A coalition government, finally, and it's good news for Bonaire

After nine long months, Mr. Rutte's centrist Party for Freedom and Democracy (VVD) has negotiated a coalition government with the same previous partners. Rutte's cabinet resigned earlier this year over a welfare scandal. News got out that overzealous tax authorities had accused innocent families, many of Caribbean origin, of falsely claiming child care benefits and forced them to repay huge amounts

According to the New York Times, far-right parties that have been gaining ground in recent years saw the March elections as an opportunity to demand systematic changes in the Netherlands. But Rutte won by a landslide. Then the negotiations to form a new government required concessions that nudged him more to the left. The results promise to be favorable to the BES Islands.

Rutte has declared that his government intends ensure Bonaire, Saba and Sint Eustatius are an equal part of the country. It will invest €30 million in the economy of the Caribbean Netherlands. Further, the government is reassessing the social minimum and will increase social security. It intends to strengthen the labor market and reduce poverty. It will assure that the financing of basic facilities is properly

The government plans to free up more money for housing, health care, education, and subsidies for child care. It will reduce the fixed costs for utilities in the Caribbean Netherlands by accelerating the switch to fully sustainable energy,

sewerage and a better drinking water supply. The government also intends to support local agriculture projects and opportunities for ecotourism.

Rutte reaffirmed that Aruba, Curação and Sint Maarten are politically autonomous and are responsible for their own good governance and sound government finances. He promised the government in The Hague will continue to contribute to the economic development of the three Caribbean countries as they strengthen and improve their soundness of governance and public finances.

Rutte's coalition partners are D66, Christian Democratic Appeal (CDA), and Christen Unie (CU). DMR (New York Times, Dossier Koninkrijksrelaties)

Dutch campaign against island corruption intensifies

In 2015 the Dutch government launched the Team Combating Undermining (TBO) in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom. Undermining, also called subversion, refers to the interdependence of organized crime and public administration. In addition to corruption, TBO investigates serious forms of tax fraud, embezzlement of public funds, falsification of documents and money laundering.

In a recent letter to the House of Representatives, State Secretary Knops (BZK) reported on the TBO's progress. Knops said the motion to create TBO was widely supported when introduced in the House and passed easily, although the affected island governments didn't want to talk about the problems it addressed. TBO's budget during 2016 - 2021 has been 12 million euros annually, contributed by the central government.

Knops reports that on Sint Maarten several politicians have been convicted of corruption by the TBO. A large-scale fraud investigation in the port also resulted in a number of convictions, and a criminal settlement was reached following a money laundering investigation.

In Curação several convictions followed an investigation into bribery in the acquisition of an oil refinery. After investigations into suspected money laundering, a bank had to relinquish assets suspected of being criminally involved.

More subversion investigations have been undertaken as additional resources were committed to the Criminal Investigation Team, the Public Prosecutor's Office, and the Joint Court of Justice. Crimes were investigated that had a financial-economic component and involved so-called Politically Exposed Persons (PEP) - civil servants, government limited liability companies, facilitators or organizations in the collective sector.

Despite these successes, the govern-

ment wants to refocus the fight against subversion from legal action to a preventive administrative approach. Knops pointed out that criminal cases have a long lead time, may be subject to appeal, and are often financially complex and intertwined with other forms of crime. Preventing corruption is preferable to punishing it.

Knops declared that, "The approach to undermining is a matter for the autonomous countries themselves." The government is budgeting and additional 13 million euros to support the creation of structural commitment and accountability within the island governments. Discussions are underway regarding steps the local governments can take to block subversion. In the meantime, TBO will continue to spend 12 million euros per year investigating and prosecuting corruption in the island governments. DMR (Dossier Koninkrijksrelaties

Covid-19 round-up

From CNN World: The Netherlands entered a strict new lockdown Sunday [December 19] due to fears over the Omicron coronavirus variant, and the UK's health minister wouldn't rule out further restrictions, as Europe braces for a surge in Covid-19 infections over the usually busy festive period.

Indoor gatherings in the Netherlands will now be limited to a maximum of two guests per household until at least mid-January, Prime Minister Mark Rutte announced Saturday That number is extended slightly around Christmas and New Year's Eve to four guests.

Non-essential shops, hospitality venues and cultural institutions will also be closed, while schools will remain shut until at least January 9.

In a televised address, Rutte said the lockdown was "unavoidable because of

MoltenWolf Glass - so much to explore

Valerie and Jeff Wolf have a passion for glass. They want to chat about glass, share ideas about glass and, of course, make glass art. What began as a fun class on bead making in 2010 in their then hometown of Phoenix, Arizona, has evolved into a big love for artistic glass work. And to share their love, they recently opened a new gallery store in Bonaire, MoltenWolf Glass.

The whole glass thing began when Valerie decided she would rather make her own glass beads for her handmade necklaces than buy them. She signed up for a class at Mesa Art Center. Though not a 'bead' guy, Jeff joined in too when he heard the process included using a 'live butane flame.'

Unfortunately, Jeff had a couple of problems: his eyesight wouldn't coop-

erate with the tools involved and each project had to be completed in one class. But Mesa Art offered all types of classes including a glass fusion class, so they enrolled in that instead.

