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## Manta Rays in Bonaire?

When divers and snorkelers head to the waters of Bonaire, they don't usually expect to see a manta ray. Mantas are generally associated with the islands of Micronesia, Hawaii, Indonesia or the Maldives in the Indian Ocean. But these beautiful, gentle giants are here and throughout the Caribbean

According to Nicole Pelletier of Manta Trust and founder of Caribbean Islands Manta Conservation Program (CIMCP), Bonaire is a bit of a hot spot with a huge population of divers and potential divers. Nicole landed in Bonaire in October 2021

to educate divers and build a Caribbean data base on mobulids, otherwise known as manta and devil rays.

"Bonaire will never be a place where I can take people out to see manta rays or where we can have a big manta ray tourism," said Nicole, "but by being here I can educate divers who will go other places in the world... and they will then know the information we are looking for and be able to interact [with mantas] in a sustainable way."

There is so much unknown as they have only been studied since 2005 when Manta Trust began in the Maldives. There is very little historical data available.

Nicole said, "We just don't have the information; there was a paper done in Venezuela in the 80's. There are so many mysteries. We don't know how far they travel, because there have never been studies done in the Caribbean. They are a challenging animal to study."

Research is important because the species numbers are declining. Mantas are threatened due to by-catch fishing, fishing line entanglement, gill nets and shark fishing nets.

Manta rays can't swim backwards and have to keep moving forward to move water through their gills. If they become trapped in fishing or mooring lines and try to get out of it by doing backward rolls, they become even more entangled and will most likely die.

Another major problem are gill rapers. People in Asia target the mantas for their

gill plates to use in their traditional med-

If mantas are taken out through fishing pressure, the population cannot be sustained.

Nicole said, "Mantas are long lived, 30-50 years, but only have one to two pups every two to five years. They are completely harmless, and very easy to kill; they are just big. If you take out members of a population then you've lost an entire generation. If somebody takes out a member around these islands then the population can't sustain."

Nicole has learned through her data collection since October, that the three most common species seen on Bonaire are: Mobula birostris (Oceanic), Mobula c.f. Birostris (Caribbean and Mobula tarapacana (devil rays). The animals range in size with the Oceanic having the largest wingspan of up to 22ft (6.7m), the Caribbean 16 ft. max (4.9m) and the devil ray with a max of 11ft (3.35m).

Total documented sightings of mobulids in the Caribbean is 932; Dutch Caribbean 380 and Bonaire 258. Numbers collected for this year in the ABC islands and Saba are 32 and 105 for the entire Caribbean.

Nicole said, "People come to [Bonaire] to look for the small stuff. I tell them to look in the blue every once in a while – look up. I can't imagine how many people have had a manta pass by and they don't even see it because their head is stuck in the coral. There is some great stuff there, don't get me wrong, but look into the blue

every once in a while."

If you have been lucky enough to see a manta then CIMCP needs to hear from you. You can even name the manta if it is the first sighting. Nicole is working with DCNA collecting data from citizen scientists, otherwise known as divers and snorkelers. Photos, videos, date, time and any other information is useful, the more the better.

"The big challenge is getting people to send it in. I wish I could go out and see a manta every day. But it's not about seeing a manta here, it is more about reaching out to people and helping to build databases around the world," said Nicole.

## TV documentary raises ethical questions about Bonaire Fuel Terminals

On February 17, Zembla, a Dutch investigative TV program, aired a documentary on government funding that is intended to help Bonaire secure its energy future. Zembla disclosed that the funding agency, the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Climate (EZK), has apparently been self-dealing. In December EZK granted 10 million euros to Bonaire Fuel Terminals (BBT), a recently formed business entity. EZK owns BBT, 100%.

The Bonaire Public Body wants EZK to support the Water and Energy Board (WEB). In 2021 WEB submitted a proposal to EZK requesting a subsidy for clean energy development, but EZK did not respond for two years.

Total independence from fossil fuels is still only a dream for the future, certainly. But WEB estimates that soon 80% of Bonaire's electricity could be generated by the sun and the wind, with a 40% to 50% reduction in people's power bills. Much progress could have been made toward that goal while WEB was waiting to hear from EZK.

Then last April the Rutte III government—to the total surprise of the OLB—formed BBT, announcing the company would assure Bonaire's fuel supply. In December EZK granted BBT 10 million euros. Some commentators suspect BBT was founded for the purpose of extending Bonaire's dependence on fossil fuel, an alternative supported by certain interests.

