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Keeping Bonaire natural

Although the pandemic decimated the tourist industry, it allowed Bonaire to live a year as her authentic self. It gave us an opportunity to rethink what kind of tourist destination we want our island

I was pleased to see a team has been working on a plan to bring Bonaire out of lockdown and isolation by creating the Bonaire Tourism Recovery Plan. Much of the plan is a refreshing acknowledgment that Bonaire is special. Bonaire is different. She is a natural beauty.

The Bonaire Tourism Recovery Plan declares three main objectives for keeping Bonaire natural:

- 1. Target existing markets and increase average expenditure: Efforts geared towards getting tourists from the existing markets back to Bonaire after re-opening borders
- 2. Diversify the tourism product: Efforts geared towards evolving the island into a sustainable and 'premium destination', focusing on the active, adventurous, nature lover, the more affluent tourist who enjoys the 'Bonaire experience'.
- 3. Engage the local community: Efforts geared towards the engagement of locals and organizations in the development of 'authentic local experiences' for the more affluent tourist."

The objectives speak to the heart of

many of us who have come to Bonaire for years as tourists or who have made Bonaire our home. They are addressed to those who love nature and value the authentic experience. I applaud the team's plan to attract and retain the tourist who wants to experience a natural Bonaire; in particular, their intention to move away from mass tourism, to focus on digital nomads, and to accept smaller and fewer cruise ships. Those would be tremendous first steps.

However, when reading proposed list of suggestions of improving Bonaire's top 20 attractions, I was alarmed by the items that seemed completely counterintuitive to the three main objectives. Their impact on Bonaire tourism would be the exact opposite the one intended. They would drive long-time tourists away from Bonaire. Bonaire would lose its authenticity.

I posted a question on a Facebook group that has over 9,500 members.

What's your opinion of the proposed 20 items? The members of the group share a deep interest in Bonaire. Some are tourists and long-time lovers of the island who have made annual visits for 20 or 30 years, sometimes multiple times per year. Some are Bonaire property owners, Bonaire residents, people who visited then ended up settling here. The people in this group mirror the tourist audience we want to reach and grow.

It seems the post struck a nerve. The Tourism Recovery Committee want improvements that will attract that target market. The members of the group overwhelmingly think they have missed the

To quote one response, "We don't come to Bonaire for it to be Disney, Aruba, or any place with concessions at every corner. Fix the roads, fix the stupid theft issues, reduce the cruise ships, leave flamingos and Klein alone. Very happy that there's terrific dining and grocery choices these days."

Another comment laid out a plan that expressed a consensus of the general responses:

"• Preserve the reef and nature. Keep the island peaceful. That is the magic

Safety and hygiene certification coming for tourist businesses

Tourism related businesses will soon be inspected, then granted a 'Bonaire Friendly Safety Seal' if they meet required standards for visitor safety and hygiene. The program will be conducted by the Tourism Corporation Bonaire in collaboration with BONHATA and the Public Entity Bonaire (OLB). The certification program, intended to give visitors a sense of security regarding their personal health and safety during their stay in the island, is part of the Tourist Recovery Program.

The goal of the new certification program is to improve hygiene and safety protocols island wide, and to ensure that local tourism related businesses meet the required standards. In order to receive a BFSS gold seal, businesses will need to adhere to several protocols and policies, plus be inspected on-site by an assessor and be approved. They will be allowed to display the gold seal at their business and on online platforms.

Businesses can choose from ten categories: Accommodations, Casinos, Car Rentals, Tour Operators, Watersports Operators, Taxis, Restaurants, Food Trucks, Retail Shops, and Spa/Salons.

The BFSS program is scheduled to be launched in May 2021 when training begins for the assessors. Then a pilot program will be conducted to debug the procedures. One business from each category will be encouraged to participate in the pilot. How and where businesses can register to participate in the BFSS program will be announced next week.

The BFSS program has been created by the TCB and is accredited and recognized by Qesh Services, a firm with more than 20 years of professional experience in implementing management systems in quality, environment, safety and health. *DMR*



Island airports organize for future

The airline industry, faced with recovering from major losses during the covid pandemic, is also reinventing its base technologies. Airports must be ready to adapt too. Therefore the managements of the six commercial airports in the Caribbean Netherlands have signed the "Dutch Caribbean Cooperation of Airports" (DCCA), an agreement to work together in the future.