From there the Wolfs took most every glass class offered at the center and then moved on to classes with specialized glass artists in the U.S. Valerie and Jeff took classes in glass painting, large glass art, how to make their own glass and basics on glass chemistry for manipulation. The Wolfs purchased a kiln, glass and the necessary tools to work at home rather than in a class.

When they moved to Bonaire in July 2019, they decided it would be fun to take everything they learned and take their glass skills to a new level by open-

ing a business, MoltenWolf Glass.

To enhance the artistic level of the venture, the Wolfs hired sketch artist Joel Muzo of Curaçao through Peoples Choice Consultancy and Recruitment. Since October Joel has been working along side the Wolfs learning all about making glass. And his drawing skills are evident in many of the glass art projects including the marine and sea life pieces.

"We want to create an atmosphere of art. Even the jewelry, every piece has something about it that makes me say, 'Oh, that's cool'," said Jeff.

Though neither Jeff or Valerie come from an art background, they both love

Blackwater Bonaire, Part 2:

Creatures Here Below!

Tiny Things Lead to Big Ideas

Bonaire sits in deep water...very deep. On a latitudinal (12 degrees) line with Curaçao, Los Aves, Los Roques, et al, the topography of these islands sit along the Bonaire Trench. Check out this map.

Find Bonaire and Klein Bonaire. Blackwater Bonaire starts here in these deepwater profiles going down over 1000 meters deep. Look at the vast structures adjacent to the island of Bonaire. Here is a view of the Bonaire Trench between the string of islands, including Bonaire, facing South America. Even between the coast of Bonaire and Klein Bonaire there is a deep cut that provides a cradle for organisms and pathway for nightly migration to places like Oil Slick Leap, Bruce's Rappel and Karpata.

Biotic Blizzards

These birthing sites are part of the Southern Caribbean Marine Eco-region and feeds the entire Gulfstream that starts along the coast of South America. This macro view of the region's topography is very instructional. The teacher in me looks for clues and reasons things are the way they are. Blackwater's tiny things lead to big ideas about the ocean. The uber-deep topography hosts a dazzling array of organisms from tiny zooplankton, larval, and post-larval stages to vast schools of pelagics. The biotic blizzards can be so dense some nights that it is difficult to see individuals. While Bonaire's vast underwater profiles and topography help explain why, but what is even more impressive.

Blackwater Buddies


Blackwater Bonaire has a mind-numbing array of biological stories. A nightly migration of organisms having shapes, colors, geometrics, iridescence, transparency, minutia, and morphologies create the "what's that?" factor. It is such an adventure.

Here's what my keen-eyed Blackwater buddy, Leanne Pinkerton, says. "Every night is an enlightening experience of spectacular findings!"


Many nights the findings are right under the surface in a snow globe-like blizzard. There are always surprises like on Anna and Ned Deloach's picture showing hydroids living on a larval sea butterfly. These hi-res images are fundamentally changing our knowledge and understanding of embryology and morphology in the sea. Anna agreed while there are many places in the world to Blackwater dive and snorkel, Oil Slick Leap is one of the premier places and you only need to climb a ladder to get there. In fact, many nights I sit at the bottom of the ladder and watch the creatures from the deep rise in staggering diversity and numbers. Many are still new to me. That is about as exciting as it gets...seeing something I've never seen before. Our dive lights are a great attraction to those that live in the dark much of their lives. As we found out at Pink Beach in 1988, nighttime snorkeling over the drop-off is interesting, bizarre, and immensely fun. Yet there is so much more to discover from the shallows to the Bonaire Trench.

What's the Big Idea?

Worldwide, Blackwater is exploding with popularity attracting the curious to new realms. Amateur birdwatchers are the citizen scientists that changed ornithology. The same is happening in marine biology. Nightly,

eager explorers and clever photographers are capturing pictures of the unknown near the surface of the water. Currents passing by Bonaire and its neighbor islands feed their coral reefs and the Gulfstream with a myriad of new larval and post-larval that grow into adults. Further north, off the coast of West Palm Beach, Blackwater divers are filling dive boats in record numbers recording new larvae and post-larval organisms that were previously unknown. On Bonaire this happens mere feet from the shore. A new story is unfolding before our eyes.

Last week, a Blackwater Bonaire buddy, Dr. Johnny Larsen, an ER doctor from N.J. and long-time Bonaire lover, answered the "What's the Big Idea?" question this way. "I find Blackwater diving and snorkeling off Oil Slick Leap in Bonaire to be totally fascinating. The array of creatures that come up from the depths, such as larval eels, fish, shrimp, octopus and other things I don't recognize. There are box jellyfish that are 1 mm size with creatures ingested within them. These are things I have never seen before in my 50 years of scuba diving. It's a whole new world of frantic animal activity and I want to know more..."

Yup, that's me, after my first snorkel on Bonaire in 1966 and 50+ return trips and countless nights in blackwater watching the known and unknown...I want to know more!

Clean up the skeletons in the closet: Revoke the old unused permits.

The Executive Council (BC) is working on preparations for a comprehensive review of the Bonaire Spatial Development Plan (revision ROB).

The BC intends to include in the revision of the ROB

- leading to the construction of high-quality hotels, resorts and other high-quality recreational accommodation facilities and
- leading to a balanced composition of housing construction and use of housing for all target group.

