*

Post pandemic planning underway

The covid pandemic has erased several years of financial gains by Bonaire's people and businesses. As a first step in planning a recovery, the Public Entity of Bonaire (OLB) and Chamber of Commerce (CoC) are conducting a March 16 to March 26 survey of business owners to help quantify the adverse impacts of the COVID-19 crisis on the island's businesses. A second survey will be conducted later to determine the pandemic impacts on the general public. All survey responses will be private and confidential.

The surveys will feed data into a comprehensive Post-Disaster Needs Assessment (PDNA) that will guide the government's response and recovery planning. The World Bank is directing the survey, using funding provided by a European Union technical assistance program for Caribbean Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) which has a 42.67 million EUR budget for 2018- 2023. *DMR*

WEB's road work continues

Despite the lockdown WEB will continue its excavation work to renew the irrigation water pipeline in Kaya Grandi. During March 22 - 29 they will work from Littman's towards Kaya Princess Marie (Donna & Giorgo). During work hours from 7 am to 4 pm sidewalks will remain accessible to pedestrians. Car and freight traffic will be diverted.

BOPEC in receivership

BOPEC (Bonaire Oil Petroleum Corporation), which has not paid its employees since January 1, has been put in Chapter-11 receivership, and the receiver has asked the court to declare the company bankrupt. As well, the employees and their union have won a suit that requires BOPEC to pay all outstanding salaries, which it cannot do because it is insolvent.

The receiver may find that BOPEC, owned by Venezuela's national oil company PDVSA, has few disposable assets. Unless BOPEC can be sold as an operable business—a highly unlikely prospect given the present circumstances—Bonaire may end up stuck with an ugly collection of scrap metal rusting away in a beautiful location on the island. *DMR*



Bonaire's relative isolation, plus the already existing tanks at BOPEC, are two of the factors that interested the space programs of the Netherlands and the United States in Bonaire.

"That the tanks are here is a huge benefit for us," said Jan Kies, Netherlands Project Manager. "Astronaut trainees can repair the tanks themselves, and the tanks can then be used for zero-gravity training."

The Joint Space Program (JSP) will also utilize the ocean off BOPEC, both to provide water for the tanks and, of course, for splashdown practice. Their contract with the Bonaire Government prohibits them from rocket launches or any other activities that would disturb local wildlife.

The OLB and the central government have signed an administrative agreement to protect and promote Papiamentu on Bonaire. The intention is to assure that the language is not only spoken on the island, but that people leave school able to read and write it as well. A joint organization will be created to preserve and develop both the language and the associated culture. Aruba and Curaçao, where Papiamentu is also spoken, will be invited to participate.

In addition, the OLB, the SPLIKA Foundation, and the DMR Fundashon Akademia Papiamentu will jointly apply to have Papiamentu recognized under the European Charter for regional or minority languages. *DMR (Bonaire.nu)*

Projector donated for elderly

Victims of Alzheimer and dementia in residential care on Bonaire now have a projector that can create for them experience of meeting with their family in person and in private, despite the isolation imposed by the corona crisis. As the patient lies in bed, the projector will project life-size images of the family on the ceiling, making it seem as if the family is visiting the resident.

The projector will improve the quality of life for ADL residents and clients, relaxing them and reducing their need for psychiatric drugs. Care providers will benefit as well, because the residents will be calmer and more accommodating. The brand new "Qwiek up" projector cost Euro 5,553 and was donated to Fundashon Alzheimer Bonaire by the Brentano's Steun des Ouderdoms Foundation in Amsterdam. *DMR (Bonaire.nu)*

cave structures. Uncontrolled visitors have held loud parties in the caves, leaving candle wax and other types of trash like cigarettes, beer bottles, fireworks, candles, plastic bags, used diapers etc.

People have entered the water caves stirring up the sediments creating a negative impact on the unique underwater fauna. Another major concern is untrained and uncertified people have led cave tours resulting in accidents. This is a major risk for both human safety and the natural and cultural values found in these caves.

