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Road to Art reveals strong Bonaire art community

One of the more innovative events held on Bonaire in recent years is the Kaminda di Arte (Road to Art) organized by Sobremesa Gallery and Art Center. This was the second year for the two-day running art show giving art lovers an opportunity to follow a map and visit participating local artists at work in their studio or in galleries. Approximately 35 artists and crafts people were plotted on the map for the road to art. *The Reporter* loves this event because it is actually more of an art treasure hunt because you never know what you will find and the journey is sometimes a bit challenging with Bonaire's road signage. All in all we loved it.

Organizer of Kaminda di Arte, Karine de Wit, owner of Sobremesa, said she was happy with the results and received many positive reactions from the artists and the visitors. "I think it's a great way to get to know the

artists of our community and give them an opportunity to present themselves, show their work and discuss what they are doing. Most artists and galleries had a continuous stream of people all weekend," said Karine.

Karine told us the majority of art visitors were local but hopes to involve tourism guests in the next few years to acquaint them with the many working artists on Bonaire.

Of the 35 participating artists in the two day event, 15 work in the fine art fields of painting, sculpture, watercolor and lithography. Many of the craftspeople work in glass, mosaics and repurposed materials which is important when living on an island. We were surprised to find a number of fabric artists working in needlework crochet and macrame.

For this article we focused on nine of the artists we visited.

Work shown in top row, L-R:

Ghislaine Monte – Ghis Arts is always broadening her range of mediums from painting with juice of aloe on linen to broad palette knife painting. The colors are either bright and fanciful or subdued, realistic stylized portraits with social commentary

Josephine Ebing has been a sculptor for 45 years. As any dedicated sculptor would do, when she came to Bonaire 30 years ago she shipped alabaster to sculpt. Her stone heads are sculpted with three faces and have a tone of mystery. Josephine is still working at 80 years old.

Eris Cremers was an art teacher in Holland for 28 years. He lets himself be inspired

by the materials he uses which comes from nature. The little houses he builds usually don't contain people but only evidence that they reside in the little houses. If there are people, then they have no faces to let the viewer use his imagination. Eric explained, if it isn't challenging then I get bored.

Loes Praagman – Aloha Bonaire Loes' work can be seen all over the island on wall murals. Her work is colorfully bright and fits perfectly on Bonaire. Her portraiture is her portraiture is spot on in capturing the personality of the subject.

The island won't become poorer on January 1 after all

Until this week the prospects for Bonaire's economy looked grim. The general consensus was that, despite the minimum wage coming into effect on January 1, the purchasing power of Bonaireans, already weak for the most needy in the population, would also drop that day by 10%. The reason: a slew of spending reductions and tax increases introduced by the Schoof cabinet would also take effect. The tax increases had been declared non-negotiable.

In a sudden turn around though, The Hague announced in several press releases issued on December 6 that the threatened subsidies would be restored. And it turned the tap back on for other support funds the island had been receiving. An explanation follows. It is not brief.

When the Schoof cabinet (with Gert Wilders watching in the background) first turned its attention to BES, it immediately began announcing the elimination of several subsidies and its intentions to reduce much support spending that had become the norm during the Rutte years. That spending has long been a thorn in the side of the conservatives, some of whom have openly declared their opinion that all the island governments are inept and corrupt.

They apparently haven't noticed that little Bonaire has changed. A condition of joining of the Netherlands as a municipality was that Bonaire's governing style had to become more Dutch. The island politicians had adapt to responsible government, implement budgeting and financial reporting, and adopt transparent governance that complied with rules and laws. Accepting the condition, Bonaire's leadership took reform seriously and made steady progress. The Rutte governments responded generously, funding many upgrades in life on the island. But the last contributions of the Rutte Four government will expire at midnight on December 31.

With the year end approaching, the Schoof government had to move expeditiously on making new expenditure decisions and passing new financial legislation, including a planned tax increase. The new taxation laws, which The Hague declared non-negotiable, would take effect on January 1.

The Central Dialogue, the local consultation platform on Bonaire that includes the Public Entity, unions, employer representatives, and the Chamber of Commerce, filed a reasoned and data supported protest. It argued that such important changes should be based on economic data and reasoned analysis and discussion

The Executive Council and the Island Council objected as well. On the other hand, according to State Secretary for Kingdom Relations Zsolt Szabó, the Executive Council and the Island Council did encourage the passage of an amended version of the tax plan. The Cabinet pressed ahead and successfully convinced Parliament to pass the tax legislation.