The leaders of the airports of Saba, Sint Eustatius, Sint

Some of Bonaire's long neglected wells must be cleaned and deepened. That's one of the priorities in the OLB's plan to develop the agricultural sector. Last year the Barra di Karta well was upgraded. Now work has started on the well of Rincon (Gruta di Lourdes). The contractor expects to complete the work within a few days. DMR

Maarten, Bonaire, Curação and Aruba want to improve the general quality of each individual airport. Airports will offer each other mutual assistance, efficient information exchange, knowledge transfer and the sharing of expertise. They intend to work together to achieve economies of scale and to devise a regional response to such matters as innovation, sustainability, regulation, safety and security, airport health challenges, emergency response, economic sustainability, stable and affordable air connections and maintenance, infrastructure and project management. They also agreed to explore the goal of making the Caribbean region a front runner in driving electric flying as the next generation in aviation. *DMR (Bonaire.nu)*

Three new goats will improve breed

Three young goat bucks from the Netherlands have been unloaded from KLM. LVV has imported them for breed improvement as part of the Professionalisation of Goat Farming program. They are studbook Boergoats three and a half months old. In November they'll be old enough to go to work. Kunukeros' will bring their best mother goats to LVV for breeding. Top quality kids will be produced which can be slaughtered within six months. The meat will be of high quality and will bring top price in the market. *DMR*

Covid-19 round-up

People are going to die

Everyone who doesn't get vaccinated against the covid virus will likely get sick eventually. Some won't survive. Those who do survive will have been vaccinated the hard way.

There's only one important item of covid news this issue. The vaccination rate on Bonaire has flat lined, even though the health department is vigorously promoting the program and doing everything it can, up to knocking on people's doors, needle in hand. April 24th, 62.6% of Bonaireans had received at least one shot. Only 2.8 % more have been vaccinated a week later. And many people are not showing up for their second shot.

The island cannot be considered safe until we reach the herd immunity level of 85%. We'll all continue to live under restrictions. And the island will continue to be infected, maybe permanently. Dozens of medical professionals are waiting around for people to show up to get vaccinated. They need to complete the program. They're not going to wait forever. *DMR*

of Bonaire.

- Fix the roads and create bike lanes/paths
- Expand parking!!
- No palm trees, they require too much water and die in a desert setting. Use desert plants and trees.
- Stop the petty crime at dive sites. If people don't feel safe they won't return.
- Keep goats and donkeys away from the public beaches
 - No music unless it is live music
- Charge every cruise passenger a nature fee and ban plastic bottles
- Support 2 higher quality museums, put one in Rincon
 - STINAPA needs to be more visible
- Upgrade the airport terminal, especially baggage claim area."

The group seems to be fully on-board with protecting the authenticity of Bonaire. One person even commented, "People who want all kinds of non-essential development and unnatural feeding events should find a different island. Bonaire should develop as an ecotourism island and promote wellness retreats. Do no damage meditation retreats. Learn to love the quiet and the beauty of the simplicity."

In summary, the people I polled fully support the vision of the team who developed the Tourism Recovery Plan. But they believe the plan itself is out of align-



ment with the team's own vision. We call on the government and the team executing the recovery plan to look beyond themselves. They should look to their audience. People in their target market overwhelmingly believe that a solid infrastructure (good roads, safety, parking, bicycle lanes/paths, etc.) in a natural and highly protected environment would provide an attractive and safe environment for Bonaireans and tourists

We ask that you seek to protect nature and extensively evaluate any project that would create artificial structures that are potentially damaging to the environment. Anything that infringes upon the salt pans, mangroves, flamingo sanctuaries, sea turtle or bird nesting areas, or causes obvious permanent damage to our protected reef system, threatens the very existence of Bonaire's natural infrastructure and therefore, threatens the

very reason people have come and will continue to come to Bonaire. We have one of the few truly authentic and natural environments left on the planet. Bonaire is unique. Your tourist audience asks that you protect and keep Bonaire authentic and natural.

