I had to remind myself this was Bonaire and not some third world island in Asia or the Pacific with knee deep plastic washing onto the shore from all parts of the world. Gratefully Bonaire has coastal cleanup groups and other volunteers like the One Hour Power Cleanup to at least make a dent in the washed-up trash. (see page 8)

Our incoming plastic trash problems are nothing compared to the Great Pacific Garbage Patch that is three times the size of France and the Garbage Patch near Japan. We see the images and think how horrible it is. Many might think, that's in another part of world and it doesn't affect me. But it does, the evidence is here in this image, the oceans are all connected.

Clean up volunteers on Bonaire will attest over 95+% of the trash they collect is plastic. They often find plastic products with manufacturing labels from all over the world drifting into our shores via our beautiful ocean. Unfortunately, we contribute too. We all use plastic, it's inescapable.

Talk show host Bill Maher of *Real Time with Bill Maher* recently said, "The ocean, it's dying. We're killing it and we can't live without it. We might be able to invent our way out of the mess that we've made of the atmosphere. There are promising new technologies for capturing carbon. But the oceans? That is a whole other kettle of dead fish."

Back in the 1950's, plastic was considered everything and the future of modern life. In those days, manufacturers had a hard sell to convince the people that had grown up in The Great Depression and World War II that it was okay to throw it away, plastic is disposable. They had been told all their lives to save as much as possible.

Plastics are everywhere. Even when we think we are not buy-

ing plastic, look again, that container, wrapper or label may be made of plastic. The stuff is in every animal, fish, human and even plants. According to CNN, humans consume the equivalent of a credit card of plastic every week. In the past 70 years the world has produced 230 times more plastic than it did in the 50's.

Soft drink manufacturers introduced plastic soda bottles in 1978 but two years before they hit the shelves, a study by the US food and Drug Administration said "substantial recycling of plastics is unlikely in the near future." But here we are today with countless plastic soda and water bottles being recycled daily.

Only 9% of the world's plastic is recycled. The rest ends up in landfills or is floating out there in our oceans lost at sea. Whales, dolphins, seabirds, turtles and fish get entangled in the floating plastic or eat it thinking it is food. The plastic makes them feel full, they starve and die leaving the plastic bits from their body to be

eaten by yet another animal and eventually turn into microplastics that we all drink or eat without knowing it.

There are countries trying to limit the production of new plastics made from petroleum fuels and instead use bio-based plastics sourced from vegetable fats, corn starch, straw, sawdust and even recycled food waste. Recycled plastics have potential to become 'new plastic products' and are currently sourced in construction, transport packaging, shoes and other non-food products.

Food manufacturers, markets, restaurants have relied on plastic for years and still do. This is one of the reasons for the Great Pacific Garbage Patch and even Selibon's overflowing waste management station (landfill). Using alternative food packaging requires food safety regulations, especially in this world of food importation. Until then, we are still relying on plastics for food packaging.

As for recycling on Bonaire, keep doing it. We reached out to Selibon for what happens to our recycled plastic once they receive it. We questioned whether it is compressed and stored, shredded to make new products, burned, buried or shipped away to yet another destination. At press time we had not received an answer, but we will let you know their response.

In the meantime, think about how much plastic you use in a day that will end up as trash. Take an inventory. Follow this link from EarthDay.org to calculate your own plastic use:

OLB planning to grant more erpachts



The OLB has identified 60 empty lots that can be made available via long leases (erpachts) for construction of residences. The waiting list of applicants dates back to 2021. According to the Land Registry, at least 85 people on the waiting list no longer meet the requirements for obtaining a long lease. Some, for example, are known to be dead. Once their names are cleared, the next 60 people on the list will be offered a leasehold plot.

The OLB is uncertain how the 2021 "Didam ruling" of the Supreme Court in the European Netherlands will affect their plans. The court ruled that government bodies must assure competitive and public selection procedures when selling or renting out land and or leaseholds. If all 60 waiting applicants asked for the first available erfpacht, the competition would be cumbersome. *DMR*

Six law enforcement proposals likely to pass

The House of Representatives Committee for Justice and Security's visit to Curação and Bonaire has moved six motions forward toward final adoption.