The ink was hardly dry when the Schoof cabinet discovered they had passed legislation that, as of January 1, would start taxing those earning the new minimum wage on their income and benefits. Bonaire's supporters among the other parties in the shaky coalition were outraged.

The Cabinet immediately moved to delete the tax increase. However, legislation once passed is complicated to change, especially in a hurry. Shortcuts would be required that would need the full support of the other coalition parties. That support apparently did not come cheap. On December 6 the Schoof cabinet issued several press releases which cumulatively promised "to focus on strengthening the livelihood security of residents with lower and middle incomes in the Caribbean Netherlands in the coming years....We also aim to align the social security system on the islands more closely with that of the European Netherlands."

As late as November 28, State Secretary Szabó was still announcing island subsidies the cabinet would allow to expire on January 1. Then on December 26 the government released a flood of press releases that promised "to further enhance the livelihood security of residents in Bonaire, Sint Eustatius, and Saba in the coming years." The reason for this change of heart are explained in the accompanying story, "The island won't become poorer on January 1 after all." A summary of the promises follows.

• To align the social security system on the islands more closely with that of the European Netherlands. This includes introducing parental leave, short-term care leave, and unemployment benefits."

- A port in Saba, food security initiatives, and road construction."
- Investments in sustainable energy, the introduction of public transport, and the construction of affordable housing.
- €2 million for island services related to poverty and debt.
- Continued funding school meals in both the European and Caribbean Netherlands.
- "A further elaboration of the additional resources" that this cabinet has reserved for improving subsistence on Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba when the cabinet addresses these issues in the spring. *DMR*.

ZJCN increases benefits for older patients

Care and Youth Caribbean Netherlands (ZJCN) announced new coverage that will take effect on January 1:

- Exercise therapy for COPD
- Exercise therapy in cases of severe rheumatoid arthritis
- Geriatric rehabilitation care
- Right to a second companion for medical transfers
- Suitability assessment for companion during medical transfers
- Abolition of the 'best ear' criterion

Also, the premium rate charged to employers will be reduced from 11.7% to 9.3% as of 1 January 2025. *DMR*

Contractors and KvK object to permit delays

Recently, contractors and project developers gathered at a meeting organized by the Chamber of Commerce (KvK) regarding delays reported in issuing permits. BES legislation (BES Building Decree) requires a building permit application to be decided within sixteen weeks. According to reports, permit applications are presently taking two to three times longer. Such delays increase the costs of building significantly.

The KvK calls wants all parties – from contractors and project developers to local governments and policy makers – to solve the problem. It offers to facilitate the meeting. The KvK also encourages contractors and project developers to unite so they can effectively speak as a single voice. *DMR*.

Challenging a purchase threshold for housing

Public letter to the Executive Council of Bonaire December 4, 2024

Dear Executive Council, Island Council,

Following the publication on *Dossier Koninkrijksrelaties* of November 28, 2024 (appendix 1) about your proposal to introduce a purchase threshold for newcomers of \$533,750 to protect the housing market, I would like to express my concerns. It seems that this measure is being introduced quietly, without broad consultation or clear explanation to the Bonairean community. I refer to the start note (appendix 2).

Why the proposed threshold is absurd

According to figures from the CBS (2022), the average income of a household on Bonaire is \$36,100 per year. (appendix 3) Based on these figures, a household can obtain a mortgage of approximately \$171,000 according to calculations by Crooij & Flipse (appendix 4). Even with your own savings or help from family, a home of \$303,000 (NHG amount) usually remains out of reach. Let alone a home up to \$533,750.

At the moment, several homes in the price range of \$400,000 to \$500,000 have been for sale for more than six months. These homes are not being bought by the local population because they are financially out of reach. It is unrealistic and absurd to expect that these would suddenly become accessible to Bonaireans with a threshold of \$533,750.

In addition, owners of homes between \$400,000 and \$533,750 will be hit hard by this measure. These homes, which have often been on the market for a long time, will probably remain on the market for even longer. Due to the restrictions imposed on potential buyers, the market for these homes is being restricted even further. This will result in a loss of value and financial pressure for the owners, who may have to sell their homes at a loss.

With a threshold of \$533,750, all apartments in resorts such as Caribbean Club, Resort Bonaire or other similar locations, that are offered well below this threshold, would also no longer be allowed to be purchased by investors. This means that these apartments would become exclusively available to the local population. However, this is completely unrealistic. In addition, high monthly HOA (Home Owners Association) fees make these apartments even less attractive.