Policing the curfew and emergency ordinance

Multidisciplinary checks on compliance with emergency regulations and curfews are carried out by the Dutch Caribbean Police Force (KPCN), the Royal Netherlands Marechaussee (KMAR) and the Supervision and Enforcement Directorate of the Public Entity.

Apr. 19. Twelve police reports were issued for violating curfews. During the curfew check, three men aged 23, 31 and 28 were arrested after a short chase for violating curfews, for disregarding police claims and for displaying highly

dangerous driving behavior. The car was impounded.

Apr. 21. Two police reports were issued. One for violation of the emergency ordinance (drinking alcohol on the street) and one for violation of the curfew.

Apr. 22. On the Kaya Korona during a vehicle check, a wooden box containing a marijuana-like herb was confiscated. The driver was also given a police report for violating the curfew.

Public service

Apr. 29. The police and medical examiner investigated the natural death of a man, 83, who was found lying in a garden.

Two fuel facilities to be built. How about one for now? Don Ricks

According to stories appearing in the media, "Despite reservations in the House of Representatives, the establishment of Bonaire Fuel Terminals (BBT) is now a fact." BBT will build two new fuel storage facilities: "a small modern terminal at the power plant" and "modern floating storage of diesel, petrol and kerosene at the airport." The general understanding on the island is that the fuel stored at the power plant will be unloaded from a pier that will be built in the Willem Alexander Marine Reserve, but government sources prefer not to mention that.

The government makes an absolutely convincing case for creating a permanent and secure fuel supply for Bonaire—but not for building it day after tomorrow.

Before construction starts, we should ponder this question: why build a small modern fuel pier on the reef at the power plant when a big, old, dirty, fuel pier is rusting away in bankruptcy less than a kilometer away? Why not float a large capacity fuel storage vessel at the Bopec pier while exploring the possibility of upgrading that dock into a permanent fuel landing point for the power plant?

Bopec is not likely to resume business someday, though many dream it will. Someone would have to fix Venezuela first. Then someone would have to find a niche for Bopec in the rapidly changing world energy market. Bopec's bankruptcy may have created an economic and political opportunity to upgrade its facilities and give them a useful future. Bonaire already has a strip of ruined shoreline and dead reef in the area. Let's not rush to create another near by. *DMR*

The condition of Bonaire's roads Ron Sewell

Having had a recent tyre burst which left me in somewhat of a helpless situation and without help, I have to think about so many other older people who may encounter similar problems due to the disgraceful conditions of many of Bonaire's roads.

Once I had recovered from my ordeal it was necessary to visit a Car Tyre Stockist and I was amazed at the number of other damaged tyres there were laying around the supplier's yard.

Having been able to navigate around some of the more serious holes that I have encountered, I have to say that from a visual point of view, it seems that even newly repaired holes have very little structure to them, to prevent them breaking up again.

To make the road hole situation even more ludicrous, a patch of our main road close to Harbour Village (Just outside the new Spice building) has a nice Tarmac stripe over the top of the channel that they re-dug to correct, (what I am told is) the original pipe laying mistake, going past a nasty hole not more than 12" away.

In most civilized countries a responsible person overseeing the work, would have told the repair gang to fill it in while passing.

Does that mean that Bonaire is not a civilised island? Or does that mean that they had nobody overseeing the work? Or that people on the work gang are not allowed to think for themselves?

It seems clear to me, that from certain newish roads, that we do have the capability on the island of producing good roads that don't break up, so I have to ask myself, why aren't the authorities able to keep up with the road repair and manufacturing requirements?

Would there be such a position in the Bonaire Government as "Minister for Roads"?

Or somebody with a similar position to whom we can place questions about government policy and activity with respect to roads?

Perhaps an article in your paper might provoke a wide degree of interest?

When driving the streets of Bonaire slow enough to avoid all the pot holes, you've most likely seen some whimsical art that makes you smile. The colorful little bird type abstractions are the signature handiwork of the Street Colors project latest visiting artist Kenneth Letsoin.

Kenneth is the second artist this year visiting from the Netherlands as a part of Holfi Kultural, an initiative of Fundashon Plataforma Kultural.

