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Building a shared future for all life - Biodiversity Day 2022

Lac Cai was alive with many of Bonaire's nature organizations that gathered to celebrate International Biodiversity Day (IBD) on May 22. It was kind of a one stop shop to learn, visit and be inspired with Bonaire's important organizations that work to keep our island's diverse nature in check. People could chat with Echo, Donkey Sanctuary, Mangrove Maniacs, Reef Renewal, Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire, Tera Barra, Wild Bird Rehab, World Wildlife Fund and of course STINAPA and their Junior Rangers.

Guided boat and kayak tours in the mangrove and Lac Cai areas were available for visitors to experience and learn about the area firsthand. A little theater area was set up with looped videos about the work done by the different nature organizations.

International Biodiversity Day was established in 2000 by the United Nations (UN) to raise awareness about the Earth's ongoing biodiversity issues and create an understanding of the challenges required to sustain them

Mangrove Maniac Arno Verhoeven said, "Biodiversity is the most important thing about nature. Many people don't realize biodiversity is in almost every aspect of our life – fish, agriculture, our oceans, forest and every life form including humans. It creates a healthy system. If we lose one specimen, we think it's not important but it brings the ecosystem out of balance. It literally collapses the system and humanity."

According to the UN, three quarters of the Earth's land-based environment and 66% of our oceans have been severely changed due to human activity. A recent report by the UN said that more than one million animal and plant species are at risk of extinction. Conservation of all the earth's species is vital to ensure our survival.

The clock has run out on many or our species. This is difficult to believe but the UN's report shows that three species disappear every hour, from 100 - 150 species disappear every day and from 15,000 to 80,000 species

disappear every year.

Bonaire and its people are a part of the three billion on the Earth that depend on marine and coastal biodiversity to make a living. That is just how important biodiversity is. Our lives depend on it.

"Pollution, climate change and all the rapid growth on our island have brought the systems under intense pressure. We have to find the balance. People need to be made aware and take a deeper look as it is virtually a part of everything. When we talk about food, agriculture and economics, we need to consider biodiversity; the nature on Bonaire is never far away," said Verhoeven. "Whether you are a nature lover or not, you have to know Bonaire is unique and in many ways Bonaire is still pristine. We have a strong conservation on Bonaire, better than on any other island."

Everyone can be a part of helping sustain Bonaire's diverse flora and fauna. There is something for everyone.

The Hague targets same social support for BES as European Netherlands

In the coalition agreement that joined the BES Islands to the Netherlands as a municipality, The Hague promised the islands eventual social support comparable to those in Europe. Recently announced budget decisions affirm that progress to that goal is continuing.

This cabinet says its main goal for the Caribbean Netherlands is to improve living standards and combat poverty. It intends to assure all residents of the Caribbean Netherlands a livelihood by reducing costs and increasing incomes.

Minister Carola Schouten (Poverty Policy, Participation and Pensions) has announced that, starting in 2023, the government will structurally invest an additional 30 million in Bonaire, Saba, and St. Eustatius. In addition, the departments themselves will also contribute in combating poverty. This amount will be increased year by year to EUR 12 million structurally in 2025.

State Secretary Van Huffelen said, "Life in the Caribbean Netherlands is expensive. The costs for drinking water, electricity, telecom and housing are high. For many people, it is difficult to make ends meet. With this investment, we can first of all ensure higher incomes and benefits, and lower monthly costs. In concrete terms, this means, for example, increasing benefits and the minimum wage, but also reducing the cost of living, such as drinking water and energy costs. Together with the government, I will continue to make efforts to ensure that daily life becomes more affordable."

The government intends to build the island economies with the goal of achieving, by 2025, a legal minimum wage and benefits that equals in the European Netherlands social minimum. At that point, people in the islands and in Europe would be protected by comparable structural social support benefits

In the meantime, targeted subsidies will continue be used to meet immediate social needs in the islands. Roughly 40% of island households will be eligible for a one-off energy supplement. The amount for a single person living independently in the welfare system will gradually increase. Gradual increases in the child benefit will begin on July 1, 2022. A regulation establishing unemployment benefits will be introduced. Subsidies will be available for drinking water,

construction of public housing, and increasing people's employability.

EUR 35 million will be invested in the preservation of nature and the environment during this cabinet period.

The free allowances paid to the public entities themselves will increase substantially. By 2025, the island governments will structurally receive \in 13 million more in resources for island tasks, as well as \in 10 million for incidental backlogs. *DMR*

Bonaire has a new tourist tax as of July 1

After the new tourist tax was passed by the Island Council, critics objected to the amendment that visitors be taxed upon every arrival, rather than just once a year, as provided in the proposed legislation. They felt that was a major last minute change that had been adopted without sufficient thought and discussion.

The OLB has responded in a press release: "The regulation and the amendment that together establish a new tourist tax for Bonaire were adopted by a majority of votes in the Island Council meeting of April 12. After the ordinance and amendment were voted on, questions arose about the process and whether it was done correctly. As a result, legal advice was requested. The legal investigation has shown that the process followed is correct. The Island Governor as chairman of the Island Council and the Clerk subsequently signed the new by-law and the amendment. The regulation and amendment have since been published." *DMR*

New Sunset Beach building request splits Island Council

Hennyson Thielman and Nina den Heyer have said they will resign from the four-person Executive Council if the Council approves a building permit requested by Sun-set Beach Resort. The resort wants to add a fifth story to its hotel, which would be unprecedented on the island. The Space & Development department has ruled the Executive Council has authority to approve the permit.

Thielman and den Heyer say approving the building permit would not be consistent with the Executive Council's vision for a

smaller and more exclusive type of tourism on the island. It would also set precedents for building higher on the island and crowding more units onto relatively small building sites.

Thielman and den Heyer voted against approval while commissioner James Kroon and island Governor Rijna voted for it. The Governor can assure the permit gets approved on another vote if he wants. He is allowed a second ballot to break ties. Thielman and den Heyer believe a majority of the Island Council would not support the permit. They point out that, if Rijna breaks the tie and pushes the permit through de-spite considerable opposition, Kroon would be the only elected councilor to have voted favor in of it.