According to Zembla, the company's papers of incorporation make no mention of renewable energy. Dossier Koninkrijks Relaties points out that the parliamentary motion confirming the 10 million euro grant to BBT did extend the company's mandate to include stimulating sustainable energy production on the island. Dossier Koninkrijks Relaties suggests, however, that amendment was included only to appease members of the House of Representatives who oppose investing in fossil fuels.

When the 10 million euro grant was announced in December, Marcelino de Lannoy, Project Director at BBT, announced the company's intention was to reach between 70 to 80% sustainable energy—but gradually. He also said the 10 million Euros would contribute indirectly to the island's energy needs. EZK did not give BBT the cash; it invested the money in additional shares. The money was intended to increase the value of the company and thereby enable it to attract additional capital for projects it undertakes.

Whatever the Rutte III government's motives for founding BBT, two effects have been clear. BBT, rather that the OLB, is now the driver of energy developments on Bonaire. And WEB's

project has been stalled.

Zembla is well known for raising public awareness regarding issues that some politicians would prefer were kept quiet. The Zembla documentary, which was based on months of research, brought into focus two major questions regarding Bonaire's future. First, will the island continue to be powered primarily by polluting fossil fuels; or will the island continue to promote clean, renewable energy? Second, who is going to decide?

This is not entirely an either-or debate between conservation vs. pollution. Bonaire is absolutely dependent on hydrocarbons in the shorter term, and its petroleum fuel supply is vulnerable. Previously the Contour Global power plant burned fuel delivered by ship to Bopec. Now the island's electrical service depends on fuel trucked to the power plant from the fuel dock at the airport, as does the water distillation plant at WEB. That is a thin thread.

Therefore BBT seemed like a good idea initially. But public uneasiness grew as BBT began to float suggestions. BBT had two projects in mind. It would build a large fuel storage facility at the airport and construct a fuel pier for filling those tanks. BBT also intended to build a smaller storage facility at the Contour Global power plant near Karpata and build a fuel pier there, one that would extend into the marine reserve. That proposal was unpopular and short-lived.

The Zembla documentary focused on the island's opposition to the BBT pier that would damage the coral growing off the airport. Zembla quoted Edison Rijna declaring that there will be no pier as long as he is Lieutenant Governor. "The Executive Council is not against BBT per se," Rijna said. "We recognize the need to make a safe provision for the supply of fuel in the coming years, but with the caveat that the size of the provision must be ... adapted to the declining demand for fossil fuels." The Executive Council has urged Minister Rob Jetten (Climate and Energy) not to involve BBT in WEB's project.

Only hours before the Zembla broadcast, BBT issued a press release declaring it was making a strong commitment to helping create a more sustainable energy supply for Bonaire, and was making plans for working with WEB and Contour Global to achieve that goal. Deep in the press release BBT also announced it had decided it no longer needed a fuel pier at the airport. It would just construct additional fuel storage capacity there. *DMR* 

### Parliament cuts red tape for students

Caribbean students in the European Netherlands, including those from the BES islands, do not have a Citizen Service Number (BSN). Therefore they cannot open bank accounts or apply for the DigiD (digital idea number) needed to access government services. They even have difficulties registering at their educational institutions. (A BSN is the equivalent of a Social Security number in the U.S. or a Social Insurance Number in Canada.)

When this issue was raised in the House of Representatives, a very large majority approved a motion instructing that a BSN be allocated immediately and unconditionally to all Caribbean students in the European Netherlands. The legislation also stipulated that a bureaucratic mechanism be created as soon as possible to provide a BSN to all citizens in the BES islands. Parliament stipulated that the enabling legislation for both actions could be written and passed later. *DMR* (*Dossier Koninkrijks Relaties*)

### Park to provide public access to old Sunset Beach

As long promised, the Bonaire public will be assured access to the beach of the old Sunset Beach Resort, according to a press release. The government is going to build a public park on the narrow strip of vacant land remaining at the north end. In addition to beach access, the park will include a restaurant and three kiosks, a boat ramp, play equipment and waterworks for children, fitness equipment, and family barbecue facilities.

There will also be a place reserved for the conservation organizations, including Reef Renewal Bonaire, Stinapa, Sea Turtle

Conservation Bonaire, Echo, PiskaBon and the World Wildlife Fund, to build a future office building. The building will also be intended to have a public function, as yet undecided. Possible attractions include a wet lab that demonstrates how coral is cultivated, an aquarium, or a visitor center where workshops and exhibitions may be held. The feasibility of this part of the project is still being worked on." *DMR* 

### Covid-19 round-up

The Omicron danger seems to be passing. Epidemiologists say that by now most people have likely contracted the highly virulent variant, even those who showed no symptoms and never tested positive.