CARIBSS is eager and happy to, continue protecting, maintain and managing the park with the help of our partner organizations. But, for optimal management and protection of the caves and karst environment, we need formal agreements with Bonaire's public entity (OLB).

In the meantime, in order to improve the protection of the Bonaire Caves & Karst Park, some trails and/or entries may be changed. This way badly prepared and poorly equipped visitors and unofficial tour guides are discouraged to enter on their own. We are proactive in educating Group 8 Bonairean students about the special environment of the Caves and Karst to encourage future nature advocates.

A Garden? Just Do It! ^{by Angliet, Nature Lover}

Getting rid of pests

Since the covid storm hit Bonaire, we have no other choice than to stay home. I always thought, what a nightmare to be locked up in a house and a yard for weeks, especially when you live alone as I do. I enjoy my free life, doing things like criss-crossing the island on the bike, socializing with friends at the Kaya Grandi markets and admiring the sunset on beaches. There is no time to get bored. When the small lock down came, I found myself more and more in the garden. I'm surprised that I can fill most of the day being busy there. I find so much to do and discover that I feel happy.

First thing I did was a big clean up. I follow the 'use to recycle and reuse' idea.

With so much time, I gave my garden and yard a face lift. First I trimmed all the trees into a heap and then raked all the leaves.

A neighbor told me to do this at least three times a year to rid the yard of roaches, ants, rats, mice, scorpions, spiders, centipedes and woodlice. Rotten leaves and wood are perfect habitats for them but I use it for compost. I turn the heap up side down so it gets light and fresh air and the bugs' habitat is disturbed.

When fruits drop like papaya, and mango, the rats, mice and roaches attack. They love fruit and once they are in your yard, it's hard to get rid of them and they can end up in your house. So don't let fruits rot in the yard.

Lately there have been a lot of wasps around and they make their nests behind things, terrible. A few weeks ago I moved a table to the back porch, and underneath

was a big nest. I got nine stings on my arm. I rubbed fresh lemon juice on the stings to eliminate the poison. I also got a thorn of a jatu cactus in my thumb. I carefully took it out, with a sterilized needle but in the evening it started to hurt, swell and throb. I ended up at the doctor and received antibiotics for the inflammation.

Safeguard your surrounding from bugs and animals by cleaning your yard. If you have old wood and other things, remove them once in a while and wear garden gloves. Always keep lemons and fresh aloe as aloe is one of the best remedies to rub over a wound.

When I raked the garden, I disturbed the ants and they

moved under the plant containers. To get rid of them, pour hot water over them. If they are in a potted plant, soak the container in a bucket with warm water and you will get rid of the whole nest at one time. I don't use chemicals and sprays because it's bad for the environment and everyone else.


I have a lot of birds in my yard. They drink in the hanging baskets on the porch and also make nests there and I love it. What I don't like is the poop they drop everywhere, including on one specific wall. One day I asked a painter to clean and repaint the wall. And since then they don't poop there anymore, but started on another wall. I washed that wall clean and no more pooping. So I'm wondering, do they smell or see the poop there and make that spot their toilet and use it every time? Anyway, if you have that problem too, you know to clean the area and they will look for another pooping place.

Iguanas also come to the same spot to poop. I mix vinegar with a liquid cleaner and spray it where they poop. And I have to say it works! I guess, they don't like the sharp smell and find another place for their toilet. One time is not enough, so keep on spraying the vinegar. This works for wild cats and dogs too. Household vinegar is cheap and they don't like the smell. I used a whole bottle where they used to pee / poop against my fence and no more cat and dog poop or pee.

Last but not least, I told a local kunukero that my papaya tree is lazy; she does not bear fruit. He said to tie a red ribbon around the tree and hit a nail in the trunk. I could not believe it was so simple, but I tried it. And, no joke, one day I saw a lot of little papayas in the top of the tree that turned into big, super delicious papayas. No one can explain what the red ribbon has to do with a lazy papaya tree, but it works, or maybe it was just luck. So these are some of my garden experiences


It is estimated to be operational by Christmas, 2021 barring any issues due to COVID.