Protection of nature is not mentioned at all; "nature" the most important source of income for Bonaire.

In anticipation of this revision, the BC took a Preparatory Decree for accommodation recreation and housing construction (VB) (P&A2021005980) on 2 December 2021 to be able to put developments, that do not fit in the ROB revision, 'on hold'. An almost unreadable piece that again contains enough possibilities to apply arbi-

According to the BC, this VB is to achieve an overall increase in the quality of the recreational facilities and a balanced composition of housing.

The VB only applies to new permit applications. But what will happen to the 'skeletons in the closet', issued, unused permits, which thwart the BC's purpose described above?

The law provides for the possibility for the BC to respond to this, namely by withdrawing the building permit (Article 2.12 sub b. BES Housing, Spatial Planning and Environmental Management Act): if construction work has not started within one year after the permit's issuance, the permit may be revoked. A crystal-clear article without ifs and buts!

A good reason to revoke unused permits and to clean the closet. It also could be an action that shows BC really cares about nature and not "just issues texts for folders".

This month, the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) announced that for the first time, more than 40,000 plants and animals are threatened with extinction, including 1,000 species of dragonflies and damselflies. The destruction of the wetlands is the main cause of the decline of these species. The IUCN reiterates the need to protect the wetlands and the diversity they harbor as they increasingly give way to urbanization and agriculture.

An example in this context. Would a building permit (issued in 2018, unused for more than a year) for the construction of a house on a plot largely located in the RAMSAR area still be issued today? No!

The next twenty or thirty years are crucial, as far as biodiversity is concerned only ten years are left... How to act, maybe we are too late, maybe it will fail but at least we must have made the effort. Withdraw those unused 'speculative' permits! Don't let it be just vague words. Remove the skeletons now!

Updated travel entry requirements

In reference to the recently updated travel entry requirements released by the government I have a few

All travelers from high-risk and very high-risk countries will be required to undergo a PCR test on the fifth day after arrival at their own expense at a commercial testing center and not at the Public Health Department. Unvaccinated travelers are obligated to self-quarantine for five days. Subsequently, they must undergo a PCR test at their own expense at a commercial testing center and not at the Public Health Department. Travelers may only leave quarantine once they have a negative test result.

While I understand the need for this, I think this is getting a little crazy. The only reason we are willing to go through this is due to the fact that we stay for 2 months. Do they really think dive travelers are going to do this for a 7-10 day stay?

It really gets expensive. For example: Due to the 48 hour (not 72) hour) requirement they instituted, my wife and I must go to a rapid PCR test center and pay \$190 each. Upon arrival it's another \$125 each for the 5 day PCR...then another \$35 each when we leave to go home. That's \$700 for the two of us before travel costs which have also skyrocketed. Some American airfares approach \$1000 RT.

If the policies were implemented for ALL traveler's fine and good, but there is a major glaring hole in all of this. THOUSANDS of cruise ship passengers coming weekly that are NOT subject to these same rules. Even ships with fully vaccinated people are having major Covid outbreaks! By allowing all of these transient visitors they are going to start a major outbreak. It will not due to people like us. Dive visitors are the ones who pump thousands of dollars into the local economy, not the cruise ship visitors who spend practically nothing. Are they going to require all cruisers to take another PCR test 24 hours prior to arrival? Bonaire better get its priorities straight or they will kill the golden goose that supports most of the island. Brad Louth

CRUISE SHIP RATING

Britannia of the P&O Cruise line was in Bonaire's port on Dec. 15 along with Friends of the Earth environmental "F" rated Aida Sol. The Britannia was not listed on the normal schedule. P&O ships have the lowest ratings in each category by Friends of the Earth for sewage treatment, air pollution reduction, water compliance and criminal violations. They did receive an "A" for transparency but an "F" overall. The Britannia had 1,248 passengers on board with a capacity for 3,647.

POLICE REPORT

Property crime

Dec. 19. Between 3:10 and 3:15 pm, thieves smashed the right rear window of a car parked at the 1000 steps dive site taking a backpack containing, among other things, four passports, an E-reader, a black wallet and some medicines.

Dec. 17. In the early afternoon, lady sitting on the beach at the Bulevar Gobernador Nicolaas Debrot was robbed. She was surprised by an unknown man who pushed her off her chair and then ran off with some items including: two backpacks, clothes, two wallets with different cards and cash, a Lorus watch, some keys and a camera bag containing a black Panasonic Lumix camera, Sandisk SD cards and an extra camera battery.

Dec. 14. Between 11:30 am and 12:15 pm, thieves took a black iPhone 12 plus, an iPhone 10 plus and cash from an unlocked car at the dive site 'Weber's Joy' while the owners were diving.

Dec. 10. Thieves gained access to a house on Kaya C.E.B. Hellmund through the bathroom window between 6:15 pm and 10:15 pm. They took, among other things, a gray Apple Macbook, a black Acer laptop, a gray HP laptop with charger, black Zeiss binoculars and cash.

Dec. 10. In the afternoon victims were surprised at Alta Mira in Rincon by a man armed with a knife, who asked them to surrender their goods. The suspect took a backpack containing two telephones and a wallet.