It raises the question whether the Executive Council has properly considered the broader consequences of this policy.

Instead of helping, this threshold actually works to the disadvantage of the local population, because:

- No solution to the shortage of affordable housing: The proposal only focuses on excluding certain buyers, without addressing the core of the problem the lack of affordable housing.
- **Negative impact on homeowners:** Homes between \$400,000 and \$533,750 will become less marketable, leading to loss of value and financial damage to their owners.
- Similar policies elsewhere have failed: In Vancouver, Canada, a similar measure was introduced to protect the housing market from foreign buyers. The result was minimal: prices hardly dropped, but homes were still for sale for a long time and investment in new construction dried up, which only increased the housing shortage.

Introducing a purchase threshold does not address the real problems of the housing market on Bonaire. A structural solution requires:

- 1. Investments in affordable new construction. Build social and middle-class homes that match the financial possibilities of the local population.
- 2. Subsidies and favorable mortgage conditions. Stimulate first-time and local buyers with financial support, such as subsidies or lower interest rates.
- 3. Government initiatives for affordable housing. Ensure that the government itself realizes housing that is focused on the local community.

Conclusion

The proposal to introduce a purchase threshold of \$533,750 is not only unrealistic, but does not solve the housing shortage for the Bonairean population. In fact, it increases inequality, does not stimulate new construction and can cause economic damage. I therefore call on you to review your plans and focus on policies that actually help the local population. Only by working together on structural solutions can the housing market on Bonaire become fairer and more accessible.

Government not listening to the fishing sector

Piskabon sent this letter to the government Monday, December 9.

Dear Executive Council,

Piskabon asks for your attention to this urgent letter.

On many occasions Piskabon has tried to stay in communication through different channels with the Government of Bonaire, pointing out topics of urgency and importance, giving and requesting information, but this has been in vain in our opinion.

Piskabon feels that the cooperative is not taken seriously and the local fishermen are the ones who are harmed in this situation.

Piskabon has not yet heard what is going to happen with its zorgcontract for 2025, the only information is that \$150,000 has been budgeted for 2025 again. With

this amount Piskabon cannot serve its membership properly and Piskabon is not getting an answer on e.g. questions about our budget adaptation for 2025, submitted to the Island Council at the end of last October.

Fisheries is one of the most basic economic sectors of Bonaire and that for years has been neglected. Security of human existence, is the level at which he can provide for his own food which makes him less dependent on factors outside his influence. The choice for sustainable development for Bonaire is not possible without giving its own food production the place and attention it deserves. And in this we as organized fishermen in Piskabon demand the Executive Council's attention urgently.

Hoping that the Executive Board realizes the urgency, we conclude.

Since there is no MLS (multiple listing service) on Bonaire, if I list my house with one real estate agency, will other agencies be able to show and sell it? Thanks, Jill

To ensure that all possible buyers see your property, list with an agency that works cooperatively with all other agencies on the island. At RE/MAX, we are happy to work with any established real estate agency to sell your home. Our primary goal is to sell your property as soon as possible for the best possible price. 



Process of enforcing environmental permits has begun

Every business on Bonaire must now qualify for either an environmental compliance permit or proof that they have been inspected and exempted from needing one. New companies are required to qualify at startup. A program to bring established companies into compliance kicked off in November. Initially only catering and construction companies are being registered. Companies in other sectors will receive notice later.

The Establishments & Activities Decree BES has been in force since April 1, 2024. This decree regulates what operating provisions companies have to make in order to protect the environment. As a legal requirement, every company doing business on Bonaire must register their existence with the OLB. They will be visited by an inspector from the Supervision & Enforcement Directorate who will determine whether the nature of their business requires a permit. If company needs a permit, a permit issuer from the Spatial Planning & Development Directorate will contact them and initiate the application process.

To get started, companies can contact the website of the OLB (www.bonairegov.com) or the website with environmental information (www.infomilCN.com).

Airport to upgrade arrivals area

Bonaire International Airport (BIA) has announced that an overhaul of the arrivals area is coming. The new baggage carousel, which was installed last year, will be further upgraded. A large fan will cool the baggage claim area. New signs and queue barriers will help arriving passengers find their way out of the baggage area to the taxis, car rentals, and waiting family and friends.

Electronic gates to be installed by the Public Entity Bonaire (OLB) will improve traffic flow through the visitor tax checks. *DMR*.