**Covid cases have dropped dramatically** since the previous issue of *The Reporter*. In the last 14 days, the number of active cases went from 147 to 20. Ten days ago one person was hospitalized. This week there are none.

Many restrictions have been eased, even though masks must still be worn indoors. Catering establishments and casinos can stay open until 2 am. Events are allowed with 100 people, and they may sing and dance if outside. Masses and services in churches are allowed, as is singing. People may again play sports inside and outside without restrictions. The advice that people work at home has been withdrawn. Infected people are allowed to leave quarantine after five full days without complaints. *DMR*

## Turkish style food that is fast and good

Looking for fast food that isn't the normal burger, pastechi or pizza? Then how about some Merguez, Kofke, Falafel, Kapsalon or Baklava topped off with an Ayran drink? These are just a few of the menu items available at the Turkish style Dutch concept cafes Fresh Market and Doner Station.

Fresh Market opened in Nov. 2014, despite the trepidation of owners, Stephanie Booi and husband Said el Kaich. Introducing Turkish food to Bonaire was a bit of a gamble. Stephanie's dad tried to sway the couple to do something more conventional by offering Bonairean type food such as cabrito and funchi.

Stephanie said, "But we convinced him to do the Doner type food from the Netherlands.'

Originally from Bonaire, Stephanie met Moroccan born marketing student, Said, while studying interior design in the Netherlands. They moved to Bonaire eight years ago and set to work in creating the restaurants though neither of them had a restaurant background.

Said returned to the Netherlands to educate himself for the new venture. He trained for a month with a Turkish man in a shawarma shop. Said learned how to make the shawarma (stacked cone shaped meat for rotisserie), sauces, pita and how it all comes together.

Traditionally the shawarma meat is either lamb, beef or chicken. To deliver great fast food, the couple went to work to find the best quality meats. Due to cost and availability,

they decided the shawarma meat for the Doner (turning kabob) should be chicken. In addition to the Doner, they found high quality meats for their Merguez (lamb sausage) and Kofke (beef meatballs).

"We bring in our own vegetables from Holland, because quality is the most important thing. Everything is from Holland. And we use Gouda cheese for the Turkish-Dutch concept," said Stephanie.

The falafel (ground chickpeas and spices) is freshly made.

Fresh Market was almost an immediate success with the locals. Building on that momentum, the couple decided to expand and opened Doner Station in Dec. 2017 in Hato.

Stephanie says the most popular item on the menu is Kapsalon (hair salon). It is a combination of layered French fries, doner meat covered with Gouda cheese and salad veggies. If you are wondering about that name, The story goes that a Rotterdam hairdresser in 2003 at a shawarma store would constantly order a combination of ingredients in one dish. His order combination caught on and the dish became known as Kapsalon.

Doner Station and Fresh Market employ 10 people including managers Mazen Akkari and Marjou van Putten who keep things running smoothly. No alcohol is served due to the owner's Muslim faith but there are plenty of other drinks including the Turkish Aryan. And if you still want that fast food pizza, you can order a Turkish Doner one.

Fresh Market is located in the green container across from Selibon and is open Mon-Friday 11am - 7p and Sat 11a.m - 4 pm. Doner Station in Hato, is in the shopping center near the roundabout. Hours are Mon - Sat 11am - 10 p and Sun 12 a.m - 8 pm for dine-in or take out.

Is it true that there are some condos that I can't live in full time or even for six months if I buy one? How much time can I stay there? Lyle

Hi Lyle,

There are two considerations, the zoning and the HOA/VVE (homeowners association.)

Some properties may be in an area zoned recreational, which is not intended for full time residency. Even if a property is not zoned this way, some HOAs have limits as to how many weeks per year owners may use their units, and how many weeks the unit must be available for rental. This can vary widely. Some homeowner associations permit a limited number of owner occupied weeks per



year, others allow a number of months, and still others have no owner usage restrictions. When you are looking at a property that is zoned recreational or has HOA owner usage requirements, review the information carefully to make sure that it fits with the amount of time you want to use your place.



### Plantation Bolivia a mirage

In the form of a press release, a new text by the Breemhaar family appeared to convince us of their good intentions in the development of Plantation Bolivia. Again it is a text developed by a communication agency with the name above it of a design agency. And again it is a changed vision. If we remember correctly, this is the sixth change of plans in the past two years. That promises something for the next 23 years, because that is the duration of the plans. And again, the current press release is teeming with ambiguities.