Bonaire's low skyline has long been maintained by precedent, not regulation. For decades two stories was widely believed to be the maximum allowed building height on the island. Then three story buildings suddenly appeared. Soon four stories became the maximum supposedly allowed, all without public discussion. Critics say that approval of only a single five-story building now would almost assure a new, higher precedent for the island. *DMR* (BESreporter, Bonaire.nu)

Bopec still a possibility for container port

The Reporter has learned that Bonaire's future container port may not be located at Hato after all. According to Executive Council member Hennyson Thielman, Bopec is still under consideration. The financial implications of a Bopec facility are being seriously studied. Opening a container port is an immediate priority for Bonaire because of the extra costs incurred when goods are imported through Curaçao. Problems at the Port of Curaçao, including labor disputes, have also disrupted deliveries to Bonaire. *Julie Morgan*.

POLICE REPORT

Property crime

May 13. At around 12:30 p.m. the police station received a report of a burglary at a company in the Nikiboko district.

Bonaire real estate advice

Do I need a property manager if I don't rent the property when I am not using it? I am going to buy a condo and I don't have to be on the island for the deed transfer and the monthly HOA fee includes the gardener and pool service. My friend said I need one, but I don't see the point. Ella

Hi Ella,

You will need someone to turn on the utilities, cable and internet in your unit if you are not going to be on island for the closing. This is done in person on Bonaire, you cannot call and switch the service to your name. It is also a good idea to have someone stop by the property regularly to ensure there are no leaks or damage to your unit. Depending on how long between your visits, your Airco units may need to be turned on peri-



odically, and cleaned every six months. In case of a problem inside your unit, you will have someone to call who can schedule and supervise a repair. You can discuss with a property manager how often you want service and what the charge would be.

Subject: solution-oriented proposal for tackling public housing problems

Kralendijk, Bonaire May 12, 2022

Dear Members of the Island Council and the Executive Council,

Fundashon Cas Bonairiano is at the heart of society and, in accordance with its statutes, should not operate for any other purpose than in the interest of public housing. To achieve that goal, FCB maintains close ties with all stakeholders and does everything in its power to achieve it.

In the past period it has become apparent that there is a scarcity of affordable housing for the inhabitants of Bonaire. FCB would like to bring this to your attention by means of this letter and at the same time make a proposal for the inventory and implementation of possible solutions, so that they can be submitted to the Island Council and the Executive Council.

Introduction and problem statement

Bonaire wants to grow while preserving nature, culture and the individual character of the island and has drawn up a plan for its development in which the territory is determined and space is offered for desired developments. That spatial development plan is currently being revised.

In this spatial development plan, the spatial conditions must be created for preserving a healthy living environment, including by safeguarding natural and recreational space in accordance with the future size of the population.

Due to the limited space on Bonaire, the pressure will increase on nature to make way for homes. In the opinion of FCB, this is an undesirable development as nature is the only wealth that Bonaire has, is the basis of our tourist economy and distinguishes us from other islands. In short, without nature there are no tourists.

There is a scarcity of affordable housing on Bonaire, which affects the current residents of Bonaire the most, because as a result of this scarcity they are 'displaced' from the housing market by persons or investors who often do not live on Bonaire and who buy the houses on Bonaire with usually the purpose of (recreational) rental. The purchase is seen as a good investment with a good return, because the money in the bank yields no or negative interest.

As a result, these homes 'disappear' from the 'normal' housing market. The prices of owner-occupied homes are being pushed up in this way and are therefore unreachable for many Bonaireans with an average income. The waiting list in the social rental sector is long. As a result, throughput on the housing market is very limited.

In general, current housing projects that are put on the market do not make any contribution to solving the shortage of affordable housing. This is with the exception of FCB's projects.

The CBS forecast shows a population growth on Bonaire from about 7,000 to 2050, with a population growth of only 1,000 in the period 2030-2050. This population growth will increase the current shortage on the housing market. Regulation is therefore necessary to keep our island habitable for future generations.

Solution

Our aim is to achieve a balanced distribution of the scarce living space and to offer all groups of home seekers the opportunity to find suitable accommodation. We assume that this is a common goal and that the Island

Council and the Executive Council endorse this goal.

We see a solution to achieve the goal by realizing the

We see a solution to achieve the goal by realizing the following two (2) things in conjunction.

Firstly, we believe that it is desirable to draw up a Housing Ordinance, which stipulates, among other things, that a housing permit is required for occupancy of owner-occupied homes up to a certain purchase price and rental properties up to a certain rent. This prevents scarce homes from being used as investment objects and contributes to ensuring that scarce homes become and remain available to meet the need for affordable housing on Bonaire. The need to draw up a Housing Regulation is not new. During the process of drafting new legislation and regulations regarding the (rental) housing market in the Caribbean Netherlands, a draft housing regulation has already been drawn up. This lays the foundation for the introduction of a permit system for rental and owner-occupied homes. The draft Housing Regulation is now somewhat outdated and must be adapted to current developments and needs.

In the Housing Regulation, concrete considerations can be made about the scope of a permit requirement for the use or allowing the use of homes in certain categories and/or at certain locations. Although we realize that this limits the freedom of owners and investors to use homes in the most profitable way (for example, only for recreational use), we believe that the public interest on Bonaire and the scarcity of homes make these measures necessary. The implementation of that framework will of course require careful consideration of the interests of all stakeholders involved, also in order to create the desired support for such measures.

In addition, we believe it is worth considering setting up a 'Public Housing Fund' to be able to fund social housing (partly) from that fund and perhaps also housing in the middle category. This fund could be fed by contributions from, among others, project developers or perhaps even part of the proceeds from real estate-related taxes. In this way, less profitable or perhaps even unprofitable developments of necessary housing can be paid for.