- The rules and supervision if the gambling sector should be tightened to combat money laundering and threats to the integrity of public administration.
- The rules for retirements should ensure that people in the Caribbean Netherlands who do heavy work, including the police and fire brigade, can retire earlier.
 - Control should be increased over the Caribbean ports

through which drugs and human trafficking reach the European Netherlands.

- A current program in the European Netherlands that encourages reporting of domestic violence and child abuse should be extended to the Caribbean Netherlands.
- Cooperation should be strengthened within the judicial chain in the Caribbean Netherlands by establishing uniform protocols, joint training and the sharing of resources, and by continuing to support the action plan already in place.
- Engaging and meaningful activities should be developed to assure support and guidance for young people at risk of criminal behaviour, through mentoring and counseling. *DMR*

Shooting with fatal outcome

A 20-year-old man with initials I.A.d.P. was shot and killed on the grounds of the former Sint Bernardusschool on Kaya L.D. Gerharts Sunday, November 10, around 10 p.m. The next night two suspects were arrested, a 21-year-old man with initials J.L.C. and a 41-year-old man with initials R.E.E.B.

Bonaire.nu has reported that a third suspect turned himself in at the police station Monday evening. His initials are D.D.L. He is 24-years old.

If you are big fan of Italian cuisine like the majority of the world, you are really going to love Rosa, a new café, osteria and patisserrie by Bon-Italy. Tucked into the passageways off Kaya Grandi, I blindly passed by Rosa for weeks before finally entering. When I did, I was totally surprised to find an Italian deli with freshly made pastries on display, a boutique shop of beautiful Italian food products, wine and a café with two Italian chefs.

Rosa first opened at the end of September, and I can say, there is nothing else like it on Bonaire. And that is exactly

what owner Jason Chapman, originally from Aruba, and manager Andrea Morfino from Piamonte, Italy have in mind with Rosa.

Jason said, "We are trying to bring a higher quality and standard to the island, you might say a touch of class, so people can enjoy themselves with a great quality coffee or wine and food in a nice atmosphere."

I toured the boutique shop with Andrea. He pointed out the real 100% Italian grain package pastas like Antonio Amato and Pastificio di Martino saying

eventually we will make our own homemade pasta. Can you imagine freshly made pasta in Bonaire?

There is a nice selection of mashed and crushed organic tomatoes from Sicily, extra virgin olive oils, olive pates with pistachios, white and black truffles, truffle oil, Tartufo candies, cookies and even Italian premium soft drinks.

One wall of the shop is lined with most any regional Italian wine. Andrea said, "There is anything you would like: white, bubbles, Prosecco, reds – everything."

Pastry chef Gianni Avena creates amazing little works of edible art in his tiramisu, bonet, cheesecakes, lemoncel-

lo, croissants, tarts and more.

In the café, chef Debora Luce crafts beautiful sandwiches from freshly baked ciabatta and focaccia with various fillings. There are lasagnas, salad, quiches and even pizza on the menu.

Rosa is just getting started and plans are still being made. An inviting mural is planned for the entry on Kaya Grandi and wine tastings should become a twice monthly event beginning in January. And this Friday, November 15, 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. will be the first event for the public with a Taste of Rosa buffet that includes five wines. The chefs will present start-

Corendon Airlines massive Airbus A350 touched down in Bonaire for the first time ever from Amsterdam on the evening of November 3. With 432 seats, the plane is one of the largest ever to land on the island.

JetBlue first flight, November 6

After several years of consolidated efforts, the first **JetBlue Airbus A320** landed at Bonaire International Airport (BIA) on November 5. The North American airline will fly roundtrip from New York's JFK airport to Bonaire twice a week, Tuesday and Saturday.

On board the inaugural flight were TCB CEO Miles Mercera, Bonhata director Veroesjka de Windt, BIA CEO Martin van der Scheer and first time visitor to Bonaire, David Jehn, vice president of network planning and airline partnerships at Jet-Blue.

In a welcoming ceremony at BIA, Jehn, announced a flight special that has since expired but reflected the price and service that has made JetBlue the sixth largest in the US.





Jehn said, "This is a unique destination and necessary for the future. JetBlue is the only airplane providing non-stop service from JFK."

After stepping off the inaugural flight from New York, CEO of BIA, Martin van der Scheer said, "This is truly a milestone for Bonaire. When I first came to the job two and half years ago, everyone was

saying, "you have to get Jet-Blue." Now we have it and we have to make it a success."