Parrots and People! by Megan Hill

Lora, friend or foe? Luca Lo Scavo, a second time Echo volunteer, has been researching human-parrot conflict on the island of Bonaire for the past year. Based on extensive interviews with local citizens, community representatives and business owners, Luca's work reveals a deep understanding of the perception of the loras (Yellow-shouldered Amazon parrots) on the island.

Luca presented his findings during a public presentation in February and afterwards everybody was invited to share their opinions and questions in an open discussion.

This research project aims to open discussions rather than take any sides and aims to be unbiased in its approach. The work Luca and many other social scientists have done on the Island of Bonaire, is vital to working towards a common goal.

During his interviews, many people raised their concerns about the loras, one of which was that they are fruit pests; they flock to eat ripe fruit trees in people's private property. This means the land owners cannot eat or sell the fruits themselves. Another issue raised was that locals feel isolated/alienated from the parrots: they can no longer have parrots as pets and therefore they hold no economic value to them as individuals.

This information is invaluable to Echo. Understanding the problem is the first step to creating a solution. During the interviews many of the concerned citizens had positive recommendations on

how to help address the issues. Some of those long-term solutions included offering parrot scholarships and creating new economic opportunities from the parrots through eco tours.

The results of Luca's research are not the end but rather the beginning. Echo will be using the research to continue community engagement and to work with nature stakeholders on the island to develop a future where parrots and people can live in harmony. current Covid regulations limit use to two patients max.

Diving accident treatments usually take five to six hours, one or two times, but they can be over a dozen. The number of treatments is based on the patient's improvement after the first one.

Pam said, "If the patient can't walk, then we keep going till there is no improvement. If their pinky finger is a little numb, then it's likely they are done.

Divers are generally treated with 100% Oxygen at 60 feet (18 meters). In more severe diving accidents the treatment gas can be Nitrox 50/50, beginning the treatment at deeper depths (100-165 feet).

Wound patients generally receive a 30-40 treatment protocol at a depth of 45 ft.

Over the past 35 years, there have been some interesting patients including a guy that denied he had DCS, (decompression sickness). even though he had come in crawling and crying. After treatment and he was okay, the patient said it was his sciatic nerve and refused to pay.

Pam remembers a girl who couldn't walk and had to be wheeled in for treatment. Towards the end of her treatment, she asked, "Will I be done in time for the night dive?".

Four people are needed for any treatment: a nurse inside the chamber, q supervisor, an operator outside and the doctor who can go in or out through an airlock.

"When a diver is not feeling well, they go to the hospital ER and they will consult the diving medical doctor on call. This doctor will examine the patient and determine if recompression therapy is necessary." said van der Vaart.

The cost is \$800 per hour. So DAN insurance is highly recommended.

"And it's good for the diver to know,"




Dr. van der Vaart watches as the new chamber is lowered into the new facility through the open roof in 2009. Photo Chamber Archive

said Pam, "that if I take one or five treatments, I'm not going to have to sell my car."

Bonaire's hyperbaric team receives initial training from van de Vaart and the supervisors. Further education is done with International ATMO Inc, formerly the Jefferson C Davis Wound Care and Hyperbaric medicine Center of San Antonio, TX.

The HBOT team is made up of: one doctor, four supervisors, three doctors in




Numbers of diving patients and wound patients treated from 2000 to 2020.

training, eight operators and 13 nurses. This dedicated and well-trained team include supervisors Pam Teitel and Malin Kaijser, who have been with Dr. van der Vaart since the beginning, and Linda Baker and Francey Allee who have been with them for approximately 25 years.

Over the past 35 years, lives have been saved and changed with Bonaire's HBOT. Records have been lost prior to 2000, but in 2010 we know 38,791 people dived Bonaire with 23 divers treated. In 2019, 33,780 diver park tags were sold, indicating the number of divers, and there were a mere 20 dive accidents.