Realization of solutions

As FCB, we are happy to take the lead in further exploring and concretizing the aforementioned solutions together with all stakeholders, and then present them to the Island Council and the Executive Council.

In that context, we think it makes sense to also involve the expertise in this area present in the European Netherlands. Hence our request if your ministry could support us in this.

We would like to hear if you have any suggestions that can be included in this process.

Thank you very much for your letter dated 12 May 2022 in which you call on our Executive Council, among other things, to come up with a concrete approach together with you and other stakeholders for undesirable developments on the housing market. You are right to draw attention to the fact that it is becoming increasingly difficult for local home seekers to find suitable/affordable housing, not only in the social sector, but increasingly also in the so-called middle segment. This is also a very worrying situation in the eyes of the Executive Council.

We share your analysis that there is displacement due to pricing. This development has been our focus for some time for several reasons. If nonresident people buy houses that are only occupied for a limited part of the year, this also has adverse consequences for social cohesion and therefore for the quality of life in neighbourhoods. That is why a start has been made with an enforcement process in neighborhoods where homes are wrongly used for recreation.

We have recently started exploring what other instruments we can use to regulate the housing market in such a way that local home seekers with a low to middle income get a fair chance.

Without regulation, building will not be the solution.

Without regulation, building will not be the solution. We are therefore in discussion with the Ministry of the Interior and Kingdom Relations. Seen in this light, the arrival in June of the Minister for Public Housing and Spatial Planning is important.

A settlement ordinance as suggested by you in your letter is certainly an good idea. Your other suggestion to set up a 'public housing fund' is an interesting one and certainly worth further exploring.

As far as we are concerned, we will meet as soon as

possible to discuss the solutions you have suggestedand to see how we can arrive at a concrete approach in cooperation with stakeholders, such as the Ministry.

Once again, thank you for your initiative. It has been taken from our hearts and comes at the right time.

Recommendation to government of Bonaire: Donkey Sanctuary Bonaire and Bonaire Donkey Protection League (BDPL) need to join forces.

We need to protect Bonaire's special, historic Nubian donkeys. We need to protect them and manage them correctly and not eliminate them or enclose them in an unnatural area. Professionals in the animal world have said this, according to BDPL in a press release. According to these professionals, the correct solution to do this is for Donkey Sanctuary and Bonaire Donkey Protection League to join forces. They recommended this to the government of Bonaire.

BDPL writes: "Because Bonaire's special, historic Nubian donkeys are a big part of our heritage, loved by people, with economic value and international interest, the professionals made the recommendation to Bonaire's government. They find that the Donkey Sanctuary should care for the donkeys that are sick and injured and that BDPL should manage those that are in nature."

Safe Area

BDPL explains that Donkey Sanctuary has the ability to treat sick and injured donkeys, while at the same time there is a team of nature, animal and land management professionals to protect and correctly manage 'our special historic donkeys' in nature.

According to BDPL, the correct solution, approved by various experts in the animal world, is to "remove the donkeys from the populated areas and the streets of Bonaire and take them to safe remote areas. This can be done in a quantity that will not damage the environment, but is actually beneficial to the environment. The donkeys will continue to be monitored and their population controlled in a humane manner. This will not be done by the barbaric method of castration."

No one on Bonaire has asked Breemhaar to destroy Plantation Bolivia and build 1,900 houses there

Colonialism in a new jacket

Colonialism is the phenomenon that countries (usually of Western European origin) dominate overseas territories and the populations in those territories for economic, strategic and/or political considerations with the intention of earning money and/or protecting interests. From the 17th until well into the 20th century, the Netherlands owned large overseas territories: the Dutch East Indies, Suriname and the colony of Curação. The Netherlands created the conditions, the trade with which a lot of money was made was left to companies and/or private individuals who made extensive use of enslaved Africans. The Netherlands owes its present wealth largely to its colonial past.

Against this background, let's consider the situation regarding Plantation Bolivia on Bonaire. The area is located in the northeast of the island, is approximately 3,000 hectares in size, forms 10% of the island, with the coastline of 15 km adjacent to currently untouched coral reef. The zoning of the area is 'open landscape', in order to preserve the open landscape and natural values for now and future generations. So it is not allowed to build

The plantation was bought at the end of 2019 for 12 million dollars by the Dutch Quote 500 millionaire Breemhaar. It soon becomes apparent that Breemhaar does not actually know what he has bought. In an interview with De Telegraaf at the beginning of 2020, he calls his purchase 'a devasted area'. He does not know that he owns the largest dry tropical forest of the Antillean islands, which is assessed by Wageningen University, among others, as an ecologically valuable area with a unique landscape. He does not know what he has bought, but he does know what he wants to do with it: earn a lot of money by 'developing' the area. A euphemism for clearing out vegetation and building. He wants to make a profit of at least 100 million, he confides to someone. This is also apparent when he



declines an offer of 24 million from an American, who wants to leave it natural.

Breemhaar manages to convince the politically responsible commissioner of his intentions. He does this by presenting a plan that he knows will be well received. With social housing, nature development, cycle paths, vegetation restoration and agricultural activities. However, the plan is full of inaccuracies and also contains untruths. An example is his claim that he will build on 10% of the area and that 90% will remain a natural area. The commissioners give in and the lieutenant governor will even sign a letter of intent with Breemhaar in February 2022. Two years earlier, the same governor stated in an interview with Trouw that he is concerned about the balance between the economy and nature on the island, explicitly mentioning 'developers who are making plans to build on open areas'. Why did the lieutenant governor change his opinion? Well, who knows, may say so.

What Breemhaar really wants will become apparent in April 2022. We managed to get hold of a housing survey that

was reported on his behalf in September 2021 and which was kept secret. It states that he will develop 700 hectares of the 1,900 hectares that can be developed (almost 37%!) by building 1,900 homes in the middle and high price segment. In addition, it appears that the main ecological structure (corridor) of the island is going to be destroyed and that he wants to build houses above the caves of Spelonk and Roshikiri in which drawings of the first inhabitants of the island have been preserved. Social housing has disappeared and there is no word left about nature restoration and conservation.