I am writing this letter to express my concerns about the way in which articles by René Zwart from sources such as dossierkoninkrijksrelaties.nl are cited and presented in your publications.

Although René Zwart is an experienced journalist and commentator, it is important to consider his background and potential conflicts of interest. Zwart has worked in the past as a communications advisor for various governments in the Caribbean parts of the Kingdom, including Bonaire, Aruba and Curação. It is important to note that he has no relationship with, or is employed by, the government.

His articles and commentaries are often characterized by a strong critical stance towards the current administration, which can lead to biased or biased reporting. Furthermore, Zwart himself has indicated that he no longer needs to be neutral since he ended his journalistic

Given these facts, it is essential that your publication maintains a critical eye on the sources that are cited. Blindly quoting from Zwart's articles without context or nuance can contribute to the dissemination of misleading or one-sided information, which can ultimately undermine trust in journalism.

I request that you take your journalistic responsibility seriously and inform your readers correctly and in a balanced way. This can be achieved by consulting multiple sources, providing context and stating any conflicts of

Property crime

and was injured. A witness stated that the driver of the scooter skidded when the driver braked. The victim was taken to the hospital by ambulance.

Nov. 3. Around 9 p.m. the driver of a moped was thrown to the ground when the moped collided with a car parked on Kaya Grandi. The driver of the moped was not wearing a helmet and injured his head. He was taken to the hospital by ambulance.

Oct. 28. Around 7 p.m. a car and a scooter collided on Kaminda Lac. The driver of the car stated that he suddenly saw the scooter appear on his side of the road and could not avoid a collision. After testing the driver of the car, aged 58, was arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol. His license was confiscated.

Oct. 26. Around 3:30 a.m. on Maria C. Hellmund-Boom Street a vehicle hit two pedestrians and drove away. Both people were injured and ambulances transport-

ed them to hospital. On Kaya Nikiboko Sùit the run-way driver lost control when her car hit the pavement and ended up in a patch of wood. She left the car and continued running through the woods. Around 4:20 a.m. the driver, a woman, 24, was arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol and for running away after an accident. Her driver's license was confiscated.

Oct. 25. Around 9:10 p.m. a man, 67, was arrested on Kaya Papa Cornes for driving under the influence of alcohol. The suspect was involved in a collision between two vehicles. Four attempts were made to have the suspect take a breath test, but without result. The suspect was also unable to show a valid driver's license and insurance papers and the vehicle did not have a valid license plate. He was fined and the vehicle was taken to the police station.

Arrests

Oct. 31. A man, 21, was arrested for violating the BES Firearms Act, attempted manslaughter and threats. The suspect was involved in the shooting incident at Onima and reported himself to the police station. The investigation into the case is ongoing.

Fire

Nov. 5. Around 8 p.m. the central control room received a report of a large fire at the Kaminda Lagun landfill. As there were two hot spots on the site a second fire truck was called to the scene. The fire was close to several storage tanks. The fire department took measures to cool and protect these tanks. Large clouds of smoke spread across the island in a north-westerly direction and residents of several homes were evacuated to another location. Other residents in the area were advised to keep windows and doors closed due to the smoke. The road to the landfill was immediately closed by the police. (See pages 7 & 8)

Oct. 29. Around 11 a.m. a fire was reported at a company on Kaya Katwijk. When the police arrived, smoke could be seen coming from the roof of the where a battery of a solar panel had caught fire. The fire brigade extinguished the fire. No one was injured.

Public Order

Nov. 4. In the night a fight was reported at a catering establishment on Bulevar Gobernador N. Debrot. Upon arrival, police officers separated two men who were arguing. The men stated that their argument got out of hand. One of the people involved had been injured in the nose, but neither man wanted to file a report. The officers temporarily confiscated the car keys of both men until the following morning.

Oct. 27. At the Onima drag strip a person who was watching the fevering saw a man with his face covered and a firearm in his hand who then fired shots in his direction. Immediately after the shooting, the suspect fled on a motorcycle. The person was not injured.

Dive Freedom joins Habitat dive fleet



Dive Freedom, a 1986 Ocean Sport Fisher is the newest addition to Captain Don's Habitat dive fleet. The 48 ft boat built for fishing was converted with insight and great mechanical ability by Habitat's dive manager Roger Haug.