Van der Vaart commented, these statistics are interesting to know. The comparison means it is really safe to dive on Bonaire. *Julie Morgan*

5. Listen (respect): act honestly and facilitate its integral and effective expression.

In short, when you act with complete honesty, expressing your true emotions to the person who needs to hear them the most (perhaps, yourself), you will be at peace with yourself, you will feel liberated and healthier and you will accept yourself as you are.

Creating optimal health

Learning from our emotions

Emotions are vital to our lives and have been key to our survival as species. For example, fear has alerted us to life dangers and anger has given us energy to face them.

It is necessary to transcend the idea that there are good (acceptable) emotions and bad (rejectable) emotions or good and bad impulses. Every emotion can be an opportunity for growth and every emotion can be an opportunity for disaster. It is essential to accept emotions and impulses without judging them, since what is rejected or judged, is usually repressed. And what is strongly repressed becomes a source of chronic stress.

Emotions result from the integration of sensations from the outer and inner world, generating changes at the somatic level. Six primary emotions have been described: fear, anger, sadness, joy, surprise and aversion. There are also secondary emotions such as love, contempt, shame, jealousy, guilt and pride. The primary ones are basic and common to all humans and other animals. Secondary emotions are based on cognitive assessment and social and cultural factors.

According to the Harvard Business Review, emotional intelligence is twice as important as technical skills or Page 10

IQ in determining top management performance. Daniel Goleman ensures that people are hired for their technical skills and fired for their lack of emotional skills. He states that Emotional Intelligence is "the ability to recognize our own emotions, to self-motivate and manage emotions within us and in our relationships."

According to this author, Emotional Intelligence is based on five skills:

1. Self-awareness: be aware of the emergence of emotions. It is important to look at them with a certain perspective, to detach from them. Self-knowledge is key in recognizing the minor changes that announce an incoming emotion.

2. Self-acceptance: it is important to avoid judgments and understand that the appearance of emotions cannot be controlled. Suppressing emotions can create chronic stress and a dangerous imbalance for the body.

3. Self-regulation: this means channeling and directing emotional energy in a constructive way. At the same time implies the ability to subordinate immediate gratification and favor more transcendental goals and values. It implies taking responsibility for your own life as you are in charge. Different techniques can be learned to achieve

Authorized family members and contacts of the elderly were contacted by doctors for consent. Results of vaccine distribution in nursing homes worldwide has decreased the number of covid infections.

Other elderly Bonaire citizens may need help too. If you know someone in this target group, please reach out to help them. Many may assistance in navigating the internet or phone system registration. *J.M.*



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
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This little fella shown in the picture is quite special. It is one of two sea slug species that can pop its head off and regrow its entire body. Researchers in Japan discovered that *Elysia marginate* and *Elysia atroviridis* are both capable of undergoing extreme regeneration. These sea slugs can detach their heads on purpose, and they regrow their bodies in just a couple of weeks. The head can live for weeks without the need of a functioning body.

These slugs feed on algae. Like plants, algae make their own food out of sunlight and CO2 (photosynthesis). When the slug eats the algae, it is then able to photosynthesize, ie make its own food and stay alive. I already think this is very special, but there is even more. This very special slug's body can live for days to months after it is detached from its head!

The scientists who discovered this phenomenon think that this species has the most extreme form of regeneration and autonomy seen in nature.

Sayaka Mitoh from the University of Japan was the one who discovered the abilities of this sea slug. In 2018 she saw an individual of Elysia marginate crawling without a head. At first, she thought the poor creature was going to die soon. However, nothing was farther from the truth; the sea slug healed in several days and its entire body started to regrow. After three weeks, 80% of the slug's body had regenerated and it was almost an exact replica of the previous one. The vital organs of the lost body still functioned for weeks. Unfortunately, it was not able to regrow its head. So why do these slugs go to such extremes? Sayaka's lab conducted research that suggests that the slugs regenerate when they get too many parasites.

If you want to know more about this special species there is a lot of information and some cool videos online.