No one on the island has asked Breemhaar to destroy Plantation Bolivia and build 1,900 houses there. The development of the area is also not necessary, according to the (draft) Spatial Development Plan. There are sufficient locations on the island that are suitable for new homes to meet the housing need, taking into account the population growth up to 2050. And yet Breemhaar continues his plans and manipulates the board and the island council members in the direction of his plans towards a change of zoning

with shiny leaflets, smooth talk, urban planners flown in from the Netherlands (and perhaps also a few pieces of silver).

Breemhaar buys almost 3,000 hectares of 'open landscape' on an island 8,000 kilometers away from his Western European hometown for pennies on the dollar. He sees his chance to earn a lot of money by destroying the largest dry tropical on the Antillean islands, building almost 2,000 homes that no one has asked for and that will be bought by rich Americans and Europeans because they are too expensive for the average Bonairean. If that's not neo-colonialism?

Nature is the only 'wealth' that Bonaire has, the basis of the tourist economy and distinguishes Bonaire from other islands. In short, without nature no tourists, no income for now and future generations. Can we prevent the future of Bonaire from being colonized? Sure! First of all, it is up to the commissioners of the island and the members of the Island Council. They can block the change of zone to housing by not cooperating. Hopefully they are aware that there will be elections early next year and that Bolivia could play a very important role. But the parliament in The Hague also has the opportunity to protect nature on Plantation Bolivia and to stop Breemhaar's plans. Nature and the environment represent a supra-local interest and that, in addition to the obligations under various treaties, makes the European Dutch government responsible for their protection. In short, responsible that sufficient natural and recreational space is secured in accordance with the future size of the population.

The most important question we need to ask ourselves is, are we good ancestors? How do we want future generations to look back on us?

Bolivia development challenged in parliament

The parliamentary group Party of the Animals has declared its opposition to the plan of Bonaire Properties NV to build almost 2,000 homes and the necessary infrastructure on Plantation Bolivia. The group believes the area should be designated a nature area in the spatial development plan.

Three MPs, Lammert van Raan, Eva van Esch and Leonie Vestering, put their written questions to the ministers Hugo de Jonge (Public Housing and Spatial Planning), Mark Harbers (Infrastructure and Water Management) and Christianne van der Wal-Zeggelink (Nature and Nitrogen). They asked the ministers to prevent development of the area if necessary. The concerns raised by the parliamentarians are familiar on the island. They pointed out that . . .

The Bolivia plantation area covers 10% of Bonaire, houses the largest rare tropical dry forest in the Antilles (3000 ha), and is the island's only natural corridor. It is also especially important to traditional Bonaireans.

Bonaire Properties NV intends to build almost 2,000 homes and the necessary infrastructure in the coming decades in the vulnerable nature reserve. The group says the spatial development plan already provides development opportunities where the infrastructure is present and nature would be less impacted.

The group points out that scientific research reports state that, given its ecological and cultural value, Plantation Bonaire is irreplaceable and that it must be protected.

The group urges the ministers to prevent damage to nature in the Bolivia plantation area, or to prevent nature from being lost, in consultation with the Public Entity Bonaire.

The questioners also wanted to be informed about the progress of the development so far. What was the content of letter of intent the Public Entity Bonaire signed with Bonaire Properties NV on January 26, 2022 regarding the development of plantation Bolivia? What process and timeline was agree to? Has a project plan already been submitted and/ or is there already clarity about possible permits, such as a felling permit for (part of) the tropical dry forest? If so, can you share this with the House?

The group asked if Plantation Bolivia is part of Washikemba-Fountain-Onima,

which has been designated an IBA (Important Bird Area) but is not protected as such? How will the building plans at Plantation Bolivia affect the adjacent coastline, consisting of 15 kilometers of coral? Will the development include protection for the caves with rock paintings, made by the Caiquetío around 1,000 BC, and other archaeological sites be found on plantation Bolivia?

The questioners also asked the ministers, "Are you prepared, if necessary, to use your power on the basis of the Act to issue an instruction (with regulations) regarding the content of the spatial development plan to be adopted ... in such a way that Plantation Bolivia is protected?" *DMR*

Another Kind of Treasure Dive

Every dive or snorkel we do is a treasure dive, whether we see gold, an unusual animal, or an unusual behavior. All of those things — yes, including the gold — are easier to recognize when the diver has good buoyancy control.

A diver who's a little negatively or a little positively buoyant sinks or rises, so they compensate by putting a little air in or taking a little air out of their BCD (which is why it's called a buoyancy compensator device); once neutrally buoyant they can hover effortlessly and see everything.

Divers who are not neutrally buoyant can compensate in other ways, however, and these methods are far from effortless and thus use more air: kicking continuously to stay at the desired depth, and using their hands for sculling along. I remember, years ago, a diver telling me her buoyancy was fine on day dives but she felt hugely uncoordinated on night dives. It turned out she was overweighted and compensating with her hands in the daytime, without realizing it. At night, carrying a light, she couldn't use her hands, so she felt uncoordinated.

Anyone can inhale and exhale through a mouthpiece. The trickiest diving skill is good buoyancy control.

Without good buoyancy control, a diver sends waves of disturbance through the water. Fish have a sense organ called the lateral line, which enables them to feel those pressure waves in the water. Divers who move awkwardly send loud messages to fishes: FLEE! This is not what most divers want.

No diver I've ever seen has better buoyancy control than Julie Morgan, yes, our Julie of The Bonaire Reporter, carrying a relatively huge camera system on every dive, yet moving the underwater equivalent of soundlessly. Julie was hovering at Lamachaca Reef when out of the corner of her eye she noticed a porcupinefish swimming toward her from about 6' (2m) away. As the fish got closer, she could see something black in its mouth. and it seemed to be trying to show the thing to Julie. The object turned out to be a snorkel keeper, of all things, the kind with a ring that goes around the snorkel and a slot for the mask strap. The ring had an opening to accommodate different sizes of snorkels, and the porcupinefish had gotten its lower jaw pinched between the two parts of the ring.