He has definitely left his mark on abandoned wall spaces but also with the 15 kids and local artists of Bonaire. Together they have completed: an abstract wall at Flamingo gym, Hofi Kultural buildings, a Hofi mixed media collage, entrances at FORSA and a 40 meter wall in Bolivia. And there have been numerous 'practice' abstracts done on abandoned buildings across the island.

Kenneth, now 48, studied at the Aki School in Holland but has been doing hip hop graffiti and tagging since the age of 12.

"I didn't care about the academics. All I wanted to do was draw." said Kenneth, "I drew a lot of birds, just like I do now. It was an escape for me. It was like a medicine or drug."

He has traveled to Mexico, Guatemala, Greece, Slovakia and Spain and always paints something, leaving his mark everywhere he goes, His work reflects the influences of his travels. There is always the occasional house exterior abstract painting he does for no pay and the home owners let him paint whatever he wants. His commission jobs are usually representational art that he enjoys too. Kenneth has had public art commissions depicting historical or cityscape themes.

Kenneth said, "I'm not the typical guy that only does one thing."

He was excited about Bonaire's cave drawings saying the symbols were beautiful. They reminded him somewhat of his own 'bird' drawings expressing something different from what is actually depicted. Kenneth has painted the same type of birds all over Rotterdam. He says they create a sense of freedom and a splash of color in contrast to the grey skies of Holland making people happy.

Kenneth said, "Here [on Bonaire] there are the beautiful colors of nature, flowers, the sea and birds and also the colorful houses. In Holland, there are no colorful houses; the colors here are like Wow!"

Kenneth has done residencies in Spain and Slovakia with children age 5-18. He works with the elderly and disabled and finds their energy of making art very rewarding.

"They are always so happy at the end saying, 'I never knew that I could draw like this, when are you coming back'." said Kenneth.

Kenneth has left a mark on Bonaire and with the children. He has planted the joy and

freedom of art in them. In his instruction, he told them, 'I am not your teacher, I am an artist'. Kenneth's first solo and final project is painting wall art on a container on Playa Lechi before heading back to Holland on May 10

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Reef Glimpses by Dee Scarr

"I'm Ready for My Close-up"

Last January I had an almost-interaction with a spotted eagle ray: the ray was trailing about 100 yards (more than 100 m) of fishing line, I grabbed the line and cut it to less than a yard (less than a meter) away from the ray's mouth. The ray wasn't exactly overjoyed for me to be attached, but it was an almost-interaction because the ray made no aggressive moves at all. It was an amazing experience and I didn't stop grinning for weeks.

Last week off Pink Beach, Julie Morgan and Malin Kaijser had a different, but also amazing, experience involving a spotted eagle ray.

But first: One thing you may not know about Julie and Malin is that their control of their positioning in the water is darn near perfect. Underwater, Julie always looks graceful and weightless, even with

the relatively large two-strobe housed camera system she carries. Malin looks equally weightless and graceful, regardless of how Julie asks her to pose in relation to the current.

Good control in the water protects the reef, but it has other benefits to divers. Marine animals, especially fish, are very sensitive to water movement and water pressure. Divers who move awkwardly send out pressure messages and nearby fish take cover or depart. Divers who control their positioning get much closer to the critters.

And so it happened with Julie and Malin and this eagle ray.

The ray cruised over the sand, and they watched. Since they were very still in the water, the ray ignored them and continued its foraging.

What is foraging for a spotted eagle ray? Swimming close to a sand or sand and rubble bottom, extending its lower jaw, and digging. Spotted eagle rays seek mollusks and crustaceans, which they crush with pavement-like teeth; I think on Bonaire they probably also munch an occasional heart urchin or even a razorfish.

So the ray foraged. "I expected it to go right past us," Julie told me, "but its route took it toward us!" The ray was much more interested in foraging than it was in Julie and Malin. There are (at least) two reasons for that, by the way. The first is the consistent respect divers around Bonaire show to marine animals. This was a young ray (about 1m across, with spots. Older eagle rays have white rings) who had probably spent its entire life around Bonaire, and had never had a negative experience with divers. Cool, huh?

The second reason is, of course, Julie's and Malin's stillness in the water; nothing they did was the tiniest bit alarming to the already comfortable eagle ray.