Curfew in force

Lt. Governor Edison Rijna has imposed a curfew from 9 pm - 4 am, the first on Bonaire. Citizens are not allowed to leave their house during those hours. But there are exceptions. People are allowed on the streets in an emergency or if they or someone else need urgent medical help. People who work at night can be out, but they must carry a completed employer's statement. This statement can be downloaded from www.bonairecrisis.com/functions.

Individuals may walk their dog during curfew hours, but only alone.

Enforcing the curfew

A team of multidisciplinary agencies is enforcing the curfew by patroling the roads, which must be clear nonessential traffic by 9 pm and inspecting catering establishments, which must shut down by 8 pm.

Most catering establishments were found to be abiding by the rules, but a few were caught selling alcholic beverages after hours. They were ordered to close. Twenty three people were caught out beyond 9 and will be fined \$150. Repeat violations will bring increased fines. The team found there were quite a few people in their cars on the street after 9 who did have their employer's statements confirming they worked at night.

The Dutch Caribbean Police Corps, the Royal Netherlands Marechaussee (KMAR), and the Supervision and Enforcement Directorate of the Public Entity, are teaming up to enforce the curfew on Bonaire. Significant numbers of violations are occurring on Curaçao too.

Airport to remain open

Despite the lockdown, Flamingo Airport will remain open for essential travel and cargo. As Bonaire's infection rate climbs, overflow patients need to be flown to hospitals on other islands. Individual passengers can still fly to Bonaire, depending on airline schedules. A negative PCR test plus a negative antigen test or a negative NAAT test result are required for entry, plus a health certificate upon. These requirements will be strictly monitored. The European Netherlands has also imposed strict testing and quarantine requirements for arriving passengers, as have other islands in the Caribbean Netherlands.

Hospitals respond to the surge

Fundashon Mariadal is expanding the Special Care department to deal with the surge in covid patients. General practitioners and specialists have been asked to postpone day treatments and non-urgent operations. Arrangements have been made with Curacao and Aruba for hospitalization of overflow patients. People who have been tested positive for the Covid-19 virus and have increasing complaints should come to the hospital only after consultation with their GP. The hospital is urgently asking people to get vaccinated.

Curaçao Medical Center has cancelled all non-emergency

operations. Clinical appointments will continue as usual.

School closures are flexible

During the lockdown, the schools can continue to provide live instruction in special needs courses, examination courses, and courses requiring practical application. Lessons are taught at school for vulnerable children and children of parents with critical functions. Otherwise, teachers are encouraged to provide as much distance learning as possible and nag the children to practice corona precautions. Schools reopen on April 1.

Customer covid registration must be private

Many businesses are required by corona rules to register their customers by name, phone number, date and time. That data can aid the Health Department personnel when they trace infection sources and contacts. However, businesses must also keep the personal information private. Each customer or table must be registered on a separate form, the form must be secured so that neither other customers nor employees can see it, and the data cannot be retained longer than 14 days.

The BES commission that supervises the protection of personal data (CPB) is especially concerned about the practice in many food and drinking establishments of registering customers on a single list that then gets passed around. Other customers and employees can view the names and phone numbers recorded on those lists. *DMR*

Every social need that is expressed should be met while still respecting social distance. A choir could be set up with regular training sessions on Zoom. And art classes too, with exhibits of the work on social media.

For people who have problems expressing themselves one could find volunteers to send little care packages or cards every week with paper hugs. Clothing rallies could be organized, followed by a fitting session online with the volunteers. There are many, more ideas that we could come up with to make life a lot more enjoyable right now.

For the lonely elderly, a buddy-program was set up successfully. This program has a lot of room to grow during these covid days. Zoom sessions on ipads or iphones would be a big help if regular daily talking sessions were organized. Donations could be packed in a very attractive way, divided, then delivered at a distance. Birthdays should be celebrated in a drive-by style.

A choir could train and work on a session with songs for the elderly that they still remember. Those concerts could be available on Zoom or other media for easy watching and listening.

All radio stations should have special programs for the elderly and the television providers should show many old movies .