The porcupinefish couldn't swallow the keeper, probably a good thing, except that it couldn't swallow anything else, either. Since the ring was pushing against both the inside and the outside of the fish's lower jaw, the porcupinefish could not spit it out. In addition, the porcupinefish was young, so it was not strong enough to crush the hard plastic ring in its mouth,

The porcupinefish swam under a coral head, then turned to face Julie, who saw only one thing to do. Hovering, her left hand holding her camera system out of the way, with her right hand she reached out, oh so cautiously, toward the porcupinefish. The porcupinefish allowed Julie to seize the snorkel keeper by the slot, and she was able to pluck it right off! Julie gained a snorkel keeper and the porcupinefish was free of dive gear.

Who would have thought that such a simple piece of dive gear could be lethal?

Lessons from Julie:

First, better buoyancy control results in better everything.

Second, the more you know about the environment, the more you will recognize things that are not right.

The problem with recognizing something that's not right is that we don't always know how to deal with the situation. Picking up a snorkel keeper lying on the sand is pretty straightforward, but what if it's lying in a sponge formation,

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Van der Vaart receives high honor

Known as the 'diver doctor' for the last 40 years, Dick van der Vaart was awarded the high honor from the Netherlands as Officer in the Order of the Orange-Nassau at a surprise ceremony on May 21.

Friends and invited guests quietly gathered outside the Recompression Center where van der Vaart was involved with hyperbaric treatments. He was surprised to exit the clinic to find the group waiting for the medal ceremony.

According to van der Vaart, he had been briefed that something was happening but had told the organizers he was too busy. The doctor wasn't completely surprised but he never expected to see the large group of friends and associates who turned up to witness the medal pinning by Lt. Gov. Edison Rijna.

General practitioner Gijs Koot, gynaecologist/diving physician Sylvia Dermout, house/diving physician Wil Cornelissen and SHF director Jan-Jaap Brandt Corstius were responsible for submitting the information to the Netherlands for the honored medal. Sylvia Dermout, also a decorated Officer in the Order of Orange-Nassau organized the 'secret' gathering.

Van der Vaart moved to Bonaire in 1983 to serve as a doctor but he was also a diver who loved 'diver's par-

He began learning about diving medicine and did his first theoretical training with the Dutch Navy. In 1986 a Navy ship showed up with Bonaire's first hyperbaric chamber and in 2008 a new facility was built with a new larger, modern chamber.

The hyperbaric clinic was not just for divers but also for wound treatment which began with the first patient in 1989.

Van der Vaart brought Bonaire's diving industry to a new safety level with the recompression chamber and hyperbaric wound medicine. He is the initiator, founder

and director of the Foundation Recompression Chamber Bonaire. His work is linked to the quality of diving medicine, both in healthcare and in training doctors and nurses. His hyperbaric clinic has treated wound patients associated with diabetes, amputations and oncological wounds. It has prevented amputations.

Van der Vaart's work is recognized not only in Bonaire and the Netherlands but in the U.S. and other parts of Europe

With announcement of his retirement for Dec. 31, a search has begun for a doctor to step into his very large shoes to oversee the clinic. In the meantime van der Vaart will continue his teaching.

Following the medal ceremony, the group gathered at van der Vaart's favorite bar, Mona Lisa, for a champagne toast and appetizers.

Governor Rijna responds to press criticism

Governor Rijna, reacting to a critical opinion piece, has responded publicly and in writing to stories that Bonaire.nu and other media have published that are, in his words, "based on factual inaccuracies and use suggestive wording." He said he felt compelled to set things straight. The following synopsis attempts to express the Governor's message accurately and fairly.

'I am reproached for regularly expressing my concerns about the impact that unbridled tourism growth has on our society I see it as a cry from the heart to the local politicians and stakeholders to protect our community against undesirable developments.

"In my role as Lieutenant Governor I cannot take [my personal] opinion into account I must be guided by the advice the civil services provide me The government must be predictable: citizens, entrepreneurs and investors must be able to trust in the fact that decision-making is not dictated by arbitrariness.

"[Regarding integrity issues] surrounding the Bonaire Holding Maatschappij I have ordered [two] investigations myself and I publicly announced the main results. The full investigation results were submitted to the Island Council in confidence. After that it was up to the Island Council - as the elected representative of the people - to decide which consequences would follow.

"The media have a responsibility to safeguard the democratic constitutional state, not to undermine it. In this case, the institution of Lieutenant Governor has been wrongly discredited and faith in democracy has been damaged unnecessarily. I hope that from now on the media will take these words to heart and that they will take their journalistic responsibility seriously when considering publishing these kinds of allegations." DMR

Real estate tax assessments are coming

The Tax Office CN will send out the real estate tax assessments for 2021 this month

Real estate tax is levied on owners of immovable properties such as a second home and company buildings on Bonaire, Saba, and Saint Eustatius. The property used by the owner as his or her main residence is exempt from real estate tax and is covered by the land tax. You can consult the tax office website for other exemptions.

The real estate tax rate is 17.5%. This rate is applied to a calculated income of 4% of the value of the immovable property. This means that the actual tax rate is 0.7% of the value of the immovable property.

Example 1:

Value of house USD 200,000. An exemption of USD 70,000 applies. The taxes are calculated based on an amount of USD 130,000. General taxes: 0.7% real estate tax = USD 910. Surtax amount (only on Bonaire) USD 273. The overall taxes in this year amount to USD 1,183.

If the property concerns a hotel, the rate will be 10% and an effective tax rate of 0.4% is levied.

Example 2:

Value of hotel USD. 200,000. Hotel sector levy: 0.4% real estate tax = USD 800. Surtax amount (only on Bonaire) USD 240. The overall taxes in this year amount to USD 1.040.