Dec. 6. Between 7:30 and 10:45 pm, thieves gained access to a tourist accommodation in Punt Vierkant through a window. Among other things, a television, a PlayStation, clothing, a safe and various valuables were taken. The perpetrators also took a white Nissan pick-up, model Frontier, with registration number V-5181

Arrested/held in custody.

Dec. 19. A man, 59, was arrested for assault at a tourist accommodation in Point Vierkant. Staff confronted him for harassing others at the bar. He then assaulted the security guard who was called in.

He then took a Hummer car but was stopped on Kaya Linda. The harpoon was seized for further investigation. The victim was taken to hospital by ambulance for medical treatment

Traffic accidents/violations

Dec. 13. In the morning hours, the police station received a report about a woman who had been hit by a truck in Sabadeco. The driver of the pickup said he probably fell asleep briefly behind the wheel, causing him to hit the woman who was running. The woman was treated at the scene by paramedics.

Dec. 12/13? In the evening around 9:35 pm, the driver of a moped flew out of the bend on Kaminda Sorobon and ended up in the mondi. He was taken to hospital by ambulance.

Dec. 12. At about 8 pm a pickup truck approaching from Julio A. Abraham Bulevar took a large bend at the T-junction connecting the two roads to enter the Kaya Internashonal. The driver of a scooter swerved but fell when he was hit by the pickup. The pickup drove away. The scooter driver was taken to hospital by ambulance for a check-up.

Dec. 11. At about 10:50 pm a moving bus hit something sta-

tionary on Kaminda La Union. The bus driver was taken to hospital by ambulance.

Dec. 11. In the night hours police stopped the driver of a quad. He was found to be under the influence of alcohol and was arrested. A breath analysis was performed at the police station. Following the result of the breath analysis, he was banned from driving for 11 hours and his driver's license was revoked.

Dec. 7. Around 5:35 pm at E.E.G. Bulevar a driver fell from his scooter. The driver was taken to hospital by ambulance.

Traffic controls

Dec 8-10. Traffic checks were carried out at various locations and several vehicles were seized.

During a check on Kaminda Turistiko, a driver received a police report for driving without a driver's license and insurance. The car was seized until valid documents could be presented

At another location, a moped was seized because it was not insured. The driver was charged for failing to comply with a police demand and for driving without a driver's license and insurance.

A scooter was seized when the driver who had been questioned several times could not show a driver's license and insurance. Upon closer inspection the chassis number turned out to be incorrect for the insurance certificate.

The driver of a car was given a police report for driving without a valid driver's license and without a license plate. A small amount of hemp was also found and seized.

In addition, official reports were issued for driving without valid number plates, without a helmet and without a seat belt.

Fire

Dec. 14. At around 12:30 pm the police station received a report about a fire in the vicinity of Jato Bako. The fire brigade extinguished a fire in several car wrecks. Residents were asked to close windows and doors because of the smoke. No one was injured.

Dec. 6. In the late afternoon, the police received a report about smoke in the vicinity of Kaya Grandi. A resident burning garbage was asked to extinguish the fire and received a warning.

Dec. 6. At around 3:40 pm the police received a report of a fire in a mondi near Kaya Pueblo. The fire brigade extinguished the grass fire.

Public service

Dec. 19. During nighttime surveillance, a patrol came across a catering facility still serving alcoholic beverages to customers at 1:15 a.m. The employee received an official report for violating COVID-19 measures.

Dec. 14. The pathologist has concluded a natural death after an autopsy on the body of Benjamina Neuman. She had been missing for 11 days when she was found dead near Bolivia. The pathologist has determined a natural death. The woman probably died of dehydration due to disorientation. There are no indications of violence.

Dec. 15. An 86-year-old man who had been attacked and bitten by stray dogs in Lagun Hill was taken to hospital by ambulance for medical treatment. The owner of the dogs said he would approach the vet to have the dogs put to sleep.

Dec. 10-12. Several reports of aggressive dogs and stray dogs that cause nuisance to local residents came in last weekend. Police talked to the dogs' owners. In one case, an aggressive dog was seized by animal control for attacking people.

Rates for electricity and drinking water change

The maximum rates for the production and distribution of electricity and drinking water on Bonaire, Saba, and St. Eustatius will change effective January 1, 2022.

For Bonaire, the maximum usage rate for electricity increases from approximately 0.29 USD/kWh to approximately USD 0.33/ kWh. The maximum limit for the pagabon rate (prepaid) increases from approximately USD 0.50/ kWh to approximately USD 0.53/ kWh. An average household can expect an increase of approxi-

mately USD 8.00 per month on the electricity bill.

The maximum rate for the consumption of drinking water decreases from approximately USD 3.81/ m3 to approximately USD 3.74/ m3. For an average household, this means a drop of approximately USD 0.75 per month on the bill.

The price has increased mainly because the price of oil needed to produce electricity has risen sharply.

Curaçao promises gambling crackdown

According to a written question submitted by the parliamentary opposition, approximately 12,000 thousand illegal gambling websites are located in Curaçao, and 40% of the worldwide unregulated gambling traffic goes through Curaçao. In responding, Minister Dekker (Legal Protection) and State Secretary Knops (BZK) announced that this month the Curaçao government will adopt a plan to tackle the gambling mafia.