OLB wants to make houses too expensive for immigrants

The Executive Council has proposed to discourage immigration, and to make more housing available to Bonaireans, by requiring anyone who wants buy a home on Bonaire for less than \$533,750 to acquire a housing permit. Housing permits would be issued to only those people who have a "social connection" with the island or who have lived here for at least five years. A self-occupancy requirement will also be introduced. The Council is assuming the restrictions will reduce the price Bonaireans have to pay to own their own homes.

Most people who are already here seem to agree that the population is growing too fast. And all agree that the need for affordable housing is dire. But there doesn't seem much support for the notion that the Executive Council can solve either problem by arbitrarily fiddling with the market for half-million dollar homes.

Critics point out that, according to the law of supply and demand, when supply goes down, prices go up. Therefore restricting the supply of houses newcomers are allowed to buy would predictably increase the value of higher end residential properties available, including those below the \$533,750 threshold.

The law of supply and demand also says that when demand goes up, prices go up. Therefore builders would be even more motivated to build more expensive houses than affordable houses.

As to the proposed self-occupancy requirement, if people who own houses have to live in them, those houses will not be available for anybody to rent. *DMR*.



Statia to build care center

A new Integrated Care and Living Center is in the final planning stages on St. Eustatius. The new center will consolidate high-quality preventive, medical, and geriatric care in one location. The care will be tailored to the specific needs of the Statia community. The Center is expected to be completed within 3 to 5 years.

The Steering Committee overseeing this multi-functional care center comprises of the island's four healthcare partners: the St. Eustatius Auxiliary Home Foundation, the St. Eustatius Health Care Foundation (SEHCF), the Ministry of Health, Welfare, and Sport (VWS), and the Department of Public Health (GGD) of the Public Entity of St. Eustatius (OLE).

Executive Council forfeits \$30 million

Thirty million dollars will disappear from the OLB budget at midnight on December 31. Because the Executive Council did not spend the money, it will be declared "underspending" and will be forfeited to The Hague. According to the Financial Supervision Board, the OLB is failing to spend money allocated by the European Netherlands partly because of "the lack of administrative decision-making by the Executive Council" DMR

Pink rice risotto with merguez sausages, mixed mushrooms, raising and parmesan

Chef Corjan Hoogerheide, Lekker Thuis Restaurant



For 2 persons

Ingredients 150 g (¾ C) pink risotto rice • 1/2 shallot, chopped • 1 clove garlic, minced • dash of white wine • 2 dl (7 oz) vegetable stock • 100 g (3/4 C) mixed mushrooms (Shitake, Chestnut, beech mushroom, oyster mushroom) • 1 tablespoon cream cheese • 25 g (1/3 C) Parmesan cheese • 20 g (1/4 C) raisins • 1/2 sprig rosemary, finely chopped • 4 merguez sausages • 10 slices of fuet hard sausage • 10 pistachio nuts, coarsely chopped • Oil • Pepper and Bonaire sea

Fry the shallot together with the pink risotto rice in some oil. Deglaze with a dash of white wine. Add the stock, a little at a time, while stirring, allowing it to be absorbed by the rice. Repeat until the

risotto is cooked, then add the raisins. Stir in the tablespoon of cream cheese. Fry the sausages until nicely brown all around. Fry the coarsely chopped mushrooms and season with rosemary, salt and pepper.

Spoon the risotto onto a plate and arrange the sausages and mushrooms on top. Garnish with the pistachio, fuet sausage and parmesan.

508 lionfish caught during Lionfish Derby

Saturday, November 30, STINAPA's 10th annual Lionfish Derby took place at Washington Slagbaai National Park.

Although the park is temporarily closed for diving, STI-NAPA made an exception for the lionfish hunt because of the noticeable increase in the lionfish population within the park. Lionfish are an invasive species with no natural predators. They reproduce quickly, so can rapidly become a threat to the ecosystem in the marine park. The Lionfish Derby is one of the ways to help control the growth of the lionfish population. Thanks to the efforts of the participating teams, a total of 508 lionfish were removed during the derby.

Things are changing. Oh boy, are things changing.

In the 1980's we had a spiny urchin die-off from some urchin disease; urchins stumbling along like zombies for a couple of days and then perishing, leaving their spines everywhere. Next it was spotted morays, who used to be seen on every Bonaire dive, being found dead; the moray population is just beginning to come back. Then it was our sharpnosed puffer population, which increased so drastically the overpopulation caused a die-off, and dead sharpnosed puffers were all over the reefs for a few days.