Surtax on Bonaire

The real estate tax rate is increased by a surcharge of 30% for immovable properties on Bonaire for the benefit of the Public Entity of Bonaire.

Paying your taxes

The real estate tax assessment form states how you can pay. The assessment must be paid as a lump sum. If this leads to difficulties, you can agree on a payment plan with the recipient of the Tax Office CN.

Thielman discusses cruise ship issues

In a press conference May 16, deputy Hennyson Thielman discussed the April 25-28 cruise summit in Miami. The Bonaire delegation, of which Thielman was a member, met with the major cruise ships that made port in Bonaire over the past years. The delegation discussed Bonaire's plans for a high quality, low quantity tourism strategy and the new head tax for cruise passengers. All cruise companies were on board with the new \$10 tax with no one canceling their schedule for Bonaire.

At the Miami cruise summit, the Dutch Caribbean cruise line discussed increasing nature, cultural trips on the island and their hope to contribute to Bonaire's nature organizations. There was no discussion regarding a new STINAPA nature fee for the passengers.

During the summit, Bonaire also spoke to smaller luxury and more environmental vessels like the Ritz Carlton Yacht, a 280 passenger cruise ship and the luxury Regency 17. Both have shown interest in Bonaire. Thielman explained many of the large cruise ship companies own the small lines.

In his May 16, 2022 review of cruise ship issues, Thielman said that although Bonaire promised the island a one ship per day limit, that could change. If a small ship is in port, the government could also allow a larger one.

Taxis and tour buses are still levying complaints that Bonaire seems to be discouraging cruise tourism but have chosen not to submit their financial data or numbers for Bonaire's tourism research. Tour prices are not government regulated, though the standard price is \$25 per person by the tour organization. The deputy said he was aware that some operators are charging less for some groups through bargaining.

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Banning single use plastics

One week from today a milestone will be set in the war on single use plastic on Bonaire. Beginning June 1, the single use plastic ban takes effect on several one user, one-time plastic items: plastic bags, plastic straws, plastic cutlery, plastic drink stirrers and bioplastics. Foam/Styrofoam packaging will be added to the list on August 1. Anyone selling or giving away these products in supermarkets, restaurants, snacks or stores

could be fined or even do jail time.

This is just the first phase of the government's Bonaire Plastic Free Campaign headed up by a two-woman team of environmental policy advisor Eva van Voskuijlen since October 2020 and communications lead Imarisha Hagens who came on board

Creating optimal health

How many friends or relatives do we have who live outside the island in different cities around the world? How many of them love to vacation in Bonaire? How many of them pay a good amount of dollars to come to enjoy the friendly nature and dive into the waters that surround the island? How many of those pay expensive memberships in their hometowns to enjoy a sports pool, either to practice swimming, aqua aerobics or for in-water rehabilitation?

We should question ourselves, having this giant spa around us, how many times do we visit it?

Sea water has many minerals such as magnesium, calcium, zinc, iron, iodine, potassium and of course sodium chloride. Soaking our bodies in these minerals has several benefits. In general terms, sea baths can help reduce stress, muscle tension and joint pain. If you wear a mask you have the extra enjoyment of watching the reef creatures, a privilege reserved to a lucky few.

Floating in salt water doesn't require much effort,

and while one floats the movements of the body are carried out gracefully and without fighting against the full force of gravity. Hydro gymnastics, aqua aerobics and rehabilitation programs in the water use the benefit of buoyancy to allow a whole range of movements that help make the spine more flexible, stretch muscles and tendons and lubricate joints with minimal risk.

Venous and lymphatic return are also facilitated by immersion in the sea. If you suffer from fluid accumulation in the legs, there is no better therapy than 30 minutes or more of enjoyment in the sea. For this reason, sea baths also prevent the formation of varicose veins in the legs.

When we go swimming, we also expose ourselves to the sun. When our skin is exposed to sunlight, it makes vitamin D from cholesterol. The sun's ultraviolet B (UVB) rays hit cholesterol in the skin cells, providing the energy for vitamin D synthesis to occur. Vitamin D is essential for fixing calcium in the bones and maintaining a strong immune system. Sun exposure is also essential to regulate the sleep-wake cycle, by telling our endocrine system which hormones to release to keep us awake during the day and which to release at sunset to induce sleep. Provided it is done rationally and gradually, sun exposure is an added benefit of this giant spa.

Some health conditions also benefit by immersion in

salt water, such as rheumatoid arthritis and some skin problems. Salt water is good for the skin in general, due to its antibacterial, healing and antifungal properties. Its iodine content strengthens the immune system and it is vital to keep a healthy thyroid.

Our ocean has almost no threats. There are no dangerous creatures except for the eventual jelly fish after a full moon. There are hardly ever strong currents, and when there is one, most of the times it is parallel to shore and this in general, is more of an inconvenience than a hazard. Only in the southernmost part of the island, the surface current created by the wind has occasionally posed a major threat to life, in most cases to divers not to swimmers. There are also many spots along the coast where we can enter the water without booties or reef walkers.

So, there are very few excuses that prevent us from enjoying this sometimes-luxurious saltwater bathtub, this huge swimming pool. On top of that, it is completely free for us Bonaireans!

Preparing for next monitoring

In the photo to the right you can see Echo staff member, Wewe, helping us prepare for the nest monitoring season by holding lessons for high-school youth from "Jong Bonaire" on how to safely ascend and descend cliffs. Loras use cliff cavities for nesting, and it is important for us to track the numbers and health of lora babies as they hatch and grow. We also help the birds find more nesting spaces by removing invasive Africanized honey bees from the same cavities.

The lessons were fun and one of the youths is already prepared to participate in the real thing! Some of the other youths need more practice to gain their confidence in climbing and rappelling, as it can be dangerous and requires patience and attention to detail. Despite that, we can tell these youths are enthusiastic to learn, they ask a lot of great questions and participate energetically.