Knops and Dekker explained the problem. "Curaçao has its own gambling laws and regulations. The licensing, supervision and enforcement of the offer of offshore games of chance have therefore come within the autonomy of the country of Curaçao since 10-10-10. Based on local laws and regulations, a small number of master licenses were issued by the authorities of Curaçao that allowed the economic exploitation of the license to be transferred to other parties without the intervention of a government body. This has resulted in a large number of sub-licences, which explains the offer of online games of chance from Curaçao."

Because the online casinos are allowed to operate under legislation governing economic zones, their income is exempt from taxation on Curaçao. Curaçao and the Netherlands agreed in the Curaçao national package that online gambling would be reformed. That action apparently is now being taken. *DMR (Dossier Koninkrijksrelaties)*

Netherlands makes indirect investment in sustainable energy

The Ministry for Economic Affairs and Climate (EZK) has released 10 million euros to expedite the transition to sustainable energy on Bonaire. Some people are puzzled, however. Why is the money going to Bonaire Fuel Terminals (BBT) instead of Water and Energy Company Bonaire (WEB)?

WEB's goal is to raise electricity production from 25% sustainable to at least 80% sustainable and eventually cut costs in half. BBT, on the other hand, was founded in April and tasked with the immediate goal of constructing a fuel terminal near the airport to help ensure the safety and reliability of the island's existing fuel infrastructure.

Dossier Koninkrijks Relaties reports that the motion directing the 10 million euros to BBT contained a provision to extend BBT's mandate to include stimulating sustainable power production on the island, perhaps to appease members of the House of Representatives who are critical of investing in fossil fuels.

According to Marcelino de Lannoy, recently appointed Project Director at BBT, "Our ambition is to initially but progressively reach between 70 to 80% of sustainable energy production. At the same time, we recognize that fossil fuels will still be required on the long run, for air traffic and traffic on land." Apparently WEB and BBT will both be working to achieve the same goal, but separately and each at its own pace.

The 10 million Euros will contribute indirectly to the island's energy needs. EZK is using it to buy additional shares in the state-owned BBT. The money will increase the value of the company and thereby enable it to attract additional capital for whatever projects it undertakes. DMR (Dossier Koninkrijks Relaties)

Ask Kate & Jean Bonaire real estate advice

Thank you for your questions this past year.

Often we receive the same question a number of times, so in this last column of 2021, we are answering the three most frequently asked questions we received this year.



1. Are there any special restrictions for foreign buyers buying in Bonaire? No, anyone may buy a home on Bonaire. However, there are rules about how long a non-resident can stay on the island each year. Depending on what country your passport is issued in, this can range from 3 months to 6 months. If you are interested in a longer stay, you can explore becoming a legal resident of Bonaire.

2. What are the costs to purchase a property? Plan on an additional 7 to 8% of the purchase price for costs to transfer the deed. This includes the 5% transfer tax payable to the government that all buyers (both resident and non-resident) pay, and 2 to 2.5% in buyer closing costs, depending on whether you are paying cash or mortgaging with a Bonaire bank. Items such as taxes, long leases

and HOA/VVE costs (if applicable) are pro-rated at the time of closing.

3. Can I buy a property if I am not on the island? Yes. You can sign a limited power of attorney for the Notaris to transfer the deed on your behalf if you are not on the island at the time of closing.

Water Circles meets with yachting community

The Bonaire Water Circles project, a collaboration between several stakeholder organizations that protect Bonaire's marine environment, organized a Zoom meeting with Bonaire's yachting community on Dec. 16. The purpose was to discuss decisions made so far, and the decisions still pending, in addressing a critical problem on Bonaire. An estimated 95% of the boats surveyed having been provided no other alternative - have been emptying their sewage holding tanks in Bonaire's waters.

The solution to the problem is straightforward. Bonaire has to provide a system for sewage to be removed from the holding tanks of visiting boats, transported to the island's sewage treatment plant, and treated. The yachties have to cooperate by using the system and helping pay for the service. The ways and means issues are more complicated.

The Water Circles spokespersons proposed four key recommendations: Provide a mobile pump out boat that also provides services such as fresh water delivery, trash pickup and environmental products. Attach seals to the Y valves on yacht holding tanks and fine boats that break them. Refuse entry to boats without a holding tank. And help the island cover the costs of providing these services by increasing the daily mooring fee to \$45. The present fee, \$10, was set sixteen years ago and provides only a secure place to tie up.

More peripheral possibilities were also discussed during the Zoom meeting. Require boats to reserve moorings in advance, for instance, and limit the time they can stay. Deny mooring privileges to long time users, those with sedulas. Educate prospective visiting yachts in advance regarding the island's rules and regulations.

Regarding the key issue of pump out facilities, representatives of island organizations reported that a dock-side pump out station has been available to all boats at Harbour Village Marina since mid November. The meeting participants recommended any expansions to Bonaire's marinas must include sewage pump out facilities.

WEB addressed another major issue, the fact that the

island's sewage treatment place cannot process salt water, by proposing three options to the meeting: 1. Deliver the waste by truck to the small treatment plant; 2. Use a controlled discharge into the big treatment plant to keep the salt content within acceptable limits; 3. construct a desalination plant that was dedicated to processing sewage with a high salt content. Water Circles agreed to the second choice.