The reefs were still our glorious Bonaire reefs, though.

Until Stony Coral Tissue Loss Disease arrived, dissolving entire coral colonies in hours like some monstrous science fiction pestilence.

So, other than that, Mrs. Lincoln, how did you like the play?

When I worked on San Salvador, in the Bahamas, the mostly vertical dropoff got little sunlight so it never had much stony coral growing on it. Morays were not common, but we did see spotted morays and greens on occasion. I don't remember sharpnosed puffers or long-spined urchins, but I'm sure they were around.

When we fed the fish on San Sal (in the late 1970's), the fish who came in were mostly groupers, especially Nassau groupers and coneys -- but there was one occasion when a 4-5' reef shark cruised in for a snack. Sharks were more likely to be seen out in the blue water, but only occasionally.

Bonaire's reefs don't seem to be following the same pattern, but even I am seeing slight changes, mostly because I'm trying to do REEF fish surveys on each dive. (Note that most of my dives have been off town, between Karel's Beach Bar and Something Special, and between 1 and 5 p.m. [1300-1700].) One of the first differences I noticed was seeing yellowtail snappers again. Okay, they're small – maximum 12" (30.48 cm) but I've seen three at once, which is a significant change over the months in which I saw not a single yellowtail!

I've also been seeing small schools of blue runners between shore and the dropoff, and on one dive saw six rainbow runners cruising in the blue water. On another dive I saw four morays! Two were purplemouths and two were spotted, the purplemouths and one spotted were at different block-moorings, and one spotted was on the reef slope.

)

As for the invertebrates, have you noticed all the banded coral shrimp? At least off town, I see several pairs on every dive – definitely more than formerly.

So, obviously, climate change and other human-produced issues are causing reef habitat changes as well. One of the easiest ways to check fish populations is REEF's website, reef.org. They – farsightedly -- began sponsoring Caribbean fish surveys in the early 1990's for hundreds of locations, including all of our dive sites on Bonaire. You can choose a site and a date and see all the fish which were reported then and compare that with another location or date.

How things will turn out is something that scientists must be working on, even as you read this. What are your own observations and predictions? Clarify them now, record them in some way with the date, and wait to see how accurate you were.

Since 2022 Scarr has been trying – and failing – to get justice for Bonaire from Silversea cruise lines, whose ship dumped more than 485 pounds (220 kgs) of broken glass and other debris on Bonaire's reef. There was a partial success in that most of that debris has been taken out of the ocean, by volunteer divers.

Calling all ocean lovers



For the last few months, divers and snorkelers on Bonaire have become a bit more fish savvy thanks to the REEF (Reef Environmental Education Foundation) fish ID presentations by Carmen Toanchina. Toachina, an avid member of the REEF Volunteer Fish Survey Project is heading up the Bonaire program to get ocean lovers out on the reefs of Bonaire to see what's there.

So far, Toachina has held three different sessions since the classes began in October at Trans World Radio (TWR). The crowd has ranged in size from 15 to 50.

They've covered a series of topics from how to identify local fish species to what it means to be a citizen scientist and the 25 most common fish species on Bonaire.

The next session is scheduled January 28 at 7 p.m. All of the fish ID sessions are free to everyone.

What is the REEF Volunteer Fish Survey Project?

REEF protects marine life through education, service and research. This is

A Garden? Just Do It! Christmas, the rainy season and sustainability

Wow, so much is going on and I have to make sharp choices for all the different activities. But as usual during the writing of my column, things come up spontaneously in my mind and so the result becomes another story and the story has another result.

Of course Christmas is the first subject. I guess you have already prepared everything for a great Christmas holiday. A few days ago I saw a beautiful decoration to welcome your guests as soon as they come to your gate. The photo shows a great combination of Christmas plants together in a nice big pot in front of the fence. This is a cool decoration and it's not too late to do before Christmas. You can plant one big pot or a lot of smaller containers running along the length of the street fence.

For your friends in poor health, a healthy Christmas box would be a nice gift and you can make it yourself. Old wall paper, Christmas gift paper, old Christmas cards glued on a painted or cloth covered box can make a creative gift box. Decorate inside the box as well. Fill the box with fresh stuff from your garden such as fruits, vegetables, herbs, flowers or dried herbal tea. I'm guessing that your friends will be very happy with such a great fresh and healthy Christmas gift.