In the past, international experts living abroad have had to come to Bonaire to help Echo with nest monitoring activities. With these lessons, we aim to establish a group of proficient climbers and abseilers here on Bonaire and that will be able to carry out nest monitoring activities independently. We hope that in the future, it



will be other organizations reaching out to Echo for support with nest monitoring, which will provide the local youth with opportunities for conservation work abroad.

The love story continues

If you read our updates from the last couple of months, you know of Popje and Pinda's blooming relationship. They now have a nest box and spend lots of time inside it, cuddling and preening. They were in a lovers' paradise, until they were joined by a Lora in the neigh-boring aviary.

A new lora was brought to Echo by a good Samaritan, for rehabili-tation and release. This new lora was ringed and therefore a past Echo resident that had been released back into the wild. Unfortu-nately, at some point after release, this lora was illegally recaptured to be kept as a pet. And in full circle, it made its way back to Echo again.

Loras brought to Echo are monitored, rehabilitated, and released when the bird is ready to be back in the wild. When the lora is first brought to Echo, it has to be kept separate from the other resident loras, to ensure that any diseases the bird might be carrying do not get spread among the rest of the flock. Additionally, the bird must

Consideration given to regulating housing prices

Ben Oleana, director of Fundashon Cas Bonariano, has asked the OLB to consider regulating the housing market on Bonaire and to create a public housing fund to tackle the rising housing shortage. It is becoming increasingly difficult for local house hunters in both the lower and middle markets to find suitable and affordable housing.

The Executive Council responded positively to Oleana's call. "Thank you for your initiative," Island Governor Edison Rijna said on behalf of the BC. "It is taken from the heart and comes at the right time."

Papiamentu-language chef training still held up in parliament

The House of Representatives has again postponed consideration of the bill that would allow the Bonaire School Community to offer the MBO-3 chef training in Papiamentu as well as Dutch, according to the Kingdom Relations File.

Initially the law was scheduled for routine passage at the beginning of December. At the last minute the VVD wanted a debate. Repeated delays followed until last month when the VVD – again at the last minute – blocked a vote by demanding a reopening of the debate. The debate was schedule for May 19 but got bumped by an emergency debate regarding Prime Minister Rutte erasing text messages from his phone.

Consideration of the Education Act must now be rescheduled. If the approval (including the Senate vote) is not passed before the summer recess, the introduction of the Papiamentu-language chef training course will be delayed by one school year. *DMR (Dossier Kingdom Relations)*

JIF peanut butter maybe contaminated with salmonella

The U.S. Center for Disease Control has warned that JIF brand peanut butter should not be sold, used or eaten because it maybe contaminated with the Salmonella bacteria. Specifically, the danger is associated with U.S. manufactured JIF bearing the 7-digit codes 1274425 to 2140425. *DMR*

Bioplastics containers which were originally thought to be better are just another type of plastic and can't be disposed of in nature. They require a different type of recycling process than traditional plastics which is problematic.

Styrofoam is one of the worst types of plastics on the ban. It is considered a possible human carcinogen. When used in packaging the chemical can leach into the food especially if heated. When created Styrofoam has been found to contain 57 harmful chemical byproducts that are released into the air impacting the ozone layer and climate change. Unfortunately, the Styrofoam ban is delayed to August 1 to allow vendors to use up any product they have remaining

Hygiene, medical or food security plastics may not be suitable for a ban. Sustainable or reusable alternatives are being considered for these types of single use plastics in the future.

Single use plastic bottles may eventually be included in another phase of the ban. Two policy tools on plastic bottles have to be considered by the stakeholders, which could be either banning or creating a deposit type system.

"There is a lot to consider if you ban a product. We are working on a second list that will be added to the ban," said Eva. "The timetable after June 1 is to inform everyone. We hope the awareness will stimulate a change of behavior. We need to ease the island into the idea and people will be more aware."

OLB makes major progress in finance reporting and implementation

The auditor has issued an unqualified auditor's report for the fairness and regularity of the financial statements for 2021, the OLB's first. The only disclaimer resulted from uncertain comparison data from 2020 that were due to problems that were subsequently corrected. The OLB remains committed to submitting a complete and unqualified auditor's report for 2022.

The uncertainties identified in the 2020 audit report with regard to the valuation of investments, participations, and revenues have been resolved in the 2021 financial year. The tax receivables have been valued and the uncertainties in the income from ground lease, pilotage, mooring fees and surcharges were eliminated before 2021. The OLB's participations such as WEB, BOG, OTB, BIA, OBNA have been correctly valued, and the solvency of the OLB is good. The resistivity is above the norm. The OLB has a sufficiently healthy financial position and is therefore in a good position to absorb any future setbacks. *DMR*

Here comes the hurricane season

The new hurricane season, June 1 to November 30, is expected to be more active than in previous years.

The Public Entity Bonaire (OLB) provides information on how to prepare against hurricanes in a brochure and via the website https://www.bonairecrisis. com/. The brochure also describes what the OLB does during a hurricane and contains the emergency number people can call. Anyone can view and download the hurricane brochure on OLB's website under the button labeled 'Residents and disaster relief.'

Bonaireans can also download the app 'Disasterprep Bonaire' from the App Store and Google Play. The app tells how to prepare for various disasters, what assistance the OLB provides, and how to



get information if a disaster strikes. The OLB can also send important messages to all users of the app.

The OLB disaster management team activates the police, fire brigade, physicians and public health services to counter dangers during and after a hurricane or tropical storm. The OLB also provides shelters for people who must leave their homes to seek safety. DMR

Boatmaster Grade III Bonaire training comes to Bonaire

The Inaugural Boatmaster III course on Bonaire was held May 9-14. The new course provides education to comply with the amendment regulation of the Seafarers Regulation directed at commercial shipping for the BES islands. Other than cargo ships this applies to passenger ships that, aside from transporting passengers, are used for commercial water-sports activities such as line fishing, diving activities and boat tours. The occupational requirements are based on the Small Commercial Vessel (SCV) Code applicable in the Caribbean region.