The boat had been out of the water for several years following the death of its original owner. It had fallen into disrepair until Habitat rescued it.

Working day and night for five months, Haug first had to gut the boat before conversion could begin. He installed a new transmission, fuel lines, water pipes, wiring, new interior, hard wood seats and aluminum framing. The boat runs on two Yanmar 6LY400 engines.

Haug added a double camera table and shade canopy for divers on the stern. The fly bridge can seat six and is outfitted with a chart plotter, digital instruments, engine monitoring and sonar depth finder. The boat capacity is 26 divers.


Haug said, "We needed an extra boat for more people and larger groups. This saved us money rather than buying a new boat." Habitat now has a fleet of five dive boats with the oldest being *Bonaire Div- er*, a flat top that dates back to 1972.

Rincon dump fire likely arson

Three landfill fires, likely deliberately started, broke out at the landfill at Morotin, near Rincon, the night of Sunday, November 8. (An earlier fire at the Lagun landfill flared up the night of November 5. See separate story.) The Rincon Fire Department responded, declared it a major fire, and called for backup from Playa.

Three separate fires were burning, a likely indication that they were deliberately started. The three piles consisted mostly of pallets and other wood. Two fires were allowed to burn out. The third was partly covered and left smoldering. It presented no further danger Tuesday. The Fire Department said no other flammables were present that might ignite.

The fires presented no risk to the surrounding area, and the smoke did not spread to Rincon. The Reporter can report (exclusively) that smoke from burning wood could be smelled near Punta Wecua Sunday and Monday evenings. *DMR*

Arson suspected in Lagun fire too

The Public Entity Bonaire (OLB) suspects that fires that have raged in recent days at two landfills on the island were deliberately started.

The first fire, possibly caused by arson on November 5, reignited the night of November 9–10 at Lagun in dumped household and bulky waste. The fire was then covered with sand to deprive it of oxygen, but subsequently the recent heavy rains eroded channels in the sand and the wind whipped up the fine again. Heavy equipment can no longer access the site because the area is still wet and muddy.

The smoke forced several families resident in the area to evacuate. A wind reversal caused the smoke to drift east towards the lagoon rather than west towards people's homes for a time, but the relief it gave was temporary.

Selibon reports that most of the flammable materials including plastic, white goods, and bulky waste have completely burned, though they predict smoke emissions will continue for some time, especially during rain showers.

Experts from the Environmental Incident Service (MOD) of the RIVM will travel to Bonaire tomorrow

to investigate the risks to public health of the fires that keep flaring up at the landfill near Lagun. This is in response to the request for assistance made by last week.

Selibon has announced restrictions on further waste. Small vehicles can deposit bulky waste outside the entrance gate in the gray rubble containers. Vehicles with separated waste can deposit it in the sorting park and the area designated for cardboard collection. Large trucks can unload their waste in the bulky waste section.

Another opportunity coming to get "priked"

People over 60 will again be able to get a flu shot, a corona shot, or both on Tuesday, November 16. People under 60 with diabetes, heart and lung diseases, high blood pressure, or obesity will be vaccinated then too. Everyone can get the vaccinations without an appointment at the building on the property next to Telbo, Kaya Libertador S. Bolivar 8 in Playa from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.

People can also get the flu shot and the corona shot from their GP. Those who are bedridden can get the jabs at home. They can make an appointment via the toll-free number 0800 0800.

The previous vaccination days were so well attended that the Public Health Department and the general practitioners decided to organize two more in November (the first was on the 9th). (See page 14.) *DMR*

Three cops go the court

Three employees of the Dutch Caribbean Police Force (KPCN) were arrested on suspicion of assault and forgery earlier this year. Public Prosecution (OM) pressed charges and the three appeared in court on Thursday, November 7th.

In anticipation of the verdict, the KPCN has issued a proposed decision to dismiss the three involved. A proposed decision to dismiss is a declaration of intent. The charged parties have a week to appeal. *DMR*

Government to inspect business

Beginning next week the Supervision and Enforcement Directorate (DTH) will begin inspecting businesses in Kaya Industria. The DTH inspectors will check, among other things, whether businesses have the correct permits and are in compliance with the laws and regulations, the safety regulations, and "other important rules that contribute to order and safety on the island."