For example, there is talk of a significant proportion of affordable housing. Again, vagueness trumps because how much is significant and what is affordable?

Completely new is the announcement that clusters of estates will be added next to affordable housing. Estates are plots



with an area of at least 5 ha. So there are several of them. But again: how many clusters with how many homes?

When reading very carefully, a sneaky thing also stands out. The houses in those clusters of estates 'together only cover 3% of the area'. That's right! 3%

of 3,000 hectares is 90 hectares. 90 hectares is 900,000 m2. Suppose the houses on the estates are extremely large and are each 500 m2 in size. Then we come to 1,800 homes of 500 m2!! Or is there perhaps a mistake in the wording?

Once again it appears that the Breemharen and the design bureau are unfamiliar with the conditions on Bonaire when it comes to agricultural and horticultural development. That's not so strange either. Breemhaar has only known Bonaire for a few years and the design agency does business in China and Russia! We would now finally like to read from them how they want to develop the initiatives for agriculture and horticulture and what the residents have done wrong over the past 150 years.

An entirely new invention in the plan is that of the third development zone. Breemhaar wants to offer Rincon a future perspective with this. What does that future perspective look like and how will it be developed? Again, vagueness trumps. And probably an empty promise. Bonaire made a completely different choice in 2010 in the Spatial Development Plan (SMB): for building in and adding to existing residential areas. This

SMB plan shows that there is room for more than 4,000 homes without unnecessarily affecting nature. The development of Bolivia is therefore not necessary at all \*

It is naive to think that Breemhaar wants to develop Bolivia to do good. Doing good will not get you into the Quote 500 (the 500 richest people of Holland). What Breemhaar is really about is money. Dollars that will be earned with the destruction of nature on Bolivia. Former plans and this press release indicate that Bolivia will be parceled out by the owner and that third parties will develop the area. The profits that will be made in this way will end up in bank accounts of Dutch and Americans. They really don't stay on Bonaire.

The project development has been put in the hands of a firm called 'Metaphor' by Breemhaar. A metaphor is an image for something else. The plans as presented again are a metaphor for a mirage, a fata morgana.

For this project, we want to contribute to the future of the Bonairean society with our knowledge and attention," says Wouter Vos, landscape architect and Director of Internation Operations with KuiperCompagnons.

"Next to the opportunities we see for the recovery of this valuable area, our plan, with a considerable amount of affordable housing, also contributes to a better balance on the housing market. The plan increases the self-sufficiency of the island by integrating agriculture and horticulture, it creates jobs and it prevents further erosion of the soil and runoff into the sea, damaging reefs and corals."

#### Third district

The management of the development of the future Bolivia Estate is in the hands of Metafoor Ruimtelijke Ontwikkeling, an agency that is commissioned by many municipalities in the European Netherlands to assist in, among other things, process management and the development of urban areas

Metafoor-director Erik Berkelmans said, "Because of the rapid population

growth on the Island, the quality of the environment is under pressure. With this opportunity to develop Bolivia as a 'land-scape park', unguided sprawl of Kralendijk can be prevented. In and around Playa, the effects of these are already palpable in daily life, for example in traffic. If you want to relieve pressure on Kralendijk and give Rincon a perspective for the future, a third district is needed. All things considered, Bolivia is the sustainable solution to a resilient and sustainable Bonaire."

### Recovery of nature

The redevelopment of the former Plantation Bolivia is from a perspective of urban and landscape planning a formidable opportunity. The area has a grand cultural-historical and scenic value, in danger of going to waste. The development of the area into a landscape park leads, with an integral approach, to attention for recovery of nature, for living, and for working. Three clusters of estates will be situated within the landscape park, that will be built in different stages unto 2045, and that together will have a footprint of only three per cent of the entire Bolivia area. These clusters will have a high degree of self sufficiency.

Because the development will be integrated in the landscape, the area will keep its characteristics. Over 85% remains open landscape. To enhance the recovery of flora and fauna, the park will be managed centrally. Already in the first stage, park management will make sure that management and maintenance of this unique area is secured.

### Letter of intent

Last week, the Executive council of Bonaire and the board of Bonaire Properties both signed a letter of intent. A presentation of the plans to the Island Council will soon follow.

## A landscape park with 1500 homes?

On February 22, 2022, Bonaire Properties, ("Breemhaars") announced, by press release, that it had retained Kuipers Compagnons ("Kuiper) and Metafoor Ruimtelijke Ontwikkeling ("Metafoor"), two Dutch firms, to design, develop and manage the development of Plantation Bolivia.