The meeting set a timeline for achieving the proposed recommendations:

January 1 - All new visiting yachts be granted overnight mooring privileges for a maximum of three months.

March 31 - An online mooring reservation system will be in operation. Boats with holding tanks are no longer be allowed to empty within 12 miles from shore. Their Y valves will be sealed, or dye tablets will be put in tanks without Y valve.

July 1 - STINAPA wants to begin charging a \$45 overnight mooring per night. Owners of private moorings will be charged \$1,000 per year); Resident sedula holders will no longer be able to use the 51 overnight moorings. They will be reserved for visiting yachts.

Water Circles will organize information sessions between these deadlines.

Water Circles also said they hope to add additional amenities like a dingy dock so the cruisers can spend money on shore, laundry facilities and showers.

During the freewheeling meeting, many questions were asked, answers given, and opinions expressed. Considerable traffic showed up on Facebook following the meeting. Many of the yachties reported they felt that their voices were not being heard, that the meeting was designed to manipulate the discussion, and that they were not being treated fairly.

A cruiser who spoke with *The Reporter* contacted a few places he had moored in to check his memory of mooring fees

- St. John, USVI is \$13/n (Senior rate) in the National Park Bays.
- Druif Bay, USVI is free.
- Dakity in Culebra, PR is free.
- Norman Island, The Bight, BVI is \$25/n.
- Jost van Dyke, BVI, \$30/n.

A mooring allows you to "park" your boat. A marina, in addition, provides amenities and security: water, electricity, trash bins, showers, toilets, laundry, etc. In Curaçao the Sera Boca Marina charges a monthly rental and utility fee that works out to about \$15.50 a night.

Know thyself

The many paths of self-knowledge and self-development

Each new year is always full of purposes and objectives. The beginning of 2022 can be a good time to deepen the path of self-knowledge.

At the end of the 20th century, another discipline emerged, which is life coaching, not belonging to the health area, but rather to the area of personal development and well-being. Coaching uses some tools common to psychotherapy derived from cognitive and positive psychology, such as education in emotional intelligence, Socratic dialogue and cognitive restructuring, among others. Coaching does not work with pathologies and basically aims to achieve objectives. Both psychotherapy and coaching are great contributors to self-knowledge.

It is not only through the help of a professional that we gain self-knowledge. Some people practice journaling, recording periodically their experiences and emotions. This is a beautiful path to gain self-knowledge and you can go as deep as you desire. There are multiple ways of journaling, from a simple blank notebook, to the ones that come with inspirational thoughts or awareness creating questions. Some journals come with tips to learn how to observe yourself and your reactions. You can also combine other methods with journaling.

The practice of meditation or mindfulness develops

the internal observer, allowing a deeper knowledge of our own nature. The combination of meditation and journaling creates a synergistic path to self-knowledge, magnifying the results.


Yoga also offers a magnificent opportunity for self-knowledge and self-exploration combining the observations of respiration, bodily sensations, emotions, and thoughts. During postures, while being aware of your breath, you also experience a full array of emotions like tiredness, sense of achievement, boredom, rebellion, surrender and more. Chogogo Resort opens

Chogogo Resort opened on the former site of the Sunset Beach Hotel on December 1, as scheduled. About 100 guests are registered in the south part of the resort that has been completed, with another 100 or so expected by Christmas. When finished, Chogogo will have some 200 rooms and five luxury villas.

Although the landscapers are still at work, all the primary facilities and services are in operation. Presently the resort has 35 employees and expects to have 120-130 soon. The owners report that applicants are coming to the gate looking for jobs, despite reports that workers are hard to find on the island. They say they have a good mix of employees: Dutch people, people from Bonaire and Curação, and resident Latin Americans.

The new resort cost nearly \$40 million to build. It is owned by Hans and Gertrude Schellevis, who operate a resort of the same name on Curação. Their two adult sons will manage the resort here.

Banks test deposit guarantee

On December 17 several customers entered their bank with required documents in hand and asked that the money they had on deposit be paid back to them. The bank supposedly had failed. Fortunately the people were just pretending. They were helping the Dutch Central Bank (DNB) rehearse the claim procedure for its Deposit Guarantee Scheme.

Customer deposits in banks in the Caribbean Netherlands that are affiliated with the DNB are insured up to USD 10,000.00 per person, per bank, should anything happen to their bank. The DNB used the rehearsal to ensure that this process runs smoothly should one day a bank actually "collapse." *DMR*

Marechaussee conducts fire test at airport

The Royal Netherlands Marechaussee (KMar) tested the new kerosene storage installation at Bonaire International Airport on December 10. Both water and foam were tested and all tests were successful. *DMR (BESreporter)*

Entrepreneur class graduates

Twenty-two people received certificates on December 9 for completing the Chamber of Commerce Academy's 2021 entrepreneurship course. The course strengthens Bonaire's economy by teaching entrepreneurs additional skills that can make them more successful.

As a final assignment, a 'Shark Tank' (Tanki di Tribon) was introduced for the first time this year. Each participant had five minutes to demonstrate their business knowledge and skills by presenting their company to a five-member jury in a creative way.