All these wonderful, special people should not feel left alone and afraid. They should know that there are many people out there who love them and are willing to make life a lot easier and more agreeable for them.

Bonaire's sky park

It's a matter of degrees

How far apart are the stars of Orion's Belt? The sky is always moving, so astronomers need a way to measure distance in the sky -- and for that they use DEGREES.

Go outside and imagine you're standing sideways! If you look at the horizon, that's ZERO -- then straight up is 90!

360 degrees of sky exist all around you! This is how astronomers divide the sky.

If you stick out your arm, your pinky is about ONE degree three fingers is FIVE

A fist is TEN

And a Hawaiian Shaka is 25! Let's try it.

Hit the skies at 9pm this week and look southwest. You'll see Orion's belt stars are almost three degrees across. From Betelgeuse in Orion you can hop to Procyon in Canis Minor with one 25-degree shaka, and then to Cancer with a 10 degree hand- width! Easy!

A waning gibbous moon near Antares

On the mornings of April 1 and 2, 2021, watch for the waning gibbous moon. In its waning gibbous phase the moon will appear less than full but more than half-lighted. A full moon rises just at sunset. A waning gibbous moon rises later at night, somewhere between your local sundown and midnight. A waning gibbous moon can surprise you if you happen to be out late in the evening and you catch it rising eerily, some hours after sunset, glowing red like a misshapen full moon when it's near the horizon.

You're gliding along, enjoying the action on the reef, and suddenly – ZZAP! – something stings you. It HURTS, especially since the sting often ends up on our lips.

This is not a pleasurable event.

So maybe you rub the site – which doesn't help much and possibly triggers more stings - and wonder: What the heck was that? You'd been looking in the direction it had come from, and seen nothing. You do a slow 360-degree spin, and (most of the time) still see nothing. So you let your buddy know you've been stung, and that you're okay, and you continue the dive - moving more cautiously and looking more carefully at the water right in front of your face. And then you finally see the culprit: a jellyfish-type creature with transparent leaf-shaped appendages, or red dots, or a little bubble, with trailing tentacles thinner than hairs. The type in the photo releases a red dye that looks like diluted blood.

These creatures are related to jellyfish but classified in a separate group called siphonophores (sie-FONN-uhfores, "tube-bearers"). The world's bestknown siphonophore is the Portuguese Man O'War, which is well-studied because they occasionally "invade" (the word used by Brevard Times) Florida's east coast beaches. One of the PMO'W's outstanding features is a gas-filled bubble that can get up to 12" (30 cm) long and more than 5" (13 cm) high, buoyant enough to float, with a sail-like shape that helps it be pushed along by the wind, and which makes those beach "invasion" fleets impossible to miss. Each of those beautiful bluish bubbles conceals a dangerous underwater cargo: stinger-filled tentacles, which trail 10-15'/3-5m behind and beneath the critter, but occasionally stretch to as long as 50'/15m! The PMO'W drifts along, and when a tentacle makes contact with anything, two things happen: the tentacle shoots venomous stingers into the prey, and the tentacle shrinks up. This pulls the prey toward the other tentacles, which begin stinging as soon as they make contact. The prey is held at the underside of the float for consumption.

The value of intense and multiple stings is simple: the sooner the prey animal is immobilized, the less damage it can do to the predator.

This correlation is true for the other siphonophores too, such as the ones who find us in Bonaire's waters. Their tentacles are fragile, but their stings pack a wallop. When they're disturbed, the creatures can shrink down to a size smaller

than your fist.

The challenge is to find them undisturbed. To appreciate the details of their intricate structures without causing them to shrink up (and without getting yourself stung).

Notes:

1. Usually, the pain from a sting doesn't last more than a few minutes (though it feels like longer). If you have any difficulty breathing or other problems, though, go to the Emergency Room!

2. The biology of siphonophores is complicated – they're actually colonies rather than individuals -- and doesn't re-

late to our underwater experiences; Wikipedia is a good place to begin learning more.