As a general matter, I find it odd that the Breemhaars have taken this step when they do not yet have a permit to develop Plantation Bolivia. Are we to read between the lines that the Bonaire Government has already given the Breemhaars the "go ahead" to proceed with development and that a permit is only a matter of time? If the Breemhaar's don't have the government "go ahead", it seems that they are wasting money. But then, that's their business.

Back to the release. It touts the fact that each firm is highly regarded, known world-wide and has years of experience. However, there is no mention whether either firm knows anything about Bonaire or whether representatives from either firm have ever even been to Bonaire. This lack of information is troublesome

Unfortunately, the rest of the release strongly supports the assumption that neither firm has any knowledge of Plantation Bolivia's history and/or its present state nor has visited the site. The first sentence of the release begins: "For the sustainable redevelopment of the former Plantation Bolivia...". (Emphasis

added.) Plantation Bolivia has never been developed. There is absolutely no evidence to even suggest this. On what basis are the Breemhaars asserting that Bolivia has been developed in the past? Why do the Breemhaars want to perpetuate this absurd falsehood?

Specific remarks attributed to their consultants are even more frightful. Mr. Wouter Vos, a member of the Kuiper firm, is quoted as saying that his firm will have the opportunity to "recover" Bolivia. Does Mr. Vos understand that a pristine natural area that has not be touched in over a hundred years, doesn't require "recovery."

Remarks attributed to Mr. Erik Berkelsmans, a Metafoor director, are no better. Mr. Berelmans is quoted as saying that his firm "will have the opportunity to develop Bolivia as a "landscape park." Does Mr. Berelsmans know that a "landscape park", by definition, does not have 1500 homes? Does he know that the Breemhaars are planning to build 1500 homes in Plantation Bolivia? What have the Breemhaars actually told his firm about their plans for Bolivia?

I always thought that the purpose of a press release was to share accurate information with the press and the public. If this is true, then the February 22, 2022 press release has failed miserably. Further, if the February 2, 2022 press release is any indication of the effort that the Breemhaars and the two firms intend to put into the design, development and management of Plantation Bolivia, Bonaire is in big trouble.

### Bonaire's sea turtle is in Mexico!

A sea turtle that Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire (STCB) tagged in Lac Bay in 2013 laid three nests in Mexico in 2021. As part of STCB's capture-mark-recapture program, approximately 200-300 turtles per year are tagged. Smaller turtles receive a PIT tag, a tracking tag that does not require power. Instead, it has an internal microchip that is activated when it passes close to a special antenna connected to a computer that records the identity of the tag and the time. Larger turtles are tagged with either one or two metal tags. These tags contain unique number combinations, so that when a turtle is recaptured or spotted, we can retrieve capture data from this specific turtle, including where and when it was tagged, its size and weight.

Flora, Fauna y Cultura de México, A.C., an organization that carries out night monitoring patrols as part of a program called 'Programa de Conservacion de Tortugas Marinas Riviera Maya-Tulum', spotted a green turtle on the night of July 9th, 2021. This turtle had a metal tag on its right front flipper and when they checked the number, they realized it was a turtle from Bonaire. The turtle had been tagged in Lac Bay in April 2013. At the time, she weighed 79kg and her carapace measured 79.5cm. In July and August 2021, she nested three times at Xcacel Beach, Mexico. How awesome!!

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## What is the truth about building permits?

The Bonaire Reporter has been trying to understand Bonaire's laws controlling building and construction permits. The idea that a permit 30 years or even 10 years old is still viable is in question. We found that according to Island Regulations, the government can revoke permits issued before 2010 and all the way back to 1961.

In our May 19 – June 2, 2021 edition we addressed the issue of Chogogo and the old Sunset Beach property in the context of the new spatial development plan and permits. Roland Bruijnesteijn, Policy Advisor for Spatial Planning (Beleidsadviseur Ruimtelijke Ordening) told us then that they were considering putting a time limit on the start of construction once a permit is granted. But that time restriction could affect the plot owner's right and land price. Therefore, it could only apply to future permits.

In our Dec 8 – Dec 22 edition, correspondents questioned a building permit issued for land that was entirely within the Sorobon Ramsar site. Could an old permit that had allowed a structure to be built in 2007 in the same plotted area of agriculture/ kunuku zoned land be used as a precedent for a new permit for building?

Our Jan 19 – Feb 2 edition reported on the new pier approval for Karel's Beach Bar which was based on an old 1989 permit that was believed could never expire.