Reksel Engelhart, who pitched his 'Best in Burgers,' was declared the winner. He was awarded \$1,000 by Maduro & Curiels Bank, \$750 in fitness training from the Bon Bida Health Center, and three months of business internet from Telbo. Flora Wijnand of Smart Choices Bonaire promised Englehart coaching sessions, and Rignald Wout of and Ohana Consultancy promised to help him write a business plan.

The Public Entity Bonaire and the Chamber of Commerce intend to offer the course again during 2022. The Ministry of Economic Affairs & Climate subsidized the development of the curriculum. *DMR (Bonaire.nu)*

Governments organize to help young people succeed

The Public Entities in the Caribbean Netherlands and five departments of the Central Government have signed a cooperation agreement to work together in supporting

the development of adolescents and young adults of the three Caribbean islands. The targeted group is young people between the ages of 13 and 23 in the Caribbean Netherlands. The parties to the agreement will focus on housing for teenagers and young adults, leisure and development activities, poverty alleviation, youth participation, domestic violence, child abuse, education and employment.

In addition to the Public Entities of Bonaire, Saba and St. Eustatius, the cooperation agreement was signed by the Ministries of Social Affairs and Employment; Interior and Kingdom Relations; Education, Culture and Science; Justice and Security; and Health, Welfare and Sport.

Agencies are also organizing to address problems revealed by "Head worries of Caribbean students," a report prepared by national ombudsman Reinier van Zutphen. Van Zutphen met with almost 40 representatives of educational and government institutions, students and counselors to explore the many practical bottlenecks Caribbean students still encounter when studying in the European Netherlands. Special attention was given to the MBO students, who often come to the Netherlands unaccompanied, are not organized and are younger than HBO and WO students.

In the report, the ombudsman noted that Caribbean students can get stuck during their studies in the Netherlands for various reasons. As a result, they incur study delay or even drop out prematurely. The ombudsman called on the government and in particular the Minister of Education, Culture and Science, the State Secretary for the Interior and Kingdom Relations in the Netherlands and their colleagues on the islands to do everything they can to make studying in the Netherlands as easy as possible for these students. *DMR (Dossier Koninkrijksrelaties)*

the fifth wave that is coming at us with the Omicron variant," Reuters reported. Failure to act now would likely lead to "an unmanageable situation in hospitals."

Bonaire has declared new entry restrictions in response to the rapid spread of the highly infections Omicron variant in other countries. All travelers aged 12 years and older from the Netherlands and the US must take a PCR test within forty-eight hours before departure to Bonaire. They must also take a self-test on arrival at their holiday accommodation and a PCR test at their own expense on the fifth day after arrival.

Travelers who self-test positive on arrival at their holiday accommodation must remain in isolation and make an appointment with the Public Health Department for a retest.

Bonaire now treats passengers from high-risk countries and from very high-risk countries the same, the Netherlands and the US included.

The travel bubble for travelers from the CAS islands and Bonaire will end Thursday, December 23, 2021. Aruba, Curaçao and St. Maarten will be high risk islands. All travelers must do a PCR test 48 hours before departure to Bonaire. They must also complete the health declaration from the Public Health Department online 12 to 24 hours before departure. On arrival, all travelers from the CAS islands are required to take a free self-test, on the fifth day after arrival they must take a PCR test at their own expense at a commercial testing company.

Travelers who are not fully vaccinated are also required to quarantine at their place of residence for five days upon arrival.

On Bonaire positive tests decreased significantly the week of December 2-8, from 742 per 100,000 inhabitants to 483. The incidence increased slightly on Curação and remained about the same on Aruba and Sint Maarten. No new infections were reported on Saba or Sint Eustatius.

The Omicron variant has not shown up on Bonaire yet, but it is spreading faster than expected and will inevitably arrive soon. It seems to spread two to three times faster than the Delta variant. The Health Department wants those still not fully vaccinated to get their corona jabs and booster jab now. When the Omicron variant arrives it will impose major burden on the hospital and the rest of the healthcare sector on Bonaire.

People should get the third shot for added protection.

Those 18 and older can make an appointment for the booster jab by calling 0800 0900. People can get the booster shot six months after their second vaccination. Those who need either their first or second vaccinations can also call 0800 0900.

COVID-19 vaccination continues to prove very effective, according to hospital records. Since July 11, 92% of the people who tested positive even though vaccinated did not require hospitalization, and 92% avoided ICU admission. Of the infected COVID patients presently in the hospital, 73% percent are not vaccinated. In the in-

tensive Care Unit, 83% have not been vaccinated. Vaccinated people who become infected average three days in the hospital, while the non-vaccinated average eight days. About 33% of the unvaccinated patients who are hospitalized for COVID stay longer than 14 days.

If you are fully vaccinated but have had close contact with an infected person, you must go into quarantine. There is a risk that you yourself have been infected with the coronavirus and could pass the virus on to others. Quarantine lasts 10 days. On the fifth day you may undergo a PCR test at the Public Health Department. If you test negative, you may leave quarantine.

Colombia is now admitting only fully vaccinated travelers.