Are you looking for Christmas placemats? Make them yourself. Cut out the size of placemats you want from boxes. Paint them and stick Christmas cards or dried flowers (bougainville, rose leaves, dried leaves) on them.

Meanwhile there might be some work to do in the garden because of all the rain. With so much water in the plant containers, there are rotten leaves to compose, fruit and veggies to harvest and trees and grass to trim.

First, check if plant roots in containers are rotting. Put a finger in the dirt and if you feel too much water, let the water drain out and remove the plant to a dry place.

Rain is great to rot dropped leaves and you can compost them. So don't take them to Selibon, but add this very healthy stuff to trees and in your garden. If you see mushrooms growing, that means a healthy ecosystem. So treasure the mushrooms for the good work they do in the soil as it leads to a balanced, healthy garden.

Collect seeds from your harvested vegetables and herbs. Participate in the project: Make Bonaire Green Again. With all the rain the soil is well soaked and ready for growing greens. Make use of this



opportunity now because as soon as the rainy season ends the young plants must be rooted and strong enough to survive the next drought.

Last but not least, some science news. Technology is researching sustainable and ecological alternatives in mass agriculture and urban agriculture.

There is a project to use charred coffee grounds to strengthen concrete. Because

concrete (made of cement) is a very bad product for nature, the scientists are looking for a new nature friendly alternative. The charred coffee grounds, called BioChar are used instead of sand and can provide a 30% increase in the strength of the material. (CNN)

The planet is in the highest need for changes in our behavior to nature. Research will lead to new life styles and changed human habits that can balance the relationship between humans, nature, and the planet. This new balance can be helped with a garden in your yard. Look for a place at your house to garden and start gardening. It's a urgent call.

The presentation led by Julianka Clarenda and translated in English by Lauriane Ammerlaan focused on funchi or polenta, one of the Islands's staple foods made from sorghum or maize.

Local Bonairean Rudoph Thode illustrated how the grains are pulverized into a type of flour on a hard stone (mula). The flour or 'maishi chiki' is then used to make polenta/funchi, pancakes, porridge or sweets.

Alex Plantijn demonstrated how handmade tools for cooking were made from local trees like the Palo di Boneiru. When the wood is cut from this hard wood tree two days before or after the full moon the wood is more durable. Tools are sculpted to the right size with a butcher knife or machete.

Plantijn explained the tools could last up to 100 years. The tools are totally organic and it's good to use natural products to reduce waste on the island and teach the youth to be more sustainable.

In addition to the presentations, Nos Zjilea always features great homemade local food from the kitchen, crafts, local music and cultural dancing.

Christmas music rang throughout and young dancers from Dance and More offered some Christmas themed choreography for entertainment.

All the regular offerings were available with homemade BBQ, stobas, fresh coconut water, sales from the greenhouse for gardening and feeding goats, as well as a jump house for the kids.

Nature Cooking School Bonaire was open for business at their new home at LVV. Owner Saeed Lourens gave introductory tours of their new thriving garden and served vegan pizzas with a choice of toppings and vegan burgers.

LVV director Maurice Adriaens served as tour guide on a bus tour out to the field where businesses can lease a plot for their own growing.

Bonaire Daily Fresh, now owned by the Van der Valt family, has almost completed expansion and is expected to start growing fresh hydroponic veggies in late January.

A goat farm with 400 residents is now in operation. Another LVV green house and field of crops are growing various peppers, warmas, assorted beans, yucca, avocado, okra, pumpkin, calabas and papaya to provide fresh vegetables for sale that don't have to be imported to the island

And a fruit grove with banana, lemon, starfruit, tamarind, avocado, oranges and mangos is thriving. The trees are planted

primarily accomplished through the survey project. Since its launch in 1993, this citizen science program has generated one of the largest marine life databases in the world. In 2024, the database surpassed 300,000 surveys conducted at almost 18,000 sites throughout the world's oceans by over 18,000 volunteer divers and snorkelers worldwide.

The project allows volunteer Scuba divers and snorkelers to collect and report information on marine fish populations as well as selected invertebrate and algae species. The data are collected using a fun and easy standardized method, and are housed in a publicly-accessible database on REEF's Website. These data are used by a variety of resource agencies and researchers. To learn more visit REEF.org.

wooden block so specific areas and lines remain raised. The block is inked and is a type of relief printing. The print above is called Duality and was created as a protect against wars, oppression and injustices in our so-called modern world.