When *The Reporter* researched these stories, we understood spokespeople for



the Bonaire government to say that building on old permits is allowed with some outlined considerations and that 'old permits are still good.'

Bruijnesteijn has helped us clarify the legalities as have Wilma Nijland and Ann Joseph through their letters to the editor and opinion pieces.

Wilma supplied us with the following information from the Public Housing, Spatial Planning and Environmental Management Act BES which is valid from July 2021 to now. But, this law is actually an act from Dec 2011.

#### Article 2.12

- 1....., the Executive Council MAY RE-VOKE the building permit in whole or in part:
- a. if it appears that the Executive Council has granted the permit on the basis of an incorrect or incomplete statement;
- b. if the construction work has not started within one year after the permit has become irrevocable;
- c. if the construction work has been stopped for more than six months after it has started;

d. if the building is not completed within three years after the permit has become irrevocable;

e. at the request of the licensee.

After checking with the legal department of Bonaire Spatial Planning and Development, Roland said it was possible to revoke permits before 2010 under Island Regulations from 1961.

#### Article 29.

- 1. The Executive Council is authorized to revoke a building permit granted by reasoned decision, if:
- a. within one year of the day on which the building permit was granted, the work has not yet started or if the work has been suspended for a year;
- b. when performing the work to which the building permit relates, the regulations laid down by or pursuant to this regulation are deviated from.
- 2. A decision to withdraw will not be taken until the interested party if his domicile or residence is known has been heard or at least duly summoned.
- 3. If the term for a decision to withdraw

a building permit has expired, a new building permit must be applied for if the interested party still wishes to carry out or continue the proposed work. In such a case, the documents and drawings belonging to the withdrawn building permit will be used again.

After digging a bit deeper we discovered that nowhere on a stamped building permit does it give a date for completion. There is nothing that says you have one year to begin construction. It does state you must notify the office when construction begins or ends. The only date on the document is the date of issuance of the permit.

Bruijnstein said, "It appears we seldom if ever use this power... it may be because it is considered a somewhat heavy-handed approach to take back a permit once it has been granted... A building permit that was granted was sometimes more a form of 'estate planning' in the literal sense of the word, than any proof of intent to build soon. It used to be so quiet on the island that it did not really matter if a particular permit was used or not. And I do not know how well permits, once granted were monitored during the course of time

A purple pipe-dream...

Following Anthony's diagnosis and a few weeks in the hospital with all the help he needed lying down, it was decided he needed to become more active.

He was not a large, heavy man, but when you had to lift him or turn him, he was very heavy. It was hard on the nurses. It was also time to see if he was a patient who could revalidate properly.

That is when she came into our lives, "Sara", a wonderful purple colored lifting device. Sara was created to lift ailing patients and to make the job of all nurses and aides a little lighter. When Sara was used, all backpain and arthrosis seemed

to disappear.

Sara came with a vest the patients would wear. On the "vest" were hooks attached and some openings in strategic places. One nurse or aid could put the vest on a patient easily and close it safely. Then Sara was rolled in and her arms were attached to the hooks and openings of the vest. With a remote control the patient was lifted out of the bed and seated in a wheelchair in a jiffy.

After a week of working with Sara, Anthony could even help a bit with one hand to get up once he had the vest on. So Anthony always did his very best to get out of bed and into his wheelchair. I also fell in love with Sara and exclaimed that once Anthony came home from the hospital, I would apply for a Sara.

But he did not go home. While in the hospital his revalidation specialist had talks with me and the therapists. They decided although Anthony was very handicapped, he would be revalidated. Within eight weeks we were sent to Revalidatie Friesland in Beetsterzwaag in an ambulance. This center was famous for their therapy, therapists, specialists and results.

The first thing Anthony had to do was to learn how to get out of bed, with and without help. He felt very helpless and even begged for his favorite purple lifting device. But, NO, no Sara here! He was here to learn everything again and Sara did not fit into that program. Very disappointed, but also very driven to get out of that bed by himself, Anthony worked

very, very hard. And within a few months he was able to get up to a sitting position in his bed, grab the "parrot" with the one hand that functioned, push his lame leg out of bed with his good leg and sit at the edge of the bed. His cane was waiting for him on that side and once Anthony had the cane in his hand, he could stand, turn a bit and sit in his wheelchair. He was so very proud!

But sometimes when we were alone and I had to help, he whispered: "Sara."

# Creating optimal health by Irene da Cunda Costa Mindful eating

Eating allows us to stay alive by renewing our tissues with the new materials that enter our body. For humans food has also acquired symbolic meaning. Today eating is a source of pleasure, an excuse to get together with friends, a marker of status or a reward. I am not going to write today about what we eat, but the way we do it.