The investigations are not a crack-down. The purpose of the inspections

will be to make business owners aware of what the law requires and give them an opportunity to get their affairs in order so that they don't face violations and unnecessary sanctions in the future. Eventually all businesses on the island can expect inspection.

Residents and entrepreneurs who are unsure about which permits or documents they need or who have questions about the conditions of their permits can contact the Supervision and Enforcement Directorate at +599 715-5330. *DMR*.

Drug bust in Sorobon

A vessel, deemed suspicious, was pursued into the mangroves at Sorobon on Sunday, November 3rd and approximately 100 kilos of cocaine were found in a hidden compartment. The captain of the vessel, a man with initials J.M., was arrested, the cocaine was destroyed, and the boat has been towed to Kralendijk pending further investigation.

The bust was carried out by the Multidisciplinary Maritime Hub Bonaire. The MMHB consists of the Royal Netherlands Marechaussee, the Coast Guard, the Caribbean Netherlands Police Force and Customs. Those agencies jointly monitor compliance with the laws and regulations regarding border control, cross-border goods traffic, maintenance of public order and the safety of the residents of Bonaire. *DMR*

Don't fall for the WhatsApp scam

KPCN's cybercrime team warns that scammers are trying to take control of WhatsApp accounts. They ask for a person's phone number via Facebook Messenger, then send a WhatsApp message asking person to enter a code. If you send the code back to them, you no longer control your account. As usual, don't disclose security information online, no matter who asks for it. In this case the sender may already have stolen the account of a friend or relative. *DMR*

Creating Optimal Health

Why have I exiled polyunsaturated vegetable oils from my kitchen?

Vegetable polyunsaturated oils were massively introduced into the human diet in the post WWII years. Economic, industrial, and technological factors played significant roles in making these oils widely available and accepted. Their rise was further accelerated by health concerns about saturated fats and cardiovascular disease, leading to public health recommendations that promoted polyunsaturated fats as healthier options.

These are the main economic reasons why the consumption of polyunsaturated vegetable oils became massive after the war:

- Agricultural by-products of already produced crops like cottonseed, soybean, corn oils offered new revenue streams.
 - They were cheaper to produce than animal fats, especially for mass consumption.
 - Industrial advances, like solvent extraction and hydrogenation made production more efficient and versatile.
 - Longer shelf life and reduced spoilage costs were beneficial for retailers and manufacturers.
 - Rationing and resource scarcity during wars made vegetable oils a viable alternative.

- Processed food industry demand for stable, cheap fats fueled mass production.
- Effective marketing and health campaigns boosted consumer acceptance and demand.

On the other hand, for many years saturated fats have been demonized and accused of causing most cardiovascular problems. Recently, the accusing finger is turning into the direction of polyunsaturated vegetable oils, like corn, soy, sunflower, canola. Of course we are not forgetting sugar, but that can be the subject of another article.

Here are the main issues raised by critics of polyunsaturated oils:

- 1. When these oils are exposed to heat, light, or oxygen, they can form harmful free radicals and oxidation products that can damage cells, proteins, and DNA, potentially leading to chronic diseases, including cancer and cardiovascular disease.
- 2. Both omega 6 and omega 3 are essential fatty acids. To avoid inflammation, they must be consumed in balance, in a ratio of maximum 4:1, Omega 6 to Omega 3. Most vegetable oils are very rich in omega 6 and very poor in omega 3 breaking this balance. The imbalance they create between omega-6 fatty acids to omega-3s could potentially increase heart problems due to inflammatory effects. Some research indicates that high omega-6 intake can contribute to insulin resistance, obesity, and other metabolic disorders.
- 5. Most vegetable oils undergo extensive processing,

- including refining, bleaching, and deodorizing. This processing can remove beneficial nutrients and antioxidants while potentially introducing harmful substances. Additionally, some oils may contain additives or residues from chemical processing methods, such as hexane extraction.
- 6. Trans fats can also be formed during the processing of some polyunsaturated oils, particularly during high-temperature cooking. Trans fats are well-documented to increase the risk of heart disease, inflammation, and other health problems.