Walbootsman Nicole Madlenar, Captain of the Pilot vessel "Velos" is the Boatmaster instructor with De Ruyter

Training and Consultancy. The course is six days of theoretical instruction and practical exams and costs \$850. The core of the course focuses on regulations for preventing collision at sea, passenger safety, emergency situations, seamanship, boat handling, engineer knowledge, pollution prevention and legal responsibilities.

Koert Heidergott SICN (shipping inspectorate Caribisch Nederland) and Alex Van Roon (Pilot), assisted Walbootsman Madlenar with exercises throughout the week which made for an extremely authentic and professional experience.

I feel fortunate to have been a participant in the first graduating class. It is tru-

ly a first class course filled with theory and plenty of hands on experience in the field. Introduction to navigation-chart plotting, fire-fighting, man-over-board and abandon ship drills in the sea and boat handling are included.

Fellow classmate perspectives:

Yuri van Kampen, Captain and owner of "Bonaire Big Game Fishing", states; "Finally being able to follow the course on Bonaire made all the difference to me. I liked the class aspect of the course interaction between our instructor and all students whilst she explained. The different topics where evenly addressed and enough time was taken for explanation and questions. Nicole, (Walbootsman Madlenar) is a natural born teacher and did an awesome job to help us understand by visualizing topics with video presentations. I can safely say that before this course I was less aware and now feel more knowledgeable. I hope that more will follow this course. It is getting busier on the water every day and the more aware people are, the safer it will be for all."

Fellow graduate, Walter Huszar, adds "The course provided my wife, Michelle and I an eye opening experience! Both in the scope and depth of information covered. The class format allowed for the exchange and expansion of information that can and will only help to keep the growing commercial and I dare say the pleasure boating community safe. The instructor was professional, and most

enjoyable! Having attended many training formats I have only positive marks to give."

The requirements needed to acquire the Boatmaster III license from the Harbourmaster in addition to the Certificate of Proficiency BMIII are: certificate for VHF operation, and a valid medical fitness certificate from local doctor to work on board a ship. One must be over the age of 18. License renewal after three years with doctors' medical statement and statement of sailing time (45 hours in three years) follows.

The Boatmaster III license is the entry level and used for the local coastal waters of Bonaire. Boatmaster II and I are required for larger vessels calling on foreign ports of call. Those courses will follow soon. The next classes are being offered June 3-18 with 15 seats available. Contact "De Ruyter Training and Consultancy" for schedule. As of January 1, 2022 the new Seafarers regulation came into force. The implication of this new regulation for the Annex 6 vessels is the requirement for a Boatmaster grade 3 license. This requirement has a three year phase in period. That means that from January 1, 2025 every Annex 6 vessel needs to have, at least, one person with a Boatmaster grade 3 license onboard. The new regulation is published in The Government Gazette and available on the Internet. *Shelly Craig*



or on a gorgonian? Can you take it without hurting anything?

Most dive training organizations teach students and instructors to touch nothing in the underwater environment. This easy rule is effective (most of the time) in keeping divers from injuring coral, but sometimes it prevents divers from helping coral and other reef inhabitants. If you would like to become a more proactive diver and learn how you can help reef inhabitants, we can dive together and do a little straightening up. I make this offer as the author of PADI's first Underwater Naturalist text (The Gentle Sea), and the creator of the Bonaire Harbour Healing Project. The fee is nominal: help me with my tank, and spot irregularities on the reef. Send an email to dee@touchthesea.com and we'll schedule a dive.

We might not reach Julie's level of buoyancy control, but we're sure to create some treasured memories.

Royal Decoration Commission asks for nominations

The Royal Decoration Commission asks for that the members of Bonaire's community submit names of residents to be considered for a Royal Decoration for the year 2023. The deadline submitting proposals for 2023 is the end of June

When is someone eligible for an award?

It is important that the work the person has done has benefited the community. So it should not only be relevant for the organization for which the person works, but also for society. The contribution may be through volunteer work or paid work. Volunteers who tirelessly contribute to an organization for 15 years or longer in areas such as youth, the elderly, the economy, sports, culture, art, religion, nature or public order can receive an award. Someone who delivers an exceptional performance at his/her job may also be eligible for an award.

Persons nominated from Bonaire must be residents of Bonaire. If you want to nominate someone who is not registered on Bonaire, please contact the committee in advance to discuss the correct procedure in good time.

The procedure

To submit a proposal, you must complete a form saying why the person should be eligible for an award. Details of the person and references must also

be entered. The request is submitted to the Bonaire Decoration Committee, which consists of Lucia Anthony, Jeaninne Wong Loi Sing, Mary Tjin Asjoe, Ada de Palm and Robert Sances. They will continue to work on the nomination in collaboration with the Cabinet of the Lieutenant Governor.

The Island Governor then sends the proposal with his advice to the Kingdom Representative. The Kingdom Representative sends the decoration proposal with his advice and the advice of the Lieutenant Governor to the Chapter for the Civil Orders. On the basis of the recommendations, the Minister of the Interior and Kingdom Relations decides whether an award will be awarded. If that is the case, the Minister will make a nomination to His Majesty the King.

Glass crusher arrives

In The Reporter's July 8, 2019 issue focusing on Selibon we announced the waste management company would soon be turning Bonaire's mountains of glass into roads and sidewalks thanks to a glass crusher. After a few delays the machinery is finally here. It will be installed and in service in the coming weeks.

The long-awaited machine crushes glass bottles, jars, etc. into different size pieces from sand sized grains to larger chunks similar to diabase.

Currently Selibon collects glass in a specialized 'for glass only' vehicle and then transports it to a storage area at the processing center at Lagun. Now the collected glass can be processed immediately and used as an additive in construction, asphalt or as a kind of diabase.

An analysis has shown that 20% of home and business waste is glass. In 2020 and 2021 Selibon collected a total of 2200 tons of glass. The glass collected at the waste disposal sites over the years is approximately 15,000 tons.

The Reporter will provide an update once the new 'crusher' is in service.