For all the above, it is important to know how to generate a state of awareness when we eat. What does this mean? Should we chew 50 times each bite? Or should we be absolutely silent savoring every particle of food that enters our system? Or should we eat all the time while practicing mindfulness? But that doesn't

seem to be practical, possible nor necessary.

Mindful eating involves first being aware of how lucky we are to have a plate of food on the table. Many people, regardless of their creed, practice gratitude before starting to eat, either with a shared statement or with a private and personal thought.

Being mindful when eating also aims to recover the original purpose for eating, as a mechanism of survival and replenishment of nutrients for the body. In this sense we should be able to ask ourselves if we are going to eat because we need to or if we are responding to one of the other symbolic meanings that food has.

It does not mean that the other motivations are necessarily good or bad, but it is important to be aware of them. This is even more important for people struggling with being overweight. Generating awareness of the existence or absence of appetite will help to reduce the intake.

Eating is also a source of sensory pleasure. When that dish delights and satisfies the vision, the taste and the smell, it is providing a good opportunity to fully apply the practice of sensorial mindfulness. Eating can also be a way of rewarding oneself. When eating involves sharing with family and friends, it is a good practice from time to time to dedicate a couple of seconds to focus on what we put in our mouth.

For all the symbolic values that food has, there are also pathologies associated with it. Some people use either overeating or depriving themselves of food as self-punishment. Some people binge but then feel guilty and engage in purging behaviors.

Digestion is an autonomic function and is better performed when a state of relaxation predominates, which activates the sympathetic nervous system. For this reason, it is very important to avoid eating in a hurry, stressed or during an argument or fight. If we have had an altercation with someone, it is good to pause and recover our axis before eating.

In summary, being mindful when eating is practicing gratitude, being aware of our appetite, savoring and enjoying the food we eat with all our senses and promoting a state of relaxation to favor the good reception for nutrients in our body.

## Parrots and People!

At Echo, one of our primary goals is to educate Bonaireans about local ecology, biodiversity and the importance of conservation. Ecological conservation takes an enormous amount of human labor, resources and perseverance over time. It is only with the help of Bonaire residents that we can succeed in re-establishing lost habitat and preserving local biodiversity. With this in mind, we offer several educational programs, one of which is teach-

ing Nature Conservation classes for MBO Bonaire students enrolled in the "Leisure & Hospitality Host" diploma program.

On Friday, February 18, we had 17 students from this program join Echo for a tour and lecture on our reforestation program. The students learned about Echo's mission to preserve the local Lora population (also known as the yellow-shouldered Amazon parrot), our exclusion zones for reforestation and other facets important to our reforestation efforts.

As part of the tour, each of the visiting students had the chance to plant a tree to leave a lasting positive impact on their local environment. This was the favorite part of the visit for most of the students. The students enjoyed their visit and had many follow-up questions, with some of them expressing interest in doing an internship with Echo. One of the most important components to achieving our mission is to inspire the growing young generations of Bonaireans to love and protect the local environment, and we're happy to report that we're well on the way to accomplishing this.



### **CRUISE SHIP RATING**

Carnival Horizon and an unscheduled Costa Deliziosa, also owned by Carnival, visited Bonaire on February 23. The Horizon carried 2500 of its full capacity load of 3954. The Deliziosa had 561 passengers of a possible 3762 with crew.

The Costa ship received F ratings across the board from Friends of the Earth Environmental Report Card for 2021 for sewage treatment, air pollution reduction, water quality compliance, transparency and criminal violations, giving it a final grade of F. The entire Carnival Cruise Lines scores a Friends of the Earth rating of F but Costa has its own individual rating of F.



### Banded coral shrimp-Could they be living a lie?

"What were those little black and white shrimp with the white whiskers?" was a question that had me stymied in my first week of guiding divers on San Salvador (in the Bahamas). I'd been diving avidly in South Florida for six years, and so far I'd been able to identify every single mystery animal except this one.

Finally, the divers beckoned to me excitedly, and showed me -- a pair of banded coral shrimp. Our dives were 40' or deeper, and the shrimp did look black and white, I guess. I see them as red and white no matter what, a kind of brain glitch where the colors get filled in when they're not actually there.

When you see a banded coral shrimp, do you see red and white, or black and white? Or either, depending on depth?