I have not used these types of oil in my kitchen for over 20 years. Of course, when I buy snacks and other highly processed foods, or when I eat out, I do consume them. By not using them in my cooking I have significantly reduced my consumption. Instead, I use cold press coconut oil, which is mainly saturated, extra virgin olive oil that is monounsaturated, and butter. For cooking my first option is coconut oil, but when the tastes call for something more mediterranean I blend butter and olive oil. For salads and any other dressings, I go for olive oil.

A Garden? Just Do It!

Caretakers

The Christmas holidays are coming and it's the time a lot of gardeners visit their family and friends all over the world. While you are busy preparing to leave, don't forget about your garden. I advise you to not leave your garden chores as the last item on your todo list. Once I left my garden at the last minute and experienced a lot of stress. But I learned these hints that might help you have fewer garden problems after your absence.

First, check with friends or family for those who have the time and are willing to take serious care of your garden during the busy month of December. Someone who has a feel for gardening and notices when a plant needs more or less water and not only when the plant has lost all its leaves. A friend promised to visit my garden two times a week, but he himself went to Curação for two weeks and asked another friend to take care of it who didn't have the time. You can imagine how that ended. Good care does not depend on payment. It depends on responsibility. Even when you pay for the job it can still go wrong if the caretaker is not taking the job seriously. Responsibility is the right attitude to look for when selecting someone to care for your garden.

The caretaker should walk through the garden with you at least two times. You might have sensitive young plants or plants that need special care. Caretakers need to know what to do with fruit from the trees. Should the caretaker let them get rotten or take them home and freeze some so you can still enjoy some of your fruit? For example, you could still sample the first papayas you have ever grown or your first string beans. Should the caretaker rake or clean up rotten fruit, trim the grass or move plants if it rains too much? Write things down so you will not forget any important information to pass on.

Don't forget to turn off the main WEB water access on the street when leaving for holiday and tell your caretaker to do so after watering the plants. The water pipes in the garden and house can get damaged and cause problems and loss of water. Turn off the water pipes in the bathroom, toilets and kitchen to prevent flooding if the pipes get damaged. This happened to me and it was not a nice experience.

Last advice about the water access don't turn it on fully. The water pressure is so strong it can damage the joints in the water systems in the bathroom. Half



open gives enough power to water with the garden hose. And don't forget to turn off the water hose.

Tell your caretaker to keep the gate closed when entering the yard. They often run in a hurry into the garden and leave the gate open. And while they are busy in the backyard, dogs, donkeys and goats come into the yard.

Because I have sensitive plants and plants hidden in and under shaded trees, the caretaker might not see the plants and forget to water them. I came up with the idea to make these plants more visible by putting Coca-Cola cans on a stick or hanging the can near the plant. The caretaker will see the cans and know the plants need special attention. You can find cans at Selibon in the recycle bins.

If you save rainwater, show your caretaker how you do it and tell them not to let the water stand too long in open containers because of denque plague. During my absence I often let the water go and turn all the buckets up side down because I don't know if people will empty the buckets. And it's important that you leave your garden clean and in good condition for the caretaker.

Well for now my garden friends you should have enough hints to prepare before leaving for your holiday. Just do it, start now.

TCB reports tourist statistics





According to preliminary visitor statistics published by The Tourism Corporation Bonaire (TCB) stayover visitors in September 2024 declined by 9.8% compared to September 2023. Then in October 2024, stayover visitors increased by 6.6% compared to October 2023. The annual Bonaire Regatta is considered responsible for boosting October's numbers by attracting visitors from neighboring islands like Curaçao and, especially, Aruba.

The monthly graphs of stayover visitors published by TCB show the same demographic profiles. Bonaire is visited by more Dutch than American tourists. The Dutch stay longer on the island, and

visitors from the Netherlands and the U.S. are older rather than younger.

In terms of cruise visitors, Bonaire welcomed 25,216 in June 2024 (from six cruise ships), 23,785 in July (from six cruise ships), 30,261 in August (from seven cruise ships), and 19,288 in September (from five cruise ships).

When I started writing about accessibility, I had absolutely no idea that it was going to be going on forever.

Accessibility has so many angles, curves and corners. It is like a person's life and the issues change with everything that changes in that life.

Initially my goal was to find a good way to walk my husband to town in his wheelchair and for him to be able to do as much as possible and go anywhere possible. But along the road we stumbled and fell, could not get into shops, could not go to the toilet when needed, find him the right incontinence materials and had to ask for whatever help was needed.