Victims can still join the Long COVID research program. The Public Health Department is making follow-up contact to find out how many people on Bonaire still have complaints such as fatigue, shortness of breath and problems concentrating long after being treated for the infection. From November 15 to December 3, more than 500 citizens on Bonaire were questioned about the complaints they had, and interviews will continue until December 31. People who want to participate in the study can register by calling 0800 0800. The interviewers want to talk with people who have no complaints as well as those who have symptoms. All information regarding individual patients is kept private.

Happy New Year!

Here it is, the end of 2021. Our terrestrial world has changed quite a bit in the last year or two, but isn't it wonderful that underwater the issue of COVID-19 isn't an issue at all? No COVID-19 changes underwater; each dive takes us right back to BC (Before Covid) times. Hooray!

It's fun to look at the bright side for a change.

Another thing I am oh so grateful for is that, for us here on Bonaire, the disruption of diving was minimal. I know that's not true for our dive operators, and I'm especially grateful to them for continuing to provide the services that we needed to keep on diving. I know that at least one Caribbean island, probably more than one, shut down all its dive operations as part of its COVID protocols. I don't think they had shore diving, though.

Our shore diving made a huge difference. Everyone could dive regardless of boats. No wonder people on Bonaire were calmer than at so many other places!

Once the mask is on and the face is underwater, there's no COVID.

On any dive or snorkel here nowadays, we're likely to see a marine turtle or two.

This was not true when I first came to Bonaire in 1980; we saw fewer turtles then. (When I began working on San Salvador a few years earlier, sea turtle had just been taken off the Wednesday's lunch menu – not because turtles were endangered, but because the providers couldn't find any turtles.) The world of unprotected turtles is shrinking, thanks in part to the great work being done here by STCB.

In the 1980's, fish traps were common and (I think) legal on Bonaire's reefs. It's difficult for divers to see fish in traps, and visiting divers destroyed many fish traps. The reactions of our fishermen contrasted strongly from those on a nearby island. Bonaire's fishermen reacted by placing their traps away from dive sites. Our neighbor island's fishermen threatened to sink the dive boats. Doncha love Bonaire?

Yesterday, on a shore dive, I saw a magnificent green moray who wasn't much smaller than Klein Bonaire. Since I had just added a little lionfish to my keeper, and the moray was about six feet (2m) away from me when I first saw it, and greens have a growing reputation for getting assertive around lionfishers, I didn't stick around to examine the moray. My feeling is that morays, and any of our other critters, are welcome to all the lionfish they find, as long as they don't mug a diver to get them.

You know that lionfish, natives of the tropical Pacific, have invaded the entire Caribbean, right? On Bonaire, volunteer residents must take a course about lionfish and how to remove them before receiving a Bonaire National Marine Park permit to hunt lionfish. Visitors may take

a course and go after lionfish only when accompanied by a Bonaire lionfishing instructor.

Unfortunately, Caribbean undersea predators who would like to eat lionfish don't have any instincts (or training) telling them how to catch lionfish. Clearly, what is needed is an underwater predator education program for morays. Just a simple sign would do it, one circle showing an eel eating a lionfish headfirst, the other circle – crossed with a slash – showing an eel eating a lionfish tail first. Divers could carry the sign and hold it for morays to read. Now Bonaire is not only the first to teach divers to remove lionfish; we will also be the first to teach morays to remove lionfish!

Although that would be an amazing start for 2022, so is what we have now: our protected marine environment, our dedicated residents who work on keeping our island and its reefs and mangroves healthy and clean, and at least one green moray who's almost as big as Klein Bonaire. Doncha just love Bonaire?



Nature must be the point of departure in decision-making and in the creation of strategic plans.

DCNA's board renewed its commit-

Global warming was also an important issue discussed at the conference. Director of DCNA, Tadzio Bervoets, said another goal of organization is to help the islands increase their resiliency against the myriad external shocks that are heading our way due to global warming. *DMR*



Pienter in Taal stops after four successful years.

Thursday, December 16, the fourth year of Pienter in Taal (Smart in Language) concluded. Over the past four years, more than 500 students from various primary schools have been given the opportunity to prepare well for secondary education by improving their command of the Dutch language. The Dutch government funded the program.

More than 120 students have followed the program this year. They started in January at primary schools in group 8. After the holidays they continued at VMBO and Liseo. In total, they took more than 100 hours of extra Dutch language lessons after school.

In the last two years, due to the cancellation or online delivery of classes as a result of corona, the level of Dutch has fallen sharply again. Many students speak and hear too little Dutch in their environment. Unfortunately, the scores of the students on the tests have dropped again.

It is unknown whether the schools will now offer additional language lessons.

But everybody wants to help and that is a great thing and highly appreciated.

They call me regularly to ask how I am doing and to make sure I am okay.

I joined the board of MiVaBo, because they reach out and work very hard for those with limitations. I feel proud being a part of that special group of people. Accessibility stays an important issue and we do what we can.

This morning I slipped in the bathroom and needed help desperately. I made a call and right away two neighbors came running, assisted me and called for more specific medical help. When I was finished in the E.R. I just had to call and they came and picked me up. Me and my poor wrist were very grateful.

So.... I learned I am not alone. There is a large group of people who take me and my well-being to heart and that is an awesome feeling. And I really hope that I am not the only lucky one.