So they got a close look at the ray's head, more pronounced in spotted eagle rays than other rays. They got to watch the ray's protruded lower jaw shovel through the bottom sand for prey. They may also have seen the ray crunching a critter - but it would have been tough to see through the ray's sand cloud!

After Julie and Malin watched motionlessly for a while, Julie took some photos. The ray was unfazed. Malin moved closer. The ray was unfazed. One photographic result accompanies this story.

Aruba repatriates Venezuelans

Aruba has been sending humanitarian flights to Venezuela to repatriate about a thousand Venezuelans who have been stranded there for more than two years. The flights are also returning Arubans stranded in Venezuela.

Two years ago the government in Caracas closed its border to Aruba, claiming that Aruba was doing too little to combat smuggling from Venezuela. When Caracas wanted to reopen the borders later, Aruba refused because too many refugees were trying to get out of Venezuela.

The most recent flight returned 93 people who were convicted of crimes or were on the island illegally. A group of Venezuelan citizens returned voluntarily as well. The flights began in January. Seven have been completed so far. DMR (Koninkrijk.nu)

Vast online resources for slavery research created

The Hague has digitized and restored nearly two million archive documents from the Dutch slavery past. The documents come from, among other sources, the West India Company, the slave trader company Middelburgse Commercie Compagnie, the Suriname Society, and the archives of the administration of the Dutch Possessions on the coast of Guinea. They are mainly ships' logs, plantation lists, cargo overviews, invoices, and business letters. But many are personal letters.

The documents record, often in vivid and shocking language, the excesses of the slave trade. In 1733 on the slave ship De Rusthof, for instance, more than half of the approximately 700 slaves aboard died between the West African coast and Paramaribo, including all 100 of the children. After the ship arrived more slaves were so weak they died before they could be sold.

Researchers unexpectedly found, in the National Archive in London, extremely detailed documents about 10 years of trade via Fort Elmina's headquarters in Ghana. The papers had been sent to the Netherlands by the Dutch governor but were hijacked by an English ship.

It is impossible to separate breathing from life. Our existence outside the womb begins with the first breath of air and we finish it with the last exhalation. It's really a good tamarind year. Not only because the trees are overloaded with tamarind fruit but the pods are a good quality - thick, long and juicy with fewer bugs. I have gathered buckets full of tamarind. Now is the best time, because later in the year the pods get old and bugs like to penetrate the seeds and lay their eggs. The pods are a safe spot for young bugs to start their life and at the same time food from the seeds are a good kind of plant protein for them. I advise you not to peel any type of pod inside your house because the bugs and their eggs can drop in your house. Just imagine what these bugs could do in your house. The same story applies to fresh vegetables from the earth. No matter if you bought it or if it comes from your garden, there are often ants, bugs and eggs on or between the leaves.

I have a pipe on my back porch where I fill two buckets half full of water, add some salt and rinse the fresh vegetables twice and then let them sit in the salty water for a few minutes. Bugs don't like salt, so they fall off the veggies. For the tamarind, I remove the shell outside the house and leave it for a day in the sun. The bugs cannot stand the hot sun and they leave. I then rinse the dry pods for a moment and they are ready to use.

All this knowledge I have from my grandma. As a kid, I would help her by doing little jobs in the garden which I often didn't like to do because I wanted to play. But now I'm so happy with all this knowledge and experiences because look what I do. I make the tamarind syrup, marmalade, chutney and more the same way she used to. When reading this, it looks like a lot of work and yes, it is, but the other side of the story is that you know for sure you get good healthy stuff in your body. And what is more important than a healthy body? The more you are aware of how precious health

is, the more you understand that no food can be better than one which is unsprayed and comes straight from the land or from the trees. As my grandma used to say: It's simple: healthy food, good rest and moving daily gives you a strong body. She proved this by reaching a very old age.

A friend asked me for some of my aloe plants of which I have a lot. She wanted to plant them along the sides of her fences. Her dogs get totally upset when other dogs pass along the fence on the street and jump against the fence damaging it. Planting a lot of aloe against the fence makes the dogs stay away from the fence because the aloe thorns hurt them. It also adds some green to the yard. I thought, that is a great idea, so I'm sharing it with you. So protect your fence with aloe, just do it now.