From "Please, he needs more physio-

therapy" to getting a pair of glasses, the list goes on and on.

Since he has passed away, I am the one who is confronted with accessibility. I need transportation to and from everything. I am in need of incontinence material and am fighting hard to get the good stuff. Getting a much needed scooter-mobile has not been approved, so I depend a lot on friends and the goodwill of others to get around.

When I made an appointment with a hearing expert, because my loss of hearing is bothering me a lot, I realized that this is also accessibility. If you cannot hear well, you are impaired. I am happily waiting for a set of hearing aids. I had absolutely no idea how many possibilities

exist in colors and styles. The help and advice you get is absolutely amazing.

Since the use of my hands is worsening, I have begun having trouble with my phone. You need a smartphone for almost everything you do nowadays. Internet banking is very hard to do and every time I try to work with this program, things go wrong. So, I decided to go to the bank personally, where I asked for help. I am very grateful that they were helpful, kind, had a lot of patience and were really wonderful.

I don't understand why there are no proper smartphones available for the elderly on Bonaire. I know they exist. The banks could offer special services for the elderly and have special days or hours to help the elderly and people with disabilities in their banking. They could even come to the care facilities on a regular basis.

Elderly people tend to fall more easily and all physiotherapists should offer fall

prevention courses regularly and make sure that this is advertised to the public.

When we, the elderly, fall almost every time we break an arm, a leg or a hip. Our houses should be made more fall proof by ergo-therapists.

And last but not least, there should be an affordable alarm system available for the elderly and persons with disabilities who live at home. When we fall now, we have to scream till somebody hears us.

Yes.... We baby-boomers are here to stay. So, be prepared and help us.

Reef Glimpses by Dee Scarr

Evolution of a New Undersea Habitat

The first step in the renovation of Bonaire's Old Pier (now called the North Pier) in the late 1980's, was to check the pilings for structural problems. Since those pilings were more than 20 years old, they were fully encrusted with sponges, orange cup corals, and other growth. A visual inspection was impossible with all that growth, so 50 of the Pier's 200 pilings were scraped naked. Cracks were found in several pilings; a one-cubic-meter form was built around each damaged area and filled with concrete, splinting the broken pilings. The Pier was structurally sound again.

But the sea bottom beneath the Pier was covered with scraped-off sponges and orange cup corals.

Back then I was guiding divers beneath the Pier about four times a week. I'd explain about the renovations in my dive orientations. The morays, sharptail eels, scorpionfish and other critters we visited were mostly unchanged, but to get to them we'd swim between denuded pilings, and over hundreds of sponges rolling around on the bottom.

After dive after dive of this, I finally remembered something I had learned from

Cathy Church: when a sponge is in contact with a hard surface such as a rock or a piling, it will attach itself to that surface. With the generous help of volunteer divers, by 1990 we had tied more than 600 of those detached sponges onto the Pier's bared pilings, where they still flourish.

Although we can't visit those sponges these days, there's a new pier and the beginnings of a new sponge garden right under Karel's Beach Bar's new pier.

There is one difficulty: my permit for tying sponges onto the pilings at Karel's requires that only sponges already unattached can be used. I never considered how few unattached sponges I'd find within diving distance of Karel's!

Nevertheless, the new sponge garden project began in mid-2022. Initial collections totaled about sixty sponges, which we tied onto 11 pilings.

Since then, I've seen some interesting animal life under and around the Karel's pilings. Several juvenile queen and French angelfish have lived around the tied sponges for a while, and baby surgeonfish also hang out there. Redlip blennies live in some of the purple tube spong-

es. Arrow crabs and banded coral shrimp have also claimed residences around the attached sponges.

And the sponges are especially interesting. The sponges we tied beneath the Old Pier had all already been growing there naturally. The changes to each sponge's environment were minimal: no more than maybe 20 ft (6 m) of depth, and some minor changes in light availability.

The sponges at Karel's were rescued from 20' ft (6 m) down to about 70' ft (21m) of depth on the reef slope, and tied onto pilings that are even shallower than 20'ft, and that receive much more light. And the sponges are doing fine.

Also, natural growth is beginning to encrust the pilings as well, especially pink bubble gum sponges and quite a few little stony corals. Schools of needlefish hang around in the shade near the surface, and snappers, grunts and jacks patrol the bottom.