You are seeing banded coral shrimp, right? They're fairly common here, but they're shy, so they hang out under ledges and in crevices, with only their white whiskers visible. Take a peek under a white-whiskered ledge, and you're likely to see a pair of banded coral shrimp. Look more closely (being careful not to contact coral or swirl water with your

hands), and you can see their long, striped claws. If you have a light, it will show you the shrimps' infamous stripes as red.

The red-banded coral shrimp's scientific name is Stenopus hispidus, which means "straight-legged, spiny". They live in tropical waters around the world, so if you see what looks like a banded coral shrimp in Vanuatu or Papua New Guinea, it's probably the same species as ours. The banded coral shrimp's attractiveness and availability gave it the dubious distinction of being one of the first creatures popular with marine aquarists.

Banded coral shrimp pairs stay together for years. When the female molts, she releases pheromones which alert her mate (or, it she doesn't have a mate, which attract one). Her mate passes her his sperm packet; she fertilizes her eggs, and attaches them to her underside, where, during much of their development, they are turquoise in color. Since she molts every three to four weeks, and the eggs only take 16 days to hatch, the timing is right for her to mate during every molt. (Yikes!)

All those molted shells can be educational for divers, since looking at a new molt is the perfect way to get a close look at the outside of a banded coral shrimp: you'll be able to see all the legs and feel the spiny surface of the shell itself. Finding a banded coral shrimp molt may also mean there's a pair nearby. Each pair, especially the male, fiercely guards its territory -- roughly a meter in diameter -- from other banded coral shrimp.

Have you noticed banded coral shrimp acting as cleaners? Stories of banded coral shrimp perching on top of coral heads and waving their bodies and their whiskers to advertise for cleaning clients abound in the liter-

ature, but don't seem to be nearly as common on the reef. One reason I might not see them cleaning much is that they're said to clean more often at night, and I don't dive much at night. Another reason we might not see them cleaning often is that they can be very subtle about it: what's visible might be only a fish leaning against a ledge -- but when the fish swims off, there's a banded coral shrimp under the ledge, having been, presumably, cleaning the fish while out of sight.

There might be another reason why we don't see banded coral shrimp cleaning very often: maybe, in fact, they don't clean very often. The original scientific description of these critters emphasized their cleaner status,

many other writers referred back to the original, and maybe the banded coral shrimp's status as a cleaner became fixed that way.

Or, maybe the banded coral shrimp's white whiskers -- standard advertising equipment for cleaner shrimp -- is false advertising. Maybe banded coral shrimp, while enjoying the protection predators afford to cleaners, don't earn that protection very often.

What do you think?

Ron went through six Dive Friends tank cards during his two months renting over a hundred tanks.



## Preparing for a future in IT

Two schools, MBO Bonaire and ROC Mondriaan in The Hague, are working together to make the IT and HORECA courses at both schools increasingly modern and innovative. Together with IT company Cisco, special high-tech classrooms have now been set up in The Hague and Bonaire, so that students can follow lessons – in real time – at both locations. This is a unique development in the Caribbean Netherlands. Students from Bonaire, but also from the other islands and countries in the Caribbean Netherlands, can receive high-level lessons in the region.

The Ministry of Education, Culture and Science (OCW/CN), and the Shared Service Organization (SSO/CN) support this course financially. SSO/CN also supplies a number of teachers and offers

students the opportunity for further development within SSO through an apprenticeship program.

SSO-CN commissioned an investigation in 2018/2019 asking what SSO-CN could do to keep up with the growing demand for IT services. One idea was to set up an IT academy in Bonaire.

Lisette Keijser, MBO director, said that 30 classes can be taken 24/7 online. Computers are available to everyone thanks to contributions from Netherlands organizations and companies. Presently the digital classroom serves 624 MBO students and there is plenty of space for more to sign up. This is the last year for this three-year term and then another three years begin.

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## Bonaire Scuba is a little like the old days

I had the advantage to learn from Bruce of how to teach and handle Bonaire visitors... as the relationships are different from anywhere else."

As a dive tourist, Larry has visited 20 countries and taken what he learned from other instructors to make him a better diver and instructor.

Bonaire Scuba offers guided dives to marked and unmarked sites with personalized service including transportation by truck, like the old days. He will go anywhere except the east coast, even Washington Slagbaai National Park, The price for one to four people is a flat fee of \$100. And he even includes photos of the dive.

Larry explained, if there are more people, then we can talk about it. He thinks anymore than four loses the intimate experience.

Bonaire Scuba offers rental equipment in all sizes which he maintains perfectly. He attributes his knowledge of maintenance to the teachings of Bruce who was known island-wide as the go-to for equipment repair. Rental gear includes