That's not all, but I'm not telling all. Check it out for yourself!

You can enter from Karel's or from the Park Tului to visit this new habitat. Be very aware of boat traffic, especially if you're snorkeling. The pier is shallow for scuba, but a nice finish to a dive on the reef slope.



Dee Scarr has been nurturing marine life on Bonaire since 1981. Her Bonaire Harbor Healing Project is still ongoing. It began by informing users of the Old Pier about how bat-

teries poison the water; numbers fell from more than 100 batteries removed from the bottom the year before the campaign, to fewer than 10 batteries the year after. Information on touchthesea.com about collecting fishing line has been shared by Sea Turtle Conservation Bonaire with spectacular results, especially on line-collecting dives beneath the Old Pier.

Isidel Beach Park officially opened last May and is definitely a success with the public as 'the people's park.' Kids, families and divers are there every day and most every month there is a movie, bingo or other activity. But what we've been waiting for is the opening of Seaside Krioyo Fusion, a restaurant unlike any other on Bonaire, owned and run by local chef Robertico Bernabella of Rincon.

In late 2023, Isidel Park Commission held a competition

between 12 local vendors and Robertico came out on top winning the prime restaurant/bar spot with a magnificent ocean and park view set right on the water.

Remarking on the competition, Robertico humbly said, "They wanted a local person to promote local business and food."

But Bonaire culinary arts experts think it was more than that. Robertico was schooled in all things cooking, first by his Rincon family where most every week the whole family would come together and cook.

Robertico said, "Everyone was always cooking, and I like to cook more than I like to eat. When I was 11, my mother told me, "I'm sick," and that I needed to start doing something for myself and that was the beginning."

Robertico's company is named Clara Delight BV as Clara was his mother's name. Attending SGB's HORECA (hotel, restaurant and café) school, Robertico was mentored and befriended by teacher Vernon Martijn of Rincon, a chef trained in the Netherlands. But before that he was a member of Bonaire's first culinary team back in 1995. Martijn has been influential in Robertico's chef career and assisted him with his presentation to the park commission for the Isidel Park competition

As for the food and the name Krioyo Fusion, Robertico explained, "Everywhere you go you get the same thing. Fusion style means from different

cultures. They tell us in school, go back to your roots, the foods of your grandmother. We are taking local food and changing it."

A specialty and great example of Krioyo Fusion is the Goat Burger with a unique sauce made of avocado. Another menu item you won't find or taste anywhere else on the island is Chicken Casserole Rouleau, stewed chicken wrapped in a crispy spring roll with Daniel sauce and siracha mayo. A look at the menu and you'll see are local with twist, even the majority of vegetables, fish, chicken and goat are pure local Bonaire.

Open less than month, Krioya Fusion is doing a 'soft opening' with a lunch and bites menu, full bar and coffees. But in the next few weeks, Robertico will expand to offer breakfast, lunch and dinner and it will be exciting to see and taste the expanded menus.

The restaurant has a unique design with seating on two levels: a covered upstairs with panoramic views of the park and ocean, floor level patio, bar and, of course, the beach with lounges and palapas. Seaside Krioya Fusion is perfect for parties or to enjoy Happy Hour with friends. Robertico has a staff of five bar and wait staff and three chefs.

Robertico has been a member of Bonaire's culinary team, Italy Stage internship and traveled as a chef to Cuba, Statia and the Netherlands. Locally he was a chef at Divi Flamingo, Ingredients and It Rains Fishes.

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

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

Tips for Observers

- · Spawning is never guaranteed, especially in a changing climate. When in doubt, go for a dive
- Predictions do not include buffers; we suggest entering the water well before predicted times
 • Dive in a place with high coral cover
- Make multiple dives on multiple nights
 Dive shallower than 50' to maximize dive time
- · Use a moderately bright dive light
- Scan the water column for clouds of spawn Spawn from most brain/star/elkhorn/staghorn corals looks like snow/confetti/polka dots
- · Spawn from starlet, pillar, maze, and pineapple corals and male great star corals looks like puffs of smoke or sprays of fine sand
- · Spawn from female great star corals looks like chunky vomit (hooray!)
- · Spawning depends on local sunset times; to adjust dives based on your local sunset times,
